Akron Court of Honor Is Held

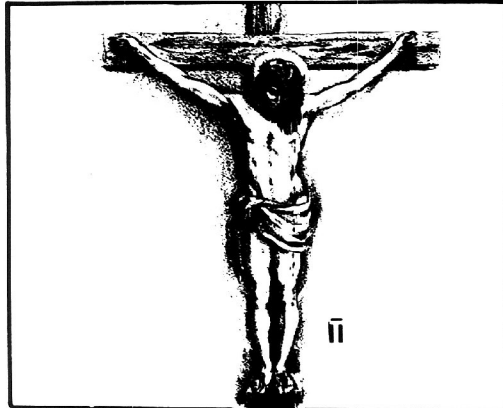

History of the Cross

The rich history of the cross is shrouded in legend and superstition. A crucifix was said to have shed blood in 1512, during an Easter Day battle between the French and Spanish. A statue of Christ on the cross reportedly performed healing wonders during the Plague of Malaga in 1649. Legend also has it that when St. Francis of Assisi was praying, a voice from the crucifix told him, "Repair my house." At first he took "house" to mean church; when he later learned that it meant his own spiritual life, he renounced his worldly goods and took up orders. And the old wives' tale still persists in some quarters that the Gypsies are accused because one of them, a wayfaring metalsmith, made the nails that were used at the Crucifixion!

Legend says that the crucifixion cross was made of four types of wood—to represent the four corners of the earth. The simple Latin cross, with an upright and single shorter transom, is the commonest. With two transoms it is called a patriarchal cross; with three, a papal cross. A cross widely used by Slavs and others of Eastern rites has two transoms and a slanting crosspiece below.

Serves In Mobile Flotilla

Fireman Charles Richard Westerman, USN, son of Richard L. Westerman, R. I., Akron, is serving with River Assault Flotilla One, a unit of the Mobile Riverline Force in Vietnam.

Members of the flotilla man heavily armed gunboats, most of which are conversions of World War II amphibious landing craft. These boats are used in providing close logistic and gunfire support for units of the Army's Ninth Infantry Division of the Mekong Delta.

The versatile Mobile Riverline Force is a combined team of Navy and Army units. Operating from Navy seagoing ships anchored in the rivers, Army infantry assault the enemy from Navy troop carriers while heavily armed and armored Navy gunboats provide gunfire support and necessary supplies of food, water and ammunition.

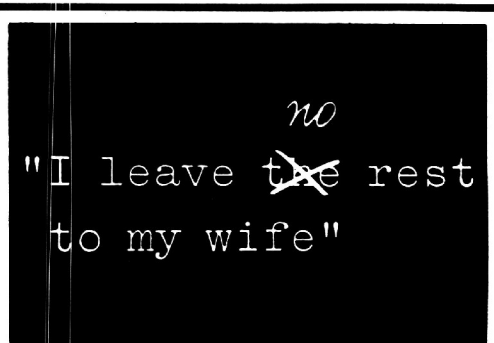

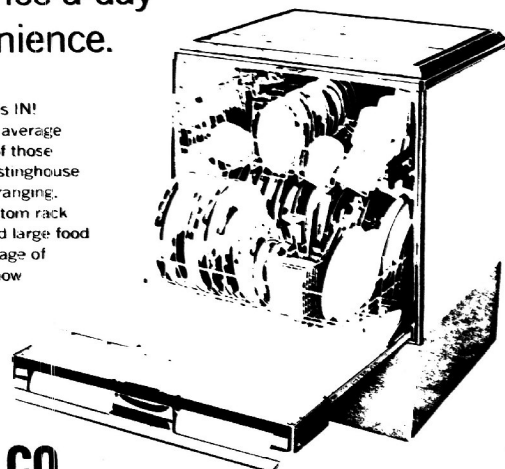

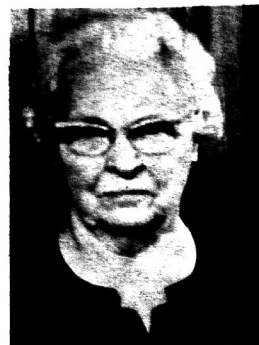

The board approved a request by Robert Whetstone concerning the Memorial Circle at the cemetery. Whetstone said the circle needed cleaning before Memorial Day, and added that Legion members were prepared to do the work. The board said it approved of the work.

In a discussion concerning the cemetery, board members pointed out that there were no definite rules and regulations at the cemetery at the present time. They have invited citizens to write letters of suggestions for rules and regulations or to attend the next board meeting to discuss a plan.

Voluntary Vehicle Inspections Continue At Rapid Rate

Willard L. Walls, Administrator of Indiana's Vehicle Inspection Department, said this week that more than a quarter of a million voluntary inspections have been made since the beginning of the year. Walls urges motorists to avoid the last minute rush and get their vehicles inspected, now, during the voluntary period.

The schedule for the mandatory period is as follows: Vehicles bearing a 1969 license plate ending with the digit 1 or 2 shall be inspected on or before August 31, 1969; those ending in 3 or 4 on or before September 30, 1969; those ending in 5 or 6 on or before October 31, 1969; those ending in 7 or 8 on or before November 30, 1969; and those ending in 9 or 0 on or before December 31, 1969. Self inspectors shall have all vehicles inspected on or before August 31, 1969.

Walls stated, vehicles voluntarily or otherwise will be due for reinspection one year from the month in which they were inspected, provided that the vehicle is not involved in an accident that the Investigating Police Officer recommends the vehicle be reinspected. He pointed out that a rejected vehicle may be operated for a period of thirty days from the date of rejection and repaired-disapproved

vehicles will be entitled to reinspection, free of charge, provided it is conducted by the initial inspection station and within thirty days of the initial date of inspection.

Petition Hospital

A group of nearly 100 Kosciusko county women and children staged a "march" on the county courthouse Monday and demanded that the commissioners and county council proceed with the utmost speed to provide a community tax-exempt hospital.

The group, described as orderly and peaceful, filed into the commissioners room where Mrs. Noble Kintzel, Etna Township, read the following statement and then signed a prepared petition: "I, a mother and citizen of Kosciusko County, hereby urge the county commissioners and councilmen to proceed with the utmost speed to provide a community tax-exempt hospital by implementing the fact-finding committee's ten point program. Please, no more delays."

After she signed the petition, other participants in the march, followed suit and departed the meeting.

Following the departure of the group, the commissioners through their President Harvey Anglin, issued the following statement:

"The board of commissioners wishes to acknowledge receipt of the mothers' petition for a community tax-exempt hospital. We wish to thank each petitioner for her interest in this matter. In response to a petition filed with this board last year, we did appoint a fact-finding committee to study this problem further. We accepted the final report of the fact finding committee and agreed to carry out its recommendations. We have not abandoned this position and we expect to continue to implement this report as promptly and as we reasonably and legally can under all of the circumstances. A proposed board of directors for such a hospital has been selected as provided for in the report of the fact-finding committee. It is now in the process of organizing itself and making its plans to proceed.

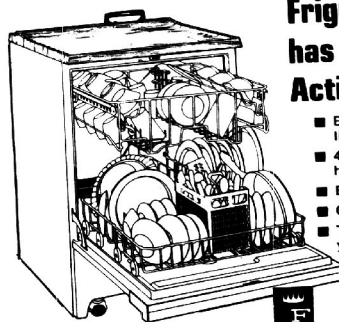

Brademas Attacks Whitcomb Medical School Veto

So. Bend, April 10: Congressman John Brademas today severely criticized Gov. Edgar G. Whitcomb for his veto of a bill to establish a blue ribbon commission to select a site for a second state medical school in Indiana.

Said Brademas, "At a time when the demand for medical services is growing and the supply of doctors in Indiana and the nation is seriously inadequate, Gov. Whitcomb's action can only be described as irresponsible and outrageous."

"Whitcomb's killing of a new medical school is particularly prejudicial to the health needs of the citizens of northern Indiana. Our part of the state has the most compelling case as the location of a second medical center. First, we are an area of substantial population growth. Second, the University of Notre Dame is an outstanding university with strengths in the natural sciences at the graduate level, as essential factor in the placing of a medical center."

Burket Cheerios Have Meeting

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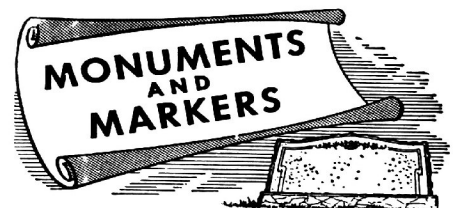

Macy area native retires as choral director

A long and distinguished career in music has been enjoyed by Dr. Philip Duey, a native of the Macy area, who will retire as director of the University of Michigan Glee Club this year, a position he has held since 1947.

A veteran of over 5,000 radio broadcasts, as a featured soloist, and a member of the internationally famous "Revelers" quartet, he has also appeared in Broadway shows such as "Lady Do" and "Good News". Among the conductors under whom he has sung are Toscanini, Damrosch, John Philip

Sousa and Paul Whiteman. In 1938 he was runner-up to Leonard Warren in the Metropolitan Opera Auditions of the Air.

A graduate of Macy High School, Mr. Duey holds the A.B. and M. Mus. degrees from Indiana University and the A.M. and Ph.D. degrees from Columbus University. He has taught at the College of the City of New York, the Arthur Jordan Conservatory, and was head of the music department at Butler University prior to becoming a member of the Michigan faculty.

During the academic year of 1955-56, he was on sabbatical leave as a Fulbright scholar in Italy where he did extensive research in the vocal ornamentation of the seventeenth century.

He is the author of "Bel Canto in Its Golden Age" a study of singing in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, and he plans two books upon his retirement. One will be a history of singing, using research material collected during his year as a Fulbright scholar, and one will be a book on choral management, based on insights he has received in his long career.

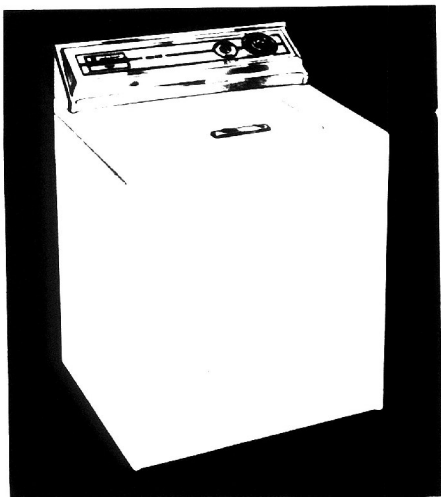

Claypool Man Shot In Scuffle

Paul Green, 24, R. 2, Claypool, is reported in fair condition at Parkview hospital, Ft. Wayne, with a gunshot wound in the left shoulder suffered in a scuffle with the Silver Lake marshal Saturday night.

Silver Lake Marshal Hayden Newhouse said he was called to the Silver Lake home of Green's brother, Carl, when a family quarrel reportedly erupted. Newhouse said, however, that Paul Green had departed when he arrived at the home.

Newhouse said he drove through Silver Lake, spotted Green's car in the area northeast of the town and stopped it. He said when he stopped the car and asked for his driver's license, Green asked him if he were going to take him to jail. Newhouse told him they would go back to the brother's house to see if charges were going to be filed.

Newhouse said when he started back to his car he was struck a blow on the side of the head and that when he started back toward Green he drew his service revolver and attempted to subdue the man. The marshal said in the process Green apparently grabbed the gun and it discharged with the bullet striking Green in the left shoulder.

Newhouse called Deputy Sheriff Stanley Holderman to the scene and waited for an ambulance to take the man to the hospital. They said while they were waiting for an ambulance, Green threatened to do bodily harm to both of them.

Green was treated at the Murphy Medical Center and later transferred to Ft. Wayne.

The incident remains under investigation.

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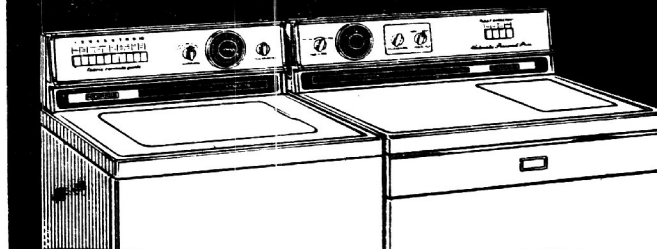

Tornado protection measures listed

April is one of the two months in which tornadoes are most destructive (March is the other), and with this unpleasant thought in mind, the Insurance Institute of Indiana has listed the following rules of safety:

CITIES AND TOWNS--Seek inside shelter, preferably in a tornado cellar, underground excavation, steel-framed or reinforced concrete building of substantial

construction. Stay away from windows!

In office buildings, stand in an interior hallway on a lower floor, preferably in the basement.

In factories, on receiving a tornado warning, post a lookout.

Workers should move quickly to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection in accordance with advance plans.

In homes, the corner of the basement toward the tornado usually offers the greatest safety. In a house without a basement, take cover under heavy furniture in the center part of the house. Keep some windows open, but stay away from them.

In schools, go to storm cellar or underground excavation, if available. If there is no cellar but building is reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows. Whenever possible, go to interior hallway on the lowest floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums with large, poorly-supported roofs.

If a building is not of reinforced construction, go quickly to a nearby reinforced building, or to a ravine or open ditch and lie flat.

IN OPEN COUNTRY--Move away from the tornado's path at a right angle. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or a ravine.

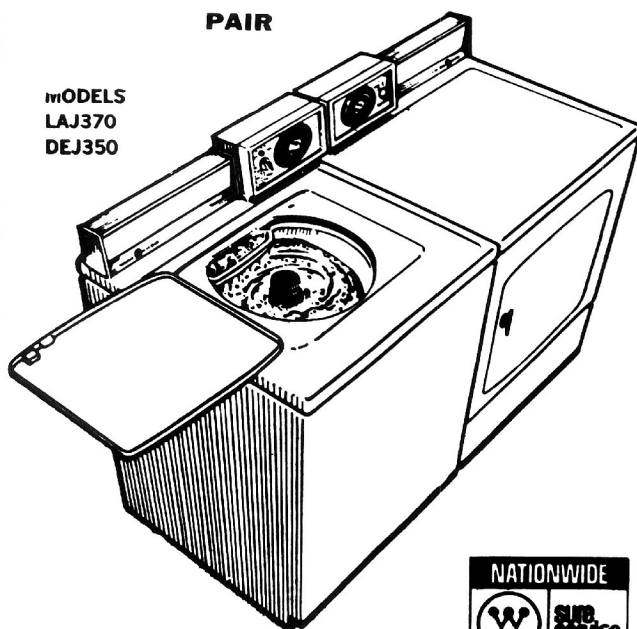

Concert to feature area writer songs

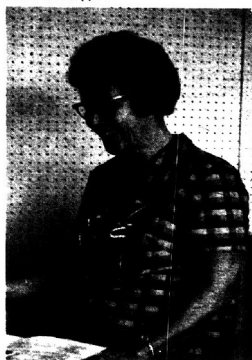
The songs of Mrs. Willard Kuhn, Burket, will be featured Sunday evening at a special sacred concert at the Beaver Dam United Methodist Church.

Property Taxes Are Highest In Hoosier History

Taxpayers of Indiana will pay the highest property tax levy in history again this year. The estimated total to be collected this year is \$948,202,127, which will be \$96,024,865 or 11.3% higher than last year, according to the Indiana Taxpayers Assoc. To finance this increase, \$67,834,116 will be a direct property tax levy, to which will be added \$28,190,749 derived from one eighth of the total collections of sales and individual gross income taxes remitted from Oct. 1, 1967 through Sept. 30, 1968, distributed by the and designated "Property Tax Relief."

Again, new replacement taxes failed to stop the increase in property tax levies, said E.B. Smith, president of the Association.

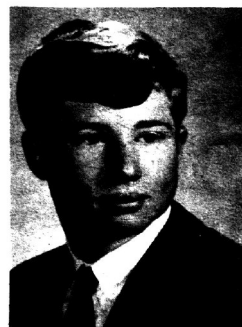

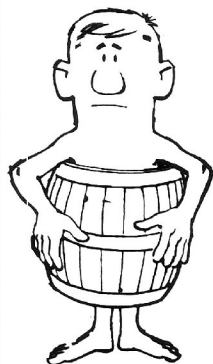

All of this material can be of extreme importance to present-day historians. Why? Simply because they're the materials of which history is made. Every year people from all parts of Indiana as well as the entire country call on the State Library for information about Indiana's past—political, social, economic and religious.

To date, the State Library has the finest collection of Indiana material in the world. But since each and every day adds a new page to our history, information must always be added. It is for this reason that the State Library is constantly searching for material

to preserve Indiana's past.

Items need not be old to be of value. Letters written today will be history tomorrow, and right now is the time to see that they are saved. Many personal letters or diaries can be sealed for any length of time desired by the donor. No one will have access to sealed manuscripts until they are opened.

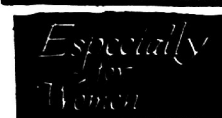

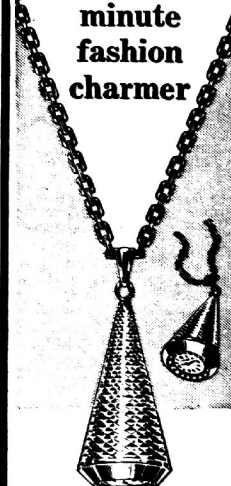

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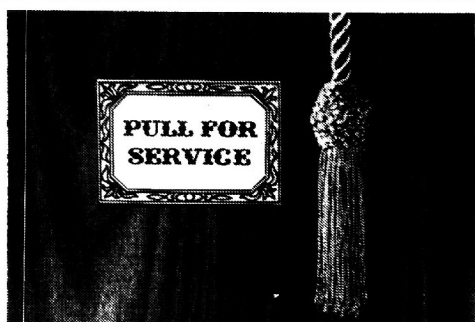

Spring Brings Pet Problems

Lafayette, Ind. Where pets are concerned spring and pleasant days tend to invite problems not as prevalent during the winter months.

As people begin to work outside more, they allow their dogs, cats, or other pets greater freedom. And, the pets themselves enjoy being out more. But neighbors do not always appreciate this, for pets may romp or dig in their yard or flower beds, causing damage.

If you own a pet, you have the responsibility of keeping the pet within the confines of your own property, remind Purdue University extension veterinarians. And though most of your neighbors may also be pet owners or lovers, you may have some who are not.

Furthermore, each spring a number of pets simply become lost. For owners give pets more outdoor freedom and then do not watch them closely. Consequently, pets tend to wander or stray.

Pets also are more likely to contact infectious diseases during spring and summer as they associate with other animals. Distemper and hepatitis are two diseases commonly spread among animals in early spring. Vaccination can prevent these diseases in pets. Discuss a program of disease prevention with your veterinarian and see that your pet has the prescribed inoculations before becoming exposed.

Lastly, the incidence of rabies also tends to increase during spring and summer as pets come into contact with one

another and with wildlife. So, above all, be sure that your pet is vaccinated each year for rabies. And remember, all animals are possible subjects of the disease, not just dogs.

The conference, sponsored by Indiana Senator Birch Bayh, is sanctioned by the Indiana Secondary School Principals Association.

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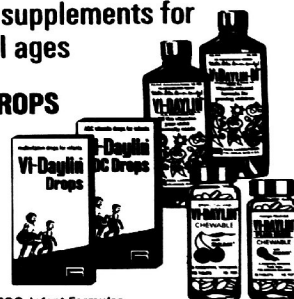

Members of the Tippecanoe Valley Classroom Teachers Association, represented by Glen Pet-ty, spokesman; Bill Davis, co-spokesman; Phil Pratt, LaDonna Kader, Marna Reidel, Trella Tombaugh, and Forst Dun-nuck, attended Monday night's meeting of the TVSC board and presented a proposed salary schedule that would in-crease the present pay-roll by approximately \$50,000. The board dis-cussed the proposal at length, finally tabling it for discussion at a special meeting to be held April 28.

The increases would raise the pay for the teachers with Masters degrees in an attempt to elevate this portion of the pay scale.

A standing room crowd was present to hear Mr. James Besson, Harrison township, read the fol-lowing message from the "two-school" group:

That referendum was fair and legal, and its outcome is an established corner-stone of the wishes of a large majority of the people of this dis-trict. We appreciate that you have all agreed to abide by it. We a- wait and expect its ful- fillment."

"We do not come here tonight to harass you or to heckle you. We come to commend you on the job you have done and you are doing. We are not suspicious of you, nor do we distrust you. We do not expect you to be perfect. We concede that you must know more about the dis-trict business than we do. Your accomplish-ments and dedication to your task pleases us."

"For us to come here every board meeting night in numbers like this would be only to persecute you. We have no such intentions. We deem it unfair and un-just to the board and to the district to take up your time that you need to complete your work, and get home at a reas-onable hour. None of us can work efficiently at

late, late hours, and we certainly do not ask this of you.

"We believe that a staff of contented and adequately paid teachers contributes more to ed-ucation than the type of buildings in the dis-

trict.

"Thank you, gentlemen, for your time.

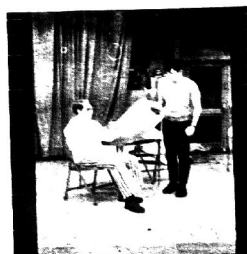

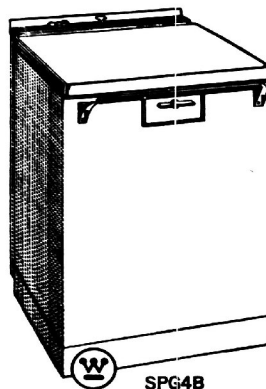

classrooms were opened and examined. No bids were let, pending final tabulation of the bids. The board, by a 4-1 vote (Goshert voting no) decided to submit a project plan for five relocatable units to be placed at the Akron school, thus enabling all grades from K-12 to remain at the school next year.
