# **Mentone Town Board instructs** Bazini to prepare ordinances

Town attorney Lee Bazini was instructed to prepare two town ordinances, thereby formalizing current town policy and enabling the board to levy fines against violators. Decision to draft the ordinances was made at Monday's regular meeting of the Mentone Town Board, held at the clerk's

Although town guidelines are clearly set out in minutes of previous meetings, trustees Jim Tombaugh Miller and Wayne agreed an ordinance would remove any possibility of error From the guarded discussion, it was evident a situation presently exists concerning bringing tem-porary buildings (trailers) into town limits, but Deputy Russ Hart declined to speak of it in public meeting .

The second ordinance concerns burning leaves on paved surfaces in town. A penalty of no less than \$1 and no more than \$100 will be included in that ordinance.

Member Frank Hardesty, who did not seek re-election in November, congratulated trustee-elect Miriam Boardman, who was in attendance, on her successful bid for his seat. He also stated it had

Clerk-treasurer Whetstone, Bazini and all three trustees spent much time discussing budgeting procedure and the water department with Boardman. Boardman, who is currently secretary of the Zoning Board of Appeals, will be replaced on that committee and will automatically become a member of the Plan Commission once she takes office

In other business: Trustees discussed the possibility of taking out the phone at the water plant. Miller reported the 1982 phone bill was \$540, with \$288 in long distance phoning. Whetstone suggested a log of calls like that kept by the police department would assist her when paying phone bills. Deputy Hart pointed out that if Superintendent Shand was asked to use the police phone, it would cause problems for that department. Trustees agreed to keep the phone for now, with Shand's assurance he's kept a log of all calls for the past several

### TAKEN FROM THE AKRON NEWS DECEMBER 7, 1933 50 YEARS AGO

"What the Farm Bureau means to the people of this commun-

The Henry Township Farm Bureau meetings are attended by large crowds of people interested in future agriculture. Not less than two hundred people meet every third Monday night in the month to enjoy the Farm Bureau programs. These programs are made up of a business session, a speaker and an entertainment sponsored by the social and educational director.

The Farm Bureau encourages boys and girls club work. These boys and girls are being trained for the adult organization of future years.

The purpose of the social and education department is to interest, inspire and enlist every farm family in cooperative endeavor to secure an adequate standard of living in the farm home.

The tax and legislative department functions to protect farmers in matters of taxes and legislation. It sponsors and works for laws designed to provide a fair tax system and other legislation giving rural people an equal advantage with other industries. It has for years urged scrutiny of local government budgets which has resulted in saving millions of dollars in taxes. It was the Farm Bureau which secured an average reduction of 15 percent in farm land assessments through special action of the state tax board in 1927 and led the fight for a further reduction in 1932.

aim of the cooperative purchasing is to provide quality farm supplies protection in price and economical distribution. It also develops a state wide business institution designed to meet various important needs of its

The goal of the Farm Bureau is that it works full time for agriculture and has for its aim the making of every farm family in America prosperous, happy and contented and the rural community an enjoyable place in which to

The Farm Bureau enables the

farmers to do collectively the things he cannot hope to do individually; it has reduced cost of farm supplies; it is an economical, social, and educational asset to township, county, state and nation.

Mentone Community Fair Association was held in the basement of the Mentone Methodist Church Wednesday evening with representatives from all the surrounding communities. A dinner, supplied by the ladies of the church, was enjoyed prior to the business session.

The nominating committee submitted the names to be voted upon for the officials for the ensuing year. An opportunity for additional nominations from the floor was given, but as none were nominated, the report of the committee was accepted and all were elected by acclamation. The officers elected are as follows:

O.A. Heighway, President, Chester Herendeen, vice president and general manager. A.F. Mollenhour, secretary. M.O. Mentzer, treasurer.

The chairmen of the various committees, along with the officers named above, will serve as the board of directors.

O.A. Heighway, president for the past several years, presided during the evening, during which time enthusiasm for a fair in 1944 grew into a strong, unanimous determination to do our best in '44. The usual date on the third week in August, August 16-19, was chosen for the 1944 event and barring any unforseen turn of events, plans are going forward accordingly.

The association now boasts of a membership of 104, fifty of whom have been added in the past few months. The original members paid off all the obligations of the association and the money received from the recently-acquired membership is being used to paint the buildings at the fair grounds. ### Claypool woman dies in accident

A rural Claypool woman was killed in a one-vehicle accident on Kosciusko County roads, late Friday night.

Margaret A. Clemens, 30. Rt. 2, Claypool, was pronounced dead at the scene on County Farm Road, near the intersection of County Rd. 600 South.

According to Kosciusko Police, a Bronco driven by Roger L. Clemens Jr., 34, Rt. 2, Claypool, was traveling south on County Farm Road shortly before 11 p.m. when it went out of control 1,200 feet north of County Rd. 600 South.

# TVSC board members adjust calendar

At Monday's meeting of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation board, board members were forced to juggle the 1983-84 school calendar to comply with State and federal requirements.

hen the school calendar was set last spring, trustees over-looked the fact that Monday, Jan. 2 would be a federal holiday. On the recommendation of Superintendent Baxter Paige, accepted a Christmas break from end of school on Friday, Dec. 16 to Jan. 2, 1984. At Mon-day's meeting, however, Paige informed trustees they'd need to make an adjustment. Among the options open to the board simply dropping a day, making up the day on a Saturday or in extra hours, or by extending May 24 to a full day of school instead of the half day originally scheduled. Paige added that the North Miami School Corporation had chosen the last solution, and board mem-hers unanimously voted to do

The corporation received only one bid in response to an advertisement for temporary loan

warrants. The school advertised for a bid of \$460,000 for the general fund, \$153,000 for the debt services fund and \$71,000 for the transportation fund, and the Akron Exchange State Bank bid the full amount at an interest rate of eight percent per annum. The loan, which will cover the lapse caused by the State delaying monthly allotments to school corporations, will be due June 29, 1984. A \$655,000 loan currently outstanding is due on Dec. 31 this year. The trustees voted to accept the bid from the Akron bank.

Paige informed trustees he'd been contacted by Gary Ellenwood, president of the Tippecance Valley Aquatic Club, with a request that people outside the school district be allowed to join TVAC. Stating that while such action might be of benefit to TVAC because they have a paying membership, Paige advised it would not be in the best interest of the corporation. Trustee Jim Royer moved to accept Paige's recommendation, with Cecil Miller seconding the motion. On a roll call vote, Royer, Miller, William

Rogers, Fred McSherry and President Richard Long denied the request.

In a separate action, however, they did approve a request to reappoint Wayne Cumberland to another two-year term on the TVAC Board of Directors.

High School guidance counselor Sandra Carmichael Sandra Carmichael addressed board members about advances in the career education program at TVHS. In the time she's been employed by the corporation, Carmichael has greatly expanded the program, offering a variety of opportunities for students to make career decisions. In addition to a Career Day held last April which involved all high school students and 49 local speakers, Carmichael has organized a Sophomore Decision Making Project in conjunction with educator Beth Barr, an exnanded Career Resource Center, and a career planning course for non-college bound students. She hopes to arrange a Career Day annually.

In other business: Trustees approved a transfer of appropriations of approximately \$120,000 within major classifications in the general fund, \$4000 within the transportation fund and \$2,845 within the debt services fund. The transfers are necessary to balance the budget by the end of calendar-year 1983.

Board members accepted the resignations of Wade Holloway, bus driver, and Ken Castleman, educator. In other personnel business, they approved Jane Hunn as coach of the seventh grade girls

were approved for second semester of the '83-'84 school year for Linda Studebaker and Bonnie Kramer.

Board members approved a request for Don Craw to serve on a North Central evaluation team in April next year. Team will evaluate Morton Memorial High School.

Trustees approved claims of \$277,262.61 and a net payroll of \$75,291.06.

Principals at all three elementary schools reported students will have Christmas parties this Friday, Dec. 16, in the afternoon after receiving Santa Claus that morning. Burket's Oliver England announced their musical will be tonight, Wednesday, Dec. 14, while Dan Kramer, Akron, reported Akron's Christmas program was re-scheduled for tomorrow, Dec. 15. Ron Leichty, Mentone, announced their Christmas concert was slated for last evening. National Honor Society inductees will be honored at Mentone this Friday at 12:30 p.m.

# **Down Memory Lane**

TAKEN FROM THE AKRON NEWS **DECEMBER 14, 1933** 50 YEARS AGO

The Akron Chamber of Commerce sent a letter on Tuesday of this week to the Borden Farm Products Company of Chicago to which was affixed the names of every businessman in Akron. The letter was sent to express appreciation for the many years of busi ness which Akron has enjoyed with the Chicago company and to express a desire on the part of the community to keep the plant in operation if at all possible.

Val Zimmerman, chairman of Fulton County NRA drive, relinquished the position Wednesday when the entire county CWA underwent a complete re-organization.

Daniel Perry, former prosecutor, and Charles Jones Jr., have been appointed to fill the chairman's position and offices have been established in the city hall at Zimmerman Rochester. Mr. turned over all records and data of the work to date and stepped out of the job.

Reuben Scheld, Dr. M.O. King, Walt Brubaker and Rollin Pontious were appointed as the reemployment advisory committee and will work in an advisory capacity in cooperation with the administrators.

Mr. Zimmerman has been very efficient in handling the chairmanship and was successful in getting the organization in good shape on very short notice. majority of the people interested in the work from Henry Township felt that he was doing a good

piece of work.

Reasons for the appointment of the new chairman were given by the state and district directors to the effects that the work demanded two men instead of one and that it was a full-time job instead of a part-time one.

he new directors, Mr. Perry and Mr. Jones, are well known in Henry Township.

# Akron Post Office address requirements

Rural route residents and post office box holders should be using their correct address on all correspondence. County road numbers, street addresses, rural route addresses without box numbers, incorrect box numbers, and missing addresses are commonplace and can result in delayed mail, misdelivered mail, and mail returned to sender due to insufficient address.

Post office box holders and rural route residents who have elected to receive mail through a post office box must use their post office box address on all mail. The correct rural route and rural box number or street address may be used in addition to the post office box number.

Persons receiving mail at their rural route address must use their correct rural route and rural box number on all correspondence. Rural route residents will be receiving notices in their mailbox within the next week of their correct address. New housing and the ensuing growth of the rural routes made re-numbering of rural boxes necessary a few years ago. Residents were at that time notified of their new box number

but are being re-notified due to the use of many out-dated box

Check for a correct address on all mail: bills; statements; personal and business correspondence; all and business correspondence; and when subscribing to or renewing subscriptions to newspapers and magazines. Notify all correspondents and publishers of the correct address either by return mail or by using forms available free of charge from your mail carrier or the post office.

Rural route residents are required to place their rural route number and rural box number on their mailbox so it is visible to the mail carrier as he approaches the mailbox, or on the front of the mailbox if it is part of a group.

Rural route residents may purchase stamps, postal cards, stamped envelopes, and money orders, and certify, register, or insure mail from their mail carrier. Please buy a supply of stamps and affix proper postage to all outgoing letters.



### Akron's new board members inaugurated

Several people attended Tuesday, Dec. 20 meeting of the Akron town board to witness the inauguration of the newly-elected board members. Last November's election marked the first time in Akron's history that a full slate of Democrats was elected to the board.

Current board president, Ron Fenimore, extended a welcome to those present and urged them to attend future meetings in support of the new board. Clerk-treasurer Ernest "Ernie" Smith issued the oath of office to incoming clerktreasurer Sarah Jane Sutton and Drudge, trustees-elect Richard Jack Miller and Jerry Hudson.

Current trustees Fenimore. Vernon "Bud" Waymire and Dr. Charles Miller spent much of the evening informing the new members of the status of several projects.

estimates from local body shops for restoring the town's trash compactor. The 12-year old compactor has less than 40,000 miles use, but the body of the truck is in need of repair. Fenimore reported used trash compactors are priced between \$30,000 \$40,000, so it's in the best interest of the town to restore this truck.

John Gagnon, of Gagnon's Chevrolet, estimated work on the compactor at \$500, while Martin, owner of Hoffman Body Shop, offered an estimate \$1600. Martin's estimate included more extensive restoration, and Fenimore said he'd check into the matter further.

Due to the age and condition of Akron's equipment, they recommended the stations be completely inspected and serviced three times annually at a cost of \$290 per visit, plus time and material if necessary.

Waymire felt this was excesalthough he agreed that regular inspections would be beneficial. After discussing the promonth checks would be sufficient

Smith reported the Blue Cross Blue Shield premium due Sept. 1 has still not been paid. Smith has written letters requesting an explanation for the 77 percent increase in the town's policy, but none of his letters have been

The trustees accepted Marshall Dave Kruger's report for the month of November. It included 1.726 miles patrolled, five accident investigations, five com-plaints, one funeral escort, six arrests, five written warnings, and seven verbal warnings. It also included two attempted break-ins, two break-ins, three theft reports. one county assist, two fire department assists, and one ambulance

The next regular meeting of the board will be Tuesday, Jan. 17, at 7 n.m. in the town offices





### Know THE Weather

Why is it that, in most areas of the country, winter brings with it so many long,

winter produces more rainy spells?
Winter produces more rainy spells of several days' duration than summer for several reasons.

One of the main reasons is that winter's colder earth and ever-present cold air creates more of the cloudforming or cooling action that makes for cloud and rain. Warm air moving into

cold winter air (a warm front) can set up a rainy area for hundreds of miles.

Since a warm front moves forward more slowly than a cold front, this mass of cold and rain takes several days to os overhead.
Occasionally a warm front

or an occluded front will become stationary over an area, and in winter this usually means several days of bad, rainy weather.

of long duration but rarely produce thunder. lightning and
