Akron resident helps save child

Robert Arnett, Rt. 2, Akron, and Robert Savage, Leiters Ford, have been credited for saving the life of a nineteen-month-old baby found floating in the Tippecanoe River. Isaac L. Hissong is believed to have been in the river 25 minutes. He fell into the river at approximately 10:30 a.m. Sundav.

Savage and Arnett were sitting at the kitchen in the Savage home at Tippecanoe Shores, when a young man drove up to the house to say he had seen the baby in the river.

Arnett dove into the river once Savage and he spotted the baby. Arnett brought the baby to dry land. Savage then performed the Heimlich maneuver and cardio-pulmonary resuscitation until an ambulance arrived.

Fulton County Emergency Medical personnel took the boy to Woodlawn Hospital, continuing CPR all the way. The baby was then rushed to St. Joseph Medical Center, South Band Isaac is the son of Vincent and Becky Hissong. He fell into the river while his father was working in the yard at their home along the Tippecanoe River near the old Indiana 17 bridge. The bridge is directly north of Delong in northwest Fulton County.

Other features to be unveiled at the dedication will be a large painting of Mr. Bell, done especially for the new library by Toni Sisti. It is reported this is the first painted portrait ever made of Mr. Bell. Twelve large pictures have been received by the school from Mr. Bell and each of them is a fine photograph or drawing of some of Bell's famous airplanes. They show planes that are known in every corner of the world. When all the present planned purchases are completed, there will be about 2,500 new books on the shelves of the new library. Lawrence D. Bell, president of the Bell Aircraft Corporation of Buffalo, New York, was born in Mentone, attended school here, and since leaving to engage in various phases of the aircraft business, has never lost contact with the town and his many friends here. Inspirted by the enthusiasm and accomplishments of the Mentone people while he was here as a special speaker for the dedication of the new high school gymnasium, Mr. Bell expressed his desire to do something more for the town. The grant for the new library is the result of that desire.

CAUSES OF TMJ SYNDROME

Many jaw problems are the result of a condition known as TMJ SYNDROME (temporomandibular joint syndrome). Symptoms include aches and pains in or near the joint (just in front of the ears). muscle spasms, headaches, stiff neck, and popping or clicking when opening and closing the mouth

What causes this problem? In most cases it is a combination of two factors: a bad bite and stress. The bad bite may be caused by a high filling, a twisted or tilted tooth, a missing tooth, an undererupted or overerupted tooth, or a poor arrangement of several or all teeth when you close them together

As the law deviates from a symmetrical arrangement, the muscles and ligaments on one side of the joint may be overly stretched, and they tend to compensate by contracting. A struggle is set up between the teeth and their desired closure position, and the ball-socket arrangement of the lower to upper jaw. This struggle may induce muscle spasm, leading to pain.



American Cancer Society is committed to informing women about the early detection methods for breast cancer because these methods literally save lives. Society's mendations are:

Monthly breast self exam starting at age 20 B. Physician exam of the breasts at 3-year intervals between the ages of 20 and

40, and annually thereafter.

C. A base-line mammogram between the ages of 35 and 40. followed mammogram every one or two years from age 40 to 49 with annual mammograms from age 50 on.

Drugs use boosts teen suicides

The recent wave of teen suicides has a direct suicides has connection to alcohol and drug abuse.

that's least considered opinion of Sgt. Jackie Ginther, Juvenile Narcotics Division, Indianapolis Police Department. Sgt. Ginther says with conviction, "Probably as many as 80 percent of the teen suicide attempts have alcohol or other drugs involvement.

"Parents sometimes, because of love, have a tendency to practice denial on their youngsters' use of alcohol and other drugs. Having to face suicide increases this denial. They nearly always want to call these suicides accidental."

A recent Marion County

suicide was drug-related. In this case, a teenager got on a drug called PCP after undergoing treatment and killed himself with a gun.

The Indiana Board of Health office. Indianapolis. reports eight suicides in the 10-14 age group for 1985 and 41 suicides for the 15-19 age group for the same year. Drugs probably played a large role in these.

While the recent teen suicides across the nation, as in New Jersey where four young people used carbon monoxide in a kind of pact, are not yet considered an epidemic, there are far too many to be treated as "accidents." One national report states that 400,000 teens tried suicide last year and 10,000 succeeded.

adolescents evaluated in a Virginia treatment center said they had tried to kill themselves at some point in their lives; this is approximately 10 times the expected rate of suicide attempts for nondrug-using teenagers.

Many drugs have depressant effect. Alcohol is one of these. And alcohol is still the drug of choice for young and old in the U.S. Depressant drugs magnify feelings of sadness loneliness, and isolation, at the same time blunting fear awareness consequences of actions.

··Other things remember, "Sgt. Ginther says. "include the fact that drugs other than alcohol work faster than alcohol and have longer-lasting effects. Lots of times, even if parents know there's a danger of suicide, there's nothing they can do. If their kids are using drugs, they need treatment outpatient, counseling, some kind of help.

"The use of drugs pushes the teenagers over the edge. Drug use reduces inhibitions, fuzzing the mind so that reality - the true consequences of suicide, for example - escapes the young person's grasp.

Indiana's Education Bill: Version 99

restored many of the provisions of Governor Orr's education bill. The bill has changed so many times even the officials are unsure of its total contents.

The senators have added some of their own ideas now a version listed as "Amendment No. 99" of the bill, originally a 31-point plan proposed by Gov. Orr and H. Dean Evans, state schools superintendent.

Because there have been so many changes, it seems worthwhile to state highlights of the bill as it now stands, even though it is sure to change again.

Highlights include:

Student accountability. It would mandate testing of children with the Indiana Statewide Testing for Educational Progress (ISTEP), to be given every spring. It's purpose is that children needing to upgrade mathematics or reading could be required to attend remedial programs in summer school or, with special permission,

be for grades 1, 2, 3, 6, 8, 9

Students who failed to meet standards after remedial classes would have to stay in the same grade during the following year unless the school promoted them to keep them with their age group. The state would not count such "social promotion" students in its funding distribution.

*Require at least 175 teaching days, as does present law.

*School accountability. This would include accreditation of school systems, which would be categorized either as accredited, probationary or non-accredited. For a school corporation to be accredited, all the schools within it would have to meet accreditation status.

The state would review schools at least every five years. Probationary schools or corporations that failed to progress or achieve accreditation within three years would be reported to the

FIXED BRIDGE TO THE RESCUE

If you have one or more missing teeth creating gaps that should be filled, you may want to consider the fixed bridge.

Missing teeth can do more than affect the shape of your face They can also throw your other teeth out of alignment and cause other serious dental problems. If you choose a fixed bridge to solve the problem, you'll have "new" leeth that will be permanently fixed in your mouth. You won't have to take them out to clean them. They can be brushed the same way your natural teeth are and floss ed (with a little dextenty from the underside) to remove bacteria and tood particles.

Before your dentist makes a fixed bridge, he li check the health of the adjacent or supporting teeth. They have to be strong and healthy with enough underlying bone structure to support the denture. Then he is make crowns for the supporting teeth to make them even stronger. As a final step, the dentist will solder the frowns to the replacement teeth (called puntics) and cement the

McCormick's Creek. Versailles, Shakamak and Spring Mill state parks; Brookville. Hardy and Cecil M. Harden (Raccoon S.R.A.) reservoirs; Deam Lake and Wyandotte Woods state recreation areas. Brown County and Potato Creek state parks have reservation campsites available through Nov. 1 and Turkey Run State Park has reservation campsites available from May through Oct. 18. Cecil M. Harden Lake (Raccoon S.R.A.) also has reservation campsites available during the Covered Bridge Festival in Rockville, Oct. 9-18.

Campers may reserve a campsite for a maximum of 14 consecutive days. During the summer, Friday and Saturday nights must be included for weekend reservations. For the summer holiday weekends, the following dates must be reserved. May 22, 23 and 24 for Memorial Day, July 2, 3, and 4 for Fourth of July, and Sept. 4, 5 and 6 for Labor

All reservations will be confirmed by return mail. Phone reservations will not be accepted. Walk-in reservations are accepted at each property on Mondays through Fridays.

The following information is needed to process all reservations for campsites on state properties:

(1) Name, address and phone number. (2) dates of arrival and departure. (3) of campsites Number reserved (four campsites or less per request). Each campsite must be registered under a different name and include the address of the person using the campsite. All campsites must be reserved for the same dates. 



Tornado season: always be prepared

Several years may pass, at times without a tornado threat to Fulton County. This results in public complacency, and consequently, a tornado may strike and catch us off guard. Civil Defense Director, Dean Smith, warns that we must not let this happen. We must be prepared - lives are too valuable. Tornadoes are most likely to occur in mid-afternoon, generally between the hours of 3:00 - 7:00 p.m. However, they can occur at any time. day or night. During tornado season, normally from March to July, you may hear warning sirens sounding during stormy weather. This has only one meaning - take shelter, a tornado has been sighted in Fulton County. It does not mean to run outside to see what is happening as there may not be time. Take shelter immediately and listen to your local broadcasting station who can keep you informed on what is happening. When a tornado threatens, immediate action can save lives. Stay away from windows, doors, outside walls and protect your head. In homes or other small buildings, go to a basement or a place in the middle of the house such as a

under something sturdy. In school, be calm and follow the directions of your teacher. In shopping centers or large buildings, look for a predesignated shelter. Share your knowledge with those around you. Direct coworkers, companions, and shoppers to safe shelter if they appear con-

cars - leave them and find shelter in a building. If none is available, lie flat in the nearest ditch or other low area and shield your head with your hands. If a tornado should strike, it is most important to remain calm. Most tornadoes are shortlived, lasting only 4-5 minutes.

Quayle offered Senate Resolution 181 on the Senate floor late Tuesday morning. and the measure, which was co-sponsored by U.S. Senator Richard G. Lugar (R-IN), was approved by unanimous consent.

Following the adoption of resolution honoring Indiana University, Quayle also introduced a resolution to correct definitions of "Hoosier" that appear in Webster's Third New International Dictionary. While that measure still awaits Senate action, Quayle plans to pursue the issue with the dictionary's publisher.

In calling up his resolution honoring IU's basketball team and coach Bobby Quayle, who received his law degree from the Indiana University School of Law, joyfully -- and praised the punfully Hoosiers, who defeated the Syracuse Orangemen in the 1987 NCAA championship game in New Orleans Monday night by a score of

I'd like to take just a few moments of the Senate's time to congratulate Indiana University for winning the NCAA basketball title last night. It's quite an achievement, and I'm especially proud to call myself a Hoosier today.

Those of us privileged to call ourselves Hoosiers have never quite agreed on what a Hoosier is, but there is something we all agree on back in my home State.

The Hoosier State means basketball at its best, and IU proved that yet again last night when it won the NCAA title a third time under Bobby Knight.

I also have a few words to say about some of Indiana's players, who worked so long and hard to reach college basketball's summit.

First, I was never a doubting THOMAS about IU's prospects. Their victory was hardly a CALLOWAY to win a national championship.

Indiana wasn't MEIERed in confusion -- they were poised and experienced on the court. Any FREEMAN in this great country of ours could see that

While I will admit to a slight bias - Lwas ALFOR(D) Indiana throughout the Final Four -- I firmly believed that Indiana was SMART and talented enough to GARRETT its formidable

Clearly, beating Syracuse was no MINOR feat. In fact. it was something a HILL

MAN on this side of the EYL can appreciate, an accomplishment of OLIPHANT-size proportions. But in the end, Indiana forged a victory that any blackSMITH would be proud of.

Sons and daughters of Hoosier farmers who go to IU quite often do so with a U.S. (S)LOAN or a Pell grant. But as anyone knows, you can't make a PELKOWSKI in Indiana. Basketball's the only game in my great State.

I know my own State of Indiana is proud of the Hoosiers today. It was a victory worthy of amateur athletics in this country.

The following is the text of Senate Resolution 181 as introduced by Quayle and unanimously approved by the Senate midday Tuesday:

WHEREAS, Indiana University has had an outstanding basketball program since basketball was introduced as a collegiate sport, and has had an exemplary program for its student athletes;

WHEREAS, the Senate applauds IU coach Bobby Knight for winning his third NCAA title, a feat matched only by two other coaches in college basketball history;

WHEREAS, the Senate pays tribute to all four teams --Indiana, Syracuse, Provi-dence and the University of Nevada, Las Vegas --who reached the Final Four in New Orleans;

WHEREAS, Indiana University's victory is much than just a single accomplishment. It is part of a long and glorious tradition of amateur college athletics

in this country.
NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Senate recognizes and congratulates Indiana University for its outstanding achievement in winning the 1987 NCAA basketball title.

Quayle offered his resolution correcting the defi-nitions of "Hoosier" published in Webster's Third New International Dictionary to rebut remarks made on the Senate floor Monday by U.S. Senator Alfonse M. D'Amato (R-NY), a graduate of Syracuse University.

According to Webster's D'Amato pointed out, as a noun, "Hoosier" means "an awkward, unhandy, or unskilled person; esp: an ignor-ant rustic." As a verb ant rustic." As a verb, D'Amato noted, "Hoosier" is a slang word that means "to loaf on or botch a job."

On the Senate floor Tuesday. Quayle countered D'Amato's jibes by introducing Senate Resolution

WHEREAS, Indiana University's basketball team displayed the real meaning of the word "Hoosier" last night:

THEREFORE, be it resolved that a Hoosier is someone who is quick, smart, resourceful, skillful, a winner, unique and brilliant.





Akron graduate back in the news

may remember when a little ten-year-old boy climbed onto the pipe organ bench at the Akron Methodist Church and continued the tradition of his mother, playing the church organ.

Evan Whallon lived in Akron as a boy with his parents in what is now the Kendall home on State Road 19 in Akron. His sister Jeanne was a member of the class of 1944 and his other sister Harriet was a 1953 graduate of AHS.

On March 27, 1987 an article appeared in the San Francisco Cronicle about the accomplishments of Evan Whallon. It was sent to Akron by Jeanne Noyer Ball who was amazed to see her hometown of Akron in that big newspaper. The article was written by Jon Carroll and it tells of Whallon's continued interest and love of music. The article is being reprinted in the NEWS for the classmates and friends of Evan Whallon and for those who just remember him as a fine musician.

FORTY YEARS LATER THE BAND STILL PLAYS Shanghai, China

It is, in its quiet way, an entirely satisfactory American success story. A kid from Akron, Ind., (population in the late 1920's: about 100 souls) shows musical ability early, starts conducting while still a teenager.

Career interrupted by war; resumes. Kid wins competition to become assistant conductor of the Philadelphia Orchestra under Eugene Ormandy. He later studies with George Szell - "A great conductor, a great pedagogue. That's how you learn music hands-on. You can't read about it; it would be like reading a book on how to swim.

takes He over Columbus Orchestra in 1956; it has 46 players and a budget of \$100,000. When he leaves, 26 years later, it has 90 players and a budget of \$3 million. Evan Whallon had done what conductors are supposed to do - he had built an orchestra.

But there are second acts in American lives. Whallon's wife died, too early, of cancer. His two sons grew up; Whallon grew restless. When the Western Opera Theater called, he answered. At 63, he has just spent five months living out of a suit-case and a Greyhound bus a troupe of singers one-third his age. His assistant conductor. Patrick Summers, also from a small town in Indiana, is 23. A tradition is continuing.

Evan Whallon has been to Shanghai before. Just after V-2 day he was on a mine-

Many of Akron's citizens sweeper anchored in the Huang Po River. It was Thanksgiving; everyone was given shore leave. Whallon wandered up and down the Bund, the waterfront promenade. He stopped at one hotel and listened to a small combo play Glenn Miller and Tommy Dorsey. Whallon found it moving and strange. these familiar, innocent tunes in the sad, immense poverty of post-war China.

Three years ago, Whallon heard through a friend that the combo (which had disbanded during the Cultural Revolution) was playing again. His first night in Shanghai he went down to the Peace Hotel to find out.

The bar at the Peace Hotel gave me a sense of "vuja de," the eerie feeling that I had never been anyplace like this before. Think of the Mabuhay Gardens only with different music and rowdy German tourists. Think of the lobby of the Sheraton Palace jammed with Chinese teenagers wearing black leather jackets and chain smoking pungent cigarets.

Think of the Venetian Room with brightly lit freezer cases full of Coca Cola along one wall, only smaller and smokier and dotted with scruffy French students trying to talk to elderly Chinese gentlemen in black suits.

Yeah, but it's weirder than that.

As we walked in, the six-man group was racing through "Chatanooga Choo-Choo." All the musicians were apparently ageless: they could have been 40 or 80. None except the drummer ever smiled; none except the bass player ever stood

But they were good. They played "Misty" and "As Time Goes By" and "Sweet

Georgia Brown." At the break, Whallon went up to the drummer.

"How long have you been playing here?

'Over six years.

"No, I saw you in 1945." The drummer smiled and ducked his head. "Yes, yes,

Evan Whallon returned to his seat and talked a bit about his task for the following day, when he would for the first time, take up his baton and lead a rehearsal of the Shanghai Opera Orchestra.

"Fascinating," he said, several times, looking as ageless as a Chinese





MISSING REAR TEETH

If all of the rear feeth in one side of your jaw are missing you may opt for a partial denture instead of a span of empty gum. Your dentist will have to rely on your front teeth for support in making such a partial denture. He'll also have to make maximum use of your gums and supporting bone to give the denture stability

Even though this kind of partial denture is not as stable as the kind that hooks onto or is permanently affixed to supporting teeth on both sides of a tooth void, it is certainly preferrable to the alternative of full dentures. The remaining natural teeth can continue to provide strength in chewing food and help maintain the shape of the

Without the help of supporting teeth in the rear to hold this type of partial denture in place, there is more pressure on gums and ridges. A certain amount of shrinkage is a natural occurrence. This means the partial denture will have to be adjusted from time to time This will probably include relining to compensate for changes in your gums to make it fit securely. But, it is certainly better for your health, your appearance, and eating to have teeth rather than un-

More Hoosier trivia

The recent news coverage of Senator Dan Quayle's resolution to change the meaning of the "Hoosier" in Web word Webster's dictionary prompted an investigation into how the "Hoosier" originated.

Hoosier is one of the oldest nicknames in this country and the debate over the origin and true meaning of the word has a very long history.

Among the more popular theories:

*When a visitor knocked on the door of a pioneer cabin in Indiana, the settler would respond "Who's yere." Why settlers in Indiana, and nowhere else, would respond in this fashion isn't clear.

*Because Indiana rivermen were so successful in trouncing, or "hushing," their adversaries in brawls. State's inhabitants became known as 'hushers.'

*A Kentucky contractor with the last name of "Hoosier" hired so many men from the State of Indiana that they were eventually referred to as 'Hoosier's men.'

*Former Indiana Governor Joseph Wright believed the word "hoosier" was derived from an Indian word for corn, 'hoosa.'

*James Whitcomb Riley facetiously explained that Indiana's early settlers were vicious fighters who bit off noses and ears in the frenzy of battle. Thus the phrase "whose ear" was often heard in taverns the morning after such fights.

Granted, the most likely origin of the word "hoosier" is the one put forth by Indiana historian Jacob Piatt Dunn, who traced the word "hoozer" from nineteenth

WHEREAS. The town of Akron is a part of a great municipal government, predating the formation of the State of Indiana: and


WHEREAS, The town of Akron has a proud history of providing our citizens with essential services; and







Spring progress

farmers had 71 percent of the land intended for spring planted crops tilled, 45 percent of which was tilled last fall. Soil conditions have been ideal for tilling and seeding thanks to dry weather this spring. Tilling progress is almost 3 weeks ahead of the normal rate of 57 percent. Oat seeding at 56 percent complete, was well ahead of the 40 percent for last year and average of 35 percent seeded. Winter wheat was rated fair to mostly good, up from the mostly fair rating last year. Wheat height averaged 4 inches same as last year and average. Indiana's apple and peach crop survived the winter in good condition but

freezing temperatures the first week of April may have caused damage. The extent of any freeze damage will not be known until later. Pastures are off to a slow start with the dry spring thus far.

School Board pinching pennies

Keeping a close eye on the money going out and the money coming in will be the objective of the Tippecanoe Valley School Board over the next few months to complete current projects as well as make needed repairs.

Construction costs for Burket and Mentone will be the first priority for the funds, but Superintendent Baxter Paige told the board the high school also needed a new roof.

During last week's board meeting. Paige presented an estimated breakdown of cumulative building funds (CBF) available as well as bills and costs that have to come from the fund

The CBF had a balance of \$1.178 million with an estimated \$1.113 million needed to complete the construction of the two elementary schools at the end of March.

Figuring \$305.702 to be received in taxes in June and again in December, and taking out a \$216,900 loan payment. Paige said there should be money left for the roofing project.

There will not be enough CBF money for the roofing project until after December taxes have been collected and the re-roofing should be

done this summer. One alternative would be to use the June taxes plus an advance on the December taxes of up to \$216,900 for a total of \$370,000, according to Superintendent Paige. However, he said he did not think this would cover the cost of the new roof.

Paige hopes the board can get back some of the money from the contingency fund in the building projects. To do that, expenses will have to be monitored. Presently, there is \$86,850 left in the contingency fund for the construction project. Contingency money is used for change orders and additional costs that were not initially expected in the project.

According to Paige, the money for the new roof either has to come out through the

While shopping this week I picked up a bag of apples and oranges and arranged them in a pretty bowl on the dessert? I have always put cakes and brownies within reach, why not fruits? Do you know how good fruit is in the evening when you haven't stuffed yourself with other foods? It's almost as if we

learn to appreciate food that is good for us.

A help when making substitutions is your calorie counter. Be sure and look up the calories before you eat some of the foods, you may be surprised. One of the hardest substitutions is for salty foods, a dill pickle or a few crackers seem to work well. Beware of too many crackers, they average 16 colories or sizes.

If you really want that something special, eat it and don't whip yourself for it. I still believe binging is a result of deprevation

Have you watched "thin" people eat? They have desserts too. I would bet they don't eat an over abundance of those foods all week long, they might even eat much the way we hope to eat, watching 90 percent of the time and splurg-ing once in a while. The only difference is...they know when to quit. We don't have to take something each time we pass through the kitchen nor do we have to eat until we are miserable. We have proven to ourselves we can eat one reasonable helping and in 20 minutes be content.





Three architects will be called in for interviews concerning the roof within the next week, with a decision on funding to be made after more accurate cost figures are gathered.

Equipment purchases amounting to \$14,482 at Burket and \$23,797 at Mentone were approved by the Board. These costs were figured in with the building costs to be paid from CBF. Equipment for the Akron school will cost \$69,484.27, to be paid by the holding corporation.

Additional changes in the building project, resulting in a cost of \$17,612, were approved by the board. Only \$805 is the school corporation's responsibility. The rest of the additions are at the Akron site at the holding corporation's expense.

Changes include:

Wait until May to fertilize lawns

Although most homeowners are conditioned to fertilizing their lawns in March or April, it is not recommended, says Jeff Kissick, Fulton County Agricultural Agent. There are with Paige that the roof several reasons why it is better for the turf to delay fertilization until mid to late May. The first reason is that turf will green up and grow well in the early spring due

to favorable weather conditions without the addition of fertilizer. If nitrogen containing fertilizer is applied in March or April it will stimulate leaf growth. Within the plant, leaf growth will always take priority over root growth. This means that excessive leaf growth occurs at the expense of the root system.

By waiting until mid to late

May to fertilize the natural flush of growth that occurs in the spring will have ceased so excessive growth will not occur after fertilization. A fertilizer with 50% or more of the nitrogen in a slow release form is recommended at this time. The slow release nitrogen will provide moderate, even growth throughout the summer. It would be best to use a

fertilizer with a 4-1-2 ratio of nutrients. The fertilizer should be applied to provide 1 pound of actual nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft. of turf.

The majority of the nitrogen applied to turf should be applied in the fall. September is the most important time to fertilize a Kentucky bluegrass, perennial ryegrass, fine fescue or tall fescue lawn.
