It is easy to forget that what we eat affects how well we meet our challenges each day. For a student faced learning challenges throughout the entire school a healthy diet is important. Nutrition plays a key role in helping our youngsters prepare for

learning.
Teaching our children proper eating habits, as well as providing the knowledge that will enable them to make good food choices are important responsibilities for parents. The eating habits we establish as young children are normally carried out throughout our adult life.

One important area we can focus on is promoting and providing nutritious snacks for our youngsters. It is essential that you help your child or teenager learn select snacks that will provide nutrients and not

promote excessive weight gain. You can help your child form good "snacking" habits by applying the following principles for choosing snacks.

Snacks are small meals Just as any meal should be planned, snacks should be planned each day to provide needed nutrients and to prevent obesity. If you wait until you are hungry to decide what snack to eat, you may choose a snack higher in calories. Also, more food may be eaten if you or your child wait until the last minute to decide what to eat.

It is well documented that healthy diet contributes to achievement and success in school. Not only is good nutrition important to a child's physical and mental well-being, but it helps him or her to be better prepared



Following safety tips could help prevent holiday tragedies

The decorated Christmas tree is a long-standing, well-loved, and often breath-taking symbol of the Christseason, but Christmas trees also have been the cause of scores of house fires and deaths. Use Christmas trees with great caution, even the artificial, flameresistant ones.

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A dry tree can blaze to its maximum heat before any effort can be made to combat it, so start by looking for a fresh tree which is less flammable. Pick a green tree whose needles are hard to pull from the branches. The branches when bent should spring back instead of being brittle. If the trunk butt of the tree is sticky with resin, that is another good sign that the tree is fresh and retains some moisture.

To keep your tree moist, keep it in water until you throw it out. You should saw 2 inches from the trunk, cutting diagonally from the butt. Check the water level daily. Trees absorb a large amount of water indoors. Be sure to mount the tree firmly, attaching guy wires to the walls and ceiling if the tree is very large. The tree should sit out of the way of traffic and away from fireplaces. radiators and heaters which will dry the tree out more

Use only flame-resistant or incombustible materials trimming the tree. Avoid trimmings that are small enough to be swallowed or inhaled by children, and trimmings with small removable parts. At least hang them way out of the reach of children. Don't trim the tree with decora-tions that are breakable or that resemble candy or food. and don't use poisonous berries or plants, either.

Use only lights with the UL label from Underwriters Laboratories. Electric shock a major hazard of the Christmas season, so avoid any strings or lights that appear to be cheaply constructed, badly insulated, or have flammable plastic parts.

You should use no more than three strings of lights per extension cord and turn off and unplug all the lights when you go to bed or leave the house. The lights have been known to short and start a fire.

If you have a metallic tree. use a floodlight rather than electric lights. If the lights short out, a person could be electrocuted by simply touching a branch of the tree.

These few precautions can preserve the beauty of your tree and prevent a tragedy from marring a beautiful and

The Clean Indoor Air Law does include hospitals and health facilities in its definition of public buildings. In accordance with the law, both are required to designate nonsmoking areas and may designate smoking areas. The State Board of Health is the agency charged with enforcing this law.

As a further development in the issue of smoking and health, the ISMA's House of Delegates recently voted to seek legislation to ban smoking in hospitals and health facilities. I hope this explanation resolves the confusion regarding

Over the past 20 years, I have managed to collect an entire shelf of cookbooks. Not all of them have I bought for myself, some were given to me as shower. Christmas and birthday presents. My first book was given to me by a in high school.

My favorite cookbooks are the ones from local organizations such as church groups, sororities, and neighborhood clubs. In many ways I have found these recipes more reliable as if they have been altered over the years to perfection. Some books have poems and storage time tables for meat. Others have bible verses and items such as Scripture Cake and Happiness Cake. One recipe book has a low calorie section and substitution chart, also a guide for family gatherings. An example: How many slices of bread would you need if preparing for a gathering of 50 people? The answer - 100 slices or 6 one pound loaves. How many blose of hamburger will feed 25 people? Answer: 9 lbs. etc.

Another type of cookbook is the kind sent by companies in exchange for labels. My favorite is from Nestle's. It is a hardback book with delicious recipes using chocolate chips, of course. Del Monte sent a holiday guide several years ago with meals and decorating suggestions. Karo syrup sent a collection of 50 recipes in exchange for labels when I was in high school, all very good recipes. Just about any dessert maker makes offers such as these from time to time. Be sure and take advantage of one and see how you like it.

Check your blenders, food processors, grills and microwaves when purchased. Many times behind the instructions will be helpful hints and recipes. There are recipes in the booklet that came with my pressure canner too.

While shopping in the supermarket the next time, check the meat counter and produce sections for recipe pamphlets, a big help when you want to try something different and many times these are free. Another type of pamphlet, not always containing recipes, are those advising of fat and oils, heart disease, vegetables and fruits.

Recipe books are always a good gift. Better yet, a recipe box with some of your favorite recipes. Whether it be wedding, shower or housewarming give some thought to pamphlets added to a gift or recipe book su

Warren said some water damage may have occurred to electrical testing equipment in the store and about \$1,500 to \$2,000 of structural damage occurred, especially to the west wall and floor joints. The whole store may have suffered smoke damage according to Warren. He said the fire began in the back third of the building.







Our home, and Aunt Elizabeth's home was filled with Christian and family love. That's why we go home for the holidays - to share the love once again.





number is 19.6 million.

11.5% of the nation's smokers were able to stay off cigarettes for 24 hours, totalling 5.8 million.

3.7 million were still not smoking 1-3 days later.

Of those surveyed, 90% had heard of the Smokeout.



Ask anyone about their favorite Christmas memory and chances are you will hear about a childhood time when all trees were perfect, lights were brighter, presents larger, and snowfalls more beautiful. I, too, have those special times tucked away, protected from reality, but my fondest memory of the season is not from that many

years ago.

We had moved to town earlier in the year and had just become accustomed to the noise a town makes as it prepares to sleep. This night's sleep would be lighter and shorter than usual. however, this was Christmas Eve.

My house was nearly prepared for the next day. We had solved the problem of the tree lights that kept going out (only half of them -

every other one), the leaning tree (about 15 feet of wire. two 10 penny nails, and some cracked moulding - it was straight) the decorating hooks that kept finding their way into the bottom of my left foot and the batteries 104 the camera (found in a drawer under three partial decks of cards, some string, bottle openers, and pens, bottle openers, and baby food jar lids and labels).

The house seemed warmer than usual. My oldest, a mere 5 years old then, was running around in those pajamas with the feet in them (it seemed to me then and even now that it is unfair for anyone to be that comfortable). Why I stepped outside that evening, I cannot remember, but what I saw and felt I have remembered.

Our street light wore a halo caused by a falling - blowing snow. It wasn't the type of snow that would ever be on a calendar or a card. It wasn't soft and gentle enough to suit the ones with

little sleighs and grandma's house and it wasn't fierce enought to show a ship being tossed or lost travelers. It was just your average, un-comfortable snow. Enough had fallen to muffle actions and movements about our town. I guess my feelings about the snow were mostly of loneliness. 



IT HAPPENED IN AKRON TAKEN FROM THE AKRON NEWS DECEMBER 19, 1929

59 YEARS AGO
One of the most severe snow storms in the history of Akron and community arrived Wednesday morning and continued throughout the day and part of the night. Akron was completely isolated except by wire, about four o'clock Wednesday afternoon. Roads were all drifted shut and even streets in town were impassable. School was dismissed about two o'clock in order that the busses could make their routes. Only two busses got through. Some could not get out of town - some got stuck in the country and the children stayed over night at the nearest houses. Two cars went out to help get the busses back to town but were mable to get back themselves. Approximately 40 school children were kept in homes in Akron Wednesday back themselves. Approximately 40 school children were kept in homes in Akron Wednesday night. Thursday morning the bus drivers phoned for bob sleds and the children were started for their homes in sleds Thursday afternoon. About eighteen students at Beaver Dam spent the night at the school house, as there was no possible way to get home. Other children were kept at homes along the road. Three and one-half miles west of North Manchester. 25 people stayed Wednesday night at the Orville Bollinger home. Mr. and Mrs. Milo Cutshall, Mrs. V.S. Weeks and Clifford Nye were among those snowbound, from Akron. Valley Weeks walked from the Bollinger home to Akron Wednesday night. At one mile east of Disko, he met Karl Gast stuck in a big drift. The two men started and walked to Disko where Karl bought a cap. They then walked on until they came to Charley Flohr's farm. Here they had to rest and Mrs. Harry Flohr cooked supper for them. From this point they followed the Erie Railroad, arriving in Akron about 10:30. Mr. Weeks suffered considerably from the cold and the long walk. At noon today, the road had not been opened past Bollingers on State Road 15. The large New Paris milk truck was snowbound at the Henry Blesch corner Wednesday afternoon and at press time today had not been reached. Gangs of men were busy with teams and tractors opening the roads. In several instances where cars were left standing Wednesday afternoon, they were completely drifted over with snow Thursday morning. It will be several days before traffic can be resumed on all the roads.

Experts report alcohol exerts a direct toxic effect on the brain, heart, bone marrow and gastrointestinal tract, and especially the liver. Because the liver processes everything we eat, liver damage profoundly affects nutrition. Tissue damage disrupts the normal absorption of vitamins and minerals, and the synthesis of protein and glucose. At the same time, it causes fat to accumulate in the liver.



Wind hastens the evaporation of moisture from the skin, making you feel colder than the air temperature would indicate. The Wind Chill Index, a measure of how chilly you feel, is found on the grid chart at the intersection of the air temperature and the wind speed. As the Wind Chill Index drops, the danger to exposed flesh increases While these figures apply to humans only. AAA-Chicago Motor Club says the wind goses a threat to your care too. A ferce wind can blow snow and ice through the radiator of a parked car, making it hards to start. It bitter cold conditions, if you don't have a garage, park the car with the hood facing out of the wind or into a wall. A piece of cardboard or a blanket attached to the radiator grille also will cut down on the wind, budon't forget to remove it before starting the car.

Cold weather has arrived officials expect this winter to be a frigid one in Indiana. You should take cold weather seriously and prepare yourself for en-

Your body generates about as much heat as a 100-watt bulb. In order to keep yourself warm in frigid weather, you must insulate yourself to keep your body heat from escaping. Clothing acts as insulation and traps your body heat in its folds. Dry, clean, and loose lavers of clothing trap heat the best. Damp clothing (even from iration) conducts cold; soiled clothing clogs air passageways, and tight clothing leaves no room for air circulation. Lavers of clothing are best because they allow for more air circulation and can be removed piece by piece should you to overheat. Another hint: how warm a garment will keep you is determined by its thickness, not its veight. A 1-pound downfilled jacket that is 2 inches thick will keep you warmer than a 4-pound woolen over-coat that's only ½-inch thick. Why? Because more air is trapped between the

fibers of the jacket. Remember when your mother used to insist you wear a hat and mittens when you went outside? There's a very good reason for this advice: most loss of body heat comes from the bare head and hands. By wearing a hat and mittens, you can retain much more body heat.

What happens if your body temperature drops to 95 Fahrenheit or degrees below? Your entire body will start chilling and freezing. This condition is called hypothermia. If hypothermia not treated promptly, the internal body temperature drop could be fatal.

victims of hypothermia are people who are exposed to severe cold with-out adequate clothing. The chance of hypothermia is greater when the person's clothing becomes wet. But in some people, particularly the elderly and chronically ill. hypothermia can occur in weather as warm as 55 degrees Fahrenheit.

Signs of hypothermia include shivering and numbness, drowsiness, weakness, uncoordination and confusion. Typically a hypothermia victim's breathing is slow and shallow and his pulse is weak. The victim's skin is pale and waxy and, the body is severely chilled, the person may be unconscious. The victim may even seem unaware of the cold.

Emergency treatment includes artificial respiration (if necessary) and getting the victim to a warm place. Wrap the victim in warm blankets, towels, or additional clothing, but remove clothes first if they are wet. Seek medical attention promptly. If you are in the wilderness, sandwich the hypothermic person between two people (wearing as little as possible) in a sleeping bag. If the victim is conscious, give him warm drinks. Never give alcoholic beverages. Check the person for signs of frost

If you are elderly or ill, take extra precautions against hypothermia. Stay indoors on very cold days and take your thermostat at keep 68 degrees Fahrenheit. Dress warmly even when indoors, and wear a hat indoors if it's chilly. Stay as active as possible and eat properly. Ask friends and neighbors to look in on you once or twice a day if you are alone during a cold spell.

Although the Tippecanoe Valley School board voiced hesitation, the members voted to establish an electronic method of banking to comply with state laws. The electronic method will be used to transfer funds for the Indiana Gross Tax and the Local Option Tax. Paige explained the Indiana legislature passed a law requiring all corporations to establish such funds, but each school system still had to pass the motion through

The transfer of local funds

in accounts for the corporation's end of the year book balancing was also approved.

Cross-account transfers will have to be sent to the county auditor and the state for approval.



Many happy returns

INDIANAPOLIS - The sweater you received for Christmas is too small and ou don't really need that third pair of slippers.

If you want to -return or exchange the gifts for a different item, what are your rights and how should you go about it?

The best way to return or exchange an unwanted or unneeded gift is with a receipt.

Realistically, however, gifts are not given with receipts or price tags remaining. If you are able to get the receipt, it simplify the return-

refund process.

The policies used by stores vary greatly. There are, however, some policies that are consistent in most places. An easy way to avoid disaster once the wrappings

have come off the gifts is keep all receipts and price tags. The type of item and for whom it was purchased should be logged with the receipts.

If you have received a gift you like, but is the wrong color or size, take it back to the store and ask to exchange it. This often can be accomplished with little

If you wish to return or

exchange an item that was purchased with a credit car, you will not receive cash back even with a receipt.

The gift giver's account will be credited in the case of a returned item, or you will be allowed to exchange that gift, applying its price to any item in the store. But there is nothing compelling the merchant to extend that particular particular privilege.

If you received a gift that was not purchased with a credit card, be prepared to have a receipt unless the store's policy is that one is not needed for returns or exchanges. In this transaction, your gift is returned and you receive cash.

In Indiana, refund and exchange policies are at the discretion of the store. In most instances, merchandise must be returned within a specific time period and be in new condition.

Sometimes consumers will find that merchandise listed as being on sale cannot be returned or exchanged. Be sure to ask before buying if the sale merchandise can be returned.

This type of partial denture should be removed at night when you go to bed. Like your natural teeth, you should take care to make sure the denture is kept clean and free of plaque. Special care is needed in keeping the clasps clean because food and bacteria tend to collect where the clasps hook around your natural teeth.

But with good oral hygiene and regular checkups, you can maintain the good appearance and health of your mouth, and help keep the partial denture firmly in place

Comprehension! Probably no other reading skill causes more fear or confusion in parents when dealing with parents when ucaming their child's reading development. It is a word that is often misused and misunder-stood. When teachers explain to parents that their child is experiencing compre-hension difficulty, the parents become unduly alarmed. That is certainly understandable, but not totally necessary. Compre-hension ability should not cause undue apprehension within the parents. It is a reading problem that can be orrected by using a number

of approaches. Comprehension is simply the process of understanding what has been read. Not everyone comprehends at the same rate or the same amount. Even adults have varying levels of comprehension ability. How many times have you had to read something more than once just to understand what you have read? That is the problem some children have that teachers refer to as poor

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Parents can play an important role in developing their child's ability to understand or comprehend. The following suggestions may provide ways to work with your child in developing his or her comprehension:

*Communicate verbally with your child. Ask where, what, how, when and why questions. This develops a working vocabulary which is essential to comprehension;

*Make flash cards of basic vocabulary words suitable for his/her age or grade level. Pronounce the words

and use them in a sentence.
*Read only the title of a book or a story and encourage your child to guess the main plot:

*Say several words and

*Say several words and ask your child to identify the one word that does not belong. Example: sun, clouds, sky, moon, car. *Read a story and have your child explain to you, in order, the events of the story. This develops sequen-ing child that are essential. cing skills that are essential to understanding what has

*Practice words that have multiple meanings. Use the words verbally in sentences. Example: fall, run, spring,

*Have your child give verbal directions to and from

a certain location;
*After reading a story to your child, ask him/her to do the following: -make up a good title for the story; discuss incidents that might have happened before the story began; -explain the events of the story by drawing various pictures; -make up another ending for the story.

These are just a few suggestions for parents to help their children develop comprehension skills. As you can see, verbal communication, vocabulary development, sequencing, and listening have all been stressed. In addition, comprehension takes concentration, desire, and few inter-ruptions. Work with your child, talk to your child, ask questions, and communicate. Better comprehension will

Deer harvest sets record

Department of Natural Resources Director Jim Ridenour reports the state's 1987 deer harvest is 14 percent higher than the record-breaking 1986 total.

At the time of this report,

two weeks remain in the late archery season, preliminary figures show that 48,539 deer have been taken by hunters in Indiana this year. The harvest includes 27,955 bucks and 20,584 antlerless deer.

A 13 percent increase in the number of bonus deer permits may have contri-buted to the record harvest, according to wildlife biologists. Bonus deer permits allow hunters to harvest an additional deer in counties where deer damage to crops is substantial.

'The increase in harvest should help alleviate deer problems in some areas." Ridenour said. "In addition, we are analyzing results of a survey of 14,000 farm survey of 14,000 farm operators. This information will help determine optimum deer levels in each county.
