Russ Hart steps in to fill void Mentone Marshal John Hart formally resigns

In what may be one of the most unusual local instances of familial duty, deputy Russ Hart agreed to fill the vacancy of Mentone Town Marshal created by his son's recent resignation. John Hart formally resigned his position last Monday, April 2, although he quit working for the town about two weeks earlier to accept employment with Niff-Tone Distributors.

Hart resigned because of low salary. During his five-year tenure as Marshal, he'd received a raise every year until this year, when town board members voted to hold all town employee salaries at their 1983 levels. The Marshal's position paid \$12,500, while deputy's job paid \$11,500.

Miller, Board members Jim Wayne Tombaugh and Miriam Boardman praised Hart's job performance, but all stated they understood his reasons for accept ing another job. When they asked Hart's father, Russell Hart, if he'd accept the position as Marshal, he agreed to do so.

Board president, Miller moved to

hire Russ Hart as Marshal, paying him the current salary of \$12.500 plus an additional \$1500 annually to cover the extra duties that will be his. (Board members do not plan on hiring a full-time deputy to replace Russ Hart, but will instead use reserve officers.)

Russ Hart's only comment was to state he felt the \$14,000 still wasn't a fair salary considering the extra work that would be his. After some discussion, trustees agreed to pay Hart for time spent in court on town business. Hart will also continue in his capacity as building inspector, and he agreed to take over as Mentone's civil defense director.

On the heels of the personnel change Hart announced that his son had only last Saturday been named the Kosciusko County Policeman of the Year by the Warsaw chapter of the VFW

Current reserve officers Jim Lewis and Rick Johnson attended the meeting. Trustees questioned them about their availability and briefly discussed hourly wages. They decided to postpone any

decision about wages until the May meeting.

Board members unanimously decided to contract with Ropes Corporation. Kokomo, and start a water meter replacement program. Last month the trustees listened to representatives from a Rockwell dealer and from Ropes, which handles Neptune meters. Super-intendent Rod Holloway commented that Rockwell had been around a long time, but Neptune's meters were easier to change from standard to remote.

After reports from Tombaugh, who investigated Bremen's Neptune system, and Boardman, who investigated Bourbon's Neptune system, members decided to accept Rope's offer.

Cost of the meters is \$42.50 for the remote-type. The town will purchase 18 meters every three months for one year, so by the end of the year cost will be \$3060 for 72 units. An additional 12 or 13 meters will be received as trade-in for extra lengths of 12 inch pipe originally purchased from Ropes,

bringing the total number of new meters to 85.

Trustees directed clerk-treasurer Kate Whetstone to send an order for 12 meters.

In other business: Town employees will sweep and clean Main Street and Broadway tonight (Wednesday) in anticipation of painting new narking lines on the streets. Darrel King and Tombaugh are coordinating an effort to clean up the cemetery on April 11 and 18.

Several of the older tombstones have fallen or are in danger of doing so, so volunteers are needed to help correct the problems. Volunteers are asked to call Tombaugh at 353-7690 for more details.

Miller reminded town employees and other trustees that the town's backhoe should not be used on private property for water lines and drains. Although in past years the town's equipment and man hours were freely donated, Miller stated he felt the town had more than enough work for employees. Whetstone pointed out that such a position had already been adopted, although occasional exceptions have been made.

Henry Twp. Trustee

Trustees agreed to hire Billy Steele to read meters for the town. He'll be paid \$1 per meter every quarter.

Members signed ordinance #249 outlining dog and cat control within town limits. (See page 3 for ordinance.)

Board members also signed a contract with the Kosciusko county Sheriff's office for county dispatch services. Cost is \$600 annually plus special telephone fees payable directly to General Telephone

Members accepted Russ Hart's report for the month of March. It included 1348 miles logged on the police vehicle while answering 20 calls. They included four accidents, two with personal property damage amounting to \$3400 but no injuries, one dog complaint, one public assist, two breaking and entering reports and three title checks-

The next meeting of the board will be Monday, May 7 at 7 p.m. at the town offices

Computer Programming II

The students have just finished working on a program in which they search for a particular word in a sentence or paragraph. There are many applications in which it is required to do such a search. For example, in an information retrieval application in a library, it might be desirable for a user to enter one or words on a computer terminal to determine if the word or words are contained in a paragraph. The program searches the paragraph to determine if the word or words are contained within the paragraph. An appropriate message indicates whether or not the word was found.

Their next assignment will be the study of date files. In many applications, it is advantageous to permanently store data on an auxiliary storage advice such as a floppy disk. When this is done, the data can be read from the floppy disk into main computer storage and be processed as required. We are currently studying the statements to record data on a disk and the statements to read the data stored on a disk. The students will then write programs to store and update data in sequential files.

Business

Business Ari thmetic students have been reviewing fractions: what is an improper fraction, mixed fraction and a proper fraction. Adding subtraction, multiplying and dividing fractions.

They have worked on ratio and proportion. In the weeks to come they will be figuring wages, time cards, cash record summaries, budget problems and commissions. They will also be working frac-

tional relationships such as: to find a part of a number, to find the number that is a certain part greater (or smaller) than a given number, to find what part one number is of another number, and to find what part one number is greater (or smaller) than another number

Typing I students are now applying the knowledge they learned in first semester. Work is assigned for a week and they pace themselves to get the work done.

Business Machines and Secretarial procedures students are working in various office and occupations via packets. Some of the areas include: filing, medical records typing, legal typing, accounting office, apartment complex, airport, etc.

The shorthand class is advanc-ing to speeds of 70-90 words per minute in dictation and transcription

Office Lab (mostly Angie Thompson) has completed the football keepsake booklet. They are presently being distributed.

Accounting I students are working on their practice set Cycle Center. They are keeping books for a merchandising business that is organized as a partnership. They

will be completing the entire accounting cycle during this exercise

Accounting II students have began their second practice set, Film and Flash. In this exercise, the students will be using special journals, including allowance journals. They will be journalizing entries for two months, doing year end financial statements along with adjusting, closing and reversing entries. They will also be working on payroll.

Building Trades

The Building Trades house is going along on schedule. Presently, the students are finishing the drywalling of the houses interior. As could be expected, the students are looking forward to warm weather so work can be completed on the exterior.

A report on the house that was built by last years class is that due to the "super insulation", the bill for one years heat will be less than \$250.

Psychology and Sociology

The Psychology classes studying neuroses and psychoses along with alcoholism and drug addiction. A field trip will be taken to the Fort Wayne State Hospital and Training Center.

The Sociology classes are doing individual research on topics dealing with various aspects of society

FFA Thirteen members of the FFA livestock and dairy judging teams journeyed to West Lafayette recently to participate in the Purdue Invitational judging contests.

The complete results have not been received for all the teams, however, the dairy judging team of Mark Floor, Troy Butt, Chris Schipper, and Phil Claxton placed first among the 63 teams from throughout the state. Butt and Schipper placed fourth and fifth respectfully, out of over 250 contestants.

This contest was the first of the judging season and all judging team members are now preparing for the county contest which they hope will give them an opportunity to try for the eventual state championship.

Home Economics

Beginning Clothing and Advanced Clothing classes are both being offered this semester. In Clothing I the students make either a skirt or a pair of slacks of woven fabric. Their next project will be a garment of a different kind. Each student selects their pattern, fabric, and project according to their own needs and abilities. The class is individualized for each student.

Clothing II students must have had Clothing I as a prerequisite. This class is also individualized according to each student's needs and abilities. Students in Advanced Clothing are making blouses. pants, suits, prom dresses, and graduation dresses

Health and P.E.

The physical education classes have finished a unit in swimming involving safety and rescue skills Last week both the boys and girls started a unit on the gymnastics

equipment. Some of the equipment being used are the parallel and uneven bars, the balance beam, still rings, vaulting horse, and flying rings. The next activity will be co-ed square dancing, and will begin after spring break.

The Health class will begin studying sports and recreation. One point of emphasis will be hand-eye coordination, therefore the class will attempt to learn how to juggle

The Co-Ed P.E. class finished up a unit in basketball. They now are on a weightlifting unit which will be followed by two weeks of volleyball.

History

The World History classes are preparing to study W.W. I. and its effect on the world today

The U.S. History are finishing the chapter on the growth of American Industry. This chapter included such people as Cornelius Vanderbuilt, Andrew Carnegie, and John D. Rockefeller.

The students will be selecting their last nine weeks projects. They will have a wide variety of topics to select from. Some of their projects will be drawings, maps, writing reports, and giving oral reports. Math

The students in Algebra/Pre Algebra have been working on factoring, multiplying, dividing, adding, and subtracting polynomial fractions.

General math students are currently working with fraction. In addition to reviewing how to add and subtract with common denominators, they are also working consumer problems using fraction, doing fraction problems on the computer and using calculators for 'everyday'' type problems.

Students in geometry have been learning about constructions and locus problems. Now that they are experienced at constructing accord ing to given specifications and describing exactly the points that satisfy given conditions, they are beginning to combine the After they have "mastered" con-structing loci, they will begin working on determining the areas of different objects.

Foreign Language

The first year Spanish students are learning to use direct object pronouns and are forming commands.

The second year Spanish stu dents are learning to use infinitives after prepositions and the conjugation of irregular tense verbs.

The third year Spanish students are learning relative pronouns and are also reading poetry and studying the culture of the Spanish-speaking republics in the Caribbean Sea.

The French 1 Class continues to increase their basic vocabulary and are presently learning to use verbs in the past tense. French II students are learning the imperfect tense.

French III students have just competed a study of the French text Le petit prince by Antoine de St. Exupery. The are now reading

Candide by Voltaire.

French meal in the home-ec department on March 15 and 16. The menu for French I included horsd'oeuvres, salid nicoise, vichychoisse, quiche lorraine, and chocolate mousse. French II and III students prepared salad nicoise vichychoisse, with vinaigrette, quiche, and crepes. We will also be sampling authentic French bread, cheese, and mineral water.

All French students will have the opportunity to again experience French cuisine on April 7, when we plan to visit Cafe Johnell in Fort Wayne.

Science

The Biology I students have finally begun studying multi-cellular organism. They have made there way through the plant kingdom and have begun studying animals. This past week they completed their dissection of the earthworm. The specimens that they will dissect, in addition to the earthworm, are the clam, the fish (yellow perch), and the frog (grass frog). The dissection of each of the specimens centers around identifying the different organs and defining their functions.

The biology II students just completed a unit on genetics. In this unit, the students identified those factors that account for variation within the species (the chromosomes). They also studied the action of the chromosomes within the community. Included in this study were the factors that affect the action of a gene and the results of these types of action on the gene.

The anatomy and physiology students have just completed the chapters on digestion and metabolism. In these two chapters the students were able to examine the process of digestion and what

happens to the end products of digestion during metabolism.

Chemistry students have been working on different bonding theories and molecular structure. They are now concentrating on the basic elements of organic chemistry -studying carbon compounds, their name and similarities in structure.

The Science 9 classes are studying weather and factors affecting weather. They will learn to read a weather map and hopefully be able to understand the weather charts shown on the news.

English and Journalism

The Saga (yearbook) staff has continued to work very hard on the production of the '84 Saga. They have completed two deadlines, the cover and endsheets have been designed.

The Runic Review (newspaper) staff has just completed its 5th issue of the paper. The students working on upgrading the are quality of articles and design. They plan to send the March issue to Manchester College to be critiqued

The junior English students are now working on research papers. They have each written their own thesis, a statement they must now support with evidence. The process helps the students with their skills in writing, organization, and critical and analytical thinking.

English 9 students continue their weekly study of vocabulary and spelling. They have recently completed grammar units on subjecterb agreement and complements.

Upon return from spring break they will read two plays, Romeo and Juliet and West Side Story. in a comparative study. They will then have the opportunity to view the film Romeo and Juliet in class.

Mentone, Alabama first in series

The staff of the Akron-Ment NEWS recently sent letters to several towns around the United States named Akron, Mentone or Burket, with the hopes we could run an article or series of articles about those towns. To our delight, we've received several replies to our questionaire, and we will indeed run a series of articles over the next few weeks.

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Interestingly enough, we found only three other towns in the U.S. that go by the name of Mentone, and we discovered by the replies that all three towns were named Mrs. after Menton, France. Barbara Creager, Mentone, TX, wrote a letter and informed us she and her husband were leaving for Australia and had made arrangements to have dinner on May 5 with people in Mentone, Australia, which is located just outside Melbourne. She mentioned in her letter that the Australian Mentone was also named after Menton, France, and she promised she'd send information about the town upon their return.

Although we sent letters to six towns named Akron, we received only three replies. Both town only three replies. historian Dorothy Webster, Akron, NY, and Mrs. Richard Goshert, Akron, PA, very generously sent copies of books about their towns. Akron, NY celebrated their quas-quicentennial on July 3 - 6, 1974, while Akron, Pennsylvania celebrated their 75th anniversary in 1970. We thank you, ladies, and rest assured we will return your hooks!

We also received four replies from towns named Burkett or Burketville, though they weren't as successful as we may have hoped. Robert Broadstone, administrator of the Nebraska Veterans Home, wrote that the Burkett, Nebraska, is simply the name of their post office, having been named for U.S. Senator Elmer Burkett of Nebraska in 1927! The post office is located on the Grand Island Campus of the Nebraska Veterans Home. Thanks, Mr. Broadstone, for setting us

straight about that. Perhaps our favorite reply, however, was the short and sweet reply from Burkeville, Alabama. Our questionaire was returned with the simple reply, "No schools, no town government, post office was closed. I don't know how it got the name Burkville.'

Obviously that town's seen better days!

We mentioned in an article last week that Mentone, Alabama had requested our Mentone to become their sister city for their upcoming centennial celebrations (lasting the entire year of 1984), so we feel it's right that Mentone have the honor of being our first featured town.

Charles White McGehee, Box 437, Mentone, Alabama 35984, is editor of a monthly publication in Mentone named The Groundhog. [The Groundhog is a lengthy, newspaper-like newsletter of the Mentone Area Preservation Association.) McGehee is coordinating the "sister city" movement with Wayne Tombaugh, and he wrote a long reply to our questionaire.

Population of Mentone McGehee writes, is about 450, with 'the voting list smaller, the number of mailboxes, town and rural. about 650. There is only one school, Moon Lake Elementary. High School students go down to Valley Head."

Mentone has a mayor and five councilmen, with a full-time policeman and a volunteer fire department and rescue squad. Though the town is small, there are eight churches.

The town was founded in 1884. and McGehee reports there was a real surge of activity in the area in the gay nineties. Mentone was established as a resort area for people from New Orleans, Atlanta and Birmingham, because of its cooler, mountainous climate. Mineral springs near one of the oldest buildings, the Mentone Springs Hotel, were said to have had healing qualities which also attracted visitors.

Visitors still invade the area during the summer, as there are several camps and three charming inns. During the winter, visitors come to use the Cloudmont Ski the southernmost ski run in Run, the U.S.

Again, though the population is small, there are four annual festivals, each of which will be a focal point of their centennial celebration The spring fest is the Rhododendron Festival, which features the crowning of a local queen. clogging and the big Classic Run from the Hitching Post to the Falls and back. In the summer, a crafts

about towns around the United States named Akron, Mentone or Burket.]

Akron, New York In reading through the 1974 Ouasquicentennial booklet of Akron, New York, one is struck on how very proud its citizenry is of the small Erie county town.

According to village historian Dorothy Webster, Akron is a village of 2971 people located in the town of Newstead in western New York state. Newstead, including Akron, has a total population of 7231.

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Akron was founded in 1829 by Jonathan Russill and was named by the townspeople in 1931. They chose Akron because the village is situated on a high ledge overlooking the valley, and Akron is derived from the Greek "akros," meaning high. Akron was incor-porated in 1849, when the town was 20 years old. At that time, 94 families, and a total of 446 people, lived within the village according to the first village census. A major reason the people decided to in-corporate was the need to establish public services, such as fire protection, street maintenance and garbage removal.

After a public election, during which 72 yea votes were cast against only one nay vote, Akron officially became a town on September 19, 1849. A village board and mayor were elected at that time, and town affairs today are still governed by a board and mayor

Major businesses in Akron in clude the Whiting Roll-up Door Co., developer of the first roll-up door in 1953, Perry's Ice Cream Co., a family-owned business started in 1918, the Ford Gum and Machine Co. (remember the 1 cent Ford vending machines?), and AAkron Rule Corp., which manufactures rulers.

Mentone, California

By a strange coincidence, Men-tone, California and Mentone, Indiana have an unusual similar interest other than their name: both towns are financially tied chickens.

Mentone. Indiana, as we all know, is known as the "Egg Basket of the Midwest" and many local people are employed in the egg business. Mentone, California, on the other hand, isn't so much interested in the egg as it is the chicken, as there are several large

poultry plants involved in raising and breeding of the birds.

Which came first, the chicken or the egg, Mentone, California or Mentone, Indiana? We aren't sure. Our Mentone was founded in 1882. but according to former news paperman Harold Reynolds (pub-lisher of California's The Mentone News from 1939 to 1944). Mentone, California was simply founded in the late 1800s.

The town of 4500 has no governing body, but is managed by its active Chamber of Commerce. The official governing body is the San Bernardino Board of Supervisors (similar to our County Commissioners).

Mentone is a picturesque spot located at the eastern edge of the famous San Bernardino Valley. approximately 66 miles east of Los Angeles, 42 miles north of Palm Springs resort, 34 miles south of Lake Arrowhead and 13 miles of the San Bernardino Mountains. A pamphlet issued by the Menchamber of Commerce touts Mentone as being within easy distance of mountain, beach and desert places of interest.

Mentone has never been incorporated. While they have a large elementary school, it is part of the Redlands Unified School District. (Redlands is three miles away and is the navel orange capital of the world.) Although poultry is a major industry, growing citrus fruits is the chief industry, followed by poultry raising and then followed by berry raising. Mentone is the home of the Boysenberry. Precautions for **Partial Dentures**

A partial denture is a removable appliance that substitutes for one or several missing natural teeth. It is held in place by clasps that grip the natural teeth adjacent to the

partial. Good oral hygiene habits are particularly important vearers of partial dentures. If food residue and film are allowed to accumulate on clasps (which are food traps) the important abutment teeth many decay. Therefore, partials should be cleaned after each meal and special attention should be given to clean the inside of the clasps

While you're at it, clean your regular teeth to remove any food debris that could accumulate under the cover afforded by the partial denture

If a partial denture breaks or becomes damaged in any way. it should be taken at once to repair the dentist for Attempts to wear a damaged appliance can be dangerous. A shift of a fraction of a millimeter in the form of the partial can cause destructive forces on several teeth. Also, an im-proper amateur adjustment could possibly render the partial completely useless and irrepairable by anyone

Phil See, Bill Leininger resign coaching positions Valley takes steps toward feasibility study

With newly appointed member Joseph Crill representing Newcastle township, the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation board once again had a full panel at last Monday's meeting. On the recommendation of Sup

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erintendent Baxter Paige, board president Richard Long and trustees Fred McSherry, Cecil Miller, Jim Royer and Crill unanimously voted to accept the State's recent "Prime Time Legislation" and to interview architects about the possibility of doing a feasibility study of the Akron school. Paige urged the board members to "make a commitment to find a solution and ways to accept the State's offer," although he admitted there was no simple way to implement the prime time Legislation as things stand now. Paige suggested there could be a number of ways to adjust classes to make room for additional teachers/ classes, including possibly chang-ing the location of some of the mobile units or possible busing. He warned trustees that if they accepted the Prime Time Legislation, however, "it will be with us for a long time," making it difficult to change direction later.

The feasibility study of the Akron school facility was also accepted at Paige's recommendation. He explained, "The board could start board with Akron first--the shouldn't bite off more than it can chew.

The trustees were unani agreeing the time was right to begin exploring options for a longterm solution to many of the problems faced by the corporation with its elementary and junior high schools

Trustees accepted the resignation of Bill Leininger, sixth grade teacher at Mentone, as the coach of the girls varsity basketball team. Leininger , 'ed personal reasons for wanting o resign his coaching duties, although he plans to remain at Mentone as a teacher.

Phil See's resignation offered no explanation other than that he'd had a few months to consider the job and he'd decided to resign as coach. He also plans to remain in the corporation as an instructor.

Paige informed the board mem that anyone interested in bers applying for either job could send letters to the office of the Superintendent, Mentone, with May 14 being the deadline for accepting applications.

Trustees granted permission to advertise for the sale of the building trades class house this June. An open house is scheduled for May 13, noon until 4 p.m. and May 14, 6 - 8 p.m. Sale of the home, which is located in Saner Addition, Akron, will be conducted at the June meeting of the board. Trustees approved and signed

contracts for 99 teachers. Three other teachers presently employed by the corporation do not currently

meet qualifications to be retained by the board, but Paige explained their positions will be kept open, giving them the opportunity meet necessary qualifications by summer's end.

After approving teacher contracts, trustees extended the contracts of principals John Hill, Mark skiles, Dan Kramer, Oliver Skiles, Dan Kramer, Journer England and Ron Leichty by one year each, until June 30, 1986. Although it was not on the agenda for the evening, trustees also voted to extend Paige's contract by two years, to June 30, 1987.

In other business: Board members approved a new North Central Indiana Agreement for a special education co-op with Bremen, Lakeland, Warsaw and Whitko. The five-school co-op currently operates a center in Warsaw, but the new agreement will help control financial arrangements each member school from major fluctuations.

Board members approved taking coverage from North American Life Insurance Co., Kokomo, for the \$10,000 additional life insurance clause for educators in accordance with the recently approved teacher's master contract. The new provision will give teachers \$20,000 life insurance policies with accidental death and dismemberment clauses, also,

Trustees accepted high school principal Hill's recommendations to change the drivers education

program. Beginning with this summer, students will have the option of taking driver's ed all year round a community education course (which will also open the course to adults who are already out of school). Instead of driving time for the course being restricted to three weeks of school-year, class-time driving, the driving requirements will now be met after regular classes and on weekends. Cost of the course will be \$100, which will cover teacher salaries, insurance, textbooks and car lease.

Other summer courses approved by the board members were speech and hearing courses, corporationwide: two sessions each of remedial math and reading at Men-tone; one session each of remedial

math and reading at Akron; and vocal and instrumental music for elementary students, grades K - 8. Summer recreation courses were also approved by the board. (See course listings on page 8.)

Trustees granted the Mentone Chamber of Commerce permission to use the TVHS gym for the NLC/TRC All-Star Basketball game on June 7 and the Mentone gym for Big Time Wrestling on June 9, both in conjunction with the 1984 Mentone Egg Festival.

Joe Mercer was approved as the Junior High track coach for Akron.

The next meeting of the board will be Monday, May 21 at 7:30 p.m. in the administration building.
