careful clean-up of Christmas lights is the basis of a pleasant tree-trimming party in 1970. Unscrew bulbs, wash, rinse, set on towel to dry. Wipe cord clean. Replace bulbs when dry. Wind strings of lights around large rollers (one way to use tubes from gift wrap). Wind loosely—tautness breaks fine wires and insulation.



MOST FAMOUS CHRISTMAS

CRIB IN BASILICA, ROME

What is said to be "the most famous Christmas Crib in the world" is on view in the Basilica of Saints Cosmas and Damian, near the Coliseum in Rome. This presepe, truly a work of art and the only one of its kind, was created in Naples over 200 years ago. A certain S. Cataldo-Perricelli and his wife, who had inherited the Crib from ancestors, presented the scene to the Third Order Regular of St. Francis.

This unique display is 45 feet long, 21 feet wide, and 27 feet high, and contains hundreds of wooden, hand-carved figurines. They are the work of several artists of the 17th century, and portray various phases of Neapolitan life of that period.

The blue sky is alight with stars, the moon, a comet, and several angels hover. One is waking a shepherd who has fallen asleep near his flock. In the background are hills, valleys, the river Jordan, and lighted villages. On the balcony of his palace is Herod, pointing out to the Magi the





Amish Acres now open in Nappanee

Amish Acres, the 80-acre farm one mile west of Nappanee on U.S. 6, of Nappanee on U.S. 6, which has been under restoration since early summer, is now open every day, except Sunday, from 9 a.m. til 5 p.m. Visitors are being invited to Amish Acres for a guided tour of the main house, out-build-ings, and huge bank barn. Since it was homesteaded, the land has been farmed by families of the old order Amish or the old order amism faith, whose picturesque dress, folk customs, mode of living and re-ligious beliefs make them the source of his-torical and social interest.
Amish Acres is a story

of man's epic struggle with the land, the self sufficiency of the homesufficiency of the home-stead pioneer, and the historical intrigue of the Amish who quest for peace has brought them far from their European

far from their European homes.

Visitors are treated to an education tour of the main house gracefully refurnished in authentic pieces nearly duplicating the house at the time it was built. From the wood burning Round Oak and the master's rope bed to the medicine cabinet in the wall and the oiled floors, a visitor is returned to the early years turned to the early years of farm life at Amish Acres. There is no el-Acres. There is no electricity, water is pumped by the wind, only horses and buggies are kept in the barn, and the people speak another language.

The farm's first buildings were constructed by Christian Stahly and

by Christian Stahly and his son Moses in 1874. Christian and his three brothers were the first Amish settlers in Nap-panee. Lived in by Am-ish families with close ties till the present, the buildings have remained virtually un-changed since their con-struction. Through care-ful preservation and de-tailed restoration, the buildings today depict the way of life of that

time.

Throughout the year, on appropriate days, the family operating the farm will be baking bread, cookies, cakes and pies, in the outdoor brick bake oven which has recently been made operative by completed restoration. Apples are being dried into snitz in the small drying house which has also been restored to working en restored to working

condition.
Very shortly the adjacent smoke house will be filled with a variety of meats smoking above smoldering hickory a smoldering bark fire.

bark fire.
Visitors to Amish Acres are also being treated to a cup of hot spiced cider, kept warm atop the wood burning antique kitchen range, while they sit and chat with their guide.
A small gift room has been added to Amish Acres where locally hand

res where locally hand made quilts, food stuff, and educational books about the Amish are available to visitors.

Agricultural Sales Tax Exemptions Must Be Renewed in 1970

The Indiana Department of Revenue has announced that all agricultural exemptions for the Ind-iana Sales Tax will have to be renewed in 1970, according to Don Frantz,

according to Don Frantz, area extension agent.
Agricultural exemptions may be used only if the purchaser is occupationally engaged in the business of producing food products for human or livestock consumption. Items going into production of home food or for pleasure or hobby farms are not exempt from the tay.

The new certificates, Form ST-106, have been sent to farm suppliers and they will assist their customers. It is the responsibility of farmers, however, to make sure the proper

farmers, however, to make sure the proper forms are submitted if they expect to claim the exemption. A few copier are available at the County Extension Office.

Such items as livestock feed, fertilizer, seed, tractor fuel and livestock equipment are exempt items. Such things as capital investments for fencing, buildings, paint, tiling and others not going into direct production of food are not.

Customs in Denmark. Sweden and Bulgaria

Small metal trumpets that often trim Christmas trees began with a Danish custom. They used to play four hymns on them at Yule — symbolizing the four corners of the world.

In Swedish art, St. Lucia is sometimes pictured wearing candles in her hair. Her feast day, De-cember 13, is a forerunner of Christmas.

In Bulgaria on Christ-mas Eve each peasant takes a lighted candle to the barn to awaken each animal, saying: "The Child is born and blesses you to-night."

Members of every family carry lighted candles on the way to church. Picture the winking, silvery streams of light threading their ways through the bills and vellays! hills and valleys!

We have mentioned only a few of the customs which have prevailed in the European countries. Many of these customs are reflected in American Christmas celebrations. Also as befits a new country, it developed its own candle customs . . . these deserve an article all its own.

Melodious church bells conclude the celebrations of Christmas Day, ringing throughout the land until the last stroke of the clock chimes farewell to the Holiday.

TREE IS OFTEN STARTING POINT

The traditional Christmas tree is most often the starting point for holiday decorating. Many historians give Martin Luther credit for introducing the decorated evergreen to Christoecorated evergreen to Christ-mas celebrations. Evergreens were abundant in his native Germany, and it's said that during a walk on a snowy Christmas Eve, Luther became enchanted with the beauty of the trees and the star filled sky.



When he rose again to his feet he saw in the spot where he had knelt a beautiful plant with scarlet leaves and a yellow flower in the center.

Dumbstruck, yet realizing he was witnessing a miracle, he gently plucked the stalk and took it, full of wonder, into the church to lay on the

The Mexicans called the plant "The Flower of the Holy Night."

Years later an American Ambassador to Mexico, Dr. Poinsett, took the plant to the United States. Thus, the name "poinsettia." Ironically we do not know the name of the little boy who experienced the miracle.





How To Select Christmas Toys

For parents and grandparents, much of the happiness of Christmas morning is the excitement of youngsters opening their gifts. For the preschooler himself, the rewards go far beyond the holiday morning, for well-chosen toys help him learn-while-playing throughout the year.

—Choose toys in bright

—Choose toys in bright primary colors (red, blue, yellow, green,) which are also pleasant to the touch and sight. Wood, for example, has "warm-th." solid feel and texture that

th," solid feel and texture that are satisfying to the preschooler.

—Toys should be portable enough to satisfy the child's insatiable desire to move and carry, but neither the toys themselves nor their parts should be so small that they defy a small hand to work them. hand to work them.

Toys should be durably and

soundly constructed so that they withstand a child's vigorous use. They should be safe, with well-finished edges and non-toxic

-Youngsters like to see how a toy works, to satisfy their curiosity about what makes it go. curiosity about what makes it go. If the toy is designed to be taken apart, it should be easy for the

apart, it snown be easy for the child to put it together again.

—Preschoolers need—and prefer—toys such as blocks, wagons, pounding benches, and disc stacks which can be "imagined into" many different play situations, rather than toys which merely recreate the adult world in miniature or toys which

world in miniature or toys which are electrically operated.

—The preschool child needs a variety of playtools. His toy "Wardrobe" should encourage the development of all of his senses, permitting him to exercise his skills, muscles, emotions, and imagination.

emotions, and imagination.

Parents can know best the kinds of toys their preschooler most enjoys by watching him at play. Be sure that you are buying a toy which is suitable for the child's age and stage of

development so that he is neither frustrated nor bored by it.





Fortunately, a threepanel U.S. Court of Ap-peals rejected the ACLU demand for omission of the Nativity Scene, and permitted construction




