Dinner at Delmonico's





ASCS reminds farmers to inspect stored grain

Steve Rodenberg, Director of the Fulton County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service today reminded farm program participants to inspect their farm-stored grain for infestation during the fall and winter months, as well as in warm weather.

Whether the grain is in the reserve or the commodity loan program, year-round inspections are necessary to preserve its quality and to prevent economic loss of stored grain destined for future markets,

He said the market value of infested grain may be substantianly reduced if the number of insect-damaged kernels is sufficient to lower the grade of the grain. Discounts against the price paid per bushel are often assessed by the buyer if live insects are present in the grain. "Farmers can use prescribed grain storage and handling methods to eliminate wasted grain and lost profits.

Before applying for a grain loan, Rodenberg said producers should check to see that their storage structures are adequate to control insect infestation, and then apply an approved insecticide to the grain when it is placed in storage. "This treatment usually protects grain from insect damage for almost one necessary, because the longer the grain is in storage, the more apt it is to become infested.

Where there is evidence of grain deterioration, the ASCS official said farm program participants must either fumigate or recondition the grain, rotate it with new crops or repay the loan.





3. Patient care is always enhanced when physicians, pharmacists and patients are working together toward the best use of medication.

A pharmacist should be able to tell you if a generic drug product is available for your prescription and if he or

our prescription and if he or she would recommend it as a good alternative. Verify any good alternative. Verify any medication's name and what it is supposed to do; how and when you should take it; and what food, beverages, other medicines, or activities might need to be avoided. Discuss possible side effects and what to do if they occur.

SPACE **BETWEEN** FRONT TEETH



Too much space between feeth can detract from your appearance, especially if the unwanted space is in the front of your mouth where it is easily seen. This is sometimes caused by a congenital condition, one that you have inherited. It can also result from harmful habits in childhood, such as thumb sucking. When the force of the thumb is exerted against the front teeth it can move them into a forward position, making spaces appear between the teeth. Another cause is tongue-thrusting or reverse swallowing. This also puts pressure on the front teeth and pushes them forward, creating unwanted

If you have this problem, you should discuss it with your dentist to find out what kind of treatment he recommends to eliminate the spaces. Straightening misaligned reeth by orthodontic means may be one solution. If it's not a case of misaligned teeth. he may be able to rebuild some of the teeth cosmetically to improve your appearance



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


We all have traditions at Christmastime and decorating George has become one of them. I guess you could say, we have the standby deer that didn't make that famous ride Christmas



200 Opt to leave PSI under voluntary work force plan

A total of 207 Public Service Indiana employees have voluntarily retired or resigned from the company under a two-month-old work force reduction plan. Of those. 176 will retire at the end of December and 31 have chosen to end their PSI

careers for other reasons.
"Each of these employees has given many years of loyal service to our company, and they'll be missed," said James E. Rogers, PSI chairman. "Yet because of our need to reduce costs to continue our financial recovery, we felt the time was right to offer a severance plan that worked for both our employees and our compa-

Although the voluntary work force reduction plan will hurt PSI's earnings in 1989, the company said it should realize substantial savings in the future, to keep staffing at its new, reduced level, Rogers said PSI is also putting stricter limitations on filling positions and hiring outside the

company.

Psi offered the voluntary work force reduction program from Oct. 1 to Dec. 1 to its 2,100 non-union employees. About 300 of those also qualified for early retirement benefits. Those who chose to resign will receive one week's pay for each year

in service up to 26 years.

"This is just one of several steps we've taken to streamline our organization without laying off employees or hurting customer service," Rogers said. "As announced earlier this year, we'll soon complete the merger of our three divisions into two. This affected about 85 employ-ces. Some opted for the voluntary

severance plan; however, the majority are being assigned to positions in our two remaining divisions or at our Corporate



King also received distinction for continued high achievement.



The wind started blowing all blustery and cold. It's now that this routine can start growing old. Just as I was reviewing my miserable state. The first birth of the night made a break in the wait.




Easter Seals honors volunteer of the year



Adams explained that he total cost of the project is over \$3 million. Over \$1.6 million is expected to come from a federal construction grant with the other remaining portion coming from Silver Lake. The \$604,520 from the state was ap-

The \$604,520 from the state was approved by the 1989 legislature but could not be made available until the State Budget Committee released the funding.

Adams, who is a member of the House Ways and Means Committee that appropriates funds for projects throughout the state, noted this was the second Kosciusko County community to receive money for this type of project.

"The budget committee approved over
\$300,000 in late September for Etna
Green," Adams said, "Many times legisators tend to forget the small community,
but it is small community that is the backbone of Indiana and I am pleased to see
Silver Lake and Etna Green receive this
type of grant."

Indiana State Police on holiday traveling

Indiana State Police would like to wish all Hoosiers and travelers an especially joyous and safe holiday season. As motorists take roads to visit relatives or attend parties, Indiana State Police urges everyone to prepare for winter weather.

Superintendent Lloyd Jennings said, "Travelers should check the forecast before leaving and try to keep the gas tank at least half-full to prevent freezing. Clearing all windows of ice and snow, as well as the road, hood and lights, is important so you can clearly see and be seen."

The Superintendent suggests proper usage of safety belts along with an atherone check to ensure brakes are working properly and tires contain the correct amount of air pressure before starting any trip. He recommends preparing a winter survival kit which includes: blankets, flashlight, batteries, sand, (small bag of kitty litter), shovel, matches, candles, non-perishable high calorie foods, newspaper (encylation), and a first aid kilt.

Motorists should also be aware that cold weather affects their vehicles. Adequately warm up the engine before leaving the driveway so the car does not stall on a roadway or while crossing railroad

Travelers can obtain road and weather information 24 hours a day from two state Police numbers. Information on rod weather conditions in the northern half of the state can be obtained at (317) 232-8300, and for the southern half of the state at (317) 232-8298. The recorded information is continually updated form observations of local conditions obtained form all

Junior Achievement of Northern Indiana is proud to announce that a second year of Applied Economics will be offered at Tippecanoe Valley High School. The class is taught by Mr. Duane Burkhart to approximately twenty-five Junior and Senior students. All expenses for books and materials were paid by a special grant as a part of a pilot program last year. The students learned about the free enterprise system of economics including supply and demand sales tactics, starting a business, etc. A volunteer consultant from a local business meets with the class once a week to give the students a first hand look at actual business methods. This year's consultant will be Phil See, Branch manager of Lake City Bank in Mentone.

There is a computer game used that simulates running a business and another that allows students to "PLAY" the stock market, based on each day's global head-

Evaluations from students, Mr. Burkhart and from the principal, Robert Schultz, have rate this class as very beneficial and enlightening. The students found it enjoyable to learn economics with the help of actual business people and with computer simulations.

The Blazers are 14-9 and return to competition in a Jan. 13 dual meet at Eastern Illinois University, Charleston.



Public Service Indiana seeking bids on energy alternatives

Public Service Indiana is developing a strategy to meet future customer electricity demand at the lowest cost, as well as encouraging efficient energy use and helping solve environmental concerns.

"There are many viable options that could help us achieve these objectives," said James E. Rogers, PSI chairman. "Instead of simply building power plants to meet future demand, we're looking at ways to reduce demand or meet out customer needs by buying power elsewhere. In the end, we may still need to build plants of our won, but we want to find the least-cost combination. Forming new energy paternerships will provide added flexibility to our power system and help our power system and help us maintain compete rates throughout he

There are a variety of "supply-side" and "demand-side" resources the company could tap to help it defer construction of new generating stations

To find, them, PSI is inviting other utilities, independent power producers, customers, congenrators, energy service companies and other summit proposals that would provide a minimum of five "megawatts" or reduced for at least 10 years. These conservation proposals and power-purchased propaslas will then be evaluated on an equal footing.

Through this energy resource program, PSI is seeking up to 550 mw by 1995 and more than 1,000 mw by the year 2000.

"We hope to find experienced com-panies to work with us and our customers in implementing programs that will help levelize power usage, reduce demand during peek periods and conserve energy," Rogers said. "This in turn would enable us to better utilize power resources and address clean-air concerns. By using electricity more efficiently, customers would also gain more control over their bills.

PSI has sent information on he competitive-bidding program to several hundred potential power supplies, customers and energy service companies. Others, however, are invited to bid, as well. Anyone interested in bidding should write to: Resource Bidding Program, Public Serivice Indiana, 1000 E. Main St., Planinfield, Ind. 46168.

Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter has Agriculture Clayton Yeuuca determined that haying of acreage reserve (ACR) and conservation reserve (ACR) and conserving use (CU) for payment would have an adverse economic impact.
"Therefore, having will not be allowed, except when based on information provided by the State office showing that haying will not result in an adverse economic effect within the State,"

Rodenberg said.
Grazing of ACR and CU for payment acreage under the 1990 program is authorized except for a consecutive 5month period between April 1, 1990, and October 31, 1990.

The 1990 farm programs call for a 5

percent reduction in wheat, oat and extra long staple cotton acres, a 10 percent reduction in corn, sorghum and barley acres, and a 12.5 percent reduction in upland cotton acres. The 1990 rice program has not been announced. Land removed from crop production to meet program requirements must be put into approved conservation practices or covered with annual, biennial, perennial grasses, legumes and small grains to guard against wind and water erosion.

In order for your body to work properly, its temperature needs to be around 98.6°F (37°C). If 85°C (31°C) or old causes your body temperature to drop below 95°F, your heart begins to slow down, your body becomes weak, and your mind becomes contused You could die

PREVENTION

The best way to prevent hypothermia is to stay warm. If room temperatures are cool or cold, dress warmly. This is your strongest defense against hypothermia.

BE ALERT

Many things can increase the risk of becoming hypothermic

- Living In A Cold House Poor Diet
- Stroke or Diabetes Taking Certain Prescription Drugs

FACTS ABOUT THE COLD

- Room temperatures below 70°F could be dangerous if you are not dressed warmly enough.
- One of the most dangerous things about hypothermia is that it causes your mind to become confused. This prevents you from recognizing the danger and seeking help.
- Many older adults die in their own homes without ever reaching the hospital because friends and relatives do not recognize that they have hypothermia until it is too late.

HOT TIPS FOR COLD WEATHER

DRESS WARMLY

- Wear several layers of clothes. Avoid tight clothing. Loose clothes will trap a lot more warm air around your body. Mittens are warmer than gloves.
- Keep your clothes dry and change long underwear or socks if they become damp or wet.
- Wear a windproof outer layer when you are outdoors


