соше Organic foods from plants grown with-out inorganic fertilizout inorganic tertilizers and pesticides. Instead, the soil is enriched, as it was a century ago, with inorganic matter only--man

ure, plowed under plant material, leaf mold. Health food promoters claim that there are claim that there are poisonous substances in our processed processed foods. argue that organically grown plants ceive a balanced diet, made available by microaction at a rate is in tune with that ants own growth Chemically - fed plants needs. plants may get an overdose of one nutrient from a fast-acting fert-ilizer, and this may block the intake of othessentials or some nutrients may be miss-ing altogether.

What do the scientists say to this? On the question of a balanced diet, they state that soil nutrients can be unbalanced through the use of organic fertilijust as well with inorganic ones.

the overall As to question of plant nutrihave tion scientists grown plants on both organic and inorganic so-ils. The plants were analyzed for their nutcontent and differences were found.

Because organic foods an increased sushave ceptibility to insects and disease the foods and are more expensive. Another factor that makes organic foods expensive is the amount of organic matter needed to grow these foods. Using or-ganic matter means tran-sporting huge amounts of it from where it ac-cumulates. The same amount of plant nutrients can be supplied in much smaller quantities inorganic commerci commercial fertilizers.

Organic foods are not harmful. In fact, if they are used as part of a well balanced diet, they are beneficial. But spending money on these expensive products often means that enough money is left over to buy all the oth-er foods needed for a

I can understand this. The week of April 16-22 has been proclaimed Home Economics Week by Governor Whitcomb. This year the Indiana Home Économics Association celebrates its golden anniversary.

In the past 50 years of "scientific explosion" home economists have been standing by picking up the fall out and fitting the pieces into the puzzle of better living for all peo-

Home Economists themselves have contributed to the scientific explosion through research in nutrition, textiles, human relations, household equipment, and fam-ily economics. But most home economists serve as liaison between research and families - relating knowledge to applicat-ions in living and re-laying problems of living to res researchers for

solutions.
Indiana home economists helped families survive the meatless Tuesdays and Whestless Wednesdays of World War I and the Great Depresthe Victory Gardens and how to feed a family during rationing during World War II. They sponsored countless 4-H projects and Homemakers clubs; they have taught teenagers how to cope with growing up and ad-ults how to cope with

growing communication gaps. They guide ghetto families toward better nutrition and better use of all resources. They advise manufacturers on the design and production of consumer products from applesauce to zippers to microwave ovens.

Indiana boasts several outstanding home economists granting institut-ions; the largests de-gree being a part of the Land Grant program at Purdue University which is also the administrative center for Home onomics Extension, Other colleges and univer-sities offering home economics are Indiana University, Butler, Ball State, Indiana State, Manchester, Goshen, Vincennes, and St. Mary of the Woods.





(4) Each voter is allowed three minutes in the voting booth.

The blue pencil is returned to the clerk. The voter must not leave the voting room with his ballots or the pencil.





Rural merchants handhing herbicides and pesticides were urged by State Police to take protective measures to safeguard their supplies. The new ruling may represent a significant step toward prevention of many problems associated with improper fabric care. The problems might still occur if the retailer forgets give the customer a la-bel or if the customer disregards the instruction to sew the label onto the finished garment.
