## Folk Art Show to have Amish-Dutch flavor

The colorful folk art of the Amish and Pennsylvania Dutch will be strongly evidenced August 15 through 18, from 11:30 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily, when the Fletcher Furniture Village of Napanee presents its annual Village Art Festival.

Amish driven horse and buggy rides, escorted country farm tours making stops at an Amish harness shop, country store and one room school and jitney tours of Napanee's kitchen showrooms, gift and antique shops add to the color and fun.

A Little Village will be added to this year's festival. Visitors may sample a variety of sausage sandwiches smothered in sauerkraut in a locally baked roll everyday or attend the ox roast while they may eat roast beef served with sauerbrauten gravy, and other good food. On Friday evening a chicken barbecue will feature the seven sweets and seven sours of the Amish-Dutch tradition. A pork barbecue is planned for Saturday. Hundreds of wet shoo-fly pies will be served during the celebration.

Besides, eating, visitors can view the works of some 200 midwest artists, explore the Flea Market, the Farmer's Market where licorice, sasafra, brown rock candy, horehound, jams, jellies, molasses, pretzels, country apple butter, pancake syrups, sweet and sour dressings and scrabble will be sold. They may buy hex signs, cook books, canes, bonnets and hats in the Dutch tradition or freshly baked Dutch bread, Amish frosting cookies,

and sugar pretzels.

They may be entertained by the Elkhart Barbershop Chorus, reviews of current plays at the Wagon Wheel, Enchanted Hills and Country playhouse, or by folk singing, banjo playing, and a variety of other country and rock music.

Pat Kelly, son of famed Ringling Brothers Clown Ennet Kelly, will greet children. The children can also visit a fantasy land showing Cinderella in her carriage as she passes gingham flowerbeds, the forest of no re-

turn, Sleeping Beauty in her castle, and a tunnel through a coal mine with the seven dwarfs.

Strolling fashion shows will be presented by the House Across the Street.

Saturday afternoon will feature an antique auction on the festival grounds. Any visitor, artist or shop may offer antiques at auction.

An estimated 30,000 people from every state attended last year's Festival. This year's estimates are even higher, says Festival promoters.

## Fact-Finding Committee is Named

The Kosciusko County Commissioners have named a 17-member fact-finding committee to investigate the community hospital problems and determine a workable solution to the current Kosciusko county hospital controversy that arose when the members of the Kosciusko Community Hospital Inc. requested the commissioners for \$2 million in tax money to help finance a new hospital.

On June 17 the commissioners voted 2-1 to table the \$2 million bond issue and appoint a committee to be composed of three members from each commissioner's district, the members to be of opposite political faiths as nearly as possible. Each commissioner was to have one member from agriculture, one from industry and one from labor. Also to be included on the committee were one member of the present board of Murphy Medi-


cal Center, one member from the board and a medical staff member from Murphy. They also designated that an appointment would be made from the Area Health Facilities Planning Council, the three commissioners and Ralph Oyler as president of the board. Appointed from the northern district were Richard E. Berger.

## Used Books Are Due at High School

Mentone school principal Ernest Holcslaw has announced that he will begin at once to accept used text books from any high school student wishing to sell his last year's books. The books will be accepted at the school from now until the morning of August 26.

The books will go on sale August 19 and the sale will continue through Friday, August 23 ending Monday, August 26 at 4 p.m.

Holcslaw urges students to have their schedules checked with him because they must receive a card indicating the schedule has been checked and approved before they can purchase books. They may do this any day.

Children in grades K-5 will rent their books as will 8th grade students. However, eighth grade students may pick up their books by sets and pay their fees on August 19. The K-5 children will pay their rental fees to their teachers on the first day of school.

A general faculty meeting will be held Tuesday, September 3. Class organization day is September 4 and classes begin on September 5.







## Tour responsibilities are great, Terry says

Terry Hammer, writing in the following article prepared for the MENTONE NEWS, says that the responsibilities of a member of the School Band and Chorus their schedules and future plans group are great. He writes of and reports having had a wonderful time.

After waiting several hours for the repair of our chartered plane, which we all appreciated the fact they repaired before getting in the middle of the Atlantic, we flew to Brussels, Belgium. Brussels is one of the centers of hand-made Belgium lace. In Brussels we had nine hours of intensive practice a day for three days.

Then we went to our first concert which was in Nancy, France. The people accepted us very well and it was broadcast. We had a large reception in their Town Hall and we were surprised to find that many of the buildings of the city were adorned with the United States flag in our honor. People were very enthusiastic and enjoyed our first public concert.

We also were privileged to visit the largest crystal factory in the world which was at Baccarat, France. We were allowed to look over their merchandise and to purchase articles.

Lucerne, Switzerland which is a great summer and winter vacation resort is very beautiful and has a wonderful history. It is the best place in Europe to buy watches, clocks and jewelry.

Munich, Germany which was one of Hitler's main cities was very interesting. Since the war Munich has rebuilt their city and it is very modern, but still the reminders remain of Hitler's supposedly great indestructible nation.

In Salzburg, Austria where the Sound of Music was produced we saw the summer house where they sang "Sixteen Going on Seventeen", the meadow where she sang "Sound of Music" and the convent where "Maria" was sung and also many other interesting places from this movie. Since Salzburg is the center for suede in the world we went to a wholesale suede shop where we were surprised to find the articles so inexpensive. We also saw where Mozart lived.

Prague, Czechoslovakia when viewed at night is impressive but during the day it is depressing. Many of the buildings need repair and redecorating.

We made recordings in Strasbourg, France and also Kolkestone. The recording studio in Strasbourg is one of the top five in the world.

Nuernburg, Germany is a very attractive city with the old part of the city in the innermost region which consists of the fortress wall, many old buildings and a large towering castle which overlooks the city and gives a very panoramic view.

Luxembourg which has many old bridges with a deep flower-filled ravine running down through the middle of the city is a very scenic spot.

Most of our concerts were held in concert halls which are the center of activity in each city. These are usually ornate and hold a large capacity for the size of the city. Some of the concerts were held outdoors in the town square which almost every city in Europe has. The concerts which we gave were for charities and were almost always a "sell-out" in a small amount of time. The School Chorus of America is entered in the international choir contest and this is the first time any American group has been entered.

London which is the second largest city in the world was booming with their "Hippies", typical British businessmen and "mini's". The traffic was very fast moving and dangerous. In England the Prince and Princess of Yugoslavia visited our concert in Gullford. The next day they spoke to Prince Phillip who is the husband of the Queen of England and Prince Phillip invited our group next year to come and give a charity concert with the Yugoslavian Dance Team. The Royal Family will be in attendance in one of the largest

concert halls in Europe.

To walk where Mozart walked, to speak where Hitler spoke, and to be a little closer to God. I felt my responsibilities were high because I was representing you the people, my town and my Country.

I want to thank the many organizations, friends and church groups which helped me in my endeavor.

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



## SOCIAL SECURITY Question Box.....

Q—Can a person getting social security sign his check with a mark?

A—Some persons sign their check with a mark because they cannot write. Two people must witness the mark and sign their names on the check. If a person is no longer capable of signing his name, the nearest social security office should be contacted. A representative payee may be appointed.

Q—My husband and I were receiving a combined social security check. He died last month. The check I received this month was again made out to both of us. How can I cash it?

A—You should take the check to your nearest social security office. They will superendorse the combined check so you will be able to cash it. Since the full amount of the check is not due you, an adjustment will be made in later checks.

Q—I understand that a disabled widow can receive reduced social security benefit sat age 50. Will the payment be increased when she becomes 60?

A—No.

Good help. Richard Indahl of New York City, who had never stayed on the river before. A great young man. He gave his vacation to help. Ken Anglin . . . young, strong, Ralph Shotts. Strong . . . took six boys to put him to the ground. Roy Calvert, life guard, could have licked the entire camp. Don Greer helping with the swimming. Garrett Phillips . . . a veteran for forty years of youth and boys' camps.

America's commemorative  
coins offer a special attraction for  
the coin collector interested  
in history.  
Many milestones of our na-  
tion's growth are represented by  
these special gold and silver me-  
morial issues, says Richard S.  
Yeoman, a leading numismatic  
authority.

Commemoratives were author-  
ized by Congress and coined at  
face value as a fund-raising de-  
vice to help subsidize govern-  
ment-sanctioned events and pro-  
jects. The coins were sold  
through commemorative commis-  
sions at prices higher than face  
value. Profits were used to help  
defray costs of monuments or  
celebrations for events or per-  
sons commemorated.

"While silver commemoratives  
are still legal tender, few have  
appeared in general circulation  
because of premium prices,"  
notes Yeoman, who is vice presi-  
dent of the Coin Division, Whit-  
man Publishing Co., Racine Wis.  
During a half century, about 50  
different types of commemora-  
tives were issued by the United  
States. None has been issued  
since 1954.

These coins have always been  
popular because of their artistic  
quality and historical signifi-  
cance. Most are collected in un-  
circulated condition, and many  
command high prices on the nu-  
ismatic market.

"The most valuable commem-  
orative is the \$50 gold piece,  
issued in round and octagonal  
form," continues Yeoman, editor  
of Whitman's "A Guide Book of  
United States Coins," the na-  
tion's most authoritative con-  
sumer reference on current mar-  
ket values of American coins.

This coin was minted in 1915 to  
commemorate the Panama-Paci-  
fic Exposition. The octagonal ver-  
sion is valued at \$4,250 in un-  
circulated condition while the  
round version (fewer minted)  
is worth \$5,500.

A collection of commemorative  
coins is desirable from a finan-  
cial as well as aesthetic stand-  
point because of steadily rising  
numismatic values, he concludes.

In a pie pan the batter bakes to form a meringue-like crust. Whipped cream, with just a hint of coffee and cocoa flavors, is mounded over the brownie crust. Atop all, the juicy sweetness of canned Bartlett's makes the perfect accompaniment to the chocolate base. Use chilled, well-drained Bartlett's pear halves, sliced in thirds. Drain pears and chill. Beat eggs, sugar, butter, flour, 3 tablespoons cocoa, vanilla and salt in small bowl for 4 minutes. Stir in nuts and pour into greased 9-inch pie pan. Bake at 325 degrees for 30 minutes or until done. Cool. Combine whipping cream, cocoa and instant coffee powder. Beat until soft peaks form. Spread over pie. Slice pear halves into thirds and arrange over top. Sprinkle with shaved chocolate. Makes 8 servings.





## Leachman - TVSC Trial Held Monday

Did James Leachman receive a fair and impartial hearing after he was dismissed as a Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation teacher on November 22, 1963 or did he receive a hearing at all? Or, did he fail to fulfill the terms of his contract. The answer to these questions has yet to be determined although Judge Roy Shenneman of the Marshall Co. Circuit Court heard testimony from both sides all day Monday.

Leachman, now a resident of Indianapolis where he is employed as a librarian, was represented by Attorneys Wampler and Lehman of Plymouth. Dismissed because of insubordination and willful disobedience, Leachman had previously filed suit against the school corporation charging that he had not received an impartial hearing as was called for in his contract. His attorneys argued he had been given a "kangaroo" hearing and introduced as evidence a letter written by Superintendent Robert Forbes two

days prior to the Dec. 18 hearing in which Forbes told the Terre Haute draft board that Leachman would no longer be employed. This, they argued, indicated a decision had already been reached prior to the hearing. They stated further that Leachman's attorneys had been denied the right of cross-examination at the hearing.

# Alaskan holiday in school bus is "fun"

Editor's Note: In June we ran a feature about the Richard Lewis family of R. S. Rochester (Tina). They were enroute to Alaska in their remodeled school bus. Now back from their trip, they wrote the following account of their travels that we think you will enjoy as much as we did.

August 15, 1968

Hi:

Just a note of thanks for the pictures and write up in the paper.

For proof your Mentone News gets around, a friend of ours in Atwood, Mrs. Tom Witham, sent the clipping about us and our bus to their son Skip in California, who was starting on a trip to Alaska, too, and told them to watch for us, and, if possible, stop us and chat a while.

They found us in a rest park near Burwash Lodge, stopped for the night. We had quite a reunion.

As to our trip:

We traveled 10,300 miles in the bus plus 475 miles on the new ferry "Wickham" from Haines to Prince Rupert, which, too, was quite an experience for us.

The standard exclamation was "all that bus and only three people!", and I swear we showed the bus to almost a million people, and they all liked what they saw.

The 6-900 x 20 x 10 ply tires proved to be up to the trip, for they took us all the way without a flat tire anywhere. We had four spares along just in case but I am happy we didn't have to use them.

The bus proved to be quite comfortable and we did have to use the lower gears quite often because of the bus weight (8 tons) — but we never ran out of gears!

As for the Alcan: I wouldn't recommend it for a weekend excursion because it takes a lot of doing to get from one end to the other and it presents quite a challenge to machinery and people. The "Milepost" magazine, a must for the traveler of this highway, says there are 1221 miles of gravel and if you take the extra loop roads you wind up around 1500 miles of gravel. All in all, the road is a good gravel road. Of course, there are billions of chuck holes in it and I think there were at least a million turns and curves in it too. And the way I look at it, every turn you went around made a different picture to look at.

The road can be dusty one minute to the point you must use your lights in passing other cars in broad daylight and in a few minutes can be a muddy mess, and you can't turn at the next corner onto a fourlane highway, because there aren't any, so you just grit your teeth and drive on.

We have taken lots of pictures of everything that caught our attention but pictures just aren't the same as being there to see for yourself. Cameras do a good job of recording what they see but they don't record the cold of the glaciers, the smell of the flowers, or the warmth of a camp fire at the close of day.

And by the way, you better

learn to sleep in the daytime if you make this trip in the summer because they only have around two hours of dusk. It never really gets dark.

For those people who are interested, we bought our bus from Leonard Supply of Silver Lake. It is a 60-passenger bus with a R-180 International engine and 5-speed transmission. When fully loaded it weighed 16,250 pounds.

We used 1485 gallons of gas at an average cost of .43 per gallon and got seven miles per gallon. The highest priced gas was .73 per gallon (Imperial gal.) and in the states we could usually get a truck discount, but not in Canada.

If you are planning to make the trip sometime and use credit cards for gas, I would suggest that a Standard card would be most acceptable (there are more Standard and Chevron stations up there.) Second choice would be Gulf (B/A - British American) and Shell would be third choice. Hardly any Shell stations until you get to Alaska.

I have been asked, would I go again? My answer to that is, "As far as the challenge of the trip is concerned, sure I'd go in a minute, but Rose says Hawaii is our next trip so I guess that will be our next venture."

I have to put in a plug for Lewis Motors of Mentone because they are responsible for us hav-

ing a good trip as far as the bus motor is concerned.

The only expense we had on the whole trip, other than gas, oil, etc. was the alternator bushing went out, north of Whitehorse, and in so doing, messed up the rectifier which they couldn't replace so we had to discard the alternator and put on a new generator, regulator and belt to the tune of \$110.

## I Was There

Much talk and jokes have been made about the small town. Such as "we CAN'T use the zip code in Mentone. The town is so small we would get unzipped mail". Such as "we park and watch the chrome rust on our cars." Such as "for amusement we go downtown on Saturday night and watch the barber give a couple of hair cuts." Of course our barber no longer runs his shop on Saturday night . . . so we must have something else for amusement . . . so we wait for the next issue of the MENTONE NEWS to come out to see which preacher is leaving town. I have been here only fourteen months and already I am the senior minister of Mentone and all the country churches, as well as Etna Green, Bourbon and other places around.

What is it like to be a minister? To live in the light of a small town. To see your children grow up and see them left out of things for the simple reason they are minister's kids? One preacher told me when he didn't want to do a certain thing, he always was sure to get word to those 2% that he planned to start the ball rolling on this particular project, and they would then get on the phone and let him know everyone is against it. So, then he said, I get out of doing it and the 2% get their 2% reward for stopping it.

Some people want to be important. One way to show one's bigness is to tell someone off who is most ripe to be told off. Why not the minister? He can't talk back. He would be out of the ministry if he hit someone. So the small group becomes big people as they tell the minister off. Afterwhile the minister grows weary and goes somewhere else. Then about all you hear is "Ministers have faults too." The congregation never thinks of looking into the mirror.

To be a minister is the greatest thing in the world. To baptize a baby or child or adult. To perform a wedding. To take the hand of one and offer prayer, just before surgery. To say a word of help to those who are left behind in a death. To help one find God. To pray. To preach. To love all, even the 2%. To be kind. To help people get jobs. To encourage the youth to get an education. If I could have my choice to being a minister at \$400.00 a year less than a starting teacher gets or be president of the United States, I would say, "Thank you, Lord, I have but one life. The ministry for me." God bless all.



## Hales & Hunter robbed



The robbery was discovered by an employee, Mrs. Janet Ogle, when she reported for work on Tuesday morning.



## School Enrollment Set Sept. 4

The Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation schools will enroll students for the current school year on Wednesday, Sept. 4. Students should arrive at the schools by 8:25 a.m. All students who will be in the sixth or seventh grades will board one of three busses located between the Akron Grade and High School buildings at 8:25 a.m. Busses will also pick up students at Mentone for transportation to Talma.

Three busses will be marked to identify them as the busses that will take sixth and seventh grade students to the Talma Junior High School building where they will be enrolled starting at 8:50 a.m. All students will receive necessary information for starting the new school year, fill out enrollment cards and receive book lists. Most students who are prepared to do so, may purchase books at the high school before being dismissed.

All schools will dismiss in time for students to return home for lunch on Wednesday. Talma will dismiss at 10:20 a.m., Akron and Mentone schools in time to board their regular busses that will take them home. Thursday, Sept. 5, will be the first full day of classes.

Busses will run on their regular morning time schedule to pick up students on Wednesday.

Akron High School students may purchase books in the north hall of the high school building from 10:00 to 12:00 and from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday, Sept. 4. Mentone book sales are now in progress.

**Akron Book Rental Fees**  
Grade one through three, \$12.00; grades four and five, \$11.00; grade six, \$14.00 and grade seven, \$15.00.

**Basket School Book Rental Fees**  
Kindergarten, \$3.00; grades one through three, \$12.00; grade four \$11.00; grade five, \$12.00. Rental fees include all workbooks and textbooks.

**Mentone Book Rental Fees**  
Kindergarten, \$3; grade one, \$12; grade two, \$13.50; grade three, \$13.75; grade four, \$12.25 and grade five, \$13.50.

Students in grades one through twelve will rent some books and purchase others (depending on the classes scheduled by each child). All eighth grade books will be rented but the rent will vary with the cost of the books used (25% of list price.)


**School Lunch Fees**  
Grade one through five 35c per day, \$1.75 per week; grades six and seven 40c per day, \$2.00 per week; grades eight through twelve 40c per day, \$2.00 per week. Daily afternoon milk for students in grades one through five 4c per day, 20c per week.

It will be helpful if the book rental money and the lunch money are not included in a single check, officials said.

High School students who have used books for sale are encouraged to bring them on Sept. 4 so that they may sell them to other student who need them. The Mentone School used book sale has been in progress for several weeks.

## Phillips Reports Hippies Don't Fight . . .

### But Chicago Police Do

Rev. Garrett Phillips, representing this newspaper at the Democratic National Convention in Chicago, reports the hippies attending the convention are quiet and peaceful but that the police have been using undo force with both hippies and members of the working press.

"Few people will talk to the hippies," he says. He reports having a conversation with one who told him he was the first person to whom he had been able to talk. Even this talk was broken up by a police officer who said no one was allowed to talk on the sidewalk.

"The convention is mostly peaceful," Phillips says, "except for the times the police arrest hippies". Then, when members of the press attempt to photograph would seem," he says, "that the police have a grudge against both the press and the hippies."

Other than the police-state atmosphere of the convention, Phil-

lips is full of praise for the participants. He enjoyed Sen. Daniel K. Inouye's keynote speech. He reports that although the Democrats had decided not to demonstrate, they staged a 20-minute demonstration for Chicago Mayor Richard Daly.

He reported that a Poor Peoples march was held Tuesday afternoon but otherwise there was little action at the convention site. A number of bands have played in the downtown area, and Sen. McCarthy has a fleet of cars available for anyone needing transportation from the Amphitheater to the Loop.

He thinks McCarthy's chances of winning the nomination are very slim and that Vice President Hubert Humphrey likely has the nomination all but sewed up. However, he does not rule out the possibility of Sen. Edward Kennedy's name being entered.



## Brademas Finds Voters Want Peace

WASHINGTON, D.C., Thursday, August 22, 1968 . . . Strong support of a negotiated settlement in Vietnam, popular election of the President and limiting farm subsidies was indicated by citizens of the Third Congressional District counties of St. Joseph, Elkhart, Kosciusko and Marshall in response to an opinion survey made by Congressman John Brademas.

Nearly 7 out of 10 replies favored a negotiated settlement of the Vietnam war. Two years ago, in response to slightly different questions, 75% of those responding either supported the policy of the United States or favored a stepup in military commitment.

About 80% of the persons answering the Brademas questionnaire said they favored limiting the amount an individual farmer or farm corporation can receive in federal subsidies to \$10,000 a year while 85% approved electing the President of the United States by popular vote instead of through the present electoral college system.

The Brademas poll, similar to ones conducted by the Congressman since 1960, was mailed to all homes in the Third District as well as in LaPorte and Starke Counties, which Brademas continues to represent until the end of the year. The questionnaires this year, printed on computer tabulating cards, requested citizens to punch out tabs indicating their answers to nine questions. Over 16,200 cards were returned and tabulated by a private computer service firm in Washington at Brademas' expense.

Brademas said, "I am pleased that so many constituents took the time to answer my questionnaire and give me the benefit of their thinking on some of the crucial issues being discussed at this time. I am reporting the tabulations of this poll to the President, the news media and will have the

results printed in the Congressional Record."

A majority of respondents favored gun control legislation (54.7%) and a reduction in the oil depletion allowance (58.2%), but opposed seeking a complete military victory in Vietnam (50.8%) and lowering the voting age to 18 (55.8%).

Divided opinion failed to register a majority response to two questions, but more people favored legislation to provide jobs in private industry and public service (46.9%) and were against lowering Social Security retirement below 66 (46.1%).



### The Bible Speaks

We often hear or read the statement, "Join the church of your choice" or "Be saved and then find a church to worship in." Such an attitude implies that first, it is necessary to be saved, and then second, one must find a demonstration to join. This attitude is not found in the New Testament. In Acts chapter two we have an example of people who wanted to be saved. They were told what to do by Peter. "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." (Acts 2:38) Now that these people were saved, what denomination did they join? None, because no denomination was in existence. Acts 2:41 says, "Then they that gladly received his word were baptized; and the same day there were ADDED unto them about three thousand souls." To what were these 3,000 souls added? The answer is found in Acts 2:47 "Praising God, and having favour with all the people And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved."

These people had no choice at all in the matter of joining a denomination. When they repented and were baptized, Jesus added them to the church. "What church was that?" someone asks. It was the church that Jesus promised to build back in Matt. 16:18 "... upon this rock I will build MY church; and the gates of hell shall

not prevail against it." It was Christ's church, and it was established just as Jesus promised, on the Day of Pentecost in Acts Two. That church was not a man-made denomination, it was Jesus' church, the body of Christ. Col. 1:18 states: "And he is the head of the body, the church." Each individual person who repents and is baptized becomes a member of the body of Christ. "Know ye not your bodies are the members of Christ" (1 Cor. 6:15) "For as the body is one, and hath many members, and all the members of that one body, being many, are one body; so is Christ. For by one Spirit are we all baptized into one body, whether we

be Jews or Gentiles, whether we be bond or free; and have been made to drink into one spirit." (1 Cor. 12:12-13) "But now are they many members, yet but one body." (1 Cor. 12:20) The body is Christ.

Have you been added to the body of Christ? If you have not repented of your sins and have not been baptized (immersed in water) then you have yet to be added to the body of Christ. You have yet to be added to the church that Christ built. (Acts 2:37-47).



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## Christmas Comes Early For Red Cross

Christmas is coming months ahead of time to the Kosciusko County Chapter of the Red Cross in 1968.

For the fourth successive year, the Kosciusko County Red Cross Chapter, a United Fund Agency, is joining with other chapters across the country in a nationwide project to make and fill bags to be distributed to U.S. servicemen and servicewomen stationed in Vietnam at Christmas time.

The local chapter has been asked to make and fill 300 bags. The bags are made of sturdy green cotton material, so they will be serviceable to their owners after the original contents are used.

"Red Cross Shop Early—Vietnam 1968" is intended to be "a tangible way for Americans to say we care about our troops in Vietnam," said Dwight Bechtol, chairman of the Kosciusko County Chapter who named Mrs. R. P. Gast and Mrs. J. E. Lambert as co-chairmen of the project.

"This is not exclusively a Red Cross program," Mr. Bechtol continued, "but a county wide community affair in which churches, civic groups, business firms and individuals are cooperating with our chapter volunteers in sewing and filling the bags. Mrs. Wayne Szymaker and Mrs. Eugene Beigh are cutting the bags from material donated by an interested individual.

Among the items the bags packed here will contain are: ball point pens, pen-sized flashlights with batteries, small pen knives, windproof cigarette lighters with accompanying package of flints, plastic soap case, small packages of writing paper with self-seal envelopes, small address book, plastic toothbrush holder, terry cloth washcloth (other than white or light color), nail clipper, plastic cigarette case, comb, mailing-size voice tapes (reels of 3-inch tapes - 150" length), small tins of nuts or candies - vacuum packed, small plastic snapshot holders, small kitchen size and sandwich-type plastic bags, pocket or diary-type calendars, pocket games, i.e. small decks of cards, chess, pinochle, etc., "wipe and shine" packet shoe shine polish, "wash & dries".

It is asked that gifts in breakable containers, food packed in non-vacuum containers, medications (including foot powder and insect repellent), reading and printed or advertising materials be omitted. (Staff in Vietnam advise there is an ample supply of paperbacks available.)

Each bag will contain a holiday greeting card carrying the names of the contributors and the name of the Red Cross chapter here.

Zimmers and Deput Splint factories supplied 300 metal mirrors which were polished by the West End Polishing Company. Covers for the mirrors are being made by volunteers with plastic coated material furnished by the American Brattice Cloth Co.

Any group wishing to help with making the ditty bags may pick up material at the Red Cross office the week of September 2nd. Contributions of articles, or money to purchase needed items, 501 No. Lake St. Call 267-5244 for further information.

Work on the bags already has begun and will continue until Kosciusko County's quota is filled.

With October 15 as the final deadline for shipping, the local chapter is aiming at completion of the project by September 30.
