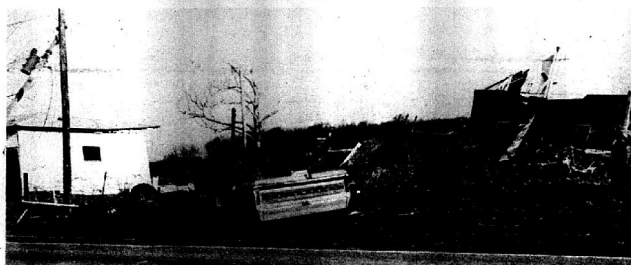
## BULLETIN

The tornado that twisted its way through the area Wednesday cost residents untold dollars in lost property. Deaths and injuries were reported but could not be verified at press time. Details next week.

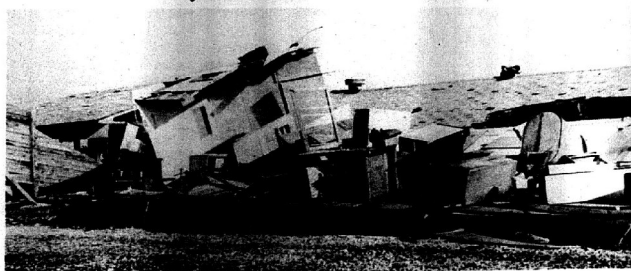

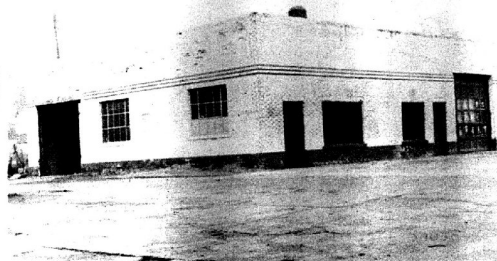

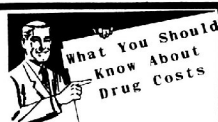

### Tornadoes Can Be Predicted But Can't Be Controlled

Technology has given meteorologists the ability to predict the occurrence of tornadoes with a high degree of accuracy...but there is almost nothing that can be done to halt the storm once it has started.

With that disquieting bit of information, the weathermen of the nation last week warned that climatological conditions were almost perfect for the formation of tornadoes--the most severe storm of local storms, one that causes the most property damage and loss of life.

Ken Holmes, a meteorologist for the National Weather Service at Indianapolis, says they are generally during heavy or severe thunderstorms. He describes the updraft in the storm as being a vacuum sweeper-like effect that causes the sucking motion in the vortex of the storm.

The vortex is the funnel cloud, a black, V-shaped air mass that increases its speed as it spins, gathering up material from the ground into the funnel. He said the wind speed inside the vortex can reach 500 miles an hour.

"Spring and summer are the prime seasons for tornadoes," he said, adding, "late evening hours--from five to nine p.m.--are the probable time."

Holmes said, "The conditions that create tornadoes are a high moisture content in the air, a daily heating effect, and there is usually a triggering mechanism that brings the storm."

"They are unpredictable," he said, "but one indicator is the presence of hail in a severe thunderstorm." He said the creation of hail requires a large

updraft and an updraft is also necessary for the formation of a tornado.

Noting most tornadoes move in a southwest to northeast direction, he

said their movements are erratic and difficult to chart.

He noted the speed usually averages 50-55 miles per hour on the ground.

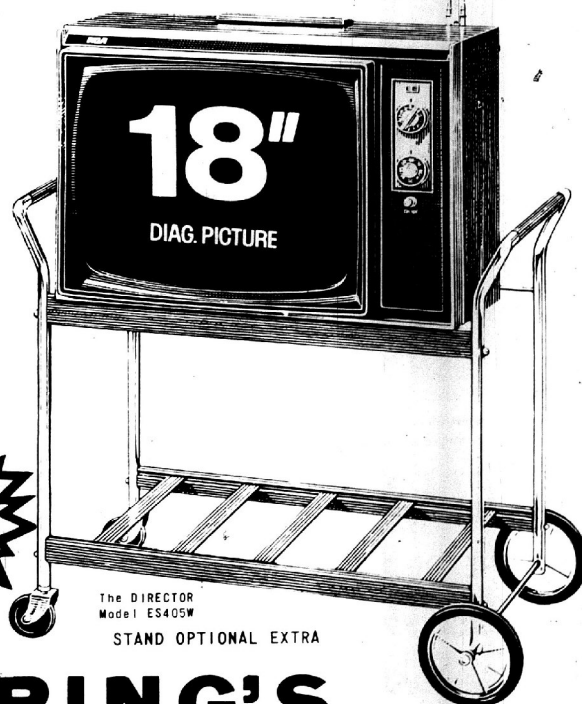

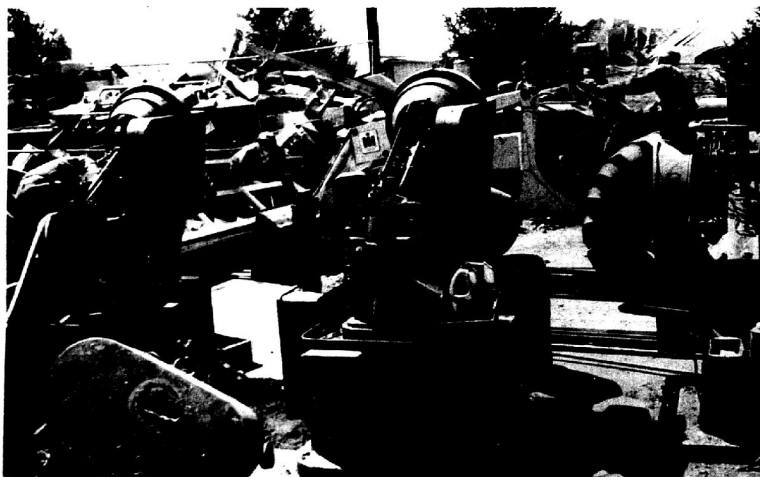

Negley said any government or voluntary agency that needs a wide variety of foodstuffs, including dried milk, should telephone the Department of Public Instruction's Division of School Lunch 317-633-6613 or, after 4:30 p.m., the state director of School Lunch at 317-529-3100.

Among Indiana communities already requesting food are Borden, Kennard, Parker, Atwood and Rochester.

Negley said the department's 11 food warehouses have adequate supplies to handle all requests and will be accessible on a 24-hour basis. Besides milk, he said the food items available include cheese, canned luncheon meat, fruit, peanut butter, butter, prunes and orange juice.

Negley said the food items were being stored for distribution to the needy through a U.S. de-

partment of Agriculture program administered by the Department of Public Instruction and will be replaced by the USDA before they are needed in the regular program.

### Make Temporary Repairs Now To Tornado Damaged Property, Says Insurance Co. Head

Persons whose property was damaged by the recent tornadoes were urged this week by Cornell F. Bailey, President of the Independent Insurance Agents of Indiana, Inc., to make temporary repairs to prevent further damage to interiors and furnishings.

He suggested broken windows and damaged roofs be covered with boards, canvas or any

other substance that would seal out the weather.

In order to speed up payment for losses, he suggested property owners report their losses immediately to their insurance agents. Those persons unable to live in their homes because of extensive damage should give the agent their temporary address and telephone number.

Bailey said, "It is

the responsibility of the property owner or his representative to make temporary repairs to prevent further damage to his property. Reasonable costs for temporary repairs are considered a part of the insurance claim, so insured property owners are requested to keep a record of these expenses.

He urges homeowners to use caution in selecting repair firms--especially those that are not local firms and whose business integrity might be questionable. There are, unfortunately, roving repair firms who seek excessive financial gain from tragedies--charging exorbitant prices then "skipping town" without paying local materials suppliers.

Bailey said it is the customary practice for experienced adjusters from many parts of the country to help expedite the processing of heavy storm and catastrophe losses. In addition, independent adjusting firms and many insurance companies send in their own adjusters. These men work nights, Sundays and holidays to process losses as quickly as possible.

The public should watch for announcements in local news media concerning the opening of local and special catastrophe claims offices.

"The insurance industry is doing all things possible to ease the financial losses. If the insured public will cooperate by reporting their losses immediately to their local agents, claims will be processed as rapidly as possible with the most seriously damaged structures considered on a priority basis. Obviously, in an emergency, it is impossible to handle all claims at the same time and it is only fair that the most heavily damaged properties be handled first," he said.

### Bryant Named To All-Star Team

Tri-State College's Bob Bryant is again in the news as the all-time leading Trojan scorer was named to the Indiana-Ohio Sertoma All Star Team. He will wear an Indiana uniform when the collegiates meet in the Indianapolis Butler Fieldhouse on April 19.

The series is in the fifth year with Indiana leading in the win column 5-3. The top ten collegiate seniors from each state are chosen each year to play in the contest. The proceeds go towards the Sertoma Charities.

Bryant became the all-time leading scorer at Tri-State this season with 1534 points including a season high his senior year of 588. He played his freshman year

at Indiana Tech before transferring to Angola and collected 449 points there for a career total of 1983.

During his four years he averaged 50 per cent from the field and 84 per cent from the free throw line. He was the tenth leading free throw shooter in the N.A.A.A. this season and honorable mention All American.

He will graduate in mechanical engineering this June with a 3.0 plus grade average. Marriage plans are in the near future with his fiancée Sue McKeever of Angola. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. David L. Bryant of Akron.

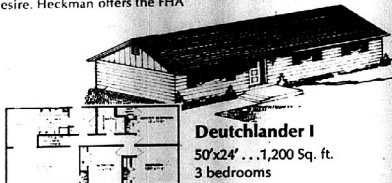

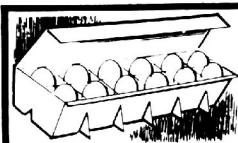

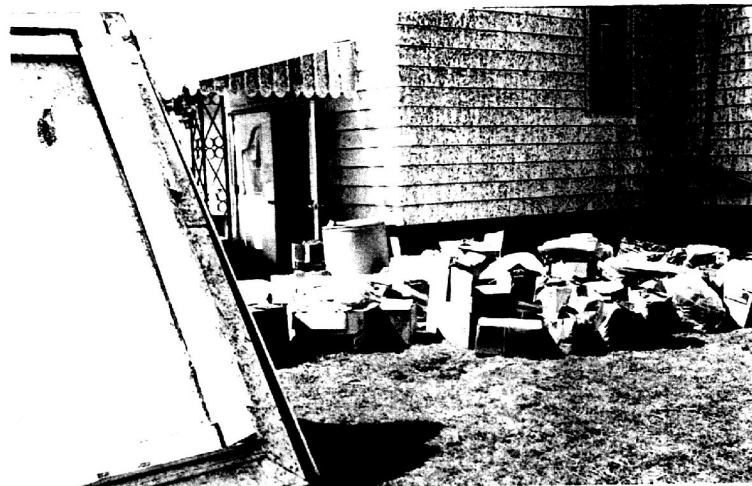

## NEW BOOKS

AKRON CARNEGIE LIBRARY

THE HALL OF THE MOUNTAIN KING by Howard H. Snyder. On June 23, 1967, the twelve members of the Joseph F. Wilcox Mt. McKinley Expedition began their ascent of 20,320 ft. Mount McKinley, North America's highest mountain peak. Only five of them were to return. In this book, one of the survivors of the expedition tells the day-to-day story of the climb, and describes the raging storm and the crucial errors in judgement which led to the death of seven men.

THE LATE GREAT PLANET EARTH by Hal Lindsay. This is a book about Bible prophecy for the new generation.

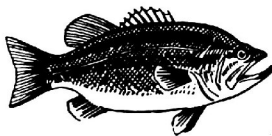

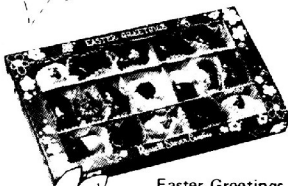

Fulton County lost 583 buildings, according to John Borah, head of the Ouabache Regional Development Commission. Other estimates set the loss at 29 homes destroyed in Rochester, 16 in Talma and 69 in other parts of the county. Houses damaged included 88 in Rochester, 38 in Talma, 56 in other parts of the county. Mobile home losses were estimated at 31 destroyed or damaged outside the Talma area, eight destroyed and two damaged in the Talma area. Also, 45 barns destroyed, 11 damaged; seven industrial buildings damaged; one motel destroyed; Riddle School, Rochester, damaged; Talma Jr. High School destroyed and two churches destroyed.

In Kosciusko Co., it is estimated 29 houses were destroyed; major damage was sustained by 134, minor by 137; 121 mobile homes were destroyed; 11 mobile homes sustained major damage; 43 barns and farm buildings were destroyed and 120 barns and farm buildings sustained major damage.

Damage surveys are incomplete. It is not known how long it will be before a complete resume of the damage can be issued.

Last week's NEWS' pictures showed a small portion of the damage. This week, the constructive activities of thousands of people helping people are featured throughout the paper. Because of the magnitude of the damage, it is impossible to depict it or the generosity of everyone who helped, but the people and organizations pictured are representative of dozens more that could not be included.

according to TVSC Superintendent Robert Forbes who said he negotiated the contracts since the board has not adopted a salary schedule.

Resignations of three teachers, Dennis Hoff, Carole Wilson and Natalie Keirn, were noted by Forbes. He recommended re-employment of all certified personnel who had not resigned. However, board members said they wanted to air certain questions and went into an hour-long executive session, returning to vote that teaching contracts for Freda Baker, Lynn Caraway, Robin Stoll, Sarah Strain, Kenneth Fleck, Sharon Scrivnor, Ellen Ford and Marsha Graff be terminated. No explanation was given.

At Forbes' recommendation, board members authorized purchase orders totaling approximately \$250,000 for graphics, language and electronic labs and general shop, drafting and art equipment and supplies, payment to be made by the holding company unless it does not have the funds, in which case TVSC will be responsible for the cost.

Forbes said this equipment would allow TVHS to be one of the best schools around, one that had more basic potential because it was outfitted with quality, first-class equipment.

During an audience period, Bill Balmer requested a transfer for his daughter Jeanso she can attend No. Miami High School next year in order to enroll in the Upper Wabash Vocational School to take data processing. This request was taken under advisement.

Mrs. Harvey Smith asked why there is no school nurse or person with Red Cross training available at the schools. She was told the state tax board had cut the funds. She suggested some of the secretaries either be put on part-time and replaced with nurses or be given first aid training. She said, "Try harder to get something in the budget that amounts to something."

Sharon Osborn, a student at Akron High School, questioned board members concerning an advanced speech course she would like to take and was told to talk to her principal or another member of the administration because the school board did not set curriculum.

In other action, board members heard a recommendation by Forbes that Dean Meyer be given a bus route when one becomes available in his area, heard a financial report that showed total funds of \$1,384,891.97,

\$1,302,279.77 of it on investment, and were told by Forbes that the school seemed to be functioning reasonably normally on the first day back from Easter vacation and minus tornado-deployed Talma Jr. High School. He said some officials had said the corporation will be completely reimbursed for any temporary expenses incurred and possibly might recoup any losses above insured value. He said the latter is very indefinite. He also noted he did not know if the temporary facilities would be for seven weeks or six months but said he hopes to have nine rooms of the new school completed by fall.

Board members also approved a change order for a 20,000 gallon tank at the building site, which has already been installed and filled. A 10,000 gallon tank had originally been specified.

All board members, Maurice Coplen, Richard Goshert, Dr. John McKee, Dr. Wymond Wilson and Philip Lash, were present in addition to the superintendent and members of the building corporation.

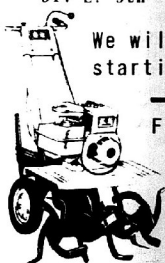

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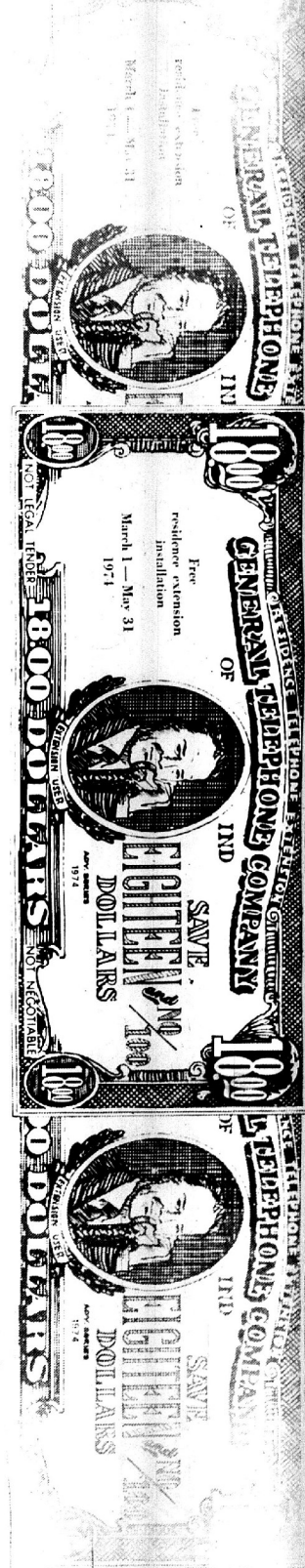
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FOUR EXAMPLES of caning done by Willis Bowen. Each piece of cane must crisscross each chair six times. Beading, a narrow finish row, completes the job.

## Willis Bowen canes for relaxa

Willis Bowen retired a number of years ago after a long teaching career, but anyone who knows him finds it difficult to believe he's really retired. Akron's busy clerk-treasurer, he also sings in the United Methodist Church choir, finds time for fishing and raising magnificent vegetable gardens and to be with his grandchildren. In his spare time, he canes or rushes. He calls these crafts retirement therapy, but friends know he simply can't stand to have his hands idle while he watches ball games on television.

Caning a chair allows a lot of time for ball games, because he estimates each rocking chair takes as much as fifteen hours.

Tools of his trade are an icepick, a few small wooden pegs and cane. The latter is probably sugar cane from Cuba, he says. He buys it from suppliers and finds it is sometimes 15 feet long.

Each piece of cane crisscrosses a chair six times, no small feat since it must first be soaked and then worked through tiny holes in the frame. That's where the ice pick comes in

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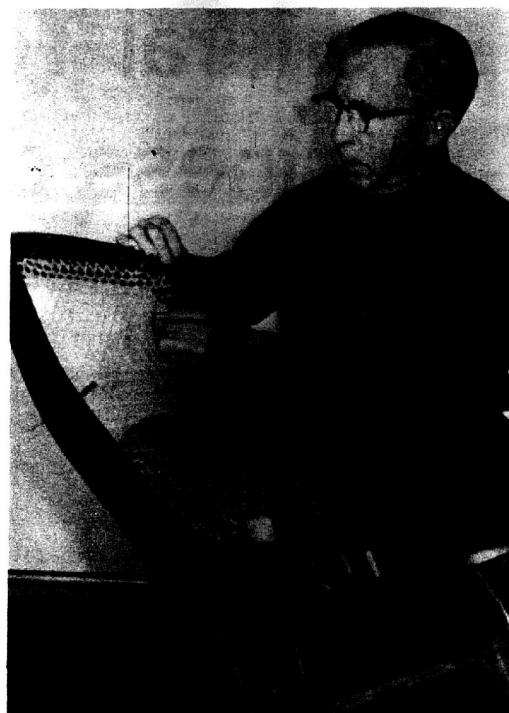

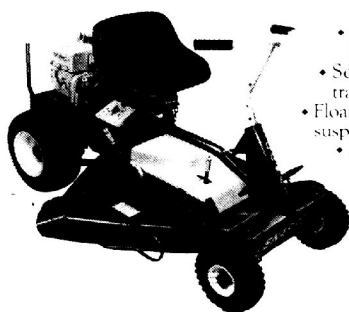

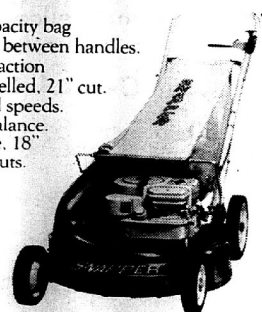

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handy; it makes a sharp object to force the cane through the holes, often worn with age. The pegs hold the cane in place until he ties it securely in the back. When it dries, it gets stiff and holds well and can then be finished off with a beading for a professional look.

"It is the tension that is important," he stresses, thumping a tightly caned chair seat. The tension increases as the cane dries, but it has to be snug to begin with or the job will be no good.

Caning is more difficult than rushing, he says, but he prefers caning. Rushing requires a person to have three hands and, lacking these, takes a lot of hard work to get the rush in proper position.

Although both cane and rush are available in synthetics, he prefers real cane and paper rush. Real rush comes from mat rush grown in swamps and is more difficult to work with.

"Experience is the best teacher," he says, estimating he caned his first chair more than 30 years ago and has done 35 or 40 in the past ten years. "The longer you work, the more details you learn." As an example, he often lets cane age before using it if he wants it to more nearly match the wood's tone. It always darkens with age, but if it has been allowed to age, it will have a more pleasing finish when it is done. It can then be left natural or varnished or shellacked, as the owner prefers.

In addition to keeping him busy during ball games and on inclement days, what does he like about his hobby?

The answer is easy. "The finished results. The chairs look so nice when you get done."

## Contract terminations stimulate busy week

Last week was a busy one for students and teachers in the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation.

Triggering the activity was the unanimous decision of the school board at its April 15 meeting to terminate contracts of eight teachers, Freda Baker, Ellen Ford, Marsha Groff,

Lynn Caraway, Sharon Scrivnor, Kenneth Fleck, Sarah Strain and Robin Stoll. The latter, an Akron elementary teacher, later reported she had already submitted her resignation to Akron High School principal Forst Dunnuck prior to the school board meeting.

On Thursday morning,

more than 200 concerned Akron High School students staged a sit-in in the school gym to show their support of all the teachers, but especially of Miss Baker and Miss Groff. Waving posters calling for the impeachment of school superintendent Robert Forbes and supporting the two teachers, they bombarded Dunnuck

## School Board candidates featured this week

As a public service to residents of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation, the NEWS submitted questionnaires to the eight candidates who seek election to three school board seats in the May 7 primary.

The eight are Martha Thompson, Dr. John McKee and Con Shewman, Henry township; Carl Whetstone, Loren Cumberland and Fred Kindig, Franklin, and Don Snipes and Claude Jameson Jr., Newcastle.

Elected to represent their home townships or school districts, members are chosen by the corporation electorate at large.

New board members will be elected from Franklin and Newcastle townships since incumbents Philip Lash and board president Maurice Coplen did not seek re-election.

Board secretary Dr. John McKee, Henry township, seeks re-election, facing Mrs. Thompson and Shewman. Winner of that seat will not assume duties until July 1975 under a policy established when the five township corporation was formed that does not allow more than two new members to go on the board at the same time.

Board members who are not up for re-election this year are Dr. Wymond Wilson and Richard Goshert.

In addition to questions relating to their personal background, candidates were asked what goals they would like to see the school board accomplish and why he or she sought election.

with questions for one and one-half hours. Some were unanswerable: Does the school board really care what we think?

Don't board members do what they want to do? What means of evaluation did the board have to make their decisions? What steps can be taken to get the board to rehire Miss Baker and Miss Groff? Some questions did not relate to the teachers and included such topics as curriculum, lack of seating in relocatable classrooms and the janitors. Dumnuck told the students he could not speak for the school board and suggested possibly the Student Council could meet with board members or students could write to them.

Classes were resumed, but by the end of the day, another teacher had been dismissed and all corporation teachers had been advised school buildings could not be used for meetings to consider local teacher membership in the Indiana State Teachers Association (ISTA).

Dismissed was Shirley Willard, a substitute teacher at Akron High School. She was charged with criticizing rather than teaching after she told students who came to her world history class from the sit-in that it would do no good for them to talk to school board members because she did not think the latter would change their minds and rehire the teachers. Mrs. Willard, a teacher for 13 years, said she was dismissed at North Miami when she was up for tenure (signing of the sixth contract) even though she had had excellent recommendations. She said she received a form letter of reasons for her dismissal and that this experience was the basis for her statement that school boards never rehire teachers once they have decided not to.

Mrs. Willard said Dumnuck called her at her home Thursday night and told her she had been dismissed by Forbes.

Forbes said he dismissed Mrs. Willard because he did not feel it was a teacher's place to run down the school board. "The school board decides if full-time teachers are to be rehired, but it is the superintendent who hires and fires substitute," he said.

Asked for his reactions to the sit-in, Forbes said, "I was not surprised. The teachers have a captive audience in the students. The whole thing was staged; once the teachers start it, the kids keep the ball rolling." "But, they'd better not keep the ball rolling too

long," he warned. "We don't want to turn a demonstration into a riot." He added a word of caution to tenure teachers, "There are ways to get rid of tenure teachers if they go too far."

Although Forbes did not say how far too far was, he was explicit in his message to corporation teachers at a meeting in the Mentone cafeteria Thursday afternoon: The schools are not to be used as meeting places to discuss ISTA membership; no school equipment can be used to form a union (ISTA) and any violation of this is in fact a violation of law. Forbes said the meeting was called to give teachers the opportunity of having a tax-sheltered annuity and to discuss their insurance program. They voted 67-9 to update their insurance. The question of using the buildings to meet concerning ISTA was voiced, and he said he told them taxpayers should not have to furnish a union hall. He said once the membership is approved, the meeting places may become negotiable items but until then he would abide by the law.

By Tuesday of this week, four teachers had requested written reasons for their dismissal and one had asked for a formal hearing, Forbes said. He said teachers are entitled to writing a letter asking for written reasons. A teacher can ask for a hearing after getting the reasons and may make the reasons public as he or she desires. However, reasons for terminating a contract cannot be given in a public meeting or to a third party as this can constitute a defamation of character, according to a Supreme Court ruling.

In the meantime, students, in an attempt to help their teachers, mailed the following letter to school board president Maurice Coplen:

Dear Mr. Coplen:  
"The Akron High School students would like to invite the School Board members to discuss the dismissal of teachers who we feel are well qualified. We would like you to be prepared to discuss the evaluation of teachers. We would like to know when it would be most convenient for you to come. Sincerely yours,  
Akron Student Council"

No reply has been received from board members Coplen, Richard Goshert, Dr. John McKee, Philip Lash and Dr. Wymond Wilson.

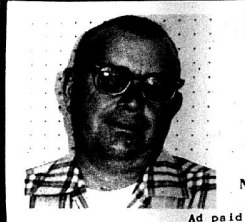
## Lay Witness Happening Re-Set

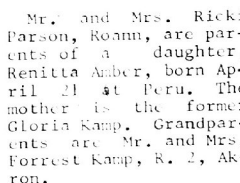

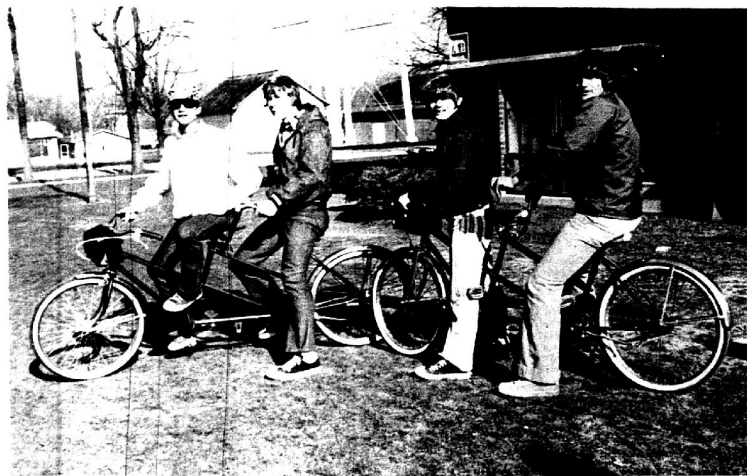
