Many, many years ago, a family lived in a log cabin in the corner of what is now our yard. The family was large and closely-knit. As each child married, the father built a cabin for the newlyweds, and soon many houses es dotted It became little the area. In time, the houses of Pucky Huddle were vacated and one t they were either by one torn down or burned. The original cabin was torn down sometime after the turn of the century when our house was built. Logs from it were used as sills in a machine shed, all that remains of the settlement.

We have lived in Pucky Huddle over 17 years, preserving the name and planning to erect a sign that says: Pucky Huddle -- Pop 4. It is our refuge, a place to with-draw, restore and predraw, restore and pre-pare for a new week. We love it dearly but we wage a constant bat-tle with the primeval jungle that must have

choked the little vill-age to death. Horseweeds with stalks as thick as a child's arm grow so tall a man standing on a tractor cannot see over them. Thistles as sharp as any Thistles as sharp as any acupuncture kit thrive in spite of our constant attempt to eradicate them. Rocks and pebbles dot the fields as if sprinkled from a giant salt shaker.

In the years we have battled the jungles of Pucky Huddle I have also tried to get a sun tan-with the same amount of success. Not being able to simply lie there with all those weeds around, I have tried to combine sunning with weeding.

Unfortunately, I'm not a physical creature, preferring reading or decorating to pulling weeds, and I don't really like the sun. I want a tan without being in the sun and I want the weeds pulled without weeds pulled without losing my place in what-ever book I happen to be reading.

As I tugged on horseweeds and gingerly dug around thistles this week-end, my back bared to the sun, I grumbled, weeds and

As I became tired, not tanned, just exhausted, I alternated. Pull a wheelbarrow full of weeds, have a glass of lemonade and read in the shade. That made the work more enjoyable and time passed quickly. I finished a biography and

started a mystery story. The epitah on my tombstone, probably a rock from Pucky Huddle, will undoubtedly read: Here lies Ann

Poor girl never did tan

She'd rather read in the shade

And drink lemonade. And can there be any question as to what tree and flower will provide summer shade and winter thorns and stickers?



Sp 4 Yeakley Killed In Vietnam

Sp4 Robin Ray Yeakley, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Yeakley, South Bend, has been reported killed in action in Vi-

etnam on June 11, 1972. Mrs. Yeakley is the former Pauline Bradway Akron.

Robin was an observer on a visual reconnais-sance mission over Thua Thien Province. Republic of So. Vietnam, when the aircraft was fired upon by a hostile ground force and burst into flames. Crew members of other aircraft on the mission reported Robin's aircraft crashed immediately and continued to burn and that the ammunition aboard the air-craft exploded. Other aircraft flew over the crash site at low level and reported no one existed on the downed aircraft although they were unable to land and seaunable to land and sea-rch the wreckage due to the heavy volume of en-emy fire and the ter-rain. The continued presence of hostile forces has precluded a search of the crash site for any of the bodies, according to Maj. Gen. Verne L. Bowers.

He had earlier bee reported missing in ac-tion but his status was changed following a re-view of the findings of a board of officers con-vened in Vietnam that investigated the cirinvestigated the circumstances surrounding his missing status.

her craft into four steps and works on many eggs simultaneously.

Initial step is cutt-g openings. There may Initial step is cutting openings. There may be hinged doors and a rear window. This, according to the egg lady, is the most delicate step. If the egg cracks, it must be thrown ways but only the delicate step. away, but only two doz en have been rejected

en nave been rejected in two years.

Cutting is done with a tiny electric saw, similar to a dentist's drill with its minute circular blade.

Application of finish follows. E to be left natural, Eggs ail and turkey, receive many coats of lacquer many coats of lacquer carden the shell. to Colored eggs take several lacquer coats, followed by up to ten coats of paint. Each application requires a one day drying time.

Hanging the doors is step three. Eggs may have single oval doors, zigzag cut double doors or the top half may fold back. Whatever the style, the liliputian brass hinges are care-fully attached with acrylic glue.

Decorating is the final process and makes each egg unique. Materials are varied and highly imaginative, ranging from cut stones and pearls to tiny figures and pictures.



Woodlawn Hospital to close 1935 section to patients

The 1935 wing of Wood-lawn hospital will be closed to in-patient closed to in-p care starting in-patient of bringing the building up to fire safety standards is too high, according to an announce-ment made this week by the hospital's board of trustees.

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Logue, hospital Don Logue, mospital administrator, said the move would reduce the number of in-patient beds from 61 to 41 with 10 of these being for obstetrics patients. He said it would not affect

said it would not affect the quality of patient care in any manner. Logue said the hospi-tal averaged 37 in-pat-ients per day last year and noted Monday's cen-sus was 35, including

two O.B. patients.
Board action followed receipt of a report from Hewitt and Royer of Kansas City, Mo., its arch-itectural engineering firm, that estimated it would cost \$314,734 to follow the 19 recommendations for fire safety made by State Fire Mar-shall Harvey Hacker on his May 4, 1972, inspection.

Logue said, "People will have to be sick to stay in the hospital. Doctors will have to see to it that their pati-ents are dismissed when they no longer need hos-pital care." He noted, too, that closing the too, that closing the 1935 wing to in-patient care "might bring some temporary inconvenience to patients and visitors in case of unusually heavy use" and said there may be some oc-casions when patients will have to be kept in hallways for awhile.

There are 24 in-patient beds in the 1935 wing and 37 in the "new" section that was added in 1956.

Changes planned would include using the presrecovery ent two-bed recovery room for in-patients, moving the recovery pa-tients to the present central supply room next to the surgical suite which would then be mov-The present treatment room would along ed into the 1935 wing. two-bed in-patient room, the treatment room also moving to the old wing. He also noted some non-infectious female surgical patients might be placed in some of the obstetrics rooms.

Closing the 1935 wing would leave the hospital with only one private room as compared to 13 it now has.

The old wing will be used for administrative, clerical and out-patient functions.

A referendum conducted in conjunction with last May's primary election May's primary election resulted in 2,927 "no" votes and 2,893 "yes" votes on the question of building a new hos-pital which would have required federal funds. Following the referend um, the county council voted 5-2 against giving the necessary backing to get Hill-Burton funds and the three commissioners also voted again-

This is the age of nutrition awareness. Un-fortunately much of we hear and read what we hear and read is not good nutrition information. Adelle Da-vis and Dr. Sillman seem to get more publicity to get more publicity then the nutrition ex-perts who rightly de-serve it. Perhaps the reason for this is that Adelle Davis and Dr. Sillman make nutrition exciting but perhaps stretching the truth slightly.

One vitamin that Adelle Davis spends much of her time discussing is

Vitamin E.

In 1922 two men at the University of Californ-ia discovered an unknown fat - soluble substance reproduction in rats. It has been considered important vitamin for man and animals sin-ce that time.

The exact functions of vitamin E have not been clearly defined. Vitamin E has been found to have antioxident properties. So its function seems to be to protect other nutrients from destruction by oxidation. Research is continuing to pin point other functions.

The Food and Nutrition Board has not set a re-commended allowance for

vitamin E but suggests that between 10 to 30 mg. per day satisfies the requirement for the requirement for a-dults. Vitamin E is widely distributed in nature which makes a deficiency most unlike-

Vitamin E has been romoted as an "anti promoted as sterility" v vitamin and as an effective agent against heart attacks. Unfortunately, those claims are not based on results from around nutritional experiments.

By eating a well rounded diet you are assured of getting an adequate supply of vitamin E. pply of vitamin E. function research is completed, we will learn more about the specific function of Vitamin E.


