

# Local resident makes dolls for 60 years

Follows family custom

Lifetime Akron resident Ruby Dawson started making rag dolls about 60 years ago for her nieces who stayed with her every summer. "My mother made us (her brothers and sister) dolls and loved to make all kinds of things. She could make anything out of nothing. And my grand-mother made me a rag doll once when I stayed with her. That is where I got the idea to make dolls for my miscare " dolls for my nieces." Mrs. Dawson's collection consists of about 60

dolls, though she figures she has made close to a total of 100. She takes an assortment of 30 dolls with her when she gives exhibitions and showings for clubs and schools. About nine years ago she showed her dolls on a South Bend television station on Lois Pences' program, Home-makers, and local author Ann Sheetz wrote a feature article about Mrs. Dawson's hobby for Lady's Circle magazine about high years ago. Mrs. Dawson hand sews every single feature of her rag dolls. The bodies, which are stuffed

with cotton, are jointed at knees and elbows for flexibility, and the dolls even have stitched fingers and toes. The eyes, mouth and nose are em broidered and sewn with colored thread while their hair is made with yarn. Many of the dolls have ears and proudly display earrings, necklaces and rings. But Mrs. Dawson doesn't stop there. After she

has made the bodies of her dolls, she handsews all the clothes they wear. This includes lace and tatting-trimmed underclothes, socks and shoes. Almost all of the clothes can be taken off and washed. As a final, fitting touch for the dolls she so lovingly makes, Mrs. Dawson has made a number of beautiful doll-sized quilts to place them

None of her dolls are alike; each has something None of her dous are alke; each has something special to distinguish them, and many even have names. There are baby dolls, boy dolls, clown dolls, black dolls, gypsy and Indian dolls, one china-head doll and even a red riding hood re-versable doll; but the majority are lady and girl dolls dressed in late 1800's - early 1900's garb. The oldest doll she still has were made about 40 years ago, and have been played with by three generations of children. These three dolls are generations of children. Inese three doils are the only ones she has out for children to play with, as she keeps the others for her showings. When I asked Mrs. Dawson which out of her dolls was her favorite, she replied, "I don't have a favo-rite. I'm attached to all of them because it takes me days to make the body alone. The lace and tatting trims are all sewn by hand and that takes several more days. Even the shoes and everything are made by hand. I like them all. So do I.

The NEWS received notice from the Fulton County auditor's office that Homestead exemptions can be filed until May 10. If you filed last year and have not moved, you do not need to file again. If you have moved to a different home, you must file a new homestead exemption. If you didn't file last year, the auditor urges you to file now.

On March 26, Lt. Governor Robert Orr announced that the three grade schools in the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation have been awarded federal energy conearmarked for improvements that will result in energy savings, such as adding insulation or replacing incandescent lights with fluorescent or sodium lights



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# "Indiana Earthenware and Stoneware: 1840-1910"

Thirty-six pieces of Indiana earthenware and stoneware are on display at Mentone Elementary School until April 10, between the hours of 8:30 - 3:30 daily. On April 2, the exhibit will be open in the evening between 7 - 9 p.m. This selection of pottery spans the period between 1840 - 1910 and represents the work of ap-

and represents the work of approximately 25 Indiana potters and firms. The exhibit is on loan from the Indianapolis Museum of Art and is part of the State Travel-ing Exhibition Program.

"Indiana Earthenware and Stone-ware: 1840-1910" is part of the Indianapolis Museum of Art's State Traveling Exhibition Program (STEP) which brings displays of fine graphic and decorative art to communities in Indiana which may communities in indiana which may not ordinarily have access to them. The STEP program is funded in part by grants from the Indiana Arts Commission and the National Endowment for the Arts, a Federal agency. The exhibition was or-ganized by guest curator Melvin L. Davies, potter and collector of Indiana earthenware and stoneware, and Catherine Lippert, asso ciate curator of decorative arts at the IMA.

Unlike the wares of the eastern United States, which are well-researched, the ceramics of Indiana have been largely ignored by collectors and historians of the decorative arts. During the 19th century the discovery of superior clay deposits near the state's rich coal seams gave birth to a thriving ceraseams gave birth to a tinring cera mics industry, particularly in the counties of Clay, Parke, Vander-burgh, Perry, Clark and Putnam. Although machine techniques were increasingly adopted from about 1870 on, the exhibition concentrates on the whole throws

concentrates on the wheel-thrown concentrates on the wheel-thrown crocks, jugs, pans and churns pro-duced by these potteries in a varie-ty of sizes for storing, preserving and preparing food. The presence of potters in Indiana can be docu-mented as early as 1807, but little is known of the craft before the manufacturers census of 1810 manufacturers census of 1810. This and later records indicate that during the period 1820-1910 some 500 individuals, all identified by were actively engaged in the production of Indiana ceramics. Without doubt a far greater num-

Compared to the highly decorated ceramics of the eastern United States, Indiana's earthenware and stoneware is plain and utilitarian. At least a few of Indiana's potters, however, are known to have em-bellished their wares. Potters Wm.

Torbert and Geo. Baker of Brazil. Clay County, frequently stenciled in cobalt slip an attractive wreath mark on their pieces. In Loogootee, Martin County, the Stuckey family potters painted a stylized flower in cobalt slip on crocks, jars and mugs in addition to applying mold-

ed, three-dimensional cherries and tional Endowment for the Arts. ed, three-dimensional chernes and leaves to salt-glazed stoneware flower pots. A highlight of the dis-play is a jar by Francis Nolen, the only major example of incised and painted decoration known.

# Postural screening scheduled for schools

A postural screening program will be conducted to detect possible spinal problems in students in grades 6, 7 and 8 at the Mentone and Akron schools.

The screening will take place dur-ing the month of April. The exami-nation will be done by the school nurse, at which time the back will be examined as the student stands and bends forward. Boys may wear gym shorts or swim trunks, girls may wear a swim suit, or shorts and halter top or bra. It is suggested that the students bring what they will wear to school with them and leave the clothes at school until the student has been examined. Boys and girls will be screened seperately. In areas where screening is being


done it is found that about one in ten students has a spinal abnorma-lity, although all of them do not require treatment. If your child is presently being treated or is under a doctor's care for a spinal abnormality, or if you do not wish your child to be screened, you must notify the school. Screening will be done on all students unless their parents notify the school that they do not wish their child

# Inflation - how it affects you and me

by Diana Streevey Bucher

Inflation; we have all heard more of that word lately than we had ever hoped to. Sky-rocketing inflation has touched every one of us in the past several months in more ways than we can count. Every month we watch our paychecks shrink-ing, covering less and less, as prices continue to steadily rise. Bank interest rates are at an incredible level, putting pressure on construction and real estate sales. Speculation in gold and silver drove prices to outrageous highs, but could not be sustained. The result was a near panic on Wall Street at the end of March that dropped the price of stock an average 24% from this year's February 29 high. President Carter has introduc

ed vet another anti-inflation program that will attempt to cut federal spending. One of his pro posals is to cut out revenueposais is to cut out revenue-sharing funds to states, cities and towns. Last Friday, the NEWS spoke with the clerk-treasurers of both Akron and Mentone (Ernie Smith and Kate Whetstone) to see how this loss of revenue-sharing funds would affect our communities.

Kate Whetstone outlined the situation in Mentone. The town has an unique fire-protection system that involves the town and three townships (Harrison, Franklin and Newcastle), and they share the costs of maintaining the Mentone and Tri-Township Fire Department. For the past several years, the Menthe past several years, the Men-tone revenue-sharing funds have -been earmarked to pay for their share of fire protection (\$5078. 40), with extra funds supple-menting other fire and police department needs. This included paying for new equipment, up-keep on the fire station, gas and oil for the trucks, insurance, supplies and fire coats. Other reve-nue-sharing funds went toward updating some equipment for the police department (radios and guns) and buying intricate JAWS equipment for the fire department.

Mentone's revenue-sharing funds, which are received quar-terly, totaled \$11,856 for 1979. They will continue to receive funds this year, as the federal

budget for 1980 is already established. The loss of the funds would take effect in 1981.

We questioned Ms. Whetstone as to the possibility of property taxes being raised if Mentone loses it's revenue-sharing funds, but she explained the State Tax Levy in 1973 froze proper-

ty taxes. This year's assessed property evaluation in Mentone rose over \$1 million from the assessed evaluation in 1979.

Since the total tax levy cannot change, the tax rates are lower this year than last per \$100 sed property.



The funds this year are ear-marked for the first payment to the Public Employee Retirement Fund (PERF) to establish a re-tirement program for town em-ployees. Mr. Smith explained, "This year theoretically, we will have about \$19,000 saved federal wronue chains funds. About have about \$19,000 saved federal revenue-sharing funds. About \$7500 will go to PERF. It costs \$1000 a year to maintain lights, heating and a phone for the EMS building. The parking area at the Akron park by the ball diamond will be graded, and we will use part of the funds for street repairs."

When we asked Mr. Smith When we asked Mr. Smith about the frozen tax levy in Indiana, he explained they are allowed a small increase yearly, but that it in no way rises as much as inflation. He feels that if the revenue-sharing funds are halted, it will become necessary to either lift the frozen tax levy or add the county option tax in Fulton county. It is also possible Akron, like Mentone, would have to reduce their free trash pick-up.

Bell Memorial Library President, Bob Hill, spoke to the Mentone Town Board at their April 7 meeting concerning the financial plight of the library. The problems stem from the current low library tax rate, which is frozen and cannot be observed. He nonited out thet changed. He pointed out that the Akron library has had a tax rate of 30 cents since 1978, compared to Mentone's rate of less than .08 cents. In the Kosciusko county property the Kosciusko county property tax settlements, Kosciusko li-braries will receive the follow-ing monies: Warsaw, \$83,364; Pierceton, \$5.295: Syracuse, \$13,195; Milford, \$8,116; and Bell Memorial, \$1,021. # Jabberwocky



There has been a lot of controversy over whether the US should allow their Olympic teams to participate in the summer games in Moscow. Last week the US Olympic Committee showed signs of reversing their decision of two months ago to abide by President Carter's plans to boycott the games. Carter, in one of the few firm decisions he has made in recent months, responded by threatening to revoke the athlete's passports. Thus, on Saturday, the USOC re-luctantly voted to honor Carter's wishes.

It is an unfortunate situation. By revoking passports, the President could have justly been accused of infringing on their rights. The athletes protest that they have devoted many years of their lives to preparing for the Olympic games, and it is unfair for them to have to give up their dreams. And they're right, it isn't a bit fair. But many things aren't fair. They cry that they're being used as pawns in a political situation. I don't think they are so much pawns as they are victims. But so are the Afghanistan people victims.

Hard as it is to accept, the athletes are playing a very minor part in all this controversy. More is at stake here than the disappointments of one select group. The President made a decision weeks ago to boycott the games, and to reverse that decision now would only further undermine his effectiveness in world matters. Boycotting the Olympics, whether alone or with other countries, will show the world that the US is serious in their condemnation of Soviet aggression in Afghanistan. It will be a devastating insult to the Soviets, and will deny them the oppor-tunity to 'show-off' their country and their system of government. It is also necessary to show the world that US foreign policy cannot be dictated by a smallinterest group.

This situation has been compared to the 1936 Olympic games that were held in Berlin. The world, by that time, was aware of Germany's treatment of Jewish citizens, but it was overlooked in the interest of the games. Every country entered in the games showed up, enabling Hitler to exultantly proclaim, "They all came!" Let's not give Soviet officials the chance to also boast, "They all came!"

# Earth Day involves concerned citizens with environment

What were you doing ten years ago on April 22? Did you participate in Earth Day? Were you concerned about what was happening to the environment?

happening to the environment? Are you still concerned? On April 22, 1980, you can again participate in Earth Day - Earth Day '80. While the en-vironment is considerably cleaner than in 1970, and a new envi-ronmental industry has develop-ed, there is still much that needs to be done. So Earth Day 'R0 is the time to think about '80 is the time to think about where we still need to improve. Here are some suggestions from the Environmental Protec-

Agency: tion Take a look around your

town. How many people are rid-ing to or from work alone in a car? Are there signs that older buildings and statues are changing color or crumbling away? Are pollution alerts fairly com-

mon in warm weather? In cities, automobile exhausts and industrial smoke are the biggest cause of air pollution. The soot and fly ash from factories and utilities act like sandpaper scratching away at build-ings and statues and darkening them. The chemicals from car exhausts and some factories can mix with smoke and sunlight to make eye-stinging smog. And when the chemicals mix with rain, you have "acid rain" that can eat away at cars, sidewalks, and trees

To help clear the air, you need to use public transportation, and carpools, and make sure that your city enforces pol-lution standards.

There are pollution standards for water, too. But the most common water pollutant is dirt washed from the land into wa-This is particularly a pro-

blem where there is farming near a stream or where con struction is going on. Chemical fertilizers also show up in water causing algae to multiply. They can absorb oxygen from the water so that fish are kill-ed. And of course poorly treat-

ed. And of course poonly treat-ed sewage produces bacteria in water supplies. Garbage and pesticides can also harm the water. And noise pollution can affect our health ritheost our error wellships the without our even realizing it.

Earth Day '80 will focus at-tention on many of these pro-blems, and help reach some answers. Randall Leininger at the Ak-ron Exchange State Bank, tried to explain the FRB's Special Credit Restraint Program. It went into effect on March 14, 1980, and since it is an untried, untested program, no one is sure yet just how to interpret it. Although it is a 'voluntary' program, the FRB has placed ceiling limits on the amount of money banks should loan between Dec. 31, 1979 and Dec. 31, 1980. The Akron Bank,

The FRB restrictions, at this time, will not affect local banks as much as they will larger city banks. If a bank stays under a as mich as the with tags of the stars under a  $2 \pm 1$  million ceiling in consumer credit loans, they will not have to take any special action (the Akron Bank has approximately 21,600,000 in consumer credit loans). Banks that show a balance over the  $2 \pm 1$  million figure are limited to a 6% - 9% increase in the allotted time period. If they show increases over that amount, they must deposit a percentage of the extra amount of money with the tra amount of money with the FRB. This will in turn limit the monies they have to lend tra consumers. to

Mr. Leininger said there has been local inflationary buying. "A lot of people did try, when interest rates first began rising, when to get loans. They wanted to borrow on the premise that if they buy now, they can pay later in cheaper dollars (as inlater in cheaper dollars (as in-terest rates continue to rise and money is worth less). But the number of people request-ing loams now is diminishing, as interest rates have reached all-time highs." He also reported that, while the Akron Bank has money to lend, they will devote more attention to the sustomer's ability to repay a loan.

F. D. Miner, President at the Farmer's State Bank in Mentone, confirmed there will Mentone, continued there will be difficulty in figuring out the Special Credit Restraint Program, as he interpreted the guidelines differently from Mr. Leininger. Farmer's State Bank filed no report with the FRB on March 14 because they don't believe they are affected by the program guidelines. Bank officials there understand that, as they fell below the \$2 million ceiling, they don't have to file a consumer cred report. Mr. Miner explained nsumer credit

that car, mobile home, truck, business and mortgage loans are excluded from the \$2 million limit. While they estimate the bank has over \$4 million in consumer loans, they figure over half of the loans are cluded from the reporting requirements.

The main purpose of the loan regulation, according to Mr. Miner, is to limit 'luxury loans (for furniture, vacations, etc.) and revolving credit (credit cards). He added, "Not a lot of people have been coming in for loans in the last six months. People are regulating themselves. As interest rates are at an alltime high, mortgage loan re-quests are almost at a standstill.

Will this attempt of the Fed-

eral Reserve Board to regulate loans help to curb inflation? Bob Taylor and Randall Lein-inger at Akron Exchange ex-pressed doubts, pointing out that it was still a voluntary program and didn't necessarily mean it would help the situa-tion. F. D. Mixer was more tion. F. D. Miner was more hopeful, although he qualified his answer. "I don't think the his answer. "I don't think the steps the government is taking will help as much as the gen-eral public itself, which is al-ready restraining from buying. It's the law of supply and de-mand. When demand for pro-ducts is down, prices are down. When demand is up, prices are up. It's a natural economic law."

Reading from the resignation, Dr. Harrell gravely stated, "If there were a glimmer of hope that a commoness of purpose -a cooperation of the many." a cooperation of the many forces which determine educaforces which determine educa-tional goals and aspirations of a community existed; then I believe the district would be mov-I would gladly, enthusiastically accept the challenge and con-tinue to provide the necessary leadership . . but to say the least, it has become a personally frustrating and a personally unsatisfactory position. "Under the circumstances, it

to myself to resign at this time in order that the board will have sufficient time to employ a successor and for me to seek other employment. My intention, at this time is to remain in the community. To dispel any rumors that might arise, my health if not a factor in my decision. I believe, and my doctor corrobrates this, that I am in much better health than a year ago.

a year ago. "My only concern is that I may have been too impatient for a positive direction to re-assert itself, but in these fast changing times we must run, not walk, if we are to keep pace with the times." Dr. Harrel tendered his re-

Dr. Harrell tendered his resignation just moments after the School Board rejected one of his recommendations concerning his recommendations concerning teacher contracts. The recom-mendation in question would have resulted in the non-rene-wal of three teacher contracts. While the board didn't vote to grant contracts to the three teachers, they did postpone a decision until their next executive session, scheduled for

April 28. Dr. Harrell had presented to the board a list of all the teachers in the corporation 45 teachers are considered per-manent and have continuing contracts, so no action was needed by the board. There are 28 semi-permanent teachers (who have been with TVSC three, four, or five years), and Dr.

Harrell recommended five of them for change to permanent status. These are: Debra Hull, Marlene Nellans, John Parker, Rebecca Smith and Joanne Welch.

Of the 30 non-permanent teachers in the corporation, several have met the requireseveral have met the require-ments for change to semi-per-manent status. Dr. Harrell advis-ed the board to effect this change, with the exception of Cindy Carvile (elementary music teacher), Sherry DeWald (special education) and Vicki Smith (special education, mild-Justice the second seco

With no discussion concern-With no discussion concern-ing the matter, board member Don Snipes moved to accept Dr. Harrell's recommendation. Lee Norris seconded, and the vote was: Norris, yes; Vern Meredith, no; Everett Besson, no; Snipes, yes; Con Shewman, no.

Meredith moved to table the three contracts recommended for non-renewal, and it passed

Tor non-renewal, and it passed unanimously. Earlier in the meeting, the board listened to a progress re-port from Chuck Posthumus, representative from Daverman architectural firm. He and the building advisory committees from the three schools have been working on finishes and re-modeling in individual rooms in the grade schools. ### Fire station to receive facelift "clean-up" day May 9 set as

The Akron Town Board met on Tuesday, April 15, for a regular meeting. All members plus Clerk Ernie Smith were

President Ron Fenimore reported that he and Mr. Smith had consulted with contractor Rex Bowen concerning a new front for the fire station. Included in the repair/reconstruc-tion will be removing the 10 ft. overhead door and installing a new 14 ft. overhead door, re-doing the sidewalk in front of the station and re-finishing

of the station and re-mining the face of the building. Mr. Bowen agreed to do the work on a labor/material pro-position. He estimated the en-tire job will cost \$8600, and he would have it finished by July 1. The board voted un-animously to sign a contract with Mr. Bowen.

The board decided to set the first full week in May (4-11) as Town Clean-Up Week. They will hire extra help to assist with trash pick-up on Friday, May 9, and they invite residents to leave ANY trash (old furniture, appliances, etc.) on their curbs that day for free pick-up. They urge residents to clean up

their properties during this week. President Fenimore advised the board that Ned and Joann Schuler are interested in starting an apartment housing pro-ject northwest of Akron park. They agreed to contact Boyd Philips, an engineering firm, to come for a consultation concern-ing sewage and water line re-quirements for such a project. Mr. Fenimore also reported Dr. Kenneth Hoff is still considering a conjuctivity considering a senior-citizen apartment complex immediately east of Bahney's Chevrolet.

The board decided to have the water tanks inspected. While water funds are low at this time, President Fenimore said they should have the tanks inspected so they can prepare for the day they will have to be recondition-ed. ed.

In other business: \*Charles Miller was instructed to check with the state to see about getting the streets cleaned. \*Mr. Smith advised the board that he had received a letter that he had received a letter concerning revneue-sharing funds. He reported there were no fed-eral monies budgeted for the funds after 1980, so the town budget will have to be planned without this form of revenue.

\*Mr. Smith showed the board a large aerial photograph of Akron and the surrounding area prepared by Robert Daake. Art Craig had delivered it to the clerk's office on April 15 from the county surveyor's



Baseball players, it is reported, are 316 to one in favor of a strike if they don't get their way. Fortunately, that's one strike people don't have to

worry about. . . except for possibly the citizens of cities who have built fabulously expensive stadiums in which the trained seals of professional athletics can perform.

Most strikes hurt everyone from the striking worker to the employer. Most important of all, the supply network for that business is stripped of its way of making a living by a situation over which they have no control.

Not this one. Not a single life will be disrupted if baseball isn't played. Few, other than the unfortunate park vendors and their employers, will lose any income. Food, clothing, heat, housing, none of it will be affected.

People don't even have to worry about who is right and who is wrong.

We have no argument with the players attempting to get all they can from multi-millionaire owners who are apparently doing just fine.

We have one big complaint. We have objected, will object, will forever remain furious about the system that has furnished dozens of stadiums of taxpayers' expense so athletes can make big money and multimillionaire owners are not required to build, for want of a better word, their own factories.

And that's all a stadium is. . . a factory from which the working ballplayer and owner can sell their wares.

Frank Navin built his own stadium in Detroit. Walter Briggs rebuilt it. The Comiskeys, Wrigleys, Connie Mack, the owners of old Yankee Stadium took care of their own ball parks. Every stadium in the land until Cleveland built its Municipal Stadium after World War II, was built by the man who owned the ball club.

If the owners were paying for their stadiums, we'd say let the players and owners fight it out.

As it is, the taxpaying citizen has been made an innocent pawn.

As for the ballplayers themselves, we don't care if they never play again.

None of them have any loyalty at all except to their own pocketbook. So we need not have concern for them.

Nice to have one problem pop up that requires no worry or concern for the average person.

# grinding meal Gristmills

by Eula Romayne Smith

"Jolly is the miller that lives by the mill," says the old song. If those words are true, there must have been a lot of jolly people in this community

through the years. People have been grinding grain into meal or flour for centuries. At first they rubbed flat stones together by hand, but life was easier when they used revolving stones. The size of the stone and the source of power varied with the time and place. Probably the millstones mentioned in the Bible were turned by animals or servants. During pioneer days grist or flouring mills were operated water, and later by steam erated by

The Treaty of 1826 promised the Indians of this vicinity a gristmill to grind their corn, a miller to operate it and a black-smith, in addition to annual payments of salt and silver. The mill meine was built near back mill, which was built near Lake Manitou at Rochester, was used only a few years before they moved West.

According to the 1879 Atlas of Kosciusko County, the first mill in Harrison Township was erected in 1838 on the banks of Trimble Creek by Islam Summy. It was a grist and saw mill operated by water power. Its facilities for grinding were limited, but it provided a great convenience to the settlers. Sometimes Indians also stopped

te to beg or buy corn meal. Without a detailed history of Palestine, we can only wonder if there were several later own ers of the one mill, if there were different mills on this site, or if there were several different mills at Palestine.

A biographical sketch of T. Sarber tells us that his father, Abraham Sarber, built a gristmill at Palestine in 1843, but sold it the same year. Another source says Samuel and Richard Croxton built the Palestine mill

about 1842. A century ago Charles Ward and N. Henderson were the millers there, and later Elmer Eddinger was in charge of Henderson's mill. According to George Nye, a

According to George Nye, a Warsaw writer, John Sloan ran the gristmill in the early 1900's, and at that time flour was hauled to Warsaw, Burket, Men-tone and other towns. A 1927 magazine article shar-ed by the Indiana Historical Society Library said the old

Society Library said the old buhrs were still used to grind corn and buckwheat (the terms buhrstones, buhrs, or burrs were sometimes used in place of millstones). However, this old mill burned a few years later. In 1924 Edwin Shirey and

Henry Secor bought the mill. Five years later Shirey bought out Secor, and it has remained in the Shirey family every since. During this period the emphasis changed from flour to feed at

Changed from hour to feed at the Lone Eagle Mill. At old Tippecanoe Town in Marshall County a mill dam was built in 1840. N. B. and P. S. Alleman operated a flour-ing mill there for many years in addition to the woolen mill which leaded form the Guid. War until 1878. By 1852 there was a gristmill

at Bloomingsburg, the town which we call Talma. The 1883 Fulton County Atlas lists N. J. Clymer as proprietor of the gristmill worth \$10,000. A few years ago Ralph Hatfield des-cribed the three-story gristmill back of Hatfield's old store and mentioned the mill dam of Robert Calvert's.

Edwin C. Gordon operated a steam sawmill at Sevastopol for several years before he at-tached a run of buhrs for grinding corn. Later he built a team flouring mill, which was listed as Towl & Keesecker's in 1879.

In the late 1800's millers be gan replacing millstones with roller mills made of corrugated steel rollers. M. O. Mentzer

wrote about one that was built in 1884, in a series of local his-tory articles which he wrote for the Mentone News about twenty years ago. He related that his at Little Chicago, but in the early days of Mentone his father "entered into partnership with Art Manwaring, moving his en-gine and boiler to Mentone and they build the first roller grist-

mill in miles of this place (there were a number of water-powered burr mills). This mill years and people came for miles to get the more refined miles to get the more refined flour. Later Albert Tucker be-came a partner in the business and they shipped flour and feed as far east as Cleveland, Ohic

At this point Mentone mill history is not quite clear. I think the mill was called the Nickel Plate Roller Mills; later, Valentine Elevator; and more recently, Agri-Center. In 1909 Star Mills advertised in the Mentone newspaper as follows: "Flour, Best that can be Made, Field Grinding Done Every Day. Secure your winter supply of barn and shorts while you have a chance. It will soon be scarce." No address was given for the Star Mills, but there was an early twentieth century flouring mill across the street from Hazel Linn's residence, about where Jerry Gross's Body shop is located. A picture of this mill proclaims it was "World's Best". That mill, powered by a gas engine without a muffler, was destroyed by fire.



# School Board decides on teacher contracts

At a special meeting of the TVHS School Board on Mon-day evening, a decision was made on the rehiring of corporation teachers.

Besson moved on the basis of individual teacher evaluation re-ports, to renew the contracts of Cindy Carwile and Vicki Smith. Meredith seconded the motion, and it passed by a vote of 3-2, with Norris and

Snipes voting no. Snipes next moved that Cheri DeWald's contract not be renewed. Norris seconded, and the

motion carried 4-1, Meredith

motion carried 4-1, Meredith casting the only nay vote. After the meeting, when ask-ed what objection there was to Ms. DeWald's job performance, Lee Norris and Everett Besson explained there were no gros problems or incidents. Mr. N Nor ris said it wasn't so much a matter of objecting to the in-dividual as a matter of wanting the best for the corporation. The board's decision was based on the evaluation report submitted by the school administration and reviewed by the Superintendent. They added that the teachers review and sign their evaluations before they are submitted to the board.

# State jail inspector recommends closing Fulton County facility

The annual inspection of the Fulton County jail at Rochester was conducted on March 27 by state jail inspector W. B. Smith. The Indiana Department of Cor

The Indiana Department of Cor-rections sent copies of the re-port to Judge Douglas Morton and Robert Newgent, Fulton County sheriff. The report began by stating that a grand jury inspected the jail once last year and had re-commended the facility be clos-od and a row isid huit. During commended the facility be clos-ed and a new jail built. During the last year there were approxi-mately 368 prisoners booked into the jail, with about 15 sentenced to the jail for a prolonged period. During this time there were two attempted es-capes, one successful. The facility has a capacity for 26 pri-

While the report noted improvements that had been made in the last year (the installation of some lights in the catwalk area, a fire alarm system, three new showers, a new hot water heater, jail clothing and the painting of cell blocks), it list-

ed improvements needed for the facility and additional personnel needed to meet the needs and requirements of a jail. Prisoners are not being handled according to state book-in procedures due to inadequa-cies of the facility and number of personnel, and written re-ports are not kept on all daily and weekly inspections of the int

jail. The Department of Correction recommended the following im-provements be made: 1) Three additional jailers are needed for proper prisoner supervision. 2) An industrial washer/drver is An industrial washer/dryer is needed. 3) A commercial kitchen is needed. 4) The wiring, light-ing and plumbing is in very poor condition. 5) An additional matron, two deputies and clerical help is needed. 6) Security is poor in that individual cells cannot be locked. 7) The win-dows are insecure and allow to come in. 8) One shower floor is leaking into the lower cell block area from the up-

stairs section, 9) There have been no steps taken toward a new facility since last year's inspection and only cursory im-provements have been made. The facility does not comply with needs and requirements, and we are once again recom-mending that the facility be closed.





The Cass Circuit Court seal is reproduced because it contains a likeness of Aubbee and Lewis Cass. Chief Aubbeenaubbee owned 46 sections of land and had six

He took to drinking and met a grizzly fate, stabbed to death by his own son, Pau-koo-shuk, in retaliation for Aubbee's having killed the son's mother, one of Aubbee's wives. Pau-koo-why there and the lord for 50 shuk then sold the land for 50 cents to \$1 an acre to the U.S. Government in the treaties of 1836.







# Jabberwocky

Next Tuesday (May 6) the polls will open for the 1980 Indiana Primary. For most of us the race with the foremost interest is the race for the presidential nomination. If you chose a Republican ballot, you theoretically can chose between Ronald Reagan, George Bush or John Anderson; remember, however, that Anderson has decided to run as an independent (without a party) because it would be virtually impossible for him to win the Republican nomination. If you chose a Democrat ballot, you will have a choice between Jimmy Carter or Ted Kennedy.

There is no doubt in my mind that the April 25 attempt to free the hostages in Iran will hurt Carter's chance to be re-elected. I cannot say that this upsets me. Over the last year Carter has continually shown himself to be inept, incompetent and unequal to the demands of his office. Now on top of the incomprehensible act of decontrolling gasoline and oil prices (to the benefit of only the oil companies), ignoring his advisors warnings about the consequences of ad-mitting the Shah of Iran into the US and his erratic treatment of our NATO allies, he has further complicated our situation by this latest, ill-conceived, attention grabbing rescue attempt. From all appearances, this attempt had a miniscule chance of succeed-ing and it risked the lives of all the hostages. I personally am tired of this type of election-year foreign policy

The front runner on the Republican ticket is Ronald Reagan. Here is a man whose single greatest asset is his campaigning style, perfected by his years of acting experience.

Reagan comes across as a sincere, personable candidate. . . until you examine his record. He is well-known for stating unfounded facts and making unfounded accusations. For example, he is fond of pointing out that he rebated \$5.7 billion to Californians when he was Governor. This is true enough, but he neglects to remind voters that he increased taxes in California by \$21 billion before he made the rebates. He also likes to point out deficiencies in the present administration. He cries that it costs the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) \$3 overhead to deliver \$1 to a needy person in the US. The actual cost, according to HEW, is 12 cents.

Other examples of Reagan's inconsistancy concerns social issues. Today he opposes publicly funded abortions, but as Governor of California he signed one of the most liberal abortion laws in the nation. Between 1968 and 1974, more than 600,000 women received abortions in his state--200,000 of them publicly financed. He also was one of the first strong supporters of the Equal Rights Amendment--today he quietly opposes the amendment.

And then there are his statements that no one can quite figure out. My favorite Reagan quote is, "Americans could have cheap gasoline again by lifting Govern-ment restrictions on the oil industry". Huh?

The second string candidates are, of course, Ted Kennedy and George Bush. Kennedy, at least, has a consistent voting record in the Senate, backing not big business but the man on the street. Politically speaking, he is a strong candidate; personally speaking, there have been a lot of problems, and this has been his biggest obstacle to gaining the Democrat nomination and, possibly, the election. George who?

John Anderson, this year's dark horse candidate, doesn't make pretty speeches and empty promises. He admits there are hard times ahead and says we need to get things under control once more. He thinks things are going to be tough for awhile. I think this might be a good year to vote independent.
