Rochester Zebras last Friday night 67-61 on the Zebras' home court.



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# The real meaning of Christmas

The snow is blowing and the days are getting shorter. People are busy overloading Uncle Sam's postal system and crowding like sardines into the stores that promise the perfect gift. For all the parties that have already been planned and attended there are still more to keep us busy. For some, this time of year is a happy one, waiting to hear from that long lost third cousin from Kansas or placing that colorful box with with the bright paper and bows under the tree. For some, it is a time to be forgotten, feeling deep in the heart that December is no different from any other month of the year. For most, it is a busy time when it is hard to catch your breath before the next task comes in the door. When it is finally all over, your sit down with your feet in a tub of hot water and watch Tommie's Hulk tear apart Mary's new Barbie house and wonder if you want to do it again next

The Christmas season has many varied meanings depending on who you ask. But if you were asked to try and pin point some basic elements, how would you answer? To help, I have a list of five traditions that pretty well describe the way we Americans go about the business of Christmas. Christmas is a time of families getting together, gift giving, celebration, spreading good cheer, and unfortunately a time of sorrow and sadness.

Most families make it a point to gather in from the four points of the compass at Christmas time. When it comes to family reunions, the biggest one took place a long time ago. Believe it on, families were called together because of an act of government. The time was more than 20 centuries ago and the place was Israel. "In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a cenus should be taken of the entire Roman world. And

everyone went into his own town to register. So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judah, to Bethlehem, the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child." Luke 2:1, 3-5 (New International Version). Soon after their journey, Mary gave birth to a boy, an event that was certainly not uncommon. In this case, there was something different. The parents were made aware of this beforehand but it didn't really dawn upon them until they were paid a visit by some very unusual visitors. ". and the star they had seen in the east went ahead of them until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw the star, they were overjoyed. On coming to the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshipped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold and of incense and of myrrh."
Matthew 2:9 -11. These Magi, or Wise Men as they have been called, were the gift givers on the first Christmas. This is a custom that is still a part of our present day

celebration. And a time of celebration it is! Christmas is a season when even the the toughest scrooge among us can seen putting aside a couple of days work and taking time to be thankful and joyful with family and friends. Even this idea can be traced back to that small village in Judea. "And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid. I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord. This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in strips of cloth and lying in a manger.' Suddenly a great company of

the heavenly host appeared with the angel, praising God and saying 'Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to men on whom his favor rests'." Luke 2:8-14.

Now that was quite a sight for someone whose job didn't include more excitement than getting one of those four-legged wool sweaters untangled from a bush every once in a while. So powerful was the celebration of the angels that the shepherds immediately forgot about their flocks and want to see the child. "So they hurrled off and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby, who was lying in the manger. When they had seen him, they spread the word concerning what had been told them about this child, and all who heard it were

amazed at what the shepherds said to them." Luke 2:16-18. Being recipients of such good news gave those herders an unyielding need to share it with everyone they knew. They couldn't keep a once-in-a-lifetime experience like this to themselves. In very much the same way we tell others about our good cheer by sending a Christmas card, making that "reach out and touch someone" phone call, or stopping by to pay that unexpected visit. In the midst of all the positive and good times, there is the sobering fact that many do not feel the joyous spirit of Christmas. This gives insight into the paradox that there are more suicides during

this time of the year. So great was the bustle and activity when Jesus was born that every

"hotel" was filled up. "While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in strips of cloth and placed him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the imn."

Fortunately one inn had room in the "garage" for the transportation of their day. Despite all these circumstances and the feeling of being crowded out and unwanted, God came down to earth in the form of a baby. The true meaning of Christmas is that God gave the greatest gift of all. We have only to open the package and accept it for ourselves.



holiday lighting can be energy-saving, too

When decorating for the holidays, take advantage of the latest energy-saving lighting techniques. Here are some tips for a safe, saving and sparkling Christmas.

- Use midget light sets. They use only about 18 watts per set.
- Outdoors, try the new lower watt bulbs that use less electricity than standard bulbs.
- To figure your holiday lighting load, multiply the number of bulbs by their watts.
- Do not use any 120-volt light sets on an aluminum tree.
   Use flood-lights only.
- When buying any new light set, look for the UL label. Most holiday light packages indicate whether the product is for indoor or outdoor use or both. A red UL label means the product is approved for outdoor use; those with green labels should be used indoors only.
- When outdoor plugs and connector joints are on the ground protect them from water and snow with plastic wrap.

# DINOSAUR FOSSILS ARE NOT FOUND IN INDIANA

But few people realize how extensive and varied in size these creatures were.

Many animals suddenly became extinct at the end of the Cretaceous Period, about 70 million years ago. Dinosaurs, flying and gliding reptiles, most marine reptiles, most shelled cephalopods, and other invertebrates vanished. Today's reptiles are lizards, turtles, snakes, alliga-

Dinosaurs are familiar extinct animals. tors, and crocodiles. Birds evolved late and are the dinosaurs' true descendants.

Although dinosaurs probably lived in Indiana, the bedrock and sediments that would have contained their remains have long since been removed. The youngest bedrock in Indiana is far too old to contain dinosaur fossils. Kansas and New Jersey are the nearest known localities of dinosaur remains.






