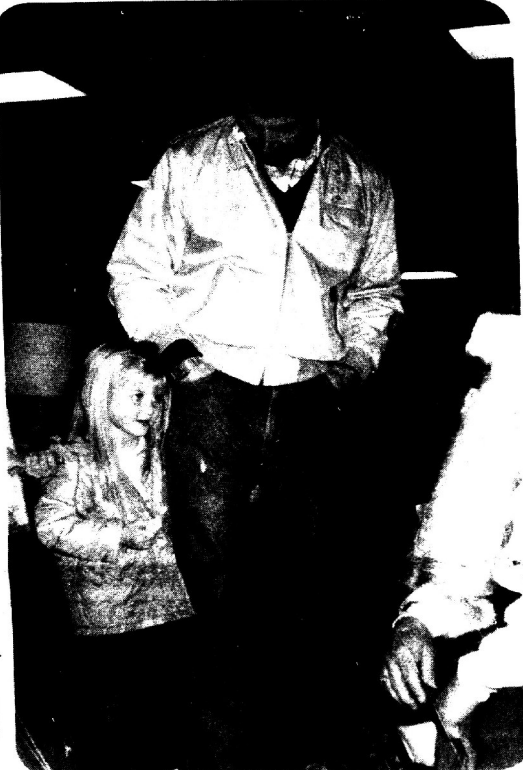

Freshman Danita Boggs and sophomore Gary LaMar recently qualified to compete in the Athletics Congress National Junior Olympics Cross Country Championships, to be held this Saturday, Dec. 8 in St. Louis, MO.

LaMar finished 12th in the 15-16 age group in individual competition at the Region 6 Cross Country Meet held in Madison, WI on November 17. His third year at the regional meet, this was his first year to qualify for the nationals, as only the top 15 individuals in each

age group advance. Boggs, who finished 26th individually, will compete in nationals as a member of the St. Joe Valley girls team, who finished second place in the 13-14 age group at the Madison competitions. In addition to Boggs, other members of the team include four South Bend teens, and one each from Columbia City and Warsaw.

Proper packing assists safe delivery of holiday packages

Proper packing and addressing are the best ways to have your parcel delivered through the mail without delay or damage. The U.S. Postal Service offers some guidelines on preparing a package for mailing.

Use containers strong enough, such as heavy fiberboard boxes, reinforced bags, or tubes, to protect the contents during handling. Lightweight gift boxes should not be used.

Cushion and secure the contents to ensure they do not move inside the container, especially important when mailing fragile items. When several items are packed together, be sure each item is individually cushioned. Suitable cushioning materials are shredded or crumpled newspaper, plastic or fiberboard inserts, and plastic or styrofoam chips.

Packages containing breakable items should be marked "Fragile" in three places: above the address, below the postage, and on the reverse side. Food or other perishable items should be marked "Perishable." Photographs or other items that should not be folded should be reinforced with a cardboard insert and marked "Do not Bend."

Use filament reinforced tape to seal parcels. Masking tape and cellophane tape do not seal a parcel securely. Avoid tying parcels with twine or string as they tend to get caught in mail processing equipment. Parcels should not be wrapped in gift wrap or brown paper. Any writing on the parcel other than the address should be marked over before the parcel is mailed.

The package should be clearly addressed on one side only with both the sender and the addressee's complete address, including zip code. Use ink that is not easily smeared or rubbed off. The addresses should be written directly on the package rather than on a slip of paper or a label taped or glued to the surface. Do not cover the address side of the parcel with cellophane tape either under or over the address since postage stamps and other labels will not adhere to that surface. The name and address of both the sender and the addressee should be inserted in

the parcel. This will allow delivery even if the outside address becomes unreadable.

A parcel can weigh up to 70 pounds and measure up to 108 inches in length and girth (the distance around the thickest part of the package) combined. The Postal Service offers several ways to mail packages. Express Mail Next Day Service is available to a network of cities when a package must be delivered overnight. Packages weighing over 13 ounces can be sent by Priority Mail and will be delivered anywhere in the continental United States within two or three days. Clearly mark the parcel "Priority Mail" or affix "Priority Mail" labels, available free at your post office. The most economical method of sending packages is Parcel Post. Delivery usually takes from one to ten days depending on the distance the package must

travel. Third class mail is an inexpensive way to mail packages that weigh under a pound. A package can be sent from any post office and delivery standards are similar to those for parcel post.

Those packages mailed to APO or FPO addresses can be expedited by using SAM or PAL Services. SAM parcels can weigh up to 15 pounds and go by the surface rate to the APO or FPO. If space is available, it will be flown to its destination; if not, it goes by surface carrier. If sent by PAL rates, the parcel will be flown from the post office of mailing to the destination post office. PAL parcels can weigh up to 30 pounds and require a minimal fee in addition to parcel post package rates. Consult your post office for a schedule of early mailing dates for Christmas delivery of APO/FPO parcels.

Mollie had had her picture taken before. In fact, she would have to check to be sure, but she thought there were several on her dresser. The graduation picture of her with the outdated hairdo, their wedding picture with both looking radiant, one of her with children and maybe one of a small dog by a large chair.

However, this picture was special - she had carried it everywhere for months. Daily she showed it to the doctors and the attendants - even pulled it out and thrust it in front of any strangers who visited the ward.

Someone had taken the polaroid shot and handed it to her on the spot at the Christmas party in December. Several people had come to the party - bringing gifts - singing - serving cookies - and smiling. They had said they were from the Mental Health Association. They had sat with her and she had told them things about herself that she hadn't thought about for some time. In a mental hospital the past doesn't intrude on the daily routine unless it is hidden by some external stimulus.

Mollie took her picture out of her dress pocket and smoothed the edges before she gazed intently at the familiar faces. It was hard to recall why she was smiling but she remembered the warm feeling of the moment. Although she had never said so, it could be that the picture had become precious to her, not because she was smiling, but because the other face in the picture was looking at her with understanding and affection - like a real friend, a friend she had met and known for only one brief hour before Christmas - but a friend who had told her by her presence that she cared that Mollie was alone at this season and that she had not only a gift to share but her time and herself as well.

Mollie slipped the picture back in its familiar place in her pocket. How long till next Christmas she wondered.

Not long! "Next" Christmas is coming fast and there is a great need for gifts for Mollie and the others who share her isolation from the season's activities. There is also a need for people to take the gifts to the parties.

You can smile for Mollie by selecting a special gift and placing it in the collection box at your local Hook's Drug Store or by calling your local Mental Health Association and offering to bring a gift or to serve at the local Christmas party in the state hospital, community mental health center or nursing home. Maybe someone will take your picture.

The B team won in a close 34-32 decision. Phil Arney was high scorer with 18 points, while Chris Start added nine. Their record is now 3-1.

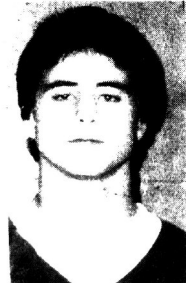

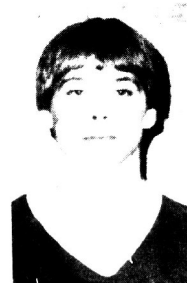

The B team also won with a 72-21 romp. Tim Sparrow and Dustin DuBois led the way with 21 points

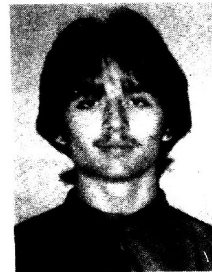
and 20 points, respectively. Their record now stands at 2-0.

Tippecanoe Valley School Board approves administrative, non-certified personnel raises

The regular December meeting of the Tippecanoe Valley School Board began with several recommendations made by Superintendent Baxter Paige which met with approval of all board members. Among those made were: the hiring of a financial consultant and a project management firm for the corporation's new building project, salary raises for administrators, non-certified personnel and board members and appointments to several advisory boards for high school organizations.

After interviewing four management consultant companies, board members have unanimously approved hiring the firm of Skillman Corporation of Indianapolis as their choice to organize the new building project which will include a new Akron Junior High School and renovating the Burket and Mentone schools.

Skillman Corporation will be in charge of the design and development stages of the project and the break-down on contracts for firms doing the actual construction work. They will provide a follow-up with an on-site team organizing the total program to get the projects finished on time. Using a management consultant firm to organize the project gives the "owner" a representative view other than a construction view of the projects.

The board voted to hire as financial advisor for the project Dr. Theodore Kowalski, Dean of the School of Education at Ball State University, to act as corporation representative. He will co-ordinate monies raised through bond sales and corporation funds available for the building projects.

Superintendent Paige stated that the next step in the construction project will be the observation of Public Law 1028, which decrees that a corporation hold a public hearing before continuing with building projects, such as the hiring of an architect.

Approve salary raises
Board members voted to approve salary raises for administrators and

non-certified personnel and also gave themselves a raise, all of which had been tabled since last June's school board meeting. It was decided during the June meeting that because of the corporation's financial squeeze, due to delinquent tax monies from both Fulton and Kosciusko counties, the pay raises would have to wait until the end of the year.

Administrative salaries retroactive to July 1, 1984 are as follows: Superintendent Paige, 45,000; Principal John Hill, 37,060; Asst. Principal Mark Skiles, 28,750; Principal Dan Kramer, 30,340 plus 2,000 as Chapter 1 Director; Principal Ron Leichy, 30,000; Principal Oliver England, 28,920; Bob DuBois, 28,195 plus 4,000 for head boys basketball coach.

Food distribution today

Kosciusko County and the counties of Fulton, Marshall, Elkhart, and St. Joseph will distribute two kinds of cheese, butter and a jar of honey to qualifying households on Wednesday, Dec. 12.

Locally the Kosciusko County Chapter American Red Cross is in charge of the distribution, which will begin at all sites in Kosciusko County at 10 a.m. and continue until 6 p.m. or until supply is gone.

There will be 37,200 pounds of American Cheese (five pound blocks), cheddar cheese (two pound blocks), 14,976 pounds of butter, and 6,876 jars of honey available for eligible recipients, who are advised to bring bags in which to carry their commodities.

Third-party pick-up must present a written request and identification of recipient. They must also complete the eligibility certificate, signing the recipients' and their name and address. S.S.I., AFDC, Medicaid, Food Stamps, Project Safe, and other, are eligibility classifications. Other includes township trustee relief and other types of welfare.

Social Security is an income, not a welfare program, and those recipients need only sign name, address, age, and number in

Santa Claus Wasn't

Santa Claus wasn't always the round, cheerful figure we know today. He was first pictured as a rather dignified person in long robes. That's because the idea of this gift bringer is based on St. Nicholas, a real 4th century bishop. One of the stories about him is this: Hearing of a nobleman who had no money for his daughter's dowries, St. Nicholas rode by their house and tossed in three bags of gold. One bag fell into a stocking drying by the chimney and so the custom of hanging up Christmas stockings began. FIRST AID

FOR TOOTHACHE

By far, the most common dental emergency is the toothache. Pain usually indicates that decay is present and can be irritating to the pulp (a soft tissue in the center of the tooth containing blood vessels and nerve tissue).

The best first aid? Clean the tooth as thoroughly as possible with a toothbrush and rinse the mouth vigorously with warm water to remove any food that may be lodged. Use dental floss to remove particles of food and place a cotton pellet with oil of cloves on the tooth to TEMPORARILY alleviate the pain.

An abscess caused toothache is often the most painful and is frequently accompanied by swelling of the jaw or face. An abscess is a localized collection of pus in any part of the mouth formed by tissue disintegration and surrounded by an inflamed area.

Aspirin swallowed, NEVER held against the tooth or gum will help reduce the pain. Immediate attention by a dentist is needed to drain the infection. Never use prolonged medication with either pain killer or antibiotics. These may temporarily alleviate the symptoms but will not eliminate the problem.

Veteran job training extended

Recent legislation has been passed that extends eligibility for unemployed Vietnam Era and Korean Conflict veterans under the Jobs Training Program.

"A veteran's Certificate of Eligibility will now be valid for 90 days from the date it was issued. Also, the period an employer has to apply for approval has been extended to February 28, 1985," said Roy C. Wetherell, Director of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Indianapolis.

"This program marks the first time that employers have been paid directly to train and hire veterans," said Wetherell. "It pays 50% of a veteran's starting wage up to \$10,000."

To qualify, a Korean Conflict or Vietnam Era veteran must have been unemployed for at least 15 of the 20 weeks prior to filing an application. The maximum training period is nine months or up to 15 months for disabled veterans with a serious employment handicap.

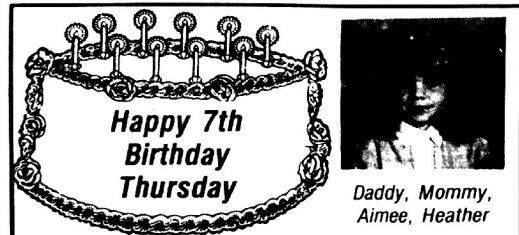

"White Christmas" old favorite

Israel Isidore "Izzy" Baline, a Jewish immigrant from Russia, wrote it; we all know the "dreamy" words; and many of us have grown up with it as an ideal for a traditional Christmas.

If you're a Trivial Pursuit fan, you'll know what "it" is "White Christmas." And Israel Isidore Baline translates into songwriter Irving Berlin.

This now-standard Christmas song found its start toward stardom when Bing Crosby sang it to actress Marjorie Reynolds in the 1942 film "Holiday Inn." The movie hit the proverbial box office "spot" because of "White Christmas," the song went on to win an Academy Award, adding to its popularity, and Bing Crosby's recording sold 25 million copies.

Now, 42 years later, many are probably not aware that in addition to being among the favorite Christmas songs of all time, "White Christmas" was one of World War II's most poignant sentimental tunes.

It all started, according to sources at Indiana University Library, when Berlin sold to Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer a story originally

intended for a lavish Broadway musical, which he had adapted as a screen vehicle for Bing Crosby and Fred Astaire. The movie was called "Holiday Inn" and, in addition to the inn's two proprietors being in love with the same girl, the plot called for a song about every major American holiday. Obviously, the Christmas season's song was "White Christmas."

However, with the turmoil of the times in 1942, "White Christmas" came to serve as a comforting reminder of home for soldiers fighting their way through the jungles of the Pacific. Young men attacked by homesickness more

times than by the Japanese, found in this ballad sweet memories and a reminder of happier days in happier places. Throughout the battlefields of the Pacific, American soldiers sang "White Christmas" as they sang no other song.

Berlin, who considers "White Christmas" as one of his greatest works, probably did not realize one song could mean so much to so many people down through the

Holiday toy safety tips

For shoppers who have to select from the multitude of toys during the holiday season, the Indiana Society to Prevent Blindness offers a valuable suggestion: Keep in Mind How Safe A Particular Toy is for The Child who will Receive It - And for Other Children (Sisters, Brothers, Playmates) who also are likely to play with it. Right away, says Sue Hetherington, executive director of the Indiana Society, shoppers will be able to rule out hundreds of items - and she adds, maybe save themselves from a stimulus blowout in the toy department or toy-store.

Children's toy-related eye injuries accounted for an estimated 7,107 visits to hospital emergency rooms last year, according to Hetherington. To help shoppers make wise selections and save their children from becoming an eye-injury statistic, the Society offers these tips:

- Check toys for sharp, exposed edges, points, nails, screws, and pins;
- Avoid projectile items, such as guns, that shoot darts or corks;
- Examine dolls, stuffed animals, etc., for rigid interior frames that can poke through outside coverings;
- Check for loose parts that can become unattached, exposing sharp metal or plastic;
- Avoid toys that shatter or break easily.

Another factor to consider is whether or not the toy will be used only with adult supervision. Hetherington reminds shoppers that some toys are safe WITH an adult supervising, but can be hazardous to a naturally curious child who is left alone. "It's important that

parents know what their youngsters do at play. Do they take a 'safe' toy and make it unsafe - for example, by pulling rubber tips off darts? Does the child understand safety risks and dangers and avoid them? Do older children keep their more complex toys and games out of reach of younger family members?

Also of concern for those selecting gifts for children is the non-toy article used for sports and recreation. Projectile non-toys, such as BB, air, spring operated guns, slingshots, bows and arrows, and darts, were responsible for 2,083 eye injuries last year - with about 77 percent of them happening to children under 15 years of age. In addition, 40,000 sports-related eye injuries (to all age groups) are treated in hospital emergency rooms each year; others are treated by eye doctors in their offices. Children between five and 14 years of age are the major victims of eye injuries from baseballs. Hetherington emphasizes, "The naked eye is not safe in any sport that involves a ball, puck, shuttlecock, or other object that is hit, shot, thrown, or kicked, or one that involves body contact. In buying equipment for such sports, people need to think about buying proper safety eyewear for the youngster.

Survivors of a deceased veteran or a person covered by Social Security are entitled to substantial cash benefits, such as:

1. Lump Sum Death Payment from Social Security of about \$255, but only to spouse and dependent children of the worker.

2. To veterans getting V.A. compensation or pension a \$300 death allowance.

3. To all honorably discharged veterans a \$150 plot allowance if not to be buried in a national cemetery plus about \$59 for a grave marker plus an American flag. There is also an allowance of up to \$1100 when a veteran dies of a service-connected disability.

4. Monthly income benefits from Social Security, depending on eligibilities (length of time covered, number of dependent children, etc.)

Groninger to leave Akron Bank

Harold Groninger, former president and chairman of the board of Akron Exchange State Bank, will end his day-to-day involvement with banking on December 31. "It's time to step out," he says in regard to his decision not to return to the bank following his annual vacation in Florida.

Groninger, whose banking career spanned 47 years that included the Depression, World War II, the Korean and Vietnamese conflicts and other periods of financial and political turmoil, joined the bank in February of 1937. With the exception of two years in which he worked at First National Bank of Warsaw, he has been there ever since. On his return in 1944, he was named cashier, a position he held until being named president in 1955. He resigned from that office in November of 1977 but continued as chairman of the board of directors until April of 1984. He has been a director since 1945.

In addition to his involvement with the Akron bank, Groninger also served as a director of First National Bank in Rochester from 1957 to 1980 and was a member of the Indiana Department of Financial Institutions from 1974 to 1981.

During his tenure, the bank, a result of the merger of the State Bank and the Exchange Bank, erected the building it now occupies and that was expanded in 1984.

J. Randall Leminger, who succeeded Groninger as president and chairman, said this week, "Harold Groninger has been a valuable asset to our community, and we will miss him."

Mentone hires trash collector

A brief meeting Monday evening saw the Town of Mentone hire Stafford and Sons, Warsaw, to begin weekly trash pick-up Thursdays, January 3.

The cost of the service to the town is \$650 per month, of which each town residence will be charged \$2 per month. This bill will

No action on request by Akron Postmistress

The Akron Town Board met last Tuesday, December 18, in regular meeting with several town patrons in the audience. The meeting was called to order by President Jack Miller with Trustees Dick Drudge and Jerry Hudson in attendance along with Clerk Sarah J. Sutton. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Miller noted that the board had checked with their attorney Bob Peterson and found it was legal to shut off water to patrons who had not paid their water bills on time. He said the town still has \$3,168 in arrears on water and sewage bills, and noted that residents who had been late, are now paying 10% on their delinquent bills, plus keeping up on their present bills. If bills are not paid, the town may shut off the water and there will be a \$4 charge to turn it back on.

Miller read a resolution of the Town Board appointing Sarah J. Sutton, Clerk, as the town representative to appear in Small Claims Court if there is a need to take any of the claims into court to be collected. Claims not exceeding \$300 can be handled in this manner.

It was noted that the new stop signs at the corner of Central and Slaybaugh Streets in the northeast section of Akron which had been installed, but were not handling the problem, had already been replaced by larger signs, which are much easier to see. Police were to begin issuing tickets as of December 1, to motorists not stopping at the intersection.

Miller said he had found the locks on the restrooms and storage room at the Akron Park had been broken, although there was no damage done or anything taken. The locks have been replaced.

Request parking solution

Town patron Mrs. Hammer, who lives on East Rochester St., and the Orchard St. extension appeared at the meeting to ask that the town do something about the parking on Orchard St. Ext. The street is very narrow, she said and if cars or vans are parked on both sides, it is impossible to drive down the street to get into her garage, which is the only parking she has close to her house. Trustee Miller noted that the resident living on the south side of Orchard St. Ext., Howard Gaby had placed cement blocks along his property, and not having had the property surveyed at the time, had placed the blocks three feet into the street on town property, so when patrons parked on both sides of the street it was impossible for anyone to drive through. Miller had asked Officer Jim Spangle to take pictures, which were shown to the board members.

The board passed a motion to ask Mr. Gaby to move the blocks and discussed the possibility of placing No Parking signs on the north side of the extension, which would widen the street for traffic. The No Parking signs, Mrs. Hammer noted would make it difficult for anyone visiting her home to park anywhere close, but did not know what the answer to the problem would be. The board decided to go along with having the blocks moved first, and see if the parking problems would be alleviated.

Handicap parking

Clerk Sutton said she had been asked if the town would be fixing the corners of the sidewalks at the four-way stop in the middle of town like the corner at Kindig Realty has been fixed, for access to the sidewalks for handicapped people. Miller noted that they probably

would not since there was already access on all sides of the street to the sidewalk. There are places to gain access to the sidewalk at the Methodist Church corner, the bank drive, Holloway Shop corner. He did note, however, that there would soon be handicapped parking space available close to the corners.

Question on lock-up

Postmistress Mary Ann Billman appeared at the meeting to request the board allow the town policemen to lock the building where the post office is located, so the lobby could be kept open until 7 p.m. each evening, allowing people with mailboxes in the lobby, access to their mail after the present 5 p.m. closing time.

She noted that if any of the postal employees were asked to lock up, they would have to be paid for two extra hours of work time, since this is what their union allows. She stated there were no specifications on the lease with the owners of the building which stated anything about the hours the building could be kept open, or any specific-

tions about utilities. She said the town would not be liable for any damage done to the building, during the extra hours the lobby would be open and would give the town a letter stating that they would not be held liable. She noted also that although the owners of the building were not happy with the proposed extra hours, there was no reason given for their opposition. Billman stated the lobby would be open an extra ten hours per week. Trustee Miller said that the police might not be available every evening at 7 p.m. to lock the building as required, since they could be called out of the police office on a run. Ms. Billman said she realized this, but it would be taken into consideration that it might not be right at 7 p.m. but as close to that time as possible.

Trustee Dick Drudge asked Ms. Billman why the Akron Police Dept. should be asked to lock up a Federal building. He noted other businesses could then ask the police to lock up their businesses also. Billman told him that several other local towns had agreed to their police departments providing their services for the post offices. Drudge asked her if she couldn't do the job, but Billman noted that with her 7.5 job she didn't relish being available an extra two hours every day. At this, Drudge told her that he would never vote yes on the issue. Ms. Billman told him it would be just another service to the public provided by the town, but Drudge held firm on his objection to the issue. Trustee Jerry Hudson noted that he thought it should be up to the postal employees to lock their building. When Miller asked Officer Jim Spangle if he had any comments

about the prospect of providing the service, Spangle had none.

Patron Loren Sheetz, noted that police do their regular door checks every evening and asked what the objection would be to locking a door found open. He was told that if a door is found open, the owner is called in to lock it, the police officer does not carry the keys. Sheetz asked if it is taking any of the town's money or putting the town out in any fashion to go ahead and lock the door. He noted that it would appear that the town would be out nothing yet it would offer a longer time for residents to have access to the mail if the lobby were open longer. He said it would appear that the town would have nothing to lose and everything to gain. At this point, Trustee Miller made a motion to have the town police lock up the post office doors at or around 7 p.m. in the evening, but the motion failed for lack of a second.

Cut phone calls

Board President Miller, in other business asked police Officer Spangle to try to cut down on the long distance calls made by the Police Department. He asked if some of the phone calls could be put on the police radio, but Spangle noted that when you are dealing in people's names, you should not use the radio. He also noted that a lot of the calls are reports given to the Sheriff's Office at Rochester. Miller asked for the monthly police report, which was given to the board at the close of the meeting.

Akron Police report

Police activity for the month of November included a total of 1,571 miles patrolled in the police car. Three accidents were investigated, the department handled one dog

complaint, found one door open on door check, handled one funeral escort and made four ambulance assists. The department made 8 arrests, gave 18 written warnings, made four verbal warnings, gave three motorist assists and two public assists. They handled two title checks, one theft report and one report of vandalism. County police assists were only given one time and state police assists, once. The officers made two court appearances and handled two live-stock roundups.

Year in retrospect

Going over the accomplishments of the town board during the past year, President Miller noted several improvements for the town, those being: having the water tower painted and sealed, installing a new light on the water tower, a new paint job for the compactor truck, the setting up of a new deal for water meters (he noted that they used to have five of the meters repaired each month for a charge of \$23.50 each, but they decided to replace the old meters with new at a charge of \$29.75 each with trade), set up an insurance

program for the town's buildings, set up a new personnel program for town employees, had the town dump re-opened for sand, brick, etc., had the corner water fountain repaired, set up a new lab for the sewage disposal system. They also made a new town ordinance on mowing weeds, lots; a new ordinance on abandoned vehicles and another ordinance on animals. The board approved a contract for cablevision for the town, set spring and fall clean-up days, set up a cumulative fund for a building program, resealed the tennis courts at the park, established new guidelines for water/sewer bills, set some new stop signs, approved \$2500 for the Fire Department, had the park cleaned up and trimmed some trees. He noted they also lowered the wages of the board and the clerk so that they could increase the wages of a town employee.

The board will be meeting January 2nd in special session for appointments of Department Heads for town departments.

The next regular meeting of the board will be Tuesday, January 15, 1985 at 7 p.m. in the town hall.

1. **Deductible.** Like your auto insurance, this method requires that you pay a specified dollar amount toward your bill before insurance coverage begins.

2. **Co-Payment.** With this method, the insurance company assumes responsibility for a specified percentage of the bill for covered dental services, leaving the remainder to be paid by you.

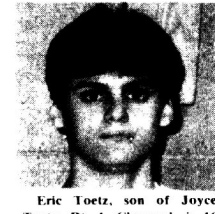
Meet The Members Of The Viking Basketball Team

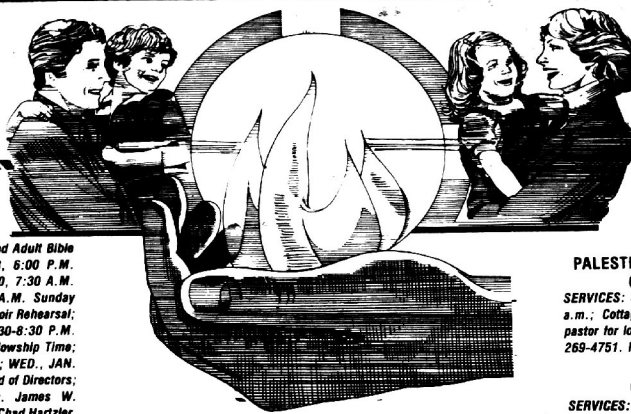

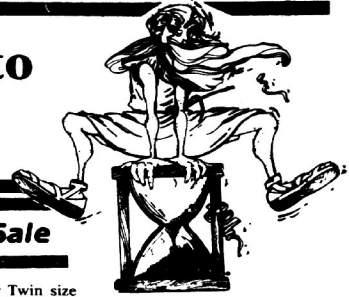
