### **Mandatory Inspection** Is Begun in Indiana

Indiana has become the 31st state with a manda-tory vehicle inspection program. Thomas W. Harthe Department of Traf-fic Safety and Vehicle Inspection, said there are 3,898 official in-stations in the state and 10,083 in specting mechanics. All passenger vehicles with a license plate ending in a 1 or 2 must be in-spected by August 31.

Inspection stations. depending on their qualifications, may be li-censed to inspect one, all, or any combination of four classes of vehicles: Class A-Passenger ve-

hicles and light commer-cial, small trailers and other commerical vehicof such size that can be inspected entirely within the entinspection area. the enclosed

Class B—Any station licensed to inspect all trucks, trailers, semitrailers, tractors, bu-ses, and oversized vehicles.

Class C - Any station licensed to inspect motorcycles.

Class D - Any station licensed to inspect for-eign manufactured vehicles.

The remainder of the vehicle inspection schedule is as follows: Vehicles bearing a 1969 license plate ending in a 3 or 4 must be inspect-ed by Sept. 30; 5 or 6 deadline is October 31; or 8 by November 30; and those ending in 9 or 0 on or before Dec. and or 0

### Wage and Hour Division Upgrades Office

The South Bend Field Office of the U. S. De-partment of Labor's Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions has been upgraded to an Area office and its super-visor, John Solbeck, has been promoted to the position of Area Director, it was announced in Washington this week by Federal Wage-Hour Administrator Robert D. Federal reueral Wa ministrator

Moran.
The South Bend Area Director is responsible for administration and enforcement of a number of Federal laws and reg-ulations covering mini-mum wages, overtime work, child labor, equal pay for men and women, and age discrimination in employment. Compliance Officers under the South Bend Area Officer, working out of South Bend, Fort Wayne, Gary and Lafayette, are responsible for obtaining com-pliance with these laws in all places of employment to which they apply in the 35 Northern counties of the State of Indiana.





Dear Editor:

The "so-called tax reform legislation recom-mended by the Ways and mended by the ways and Means Committee to the U. S. House of Repre-sentatives on Thursday, July 24, 1969, I believe, is very bad legislation. It could very well cause a depression and increase inflation both at the same time. If enacted into law, it would "strait jacket" the U.S.

economy.

The principles of the tax reform bill have the support of both political parties including the treasury department under the administration of Precident Nivon and of President Nixon and the House and Senate Democratic leaders. The tax reform legislation is not receiving a pro-per public debate. Pubper public debate, rub-lic hearings have not been held by the Ways and Means Committee, on the provisions of the bill. What hearings

they held were held before the bill was draft-ed. It is "shot-gun" legislation at its worst. Despite bill's stringent the visions, no important political or business political or business leaders have raised their voices in protest. The bill asit is pre-sently written would have these effects:

Increase real estate and other local

taxes.

2. Cut down apartment building and new home building starts.

Increase rents, mortgage payments and purchase price

homes. 4. Increase food costs, especially meat and milk.

Decrease the value of retired peoples savings.

Greatly increase the tax cost of sell-ing real estate, stocks, businesses ing stocks, businesses or stocks, businesses or any kind of property.
7. Discourage incentive on the part of the business management and cause business men

to loaf. 8. Cause an outward flow of capital from the United States and further aggravate the value of payment problems and impair the blems and impair the value of the dollar.
9. Probably end local control of all public improvement financing.

Specifically, the leg islation, as recommended by the Ways and Means Committee would destroy the private tax-free municipal bond market by placing a tax on the placing a tax on the bonds, including those bonds, including thalready outstanding.

These existing bonds, many of them in the hands of our elderly citizens are automatically reduced in value--many of them as much as one-third to one-half if the holders have to liq-uidate the bonds.

Before any school house fire station, sewer system or other local improve-ment could be built, per-mission would have to be obtained from the federal government inWashington. would mean that local officials would merely be rubber stamps for government bureaucrats.

The proposals to wipe out hobby farming by disallowing losses in farm operations unless opera-tors make 75% of their income from farming would strike sharply at the moonlighting farmers (those who work in industry and farm on the side). A large percentage of corn belt farmers are moonlight farmers. This would very likely force would very likely force many of them to give up farming. The bill would also strike severely at livestock herdsmen, thus causing curtailment of the cows and sows. This has to raise the prices of food, especially of meat and milk for the consumers.

The plan to add a minimum tax to the capital gains tax will mean that it will make it very much more expensive to sell real estate, stocks, businesses, or any kind of property. Considering present unsettled condi tions, this could very well cause a 1929 type stock market panic and lots of unemployment.



no blue monday: If you are buying a washer for the first time or replacing an old one, you may not realize how much washday help you have waiting for you.

nuisance items: Tennis shoes, red socks, rag dolls and delicates are leftover items you may usually wash by hand. A washer is now available with a separate "basthat fits over the machine agitator for handling all your nuisance loads.

Sometimes it seems to take forever to complete your wash, especially when you forget to transfer the clean clothes to the dryer. This may be avoided by those models which have a buzzer which tells you the wash is done. It buzzes for about one minute and the sound level is adjustable.

cramped? If you have limited space, one manufacturer has a tumbler washer with a dryer "stacked" on top. Another brand has a combination washer and dryer in one unit that occupies about 30 inches of space. Also available is the "mini" washer which can be stored in a closet and rolled to the kitchen sink and used much like a dishwasher.

good ol' soak: To remove stubborn stains, clothes may be soaked in one of the new enzyme agents for at least ½ hour. Some washer models let you decide how long you want the clothes to soak. After filling with water, the washer agitates for 2 minutes to mix thoroughly the pre-soaking agent and water. When the desired time is up, you advance the timer to rinse. The washer spins, drains and shuts off. The clothes are then ready to be washed.

Swine cannot shipped into Indiana from Missouri, Arkansas, Indiana Louisiana, So. Carolina, No. Carolina and Georgia. This restriction will remain in effect until outbreaks of cholera in these states are under control.

Indiana farmers who purchase feeder pigs should make certain that animals did not originate in these states, says Dr. Kenneth Meyer, Purdue Universtiy extension veterinarian.

Effective July 31, Indiana buyers or consignees who wish to import feeder pigs must request permit from the State eterinarians' office, inarians' office, Office Building, State Indianapolis, to bring these animals into the state. Telephone number for more information on these permits is Indianapolis AC 317 633 -

Meyer advises farmers to be extremely cautious when purchasing feeder pigs, expecially from outside Indiana. Avoid buying pigs from slaughter swine, thin sows or feeder pigs of unknown origin, he adds. And if your hogs sicken consult a veterinarian immediately.



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


