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## Burket registration announced

The first day of school for all grades of the Burket Elementary School will be August 22. Classes for Grades 1-5 will begin at 8:00 a.m. and end at 3:00 p.m. Class for kindergarten will be from 8:00 to 11:00 a.m.

Parents may enroll their children and pay book rental fees on August 13, 14, and 15 from 1:00 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. All kindergarten students will need to have a birth certificate unless they have previously presented one.

Textbook rental and supply fees will be as follows:

Kindergarten - \$23.00; 1st - \$47.00; 2nd - \$46.00; 3rd - \$49.00; 4th - \$39.00; and 5th - \$41.00.

The school cafeteria will begin serving lunches on August 22. The charge for lunch will be 80¢ per day. The charge for afternoon milk will be \$1.00 per week. The charge for the first semester kindergarten milk will be \$17.00.

Free lunches will be made available to those students unable to pay. Reduced priced lunches are also available to those unable to pay the full price. Free and reduced priced lunch applications may be obtained from the principal's office.

# Reminiscing with Ruby

Articles Taken From Ruby Dawson's Journals

When I first started to school in the winter when it was cold, first we put on long underwear, then what was called a panty waist, this was white muslin with a button on each side and one in the middle. In front your panties were put on next. The front buttoned on, then the flap on back buttoned on each side. You put on long black stockings and the supports were also fastened to the panty waist. The boys had a belt with straps over the shoulder and the supporters were fastened to this. Some children wore the round ones but mother said not to. She wanted them to look nice.

Carl wore short pants with a blouse, sometimes fancy, as for going to Sunday School. A white one, the big collar with a ruffle or imbroided. I wore wool dress to school, sometimes made fancy but never below the knee. My under skirts and panties were always white with homemade lace and the lace was made out of sewing thread. Of course a heavy coat and a tam and if the weather was real cold mother would put a thin veil over my face. And sometimes she would put on us some leggings which she had made out of a old overcoat. They went to the knees and buttoned up at the side.

Aunt Margette and Aunt Alice and Chas. went to St. Louis fair and she brought me a beautiful parasol. It was silk and one day it rained and spoiled it. So mother got some wide inbroday and recovered it. It had a beautiful carved handle. Later it came up missing and we never saw it again.

Oh yes I won't forget the sleeve holders, some were real pretty. Sunday ones and those for everyday for men.

Father mostly wore white shirts or they might have a little light colored stripe. He wore for everyday colored collars which he could wash off every night. Guess we kids would love to get one, he would let us cut it in strips and see it burn up to nothing. He did not wear a tie to work because it was in the way. The white shirts were easier to soak and get clean.

Vance, original, mischievous, and you could say hell-bent, he was always in trouble from going in a clover field with two paddles hunting where the bees had their honey. Oh he tried everthing even made some beer out on the back porch. Yes, it was good for tasting, one time he was going to fly like a bird, so he sneaked in and got mothers good umbrella, went out to the chicken house and jumped off. It was not so high, he was not hurt, till he came to the house with the umbrella, when the paddle got him.

Yes, he swiped a mellow from Jennies garden and was made to go to her and tell her. Also with his own money pay her 5¢. Mother had told Jennie before and told her to take the money to teach him a lesson.

Oh Pat do you remember your first train ride, I do. I was in Hammond and I brought you home with me. I am now going from one thing to another. While I am writing so many things comes to my mind. The stories I used to tell you in the eve when you were supposed to go to sleep.

Mothers schooling was limited because she had to stay out of school so much and help her mother with the smaller children. So she was deprived of formal education but she was a educated person, reading much. I don't think she ever passed a book or paper up if she could get her fingers on it. She was a good student of human nature and never punished too much but stopped to listen to our tails of woe. Of course boys were left to dad and that not too bad. She was a wonderful cook with her fancy bread and preserves. We never did know how many were to set at the table, but she always seemed to find plenty. Often she had sick spells and we would then have a hired girl and some one outside the home to do the washing. One lady who came to the house to do the washing. Of course by hand, on a washboard, always wore a ring on her thumb which us kids thought was something, as she held that thumb out so as not to harm the ring.

Yes, my memory of mother always brings to mind her smiling face, her busy hands at work of evenings, knitting, mending, sewing or peeling apples or something for the next day. Sometimes when she was at work hearing her sing to herself some old hymns of church from memory. One was "There is a Green Hill Far Away" and "The Old Rugged Cross".

Just think how many years ago it's been since Vern and I went fishing in the creek and thought of all the fish we would get and come back with one little one, how big are those we did not get, by now?

Oh, if I could only have a piece of that old fashioned apple butter pie.

Every spring we had sassafras tea. About everybody drank it. It was suppose to be good for your blood. Anyway people still make their sassafras tea and it is good. Try it. Oh, yes, we loved fried butter.

I said way back, those little bags to clean your teeth were soda and salt - no the first ones grandmother would take charcoal out of the stove and make in a powder and mix with salt.

Grandmothers crumb pie. Grape pie with crumb topping, old fashioned apple butter pie, ground cherry pie, elderberry pie, mulberry pie - sometimes mixed with cherries - you made up of everything because no store ones.

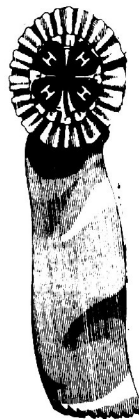

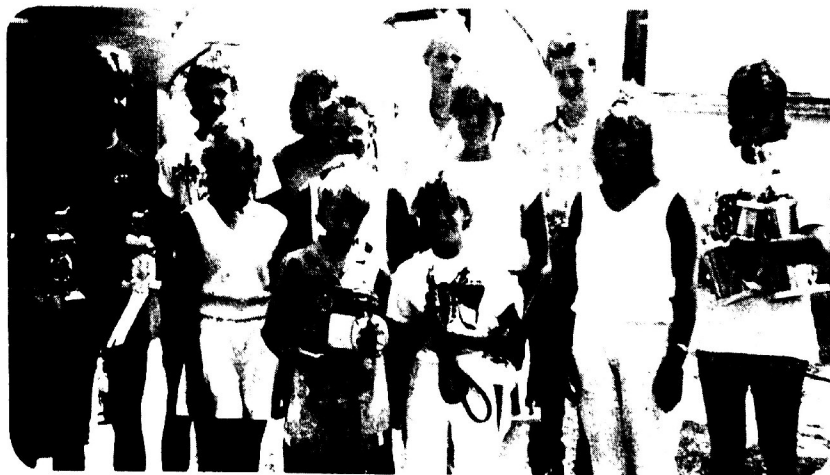

Children from household whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.

Applications forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians to apply for free or reduced price meals. Households should fill out the form and return it to the school. Additional copies of the application form are available at the principal's office in each school. Households should answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain all of the following information cannot be processed by the school:

(1) The total household income and the amount and source of income received by each household member (such as wages, child support, etc.), or the household's food stamp case number if the household is on food stamps; (2) Names of all household members; (3) Social Security numbers of all household members 21 years of age or older, or the word "none" for any adult household member who does not have a social security number; and (4) The signature of an adult household member.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility and verifying data. Applications may be verified by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

If children are approved for free or reduced price meal benefits, the household must report to the school increase in household income over \$50 per month (\$600 per year) and decreases in household size.

Households may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If a household is not currently eligible but has a decrease in household income, an increase in household size or if a household member becomes unemployed, the household should fill out an application at that time.

In certain cases foster children are eligible for these benefits regardless of the household's income. If a household has foster children living with them and they wish to apply for free or reduced price meals for them, the

household should contact the school for more information.

Under the provisions of the policy each school principal will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. The household also has the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official: Mr. Baxter Paige, Supr., Box 338, Mentone, In. 46539, or phone 353-7741. Each school and the central office have a copy of the complete policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

In the operation of the Child Feeding Programs, no child will be discriminated against on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, sex, or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

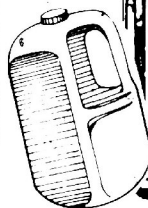

Mae Brightbill, 85, decided to join the Manchester Fellowship of Reconciliation for one day in their announced fast for immediate steps in nuclear disarmament.

Members of the Fellowship of Reconciliation will fast from Aug. 6th, through Saturday, Aug. 9th.

These two dates mark the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, 41 years ago.

Since then, more than 250,000 people have died from these bombs, either right on the spot in 1945, or because of cancer in later years.

The Fellowship of Reconciliation wants to remind the public, they say, of what nuclear war would mean, and calls for immediate and effective steps of nuclear disarmament in east and west to lessen the chances for nuclear war.

The Fellowship of Reconciliation will also hold silent vigils in front of the post office in North Manchester from Wednesday through Saturday from 10:00 to 11:00 and from 3:00 to 4:00 to protest against the government's role in the nuclear arms race.

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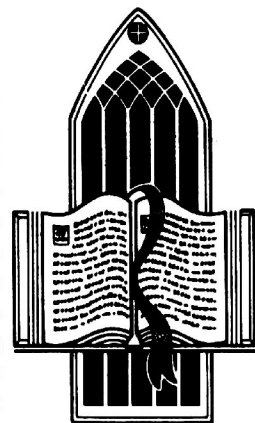

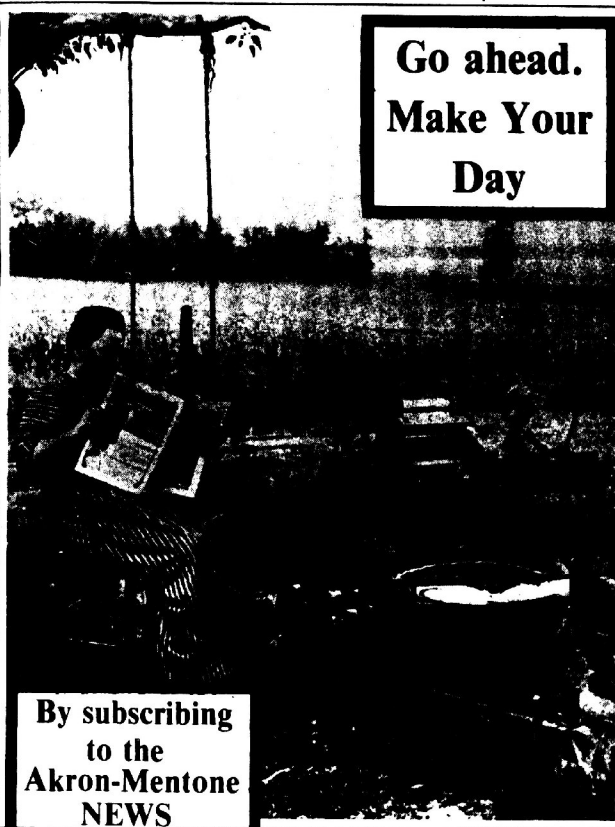

## Dry land farmers need long term help

"The need for more hay will still be there long after the news media has dropped the story," said Dean Kleckner, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation. Kleckner said it would be eight months at the minimum before even normal rainfall coming now could replenish the soil and start hay and grass growing next year.

Kleckner spoke to news representatives following the Midwest Farm Bureau President's Meeting recently in Indianapolis.

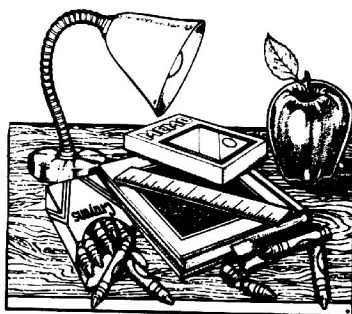
"All but 13 counties in Georgia have been declared disaster areas," said Georgia Farm Bureau President Robert Nash. Nash made a special visit to the meeting to discuss the plight of southern farmers in light of the drought. "Georgians do not expect unlimited free hay, but some farmers are too strapped to be able to pay for the feed and forage if some aid doesn't come through from Washington."

Harry Bell, American Farm Bureau Federation vice president and president of the South Carolina Farm Bureau said he had reports of hay being received from 39 states as well as Canada. Bell also said South Carolina is 21.44 inches short of predicted rainfall for the year. "This is less than one-third of our normal precipitation. Crops are devastated; cotton, soybeans, milo, corn, and others are ruined for this year."

"There are provisions in the current Farm Bill to aid disaster-affected farmers with reduced grain prices and aid in transportation

costs," added Kleckner. He also pledged the support of the American Farm Bureau Federation in assisting these southern farmers.

"Hay and feed would be purchased if there was assistance," Nash concluded, "but farmers need help to stay in business."

Homeroom assignments for kindergarten through sixth grade students and schedules for seventh and eighth grade students will be available at registration.

Textbook rental fees for the 1986-87 school year are listed below. Textbook rental fees should be paid at the time of registration.

### School hours

Opening day of the 1986-87 school year for all Akron students is Friday, August 22. On the first day of school all seventh and eighth grade students should report to the cafeteria upon arrival. All other students should report directly to their respective classrooms. Daily school hours throughout the year for students are as follows:

# Reminiscing with Ruby

Articles Taken From Ruby Dawson's Journals

One time mother was not feeling well and was in bed, Nina who never cooked said she wanted to make a cake. Mother told her to wait until she could show her how. No, she would not wait, and went ahead, made a loaf cake.

When I came home from school I moved it as I wanted to get supper, the cake fell apart. Was Nina mad - Oh!

Then I went to cellar to get some cream and the cream had all been taken off the milk and we did not know where it went - then Nina said - for the cake, it said to cream the butter, so I spread the cream over the butter before I mixed the cake. No wonder the cake was so rich - it fell apart.

Tent shows:

Neighborhood kids use to have tent shows. Anything to make a tent out of and as there were no side walks you put up the tent there.

Charly Pyle and Carl were the head ones. They made a tent (small) out of old canies pieces - Oh the shows were good. The tent beside the street, we divided up the ones who were not in the show. Had to pay 10 pins (common pins) to get in - you did not have as many pins as today so mothers pin cushion was robbed. No bent pins would do, but a black headed one was worth 5 plain ones. One day I got too close to Charley and he hit me on the nose. Charly was a year older than Carl, did I howle - yes. They were good shows. Of course if you wanted to go through the street with horse and buggy you had to drive around the tent.

Week:

Monday - wash day - can't you hear the snap crack of wet sheets on the line. You run under them because they were cool. Then you would hear your mother "You children keep your dirty hands off my clean sheets. No waiting for weather. Hanging clothes out was an art.

Tuesday - we ironed.

Wednesday - baked and mended, oh yes, I forgot, should undershirts be hung top or bottom. Should socks be hung toe or top. I sure was told if I was wrong. Front line for best things, just get them wrong! It seemed mother had eyes in the back of her head. Wash day actually started on Sunday night. Wash was spread out in one big pile then sorted.

Wash tubs were set on benches filled with cold water. Brown or homemade soap. Sometimes a little lye if it was hard - white clothes were put to soak in water to cover then punched down with a stick (handle of a broom). Of course on Mon. you got up a hour earlier to start the fire. Hot water and more soap rubbed the clothes on a corrugated washboard (there is one in basement now [1974]) Then in boiler to boil a while, then rinse twice, blued and starched. Starch was made on stove with flour. Yes, you liked to beat the neighbor to hang out the washing, and the whitest.

Thursday - you went calling or had company.

Friday - the whole house had to be cleaned.

Saturday - Oh, those were bake days and at night your body got a good scrub.

Lids for crocks, etc. were made of wood. They were scrubbed until snow white. What kind of wood, do not know. They were about 1 inch thick.

Corn planting time at Grandmother Eber's, quite different than now days.

When the corn came up and any was missing you went up and down the row with a hoe and replanted it that way.

They gave Vern a hoe and seed to plant where it was missing, also some punkin seeds - yes, I went along to hurry him so we could go fishing.

Oh yes, we planted punkin seeds here and there and then decided we had planted enough, so we went to corner of field, dug a hole and put the rest of the seed in it. In about 10 days Uncle Chas. came to the house and said "Where did you plant all the punkin seeds?" He had found out where we put them. Oh well, just another mistake.

When Aunt Lola was going to get married they sent me to Aunt Alices, two miles on horse back to get some yarn. I got there but on the way back along came an automobile. The horse jumped, I slid off and had no way to get back on until I came to a rail fence.

Another time Grandmother was bringing me home and we came by the way of Mill Ark, and at the bridge, the horse jumped up, the back wheels of the buggy started over the bank and grandmother said to jump - they laughed because I grabbed the buggy whip to save it, we got back on the road ok.

Oh yes, things do come back of days gone by.

When we lived in the little house our pump was outdoors. In the summer it would run down sometimes. Then we would say it would its prime, then you had to take some water and pour into the top and work the pump handle real fast. This would start the pump to work again. If the weather was real cold and it would freeze then you had to take a teakettle full of boiling water and pour in to thaw it out. After we moved here we had the same kind of pump but father fixed it so it would be in the kitchen. It still would run down once in a while.

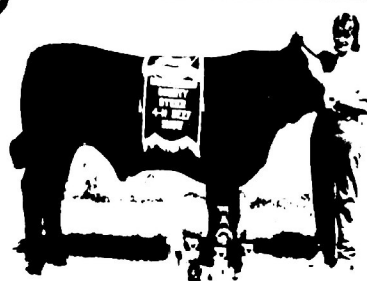

## Coopers too busy to retire

Many people in the work force today are looking forward to the retirement years when one can sit back and relax, and do nothing. Yet many people who have reached the "Senior Citizen Era" have kept active; maybe keeping busier than ever before.

One such person is Raymond Cooper of Mentone. Raymond and his wife Marjorie are both very active considering they both have suffered heart attacks.

Mr. Cooper started working while still in high school. Even during his high school sophomore year, Raymond wanted to be a car salesman. He began his working career selling cars for a Ford dealership in Swayzee.

Mr. Cooper married his high school sweetheart while earning \$10. a week during the depression. In 1935, he began working for a furniture store as a truck driver. Within six months he had worked his way to the manager of appliances position. Later he started working in a retail store.

Following World War II, the Coopers moved to Mentone and started a variety store which is now the Neighborhood Store. Mr. Cooper credits the local people for much of the stores growth. "A farmer once came in and asked for Oshkosh over-alls; so, I ordered them. Then another farmer asked for pull-on boots," explained Cooper, "that's how our business grew from a variety store to a department store." Marjorie Cooper worked along side her husband until her heart attack in 1972.

Mr. Cooper decided to retire following his wife's heart attack so they could enjoy some time together. Deciding to spend time in Florida, the Coopers purchased a winter home in Florida. It was while remodeling the winter home that Mr. Cooper suffered his first heart attack. This forced Raymond to slow down - but it did not keep him down.

It was not long before Raymond was again involved in a remodeling project. His desire to help people was demonstrated when he helped remodel the Talma United Methodist Church.

During this same time, the Coopers became actively involved in the Herb Bowdoin Crusade Team located in Tampa, Florida. The Coopers travel across the nation doing the preliminary work for the crusades. Since starting in this field, the Coopers have worked in twenty different crusades. This last year they helped plan crusades in Newark, Ohio, and El Dorado, Arkansas.

Mr. Cooper recently suffered a second heart attack. But, again, this did not dampen his outlook on life. While continuing his recuperation, Mr. Cooper purchased and started remodeling a large home located in Mentone.

The house, which was previously owned by John Smith, dates back to before 1904. Water pipes were discovered wrapped in newspapers dated 1904. The Coopers have remodeled the home and converted it into five apartments. Even though Raymond Cooper has subcontracted some of

the work, he has drawn all the blueprints and has overseen all the work. The building has been completely modernized by a 'retired' gentleman with no architectural training.

"We were both Christians when we married and we have grown in the Lord together," said Raymond. The Coopers have been married 56 years. When asked how he learned to do all he has accomplished, Cooper explained, "God gave me the ideas. He (God) has guided me all the way."

Mr. and Mrs. Cooper plan to spend the coming winter in Florida. Raymond announced he is really ready to retire, well, rest awhile anyhow!

## Fund-raising drive underway for new Fulton Co. Museum

A new museum is being planned for Fulton County. A fund-raising drive is now beginning to solicit donations from business, industry, clubs, organizations, and individuals. Ed Bellows, Rochester, is the general chairman for the fund drive. The goal is \$125,000 to \$150,000.

The new museum will be located on the corner of 375N and U.S. 31, four miles north of Rochester. "This location is highly visible, easy to find and very accessible," stated Shirley Willard, Fulton County Historical Society president. "We need to replace the four rented rooms in the Civic Center which the museum presently occupies. The City would like to close the Civic Center, but even if they didn't, the Civic Center Museum is stuffed full to overflowing. Fulton County residents have a great desire to preserve their history, and many courthouse records have been transferred to the museum for genealogical and historical research. The north room of the museum is so full there is just a path to walk between the stuff."

"We looked for a suitable building but none was found that was large enough for the big farm machinery and had adequate parking. So a Building Committee was formed in January to plan for a new museum on the land FCHS purchased last year."

The new museum will be spacious and attractive, with over 9,000 square feet. An archives/storage room will house the items not on display. A gallery will feature traveling exhibits and displays on loan, advertised on a big sign facing the highway. The general purpose room will have tables and chairs for researchers using the reference room as well as space for workshops, conferences, lessons, even historic dance practice and program practice.

There will be 17 display areas with moveable partitions for displays of an old time kitchen, dining room, parlor, bedroom, Scouts and toys, medical, art and music and entertainment, circus, churches, Indians, transportation, old time farm machinery, old time barn, schools and sports, military, club and recreation, merchants and industry.

Those who would pay tribute to or memorialize a love one can place a plaque of any of the 17 display areas or other rooms.

The new museum will be on the corner of the first county road north of the Tippecanoe River and the big dual lane highway. It will not be in the woods by the river where the Trail of Courage and Civil War Re-enactment are held, but on high

ground up the hill well beyond the flood plain. Soil tests indicate that this is an excellent location for a building and a septic system, the soil being sand and gravel.

Being located on one of the bigger highways of the state should bring in more tourists and income, increasing the daily attendance, book sales, and donations. And the new museum will be near the historical society's living-history festivals. Also other events, such as a weekend flea market, perhaps a pow wow or rodeo, can be scheduled there to help bring income to support the museum.

FCHS plans to cut costs by using volunteer labor as much as possible. The Fulton County Highway Department has already scraped off the top soil and hauled in fill dirt. Gene Chudzynski, professional engineer, has volunteered his services to draw the blue-prints. FCHS will pay a contractor to pour the cement floor and to build the outside of the building.

Pole-type construction is the most affordable. This does not mean the museum will look like a pole barn, not

at all! Pole construction is used for many types of buildings, such as offices, stores, factories, restaurants, clinics. The outside finish and landscaping make the difference.

FCHS plans to have the outside of the building done before winter. Then volunteers can finish up the inside, such as insulation, paneling, ceiling, painting, and have it ready to move in the museum collection by spring or summer of 1987.

## Tax Levy to add \$2.7 million to school budget

The Tippecanoe Valley School Board held its public hearing on the 1987 budget last week at the administrative building. The board advertised a tax levy of \$5,0946 per \$100 of assessed valuation, up from the 1986 budget levy of \$4,529. This increase of \$6.56 cents is virtually equal to the 57 cent tax boost advertised last year. The new figure is a 12.4 percent hike.

The tax levy is reported to bring a total of more than \$2.7 million to the school corporation. Of the total tax rate of \$5,0946, \$2,4873 will be used in the general fund to raise \$1,324,400; \$1,0595 will be used in debt service fund to raise \$564,159; \$1 in the accumulative building fund will raise \$552,465; and .5478 in the transportation fund will be raising \$291,703.

Total operating expenses in the 1987 budget top \$4.7 million in the general fund, 625,000 in the debt service fund and \$554,325 in the transportation fund.

If approved, the total budget levy will collect \$2,732,727 compared to the 1986 amount of \$2,293,379, up from \$1,988,878 in 1985.

Part of the increase in the tax levy is due to the 35 cents cumulative building fund increase from 65 cents to \$1. The increase was needed to help fund the \$4.2 million renovation and construction projects at the elementary buildings.

The budget adoption meeting will be held on Aug. 26, at 7:30 p.m. in the administrative building.

The board also approved 1986-87 salary schedules for administrators, teachers and non-instructional workers. Administrative salaries for elementary principals and vice-principals range from \$30,000 up to \$37,700. The high school principal is on a \$45,200 contract with the assistant being paid \$36,000. Superintendent of the corporation will receive a \$52,200 salary.

Teacher salaries adopted

start at \$16,250 per year for a beginning teacher with a bachelor's degree and increase with the number of years of experience. Salaries are also higher if the teacher has a master's degree. A teacher with a bachelor's degree and 10 years experience will top out at \$19,250 per year while a master's degree teacher with 17 years experience will earn \$30,000.

For non-instructional workers, salaries are broken into hourly wages, weekly, monthly and yearly earnings. Those with a "D" classification top the list with a salary of \$29,100 per year. Those on hourly wages range from \$3.80 per hour up to \$8.75 per hour.

Vyn Popplewell, project manager for the construction projects at the elementary schools, gave an update on the status of the projects. Two changes in the plans were brought up for action by the board. One change would make all the basketball goal supports at the Akron gymnasium free to move. It also provides for two new backboards at the south end of the practice courts. The total additional cost was estimated at \$4,562.

A second change approved by the board was for additional funding for re-route work on a storm sewer line around the construction site at Akron. According to Popplewell, city plan maps that were used failed to show a sewer line at the project site and was not detected until work began. Popplewell said that some of the down spouts may have to be replaced, but could not be certain. The addition came to 3,543 for the project which Popplewell said could easily be reduced if down spouts and catch basins did not have to be replaced.

Other changes in the construction plans are still pending. The board was notified that work that was being done on the stage at Akron had been stopped by

the construction crews because of a lack of supports under the stage. Additional supports would have to be placed under the stage before work could continue. Superintendent Baxter Paige was authorized to make any necessary changes in the construction plans up to \$5,000 without having a full board approval. This was done so that construction could be continued without waiting until the next scheduled board meeting.

Mentone has changed the class meeting times from an eight-period day to a seven-period day. Parents are being asked to call the school office by 10 a.m. if they know their child is going to be absent that day.

In other matters:

The board approved a recommendation by Paige to apply for a Primetime waiver which will allow the school corporation to use aides for oversized classes rather than hiring full-time teachers.

A building trades agreement was approved for the high school building trades class to have a project building a home for Mark and Kathy Gast.

A GED certificate was signed for Beulah Ann (Bailey) Bradley.

In personnel matters the board approved:

The resignation of Ron Leichty, Mentone principal and the appointment of Mike Humphries as acting principal until a replacement can be hired. Humphries is currently vice-principal at the Mentone school.

The teacher's contract ratifications were approved.

Hired Victoria Brock as Tippecanoe Valley High School assistant principal.

Hired Kay Goshert as inter-disciplinary cooperative education instructor at the high school.

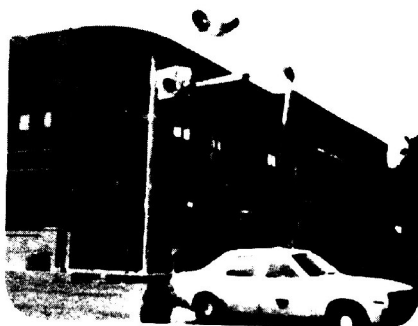

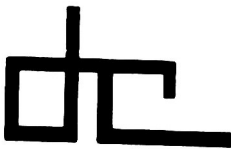

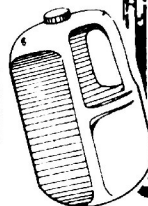

## 4-H State Fair Leadership School set

Most teens would not look forward to school starting early, but some 250 Indiana youths are anticipating the Annual State Fair Leadership School to be held at the State Fairgrounds in Indianapolis, August 11-20.

Each county is eligible to send as many as six young men and women to the conference. Eligible 4-H members must be between the ages of 16 and 19 during the calendar year. Attending the State Fair Youth School from Kosciusko County this year are: Kimberly Demske, Rt. 1, Piercetown, IN and Shirley Bolinger, Rt. 7, Warsaw, IN.

The Indiana State Fair Youth School is a program developed to assist Indiana youth in the development of leadership skills as well as a greater appreciation for the state of Indiana. The school also encourages delegates to look more closely into areas of state government, American culture and human relations as well as look at potential career opportunities open to them.

Delegates are housed in dormitories on the State Fairgrounds. During the State Fair, they attend special events such as the Giant Balloon Race, Indian: 4-H Adult Volunteer L. J.'s Day Program, 4-H Fashion Revue, and the Spotlight Sale.

The young adults are given at least two hours of free time daily toward a group project to improve the fair buildings or grounds. By their own choice, they select and carry out activities such as painting, cleaning, landscaping or redecorating. All of the work time is donated.

Participants in the school take part in mock legislative sessions in the House Chambers of the State Capitol Building. They also tour the State Capitol.

Indiana State Fair Departments, and the Indianapolis Children's Museum, as well as participate in seminars on automotive preventive maintenance and outdoor cooking.

Delegates for the Indiana State Fair Youth School are selected by a committee of community leaders making up the 4-H Awards Committee. School directors are assisted each year by a group of young adults returning as an honor group. Kosciusko County has two delegates returning to assist with the State Fair School this year. Cindy Davis and Mark Demske will also be working with the program as part of the 1986 honor group.

## Butcher in work force

State Senator James R. Butcher, R-Kokomo, Republican candidate for Congress in Indiana's 5th District, worked the second in a series of 14 jobs around the 5th District as the Lehe Hog Farm near Brookston.

At a news conference, Butcher said he is concerned with the farming situation in Indiana and to prove this, he has chosen to work on two farms in the 5th District during his 14-week jobs excursion.

Hog farmers have two concerns on their minds these days. First, they are asking that the tax reform bill, now in conference committee in Washington, keep the "income-averaging" clause available for farmers. Butcher said, "This is in keeping with the Administration's goals of getting government out of agriculture and farming. Therefore, if there are no more government subsidies in a few years, then the American farmer's income is likely to go up and down from year to year and income-averaging

will be very helpful."

Finally, the hog farmer is asking the United States to declare hogs being sent to America to be treated equally even if they are pre-processed in Canada. In other words, the Canadian government is subsidizing Canadian hogs at the rate of \$7.00 per hog. The U.S. is imposing a \$7.00 per hog tariff to keep the U.S. hog farmers on a parity with his Canadian competitor. But, the Canadians have circumvented the tariff by shipping in the hogs after they have been processed. Butcher said he supports a ruling by the Trade Commission to allow the U.S. to impose the \$7.00 tariff on the pre-processed hogs as well.

Butcher is scheduled to work on a dairy farm in Fulton County, Friday, Aug. 22, 1986.

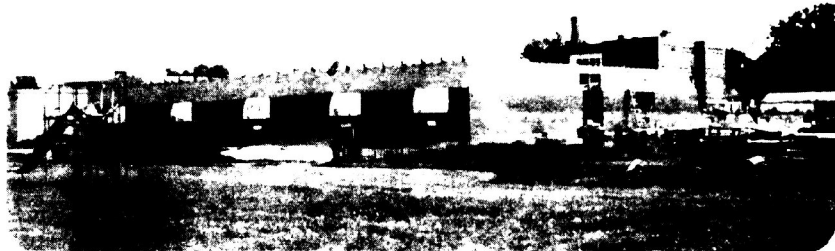

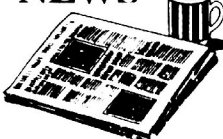

## Local problems voiced in Mentone

Mentone residents voiced concerns about surface water, the burning of grass and leaves and the positioning of a new sign during the town board meeting Monday night.

Numerous residents have been burning dry grass clippings, which has caused an excess amount of smoke. Because of the recent high humidity the smoke has not been able to rise and has settled over areas of town.

The board discussed the matter with residents, deciding to ask residents not to burn in the evenings. The board suggested that homeowners inside the city limits, put all dry grass clippings and leaves into trash bags so that they can be hauled away by the town's garbage collectors.

Water back-up and surface water problems were discussed by the board with residents living along St. Rd. 19. The water runs off the highway and into a working catch basin that sends it to the other side of the road to a non-working catch basin.

Many homeowners living near the area have water standing in their basements and crawl spaces nearly year-round, it was reported.

Town board president Jim Miller explained that he was aware of the problem and had notified state highway officials months ago about it. At that time the state highway department sent a representative to the area to confer with town officials.

Because the town has not received a response from state highway officials, the board agreed to have trustee Marian Boardman check into the matter.

Miller explained that although the board will be helping in this matter, it will no longer be involved in water back-up problems caused by residents connecting their downspouts to the town tile. He stated that the town will not be responsible for the town ditch overflowing until these residents have disconnected.

The board also discussed complaints of the Bell Museum sign being placed too close to the road, thus obstructing the vision for low riding cars. The board

agreed to check into the matter and resolve it immediately.

Marshal Russell Hart stated that those responsible for the recent tire slicing incident in Mentone have been apprehended. He also discussed the possibility of hiring part-time help during the coming year.

Ordinance 258 was passed during the meeting. It calls for a stop sign at the inter-

section of Broadway and Jackson streets. It was explained this change is being made to protect pedestrians, especially children, walking to the Mentone Elementary School along that route.

It was also announced that the weeds along the Conrail tracks will be sprayed soon and the fire department and the town will be purchasing a copy machine.

A native Californian, Mrs. Brock did her undergraduate work in California, then

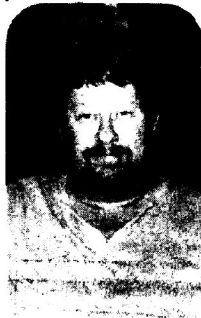
received her Masters Degree and Educations Degree from Indiana University. She is also a member of CADRE, a state committee for gifted education.

### Things To Remember:

The bumblebee that got under my big hat.  
The water bucket and tin cup.  
The good hot stove in winter.  
When we had sometimes beef stick and gravy for breakfast.  
Homemade ice cream made with plenty of cream and eggs.  
Those big plugs of tobacco the men had.  
The coffee grinder grandma held between her knees.  
The church bells ringing whenever there was a fire or some death.  
All the Civil War Veterans living on a dollar a day pension, a cow and a garden or some small job.  
When we got a stove with a reservoir at the back. Gee that nice warm water. Most always rain water from a barrel at the corner of the house.  
Grocery stores had about everything, even coal oil at 10¢ a gallon.  
How I hated to clean the coal oil lamps every morning.  
When we got our first electric lights in Akron and they were all over town, out by 11:00.  
When some one died, 2 or 3 friends would set up all night with dead person.  
Some of the kids at school wore asafetida bags around their neck to keep measles, etc. away.  
The big steam engines pulling the separator on the place to do the thrashing.  
How cold the seat in the "backhouse" was in zero weather.  
The old hen who stole her nest out and hatched every egg.  
The Sunday school picnic held in the woods behind the Slatore house.  
The 4th of July with nautical swim suits we wore at the deep place in the creek not far from town.  
The smell of the wet feathers when the headless chicken was scaled.  
Dad tending the slow fire for smoke for the meat in the smokehouse.  
When you could get a meal for 25¢.  
When we had a "hack" and met all the passenger trains at the depot.  
I remember giving dad a big mustach cup for Christmas.  
How first of spring you went barefoot.  
When sometimes south of town it took four horses to get the hearse up the hill to cemetery.  
When country kids walked to school and carried their dinner buckets.  
When farmer who only loaded in town when he was waiting to get his team shod.  
The new horse nail the blacksmith gave us to pick the "goodies" out of hickory nuts.  
When the dresses women wore, when they were expecting, were called "Mother Hubbard."  
Our Saturday night baths in a big tub by the kitchen stove.  
When we put straw under the carpet and in the "straw tick".  
When father gave the liver away.  
When the farm wife brought her butter and eggs to the grocery store and traded it out.  
Gee, remember the knee pants the boys wore (Carl and Earl Arter had their pictures taken then).  
Father, everynight cleaning his celluloid collar with a wet rag.  
Uncle Hi (father's brother) was a fine shoeman and cobbler - half soled your shoes for 30¢.  
You used corn cobs for corks.  
Remember turning the big grindstone when father sharpened the knives.  
When folks died of "consumption" instead of tuberculosis.  
When Dr. Hosman always took time to tell a funny story to cheer you up.  
When you did not have to spray the fruit trees to have good fruit.  
5¢ bought you a loaf of bread.  
Grandmother Eber moving out to the summer "kitchen" about the first of May.  
Oh, I must not forget one of the girls at school always wanted to play "post office".  
When women had their babies at home.  
Father and mother had no college education. Father was a successful man in his own way, being able to provide for his family and himself. He was a thrifty person and usually never spent money on anything that he or the family did not need and money that he received for his efforts were always earned.  
He was very good natured person, willing to help or do something for someone just about all the time.  
Yes, he was a kind father and gracious man, willing to help you with any problem you might have.  
We were dumb to the ways of the world today (or were we?), but we did have fun.

## 4-H Scholarship deadline approaches

College freshman who are current (or past) 4-H members are reminded that September 1st is the deadline for application for many college scholarship programs available through the National 4-H Council. Applications are available from the County Extension Office and should be mailed directly to the State 4-H Office at Purdue University.

The following scholarships are currently available:

**Agriculture Scholarship.** is a \$1,000 scholarship provided by the Educational Foundation of Alpha Gamma Rho. Applicants must be planning to pursue a degree program in agriculture, forestry, veterinary medicine or a closely related field.

**Animal Science Scholarship.** is a \$1,000 scholarship provided by Wayne Feed Division of Continental Grain Co. Applicants must be planning to enroll in the junior year of college in the fall of 1986 and plan to major in animal science.

**4-H Career Scholarship.** is a \$750 scholarship arranged by the Gertrude L. Warren Fund. Applicant must be planning to enroll in the freshman year at an accredited college, university, trade or technical school this fall and have been influenced by 4-H in selecting a future career.

**College Scholarship.** is a \$1,000 award provided by the Edwin T. Merdeith Foundation. Applicant must be planning to enroll in the freshman year this fall and plan to pursue a four year degree program.

**Dairy Goat Scholarship.** is a \$1,000 scholarship awarded by the American Dairy Goat Association. Applicant must be a high school senior or college freshman in the fall of 1986. The applicant must be planning to pursue a degree program in agriculture, home economics or a closely related field.

## Rust removal project at Akron discontinued for lack of support

The findings of the rust removal survey conducted in Akron were announced at the August 19 meeting of the Akron Town Board. A total of 285 ballots were returned. Favorable ballots were returned by 120 voters while 160 negative votes were returned. Five ballots were undecided. On the basis of these results and further findings, the board voted to discontinue the project. Improvements recommended by the engineer will be completed as funds become available. Some of these improvements will include connecting dead ends so water will circulate. It was announced with the new method of flushing hydrants, rust should be less of a problem.

On August 18, 1986 a Pre-Adoption hearing was held in the town of Akron.

Since no citizens appeared, the board reviewed the budget and adjourned.

As of September 20, the Board will enforce a late penalty charge for late water bill payments. The board asked the public be made aware of this procedure since the penalty fee has not been enforced for several months. The date has been changed from the 10th of the month, to the 20th of each month. This will give citizens an additional ten days in which to pay their water bill.

A report submitted by Dr. Charles Miller stated the weed killer used at the city park had been successful.

Superintendent Gearhart announced numbers will be painted on the park shelter for easy identification. The numbering system was adopted by the board to avoid reservation confusion.

Anyone with a 1987 reservation is asked to contact the town office for a reserved number.

Following the proper advertisement procedure, an engineer-contractor will be chosen at the September meeting.

It was announced at the meeting that Marshall Rodney Fisher is now qualified as an EMT. Fisher is now attending the Law Enforcement Academy with September 26 set as his graduation date. Deputy Marshal Craig Smith has been covering during his absence. A \$100 donation was sent to the Fulton County Sheriff's Reserves for their help while Marshal Fisher attended EMT training and Deputy Marshal Smith attended the Law Enforcement Academy.

## Community shocked by weekend tragedies

Four people were killed in three one-car accidents in Fulton County over the past weekend.

Two people were killed in the first crash at 4:33 a.m. on Business U.S. 31, a mile north of Rochester.

The victims were Franklin Dimmock, 21, Silver Lake, and Michael J. Davis, 31, Rt. 1, Claypool.

State Trooper Jerry Jolley said Dimmock was northbound and left the road on the east side. The car skidded broadside back across the road on the west side and struck a tree broadside on the passenger side of the vehicle.

Both Dimmock and his passenger were killed instantly. Dimmock died of a skull fracture and Davis died of a broken neck. They were not wearing seat belts. The car was a total loss.

Fulton County police assisted Jolley in investigating the accident.

The second fatal crash occurred at 5:20 a.m., eight miles north of Rochester on Ind. 110, just west of Ind. 25.

State police said John H. Kats, 29, Hammond, was eastbound, traveling at high speed, and failed to negotiate a curve.

The vehicle ran off the roadway and rolled over several times, throwing Kats out before the car struck a pole. He died two hours later at Woodlawn Hospital of internal injuries.

Troopers Dan Ringer of the Bremen post and Jolley investigated.

Ind. 110 is on the Fulton-Marshall County line, but the accident occurred on the Fulton County side.

On Sunday, 20-year-old Jennifer Dee Sriver, 214 South Pine Street, Akron, died in a single car crash on State Rd. 14 about one mile north of Akron.

Apparently Miss Sriver side-swiped a utility pole, went through a fence and over a corner post, rolled over through another fence and came to rest against a parked car.

Miss Sriver died of a fractured skull and internal injuries according to Fulton County Coroner, Joyce Good. The victim was thrown from her car.

The accident occurred on the property of Lewis Hertsel a mile north of Indiana 114.

State police said Hertsel heard a noise about 4:30 a.m. Hertsel discovered Miss Sriver's body outside her car

about 6 a.m.

Police said a girlfriend of Miss Sriver who lives in Milford, about 12 miles north of Warsaw, told them the two had been together during the day and that Miss Sriver left Milford for home about 3:30 a.m.

State police attributed the accident partly to fatigue of the driver.

A 16-year-old Claypool youth was killed when he was struck by a westbound train at 10:15 p.m. during the Burket Day festivities. Police reported Robert R. Sisneros was running south across the Walnut Street railroad tracks when he ran into the path of a westbound train.

Burket Town Marshal John Huff was joined by Kosciusko County policeman, Capt. Ron Robinson in investigating the boys death. According to Robinson, Sisneros and another youth, Carl Duncan, 19, of Beaver Dam Lake, were attempting to get to their car parked on the south side of the tracks.

The boys were running as the train approached. Duncan made it across the tracks; Sisneros did not. Witnesses said the train was sounding its horn at the time of the accident.

# Reminiscing with Ruby

Articles Taken From Ruby Dawson's Journals

Old Mrs. Shamp, her husband was an old soldier, she smoked a corn cob pipe. Sometimes she had two. She used dried mullein leaves. The smoking of these leaves she said was a good remedy to catarrh, or what we call it now sinus. The other was for tobacco.

How dad started the fire in the morning when he got up. First he shook down the ashes from yesterday's fire from the grate down into the ashpit. Next a crumpled up paper was laid across the grate. On this a few pine kindlings or cobs, then some sticks of wood, then a couple dollops of coal oil for a quick sure fire.

The stove lids on, you opened the front draft, touched a match to the paper that showed through the front grate, stepped back and waited for the roar that showed your firemaking was o.k.

We had sled rides, sleigh rides, bobsled rides, picnics, a few house dances (upstairs above the bank and a few at Whit Gast's upstairs), play parties, and oh those box suppers were always good for a large gathering, most always at a one room school house.

Pie socials - oh yes, at the play parties the boy could kiss the girl without asking and then if he did you kinda knew he liked you. We flirted with our eyes. Remember this is a very small town - no phones, autos, radios or shows until later. The boys when they were 18, they were allowed to use the family horse and buggy, sometimes at 21 the boys would get a horse and buggy, then watch out, the girls would dress up, cornstarch was used as powder.

Uptown the walks were wooden. Sidewalk boards were thick and wide, and were secured to large planks with large spikes. As I remember I say the boards were long with cracks between so water after rainfall or thawing of ice and snow in warmer weather. If you dropped a penny you were out of luck but some of the boys would look even on their hands and knees to see if they could find a few cents. Sure a penny would buy you a stick of licorice candy which smeared your face which then required the rubbing of rough washrag plastered with the strongest kinds of laundry soap. No boughten washrags.

Oh a boy could whittle a thin stick from a packing box, a little molasses taffy on the end to reach the coin. If it was bigger than a copper, say a dime, he did not say anything, someone else may claim it. Crack searching was hard on the clothing - mothers would know where they had been because of hot dry resin oozed out of the boards and would be hard to wash out. Yes, you could hear the kids also if they got a splinter which called for a sharp needle from mother's work basket. Sometimes a loose plank would be upsetting. Father and Uncle Billy tried to keep the boards in from of shop in good shape. Yes we also rolled hoops. Father bought a bike from a family who was moving away for Carl and I. It was for a girl. I did not care too much, anyway Carl enjoyed it.

Mothers peanut cluster candy.

I remember the dusty, narrow road that was twisted several ways. The creek where we played and the cows drank. The big trees with branches just about hit the top of the buggy and playing under the bridge.

When you come to a house and the squawkin of hens as they scattered in alarm when you came into the barn yard.

The big dinner bell that hung by the big tree behind the house and how once in awhile you were permitted to pull the rope that sent it's deep voice rolling and echoing across the fields.

Remember that bunch of wasps that always seemed to fly around that window when you woke up in the morning at grandmothers.

Grandmothers old fashioned roses and tall hollyhocks, how we picked them to make small dolls.

Remember when mother fried doughnuts on the old woodstove and fished out "holes" for us to roll in sugar and pop into our mouth all hot, "Oh, boy!"

Pumping water in the corner in the kitchen sink that father had made?

Remember grandmother milking the cows and she gave you a cup full of warm fresh milk and remember the barn cats and some warm milk in the pan by the cistern pump.

Remember the old house Vern and I wandered around in to see what we could find besides spiders and webs.

How we would walk to the old building to find the grindstone, there to climb on it's rusty metal saddle and peddle to our hearts content.

Oh, we walked a lot and climbed on old dates, watch cattle, horses and pretend they belonged to you.

The American Lung Association also reports that asthma is the most prevalent serious chronic disease of Americans under the age of 18. A total of 2.2 million children in the U.S. have asthma, a figure that far outdistances any other serious chronic illness for that age group.

Asthma episodes can be frightening experiences for children and their parents, can cause hurried visits to doctors' offices and hospital emergency rooms, and can play havoc with a child's normal social and school routine. Some children outgrow their asthma, but the majority - about 65 percent, do not.

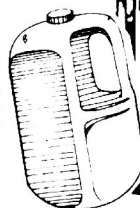

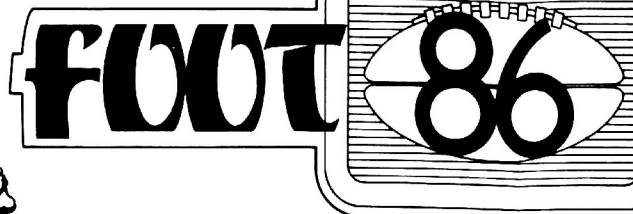
Jamie Cullison will be in the backfield along with senior quarterback John McDaniel and Manwaring

Coach Phillips believes Rochester, Whitko and Oak Hill will be the three toughest teams on the schedule.



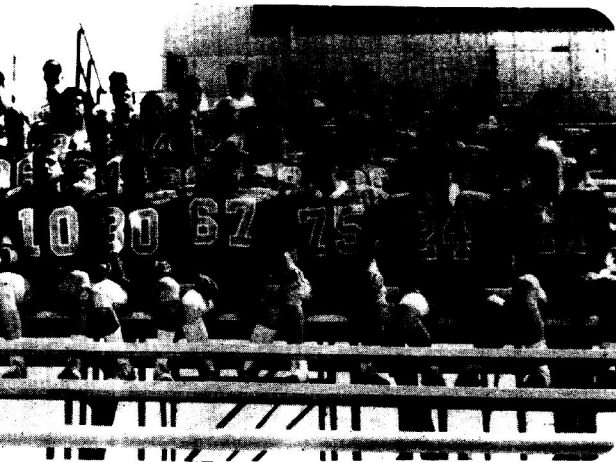

After Caston's fumble on the first play of the beginning 26 seconds of the period, Valley gained possession of the ball.

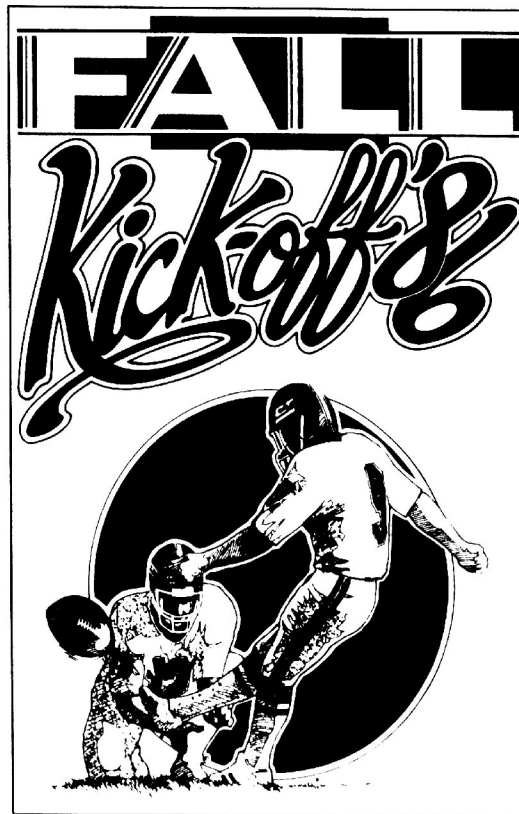
Jamie Cullison made the first touchdown while John McDaniel added the extra point.

## Pet ordinances reviewed

Because of recent complaints and incidences in Akron, citizens are reminded of the following rules which may be found in the Town of Akron Ordinances:

### SECTION 2:

#### Animal Control Officer: Duties: Authorization And Impounding

The town animal control officer, Humane Officer or any other police officer may pick up and impound any animal found to be in violation of any provision of this Ordinance. Animals impounded under this section shall be impounded for a period of not less than five (5) days. During such time the owner, harbinger, or keeper thereof may secure the release of such animal upon proof that he has duly registered the animal, if registration of the animal is required. If the animal is a dog, the owner shall provide proof that a dog license for the current year has been issued and that the animal has a current rabies inoculation.

If the animal is not so redeemed, the town animal control officer shall deliver the animal to the county dog warden, or make such other disposition as the town animal control officer deems appropriate.

### SECTION 6

#### Prohibiting The Keeping Of Dangerous Animals

It shall be unlawful for any person to keep, maintain or have in his possession or under his control within the Town limits of Akron any dangerous animal.

Dangerous animals include any wild animal, reptile, or fowl which is not naturally tame or gentle, but is of a wild nature or disposition and which because of its size, vicious nature or propensity if it escaped from secure quarters would cause injury.

Dangerous animals also include any domestic animal, reptile or fowl which because of its size or propensity or other characteristic would constitute a danger to human life or property if it escaped from secure quarters.

Persons found to be in violation of this section are guilty of a Class C Infraction.

If any dangerous animal escapes from the person having charge or control of said animal, and the animal without provocation, endangers, destroys, or constitutes a danger to human life or the life of any other animal or property, and can not be immediately and safely recaptured, it shall be destroyed by any police officer or humane officer.

### SECTION 10

#### Failure To Confine Animal

The owner or person having charge of any animal within the Town limits shall

at all times keep the animal confined upon the premises of the owner or person in charge or under absolute physical control when off the premises. In the event such animal is being walked on a leash or lead, said leash or lead shall not exceed ten (10) feet in length.

The running-at-large of any animal off the premises of the owner or person having charge of the animal is prima facie evidence of failure to keep an animal confined in violation of this section and such owner or person is guilty of a Class C Infraction.

If the offender has previously been convicted under this section, then such a violation of this section is aggravated failure to keep an animal confined and is guilty of a Class B Infraction.

## Financing available for small businesses

The state will provide sound Indiana businesses with adequate financing for expansion projects through the "Capital Assistance for Small Enterprises Program" announced Lt. Governor John Mutz at a press conference. During the first year, this program will be operated as a pilot program.

"Through this pilot program, the state offers financial assistance to small businesses for expansion projects which cannot be fully financed by the private sector. We help businesses grow and prosper, thus creating more jobs for Hoosier workers, and strengthening Indiana's economic base," said Lt. Governor Mutz.

To be eligible for the pilot program a business must:

Have a net worth of \$3,000,000 or less; have an average net profit, after taxes, of \$1,000,000 or less annually for the past two years; be "for-profit".

Grants will be made to small communities who will lend the money to the eligible business. The program is not designed to bail out failing businesses, but to provide working capital assistance to businesses whose expansion will add to Indiana's economic base.

Funding decisions will be made on a competitive basis three times during the year: April, August, and December. The Department of Commerce will consider the following factors when making selection decisions: The number of permanent jobs affected; the amount of private sector investment in the project; the significance of State assistance to the business; ability to secure

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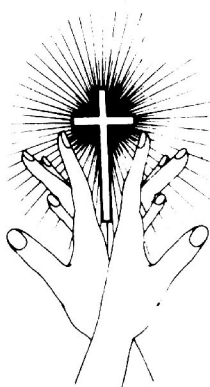
