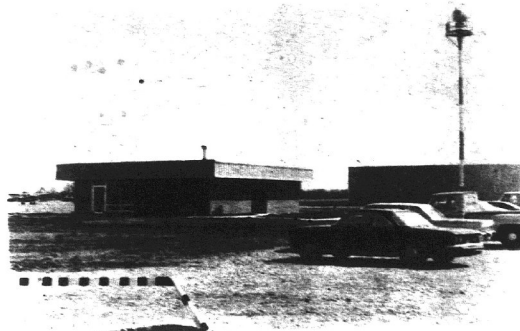

Youth League To Complete Activity Hear Sing Out Warsaw

The Mentone Youth League will hold its annual picnic Sunday, August 10, at which time players will be recognized with trophies.

The carry-in dinner will begin at 1 p.m. and the program will continue throughout the afternoon with a game between the girls and their mothers, the awards presentation, entertainment by the Sing Out Warsaw group, and a watermelon feast by the fire department. A softball game at 5 p.m. will conclude the afternoon's activity.

All boys and girls and their parents and all other interested persons are invited to attend. Any boys not having their insurance paid or uniforms turned in will not receive a trophy.

The program will be held at the Youth League park located in the south part of Mentone on land that has been improved by the league.

The park was begun in 1966 when two acres of land were purchased from Mrs. Reth Rogers. Two

ball diamonds were constructed and lights from Talma Jr. High were installed for night play.

In 1968 and 1969, a half acre was purchased from Mrs. Rogers and the field was enlarged. It was enlarged again in 1969 with the purchase of one and one half acres of land from Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Adams.

The 1969 land purchase made it possible to add a playground for the younger boys and girls. Playground equipment was installed from the Beaver Dam school. Also added this year have been a 40 x 64 building to be used for winter activity and for other groups as well in addition to a tennis court.

When the project was begun in 1965 there were 73 boys playing. There are now 153 boys and 40 girls enrolled in the league, an increase of 120 in the past four years.

Youth League President Jerry Secrist invites everyone to attend the program and hear the Sing Out group, whether they have children in the league or not.

Mandatory Inspection Is Begun In Indiana

Indiana has become the 31st state with a mandatory vehicle inspection program. Thomas W. Harlow, Sr., Director of the Department of Traffic Safety and Vehicle Inspection, said there are 3,898 official inspection stations in the state and 10,083 inspecting mechanics. All passenger vehicles with a license plate ending in a 1 or 2 must be inspected by August 31.

Inspection stations, depending on their qualifications, may be licensed to inspect one, all, or any combination of four classes of vehicles:

Class A—Passenger vehicles and light commercial, small trailers and other commercial vehicles of such size that can be inspected entirely within the enclosed inspection area.

Class B—Any station licensed to inspect all trucks, trailers, semi-trailers, tractors, buses, and oversized vehicles.

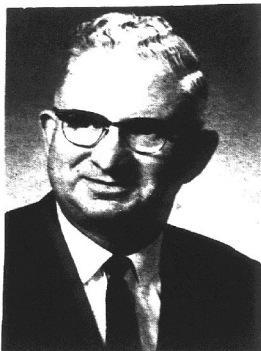
Class C—Any station licensed to inspect motorcycles.

Class D—Any station licensed to inspect foreign manufactured vehicles.

The remainder of the vehicle inspection schedule is as follows: Vehicles bearing a 1969 license plate ending in a 3 or 4 must be inspected by Sept. 30; 5 or 6 deadline is October 31; 7 or 8 by November 30; and those ending in 9 or 0 on or before Dec. 31.

Area vehicle inspection stations are: Arthur's Sinclair, Bahney Chevrolet, So. End Motors, and Stephen's Texaco in Akron; Powell Tire Co., Burket; Donald Poulson Garage, of Etna Green; Linn Sinclair Service, Mentone Service Center, both of Mentone, and Glen's Standard Service, Kerlin Motor Co., and Sells Oil Co., all of Silver Lake.

Bishop Kendall To Speak At Mentone



Rev. Walter S. Kendall of Winona Lake, a bishop of the Free Methodist Church, will be the guest speaker at a series of special meetings to be sponsored by the United Methodist Church and others and to be held August 8, 9, and 10 at the Youth League pavilion in Mentone.

Bishop Kendall, a native of Wisconsin, was ordained in the Free Methodist Church at the age of 24 and served as pastor for six years and evangelist for eighteen years in addition to being General Conference evangelist for two years and superintendent for eight years.

He has traveled in Latin America, Japan, Formosa, Philippines and Norway and in 1965 took a trip around the world where he presided at conferences in southern Africa and India. He also visited Egypt, Japan, and Formosa and was a participant in the Asia Fellowship Conference and later visited Free Methodist churches in Ireland.

He was honored by Greenville College in 1967 with an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree.

Wage and Hour Division Upgrades Office

The South Bend Field Office of the U. S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions has been upgraded to an Area Office and its supervisor, John Solbeck, has been promoted to the position of Area Director, it was announced in Washington this week by Federal Wage-Hour Administrator Robert D. Moran.

The South Bend Area Director is responsible for administration and enforcement of a number of Federal laws and regulations covering minimum wages, overtime work, child labor, equal pay for men and women, and age discrimination in employment. Compliance Officers under the South Bend Area Officer, working out of South Bend, Fort Wayne, Gary and Lafayette, are responsible for obtaining compliance with these laws in all places of employment to which they apply in the 35 Northern counties of the State of Indiana.

Administrator Moran said he decided to establish an Area Office in South Bend and to promote Solbeck to Area Director because of the increased responsibilities assigned to this office since its establishment. He noted that much additional responsibility has been delegated recently by the Washington head

quarters to local Area Offices all over the country in keeping with President Nixon's directive to get government as close to the people as possible by delegating decision-making authority to Federal officials located in certain key areas.

Moran added that he was happy to be able, through this action, to

have a Department of Labor Wage-Hour Director located in South Bend for the first time in the history of the Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions. He said that this office will be available to assist both employers and employees who wish to learn of their rights and responsibilities under the Federal laws administered and enforced by the Wage and Hour Division.

New Area Director Solbeck has been employed by the Department of Labor since 1941.

EDITOR'S CORNER

Beginning last week and concluding this week, newspapers in Indiana, both weekly and daily, start publishing proposed budgets for the coming year as prepared by various taxing units, such as towns, townships, school corporations, counties and libraries.

This publication, often in fine print, is regulated by the legislature, which recognizes not only the right of the taxpayer to know what he's paying for but also that such publication is an added assurance against malfeasance in handling funds.

Recently, readers had the opportunity to learn how the school corporation spent its tax money during the past fiscal year. This published annual report of income and expenditures is also required by law.

If you are an "interested taxpayer," as the law refers to you in the conclusion of the printed report, and want to know how your money is being spent, read the budgets for the taxing units as they appear in this week's paper. You can understand them with a little study and you can compare the amounts proposed by different units for the same fund.

Remember, too, that you can attend the public hearing on such budgets and can assume the role of an "aggrieved" taxpayer, as it states, if necessary to dissent.

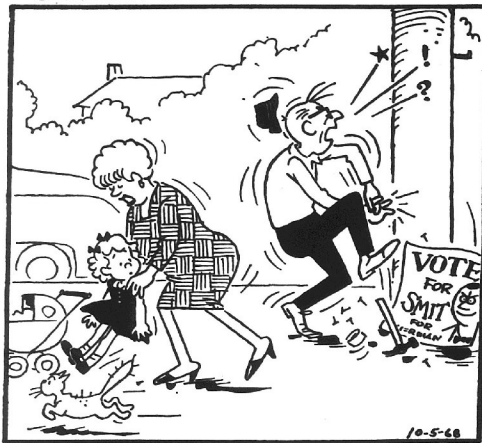
What Others Are Doing

Wabash County Auditor Eldon Landis reported a petition bearing a total of 1,100 signatures had been properly filed with his office in objection to the building of the Manchester Middle School and High School addition. To The Editor

Dear Editor:

The "so-called" tax reform legislation recommended by the Ways and Means Committee to the U. S. House of Representatives on Thursday, July 24, 1969, I believe, is very bad legislation. It could very well cause a depression and increase inflation both at the same time. If enacted into law, it would "straitjacket" the U.S. economy.

The principles of the tax reform bill have the support of both political parties including the treasury department under the administration of President Nixon and the House and Senate Democratic leaders. The tax reform legislation is not receiving a proper public debate. Public hearings have not been held by the Ways and Means Committee, on the provisions of the bill. What hearings

they held were held before the bill was drafted. It is "shot-gun" legislation at its worst. Despite the bill's stringent provisions, no important political or business leaders have raised their voices in protest. The bill as it is presently written would have these effects:

1. Increase real estate and other local taxes.
2. Cut down apartment building and new home building starts.
3. Increase rents, mortgage payments and purchase price of homes.
4. Increase food costs, especially meat and milk.
5. Decrease the value of retired peoples savings.
6. Greatly increase the tax cost of selling real estate, stocks, businesses or any kind of property.
7. Discourage incentive on the part of the business management and cause business men to loaf.
8. Cause an outward flow of capital from the United States and further aggravate the value of payment problems and impair the value of the dollar.
9. Probably end local control of all public improvement financing.

Specifically, the legislation, as recommended by the Ways and Means Committee would destroy the private tax-free municipal bond market by placing a tax on the bonds, including those already outstanding.

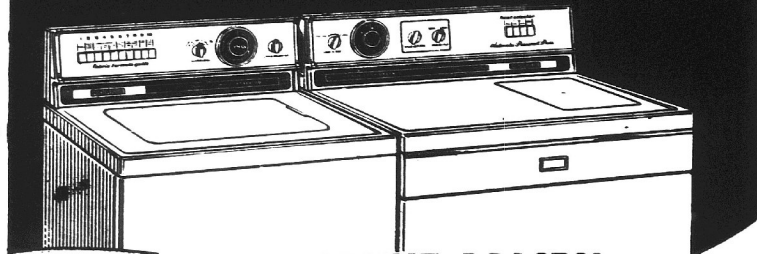

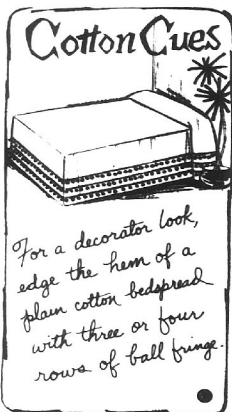

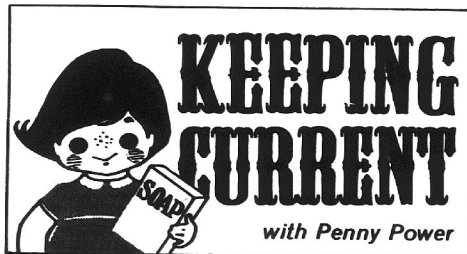

no blue monday: If you are buying a washer for the first time or replacing an old one, you may not realize how much washday help you have waiting for you.

nuisance items: Tennis shoes, red socks, rag dolls and delicates are leftover items you may usually wash by hand. A washer is now available with a separate "basket" that fits over the machine agitator for handling all your nuisance loads.

Sometimes it seems to take forever to complete your wash, especially when you forget to transfer the clean clothes to the dryer. This may be avoided by those models which have a buzzer which tells you the wash is done. It buzzes for about one minute and the sound level is adjustable.

cramped? If you have limited space, one manufacturer has a tumbler washer with a dryer "stacked" on top. Another brand has a combination washer and dryer in one unit that occupies about 30 inches of space. Also available is the "mini" washer which can be stored in a closet and rolled to the kitchen sink and used much like a dishwasher.

good ol' soak: To remove stubborn stains, clothes may be soaked in one of the new enzyme agents for at least ½ hour. Some washer models let you decide how long you want the clothes to soak. After filling with water, the washer agitates for 2 minutes to mix thoroughly the pre-soaking agent and water. When the desired time is up, you advance the timer to rinse. The washer spins, drains and shuts off. The clothes are then ready to be washed.

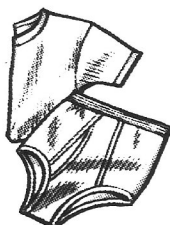

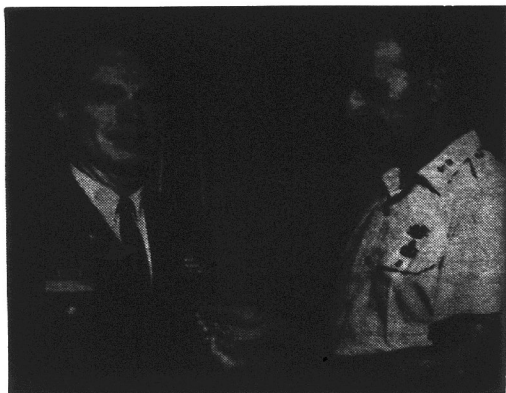

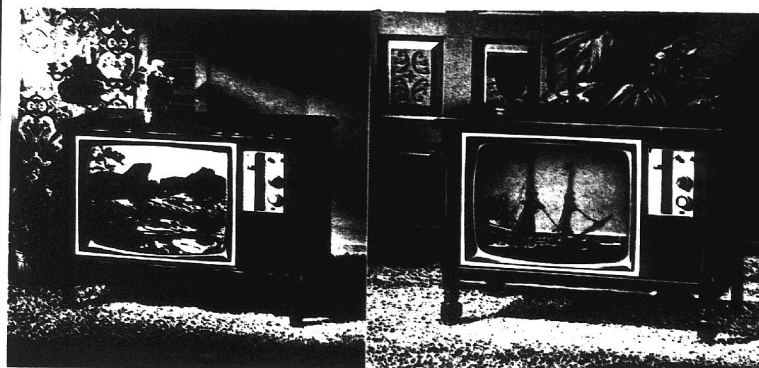

General Commission Denies TVSC Appeal

TVSC School Opening Dates Listed

The principals of the Akron, Burket and Mentone schools have announced the following opening schedule procedures:

Akron School

The Akron Grade and High Schools will enroll students for the current school year Wednesday, September 3. Students should arrive at the school by 8:40 a.m. All students who will be in grades seven through twelve will meet in the high school gym for a general meeting before going to assigned home rooms to enroll. All students in grades one through six will go to their proper rooms as indicated in the grade school building.

All students will receive information necessary for starting the new school year, fill out enrollment cards and receive book lists. Students who are prepared to do so may purchase books at the high school before being dismissed. All students will be dismissed at 10:15 a.m. to allow them to return home for lunch on Wednesday.

Thursday, September 4, will be the first full day of classes at all schools. Buses will run on their regular morning time schedule to pick up students on Wednesday.

Kindergarten students need not enroll until September 4, their first day of school.

Akron High School students may purchase used books in the north hall of the high school building from 9 a.m. to 12 a.m. and from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. and from 5 to 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Sept. 2. New and used books may be purchased in the north hall from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. on Wednesday, September 3.

Book rental: Kindergarten \$10 (including daily milk); grades one through four \$12.00; grades five and six \$11 and grades seven and eight \$12.00.

Students in grades nine through twelve will rent some books and purchase others (depending on the classes scheduled by each child.)

SCHOOL LUNCHES

Grades one through six .35 per day, \$1.75 per week.

Grades seven through twelve \$.40 per day, \$2 per week.

Daily afternoon milk for students in grades one through six \$.04 per day, \$.20 per week.

It will be helpful if the book rental money and the lunch money are not included in a single check.

Book lists for students in grades seven through twelve may be obtained at the high school office if desired prior to Sept. 3.

High school students who have used books for sale are encouraged to take them on September 3 so that they may sell them to other students who need them.

Burket School

Organizational Day for the Burket Grade School will be Wednesday morning, September 3. The first full day of school will be Thursday, Sept. 4.

Kindergarten students should not report to school on organizational day. The first day of school for kindergarten students will be Thursday, September 4. The kindergarten time schedule will be announced at a later date.

Rental fees for textbooks and workbooks will be \$4.00 for kindergarten, \$12.00 for grades 1 to 5. Rental fees include all workbooks and textbooks. Students may purchase other supplies from the school.

The school office will be open afternoons from 1 to 5 p.m. on Thursday, August 28, and Friday, August 29, so that parents may pay book rental fees. If parents prefer, they may send in the payment with their child on organizational day.

The school cafeteria will begin serving lunches on Thursday, Sept. 4. The charge for lunches will be 35¢ per day or \$1.75 per week. Money for lunches will be collected on Thursday, September 4. Students in grades K-5 will be given the opportunity to drink one half pint of extra milk per day. Five day milk tickets will be sold for 20¢ each. Milk for kindergarten students will be sold on a semester basis only. The charge for kindergarten milk for the first semester will be \$3.40.

Board Sells Buses House Bids Stay Open

An auction of used school buses and new houses opened Monday night's meeting of the Tippecanoe Valley school board and saw little bidding on either, although the buses sold for a total of \$565.00. All except one was in operating condition.

The sale of the houses built by the boys enrolled in the corporation's building trades program was well-attended but bidding was light. No one bid on the Mentone house while bidding between two Akron men ended at \$22,000, more than \$4500 below appraised value, and the house was not sold. The Mentone house was appraised at \$26,288 and the Akron house at \$26,588.

Following the sale, the meeting recessed as board members toured the recently remodeled bus shed at the Mentone School. The building will

be used for the new auto mechanics program being initiated this year and will be used by boys at Akron and at Mentone.

The meeting resumed at 9:15 during which time routine business was handled. Contracts for two new teachers, Charles Kelsey and Marsha Groff, were approved and a completed list of teacher assignments

was presented.

Permission was given the Akron 4-H group to take a bus to Ft. Wayne and after a lengthy executive session, the board voted to grant 2-year contracts to the administrators of the corporation with the exception of superintendent Robert Forbes who

Feeder pigs banned from six states

To cope with recent hog cholera outbreaks, the Indiana State Board of Animal Health has banned shipment into Indiana of feeder pigs from six southern states.

Swine cannot now be shipped into Indiana from Missouri, Arkansas, Louisiana, So. Carolina, No. Carolina and Georgia. This restriction will remain in effect until outbreaks of cholera in these states are under control.

Indiana farmers who purchase feeder pigs should make certain that these animals did not originate in these states, says Dr. Kenneth Meyer, Purdue University extension veterinarian.

Effective July 31, Indiana buyers or consignees who wish to import feeder pigs must request a permit from the State Veterinarians' office, State Office Building, Indianapolis, to bring these animals into the state. Telephone number for more information on these permits is Indianapolis AC 317 633-5865.

Meyer advises farmers to be extremely cautious when purchasing feeder pigs, especially from outside Indiana. Avoid buying pigs from slaughter swine, thin sows or feeder pigs of unknown origin, he adds. And if your hogs sicken consult a veterinarian immediately.

Roudebush lists poll results

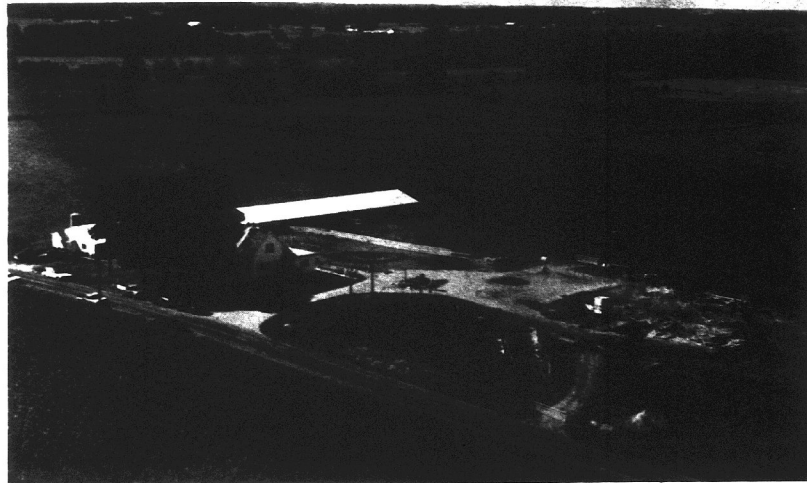

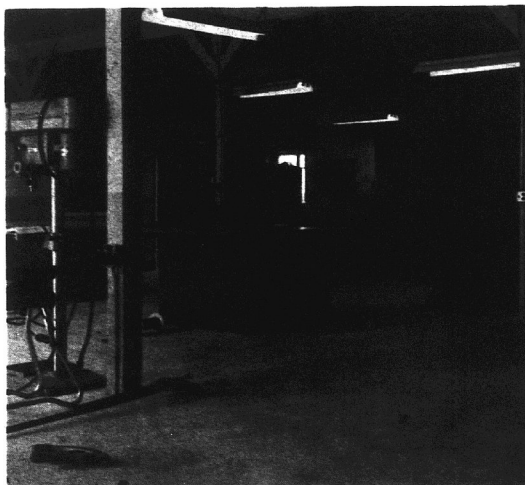

ville, North Judson, Gary and Fowler. ISU will offer 92 extension classes in 23 communities during the fall semester.

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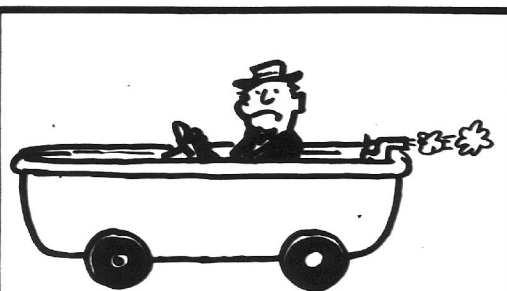
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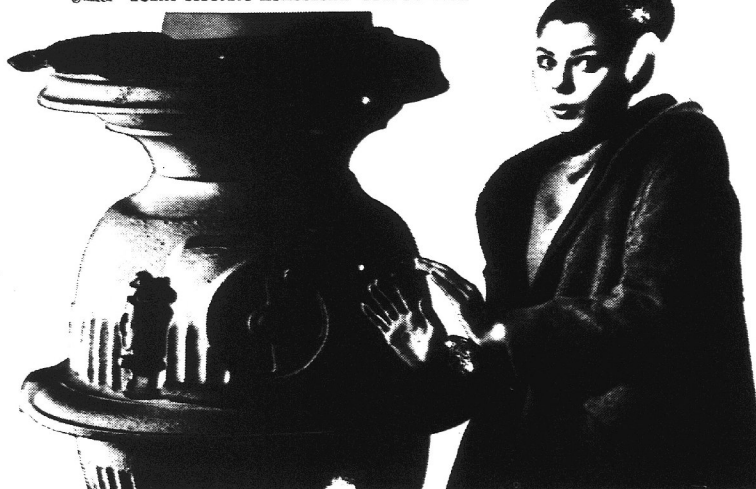
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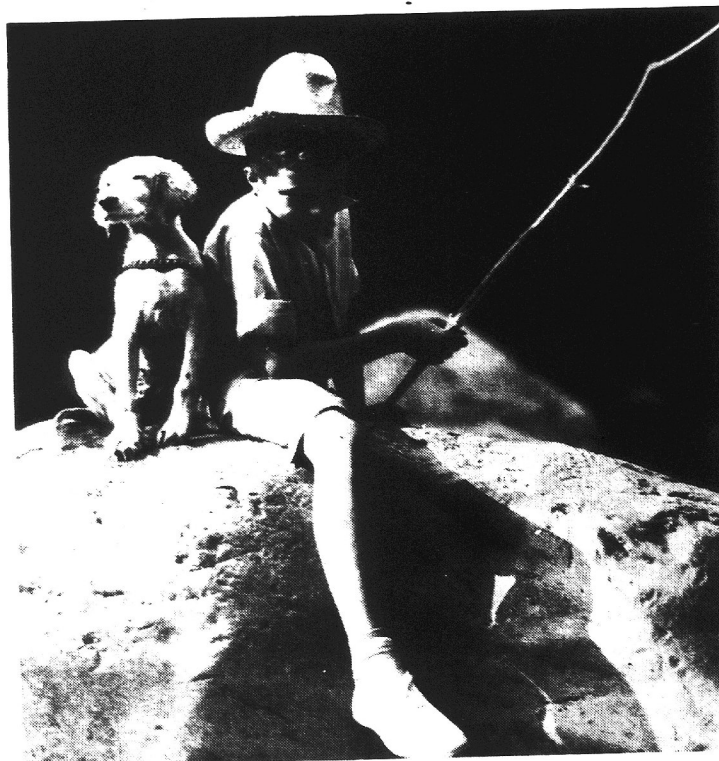
