### School protests lodged

Members of a Tippe-cance Valley School Co-rporation citizens committee have asked school board members to abandon the idea of maintaining two high schools in the corporation or be held "personally liable."
The citizens committee

told the five board mem-bers in a letter from Warsaw attorney Thomas Lemon that a formal objection to the board action had also been sent to John J. Loughlin, newly sworn-in Sup-erintendent of Public Instruction Each board member received the correspondence the correspondence to Loughlin and another addressed to the board members that said, "That letter (to Loughlin) is formal objection the policies which you as a member of the sch-

ool board have adopted with regard to maintain-ing two high schools in ing the the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation. "I am sending you a copy of this letter to put you on notice that because the General Com-


mission on specifically Education specifically denied a similar request in 1969, that any actions or expenditures of money which the school board might make with regard to maintaining two high-schools might be considschools might be considered arbitrary and on-supportable and could impose personal liabil-ity on the individual members of the school members mempers of the school board. Accordingly, we would urge you not to expend any public funds until such time as the matter is resolved by the appropriate state agencies.

this matter "Because has been pending for a considerable number of years, our clients (the citizens committee) feel that progress should be made and that the school board should reconsider its actions with regard its actions with regard to maintaining an obvi-ously unjustifiable two school policy. Such a plan cannot be justified financially, logically or as an education con-cept, and the continua-tion of the policy is a constant detriment to

### Cockfight ends in arrests of 57



Lambert had recently purchased the farm. He and Ervin Dotson, 32, Akron, were the only lo-

cal residents arrested.
The eleven arresting
officers converged upon
a barn on the Lambert
farm and found a number of dead birds just out-side the door, and upon entering the barn anno-unced that all 57 perunced that all 5/ per-sons were under arrest. They had previously secured a search warrant after' receiving a tip that a cockfight was to take place that night.
In addition to taking
57 prisoners, the offi-

cers confiscated 56 fightcocks in cases, 20 empty cases and the same per of dead birds, sets of fighting rs, six cockfight number spurs, six cockfight kits and a set of scales.

After being taken to jail in a schoolbus, the persons arrested appear-ed in Justice of Peace Abe Caldwell's court which was set up in the living room of the sherfif's home. Caldwell fined each person \$10 and costs of \$20 after all had pleaded guilty of being a spectator at a cockfight. The court a cockfight. The court session lasted well into the morning. Caldwell also ordered all the birds and fighting equipment to be disposed of. Officers said fighting cocks cost from \$200 to \$500 apiece.

The barn where the cockfights took place had been under surveil-

lance since last year.





Under rather normal conditions rather normal conditions and use in the past the elements has become ex-pendable at approximate-ly the following rates: raint and interior decoration - up to 8 years; Lighting - 12 to 15 years; Heating pipes and, plant - 28 to 35 years; plant - 28 to 35 years; Ventilation system - 30 to 40 years; Water lines - 28 to 35 years; Elec-crical wiring - 25 to 30 years; Floor cover-ings - 20 to 25 years; Exterior painting - 3 to 6 years; Window frames 6 years; Window frames - 25 to 30 years; Roofs - 18 to 22 years; Furn-iture - 30 to 35 years; It is difficult to determine the life of the structure or shell of a building and will good maintenance it is likely become obsolete for school purposes long be-fore it becomes unsafe. The degree of obsolesc-ence, the cost of con-tinuing maintenance and repair and the cost of replacing one or more of elements mentioned above frequently de-termine whether a building should be remodel-ed or razed. Buildings with load-bearing walls or partitions that are not removable are extremely difficult to adapt Most of the classrooms in the old buildings were small, due to the fact

small, due to the fact that frequently classes were small, however, more frequently due to the fact that the program did not require the equipment or activity which we find in the modern classrooms. Consequently, many old buildings cannot be adapted a modern high school program even though conprogram even though con-siderable money may be available for the reha-bilitation. After a building is 40 or more years old it usually be-comes a constant expense comes a constant expense and it is difficult for a board of education to decide just when it is time to retire the building. If it is fire and structually safe all of these facts must be kept constantly in our minds as we evaluate more fully each attendance center.

Since study halls are very much a regimented situation they are not found compatible with library use. Conseque-ntly, the well-trained ntly, the well-trained librarian becomes prima-rily a proctor in the studyhall and therefore studyhall and therefore those students who wish to use the library for research found this type of a situation intolerable. The health room was on the first floor, however, the school of-fice and guidance areas were on the second flo-or. The school office was small as was the gu-idance office. In addition the guidance office was cluttered up with a duplicator and had no visible means of ventilation. The gymnasium was small however it did have a large stage at one end where reasonable convocations could take place. This gym could be adapted better to junior high school or elementary use than to a modern high school program of physical education and athletics.
The two dressing rooms
were very small were very small and in poor condition and inadequate so far as facilis are concerned. Ventilation was poor and in the present confines could hardly be brought p to recognized high chool standards. The shop was small and at the time of the inspec-tion was being used for plastics. It was equi-pped so that some weld-ing, woodworking and light metals could be

given. As mentioned above, the elementary building was built in two sections, 1959 and 1967. The 16 rooms in this elemenrea were modern good condition. area and in

The glass blocks in the window walls produce too much glare and the sup-erintendent wisely paierintendent wisely painted them to take care of the situation. This building had a small teachers lounge with a water closet and lavatory. The pupils toilet rooms were poorly ventilated. The acoustics in the acoustics in the corridors were rather The acoustics in corridors were re rather harsh due to so many hard surfaces. The kindergarten was rather nice with an outside door and good storage. There were 41 kindergarten children in the morning and 37 in the afternoon. Both of these classes are too large to do justice to a good kinderga-Three of rten program. he five relocatable buildings were used for elementary purpose and two for junior high sc-hool. The cafeteria in the elementary section, though small for a school center of a thousand was nice. About 800 type A lunches were served each noon. There were no indoor physical education facilities for the elementary boys girls.

The elementary program seemed to be operating very smoothly in rather modern quarters. The junior high school and senior high school pro-grams were definitely limited by the facilities even though the buildings contained modern furni ture, good lighting, a good paint job and were clean and well-maintained. As mentioned before the program has been mo-dernized about as much as it can be under existing facilities. innovations defini ly requires more and be-MENTONE ATTENDANCE CEN-

The Mentone Attendance Center houses kindergarten through six and nine through twelve. The seventh and eighth grades going to Talma. The high school was originally built in 1930 with an built in 1930 with an addition in 1952 and an elementary addition in 1967. The building has been well-maintained both on the outside and inwith an excellent color scheme on the interior of the building.

The cafeteria was very small but nicely decora-ted and I am informed thatthey feed about 500 day. students a homemaking room was small but rather nice. The teachers room was also small. The health suite was nice and adequate for an elementary or high school gram but not as good as those recommended for a senior high school. The kindergarten was very nice with 25 attending in the morning and 22 in the afternoon. The sci-ence room was small but it had rather new tables it had rather new tables and equipment. Lockers were found in the corridors. A small developmental reading room although well equipped had to serve also the purpose of a general classroom. The principals and guidance offices were on the third floor. were on the third floor, a little difficult for

the public to reach. A small library was partitioned off to the rear of a rather large study hall. There were no sinks in the library and the floor was in a checkerboard pattern which many data a root when ich provides a poor vi-sual environment. Drapes are needed for the win-dows both in the study hall and the library. The woodship which had The woodship which had an overhead door was rather nice. Nearby the shop was a small draft-ing room. Diffusing globe fixtures
found both in the glass were and the drafting The gymnasium was but in rather good room. condition. The small dressing rooms under the bleachers were clean and equipped with water closets, lavatories, good shower heads and one had an individual stall. Even so, these facilities are hardly adequate for a modern senior high sc hool, they could well be adapted to the use of adapted to the use of the junior and elementary chool pupils.
Two of the highlights

in the school program are the building trades and the auto mechanics. The patrons of the dis-trict should be extremely proud of these programs. The th third house is now under con-struction and the boys are getting excellent instruction in building trades. The auto mech-anics was housed in a reconverted bus garage, reconverted bus garage, with proper spaces set aside for boyd repair and painting and all types of engine repair. In addition a space was provided for the study of electricity and small power machinery. The boys in this program seem to be very enthus-iastic about the program and were doing a good job. Let us hope that there will be a contin-ued expansion of these facilities.

Even though some of the high school taching at Mentone are better than those at Akron a than those at Akron a further upgrading of the program is definitely limited by the school plant. Further innovations will require more adequate facilities. cilities. TALMA ATTENDANCE CENTER:

The Talma school, according to the best information I can obtain, is more than 60 years old houses seventh and and and houses seventh and eighth grades. And even though the building semed to be in good condition visibly it's age showed in many respects and the board of education should soon set a time for its retirement. The gym was fairly good for a junior high school and the dressing and shower rooms were in fair condition. There was a small shop in the subbasement. The kitchen se-emed to be in good condition, the art room was small and an attempt has made e to keep the well-lighted, been made to keep the building well-lighted, neat, clean and attrac-tive. The ceilings and walls were suffering from the affects of moisture penetrating the walls. To stop the continuance of this penetration would be an extremely costly process. To continue with this attendance center much longer is going to be expensive and will probably never be adequate bably never be adequate for the program envis-aged for the future. THE BURKET SCHOOL CENTER:

The Burket School was built in 1961 with six classrooms, office suite and a kitchen for serv-ing meals which pupils take back to their classrooms for eating. also had an area for di-rty dishes. This build-ing houses kindergarten ing houses kinde through fifth grade. The rooms were nice and The rooms were nice and large and with the exception of the fifth grade sizes range from 27 to 32 pupils. The fifth grade had 40 pupils, however, this grade will pass out of the school this spring. It does not appear that the building will be overcrowded in the near future. owded in the near future. Without a doubt the sch-ool plant can serve the Burket area for a long time in the future.

To the rear of this new building was an old wooden gymnasium and store-room which is used for play by the children during inclement weather. It was also used by peo-ple from the community ple for games and community vities. The shower activities. rooms were poor, howev-er, they were not used er, they were not by the school children. Even though the building is an old wooden structure with rather new furnaces it needs considerable attention. Nevertheless, it seems to serve the community ra-

ner well. CONCLUSIONS. apparent that the school administration has made a great effort in keep-ing all facilities neat, clean and in good repair.

There was new lighting in practically all of the buildings in the co-poration, also extensive acoustical treatment and good interior paint jobs. Modern furniture, and equipment has been purchased for all scho-ols. Remedial reading, building trades, and automobile mechanic courses have been brought in to modernize the program. Little, if any, further upgrading of the program can take place with out the construction of more adequate facilities. In fact, the breadth of the present school program in this school ool corporation under existing limistati-

ons s is astounding. RECOMMENDATIONS. is recommended that:





This is commendable but perhaps we're too eager to pat ourselves on the back. Phosphates aren't the only villans, and we as homewakers need to branch makers need to branch out into other areas to fight pollution. One very important

One very important step the homemakers can take to fight pollution is to educate her children. Setting a good example is the best way to teach them. If we want are careful to but all are careful to put all waste paper in trash cans, if we don't let the faucet run, if we aren't using the water, and if we don't misuse our resources, our chilwon't. en won't. Be aware the problems by reading newspapers and ma-gazines and discuss what you've read with your family. The mother as teacher can do much to mold her children's way of thinking.

Disposal of glass bot-tles, aluminum cans and others throw away containers is a growing problem. The homemaker as a consumer can do much to discourage throw away bottles and other containers by refusing to buy those products. Buy soft drinks and other beverages in return-able bottles and return to the store. them are using more and more paper products in the home. Drop by level teaspoonfuls onto ungreased cookie sheets, about 2 inches apart. Bake in preheated oven (350°P) 6 to 8 minutes. Cool about 2 minutes, then carefully remove cookies from cookie sheets with wide spatula. Cookie will be large and thin.



### Will Erwin Named Consultant

Will Erwin, Etna Green farm manager who is a member of President Nixon's White House Task Force on Rural Development, was named this week as a special consultant to the administrator of the Environmental Production Agen-

cy.
EPA officials said Erwin, 45, was named to the post by EPA Administrator William D. Ruckleshaus and will be paid a consultant fee rate of \$316 for each day he works.

The Environmental Protection Agency, representing the Nixon administration's major thrust in environmental affairs, was established Dec. 2, 1970 and includes organizational units from 15 other Federal programs.

Erwin, a former Indiana State Senator, served on the Natural Resources Committee. He was author of legislation concerning outdoor recreation, protection of the environment and natural resources.

Erwin served on Pres. Johnson's Committee on Community Relations in 1964 and also was chairman of the Indiana Advisory Committee on the U.S. Civil Right Commission.

Erwin is an Etna Green area farmer and was chosen as the national winner in the Jaycee's Outstanding Young Farmer Foundation for American Agriculture, and has served on numerous committees, including one to study conservation activities of the U.S.

Dept. of Agriculture.
Erwin is also chairman of the Indiana Farm Policy Study Group sponsored by Purdue University.

Erwin is a graduate of the University of Illinois and took post graduate work there and in American history from Indiana University extension

tension.

per 100 square feet of a general analysis fer-tilizer, such as 12-12-12, should be spread over the garden area before working the soil. For exact recommendations including lime requirements, soil should be tested.

Add one cup of starter sol-ution (made by dissolv-ing one tablespoon of high phosphate fertilizer such as 11-48-0 in a gallon of water) to each plant, then place soil around the roots.

To see if water is still 150° when it arrives in the kitchen, hold a candy thermometer under the faucet. You may need to reset the water heater thermostat.

### Farmers Do Away With Moldboard Plowing

A number of farmers in Kosciusko county are do-ing away with the mold-

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ing away with the mold-board plow for row crop production according to Joe Wilson, District Conservationist.

The no-plow system is an important conservation practice, Mr. Wilson indicated. It leaves the soil surface well protected with crop residues and will greatly reduce water and wind erosion. It also reduces oil and fertilizer losses from crop fields and allows more inelds and allows more in-tensive cropping without increasing pollution of our water resources by

increasing pollution or our water resources by sediment, he said. Wilson pointed out that a farmer must know his soil type before go-ing into the no-plow system of planting row crops. Rolling, well-drained soils are espec-ially well adapted. ially well adapted.
Some wet, poorly drained soils do not work
effectively, he said.
The Kosciusko Co. District Board of Supervis-

ors are especially int-rested in observing this practice as a con-servation practice in

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reducing soil erosion by water and air.

#### Teachers Present School Board Salary Proposal

Cont. from page 1 Bynum presented the boarda 41-page "Propos-ed Tippecanoe Valley Classroom Teachers Association Agreement", part of which set out the rights of the Association--right to have exclusive use of school facilities at reasonable times for meetings and equipment, to have ex-clusive right to post notices on teacher bulletin boards, to have the president or his designee visit schools to investigate working coninvestigate working conditions, teacher complaints, problems, etc., to obtain information concerning financial resources of the district, to have Association placed first on the agenda of each board meeting new business, to under have the corporation t, on authorization the teacher, all reduct. mittance for programs jointly approved by the Association and the board. Also to have representatives of the Board and Association negotiating committees et once a month to view administration contract and resolve meet review problems, to have principal meet once a month with Association buildcommittee. The president of the Association or his designee nation or his designee would be given time off to conduct Association business with pay if this came during school hours and the Association would be given an ion would be given an opportunity to make reports and announcements at faculty meetings and would be given a place on the orientation pro-gram agenda for new teachers.

In addition, a negotiation procedure was outlined that would allow the negotiating comto meet altermittee mittee to meet alter-nately during and after regular school hours from Feb. 1 to March 15 for the purpose of reaching an agreement. In the event of an impasse, it would establish mediation and fact finding procedures including the services of the Federal Mediation and Concilia-Service and Merican Arbitration Association.

A teach grievance pro cedure was outlined. including steps that would be followed and would be forms to be completed. The American Arbitration Association was set as final and binding prity and release authority and release time was allowed for a teacher engaged during the school day on behalf of the Association in arbitration without loss

of pay. CLASS SIZES

The proposal set optimum recommendations for class size, requestthan 25, 25, third-sixth grade 15-25, third-sixth grade 18-30. Solid subjects in grades 7-12 would have optimum classes, por ing kindergarten at 16. have optimum classes of 22, not exceeding 30, while music and physical education classes would

begin at 30 and not exceed 40. Also included were special education classes for handicapped, emotionally disturbed the children with sight and hearing problems.

Terms of the proposal further stated teachers not teach more should than five periods a day and that junior high and high school teachers not more than three preparations a day and asked sufficient teach-ers for art, music and physical education for physical education for elementary students. Also named were need of sufficient reference facilities and adequate typing and duplicating equipment and clerical equipment and clerical personnel to aid teachin the preparation instructional material.

Teachers, in the pro-osal, would be given posal, 30-minute uninterrupted lunch periods, have exclusive lunchroom, restroom and lavatory facil-ities for teacher use, there would be an ap-propriately furnished ventilated room reand ventilated room re-served as a faculty lounge. It asked that all teacher participa-tion in extra-curricu-lar activities for which no additional compensa-tion is paid be strictvoluntary and asked at observation of that observation of teacher's class by persons other than school administrative personnel be allowed only after consent had been granted by the building principal and teachers involved. involved.

Teacher authority and the right to exclude a pupil from class for misbehavior and offenses was allowed and procedures were outlined in the event a teacher was assulated by a student. Teacher evaluation would be done openly with the teacher.

Teachers would not be assigned outside the scope of their teaching certificates and their major or minor field of study and would receive their schedules no latthan July, after which be made except by mutu-al consent of teacher and his building prin-cipal. Any other as-signments, such as drieducation, summer courses and extra dut-ies, would not be obligatory but would be with the consent of the teacher. Preference in making the assignments would go to tenure tea-

Transfers and signments would be made on a mutual agreement basis. It requested the board to post notices by April 1 of known vacancies and said no new teachers should be as-signed to specific tea-ching positions until all pending requests for reassignment transfer to that posi-tion have been acted on.

Outlined in the closing articles of the agreement were tenure status, fringe benefits that would allow two personal leave days a year to be paid at a bonus of \$25 for each bonus of \$25 for each day not used, bereavement time of five days for close family and with pay, professional leave days with pay for attending and participating in professional meetings, visitation to other school corporations and educational institutions for the institutions for ourpose of observation. purpose of observation. Teachers would be compensated the difference between teaching pay and pay received for jury duty or during court action in which they were called for testimony.

Also, any absence due to injury on the job would not be charged against the teacher's sick leave days and a teacher could be absent for five days without loss of pay in event of illness in the immediillness

Three year maternity and adoptive leaves would be granted and other unpaid leaves of

absence were outlined. Final articles of the agreement outlined sev erance pay, set out that there would be no deviation or change in school calendar without calendar with a greement mutual agreement or Board and Association, provided professional provided professional compensation including what credit should be what credit should be counted and paydays on which teachers should be paid, provided insurance protection, setting out the amount the check board would not ting out the amount the school board would pay and requesting the carrier of insurance be selected jointly by the Association and Board, outlined professional behavior, maintenance of standards. The last article provided that all contracts of future that teachers be expressly subject to terms of the agreement and required the board at their exto have copies the agreement printed within 30 days and asked the board to agree that no teacher should intimidated signing any individual contract before the the cerms and conditions are mutually agreed upon by the Association and the Board.

Terms of the agreement would be from Aug. 15, 1971 to Aug. 14, 1972. The board agreed to examine the agreement

Kennedy as a national non-profit, non-sectarian organization to sup-port the world-wide Freedom From Hunger Cam-paign. That campaign is a program of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Na-tions with the approval President Nixon. In 1968 the board of trus-tees of the AFFHF re-solved to include in sorved to include in this program hunger at home as well as over-seas.

The AFFHF works thro-ugh its Young World Development program to in-tensify public aware-ness and participation. YWD strives for under-standing and the raising of funds for self-help projects that help the

or tunds for self-help projects that help the fight against hunger.

Walks have been organized in over 150 communities since September of 1968 with over 5,000,000 students participating. They have raised over \$3,000,000.

Walk funds are distributed in this manner: 42.5 percent to a project in the United States, 42.5 percent to a project in a foreign country; 15 percent to AFFHF for expanding the walk program and for educational activities walk program and for educational activities concerning world hunger and poverty.
