Touring preschool staff to test children



Indiana Census

The success of Indiana's upcoming 1990 census, the largest peacetime operation in our nation's history, depends on the response of Hoosier residents and thousands of behind-the-scenes census workers.

According to Perry Aberli, Indiana Regional Technician for the 1990 Census, the United States Department of Commerce and the Bureau of the Census sent census questionnaires to approximately 2,100,000 housing units in the state of Indiana, beginning March 23.

"The results will provide valuable information which will impact our state financially and politically for the next ten years," Aberli said.

Aberli works in the Midwest regional office of the Census Bureau, located in Westchester, Illinois, a suburb of Chicago. The regional office deals with census issues in Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin. Aberli, however, works only with the Hoosier state.

"Besides the regional office in Illinois, nine field offices are located throughout Indiana to handle the heavy workload generated by the 1990 Census. These offices are in Evansville, Fort Wayne, Gary, Jeffersonville, Lafayette, Muncie and two locations in Indianapolis," added Aberli.

Nearly 4,000 temporary employees will be hired in Indiana to handle the work created by the census. This includes field work for enumerators, clerical duties and supervisory positions. These job assignments will last from two to eight weeks.

"The workload for these temporary workers will be driven by non-response.

The more residents who fail to return their census forms, the more enumerators the Bureau will have to hire to gather the needed information," said Aberli.

"Hopefully, everyone will fill out their

"Hopefully, everyone will fill out their census form and mail it back by Census Day, April 1. The more people who respond early, the fewer enumerators we'll need to send out to get information. We're anticipating that the Hoosier response to this year's census will be a positive one," Aberli concluded.

We encourage all landusers to sit down with us for an hour and become informed about wind erosion. We want to have this fresh in our minds so when May comes, we'll be able to identify the changes needed to stop the blowing."

With some excellent volunteer help, including the Scouts, they planted several hundred shrubs for these people who would request them, at no charge.

The value of trees shows up frequently when a family fifty years ago was looking for a new home for their base camp and picked out Akron, with one of the main features being their beautiful trees. That family was the D.A. Pike Family.







Solid Waste Management Planning Public Meetings

Indiana's new comprehensive solid waste law, House Bill 1240, signed by Governor Bayh on March 20, 1990, requires Indiana counties to form solid waste districts, estimate waste generation rates, and plan for management of that waste for the next twenty years. It includes measures designed to certify and closely monitor out-of-state waste and sets statewide goals for reducing the amount of solid waste landfilled and incinerated by the

year 2000. It also provides funding and taxing authority to solid waste districts.

The Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM) will work with the firm of R.W. Beck and Associates, of Carmel, Indiana, to prepare a statewide solid waste management plan which will inventory the status of current solid waste management, identify alternative strategies, district planning and funding requirements, develop public information materials, and develop a model district plan. Because the plan will affect how each Indiana resident handles solid waste and pays for its disposal, citizen views and ideas are considered a crucial part of our research.

IDEM and R.W. Beck personnel will hold a series of public meetings throughout the state between April 23 and May 4. A schedule of the meeting locations, dates and times



USING CROWNS TO SAVE TEETH



If you have a badly decayed or damaged tooth, your dentist may recommend a crown to save the tooth and make it properly functional again. He will have to X-ray the tooth first to find out if it can be saved. An X-ray will reveal many important facts, including whether the roots of the tooth are healthy and if there is sufficient bone to support the tooth. The X-ray will also show the size and location of the nerve canals within the tooth as well as the condition of your surrounding teeth.

Another tool your dentist may use is a study model or plaster mold of your mouth. Using this, he can examine and measure the size and shape of the tooth to be crowned. The model will also reveal the relationship of your upper jaw to your lower jaw. If a crown is to be made; it should fit properly in your mouth and improve your chewing efficiency.

The Tiger and the 1990 Census

Indianapolis, Indiana--How is the 1990 census different than the 1980 census? One answer is the TIGER (Topologically Intergrated Geographic Encoding and Referencing), a new system that uses modern computer technology to avoid many of the errors that plagued the geographic program of the 19980 census in Indiana and across the country

What exactly is the TIGER system? "Basically, the idea behind TIGER is to provide geographic information necessary to plot a detailed map. These maps show the tracts and blocks, or basic census boundaries, within a given town, county, state, or country," explained Carol Rogers, Public Information Manager of explained Carol the Indiana Business Research Center at Without modern Indiana University. computers, there could be no modern census. Even as recently as 1980, the majority of the census operations were no computerized. Instead, census personnel prepared maps, address reference files, and geographic reference files. These three tools described the same areas in different ways. The challenge for census workers was to cross-reference the information properly, resulting in specific, detailed maps.

Unfortunately, the processes in 1980 and before were slow and far from errorfree. This resulted in production delays, mistakes, and inconsistencies

As Roger explained, the TIGER system and computerization of the census affects Hoosiers in 1990. "The main purpose is to provide map information that's critical to run the census. Just like we need a road to get from one place to another, TIGER maps offer specific geographic information. These maps helped census personnel plan more efficiently for distribution of the 1990 census forms. The maps will also help field workers find all

housing units in a given block area for

census follow-up," said Rogers.

Besides helping to improve census operations, the TIGER system will make other computerized geographic products possible. For instance, in Indiana, the police and fire departments are using the system to improve police and fire protection. They create a map of their territory and then impose information from their files to indicate areas of high crime or fire risk.

"The Department of Natural Resources will also be using TIGER as part of their own geographic-based information own geographic-based information system, along with census results, to determine where people live in Indiana and how this corresponds with our natural resources. They'll then use this information to better serve our Hoosier

community," explained Rogers.

The TIGER system was created over the past ten years to simplify the geographic program for the 1990 census. "With good maps you get good coverage and find the locations you need to find," said Rogers, "Ultimately, the TIGER system will enhance a more complete count in Indiana and across the country.
