



Dear Editor: Hurrah, the log cabin finished!

The Historical Society and Bicentennial Comm ittee want to thank everyone who helped work on the cabin and every-one who donated money or materials or lent tools. Together we did it and it shows how Ful-

ton County cares and works together. We especially want to thank the Manpower pro-which furnished thank the Manpower program, which furnished most of the labor, and Carl Davis, who acted as foreman and worked 20 days in the cabin, and Walter Jordan, who built the fireplace. And a great big thanks to Merrill Waltz, who worked on the cabin for five days finishing it in by putting in windows

up by putting in windows and the door, making a mantel for the fireplace, chinking between the logs, making a ladder to go up to the loft, etc.

Carl Davis made frames for the windows, which are old original ones are old original ones from the county courthouse, built in 1895. Hiram Ousley helped make the mantle. Mike Freece helped chink and donated a gallon of waterproofing to put between the logs and the cement floor.

The mantle was made from an ancient log beam donated by Ward Polley. It took five men to carthe mantle in and

place it above the fireplace on wooden brackets made by Merrill. The five men were Red O'Dell, Bruce Hess, Bob and Merrill Waltz and Hiram Bruce Ousley. Then they coated it with Penta to kill the termites. It looks very rustic and beautiful.

The door was donated by Ted Lewis of Akron, who says it is from a who says it is from a 100 year old house. Bob Waltz donated the lock for the door, and Merrill Waltz donated the latch and ceramic doorknobs. You may not think this is very auth-entic and that log ca-bins were more primitive bins were more primitive then that, but a look at the photos of the original cabins from which this was reconstructed will show that they had a paneled door and doorknobs. Their beds had coil springs too, so these inventions are older than we think.

some people have mentioned that the pitch of the roof is too steep and makes it look like an A-frame. This is the an A-frame. This is the original pitch of the roof, just the way it was on the cabin donated by Ted Merley. It was actually a two-story log house. But the high pitch helped allow rain to run off.

A few finishing touches like applying linseed oil to the exterior logs remains to be done. As Merrill Waltz says, you're never really done when it comes to fixing up a house. We need to install hidden electric heaters to drive away winter moisture and preserve the century old furniture that will soon

To finance the log cabin, we are selling Log Cabin Shares for \$1 or more. They are available at all the county banks, libraries, Harbanks, libraries, Har-desty Printing, Rochest-er News Stand, and the er News Stand, and the musuem. Those who donate \$10 or more will have their names put on the Bicentennial Lob Cabin Honor Roll, to be placed in the cabin.





Returning to this area in 1941 after a brush with death because of an ulcer, he felt it was time to slow down a bit. And, at 40, he felt his life's direction was changing: the music teacher was becoming a Bible teacher. However, it wasn't until 1948 that he finally left the public school system, having in the meantime

having in the meantime taught at Atwood in addition to farming.

Truth for Today classes soon kept him so busy he had to sell his livestock and rent his fields. Eventually, his photography hobby was discontinued because of the pressures of the new endeavor and, finally, even his music had to be set aside for a later time. "We never have enough time," he says.

In addition Tuesday night classes, which are attended by "0-40 people, depending on the night," Baker and on the hight, Baker and his wife, Mae, print and mail a monthly publication to 5,300 people in all 50 states and 47 countries, often work-ing until 11 p.m. to get the copy set and the paper printed and addressed. They also print booklets and make tapes that are sent to New Zealand, Australia, England, India and all over the United States.
Three radio programs are taped in their home for broadcast in Missouri, Arkansas and Oklahoma.

Seven years ago the Bakers made a speaking trip to England and trip to England Scotland, their overseas venture. lone However, they have spoken all over the United all over the United States and frequently speak in Canada. Their most recent trip was to Ontario in October, and it was typical of most of their meetings. "We began on Friday, had questions and answers # 888 *

on Saturday and three sessions on Sunday,"
Baker notes. The meetings are conducted in homes, bank basements, clubhouses and lodge-rooms and are kept as informal as those in the Baker living room.

"Our biggest reward is seeing people get interested in the Bi-ble," he says. "I don't pre-digest it for them. Real education is not cramming in facts; it's helping people want to find out. A lot of find out. A lot of people approach the Bible from an academic standpoint. But they can only learn by revelation. I can't teach the truths of the Bible."

Truth for Today has taken over the Baker home. Printing equipment lines a sunny porch; tapes and record-ers crowd the study and huge charts supporting Baker's theory that all scriptures are built on structures line the dining room and are mounted on an old camera stand in the living room. And, adhering to their motto, they fre-quently house overnight guests, sometimes


as long as a month.

"We never ask for money," Baker says proudly.
"Truth for Today is entirely self-supporting. The money just comes in. Sometimes someone we've never heard of writes out a check for a coup-le of hundred dollars and sends it to us."

The 80-mile drive from Port-au-Prince to the compound in Borel took four hours. "There were 13 of us and 400 pounds of luggage in that Jeep Rover," they recall.

But they found the rewards were great as they worked on the compound painting, building and doing secretarial work. In addition to this, they visited area churches, giving programs in each. Presented through interpreters, these consisted of test imonies, reading singing.

One of the churches was a three-hour horsewas a three-hour horse-back ride from the com-pound. The mountain roads took their toll on the horses that Nanon the horses that Nancy Rhoades describes as "so skinny that when we took the saddles off, we couldn't bear to look at the sores the saddles had rubbed. They said these places never heal because the horses stay because the horses stay so thin. They never have anything to eat ex-cept very hard grass."


He almost quit when

he cut his finger se-verely while skinning a verely while skinning a pigeon, but after a two-year layoff, he return-ed to the hobby and has pursued it steadily since. "It's hard work," he says. "Only one per-son out of every hundred who try it continues."

Although the work is hard, it is challenging, one that demands study and perfection. Wildlife and nature books abound in his recently remodeled garage on SR 19 north of Mentone, giving evidence that a correctly mounted head reflects re-search as well as taxi-

search as well as taxi-dermy skills. Smiley estimates he has preserved hundreds of birds, animals and fish but has only ruin-ed one---a quail that lost its feathers. lost its feathers.
"Birds are pretty hard," he acknowledges. "They have to be washed and skinned. Then you have to remove the fat and grease or you'll get a grease burn and all the feathers will fall out. After that you preserve it, add glass eyes and fix its bill and feet."





School board continues search for mechanic-body man

"It's pretty hard to get a good man in our salary range," Tippe-cance Valley School Corard later went into experition by the state of t poration business manager Robert Forbes said at Monday night's school board meeting as he de-scribed his attempts to fill the board's request for a qualified mechanic-body man to work in the corporation garage. "They all want more," he said. A motion made by Richard Goshert at last month's meeting had month's meeting had stipulated the administration be given leeway to man and equip the garage, which will be located in the former bus shed at the Mentone school, and had said the salary should be in the range of \$10,000 per year, depending on the qualifications of the individual found to man the garage.

Forbes presented the name of one person who had asked to be paid \$225 per week, along


