Janelle Kistler takes medals at White River

Mentone eighth grade track star Janelle Kistler, daughter of Dean and Jane Kistler, Rt. 1, Mentone, distinguished herself statewide by being a medalist at the 1984 White River State Park athletic meet.

Kistler, 12, won the gold medal in the long jump with a jump of 14'9", missing the state record by 1/4 inch. She also brought home the silver medal for the 200 yard dash with a time of 29:53.

The White River games, held Saturday, July 21, brought the best athletes in the State together to compete in their individual areas of expertise. Kistler qualified for the games by winning the Fort Wayne

regional, which was one of four regionals held throughout Indiana. The top two winners from each regional then advanced to the final games in Indianapolis.

Pat Silveus opens Mentone office

Dr. Patrick Silveus formally opened the doors to his family practice last Monday, July 30 in Mentone. Dr. Silveus, who grew up near Bourbon, returned to this area after completing his family practice residency at Methodist Hospital, Indianapolis on June 30 this year.

Dr. Silveus, a 1972 graduate of Triton High School, completed his undergraduate work at Purdue University in 1977 and took his first year of medical school at Purdue in West Lafayette before attending the IU Medical School, which he finished in 1981. Rather than doing a one-year residency, Silveus then decided to take the three-year family practice residency at Methodist Hospital, which is one of the oldest and most complete family residencies in the country. He received specialized training in pediatrics, internal medicine, surgery, obstetrics and gynecology and psychiatry, and he also worked with orthopedics, ear, nose and throat, radiology and geriatrics.

Earlier this month, Silveus took his examination for board certification by the American Academy of Family Physicians. If accepted as a member of the Academy, he will receive an additional 150 hours of continuing medical education cred-

its every three years plus take a re-certification exam every six years to ensure he is kept familiar with current medical procedures and research.

Silveus, the son of Mary and Eldon Silveus, Bourbon, is married to the former Jana Graham, the daughter of Jana and Brenton Graham, Warsaw. Mrs. Silveus is also a graduate of Triton High School. While her husband worked on his medical degree, she worked as a secretary for the president and vice-president of the Purdue Student Association, and she later worked as an administrative assistant for an agricultural development-training firm in Indianapolis. The couple has three sons, Tyson (ten), Adam (six), and Noah (two and a half).

Working with Dr. Silveus at his office will be his wife, who will share working with Terri Snyder, Mentone, as receptionist and bookkeeper, and nurse Glenda King, Plymouth, who is also a former Bourbon resident. His hours will be Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Wednesday and Saturday 9 a.m. to noon. Appointments may be made by calling 353-7561.

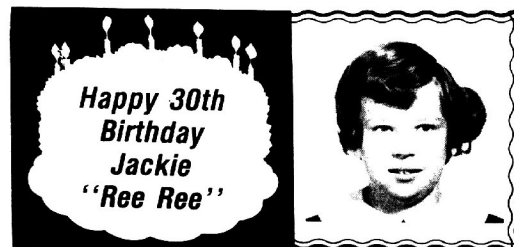

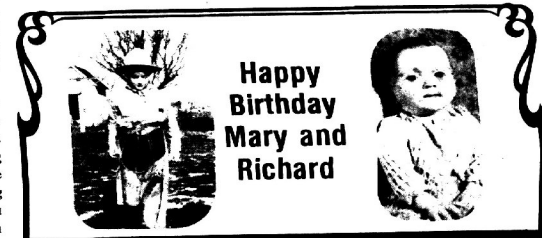



PUBLIC NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE TO CONTROL AND PROTECT ANIMALS
IN THE TOWN OF AKRON, INDIANA, AND PROVIDE FOR
THE PROCEDURES AND PENALTIES IN VIOLATION THEREOF:

BE IT ORDAINED, BY THE TOWN BOARD OF AKRON, INDIANA:

SECTION 1: For the purpose of this Ordinance the following terms shall have the following meanings:

ANIMAL: Any animal other than man and includes birds, fish, mammals and reptiles, wild or domestic.

ANIMAL CONTROL COMMISSION: The Fulton County Humane Society Animal Control Commission organized for the purpose of representing a viable animal control and rescue program in Fulton County.

ANIMAL SHELTER: The Fulton County Humane Society Animal Shelter located at RR #3, Monticello Road, Rochester, Indiana, for the purpose of impounding and/or caring for animals held under the authority of this Ordinance or State Law.

HUMANE OFFICER: Any person or persons designated by the Fulton County Humane Society as a law enforcement officer who is qualified to perform such duties under the authority of this Ordinance and the State.

TOWN ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER: A Deputy Marshal of the Town of Akron appointed by the Marshal for the Town of Akron for the purpose of enforcing the Animal Control Ordinance of the Town.

HUMANE SOCIETY: The Fulton County Humane Society, Inc.

KENNEL: Any premises wherein any person engages in the business of boarding, breeding, buying, letting for hire, training for a fee, or selling dogs or cats.

OWNER: Any person, partnership or corporation owning, keeping, or harboring one or more animals. An animal shall be deemed to be owned if kept or harbored, fed or sheltered for three consecutive days or more.

PERSON: Any individual, partnership, company, or corporation.

PET: Any animal kept for pleasure rather than utility.

PUBLIC NUISANCE: Any animal or animals which: 1) Molest passersby or passing vehicles. 2) Attacks other animals. 3) Trespasses on school grounds. 4) Is repeatedly at large. 5) Damages private or public property. 6) Barks, whines, or howls in an excessive, continuous, or untimely fashion.

RESTRAINT: A leash, lead or barrier used to control or confine an animal.

RESTRAINT OF AN ANIMAL: An animal secured by a leash or lead, or under the control of a responsible person and obedient to that person's commands, or within the real property limits of its owner.

SECTION 2: ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER: DUTIES: AUTHORIZATION AND IMPOUNDING
The town animal control officer, Humane Officer or any other police officer may pick up and impound any animal found to be in violation of any provision of this Ordinance. Animals impounded under this section shall be impounded for a period of not less than five (5) days. During such time the owner, harbinger, or keeper thereof may secure the release of such animal upon proof that he has duly registered the animal, if registration of the animal is required. If the animal is a dog, the owner shall provide proof that a dog license for the current year has been issued and that the animal has a current rabies inoculation.

If the animal is not so redeemed, the town animal control officer shall deliver the animal to the county dog warden, or make such other disposition as the town animal control officer deems appropriate.

SECTION 3: INOCULATIONS:

Every owner, keeper or harbinger of any dog or cat within the limits of the Town of Akron shall cause such dog or cat to be inoculated by a practicing Doctor of Veterinary Medicine with a prophylactic serum to prevent rabies at least once a year, and not more than twelve (12) months shall elapse between successive inoculations. Any person, partnership or corporation found to be in violation of this section is guilty of a Class C Infraction.

SECTION 4: BODILY INJURY

In the event any person who harbors a dog or cat which is over six (6) months of age and is not immunized against rabies and allows such dog or cat to run loose with the result that bodily injury is inflicted upon a human being, such person shall be guilty of a Class B Infraction.

SECTION 5: PROCEDURE WHEN BITTEN

It shall be the duty of the owner or caretaker of any dog or cat within the Town of Akron to immediately notify the Town Marshal or Deputy Marshal, and the Fulton County Health Department whenever his or her dog or cat has bitten any person within the Town limits. Upon notification the Marshal or Deputy Marshal or any other police officer or Humane Officer shall order the animal confined and held in observation for a period of not less than ten (10) days.

Any animal which dies during the period of observation, or is killed subsequent to having bitten an individual or other animal and is suspected of having rabid shall have its head removed, packed in ice and container, and the head shall be forwarded immediately to the laboratory of the State Board of Health for examination.

Said animal must be isolated in strict confinement under proper care and observation in an approved place of confinement as follows:

- a. The Fulton County Animal Shelter,
- b. A veterinary hospital or licensed kennel,
- c. Confinement on the owner's premises may be permitted only if the following conditions exist:
 - 1) The animal is protected by a current valid rabies vaccination and is currently licensed.
 - 2) The animal is in the low risk group of large farm animals such as a cow or horse, or is a dog or cat under the age of four (4) months.
 - 3) The animal is isolated in an occupied dwelling or under restraint at all times in a building or yard and is not roaming at large or in a yard with a fence high enough to make it difficult for children to enter, tight enough to keep a child's hands from entering, and sound enough to keep the animal enclosed.
 - 4) The animal is not in contact with other animals or persons other than the person(s) providing care.
 - 5) The animal is kept under proper care with adequate and sanitary facilities.
 - 6) The animal is readily available for inspection by the Fulton County Humane Officer or Town Animal Control Officer.
 - 7) Dwellings which are habitually unoccupied during daylight hours are not acceptable for quarantine purposes.
 - 8) The quarantined animal may not be moved until the designated release date established by the Fulton County Humane Officer.

Examination shall be made by any police officer or Humane Officer of said quarantine quarters if the animal is quarantined on the owner's property and if the above stated requirements are not met the animal shall be taken from the property by the police officer or Humane Officer and impounded at the Fulton County Humane Shelter.

All expenses incurred for the keeping of such animal or the necessary tests to determine whether rabies exist shall be borne exclusively by the owner or keeper of said animal.

Any person having any knowledge of the existence of any rabies or the fact that any animal has bitten any other animal or person who shall fail to immediately report such information to the Akron Police Department or county Humane officer is in violation of this section and is guilty of a Class C Infraction.

If at the end of the ten (10) day quarantine period a practicing Doctor of Veterinary Medicine is convinced that the animal is free of rabies such animal shall be released from quarantine.

SECTION 6: PROHIBITING THE KEEPING OF DANGEROUS ANIMALS

It shall be unlawful for any person to keep, maintain or have in his possession or under his control within the Town limits of Akron any dangerous animal.

Dangerous animals include any wild animal, reptile, or fowl which is not naturally tame or gentle, but is of a wild nature or disposition and which because of its size, vicious nature or propensity if it escaped from secure quarters would cause injury.

Dangerous animals also include any domestic animal, reptile or fowl which because of its size or propensity or other characteristic would constitute a danger to human life or property if it escaped from secure quarters.

Persons found to be in violation of this section are guilty of a Class C Infraction.

If any dangerous animal escapes from the person having charge or control of said animal, and the animal without provocation endangers, destroys, or constitutes a danger to human life or the life of any other animal or property, and can not be immediately and safely recaptured, it shall be destroyed by any police officer or humane officer.

SECTION 7: INFECTED ANIMALS AND DISPOSITION OF DISEASED ANIMALS

No domesticated animal afflicted with a contagious or infectious disease shall be allowed to run at large or be exposed in any public place whereby the health of man or beast may be affected, nor

shall any animal be shipped from or removed from the premises of the owner or keeper thereof except under the supervision of the animal control officer of Humane Officer.

It is hereby made the duty of the town animal control officer, police officer or humane officer to secure such disposition of any diseased animal and such treatment of infected premises as to prevent the communication of disease or infection (or communication of infection) except where the State Veterinarian is empowered to do so.

SECTION 8: ANIMAL CARE AND CRUELTY

Every Owner of an animal within the Corporate limits of the Town of Akron, Indiana shall:

a. Keep such animal in a clean, sanitary and healthy area. No animal shall be confined to an area so as to be forced to stand, sit, or lie in its own excreta.

b. Not confine an animal in an area littered with debris or any other obstacles which would impede, prohibit or reduce the animal's movement or cause injury within such area of confinement.

c. Confine the animal in an area of sufficient size to permit such animal to exercise and move about.

d. Not prevent in any way any animal from seeking proper shelter, including, roping, or fencing in any animal.

e. Not tether a dog by a choke collar or chain or similar means of restraint less than ten (10) feet in length or of such weight as to prevent the animal from moving about or causing injury to such animal.

f. Not fail to provide the animal with sufficient wholesome food and clean water.

g. Not fail to provide the animal with proper soundly and effectively constructed shelter and protection from the varying elements of the weather at all times.

h. Not fail to provide the animal with proper humane and veterinary care and counsel for sick, injured or diseased animals and shall segregate such animals from the healthy so as to prevent transmittal of any sickness or disease.

i. No person shall cruelly ill treat, beat, torment, overload, overwork, or otherwise abuse or mistreat any animal.

j. No person shall injure or cause to be injured any animal by means of any motor vehicle, firearm or any other instrument or object and fail to immediately report the existence, location, description and tag number, if any, of such injured animal to the police or humane society and in doing so shall give his name and address.

k. No person shall abandon any animal on any public or private place including a public or private highway or street or upon the property of another.

l. No person shall keep or use any animal for the purpose of fighting or cause or permit any fighting or other combat between animals within the town limits. No person shall be party to or present as a spectator to any such fighting or combat between animals. No person shall knowingly suffer or permit the use of any building, yard, ground, or any other premises belonging to any person for any fighting or combat between animals, and no person shall carry, haul, or deliver any animal for the aforementioned purposes.

m. No person shall expose any known poisonous substance, whether mixed with food or not, so that the same shall be liable to be consumed by any animal except in the control of rodents.

Any person found to be in violation of this section is guilty of a Class B Infraction.

SECTION 9: BREEDING RESTRICTIONS

No person or persons shall keep or harbor at any one residence or business or other address within the Town of Akron, more than two (2) female dogs or cats for the purpose of commercial breeding, provided that all such females are confined in such a manner that they can not come into contact with a male except for planned breeding. Such confinement shall be maintained at all times during the period of estrus.

Persons found to be in violation of this section are guilty of a Class C Infraction.

SECTION 10: FAILURE TO CONFINEMENT ANIMALS

The owner or person having charge of any animal within the Town limits shall at all times keep the animal confined upon the premises of the owner or person in charge or under absolute physical control when off the premises. In the event such animal is being walked on a leash or lead, said leash or lead shall not exceed ten (10) feet in length.

The running-at-large of any animal off the premises of the owner or person having charge of the animal is prima facie evidence of failure to keep an animal confined in violation of this section and such owner or person is guilty of a Class C Infraction.

If the offender has previously been convicted under this section, then such a violation of this section is aggravated failure to keep an animal confined and is guilty of a Class B Infraction.

SECTION 11: BARKING, HOWLING, OR OFFENSIVE ANIMALS

No person shall own, harbor, or keep any dog, cat or other animal within the Town limits which by frequent or habitual barking, howling, yelping or otherwise creates unreasonably loud and disturbing noises of such character, intensity or duration as to disturb the peace, quiet, and good order of the Town.

No person shall own, harbor, or keep any dog, cat, or other animal which, by biting, scratching, digging, jumping, running, frolicking, urinating, defecating, vomiting, or otherwise inflicts damages, soles, defaces, or betrays any person, lawn, tree, shrub, plant, building, street, sidewalk, or other public or private property without the permission of the property owner or person in charge of such property. The restriction as to defecating imposed by this section shall not be applicable to public property when the owner, harbinger, or keeper of such dog, cat, or other animal immediately and completely removes all feces deposited by such dog, cat, or other animal and disposes of same in a sanitary manner, nor to cases in which Seeing Eye Dogs are leading legally blind persons.

Any person found to be in violation of this section is guilty of a Class C Infraction.

SECTION 12: DEFECATION ON PUBLIC OR PRIVATE PROPERTY

No owner, keeper, or harbinger of any dog, cat, or other animal shall knowingly permit the animal to defecate on property, either public or private, of another without the owner, keeper, or harbinger having in his possession the necessary tools or equipment to remove the fecal matter immediately.

Any person found to be in violation of this section is guilty of a Class C Infraction.

SECTION 13: ANIMAL OWNERS LIABLE FOR DAMAGES TO PROPERTY

The owner, keeper, or harbinger of any dog, cat, or other animal which damages or destroys parks or other public property or private property shall be held liable for the full value of the damaged or destroyed property in addition to any penalty imposed for violation of this Ordinance.

SECTION 14: DEAD ANIMALS

No person being the owner, keeper, or harbinger of any animal which shall die or be killed other than for slaughter for meat, shall permit the carcass of such animal to lie or remain unburied within the limits of the Town of Akron for more than five (5) hours after he or any member of his household or any employee shall have knowledge thereof. If, because of the circumstances, the animal control officer or any other agent of the Town is required to pick up and dispose of the animal carcass a pick up and transportation fee of five dollars (\$5.00) shall be levied against the owner or keeper of the animal.

SECTION 15: HUNTING PROHIBITED

The hunting of game birds, game animals, or protected birds or animals within the Corporate limits of the Town of Akron is prohibited.

No person shall hunt, kill, or attempt to kill any game animal, game bird, or otherwise protected animal or bird by the use of firearms, compressed air or compressed gas or spring-powered weapons or by any other means. Persons found to be in violation of this section are guilty of a Class C Infraction.

SECTION 16: LOCATION RESTRICTIONS

It shall be unlawful to keep, harbor, or house any cattle, sheep, hogs, horses, or fowl within the Corporate Limits of the Town of Akron. Any person found to be in violation of this section is guilty of a Class C Infraction. Each day a person is found to be in violation of this section shall be considered a separate offense.

SECTION 17: PRIOR ORDINANCES REPEALED

This Ordinance does repeal any and all ordinances, or parts thereof, which may be in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 18: EFFECTIVE DATE

The effective date of this ordinance shall be from and after passage and publication thereof in the manner provided by law.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:

This letter is inspired by a discussion I saw on the Donahue Show, a few months ago. I was astounded when the proponents of evolution stated it was a "science" and therefore should be taught in our schools. In contrast they argued that dinosaurs were a myth and a fact that could not be allowed in the schools.

For decades now, I have always heard it referred to as the "theory" of evolution. So as not to be considered behind the times, I took it upon myself to check and make sure it was a science.

First, we must go back to the beginning, if we are to be fair about this appraisal. So a little investigation turned up the fact that it all started out with the "Big Bang." (See National Geographic Mag. June 83). For years they (the evolutionists) were undecided and had the "Big Bang," the "steady State" and the "Collapsing" theory. Thank goodness they've now narrowed it down to one theory, so we can relax somewhat.

The "Big Bang" idea started out with the whole universe squeezed down into an area about the size of an atom. Not just the Milky Way, but the whole known universe. Then it blew up. At 10⁻⁴³ second, it let go and by the 10⁻⁶ second it had expanded to the orbit of Pluto. Are you still with me?

As you know, it takes light some eight minutes to reach the earth, the sun being 93,000,000 miles distant. However, Pluto is some 40 times further away, and it takes light four hours or more to reach that planet. Science tells us that light travels at the speed of 186,000 miles per second, and nothing can travel faster than that or it simply vanishes. Yet the "Big Bang" advocates tell us that in less than one decillion of a second it had reached out some 4,000,000,000 miles. That far exceeds the speed of light. To put it in round numbers, it would be 37 zeros followed by a four and consider the atom that started the "Big Bang." It is so small that the scientist can only theorize about it, but expanded into a mass of 10⁷⁹ power, the estimates size of the whole universe.

This so intrigued me that I researched a book written by Mr. Gribbin, doctor of astrophysics at Cambridge. The volume is "Genesis" and is very interesting. According to Dr. Gribbin, the "Big Bang" did reach the orbit of Pluto and exceeded the speed of light for a very simple reason, which I in my innocence somehow overlooked. Before the "Big Bang" there was no space. There was just nothing

out there. Nothing. Nothing. Dr. Gribbin envisions the universe as a big balloon that is slowly being blown up by a thin soup consisting of hydrogen and helium atoms. Inside this balloon is space and matter, and outside nothing. No space, no nothing. So space and matter are both inside the balloon, and started with the "Big Bang" and since there was nothing out there (0) the balloon could expand at tremendous speed, therefore exceeding the speed of light.

This then brings up another interesting question. If there was no space in the first place on the outside and nothing on the inside (remember the atom), we have a paradox. We have nothing on the outside and we have nothing on the inside. So nothing times nothing equals all of space and the known universe. When I went to school, I was taught that 0 x 0 = 0. So nothing times nothing should still equal nothing.

Another thorn in the side of the cosmologist is the fact that theoretically this balloon and the universe should expand evenly like a balloon. However, we know that the universe is not round in all directions but shaped more like a doughnut, wider than it is thick. So how could the "Big Bang" blow up like a smoke ring, when it came from a central point of explosion?

If space slows down the speed of light as they admit, the speed of light (being faster on the outside than the inside) is not constant. If it takes eight minutes for light to reach the earth from the sun, 93,000,000 miles distant, how long does it take to reach us from a distant galaxy? The longer it travels through this soupy space, the slower it must go. If it goes four decillion miles per second out in "nothing" space down to 186,000 miles per second just from the sun, then from the edge of the universe some 20,000,000,000 light years away, it must come to a screeching halt.

Now if this is all somewhat bewildering to you, you are not alone. Many cosmologists cannot agree among themselves. Alan Guth of MIT made the remark, that the inflationary universe attempts to build the universe out of almost nothing. It may be the ultimate free lunch.

Michael Turner, physicist at the University of Chicago, made the remark, "To get a universe that has been expanding as long as ours has without either collapsing or having its matter coast away would require extraordinary fine tuning." The odds to that, he says, would be like throwing a microscopic dart to the most distant quasar and hitting a target 1/8 inch in diameter.

Another astrophysicist reasons that the "Big Bang," after it blew, would have created large supermassive particles and collapsed upon itself in some 30,000 years.

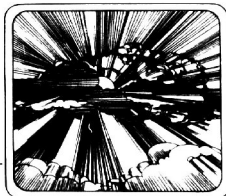

Mentone continues to battle water, sewage problems

In what's become an almost monthly ritual, members of Mentone's Town Board listened to residents complain about town water and sewage, but there was a new twist in that one of the major problems was reported by trustee Miriam Boardman.

Boardman found herself on the unpleasant side of being a homeowner with a drainage problem that causes her basement to flood after even a moderate amount of rainfall. She reported that not only do they have water, but that a heavy oil is mixed with the fluid.

Trustees Jim Miller and Wayne Tombaugh and town superintendent Rod Holloway discussed the problem, possible causes and possible solutions with Boardman at last Monday's meeting of the board.

Tombaugh stated he felt the problem was connected to the county ditch that is currently causing other drainage problems for the town. The Kosciusko County Drainage Board was to have met Monday, also, and Tombaugh reported they would contact the town as to when they could schedule a meeting to discuss responsibility for the ditch.

Two residents from the northwest section of town (north of SR 19) attended the meeting to complain about the water. Not only is the water heavily laden with iron, but they reported there is so much debris in the water it's unfit for consumption. Earlier this year, Holloway tried flushing some of the hydrants on a weekly basis, but the residents reported that had worked only haphazardly and then not for

long.

Holloway was instructed to price small iron filters, and Tombaugh offered to conduct a survey among others in the troubled section of town to discover if they're having similar problems.

In other business: Boardman reported several people have been dumping at the lot in the cemetery without receiving permission from the board. According to caretaker Darrell King, the wanton dumping has left a terrible mess that needs to be cleaned. Boardman suggested the lot be burnt off and the nonflammable trash bulldozed and buried. Trustees were unanimous in agreeing there is to be no more dumping of any trash at the site. (See special notice this page.)

Holloway and Miller reported a total of 27 new water meters have been received and most of them installed. Board members instructed Holloway to order 12 more meters for the next quarter.

Miller reported the Chevy truck was sold to Willard Wagner for \$800.

Gerald Construction Company is beginning street work in Mentone, according to Miller. Approximately \$10,000 in chip and seal repair will be completed by the Rochester firm.

Phil Tackitt attended the meeting with Mentone Marshal Russ Hart to express his interest in becoming a reserve officer. Tackitt, who recently completed a four-year stint in the Navy, offered to work without pay in exchange for the opportunity to gain experience as a law enforcement agent. He

stated he plans to apply for the spring class of the State Police Academy, but he wants to have experience first.

Board members agreed four reserve officers are all the town needs, but they questioned Hart about one reserve officer who rarely assists. Hart agreed to approach the officer in question to see if he wanted to withdraw as a reserve; if so, Tackitt will be appointed to fill the position.

ORDINANCE

WHEREAS, P.L. 44-1984 allows municipalities to establish a municipal Cumulative Capital Development Fund; and

WHEREAS: The Town of Akron finds that such a fund is necessary and prudent for the financial well being of the municipality;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Board of Akron:

Section 1. That there is hereby established an Akron Cumulative Capital Development Fund.

Section 2. That an ad valorem property tax levy will be imposed and the revenues from the levy will be retained in the Akron Cumulative Capital Development Fund.

Section 3. That the maximum rate of levy under Section 2 will not exceed:

a. .04 per \$100 assessed valuation for 1985

b. .08 per \$100 assessed valuation for 1986

c. .12 per \$100 assessed valuation for 1987

Section 4. That the funds accumulated in the Akron Cumulative Capital Development Fund will be used for capital improvements as described in IC 36-9-16.2, Cumulative Building Fund.

Section 5. Notwithstanding Section 4, funds accumulated in the Akron Cumulative Capital Development Fund may be spent for purposes other than the purposes stated in Section 4, if the purpose is to protect the public health, welfare or safety in an emergency situation which demands immediate action. Money may be spent under the authority of this section only after the Town Board President issued a declaration that the public health, welfare or safety is in immediate danger that requires the expenditure of money in the fund.

Section 6. This fund takes effect upon approval of the State Board of Tax Commissioners.

Pioneer Building offers nostalgia

Indianapolis . . . Step out of today, into yesterday and remember the good ol' days with fondness at the Pioneer Building on the Indiana State Fairgrounds. Collections and exhibits, story-

telling and a village reconstruction make this nostalgic attraction one of the most popular spots at the Fair, according to State Fair Director, Stanley Andrew.

"Wheat - Mainstay of the Early American," this year's demonstration theme, was selected because of the crop's incredibly versatile nature. Wheat was used by the early pioneers for bread and animal feed as well as bedding and other practical items. A 10-horse sweep, threshing machines, grain separators and other old small grain machinery will process the wheat before Fair visitors.

A village, Possum Holler, is erected in front of the building for the duration of the 12-day exposition, depicting an old pioneer settlement. Over 100 people stage the re-creation which includes craftsmen, artisans, cooks and music makers. A broom maker and leather worker will join basket makers, wood workers and other farm craftsmen to provide audiences with an authentic look at early American lifestyle.

The Pioneer Building, a veritable farm life museum, houses over 3,000 artifacts collected by Purdue

Agricultural Alumni Association for a display that is the largest of its kind in Indiana. A log cabin, stands proudly in the center of the building. The cabin is a replica of the Johnson cabin, the first homestead on the Indiana State Fairgrounds until 1921.

Highlighting the Pioneer Building festivities is the popular Antique Tractor Show. This latest rage in farm collecting brings 70 restored tractors together for a judging worth \$1,100 to winning machine owner. Since many of the companies that manufactured these tractors no longer exist, restoration enthusiasts spent many long hours searching junkyards and often end up making their own machine parts. The process of restoration is a very expensive one and some tractors are worth more than \$15,000 when completed.

In addition to the demonstrations, collections and craftsmen, story-tellers and the Central Indiana Folk Music Society will provide day-long entertainment. An expected quarter million Fairgoers are expected to visit the Pioneer Building, a hot spot at the Indiana State Fair Aug. 15 - 26.

Salt Standards Set

Starting in July 1985, many processed foods must list sodium content. The new rules announced recently by the Food and Drug Administration will apply to those manufacturers that fortify their products or make nutritional claims for their foods. The regulations also set standards for products marketed with special labels such as low sodium defined as 140 mg. of sodium or less per serving or unsalted food processed without salt. Sodium which occurs naturally in many foods, is an essential mineral, but many Americans consume up to 7000 mg. daily far more than they need. A teaspoon of salt contains about 2000 mg., and a daily intake of 1100 to 3300 mg. is considered safe and adequate. Secretary of Health and Human Services Margaret M. Heckler said that the new rules are of special importance to the many Americans with high blood pressure, who often can lower it by cutting down on salt and losing weight.

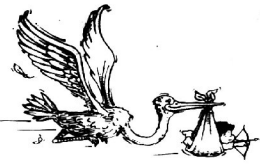

Mentone Cemetery Regulations

BURIALS

An outer container is required for burial and the cost of this container is to be paid by the persons involved with the burial, such as relatives, the estate of the deceased, or the funeral director, and will not be paid by the cemetery. The outer container can be either a vault or grave liner with solid sides and top and made of concrete, steel, fiberglass, copper, stainless steel, or approved plastic.

Exceptions to above rule:

1. A casket-vault combination may be used if approved first by a representative of the Cemetery Board.
2. Infants. Many casket-vault combinations may be used if comparable in quality to those manufactured by Wilburt Co. or McCord Co. No styrofoam units may be used as an outer enclosure.
3. If for religious reasons a rough box made of wood is used as the outer enclosure, a maintenance fee of \$200 must be paid on or before the day of burial.

FOUNDATIONS FOR MONUMENTS

1. Made only of concrete with a minimum of 4 in. margin on all sides of stone and minimum of 18 in. depth.
2. The hole for the foundation must have straight sides and a flat bottom, no rounded corners.
3. Landscaping must be done to allow the wheel of a lawn mower to run across the foundation, which is to be no higher than 1 inch above ground.
4. The sexton must be contacted before a foundation may be installed.

PLANTING, FLOWERS AND SHRUBBERY

1. All flowers must be placed within the line of the headstones.
2. Before planting - all shrubbery and plantings must be approved by the Cemetery Board.
3. All shrubbery shall be maintained or will be removed at the owners expense.

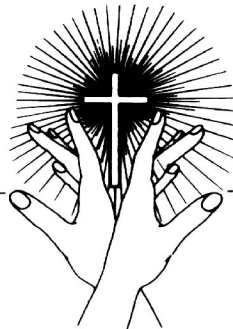

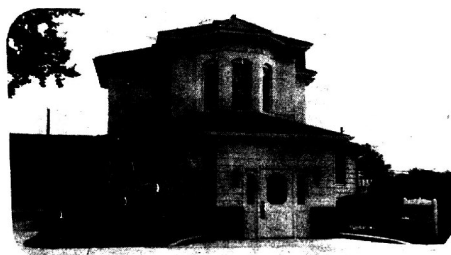
Notice to Franklin Township Residents in Montone Town

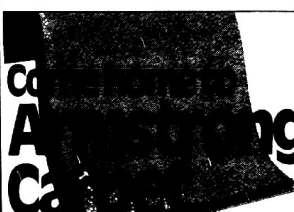

1984 the year of the Big Sneeze?

The more than 18 million hay fever sufferers in the United States will remember 1984 as the Year of the Big Sneeze. According to the American Lung Association, 1984 will go down as one of the worst years in history for victims of hay fever. The heavy spring rains accelerated the pollen blooms which then were borne on the winds over the length and breadth of this continent.

For the one in 20 Americans who suffer from this serious ailment, hay fever is no joke. It is an allergic disorder that can cause headache, irritability, insomnia and gastric disturbances. The chief symptoms are sneezing spasms; stuffed-up running nose; red swollen and itching eyes; and itchy throat and mouth. Also, hearing may be impaired and infections of ears or sinuses may result. An even more

serious complication is the asthma that 30 percent of chronic hay fever sufferers develop.

Hay fever has nothing to do with fever. It is caused by sensitivity to airborne pollens of trees, grasses and weeds that invade the air seasonally and vary according to regional climates, so hay fever can occur during spring, summer or fall.

At least 75 percent of people with hay fever are sensitive to ragweed, although an individual may react to more than one pollen so that his own "season" can last from early spring through to the first frost. It must have been a truly satanic botanist who dreamed up Ambrosia as the Latin name for ragweed, the most common offender among all the pollens. Among the many other villainous flora is the Russian

thistle which is particularly persistent and pesky. Despite its biblical name, the burning bush is another offender—it primarily affects the Great Plains states.

No matter how intensely you suffer, no matter how much you think you're going to die, hay fever won't kill you. But since it can result in troublesome and even severe complications, consult your doctor and follow his or her advice.

Though there is no cure yet for hay fever, there are up-to-date methods to ease the symptoms. If your doctor thinks desensitizing injections will help, you should start them before the hay fever season and stick to them without skipping. And stay alert for possible complications, including a real nose or throat infection, or the development of asthma.

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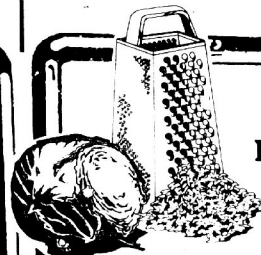

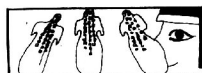

WHEREAS, P.L. 44-1984 allows municipalities to establish a municipal Cumulative Capital Development Fund; and

WHEREAS, The Town of Akron finds that such a fund is necessary and prudent for the financial well being of the municipality;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Board of Akron:

Section 1. That there is hereby established an Akron Cumulative Capital Development Fund.

Section 2. That an ad valorem property tax levy will be imposed and the revenues from the levy will be retained in the Akron Cumulative Capital Development Fund.

Section 3. That the maximum rate of levy under Section 2 will not exceed:

a. .04 per \$100 assessed valuation for 1985

b. .08 per \$100 assessed valuation for 1986

c. .12 per \$100 assessed valuation for 1987

Section 4. That the funds accumulated in the Akron Cumulative Capital Development Fund will be used for capital improvements as described in IC 36-9-16.2, Cumulative Building Fund.

Section 5. Notwithstanding Section 4, funds accumulated in the Akron Cumulative Capital Development Fund may be spent for purposes other than the purposes stated in Section 4, if the purpose is to protect the public health, welfare or safety in an emergency situation which demands immediate action. Money may be spent under the authority of this section only after the Town Board President issues a declaration that the public health, welfare or safety is in immediate danger that requires the expenditure of money in the fund.

Section 6. This fund takes effect upon approval of the State Board of Tax Commissioners.

grams. Each school and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households

should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

For the school officials to determine eligibility, the household must provide the following information listed on the application: Names of all household members, social security numbers of all adult household members or a statement that the household member does not possess one; total household income; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct. Households are requested to report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size.

Applications may be submitted at

any time during the year.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced policy each school principal will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent or guardian is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis.

If the parent wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make request either orally or in writing to Mr. Baxter Paige, Box 338, Mentone, IN. 46539. Ph. 353-7741, for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size changes, the family should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals, if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals for them, the household should contact the school for more information.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age, or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C., 20250.

Ivy Tech offers "short courses"

"Short Courses for Success" is the theme of a new program at Indiana Vocational Technical College Region 5 beginning Fall Quarter.

Five courses will be offered either in Kokomo or Logansport, and each course will run approximately four weeks.

"We realize there are individuals interested in upgrading their job skills or making themselves better qualified or more employable to potential employers but don't have the time to dedicate themselves for 11 weeks of classes," Dan Tye, Director of Instruction, said about why the program was started.

"We reviewed many of our credit courses which have had a lot of general interest. We selected five credit courses which have been popular, then shortened the curriculum using what many of our students have told us has been most helpful. Each course will give students practical training in areas that will upgrade their skills or make them more attractive candidates for employment," Tye said.

College credit is available for all five courses. The courses are:

Introduction to Microcomputers: offered 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturdays, Sept. 9 - 22 at both Kokomo and Logansport. The two-credit course consists of hands-on experience in the use of micro-computer. The student will be exposed to different types of software available for office use. The cost is \$48.70.

Your Office and Word Processing: offered 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturdays, Oct. 6 - 20 at both

Kokomo and Logansport. This two-credit course is designed to introduce the office manager or worker to the concepts of word processing. It also will provide the opportunity to experience working in word processing. The cost is \$48.70.

Welding for Do-It-Yourselfers: offered 6 to 9 p.m. Wednesdays, Sept. 29 - Oct. 17 at both Kokomo and Logansport. The one-credit course will focus on welding, soldering and brazing using simple and inexpensive equipment to perform routine home/car welding jobs. The cost is \$25.10.

Small Engine Repair: offered 6 to 9 p.m. Wednesdays, Oct. 3 - 24 at both Kokomo and Logansport. After the first meeting, students

may bring in their own one or two cylinder engines to work on. The course offers one college credit and cost \$25.10.

Job Advancement Techniques: meets Tuesdays and Thursday, Sept. 11 - 20 from 6 to 9 p.m. The one-credit course has three parts consisting of interpersonal communications, communications, resume writing and job interviewing. The course is offered at Logansport only and costs \$23.10.

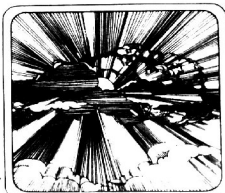

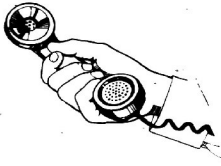

John Mallott named to TVSC board

The Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation board once again has a full slate with last Monday's appointment of John Mallott as representative of Harrison Township.

Mallott, a hog and grain farmer from Etna Green, is currently on the FFA agricultural advisory board, but plans to resign that position. He will take his seat on the board at the September 17 meeting.

A group of parents attended the meeting to voice their disapproval of the new bus routes. Most of the patrons present have small children who will be riding buses from one to two hours, and they expressed their concern on the effect the long bus rides will have on their children.

Superintendent Baxter Paige admitted it's a difficult situation primarily caused by the new State requirements for length of school day for high school students. Unlike previous years, all 22 buses will now be channeled to the high school so students there will be able to start at 8:10 a.m., and

elementary and junior high students will then be taken to their respective schools for an 8:30 a.m. opening.

Double routes were mentioned as a possible solution, and the consensus of the parents present seemed to favor double busing. Paige pointed out, however, that the buses cover a total area of 200 square miles, and double routes would still take a very long time and possibly not alleviate the time problem.

The board members expressed a desire to at least try the present routes to see if the anticipated time can't be cut. Jim Royer informed the parents a special meeting will be held August 30, and he asked them to return and inform the board how the routes are working.

At the end of the regular meeting, trustees decided they would ride on some of the bus routes tomorrow (Thursday). The two routes that are causing the most concern (Mike Wise's and Evelyn Schipper's) will be monitored.

In other business:

Teachers' contracts for the 1984-85 school year were approved and signed. Contracts for bus drivers were also signed.

Additional appropriations for the cumulative building fund in the amount of \$35,000 were approved by upgrading the parking lot, tennis courts and tracks.

Trustees discussed bus bids received for two 66 passenger bus chassis and the special 32 passenger bus chassis. Bids were received from Kerlin Bus Sales, Silver Lake, and Gagnon Chevrolet, Akron.

Due to confusion on the advertised speculations for the 32 passenger bus, that decision was tabled. Kerlin was awarded the bid for the 66 passenger buses.

Trustees approved claims of \$35,018.40 special payrolls of \$3817.31 and \$8936.96, and regular payrolls of \$59,706.30 and \$61,850.89.

As of July 1, a temporary loan of \$684,000 was received and invested at Farmers State Bank and Akron Exchange State Bank.

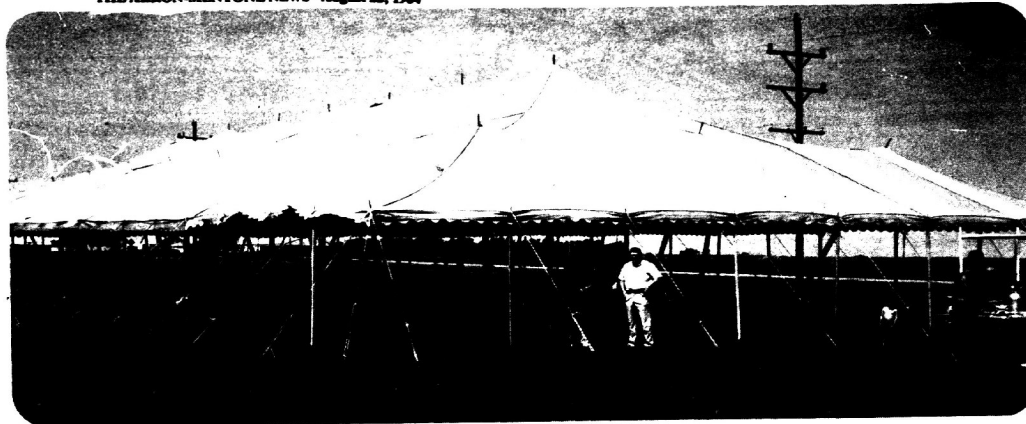

Immunization update

As the new school year approaches, children entering school for the first time will need to have physical examinations before the child is allowed into the

classroom. As part of this exam, the child's immunization history should be updated. Most children at this time will need booster doses of diphtheria/pertussis/tetanus (DPT) and oral polio (OPV) vaccines.

To enter school in Indiana, children need four doses of DPT and three doses of OPV. They also need one dose each of measles and rubella (3-day measles) vaccine. Although not required, one dose of mumps vaccine is strongly recommended. If a child is in need of

immunizations, the parents may provide the school with a schedule from their physician or clinic for when the child will receive the needed vaccinations, so the child will be allowed in school.

These immunizations provide protection against once common and serious childhood illnesses. In Indiana, these diseases are seldom seen anymore. The potential for outbreaks remain, however, if there are unvaccinated children in the community.

Outer space: Ever since that first space shot, that first science fiction story, you have wanted to go there, but you knew it wasn't possible. Now there is an easy way to go, and you don't even need the space shuttle. In fact, all you need is a pen and paper.

To start you on your adventure through space, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration has produced a breathtaking and informative 38"x48" poster commemorating the tenth anniversary of their study of the planets. For your copy of **Ten Years of Planetary Exploration**, send \$4.50 to the Consumer Information Center, Dept. 210M, Pueblo, Colorado 81009.

The poster provides an historical outline of space exploration from Galileo to the present. In addition, there are descriptions of Mercury, Venus, Mars, Jupiter, and Saturn. For example, Mercury's surface is similar to Earth's moon in that it is heavily pock-marked with craters.

And Venus's environment may have been similar to Earth's during its early history when the sun was cooler than it is now. In fact, Venus may have supported life at that time.

Furthermore, there are fascinating color photographs of the planets taken by Voyager 1 and 2 and by Pioneer 10 and 11. Serving as Earth's eyes to the solar system,

the Voyager and Pioneer spacecraft have enabled us to unlock the mysteries of the universe. For example, one photograph shows a close-up of Saturn's rings. This picture proves that the rings, once thought to be four in number, are really an incredibly complex system, consisting of thousands of concentric ringlets. Another photograph reveals the bewildering beauty of the Great Red Spot of Jupiter.

PSC approves NIPSCO cuts

Edmund A. Schroer, Northern Indiana Public Service Company chairman and chief executive officer, said that the utility is pleased that the Public Service Commission of Indiana has approved the settlement agreement proposed by NIPSCO and accepted last week by several large industrial customers, the State's Utility Consumer Counselor and others which will result in an immediate electric rate decrease of approximately \$10.4 million annually for all NIPSCO customers.

"The agreement results from concessions NIPSCO offered and filed with the Public Service Commission of Indiana on July 11, 1984," Schroer said. "Negotiations that led to the agreement were arduous, but well worth the effort in that they will materially benefit all of our customers."

"We recognize the serious economic problems confronting industry in our service area and their effect on all our customers," he said. "We are making these real and meaningful concessions to demonstrate our concern for our customers, to provide some stability in energy prices and supply in our service area, and to help promote economic development in northern Indiana."

The terms of the agreement approved by the Commission in-

clude:

1. NIPSCO agreed to reduce the requested rate treatment of R.M. Schaffer Unit 17 by \$55 million, resulting in an immediate electric rate decrease of \$10.4 million annually. Unit 17 began commercial operation in April 1983, and was placed in the rate base in an electric rate order of the Commission in August 1983.

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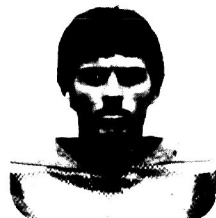

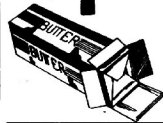

housewife Darlene Hulse on Friday, Aug. 18.

Marshal Dave Kruger spotted a man hitchhiking along CR 1000 E, north of CR 250 S on Wednesday at 6:30 p.m. The man darted into a cornfield at sight of Kruger and then eluded police for four hours. County police were assisted in the search by the Marshall County police helicopter, the canine corps from St. Joseph County and other units from Miami and Grant counties and ISP troopers from Peru and Bremen.

Several local residents report that on Wednesday and Thursday a young man fitting the description of the killer came to their homes requesting entrance to dis-

cuss important matters. Two reports surfaced that the man said he was connected to the school corporation.

Sometime between 8:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Thursday, the N. Shafer home near Akron was broken into and ransacked, according to Miami County Sheriff Don Howard. Howard also confirmed they had reason to believe the man who eluded police the previous evening, was the same person who broke into the home and stole an old shotgun and ammunition, as well as a small amount of money and jewelry. An early 70s model black Gremlin with 1983 license plates was also stolen from the Shafer home.

Town employee Rick Ringle complained that some residents use flimsy trash bags that break open easily, and he requested the board consider taking action.

Trustees voted to change the yield sign at the corner of Central and Slaybaugh streets to a stop. Marshal Kruger will draw up the

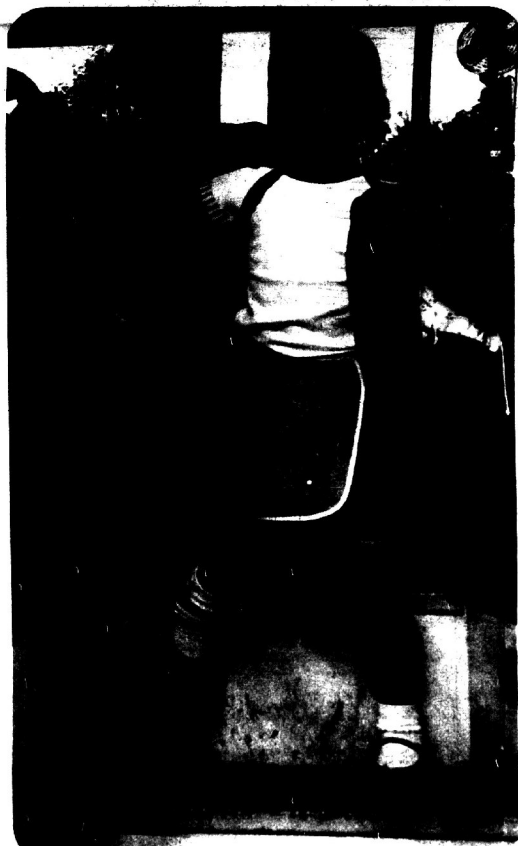
proper ordinance for the change for publication.

The next regular meeting of the board will be held on Tuesday, Sept. 18.

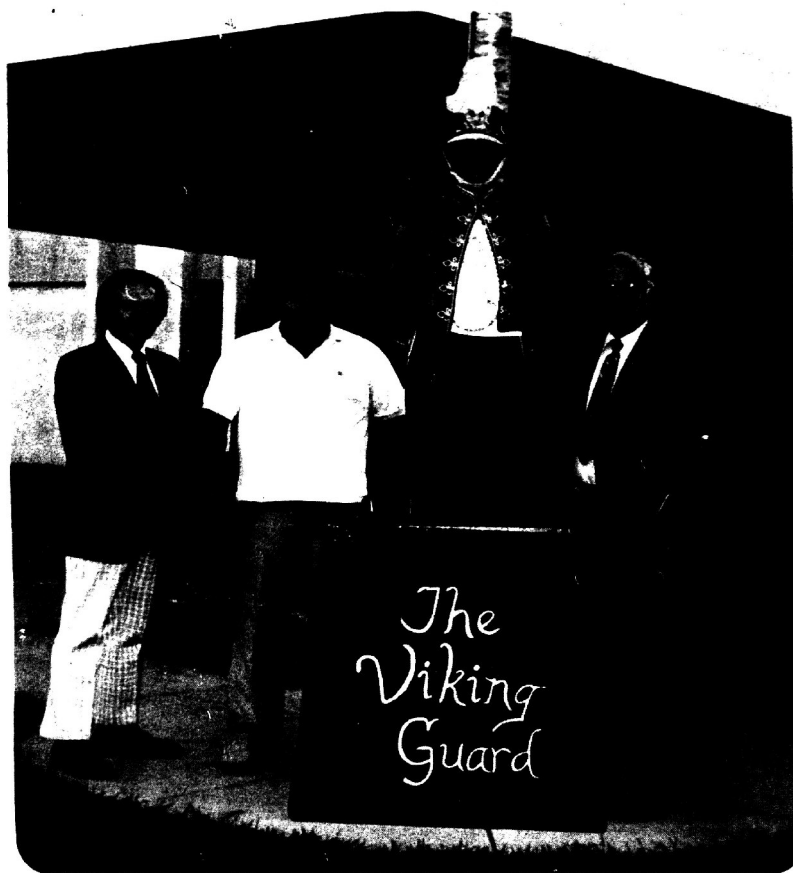

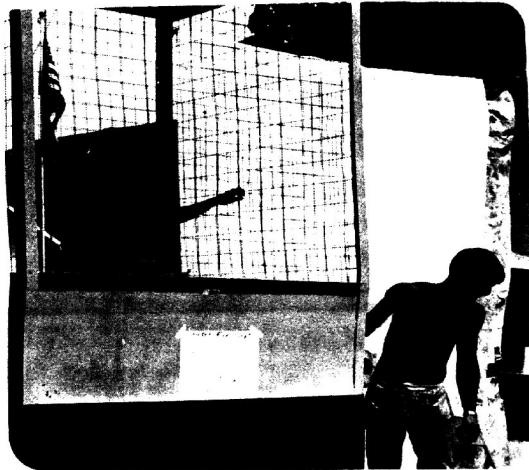

Valley romps over Northfield

There was little doubt in anyone's mind that last Friday's man of the hour was new Tipppecanoe Valley coach Jeff Phillips. In the season's opener, the Vikings kept alive the "Death Valley" tradition by romping over visiting Northfield 35-8.

Although the tension in the air

was palpable during Northfield's initial march from their own 36 yard line to Valley's 24, the young Valley team held the Norse to a one-yard gain on a fourth down and nine to take possession of the ball. Junior tailback Danny Cave then drove for 61 yards on five rushes to move the pigskin down the field,

and senior veteran Rob Dunnuck completed the job in three plays of five, six and one yard for Valley's first TD. Jon Baker converted the first of his five extra points to give Valley a 7-0 lead at 5:37 of the opening quarter.

Although the Vikings are an inexperienced team and smaller in size than in previous years, they never looked back after that first push. Northfield, at the same time, only recovered late in the second quarter when quarterback Tim Miller moved the ball 62 yards in only six plays. Miller completed four of five pass attempts, with Scott Meyer carrying the pigskin over the line. A conversion for two points brought the score to 28-8, where the Norse were stymied for the remainder of the game.

Dunnuck was Valley's only scorer, but Cave was the leading Viking carrier with 96 yards in 14 tries. Dunnuck finished the evening with 19 carries for 75 yards, including the five touchdowns.

During the final quarter, coach Phillips substituted liberally. This Friday the Vikings travel to Southwood for another Three Rivers Conference game.

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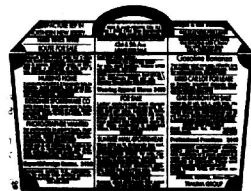
