Lackawanna Railroad no longer runs through Ak-ron. In its place is a rail service formed by the consolidation of seven ailing railroads, Consolidated Rail Cor-

Consolidated Rail Corporation, better known as ConRail.

Though his con-scription into the Gerran army seemed unlike-ly, we felt it better to be safe and some 18 months ago we began the steps necessary for his certificate of citizenship.

Passport photos, a ten-dollar fee and endless forms later, submitted copies of our own birth certificates, marriage licenses, etc. to the Bureau of Immigration and Naturaliza-tion.

Weight loss--off again, on again

Everyone wants to lose everyone wants to lose weight rapidly. Thus, most currently popular reducing diets promote quick and easy weight loss. Dr. Jane Aycock, Extension specialist in foods and nutrition at Purdue University, says most people who follow a "fad diet" for a short a rad diet for a short time will regain lost weight rapidly when dis-continuing the diet. The poor eating habits which caused weight gain have not been changes, and the cycle begins again. To lose weight, you must either ear less exercise more, both.

But what about TV or +1 radio, newspaper radio, newspaper and magazine ads, or the diet books that claim losing weight is easy if you follow their diets? Can they be dangerous to one's health?

Dr. Aycock lists some questions that may help

you to evaluate reduction diets. Does the diet limit your food choices? For example, does it limit or eliminate one or more of the basic four food groups-milk and milk products, meat and meat alternates, breads and cereals, fruits and vegetables? Does it limit food breads and cereals, fruits and vegetables? Does it limit food choices by claiming that a single food such as grapefruit is the "magical key" to weight loss? Does it limit food choices by leaving out one food or nutrient, such as carbohydrate, from your diet?

On a diet containing fewer than 1,200 calories, it is difficult to provide nutrients calories, it is diffi-cult to provide nutrients needed to maintain needed to maintain health. A pound of fat contains about 3,500 calories, so do not de-prive yourself of more than 500 to 1,000 calor-

"homeowners should also beware of unscrupulous

persons who might prey on this natural fear of on this natural fear of termites. Both seem to come out of the woodwork about the same time, in the spring. Termites come above ground and swarm, but it's a frightening sight to be sure, but the consumer should not let that stampede him into making a frantic purchase."

"In the first place, the insects may not be termites. They might be winged ants or some other form of insect."

"In the second place," he said, "even if termites swarm around a property, it does not necessarily mean that damage has been done or that there is any danger the building will collapse. In short, even if you see termites, you still have time to follow your common sense rules that apply to any termites. Both seem

follow your common sense rules that apply to any purchase you might make." He suggested three rules:

1. Don't be highpressured into purchasing a termite control
service. Be wary of
anyone who tries to
scare you or rush you
into signing a contract
without reading it.
Stop, look and think about it!
2. Have a number of
companies make inspections, suggest treatment and prices and compare and pick the most
reliable offer.
3. Check the reliabil-

3. Check the reliability of the company you choose with your local Better Business Bureau, Chamber of Commerce, union headquarters or with county extension ag-

ent.
4. Read the terms of any document before you sign. If any guarantee or promises were made by the salesman see " or promises were made by the salesman, see that they are in writing. All the services to be performed and the price should be clearly stat-ed in the documents be-fore you sign.





BUNKER HILL

On June 16, 1775, American troops led by William Prescott marched to Charlestown where he had been ordered to fortify Bunker Hill. A council of war decided to fortify Breed's Hill instead. A minor installation was placed on Bunker Hill. On June 17, Connecticut troops under Captain Thomas Knowlton and New Hampshire troops under General Stark arrived. That afternoon in 90 degree heat, 65 companies of British advanced against the Americans and three times were repulsed. The hand to hand combat ended in a British victory, but the Battle of Bunker Hill served notice that the Continental Army had no intention of surrendering.

Private to general: Yeager is pilot of many honors

Air Force Brig. Gen. Charles E. Yeager, who will be guest speaker at the April 23 kick-off at the April 23 kick-off of the Lawrence D. Bell Aircraft Museum, logged almost 11,000 hours in 174 types of military aircraft before he retired on February 28, 1975, but it is for his work as a test pilot for Bell's X-l and X-lA that he is best known. These were the first airplanes he is best known. These were the first airplanes to break the sound bar-rier and to fly two and one-half times the speed

Yeager became a test pilot on his return to the States from Europe where he shot down 13 enemy aircraft during World War II, five on one mission, including one of German's first jet fighters

one of German's first jet fighters. Prior to the X-1's successful flight, air-planes had disintegratplanes had disintegrated when reaching Mach 1. Several pilots had been scared away from the program, but Yeager was so determined he flew the test without tell-ing anyone he had cracked several ribs when he fell from a horse the night before the flight.

After nine years as one of the nation's leading test pilots, he attended the Air War College and was assigned as Commandant of the Astronaut School at Edwards Air Force Base where 41 of the astronauts were trained. The mauts were trained. The general, who entered the Army Air Corps as a private, also served in Germany, France, the Philippines and flew 127 missions in Vietnam.

Gen. Yeager's exploits have made him one of the country's most honored pilots. His awards include the Collier and MacKay trophies and the Harmon International trophy. In 1973, at the age of 50, he became the first military person on active duty as well as the youngest person ever to be enshrined in the Aviation Hall of Fame at Dayton, Ohio. In Janu-Gen. Yeager's exploits Dayton, Ohio. In January of this year, President Ford signed a bill authorizing presenta-tion of a silver con-

gressional medal "equivalent to a non-combat Medal of Honor" to Yeager for risking his life in the sound barrier assault. (The Air Force originally proposed that Yeager be given a spec-

ially authorized Medal of Honor, but the Marine Corps objected that the medal should be awarded only for heroism in combat.)



All are authentic Conester wagons wagons. All are authen-tic Conestog wagons made for hauling freight and prairie schooners, made for hauling people.

The wagons were hand-ade of white pine and oak in Jonesboro, Ark., and were delivered to each state capitol last year by Mayflower Transit Co., which is also donating its services to transport food and hay to the traveling wagon

train.
The first wagon train started out in June from Blaine, Wash., down the Oregon Trail. Other western states' wagon trains started out last year, too, and wintered at Ft. Laramie, Wyoming. They resumed their journey this spring.

Indiana's wagon train Indiana's wagon train will leave Indianapolis on May 3, heading north on US 31 to spend one night each in Carmel, Tipton, Kokomi, Peru and Rochester and two nights in Plymouth and Lakeville. It will arrive in South Bend on May 13 to join the Great Lakes to join the Great Lakes wagon train and head east. Plans call for the train to reach Val-ley Forge on July 3 for a large fireworks spec-tacular on July 4. The wagons will remain in Valley Forge for two and one-half months and then be returned by May-flower to their respec-tive states for permanent enshrinement.

Individuals may join the wagon train with wagons or on horseback.

brary loan.
For example, if Bell
Memorial Library, MenTone, could not supply Tone, could not supply a title a local patron requested, the librarian would refer the request to the center, which would either furich the hook or search nish the book or search for it in other ALSA 2for it in other ALSA 2-member libraries. Or, if faced with a tough question, the librarian could pick up the tele-phone and relay the qu-estions to the center. Brich estimates that in most cases, the question most cases, the question can be answered within the same day with a day or two being the maximum for difficult refer-ence problems.

Books borrowed through the ALSA 2 Reference and Referral Center are usu-ally in a patron's hands within one to three days, he said. He noted that with the exception that with the exception of a rare book that may of a rare book that may not be available, almost any book title can be obtained through the center. All that needs to be done is for a library user to make a request at the local library.

ALSA 2, which serves Elkhart, Kosciusko, Marshall and St. Joesph counties, is federally funded.
