





Board orders street repair this spring

This directive will adversely affect a number of food stamp applicants and participants in Indiana. Food stamp households receiving township trustee assistance may have their benefits reduced or may become totally ineligible for the food stamp program.

The Indiana State Welfare Department, food stamp division, has contested the implementation of this direc-

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tive through all available administrative avenues. At this point in time, however, Indiana must either implement the directive or suffer federal fiscal sanctions.





Henry Twp. Trustee defends Trustee system

Recently a letter written by a local lady and Henry Township Trustee Jean Conner, Akron appeared in the South Bend Tribune in answer to attacks on the Trustee system in the state of Indiana.

The first letter attacking the system appeared in the Tribune's Michiana Point of View column on January 23rd and was written by Wendell W. Walsh, an attorney and member of the St. Joseph County Poor Relief Task Force.

Mr. Walsh's letter attacked the Trustee system in the state which includes a total of 1008 trustees, calling them "overseers of the poor", stating that the system had its roots in Elizabethan England in the 16th century, and making the statement that little has changed since that time. He wrote that "trustees remain, essentially, lords over the poor of their townships."

His statements about the weakness of the Poor Relief system, the costs of the system for running the 1008 offices, the comparisons between Poor Relif assistance distribution and the costs for the AFDC program were noted as being an estimated reduction by 40 percent if the program were to be transferred to the Department of Public Welfare.

Mr. Walsh also noted his belief that the inaccessability of the offices, the offices being poorly marked with no hours noted, and the fact that township trustees were not easily reached, and poorly trained for their jobs, prompted an answer to his letter from Mrs. Conner which appeared in the Tribune's Point of View column in answer.

Township trustees weed out greedy from the poor and needy

I too, have read with interest articles appearing in Michiana Point of View and Voice of the People dated Jan. 23 and Feb. I, and I'm wondering how these people would feel if they were sitting behind my desk. I sure do have questions for them and a lot of food for thought.

Much has been said about the poor and needy - but waht about the greedy? How many of you have been told an untruth? How many of you liked it? How did you react? How many of you know persons (especially the younger 20s-30s age bracket) on welfare living better than you? How many of you have questioned applicants with the smell of alcohol on their breath and a cigarette in their hand? Do you as taxpayers want to buy these items? Where is the money, coming from? Do you as taxpayers want to buy more groceries when some applicants are already receiving as much as \$300 a month in food stamps? Some eating better than you? Do you like them buying hamburger for a dog or dogs because dog food is a no-no as far as food stamps are concerned? Should they even be allowed to have dogs or cats while receiving food stamps? Do you like to see them driving a late model car and dressing better than your family? And before you get to irate at these questions, let me add that these have all been asked of me as a township trustee.

I've seen them eating in restaurants, getting their rent paid through HUD, utilities compensated through Project Safe, or Public Service Indiana Helping Hand, pre-natal and post-natal care for babies (formula, check-ups, shots, etc.) through WIC Programs, free lunches in our schools, trustees paying book rental, various churches donating clothing, food, utility bills and more I'll not go into. All with your tax money except churches. It seems like there is a program for everything. And if it's free, where is the incentive to work?

I have been chewed out in person, cussed over the phone, harassed at my home, even when entertaining guests (Yes, I have an outside office and it is marked and hours are posted). I have been stopped on the street or anywhere else I might appear, all from investigations finding applicants had falsified records we are required to keep. The average salary of a Fulton County trustee is \$2,400 per year and includes volunteer fire departments, parks, cemeteries, school board members, line fence disputes, dog claims, assessing of personal property, distributions of cheese, etc., in addition to Poor Relief claims, to name a few of our duties.

Yes, I knew what the job paid when I ran for the office and it is supposed to be part-time, but I find myself working every day and this includes a lot of weekends. I've been contacted as late as I0 p.m. and as early as 6 a.m., and I'm asking the writers if they would be so willing to have their private time invaded. We do have families and as in most cases they come first, no matter what, and I would guess all of the writers' families come first with them, which is as it should be. Is it any wonder that we have turned into skeptics?

Now, considering all of the above and the rest of Indiana's 1.007 trustees (assuming they have the same problems), how can 40 percent be saved by us as taxpayers by transferring Poor Relief over to the State Department of Public Welfare? I say it isn't so, and who of us in a farm setting wants to be taxed for all large cities? Indianapolis-Marion County had a \$6 million budget for poor relief in 1984 alone. This was reported in your Tribune not too long ago.) You will be paying through the pocketbook and have no say whatsoever as to how the money is spent. Locally you do and

can vote for your choice. Anytime the state or federal government steps in, it always costs the taxpayers. Think about it. We are called grass roots government, and who better than us who reside in the community can best keep tabs on the needs of our own citizens?

As to Wendell Walsh's comment in the Michiana Point of View, record keeping and reporting are mandated by the State Board of Accounts on forms they have prescribed and are subject to audit anytime they see fit, and all Poor Relief claims are on file in the auditor's office of each county and are open to taxpayers and may be viewed during regular business hours. Also, Mr. Walsh, we have to make and advertise our budget a year in advance in two newspapers and a public hearing is held-guess how many taxpayers show up? We are also required to publish in two newspapers our annual reportall receipts - and all disbursements and balances. Of the above two items we make six copies, two for newspapers, one for the auditor of the county, one for the State Board of Accounts, one for the advisory board and one for the trustees records (also open to local taxpayers). Now how much more public can you get?

Walsh further states that township trustees are elected, which everyone knows if they are registered voters, but he also says there is no guarantee that a trustee has any prior experience, training or education regarding working with the poor. By the same token, I say there is no guarantee that a person appointed by whomever would do any better. Do all of us need a college education to deal in a one-on-one situation? Common sense says no.

The documents most of us ask for are merely affirmation of separating the needy from the greedy as I have previously stated, and I would feel I was not protecting the taxpayer if I asked for less. I have a workfare program in our township yes, it is legal and mandated - and you would be surprised at the number of people you give applications to fill out (thoroughly and truthfully) and upon learning they have to work first, never appear again. In other words, give it to me on a silver platter. And these are able-bodied persons between 18 and 60. (My guidelines. The state's are 18 to 65.) And we do carry work/comp insurance as required by law.

In closing - I truly do help the poor and needy and have no guilty feelings about it; in fact, it makes me humble to be able to ease their burdens. But when people tell me an untruth and I investigate and confront them and they continue to tell an untruth, I cannot legally help them. This is so stated on all applications for assistance and they can be arrested for

My grandfather told me as a young girl that it only takes one rotten apple to spoil a whole barrel. This true more today than ever before and the spayers are fed up. There has to be a stopping place, and I say it should be now. Bigger does not necessarily make anything better and we as a small farming community will surely get lost in the shuffle. As for your taxes going down - forget it. So long as we have citizens who are out for all they can get - free - the bill will go higher. In the meantime, so long as I am trustee, I will continue to investigate each applicant thoroughly. If the truly needy feel abused, it's time for them to stand up against the greedy.

In the event the poor are denied assistance, they have a right to appeal to the county commissioners to overturn the trustee decision. Meanwhile, report to the proper officials, get involved, help us as trustees, the county welfare department or other agencies mentioned here previously, to weed out the greedy. This is the root of the problem and I know all Indiana taxpayers will thank you.



Letters to the Editor...

To The Citizens of Henry Township:

So many of you have asked for the facts and figures on the proposed issuance and sale of bonds for the Akron Carnegie Public Library in the amount of \$115,000 at not more than 10% interest per annum and not to exceed 15 years. Here they are as I know them. The net assessed valuation of Henry Township is \$12,092,530. Approximate ly 9 million in the Township and 3 million in Akron Town. That is a ratio of 3/4 (Twp) and ¼ (Akron Town) and almost all signatures on the petition for the sale of bonds are from the town which is leaving Township residents irate to say the least, since they will be paying the most in an increased tax rate.

If the payments were \$5,000 per year on the principal and interest of 10% over a period of 13 years you would be paying almost \$92,000 in interest alone. Add to this the original \$115,000 and you come up with a total of \$207,000 which seems a high price to pay for the original "free"

The Library budget for 1985 calls for an operating expense of .307 per \$100 assessement. If the addition is made the projected 14¢ for payment and interest on the bond and a conservative estimate of 10¢ additional for up-keep, utilities and additional equipment and insurance and other incidental expenses would make all taxpayers bill increase to .547é or an 80% increase over present taxes and ther after bonds are paid off you would still have a 30% increase in taxes for operating expenses.

At the present time the Akron Library is the most expensive to operate Fulton County. Kewanna Library operates on 24¢ and Fulton County Library is operating on .212é. With 2613 residents in Henry Township according to the 1982 Census we don't need another added tax burden.

The Fulton County Library served all of Fulton County with the exception of Union and Henry Townships for years and total space was not much different than what we already have - so for 2613 residents why do we need

Of vital interest to your readers in the Akron community affected and concerned with health, education, and general welfare, the failure of a major drainage system has reached the critical point. This drainage identified as Bucher Ditch, Arm 3, commonly known as the "High School Ditch" is an over-fifty year old title, the only drainage of the school system in Akron, running westwardly across our 'Possum Hollow' through Marie and Lamoin Hand farm into the big open Bucher Ditch, has broken

Not only does this public ditch serve the high school, but is the principal drainage of the land through the area it runs. In the last breakdown, apparently west of the town's sewage lagoon road, the water has backed up at the southeast corner of the lagoon into a five acre lake, with 2' of water measured on the only road into the lagoon at the last heavy rain fall. Should additional breakdown in the ditch take place or should the only presssure sewage line running from the town's sewage lift station down by State Road 14 north to the lagoon, which is under water most of the time, get in trouble, it could interrupt the sewage disposal, necessitating the State Health Department, along with the city, to take quick emergency action. Should such a failure also disrupt the school drainage, the same kind of action could result in a costly emergency move by an outside agency which would cost much, much more than a repair in the county commissioners are now considering and who are awaiting a petition now being circulated to the major landowners affected requesting a prompt public hearing on the matter. This public drainage system was set up several years ago with those having land or property drainage into the ditch paying a yearly ditch maintenance fund which accumulates. Small repairs can be made without a petition or public hearing, but larger repairs must legally through the petition and

hearing process. Those concerned in the matter should drive back and take a look at this water build-up and if additional information is desired, phone the County Surveyor, Mr. Bob Daake, or Everett Smith, president of the Fulton County Commissioners, both of whom are familiar in detail with this drainage break-



IF THE POWER GOES OFF, WHAT SHOULD YOU DO?

Americans'enjoy the most dependable electric service in the world. Power failures don't happen often...and they usually don't last long.

But major windstorms and tornadoes can knock our power lines and cause extended outages. The U.S. Weather Bureau says that more tornadoes in Indiana occur in April than any other month. Since PSI operates more than 25,000 miles of power lines, outages can happen.

If your power should go off, this is what to do:

- Check to see if your neighbor's power is off, too. If they have lights and you don't, check to see if any of your fuses has blown or a circuit breaker has tripped.
- If power is off in your entire neighborhood, call your utility at the phone number listed in your directory. Report the outage and give specific information about your location or address.
- Turn off the TV and other appliances until power is restored. Keep your freezer and refrigerator closed as much as possible. (Food in a freezer will keep for at least 24 hours without power.)

A safety tip for everyone: Stay away from a downed power line. Report it to your utility or to the local police or shertly if possible, warn others to keep clear until help arrives.







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Indiana celebrates libraries during National Library Week April 14-20

"Libraries...for a Nation of Readers" is the theme for Indiana's 1985 observance of National Library Week, April 14 - 20, sponsored by the Indiana Library and Library Trustee Association (ILA/ ILTA).

All 239 public libraries in the state, in addition to many schools and academic libraries, have been supplied with posters and theme-oriented materials and most are planning special events to mark the week-long celebration. Others may use the American Library Association (ALA) theme, "A Nation of Readers," or create local slogans. The Indiana poster features a bright red map of the state with the national library symbol inside.

"Libraries are the cornerstone of information dissemination in Indiana today," said ILA/ILTA Executive Director Joyce M. Martello. With our theme, 'Libraries...for a Nation of Readers,' we recognize those libraries for the tremendous public service they offer our citizens. Virtually every kind of information in every subject area is available at little or no cost to individuals. businesses, and organizations through libraries. This kind of service and information is not available anywhere else."

Among services and materials offered through Indiana libraries are access to major newspapers and corporate magazines, government publications, statistics, telephone directories, videotapes, cassettes, computers, posters and art prints, records, films, and programs on practical and recreational topics, in addition to books.

More than 31½ million items were circulated in 1983 to the 5.2 million Hoosiers living in library districts, an average of six items per persons. "Libraries are at the heart of our information society" said Martello, "and they are essential to lifeling learning and quality of life in our communities."

National Library Week was first celebrated in 1958 under direction of the National Book Committee, organized by the ALA and the American Book Publishers Council. Americans were urged to "Wake Up and Read!" and President Dwight D. Eisenhower issued a proclamation calling for the "fullest participation" by citizens. Subsequent themes also

focused on reading

The committee disbanded in 1974 but the celebration continued under direction of the ALA, who began to emphasize libraries and library services through their themes and graphics. Posters issued in recent years have included Miss Piggy, Yoda, Annie, and Snoopy, New for 1985 are posters featuring Bill Cosby, Bette Midler, Sting, and Mikhail Baryshnikov.

Many state associations produce their own library week materials and themes, and public libraries have the option of using these, the ALA materials, or those produced by independent companies. Most libraries mark this week with at least one special event, joining thousands of libraries across the country in recognition of the unique role played by all kinds of libraries.

Indiana Library Association, organized in 1891, includes more than 1,200 librarians and libraries II.TA, founded in 1901, includes trustees of public library boards.



Grants explained to Akron Town Board

Fieldman for the Indiana Department of Commerce, Frank Ryan attended the monthly meeting of the Akron Town Board last week to explain the state's grants for community improvement projects and answer questions about the availability of a grant for a building project.

Grants not available

Ryan explained to town board members Jack Miller, Jerry Hudson and Richard Drudge last Tuesday that his department could not help with a government grant to build a town hall, fire department and community center building combined since no HUD funds can be used for government offices. However, he explained, a CDBG grant could be used to build a fire station.

Ryan went on to explain to board members and several town patrons attending the meeting that he could work with the town to obtain a grant for an industrial park, working along with the county EDC to get matching funds.

President of the Board Jack Miller told those attending that he proposed setting up an economic development committee composed of one member of the town board, one member of the Chamber of Commerce, a banker and two town's people. They will represent the town board in working with the Rochester City EDC, the Fulton County EDC, and Ryan.

Ryan outlined some steps for the board to take if they want to undertake a industrial park project; first setting up the committee then working along with the above mentioned committees to get matching funds.

Mr. Ryan noted that for litt industry, the minimum acreage would be between 22 to 30 dcres of land and said that there are many small industries who would be interested in locating in a small town, noting that he had helped locate Wen Products in Akron.

He said there are several different programs that would generate a sufficient amount of money to help get water, sewer and roads to different small industries - one at a time. He gave the board two different ways to go to get an industrial park started, the first being - one industry at a time - the other he said was a bold move and that was to go after a Community Improvement Program grant, either way, he noted, the town would have to come up with at least 30% of the cost, the grants only covering about 70% of the cost for these services.

Patron Fenimore told Ryan that the town has 20-22 acres to develop which would handle one or two small plants which is probably all that Akron could handle with it's water and sewer system.

Petition filed

A petition to vacate two streets and one alley in the Town of Akron was filed with the Town Board by Pike Lumber Company at the request of owners Howard and Helen Utter during the meeting.

The Utters and attorney Bob Peterson explained to the board the reason for this need to vacate and the legalities needed to do the vacating. Utter explained the reason for the request as the need to expand their production, putting in some manufacturing equipment which would mean an additional 25 employees added over the next twelve months. In order to do this, Pike Lumber needs clear title to the land so they can build.

The three parcels of land which is needed is on Main Street and Cedar Street and an alley all in the southeast part of the town, all of which is abutted by property already owned by Pike Lumber Co. Attorney Peterson said because of this, there should be no problem or question of the vacation of the Continued on page 5



The board set the date for the hearing on Tuesday, May 7 at the town offices. A legal advertisement for the hearing appears in this issue of **The News**.

Resignation

President Miller read to the people attending the meeting and other board members the resignation of Town Marshall James Spangle which will be effective May 2nd. Spangle gave his reason for leaving the department as personal. A motion to accept the resignation was made by Richard Drudge, and carried unanimously.

During other business:

**the board decided to have well No. 3 inspected by the Layne-Northern Co., of Mishawaka and get an estimate on the cost of repairs needed. It was noted that the cost of repair on the pump in well No. 4 at the park area was just completed by that same company at the cost of \$3,559.97.

**President Miller told everyone attending that water and sewage collections had reached the 61.6% mark as of March 20. The amount now in arrears is \$2399 as opposed to the total of \$6200 which was noted previously.

**Miller said there had been complaints about the burned out Akron Feed and Grain Co. Patron Bob Allen asked if the owner could not be requested to fence the premises to keep children off the property. A motion was passed by the board that they contact the owner and ask him to barricade the premises or clean it up.

**Patron Leon Kindig told board members he would not be available to do the mowing for the town in the park area or at the cemetery. The board decided to publish a notice for taking applications for the job, deciding that town employees would have time to mow the cemetery.

**board members discussed a proposal from Charles Miller for doing the testing of waste water and care of the sewer system. Miller offered to do the service for \$220 per month with a \$15 per hour call-in rate and charge of \$39 for the testing. The present employee is Val Duggins who works 25 hours each week for \$600 per month. President Miller noted that he had asked Charles to give a quote on 25 hours per week and he had not done this. The board made the decision to stay with Duggins at the time. A motion was made to this effect and passed unanimously.

**the board heard Mike Stephen ask permission to use the alleys in Akron to bury lines for cablevision. He said the cable is buried 18-24 inches deep and will not interrupt phone lines or water lines. Miller said they would check with their lawyer to see if Stephen could do this, as phone, electric and gas lines are public utilities and his is a private utility. He was told that he would have to get the consent of the property owners for easement along property lines.

**heard patron Howard VanScoy's concern about police protection since Marshall Spangle is resigning. President Miller told him the board was open to suggestion. VanScoy asked if the board had anyone in mind for the position and what procedure would be used to hire a Marshall. Miller said he had a lot of people comment that the board should hire one Marshall and a night watchman, then told VanScoy that the board would decide in executive session which route to take.

**heard Fire Chief George Stephen ask the board about painting the fire hydrants in town. Miller told him they had a program for this spring to reseal and repaint, but might have to have some help from the volunteer firemen on the painting. He noted that one hydrant would be replaced this summer.

Ask closure of alley

Terry Randall, owner of Viking Foods, approached the board to ask if they would consider closing the south end of the alley, between his place of business and the fire station because of the danger to pedestrians walking along the sidewalk. He noted several times the people had come close to being hit by three vehicles coming down the alley. He said that it is no longer wide enough for thru traffic and anyone driving down the alley is a danger to the children playing or walking in the area including pedestrians.

Miller said that perhaps the South end of the alley could be barricaded so thru traffic would not be permitted, but the town would have to go through the legal process to close that portion.

Randall also asked the board's help to solve a problem he has with the delivery trucks backing down the alley to his store, as they turn at the Walnut St. entrance is so narrow, they sometimes have to drive, or will back into the yards bordering the alley. Miller told him they would think on it and try to find a solution to the problem, maybe asking the property owners to sell a portion of their property along the alleyway to widen it.



National Consumers Week April 21 - April 27

EDITORS NOTE

As National Consumers Week is now being observed, I thought the following news release from the Attorney General's office in Indianapolis would be of interest to of our readers. You will find at the end of the article a phone number to call and an address you may write if you have any problems which their office may help you

Attorney General Linley Pearson said auto complaints replaced mail order and door to door sales as the number one problem Hoosiers had last year.

Pearson also reported the Consumer Protection Division negotiated or returned almost \$700,000 in refunds to Hoosiers in 1984.

The consumer division's preliminary figures for 1984 show that \$625,756 in mediated settlements for Hoosiers were negotiated by the division.

Another \$66,000 was collected through court judgments and consent decrees. with another \$161,000 in judgments pending collection.

Pearson said auto sales and service provided 16 percent of the 3,100 written complaints filed with the consumer division last year. More than 500 Hoosiers complained about new or used car sales or repairs on their

Mail Order problems provided more than 220 written complaints in 1984, while home improvement and remodeling and real estate problems also generated more than 200 complaints to

the office

Pearson said television and radio repair problems were fifth on the list with more than 150 complaints in 1984, with complaints about household appliances ranking sixth, vacation plans and travel agents were seventh. plumbing complaints brought the eighth highest number, heating and air conditioning complaints ranked ninth and furniture and magazine sales in a virtual tie for the tenth highest number of complaints in

The attorney general said there were more complaints in 1984 than in previous years on health spas, mobile homes, and recreational vehicles, probably due to more public awareness.

Pearson said the number of complaints on a traditional problem, door to door sales. dropped dramatically 1984, with only eight written complaints filed with the consumer division.

Pearson credited media coverage of problems associated with door to door sales, home repair and other areas with cutting down the number of problems and providing consumers more information on which to make a

Legislation allowing 72 hours to cancel agreements following an at-home sale also helped stop many prob-

The attorney general's office also dealt with a record number of complaints and filed charges against doctors, dentists, pharmanurses, cists, and chiropractors.

169 Doctors generated

complaints which were inves tigated by Pearson's office; dentists had 70 complaints lodged against them; 39 complaints were filed against registered and licensed practical nurses; optometrists and pharmacists had more than 35 complaints filed against them; psychologists 32 complaints in 1984; and chiropractors with 14 com-

Another profession which generated a high number of complaints were beauty culturusts (beauty operators) with 90 written complaints in 1984; auctioneers with 32; and hearing aid salesmen generated 23 complaints last

A new category last year, professional fundraisers, had 9 complaints filed. Pearson's office has already investigated a number of professional fundraisers this year, and with new legislation on disclosure and registration requiresments, more complaints are expected.

Pearson said consumers should make sure they keep copies of any contracts or documents prepared during the problem transaction and include copies of those documents when filing a written complaint with his office.




