Akron Bank Robbed!



Akron Exchange State Bank was looted last night by a gang of Chicago gunmen.

Four car loads of gangsters from the Windy City drove into Akron last night shortly after midnight and staged one of the most daring holdups ever dreamed of since the days of Jessie James.

The exact amount of the swag is not definitely known, but a conservative estimate places it at nearly \$375,000.

Armed to the teeth with sub-machine guns, bullet-proof vests, moth proof pants, tear gas bombs, and knives of all descriptions, the four car loads of gunmen strode boldly into town shooting out streetlights and taking a shot now and then at inquisitive citizens.

They cut all telephone wires leading out of town (this loss alone is valued at thousands of dollars by the Telephone company) held the telephone operator as hostage and set about their well laid plans of looting Akron's financial house.

While one crew of robbers went about their operations with the TNT at the bank vault, another group unloaded several bags of sand and threw up a fort in the center of Main Street from which point they stood guard over their partners in crime.

After the vaults were opened and the swag taken in large bags, the bandits leisurely loaded it into their cars and drove back to Chicago.

It will require the help of several hundred PWA workers to restore the bank building to its former glory and work will start as soon as the county administration is notified.

Hands Across America

Hands Across America has named J. Bradford Senden as state director for this event which will raise funds to combat hunger and homelessness in America. Senden is one of 16 state directors who are each responsible for a section of the human chain which will be formed coast-to-coast on May 25, 1986.

As Indiana state director, Senden must organize approximately 280 miles of the route. At 1320 people per

mile, 369,600 participants will be needed. A state office is being set up and staffed to recruit participants, coordinate volunteers and prepare the route.

Senden brings to the project the experience of his organizational work in state government and midwest politics. Senden was Administrative Assistant to the House Minority Leader and Director of the House Democratic Staff, Indiana, House

of Representatives, from 1979 to 1982. He was also Press Secretary for a U.S. Senate Campaign.

Senden is a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania and holds a Ph. D. in English

literature from Indiana University. He lives in Indianapolis with his wife Barbara and children Katherine Charlotte (age 9) and David Bradford (age 4).

National Library Week Noted

National Library Week was first celebrated in 1958 under direction of the National Book Committee which was organized by the ALA and the American Book Publishers Council. Americans were urged to "Wake Up and Read" and President Dwight D. Eisenhower issued a proclamation calling for "the fullest participation" by citizens.

Subsequent themes focused on reading with "Read - the fifth freedom" in 1963, "Be all that you can be - read" in 1968-69 and "Get ahead - read" in 1973. The committee disbanded in 1974 but the celebration has continued under direction of the ALA. This year's national theme is "Get a head start at the library."

National Library Week is part of an annual, continuing effort on behalf of libraries. The objective is to make the public more aware of the value of libraries and reading in our society, to strengthen support for all kinds of libraries, and to encourage library use.

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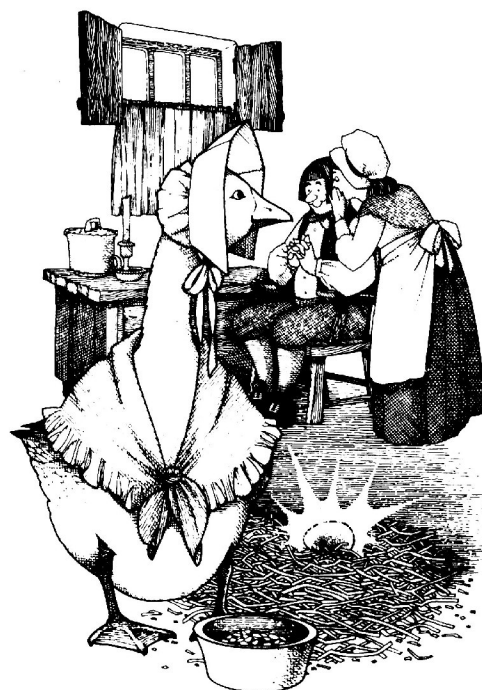

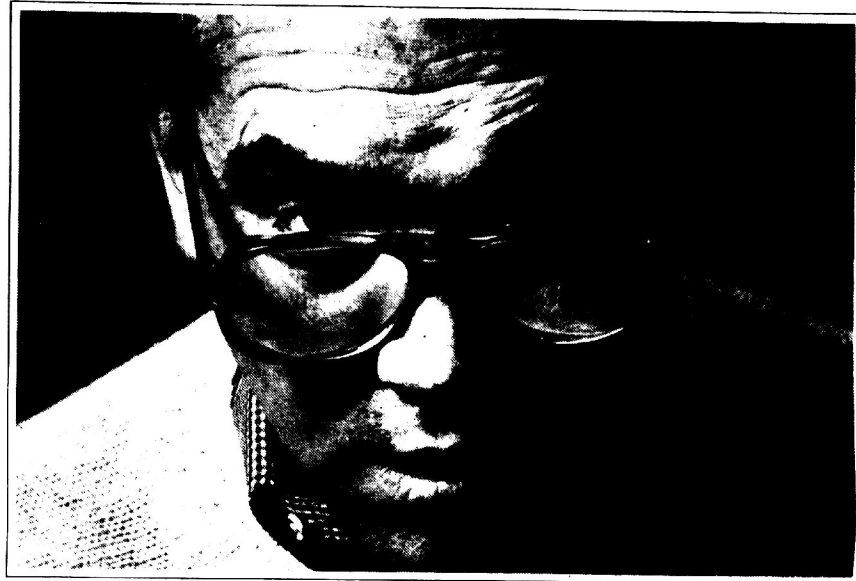

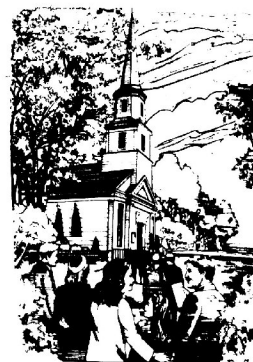

NEWS Century Home Award Given

The old Sand Hill Methodist Church, converted into a home by Jim Scott, is the latest recipient of the Century Home Award. This award is being offered to owners of 100 or more years old homes and buildings by the Fulton County Historical Society.

Built c. 1880, the church originally stood just north of the Tippecanoe River and was called Mount Nebo Church. In 1897 the church was moved to its present location on the west side of Old 31 four miles north of Rochester.

The building was taken apart by sections and was hauled up the then gravel Michigan Road by four horse wagons. On the land donated

by Mrs. Nancy Robbins the building was assembled in one day. The only changes made in the church were improved lighting and the addition of an entrance and bell tower. The back of the church burned and was cut off sometime after it was moved. The bell was stolen in about 1950.

The church closed Sept. 17,

1971, with the Rev. D. James Fitzhugh, the last pastor.

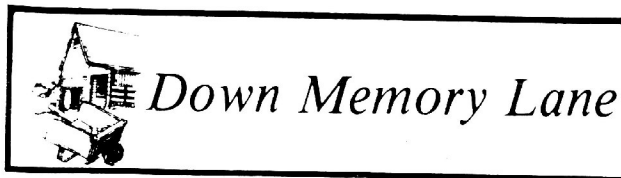

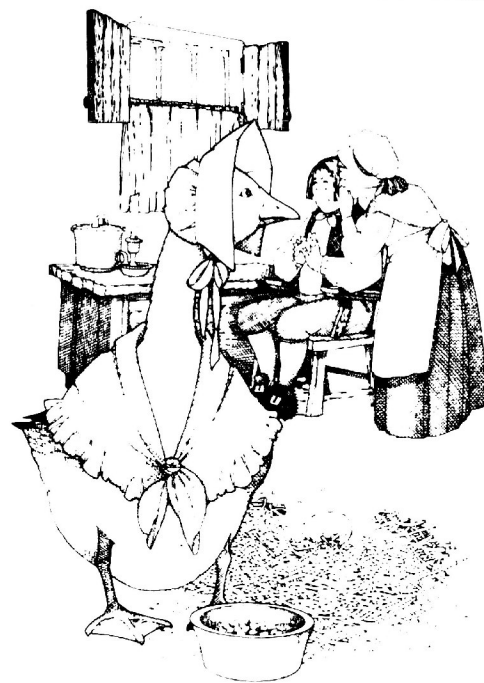

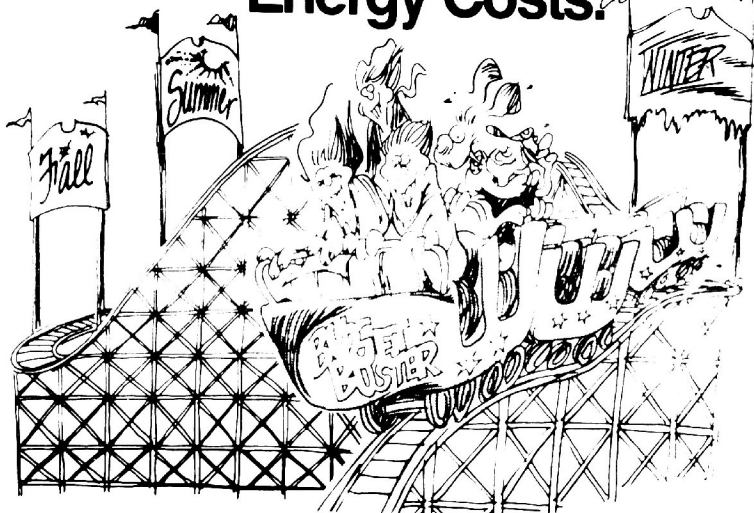

Postal Insurance

If you send merchandise or valued objects through the mail, you can buy postal insurance. The key is knowing the rules that apply.

While almost all packages and envelopes handled by the U.S. Postal Service reach their destination without incident, insurance is a safe and economical way to assure reimbursement in the event of accidental damage or loss.

Insurance is available up to \$500 for fourth-class parcel and book-rate mail, third-class business mail and for merchandise mailed at the Priority Mail or First-Class rates. For articles insured for more than \$25, a receipt of delivery is signed by the recipient and filed at the delivery post office.

The cost of insurance ranges from a minimum of 50¢ to a maximum of \$4.40. Express Mail is covered by limited insurance at no additional charges.

Send irreplaceable articles, regardless of value, and all items worth more than \$500 by Registered Mail for greater security. Do not over-insure your articles. Payment for a lost item is limited to the actual value of the item, less depreciation. Insurance does not cover the spoilage of perishable items. Sentimental value is not covered by postal insurance.

If a mailed article you insured has been lost or damaged, you need to pick up the claim forms at our post office where the procedures for filing claims will be explained to you.

Money orders offer another kind of insurance. The Postal Service encourages people not to send cash through the mail since cash cannot be insured. The safe answer is to purchase domestic money orders, available at all post offices in amounts up to \$700. If your money order is lost or stolen, present your customer receipt and it can be replaced.

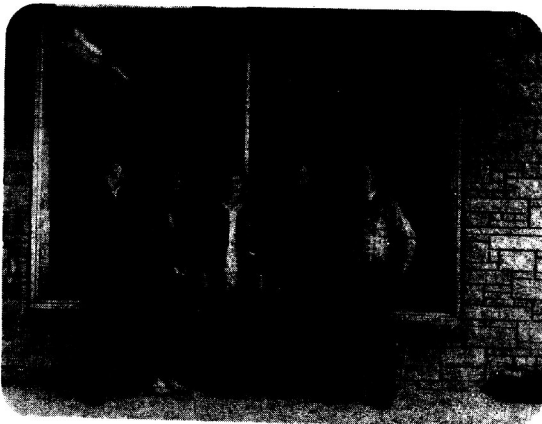

Add to fruit mixture.

Bake in 275 degrees oven for 2 1/2 hours, in what ever size pan you wish. When cool wrap and store. Can be frozen.

ESCALATING THE WAR AGAINST DRUGS

One in every ten Americans has tried cocaine. An estimated 2 million are drug-dependent—and that number is skyrocketing.

Increasingly concerned about drug problems throughout the world, Lions Clubs International has strengthened its long-standing opposition to the concept of "responsible use" of psychoactive substances. Psychoactive substances, including cocaine, marijuana and heroin, are those causing chemical action in the brain which affects feelings, reasoning or behavior.

The Lions recently adopted a resolution against the use of these substances, and the legalization or decriminalization of their use, possession, sale, trafficking or production, other than for authorized medical or scientific purposes.

While many believe such drugs do not lead to dependence, researchers say the first use of a drug is the first step towards compulsive use.

Other effects are becoming known. Cocaine use can lead to "compulsive" alcoholism, drug abuse, sexual abuse, and even homicide.

While many drug users believe themselves to be "functional users," that is, occasional users only, experts believe the term is a misnomer. Cocaine users, for instance, experience both increased tolerance, and withdrawal effects when they stop taking the drug. Both are signs of the compulsive user.

How can this problem be confronted? One way is through community education projects.

Drug education activities sponsored by Lions Clubs International include the "Skills for Adolescence" program, a classroom curriculum for 10-14 year olds. A joint venture with the Quest National Center, a curriculum development organization in Columbus, Ohio, the class involves teachers, students and parents. It helps young people develop the personal and social skills needed to cope with the temptations of drugs and alcohol.

As of September 1985, the Skills for Adolescence program will be available in 100 schools in Akron, Ohio.

Community education projects, such as the "Skills for Adolescence" program, are part of the long-term commitment of Lions Clubs International, the world's largest service club organization, to drug awareness.

Mentone survey explained

The first step toward accepting a sewage plan for Mentone was taken April 11 in a public hearing.

Board member, Miriam Boardman explained that after the board acquires a Municipal Compliance Plan, all residents would have their own onsite absorption system, and would therefore not have to pay a monthly sewage bill.

Some residents however, do not have sufficient area for the systems and thus will be required to unite in a clustered absorption field.

Anyone using the clustered absorption field will be required to help pay for it. No state funding is available.

To begin the procedures, all residents will be asked to answer a survey which will include the following questions: Size of your septic tank; Location of your tank; Number of bedrooms (a. people, b. bathrooms, c. washing machine, d. dishwasher); Water used per day; Age of septic tank; Type of septic tank; Do you have a gravity-fed septic absorption field system; Space

available for absorption field; Percolation rate is governed by type of soil; Soil drainage.

The town board requests that residents be able to answer these questions when approached. Kosciusko County Sanitarian Jan Cupp will be available to help out as much as time will allow.

Volunteers with the live-

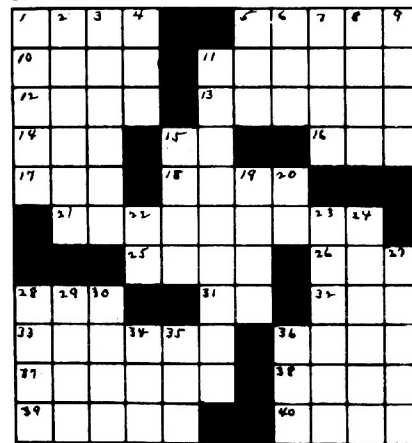
stock program committees organize and conduct workshops on a county basis for 4-H members and parents as well as provide primary organization for the livestock shows during the County Fair.

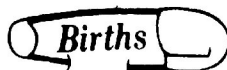

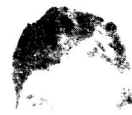

The Summer Youth Employment Services program is federally funded. The Employment and Training Consortium administers the program for the North Central Indiana Private Industry Council. The Youth Employment Services Program (YES) will operate in Cass, Fulton, Howard, Miami, Tipton and Wabash counties and will consist of work experience and career education programs.

In addition to earning money during the summer, participants will strive to develop good work habits, learn about vocational and occupational options, and experience the satisfaction of getting and keeping a job. Career training materials will focus on job seeking and keeping skills, choosing and relating high school curriculum to careers and money management.

The summer Youth Employment Program will serve youth aged 16 through 21. Jobs for youth ages 16-21 will begin June 9th and end August 15, 1986. All youth

must attend several days of orientation before beginning the summer jobs.

To begin work June 9, persons interested must complete an application during May. Applications will be taken by appointment only at the Youth Employment Services office located at 100 West 9th Street, Room 202. All interested persons are encouraged to call the office between 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. to make an appointment. The Youth Employment Services phone number is 223-8542. Applications will be taken from May 5 through May 29.

A limited number of jobs are available so early application may be helpful in being placed in a job. Eligible individuals will be chosen for specific jobs based on job skills and location of job site.

To qualify for participation in the program, a youth must be 16-21 years of age, qualify according to economic guidelines, have a social security number, and if under 17, have a work permit. All applicants aged 16-18 and those over 18 who are currently being supported by their parents or a guardian must be accompanied by a parent or guardian at the

time of application.

In addition, every applicant must have his, her own social security card or proof of their number, proof of age, all family member's social security numbers, provide proof of all family member's income for the past six months, and be a resident of the county in which they are applying.

Koala Center to open residential cocaine program

As the cocaine menace spreads across the nation, at least one alcoholism and drug abuse treatment center in Indiana is trying to do something about it.

Koala Center, Plymouth, Indiana, which opened in 1985, will begin the first residential cocaine program in the state on June 2, according to Tom Hagan, executive director.

The center, at 1800 North Oak Road, Plymouth, will add staff and will provide special training for the present staffers who will be involved in the new, eight-bed treatment unit. Koala's Plymouth facility now has a total of 80 beds for alcoholics and drug addicts.

Cardwell C. Nuckols, president of Training and Evaluation Consultants, Oak Forest, Ill., will be consultant for the cocaine program,

Hagan said. Patients are expected from the Chicago area, northern Indiana and southern Michigan, he added.

Nuckols is recognized as an authority on cocaine and treating cocaine addiction.

On May 7, the series will be offered in South Bend in Century Center at 1:30 p.m. by invitation and again at 7 p.m. for the public. A third session is slated for May 16 in Harvey (Ill.) Holiday Inn South at 1 p.m. by invitation and at 7 p.m. for the public.

Trout fishing to open

All trout to be released are rainbow trout, averaging 9 1/2 to 10 inches in length. DNR fisheries biologists expect that more than half of the newly stocked trout will be caught by anglers during the first week of the season.

Residents of Indiana age

17 through 64 (non-residents age 17 and older) are required to possess a valid Indiana fishing license and a \$5 trout-salmon stamp to fish for trout or salmon. The daily catch limit is 10, and the minimum size limit is 7 inches. Trout fishing is permitted from the last Saturday in April through December 31 in streams and year-round in lakes.

Area waters that will be stocked in 1986 include the Sechrist and Wyland Lakes in Kosciusko County and Mill Creek in Fulton County.

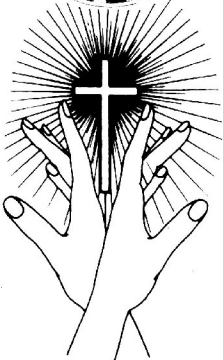

The Tippecanoe Valley School Board meeting had to be moved to the high school lecture room Monday, April 21, because of the number of patrons who were there to protest Tippecanoe Valley High School Principal John Hill's request to terminate tenure teacher Forrest Kantner. The board members were presented with a petition with more than 400 signatures from residents in the school district to keep the high school teacher.

Board president John Mellott reminded the audience that no hearing date had been established and that by law a certain timetable would have to be met. Board members said they did not know what would happen next, only that they had until the end of May for final action.

Attorney Lee Bazini reported that \$3,904,755 was approved and available in bonds for the corporation building plans. Bazini reported the bonds were secured at 7.875%. The board had to adopt an amendment to a resolution passed in 1981 setting the bond issuance at \$9 million. The school board found they could raise enough money in the cumu-

lative building fund to cover Mentone and Burket projects with only the Akron project needing bonds.

*An additional appropriation of \$20,000 for the CBF was approved by the board to repave the high school parking lot.

*The ABE (Adult Basic Education) program was extended to the 86-87 year with a 50% increase in enrollment.

*A set of Thomas Registry reference books was donated by Tyler Machinery Co. and the Tippecanoe Valley Kiwanis Clubs donated checks in the amounts of \$800 and \$200 for purchase of library books, health

charts and an "I Can" curriculum kit.

*A GED certificate for Theda Mae Stein was signed by board members.

Butcher speaks to A.A.R.P.

Views On Dental Health

CALORIES AND CAVITIES

A recent study has shown that Americans are consuming just as much sugar today as they were 10 years ago, and even more corn sweeteners, a common ingredient of packaged foods.

In fact, each year Americans consume the average person's weight in table sugars and corn sweeteners, about 129 pounds' worth. These are called "empty calories" because they contain essentially no nutrients.

What is all this sugar doing to their dental health? The same thing it did to the Dutch 300 years ago. Many of the paintings of Dutch painter Rembrandt show people with decayed or missing teeth, or no teeth at all. This was in the 17th century when the Dutch were bringing back large quantities of sugar from the New World. By 1661 Amsterdam had 60 sugar refineries and had become the "carbohydrate capital" of Europe. Before then, cavities and missing teeth were much less common and so was the use of sugar.

Good dental care today, with regular checkups, can help prevent loss of teeth. It also calls for moderation in sugar in-take to help keep cavities to a minimum.

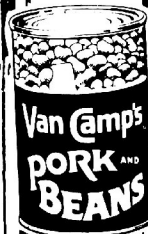

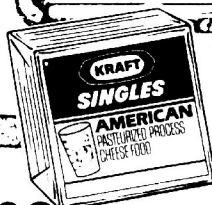

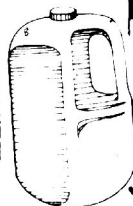

59 BUSINESS MEN ATTEND BANQUET

Fifty-nine business men, interested in the welfare of Akron and its future development, attended the dinner sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce last Friday evening.

The Hotel Akron dining room was filled with guests, and two tables were arranged in the lobby to accommodate the crowd.

Charles Irelan, president of the Chamber of Commerce, introduced Harold Heyde of Wabash, who donated the ground which is to be used for the development of a city park, and told of the work Frank Maford and Earl Leininger had done to help make the park possible.

Two officials of the Wabash office of the Northern Indiana Power company were introduced by Earl Bradway, local "trouble shooter" for the company. Jimmy Evans, district manager, was unable to attend because of illness.

Rev. J. F. Pfeiffer, the new Methodist pastor, was introduced by John Kreamer, and Charles Martin introduced his son, Dr. V. R. Martin.

The rest of the program was under the direction of Claude Billings, who, as a member of the board of directors, was "lead-off man" in a series of attendance meetings to be held every two weeks for the remainder of the year.

Frank Stephens, principal of the Akron High School, made some interesting remarks concerning the school work being done here.

H. R. Overdorf, manager of the Akron Canning Company, presented facts concerning the average income per acre on tomatoes as compared with other crops. The farmer's average income for fall for tomatoes was \$59.23 per acre. In order to receive the same income for oats, he would have to get a yield of 185 bushels per acre, and wheat would have to bring \$9 plus bushels per acre. One hundred forty-eight bushels of corn per acre would be necessary, at today's market prices, in order to bring the farmer his \$59.23 income per acre.

Rev. I. R. Godwin, president of the Town Board, spoke appropriately on the desirability of Akron as a permanent residence. He thanked Mr. Heyde for his gift of land to the town, and told of plans being made to make use of the ground.

The climax of the program was a tour of the American Fork and Hoe company, supervised by plant officials who attended the dinner. Many of the men present learned for the first time and at first hand the extent to which the local plant has expanded, and the large scope of operations which it covers.

Several of the guests then returned to the lobby of the hotel where Earl Troutman showed several reels of film some in color taken at local points. Scenes of a recent chamber of commerce dinner, a dance, sports, etc., and high school sports were shown. The film was very interesting and was enjoyed by all present.

NEW PASSENGER TRAIN FOR ERIE R. R. PATRONS

Cleveland, Ohio, May 4. Erie Railroad will inaugurate a new passenger train to supplement its present fast service between New York and Chicago, C. C. Howard, Passenger Traffic Manager, for the Erie announced here today.

The new train which will be made up of modern air-conditioned equipment including sleepers, lounge cars, diners and coaches will be a westward extension of the railroad's present "Lake Cities Express" which now serves the territory between the Erie's New York terminal at Jersey City, N. Y., and the Great Lakes City of Cleveland and Buffalo. The junction point will be at Salamanca, N. Y. The extension will provide an additional service through Northwestern Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois to and from Chicago.

The announced schedule for the new train, which will be a companion service with that now afforded by the Erie Limited and the Pacific Express, call for a departure from Chicago at 9:00 A. M., daily, arriving in Jersey City at 7:45 A. M. the following day - approximately twenty-two hours. Westbound, the train will leave Jersey City at 8:00 P. M. Standard Time, arriving Chicago at 5:20 P. M. the next afternoon.

This new train, Mr. Howard said, has been instituted primarily to take care of the heavy travel to and from New York and an account of the World's Fair, as well as to provide an additional service to the many large centers of population along its right of way. Among the cities which will be specially benefited by the new train are the following: Chicago and Rockford, Illinois; Hammond, Rochester, Huntington, Indiana; Marion, Galion, Mansfield, Ashland, Akron and Kinton, Ohio.

Absentee voting deadlines

The deadlines for voting absentee during this May's Primary Election are quickly approaching.

Ed Simcox, Secretary of State, has noted that voting in the primary is more important than most voters realize. The field of candidates will be narrowed and the outlook of the campaign will be determined. Absentee voting is the next best thing if voters cannot vote at their precinct on Election Day.

Those voters who are unable to vote on election day due to confinement by injury or illness must request applications for absentee voter ballots from the office of the clerk of the circuit court, according to Simcox. These ballots must be voted before an absentee voter's board at the voter's place of confinement.

April 28 is the first day that confined voters can vote their ballots before the board. The last day they can apply to vote absentee is May 3, and all of these ballots must be voted by May 5.

Those who wish to vote absentee because they will not be in their precinct on election day have different deadline dates.

May 1 is the deadline for mailed applications for absentee voter ballots for individuals desiring to vote by mail, Simcox said. The applications must be in the office of the county clerk by midnight on May 1.

Actual voted absentee ballots must be in the hands of the county election board by 6 p.m. on May 6. Primary

Election Day.

Any qualified elector who has reason to believe he will be absent on Election Day may make application and vote before the absent voter board in the office of the clerk of the circuit court until noon on May 5.

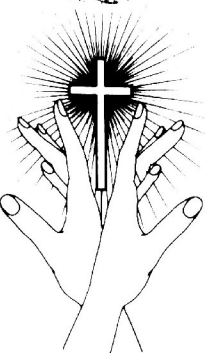

Union Station celebrates

More than 100,000 people jammed downtown Indianapolis on Saturday for the opening of Union Station, a 98-year old train station that underwent a \$50 million renovation.

"It's a new lease for life for the station and for the redevelopment of this part of downtown," said Indianapolis Mayor William Hudnut.

Built in 1888 on the site of the nation's oldest union station, the current station was completely renovated and now contains a hotel, several restaurants and many specialty shops, all with the nostalgic flair of an era when trains roared in and out of the area.

The renovation remained true to the original design of

the building and in most cases original furnishings or period pieces were used. The station was packed to capacity for a Friday gala and the Saturday public opening. The station still houses the Amtrak terminal, but one level of food services and the ground level of specialty shops now occupy space once taken by the trains and passengers. The hotel, also built around the original massive support beams, offers suites in restored Pullman cars.

Traffic at the station peaked in 1919 when more than 200 trains pulled beside the platform every day.

Clean Air Week Proclaimed

In 1984 U.S. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop, M.D., stated in his annual report on "The Health Consequences of Smoking" that cigarette smoke at typical levels of smoking and ventilation "can make a significant measurable contribution to the level of indoor air pollution." He also warned that children of smoking parents have an increased prevalence of reported respiratory symptoms and increased frequency of bronchitis and pneumonia early in life.

Passive smoke, also known as involuntary smoke, secondhand smoke, sidestream smoke or environ-

mental tobacco smoke, refers to tobacco smoke in the air which is inhaled by non-smokers. The American Lung Association will focus attention on its possible health effects and its acknowledged major contribution to indoor air pollution during Clean Air Week, April 28-May 4 according to the American Lung Association of Indiana.

The local lung association pointed out that a research scientist at the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has calculated that 500 to 5,000 deaths occur each year in the United States because of passive smoking.
