

# History of the Cross

The rich history of the cross is shrouded in legend and superstition. A crucifix was have shed blood said to in 1512, during an Eas-ter Day battle between the French and Spanish. statue of Christ on cross reportedly the cross reportedly performed healing wond-ers during the Plague of Malaga in 1649. Le-gend also has it that when St. Francis of Assisi was praying, a voi-ce from the crucifix told him, "Repair my house." At first he took "house" to mean took "house" to mean church; when he later learned that it meant his own spiritual life, he renounced his world-ly goods and took up orders. And the old orders. And the old wives' tale still perin some quarters the Gypsies are sists that the accursed because one of them, a wayfaring met-alsmith, made the nails that were used at the Crucifixion!

Legend says that the crucifixion cross was made of four types of wood--to represent the four corners of the earth. The simple Lat-in cross, with an up-right and single shorter transom, is the com-monest. With two tran-soms it is called a par-triarchal cross; With triarchal cross; With three, a papal cross. A cross widely used by Slavs and others of Ea-stern rites has two transoms and a slanting crosspiece below.
