Our church doesn't require that we give up anything; I just wanted to do something con-structive, something that hurt a little, and denying myself food was as painful as anything I could think of, even if the selfiat knew that losing a pounds wouldn't be much of a sacrifice.

And so instead of seconds, I simply ate big-ger first helpings and ger first helpings and instead of sweet and salty snacks, I drank a lot of tea and ate ap-ples. But then came the final week of Lent, the one that is the saddest of all weeks, the one that began locally with rain, fog and general gloom, and the devil hit me where I am weakest--with an attack of chocoholism that could be treated only with a bag of chocolate-covered peanut clusters.

Washing down the last the chocolate with cups of hot tea, I star-ed out my office window at the bulletin board on the church lawn across the street and read: "The values of Lent are not based in what we give up but what Lent

we take up."
I felt a little better because I knew I had given up one thing--a few hours of time for a prayer experiment group that had become one of the most meaningful periences of my life, one in which I'd become closer to many people I had known, but not really known, all my life. It was a giving that resulted in my getting more than I gave.

I reflected on the prayer group, on the ex-periences we had shared and on our answered and unanswered prayers. And I thought again of the week that always seems so sad, that this year began with rain and gloom, that would end, as always, with the sad-dest day in Christendom --Good Friday. And I began to cry, which, for people who know me, is nothing unusual, except that these were tears of joy at a Good Friday story with a happy end-ing, a prayer dramatiing, a prayer of

## Cetters Know warning system, what to do if tornadoes strike

protection against sare protection ugainst tornadoes, but knowing the warning system and what to do in case a twister hits are two things that might save things that might save the save that might be a consequent injury. a life or prevent injury, according to Bruce Hess, director of the Fulton County Department of Civil Defense.

With the tornado season underway, Hess urg-ed the public to become familiar with the var ious warning plans and with protection measur-

Hess said that three agencies in Fulton county are concerned with tornado activity--Civil Defense, police depart-ments and fire departments.

The most common warn-ing device in case of the threat of a tornado the threat of a tornado is a fire siren, Hess said. If a community is in the path of tornado, the fire siren will be sounded for several straight minutes at a time, with short intervals vals

"Along, wailing siren means just one thing-take cover," Hess said. In addition to use of fire sirens, Fulton county residents will be informed of tornado danresidents will be ger by police cars mov-ing about their commun-ities using their sirens and public address sys-

tems.
Hess said that Rochester Radio Station WROI
(an FM station) will broadcast tornado information every 72 minutes when necessary, and more frequently than that if the situation requires.

He said that owners

AM radios tune to the or Plymouth for informat to the Logansport lymouth stations information about Fulton County.

Television can be of some help in alerting Fulton county, but re-sidents should note that Fulton county lies within the Indianapolis jurisdiction of the National Weather Service while the county's primary television reception is from South Bend.

Sometimes the South and area television Bend stations include Fulton county in their weather alert news and sometimes

they do not.
Starting in May, Hess
said, Indiana Cablevision which services the Rochester area will have an all-channel alert system through which it will be able to broadcast tornado information on each of its 12 chan-

Hess said that CB radios "can be a wireless partyline which can be helpful when used correctly and conditions are conducive for recep-

He said the Civil Defense department spon-sored a weather watch service on CB Channel 5 last spring and summer

do report, Hess said. He said that the C.D. office also monitors the statewide two-meter ham weather networks for additional weather information.

"For the interest of persons who own scann-ers," Hess said, "Inders," Hess said, "Ind-iana plans to be one of the first states to achieve more than 80 percent coverage by NOAA Weather Radio."

He said that in May, transmitter sites in South Bend and Fort Wayne will begin opera-tion and that a trans-mitter at Monticello is in the planning stage.

The effective range of weather transmitters is about 40 miles, about 40 miles, so an outside antenna probably will be needed in Fulton county, he said.

Hess said that elderly and hard-of-hearing

persons are of particu-lar concern in case of tornado threat. suggested that civil and social groups in the county might take on as the alerting a project of persons in these cat-

The most likely time of day for a tornado is between 3 and 7 p.m. and the movement of a twister is from southwest to northeast at an aver-age speed of from 25 to 40 mph. 40 mph. Precipitation followed by hail often

precedes a tornado.
Hess gives the following advice in case of

tornado:

-If you are outside, move at right angles to the storm and take cover in a depression in the ground such as a ditch or ravine if you cannot reach safety indoors. If you are in a car or on a farm tractor, get or off it and do not allow it to be between you and the approach of the tornado because

the wind can push the vehicle onto you.

-Inside a building, the safest place is in the southwest corner of a basement or storm celler. In buildings with-out a basement, the smallest ground floor smallest ground floor area with stout walls, such as a bathroom, closuch as a bathroom, closest or hallway, is the best place to be. If nothing else is available, a tipped over coach in the central part of the home will provide protection.

-If there is time, open the windows away from the direction of the storm's approach to lesson the possibility of the house "explod-ing" due to the sudden ing" due to the sudden drop of air pressure created by the partial vacuum of the funnel.

Spring rains and warm weather bring out the hunters-mushroom hun-Fresh mushrooms ters. are unique in flavor, easy to prepare, and go well with a variety of foods. In addition, they are low in calories.

Good mushroom hunters we their own "secret" have their own "secret" signs and spots for locating their prey. Actually the location of mushrooms is determined by their food supply. Because mushrooms contain no chlorophyll and can't produce their own food, they live off decaying organic matter have their own caying organic matter in soil--tree roots, fallen logs, stumps, or leaf mold.

Mushrooms should be cleaned carefully to remove dirt and insects. Soaking in salt water is the best procedure.

Never use any mushroom that shows signs of decay. It harbors ptomains and toxins just ike any other decaying matter. As a precaution, wild mushrooms should never be eaten raw.






