Tree Farming: Planting for the future

Every man, woman and child in the United States will use a ton of wood this year. And more next year and even doing the planting it more every year there-after, according to the American Forest Insti-

It's a staggering thought, but the good news is that, unlike coal, oil or ore, there won't be a deplation coal, oil or ore, there won't be a depletion problem if steps are taken now, because trees are the world's only renewable resource.

At Akron's Pike Lumber Company, four foresters oversee 25 tree farms in Ohio and Indinana-proper than 1,000

ana--more than acres in all. 1,000 Their guidance now will ensure necessary lumber in the twenty-first

Pike's first tree farm was purchased in 1954, and no end is in sight as far as future acquisitions are concerned.
"We're limited only by "We're limited only by the availability of good timberland and profits to turn back to purchase more," head forester Dean Baker says. With Jim Mulligan, David At-kinson and Eugene Weirick, Baker oversees the farms, directing their overall development.

Tree farming, contrary to the popular conception, is not restricted to planting new trees. Rather, it is a matter of giving nature a helping hand, which, if properly done,

doing the planting, it is encouraging nature to do her own.

Harvesting of mature trees is as much a part

of the long-term manage-ment plan as the encourment plan as the encouragement of new growth.

"At first we did little harvesting," Baker says,
"but in the last five years we've increased our management by inventorying our properties to find

TV bargaining election set

Valley Tippecanoe teachers face the first exclusive representation election in the state during the 1975 bargaining season for teachers. The Indiana Education

Employment Relations Board (IEERB) Monday approved rules for an election between the Tippecanoe Valley Class-room Teachers Associa-tion (TVCTA) and a "no recognition" choice for

recognition choice for the corporation. The election is the result of over a year of attempts by TVCTA to achieve exclusive bar-gaining agent status

for the corporation's eighty teachers. An election last year resulted in the Tippecanoe Valley school board obtaining an injunction against counting the ballots, and no final ballots, and no final decision was rendered.

Lawyers for the asso-ciation cited incidents of teacher "harrassment and coercion" since the abortive election dur-ing Monday's hearing. ING MONDAY'S REATING. IEERB ordered the mail-ing ballot directly to the state to insure con-fidentiality and circum-vent possible continued harrasment moves. harrassment moves.

"The majority of our "The majority or our teachers are determined TVCTA is the only means to achieve professional negotiations status," TVCTA president Phyllis negotiations Gearhart stated. "The board's efforts to deny us the right to collect-ively bargain will not be tolerated either by TVCTA or the state of Indiana as was shown in IEERB's order."

"Harvesting is done in a conservative manner," Baker says. "Our phiet is to recenerate object is to regenerate new trees, to get new growth to come in as the old is harvested."

Trees are harvested in what Baker terms a "group clear cut" on a limited area. By relimited area. By removing all the timber,
natural reseeding will
follow and the woods
will be regenerated. If
there is an insufficinot amount of cotural amount of natural ent ent amount of natural seeding, the foresters can supplement it. And by using Timber Stand Improvement (TSI), non-desirable trees can be kolled to help trees best suited for the site to regenerate.
Although Baker refers

Although Baker refers to the harvest as a "clear cut," he does not mean a woods will be left "clear." "An absolutely 'clean' woods is not renewing itself," he says. "Young trees must come in thick to grow tall and limb free," Tops are left to decay. Tops are left to decay, in turn providing natur-al fertilizer and humus necessary for new growth.

"Our method of farming is different than a regular farmer's," Baker notes, "because we are thinking in terms of a long-term rotation --60 years--of a multiple species make-up. A number of individual species to work with actually complicates the project because of the difference in their needs." For instance, some species like Tulip Poplar, need a lot of light to grow; others, like hard maple, thrive in their own shade. Most other species range be-tween hard maple and poplar in shade tolerare treated accordingly, explaining why sometimes there is y large in a very opening a woodlot and why sometimes only a small "hole" is left.

Although Pike forest-ers are learning how to best grow trees on bare ground, their main thrust is managing es-

tablished timberland. If they purchase a farm that has odd openings, they will plant the area. Or they might consider planting the whole farm if it is not suited for cropland. Other-wise, acreage suited wise, acreage suited for farming will be sold

American Black Walnut is one of the species recommended for longterm investment for dry, open-field plantings. However, a top quality soil such as a well drained, fine textured bottomland is preferred for walnut trees.

Walnut, one of the most beautiful and durable hardwoods used in furniture manufacture, commands such a premium price, there have been some instances of illegal poaching by unscrup ulous dealers. ulous dealers. Refus-ing to deal with "log rustlers," Pike Lumber Co. will not buy logs offered them by anyone who is not a licensed Refus-

who is not a limber buyer.

Because of walnut's scarcity, foresters have worked for the past ten years to perfect genet-ically superior walnut trees. Purdue University specialists, under the direction of Dr. Walter Beineke, have Walter Beineke, have spent a great deal of time selecting top walnut trees--graded on the basis of straightness of stem, distance to the first limb, angle of limbs to stem, relation of the amount of top to



or ravine. Persons trapped in open country Persons by approaching heavy winds are advised to lie face down in the nearest depression and protect their heads with their arms.

Most schools have advance plans that include moving students to in-terior hallways on the lower floor. Auditori-

The new congregation represents segments of several former churches in addition to the two, including Valley church, Palestine Methodist and Fairview, the Yellow Creek Lake church completely destroyed by a tornado some years ago. Each week, the Burket

Each week, the Burket United Methodist Church has a prayer and share group, church school, worship services, Bible study groups and MYF. It provides meeting space for the Girl Scouts, 4-H clubs and home economics clubs. After the April 3, 1974 tornado destroyed the Talma school, placing those students into already crowded classrooms, the Burket church became a kindergarten classroom until the new school opened in January.

Tornado system to be tested in Akron April 14

Faced with the realization that tornado sea-son is again here, the Akron fire department has announced it is coordinating efforts with other fire departments and the sheriff's off-ice to establish a tor-

The system will be tested at 6 p.m. Monday, April 14, in Akron. April 14, in Akron.
There will be three oneminute blasts of the
fire siren with 15 second intervals between. In the event of an act-ual alert, plans call for use of the fire truck

and police car to sup-plement the siren. Plans for the warning

system were discussed at Wednesday night's Akron Chamber of Commerce meting. Chamber officials, as well as members of the fire department, expressed a desire to expressed a desire to receive comments from the public, either be-fore or after the test. They also want to know how far the siren can be heard.

Alternative methods were discussed and will be checked into along with suggestions from the public.

Fulton Co. told it needs new jail

"A new jail is needed post haste," Jail In-spector Walter B. Smith of the Indiana Departof the Indiana Depart-ment of Correction said following a recent tour of the Fulton Co. jail. For the second straight year, he recommended the county build a new jail.

Reasons given includinadequate plumbing lighting, padlock doorlocks not i and working order, jail not considered secure for safe custody; no forced air ventilation system and inadequate bathing and inadequate bathing facilities; jail not inspected by state or co-unty health officer; no visiting room for pris-oners who wear their own clothing instead of jail clothing, which he said should be provided; jail kitchen equipment not provided by county as provided by county as prescribed by law; windows loose and letting in cold air; screens on windows bent; need for

cluded furnishing clo-thing to prisoners, pro-viding all kitchen equi-ment, replacing light-ing and plumbing equip-ment, employment of four jailers and two deput-ies for round-the-clock und-the-clock stairs portion supervision; 1893 building.

Kit-tens don't leave shells in the nests when they hatch. There are so many things one has to learn on a farm. There is always a surplus of kittens and a few have to be put in the creek to make pussy willows grow on the creek bank.





It is the hope of the 'Woodlawn Hospital Cancer Detection Unit that new patients will be seen at each screening clinic with the hope that those who do attend that those who do attend can be encouraged to visit their own private physician on an annual basis for a thorough check-up. News Of Interest To Homemakers

Every homemaker has certain resources availcertain resources avail-able to use in managing the home. Those resour-ces are time, money, energy and knowledge. With so many women work-ing outside the home and those that are full time homemakers involv-ed in community service. ed in community service, time becomes the most important resource.

important resource.
With modern equipment such as freezers and modern techniques of preserving food, we can preserve food at home quickly and easily. Freezing is the easiest method of food preservation but it is also the most expensive. most expensive. the most expensive. A decision must be made as to which is more important - saving

or money.
The bacteria in food that causes it to spoil is not destroyed freezing. The organisms are just not as active are just not as accept at freezing temperatures. It is important es. It is important that all home freezers are set at 0°. Food deteriorates two to three times faster at 5° than at 0°.

All vegetables except cooking for someone, green pepper should be Reading, hearing a laugh, blanched before freez-

ing. Blanching is the process of holding food in boiling water for a few minutes to destroy the enzymes that cause ripening. If not de-stroyed these enzymes continue the ripening process in the freezer and the food loses color, texture, and flavor. Fruits do not require blanching since their acid base along with the freezing temperature

slow down the enzymes. Fruits can be frozen in a syrup pack, sugar pack, or unsweetened. Generally unsweetened fruit is of lower qualpack. ity when thawed than the other packs. Fruits other packs. Fruits that turn brown such as apples and peaches need treating in ascorbic acid (vitamin C). Powdered ascorbic acid can be purchased at the local pharmacy.







Not for older folks, perhaps, but for preschool tots who learn the "E" game. complete and the "E" game. "E" game, complete with
"magic feet" and topsyturvey "table," an eye
test can be a happy adventure in growing up healthy, according to members of Psi Iota Xi sorority.

The "E" game, an integral part of the screening procedure, is used to discover indications of visual faults in of visual faults in children who have not yet learned to read. The topsy-turvy table is actually the letter "E" that tops the usual eye chart. The "E" appears on the wall chart in diminishing sizes and rotated positions, with the "table legs" pointing in a different direction each time. ection each time.
The child being screen

ed indicates which direction the "legs" are pointing, thus permitting him to be checked even though he cannot

For the actual screenng test, the child pering test, the child performs alone; however, to enable the youngsters to learn the game and overcome any possible shyness, the preschoolers play it in a group first. The children sit in a semi-circle before a volunteer who displays a volunteer who displays the "E" symbol, and they move their arms up, down to the right or left to correspond with the ro-tation of the "E" by the

volunteer screener. When the time for the individual test arrives, the "magic feet" help to sustain the child's interest as well as aiding erest as well as aiding the accuracy of the test. To obtain a precise check of the youngster's visual acuity, the chart must be read from a distance of 20 feet. At the 20 foot measurement, the child finds two small shoe measurement, the child finds two small shoe prints sketched. Standing within the "magic feet" while he reads the chart is all part of the game.

If a youngster's test performance gives evidence to the volunteer.

performance gives evidence to the volunteer screener of a possible vision difficulty, the child is "referred." This means his parents are notified in writing of the need for the child to have a complete, professional eye

examination. Each re-ferral is subsequently followed up to see if the youngster has had the necessary examina-

Sixteen ballots that have remained sealed since they were cast by Tippecanoe Valley teachlast spring were op-d in Wabash Circuit ened court Thursday after-noon, and a count by Judge Lynn Ford showed all favored having the Tippecanoe Valley Classic room Teachers Associa-tion (TVCTA) be the off-icial and exclusive rep-resentative of teachers in collective bargaining and negotiation with the Tippecanoe Valley school board.

The school board and administration have administration have maintained that 14 of the 16 ballots were cast by teachers who had re-signed or had been notified that their contracts were going to be terminated, thus making themselves ineligible

Representatives of the school administration, the Indiana Education Employment Relations Board (IEERB) and TVCTA were ordered to appear in Wabash Circuit Court again on May 14. Judge Ford said the May hear-ing would determine if ing would determine at the 14 ballots were valid votes. IEERB has id votes. IEERB has said it considers the legal question of whether resigned and term-inated teachers may vote an important issue, and the decision is expectl to set a precedent. A second teacher re-

presentation election that was to end at 5 p. m. Tuesday, April 15, will not be decided un-til the outcome of the first election is retil the outcome of the first election is resolved, according to Judge Ford. The second election was conducted on a write-in basis.

Presently as-sistant superintendent at Ross Township School Corporation, Merrill-ville, where he is in charge of curriculum and personnel. he is a repersonnel, he is a native of DePont. He graduated from Indiana State
Teachers College and received his master's and doctorate degrees from Purdue University. He was principal at the was principal at the former Talma school for two years and also has served in Lockport, Ill. as well as Star City, New Paris and Fairfield in Indiana.
Harrell's contract was

approved on a 3-2 vote with Dr. Wymond Wilson and Richard Goshert dis-senting. Wilson object-ed that Harrell's sal-ary-\$27,000 per year plus mileage and fringe benefits--exceeded what had been appropriated. Goshert said, "There has been a pretty good wound in the community for a in the community for a long time. I hoped this would help bind it up, but it hasn't turned out that way." He said, "We paid \$17,000 last year to get a job done. We will pay \$50,000 next paru \$17,000 last year to get a job done. We will pay \$50,000 next year to get the same work done." Turning to year work done." Turning to fellow board members Fred Kindig, Don Snipes and Dr. John McKee, he said, "I got reports immediately who would be hired, and they have proven true. Our gentlemen's agreement to find a man acceptable to all of us has not been kept."

he were accusing him of not trying to come to an agreement, and Gosh-ert replied, "I'm just stating the facts."



Extension Service.
The shortage of manufactured and the resulting high prices will boost the demand for manure to an all-time high, he believes.

In Texas last year, 10 tons of manure per acre produced yields that compared with those recommended rates of commercial fertiliz-

er.
"It cost about \$40 to fertilize an acre with commercial fertilizer," notes Sweeten. "The cost of fertilizing an acre with feedlot manure is about \$23, where the

Manure used as fer-lizer can produce corn, miles or less. Assuming orghum or silage--as the same yields, feedlot manure saves about \$17

per acre. Sweeten's figures in-

Sweeten's figures indicate a break-even haul distance for manure of about 40 miles. What's a ton of manure provide? Well, a ton of liquid dairy manure contains about 9.3 pounds of phosphorus, and 8.7 pounds of potash. Lipounds of potash. Liquid hog manure contains about five pounds of nitrogen, 6.8 pounds of phosphorus nitrogen, 6.8 pounds of phosphorus, and 10.6 pounds of potassium. Beef manure -- liquid, again -- contains about 12 pounds of nitrogen per ton, and ranks be-tween dairy and hog ma-nure in both phosphorus and potassium. and potassium.

In other areas, where stom manure hauling custom manure hauling is not available, the cost may be higher. And if you're still hauling manure when you should be planting corn, those bushels lost to late planting would need to be added to the manurefertilizer bill.
