Akron looking to divorce Public Utilities Commission

The Akron Town Council met in regular session on Tuesday, Nov. 20.

A letter was composed by town attorney, Fred Rakestraw, to all water and sewage customers. The letters explain that the town will file to be removed from the jurisdiction of the State Public Utilities Commission. This would enable the Water Department to raise water rates and thus enable the Water Department to upgrade water quality. A rust removal system could be installed and many other necessary changes could be made in both sewage could be made in both sewage and water. Akron Water Department has not raised their rates since 1972. The State Legislature passed a bill giving towns of 5000 or less the ability to be removed from control of the Public Utilities Commission, Almost all of the towns surrounding have removed Akron themselves from the control of the Public Utilities Commission. Clerk Treasurer Jean Conner is compiling a report of surrounding towns present rates on water and

Town President Robert Allen commented, "We do not want to raise the water rates

sewage.

unreasonably. It really concerns me that I hear talk around town that folks are moving out of Akron because

of the poor water quality.
Something needs to be done."
Water Clerk John York said, "It would be like people making the same wages as they did in 1972 and trying to pay bills and buy groceries with those same wages today, in 1990. The Water Department needs the increase upgrade the present to system.

The Town Council will be holding a public hearing during their regular town council meeting on December 18, at 7:00, at the Akron Town Hall. All water and sewage customers are strongly encouraged to attend the meeting.

After the hearing the Town Council will decide whether to go ahead with the project or abandon it.

* Permission was granted to Superintendent Gearhart to install a split rail fence across the north border of the new town building property. Lines are to be painted in front of the new town building for parking and for the alley on the east side of the Mini-Mart with a one way sign.

DNR stocks Palestine Lake

The Department of Natural Resources recently released 5,800 channel catfish in Kosciusko County's Palestine Lake as part of a broad restocking effort, announced Bill James, DNR Fisheries Chief. Palestine Lake was renovated in 1988 and restocked with game fish.

The catfish measure an average of 8.4 inches in length, with some as large as 11 inches. With available good habitat, the DNR hopes that the catfish will establish a reproducing population that will sustain the fishery without

DNR biologist conducted a fisheries survey on Palestine Lake last June and found excellent survival and growth of channel catfish that were stocked in 1988. The largest catfish collected was 19 inches in length.

The restocking of Palestine Lake should be completed in 1991 with the introduction of northern pike. The large wetland area around Palestine Lake should provide excellent spawning habitat for this game fish species.

The Blade and Brush

Gary and Marlene Nellans, R.R. 1, Argos, a couple with strong ties to Mentone, have turned a family hobby into a profitable business. Operating The Blade and Brush from their Victorian style brick home on State Read 110 just west of U.S. Victorian style brick home, on State Road 110, just west of U.S. 31, they are busy all year long making and marketing their distinctive crafts.

It all started about seven years ago at a craft show in Indianapolis. Intrigued by some of the items he saw there, Gary

Indianapolis. Intrigued by some of the items he saw there, Cary got the idea of cutting names from wood. He thought it would be fun to try.

So, Gary bought a bandsaw, procured some poplar wood and experimented cutting out names. A teacher and coach, he made the first names as gifts for his students. "But," says Marlene, when you learn to do something, you begin to wonder 'how can I use this?" The next step was to make mascot ornaments for his bestetable from basketball team.

"That's where Marlene came into it." Gary says. "She said we couldn't just give them away plain, so she started painting

"We searched for patterns for letters," they remember, "and when we found what we liked, we stuck with it. It became ours

distinctively—our trademark."

The more the Nellans made, the more ideas they seemed to have to make things. So they added other items to the names, which remain their most important items. "After we got started, we signed up for some craft shows," Marlene says. "You make all this extiff then you have to get rid of it!" all this stuff, then you have to get rid of it!"

They soon became so busy that they added a spacious shop area onto the back of their house and transformed a front porch

into a display area.

The Nellans now attend about twelve shows each year, from The Nellans now attend about twelve shows each year, from May through December, with their wares. That's all they have time for. Some of the places they go are South Bend's Ethnic Festival, One Hundred Center, Amish Acres and the Blueberry Festival. Gary and Marlene say they really enjoy the craft shows. They take their saw, paints and materials along and continue making things right there. They benefit by using that time to regenerate their products and they have found that the public enjoys watching their products and they have found that the public enjoys watching them create things. "We see a lot of neat people," Gary says. "Every community is hyped up for their own festival." "It's a good feeling," Marlene adds, "to be with people who are having fun."

They advertised, at one time, in a country magazine. The business from that resulted in shipping orders to thirty-five states. "We couldn't keep up." Marlene says. "We had to choose the mail order business and our teaching jobs." "We between the mail order business and our teaching jobs." didn't want to leave teaching," Gary adds.

Many of the Nellans' customers are former students. "We often don't recognize them at first," they say, "because they've grown so. But, it's always a thrill to see them."

One of their most popular lines is the college accessory group. Marlene says it's impossible to second guess their customers' preferences in colleges. A different one usually goes better in

Marlene says it's impossible to second guess their customers' preferences in colleges. A different one usually goes better in each location--not necessarily the closest one.

Every year, Gary and Marlene hold a three-day open house Thanksgiving weekend. They display their crafts all through their cozy Victorian home, offering punch and dainty Victorian delicacies in their dining room. Their "country accessories theme," Marlene points out, "will fit into every house and

decor." Over two hundred usually attend the open house.

To name all of their creations would be impossible, but just a few are: rocking horses; carousel horses; sleds, sized from Christmas tree ornaments to big enough to stand by the fireplace; baskets and school desks and seats. Besides painting them, Marlene has softened many items with flowers. They also offer wreaths and dried flower arrangements. Marlene will personalize any item for the customer.

Every wooden article Gary makes is made of quality poplar

This is a team effort," Marlene says. "The boys, Steve, 19, and Mark, 13, help immensely. We always introduce one new item at each show. We all sit down together before preparing for

item at each show. We all sit down together before preparing for a show to brainstorm and plan."

They watch the trends but don't worry about what others are offering. "We've learned through the years," Marlene says, "let them do their thing and we'll do ours. This year's new line was more of a departure than usual. They introduced the Southwestern look with cactus, coyotes, peppers on a string and adobes (Indian homes). It has proved to be very popular.

Although they have taken seminars on displays and marketing the Nellans expertise in their crafts is largely self-taught.

the Nellans expertise in their crafts is largely self-taught. Marlene admits to always having wanted to take art lessons, but she has never had a lesson. She laughs, "I'm too busy painting to have time for lessons in it!" She still hopes to have formal art

training someday.

While their craft business keeps them very busy, it is only a part of their busy lives. Both teachers, Marlene has taught nineteen years. The last ten has been in kindergarten at Mentone.

nineteen years. The last ten has been in kindergarten at mentone. "I'm a caretaker by nature," she says, "and teaching kindergarten requires a lot of caretaking." she says, "and teaching kindergarten Gary has taught fourth grade, mostly math, at Winamac for eleven years. "I like teaching fourth grade," he says. "It's an impressionable age and it's important to be a good role model for kids that age. I like being part of that development."

High school sweethearts, Gary and Marlene both have undergraduate degrees and M.A.'s from Ball State University.

They have two sons. Steve, a 1989 graduate of Tippecanoe Valley High School, is interested in mechanics and computers. Mark's main interest is in all athletics. He's a seventh grader at Winamac, where he plays on the basketball team.

Marlene says, to keep up with all their activities, "the

organization has to be phenomenal. But what you can achieve in a short time, if you are organized, is unbelievable."

Although they live a few miles from Mentone, Gary and Marlene identify with the Mentone community. The whole family is active in the Mentone United Methodist Church. "We ramily is active in the Mentone United Methodist Church. "We know so many people in Mentone," Marlene says. "I'm so proud of it, especially our church and its continual outreach to the community." She adds, "I get a lot of Jack and Jill preschool students, and I can see how much it does for them."

Who's Who in Akron



Jim Saner -- "Play Ball!!" by Tonia Weller

In the two years since he was elected president of the Akron Youth League, Jim Saner has put together a winning team.

Last year, for the first time, the league had a Board of Directors to deal with scheduling, fundraising, bill paying, rules and other administrative duties. This allowed the coaches, who had handled these tasks in past years, to spend more time actually coaching and working with the kids. Last summer was also the first time "team mothers" were chosen. These mothers assisted the coaches by handing out papers, making phone calls, coordinating and managing the very successful fund drive and many other helpful tasks.

Each team also had a sponsor from the business community who purchased their uniforms. Jim is especially proud of the community support for this project. There were more offers of sponsorship than there were teams.

Jim also submitted a budget and gave a presentation to the United Way and was able to get a 100% increase in the funds

they provide to the league.

With the help of the Park Board and the community, the ball

diamond behind Day Hardware, formerly used by the Men's Softball Association, was renovated for use by the league. Adding this diamond to the program along with the regular diamond near the Akron Park, meant that games no longer needed to be scheduled as late into the night as in past years.

Jim stressed that without the time and talents of the Board of Directors, coaches, umpires, sponsors and parents, none of this would have been possible. Board members, John and Crystal Weida, Jay and Lisa Fawley, Gary Rensberger, Dave Ellenwood, Darla Shafer and Dodie Ruff put in endless hours. "Jay did a lot of work on the diamond." John, Dave and Jay had experience with other leagues that proved very helpful. "I'd like experience with other reagues that proved very helpful. I d like to thank the T-Ball coaches especially," said Jim. "They had a lot of kids and put in a lot of time. I really appreciate all they did to make it a good season." This was the first season for a structured league for T-Ball. Jim is very thankful for the support of the sponsors. "Without them we just couldn't have the teams." The local people who served as umpires also received Jim's praise. "It's hard getting umpires," said Jim. "Very hard." Jim understands what a difficult job this is, having umpired, himself, for 6 years.

The addition of the new diamond made this an expensive year for the Youth League. Besides the cost of the lights, bleachers, fencing, and back-stop, money was also need to purchase equipment for the teams and the diamonds, and of course, the insurance required for the league goes up each year. A second concession stand was also built at the new diamond.

Jim's wife, Jan, a third-grade teacher at the Metropolitan School District of Wabash County, was in charge of the concession stands this past summer. She had worked in the old concession stand for two years before that and has served on the board as well. Local kids were hired to work in the stands,

serving hot dogs, sloppy joes, nachos and soft drinks.

In the 1990 season, 240 kids took part in the Akron Youth
League. This included five co-ed T-Ball teams, for six to eight
year olds; five baseball teams for boys and six softball teams for girls, ages nine to twelve; a girls' travel team for 13 to 16 year olds and a boys' travel team for 11 and 12 year olds. For the '91 season, Jim hopes to see more T-Ball teams added and a second girls' travel team.

There has been a Little League program in Akron for over 40 years, but the name was changed to "Youth League" about 15 years ago when the girls' program was added. There are now as many girls' participating as boys. According to Jim, "We have a very competitive girls' league." The Little League rules of play

The season starts the week school lets out, so as not to interfere with the kids' studies, and runs through the first of August. Jim feels the Youth League is great for kids, providing

recreation, a learning experience and keeping kids off the streets. Some local children join leagues in nearby towns. Jim says, "I'd like to see the Youth League grow larger, improve and be more

competitive. I want kids to stay home and play ball here."

One thing Jim stress to the coaches and parents is that the league is "for the kids." "I want kids to learn to play the game and fun is what it's all about." Parents and coaches, alike, are urged to encourage, not criticize, while watching the games and to never use abusive language. "Sure you want your team to win .it's for the kids.

Jim says being president of the league is an "everyday job in the summertime. It takes all my time."

His hard work is obviously paying off, though. This year's awards picnic, at the end of the season, had the biggest turn out

ever.

Jim and Jan, who were both raised in Akron, have four daughters; Missy, 14; Kristen, 11; Jayme, 8 and Amy, 3. The older three have all played in Youth League. The four girls, who all have beautiful singing voices, have formed a group called "The Singing Saner Sisters" and perform religious music for clubs, organizations and churches. Jim, an accomplished singer himself, frequently joins them. This past year, they won first place in Akron's talent contest. place in Akron's talent contest.

Missy has been singing in public, with her dad, since she was only three years old. The slogan the girls use "Have you kissed any frogs today?" is also the title of the first song Jim and Missy performed together.

The Saners are very active in their church, The Akron Church

Jim, the son of Roy and Marilyn Saner, has been employed by Day Hardware for 14 years. He has also served the community as an advanced EMT for 13 years.

Jim sees a great future for the Akron Youth League. There are plans for next year to build restrooms at the Park diamond and to finish the dug-outs at the new diamond. Jim also hopes to, someday, sod the diamonds' infields and possibly even construct a new diamond. Jim would like to see more parental participation. He'd like for more parents to come out to watch the games, particularly the older kids' parents. But he understands that it is difficult to find enough time. This summer, the league plans to work harder on publicity, making people aware of the schedules and getting game results to the public. Jim says, "I think we've come a long way. We'll just keep getting better and better." With Jim, and the strong team he's built, working together, I'm sure this will prove to be true.

PSI Energy seeks another rate decrease

PSI Energy is seeking approval for a two-step, \$8.5 million rate decrease to reflect the phase-out of certain power-purchase arrangements. In total, customer rates would be reduced about 1 percent by

January 1992. In 1983, PSI Energy sold a 49.95 percent interest in Unit 5 at its Gibson Generating Station to the Wabash Valley Power Association and the Municipal Power Indiana Agency. According to the power agreements, PSI has been purchasing varying amounts of Unit 5 power from WVPA and IMPA.

Because the power purchases from Unit 5 are being phased out in two steps over the next year, PSI is asking the Indiana Utility regulatory Commission to reduce customer rates accordingly. If approved by the IURC, PSI Energy's overall customer rates would be reduced by .48 percent effective Jan. 2, 1991, and an additional .54 percent effective Jan. 2, 1992.

Cable system making changes

Local cable operator Sammons Communications announced that it is making changes in 1991 that should provide area customers with more efficient service and greater programming variety.

Beginning in January, Sammons will implement a statemons will implement a state-ment billing system. At ap-proximately the same time each month, customers will receive a bill describing the charges applied to their ac-count for the billing period. Other important customer information and a return envelope will also be included with the bill.

During the first quarter of the new year, Sammons will add new cable networks, THE WEATHER CHANNEL, to basic service and THE DIS-NEY CHANNEL and SHOW-TIME. Akron's water and sewer

After months of discussion the Akron Town Council will hold a public hearing on Tuesday, December 18 on water rates.

The Council will present, to the public, the reasons behind the proposed rate increase. They feel the water rates must go up.

The present Council would like to draw up an outline of Akron's needs for the next twenty years. Water rates are where they will begin. A lot of red tape will need to be cut through before the Town will be able to see if they can divorce the Public Service Commission. Seven thousand dollars will have to be spent to even present the case to the Commission and there

still is a possibility that the Commission will turn them down.

Council President Robert Allen commented, "What the town Council President Robert Allen commented, "What the town is looking at is that a man from the State Department could come down and tell the town they have to upgrade present water and sewer systems. It would be out of the town's hands. Then they would have to take action and that would mean a bond and the problem with a bond is that you pay so much interest. Taxes without a doubt would go up to help pay for the bond. The people would be paying for something and not really getting their money's worth. So what we can do is look to the future, which means divorcing the Commission and raising water and sewer rates slightly and begin to accumulating the funds to make the necessary changes to the present systems. I really don't want the rates to go up either. I live on a fixed income, but I know we have to do something. Inflation has hit the water and sewage departments just as it has hit everyone else. It would be great if we could pay the same prices we did twenty years ago, but as everyone knows, prices on everything have gone up. The water department costs have gone up. You can't buy a pipe or a valve for the same price as in the 70's and even labor has gone up."

The last time sever rates were increased was back in 1970 and water rates were increased in 1982, when the rate went from \$1.60 to \$2.65 per 1,000 gallons.

Of the six towns surrounding the Akron area, only one has a rate less than Akron's present rate. The others were much





Holloway Barber Shop

Holloway Barber Shop, nestled beneath the office behind Harris Drugs, has served Akron, not only as a barber shop but also as a meeting place, for nearly 30 years. According to proprietor Tom Holloway, "Since Akron doesn't have a card room, my shop is a place to loaf and shoot the breeze. I have a lot of regulars who stop by to visit and kill time. We solve all the world's problems right here," he says with a chuckle.

Tom has rented the shop, first from Royce Mishler and later
from Bud Harris, since coming to Akron in 1963. The
interesting tile floor, in eight different patterns and color
combinations, comes from the shop's past life as Charley
Lowe's floor covering office. It served as a sample of the available patterns.

Tom grew up in the Burket area. He attended Mentone High School, where he played basketball for Paul Bateman and Abe Hoogenboom, making the first Sectional team in his senior year of 1959. After graduating from Indiana Barber college, in 1960, Tom barbered in Richmond for a couple years before returning to Mentone to work with R.J. Hill. After about a year, Tom

to Mentone to work with R.J. Hill. After about a year, Tom opened his own shop in Akron.

Besides cutting hair, Tom also sells and repairs Norelco electric razors. After the first of the year, he will be adding Remington repair. With the exception of occasional one day clinics, Tom is believed to be the only person in Fulton County repairing razors. The shop also sells hand-crafted wallets and belts, made by Tom's mother, Hildebell Holloway, of Burket. The shop is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:30 on weekdays and from 8:00 till 4:00 on Saturdays. Tom is closed on Thursdays and Sundays.

According to Tom, barbers of years ago, put in incredibly long hours. On Saturday they'd start cutting at 6:00 a.m. and work straight through to 2:00 a.m. Sunday. After sleeping a few work straight industrious 2.00 a.m. straight a temperature, they'd get up to give their customers shaves before church. After putting in 65 hours a week, himself, for 20 years, Tom has cut back on his hours. He used to stay open till 10:00

p.m. on Monday.

Shaving is no longer a part of most barbers' business. This doesn't bother Tom, since it was always his least favorite chore. The last man Tom shaved was old George Smith, a coonhunter

from Miami county and that was several years ago.

Tom's clientele consists of all types of men, from all walks of life. In addition to locals, Tom also has regular customers from Chicago, South Bend, Marion, Urbana, Leiters Ford and Roann. Some customers, like Bill Engle, continue to come to Tom for

And Tom has been known to make housecalls for regular customers when they were ill. Tom takes pride in making his customers look particularly good for special occasions such as wedding, anniversaries or for photographs.

The best thing about barbering, according to Tom, is the people and the fact that there's something new everyday. "You have to be a real good listener to be a good barber," says Tom. "It's been an education, in itself, listening to 30 years of conversations."

But Tom's enjoyment of people is also the worst part of the job, too. After cutting someone's hair for 20 or 30 years, you can get pretty close to them and their families. "It's really hard when friends die," or experience illness of family troubles.

Tom is now cutting the hair of the grandchildren of some of

his first customers.

It's the kids that Tom enjoys the most. A first haircut is a big Recipe for a event in a young man's life and Tom makes sure it's a pleasant experience. If a little boy gets scared or upset, Tom will just visit with him and give him a lollipop and wait till another time to try the cut. With active little guys Tom says, "You have to move pretty fast to keep up with them."

pretty fast to keep up with them."

Over the years, the kids have provided Tom with some good stories. One time, after a little girl had visited Tom's shop with her dad while he got his hair cut, she went home and "whacked her hair off clean to the hide." When her shocked and somewhat angry parents asked why she'd done that, she tried to stay out of trouble by saying, "I didn't! Tom Holloway did!"

Then there was the little five year old boy who'd always worm his hair in a hurr, with a large cut in front. After his parents

his hair in a burr, with a large curl in front. After his parents brought him in and had Tom cut the curl off, leaving a plain burr, the boy went home and took his three goldfish out of their bowl, one by one, and cut their curly tails off.

Through the years, Tom has seen a lot of styles come and go. Mostly though, Tom sees it as being 20 year cycles with Mostly inough, from sees it as being 20 year cycles with different versions of the same styles resurfacing. The kids think they've come up with something new, but according to Tom, the popular "spike" of today is nothing more than a long flat-top with hairdressing on it. Tom says, "The old guys make fun of today's styles, but they had their fads, too."

Tom feels it's the wives, mothers and girlfriends who direct the styles most men and boys wear. He remembers, a few years ago, when many middle aged women wanted their husbands to get their hair cut like Walter Cronkite, whose thick, wavy hair they admired on TV. "And here the poor guy was half bald and there was no way I was ever going to make him look like Walter." Tem lough. Walter," Tom laughs.

There are some popular cuts Tom refuses to do. He won't give Mohawks and he doesn't cut stripes. When Tom was 14, he was seriously injured in an auto accident and required plastic surgery. The stripes look to Tom like the scars he carried for many years. Tom wants his customers to leave his shop with a look he is proud of.

During the late sixties and seventies, when long hair was in fashion, 2500 barbers a year went out of business. Now that the style has returned to short cuts, the barbers that remain are busy. Many barber shops now require appointments, but Tom says he'll never change to that system.

The biggest change Tom has seen, in the last 30 years, is the pace of peoples' lives. Even in a small town, they are always in 'People don't relax enough anymore. There's too much hustle and bustle.

Fom and his wife, Bonnie, who is Vice President of Clinical Services at Woodlawn Hospital, have been married 30 years. The Holloways have three children: Rex lives in North Manchester, works for the Post Office and has three children, Nathan, Nolan and Sarah; Anita is a bookkeeper for Ace

Hardware in Warsaw and has a daughter, Arin; Steve is a junior at Manchester College.

at manchester College.

Tom also has a second business, Holloway Wood Products. With the help of his son Rex, he produces thousands of custom shaped, hardwood plaque boards, every year, for three different trophy shops. Tom uses a hand rubbed oil penetrating finish that lets the natural color and grain of the beautiful walnut, oak, cherry and maple, he obtains from Pike Lumber, show through. This venture has been so successful that Tom has almost more

business than he can handle.

Recently, Tom purchased the 100 year old Fenstermaker home, north of Akron and then resold it to his daughter, Anita and her husband, Mike Gelbaugh. Tom has been working till midnight on the remodeling of the house, which the Gelbaughs will soon be moving into.

Next summer, Rex, is who is an excellent carpenter, will build

a large, new home, north of North Manchester. Tom will help with this project in addition to spending this winter making the

oak molding, trim and cabinets for the house.

Tom has built several entertainment centers and cabinets and plans to do more of it after he retires. "I've built for everybody but my wife," says Tom. "Bonnie has wanted a cabinet for seven or eight years. I'm not going to have any trouble keeping busy after I retire.

Tom credits his son, Rex; Henry Hartman, who passed away a year ago; and his grandfather with teaching him about woodworking. "I've had very good teachers."

woodworking. The had very good teachers.

Tom also enjoys coon and squirrel hunting, fishing and trapping. Both of his sons helped him run his trap lines, rising at 3:30 a.m. Tom feels this provided his sons with an excellent learning experience and taught them about responsibility. Tom, himself, put out 5000 sweet potato plants at age 14 and drove a milk truck at age 16. He feels it's important to teach kids to get up and work.

Very responsible himself, Tom believes in always opening his

very responsible infiniser, form betteves in aways opening his shop on time. He has only been sick about 30 days in 30 years, and two weeks of that was due to surgery.

He does occasionally take time off to travel. He and Bonnie went to Hawaii to celebrate their 30th anniversary and they

went to Hawaii to celebrate their 30th anniversary and they enjoy going to Los Vegas in the winter.

Tom has a very positive outlook for the future of Akron. He lists several new businesses and the fact that many are being opened by young people. He feels Akron has several good places to work and professional services not available in other small towns. "Some people might say that barber's crazy," Tom laughs. "But I'd say Akron is doing just fine!"



Profile of Harry

by Leafy Hudson

Harry Smythe, a Mentone resident for forty-seven years, in retirement, makes a significant contribution to his community with his woodworking craftsmanship.

But, woodworking is only a part of Harry's interesting story. One of seven children, Harry started life in Lebanon, Indiana, where he was born in his grandparents' home. His family lived in Indianapolis. Harry's father, Harold Asa Smythe, was a tinner by trade, but also a vaudeville actor, tap dancer and musician. "That's where Harry gets his (theatrical) flair," his wife, Buthene, laughs. Harry's father was also an inventor, inventing the Jiffy Tire Tool and a fishing reel that was made by Buyer

Mfg. Co., Winona Lake.
Harry's mother told him that as a tot, Harry, would sometimes crawl onstage while his father was performing. Although Harry was too young to remember that, he did get into the act when he was older. In the early 1920's, the WLS Chicago Radio Station, famous for its Saturday night Barndance, sponsored a weekly program on stage at Warsaw's Centennial Theater, where his father's group often performed. The group included his father on guitar or mandolin, Herschel Campbell (co-owner with Lawrence Dunkleberger of Shrock's Dry Cleaners) on the banjo, John Varparer on practed in Horschel John Vampner on mandolin, Harry's brother, Leon, tap dancing and playing guitar and Harry on the mouth harp. "I got a kick out of that," Harry says. He also tapdanced and did the Charleston. "I sure couldn't dance now," he laughs.

In 1918, the family had moved to Kokomo and then to Warsaw in 1919, to be near his Uncle, Ode Herod. Harry's next move took him to Palestine in 1925, where he met Buthene Bowser at the Christian Church. Harry and Buthene were married in 1928.

During the first years of their marriage, Harry and Buthene lived in the Merle Yocum Filling Station in Palestine. Buthene pumped gas and Harry worked as a core maker at Dalton Foundries.

Harry joined the Warsaw National Guard unit, Company L, in 1927, but left in 1930, just before their first child, Don was born, rather than leave Buthene alone during the Guard's annual two-

week training.
When a Warsaw business man, Billy Felkner, hired Harry's friend, Alvey Banghart, to install a heating system at Zimmer Mfg., Alvey requested Harry to help him. "I've worked with him before," he told Mr. Felkner, "and he's good help." So, Mr. Felkner arranged a three month leave of absence for Harryenough time to do the Zimmer job. When Harry went back at the end of three months, he was told he no longer had a job.

By this time, the country was in the depression, it was winter, jobs were scarce, and a daughter, Jalaine, had joined the family But, even then, Harry showed ingenuity, a flair for making things, and a determination to support his family. He made a sled, four feet, by four feet, by 2 feet, and equipped it with a stove made from a five-gallon lard can. Loaded with hamburgers and hot coffee made by Buthene, he found a favorite ice-fishing spot, crowded with about 400 ice-fishermen, and sold them the Before the winter was over, a friend stopped at the station and

suggested he apply for work with him in Rochester. Soon, Harry was working nights in Rochester in a lawn-mower factory.

That was how he happened to be present when the Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey Circus burned in Rochesterabout 1941. The foundry was just three blocks from the doomed circus buildings. "I was scared to death," Harry remembers. "There were horses and elephants all over town." He especially remembers hearing the experience of one Rochester resident who was home alone with his small daughter. They heard a resounding thump at the back of their house. Investigation

resounding thump at the back of their house. Investigation showed an elephant had put his foot through their porch floor! Harry then had the opportunity to go to DePuy's in Warsaw, where he worked ten years. While there, he became ill with viral pneumonia, and was unconscious for eleven days. Upon recovery, he and Buthene made some changes in their lives. They had bought a house a few years earlier on Franklin Street in Mentone, renting it to Arlo and Mildred Friesner. They decided then to move to their Mentone house, still their home today, and Harry changed jobs. He west to work at the Parelie of the Mentone house, the profit of the Mentone house, still their home today, and Harry changed jobs. He went to work at Bendix Corp. in South Bend.

was the move to their new home that started Harry on his woodworking career. The house hadn't had a coat of paint for twenty-four years, Harry remembers. He remedied that, enclosed the front porch, and dug a basement. Next, he built three rooms, a bedroom, bath and new kitchen, onto the back of the house. The new kitchen, of course, necessitated cupboards, which he

One of the first things he built was a boat for Dearl Tucker. He laughs as he says, "Dearl and his brother, Rex, came to get it, but we couldn't get it out of the basement! They had to tear the stoop off the back of the house to get the boat out.

Then, it happened again! He built a double kitchen cabinet for

Lois Lemler, and had to tear out the cellar steps to get it out.

When Harry was laid-off from Bendix in 1960, Bruce Howe, vice president of Westminster Hotel in Winona Lake, hired him to build bathrooms in the hotel. That job evolved into steady employment and he stayed until the hotel was sold. Then, he went with Mr. Howe to Word Music, which also was in Winona

Lake, as maintenance man, until he retired in 1984.

In the meantime, in the shop he had constructed behind his house, he had built, and is still building innumerable wood pieces of lasting quality and beauty for many people throughout

Harry has crafted over 167 originally designed jewelry boxes of oak, walnut, maple and cherry, and although he no longer makes them because materials have become cost prohibitive, he still gets requests for more. Orders have come from as far away

alifornia.

c has built numerous stands, frames and bulletin boards for the Mentone United Methodist Church, where he and Buthene

are members

are members.

For neighbors and friends, he has repaired chairs, made tableboards and picture frames, built in kitchens and bathrooms.

"I wish I had a record of all the kitchen cupboards I've built through the years," Harry says wistfully, naming many in both Mentone, Warsaw and surrounding areas.

Harry made the forms that Darrell King used last year to pour the cement flower pots everyone enjoys so much on Main Street.

Harry has made three beautiful grandmother clocks for their

Harry has made three beautiful grandmother clocks for their ome and their children's homes. Their house is a tribute to his skill, with handcrafted cupboards, tables, stands and shelves in each room. Many of the shelves hold part of Buthene's extensive collection of colorful cardinals.

Harry's proud of his artistic accomplishments. "But," he says, "the highlight of my life was when that nice little town of Mentone made me Grand Marshall of the Egg Festival Parade, Mentone made me Grand Marshall of the Egg Festival Parade, June 8, 1990, for being the oldest living retired volunteer fireman." Harry was a Mentone volunteer fireman for twenty-seven years, from 1948 to 1973. He is very proud of the beautiful plaque presented to him for his services, "Although," he confides, "I'm not really the oldest living volunteer fireman. Vance Johns is, but he lives in California. He adds that he was thrilled when Vance Johns called Wayne Tombaugh from California, asking him to congratulate Harry for his honor. Harry and Buthene celebrated their 62nd wedding anniversary recently. They have two children. Don, of Mentone, and Jalaine.



Although now retired, after working as a registered nurse for over 50 years, Beaver Dam resident Doris Haney continues to

dedicate her life to helping other people.

Nancy saw that Doris and her sister had Topsie, and thought she'd finally be able to beat them to the barn. Doris and her sister saw Nancy coming and used their umbrellas to whip Topsie. It must have scared her because she ran fast and they beat Nancy to the tie barn. "She was so mad, she wouldn't talk to us all day." Doris laughs.

Doris graduated from Elkhart General Hospital School of Nursing in 1928. It was while she was doing her student nursing that she met Fred Haney. He was having his tonsils removed and Doris was his nurse. They fell in love and after courting for three years, were married in 1930.

Fred was from Milford and taught school in a rural district in

This was the beginning of the great depression and times were hard. The Haneys worked long hours, frequently 12 hours a day. They raised chickens, ducks and pigs and had a cow for milk. They raised chickens, ducks and pigs and had a cow for milk. They had a large garden, raised produce and canned as much as they could, sharing the surplus with others. Doris used the sewing skills she'd learned in 4-H, as a child, to turn cloth bags used for flour, sugar and oatmeal into dishtowels, sheets, curtains, pajamas and nighties. On long evenings, the Haneys and their friends would gather at one anothers homes to make ice cream, pop corn or have a taffy pull. "Times were very hard, but we got along beautifully. We always had enough to eat. We had great friends. We really had a wonderful life," Doris says.

The Haneys came to the Beaver Dam community in 1944, when Fred was hired to teach at the Beaver Dam School. They purchased the large, beautiful brick home, Elias Leininger had built in 1918. Fred and Doris purchased the property from the widow of Elias's son, Daniel. It is said that while the Leiningers owned the house, the author, Gene Stratton Porter attended a

owned the house, the author, Gene Stratton Porter attended a wedding held there.

Fred and Doris had five children, but their youngest son, David, died tragically, at the age of 15, in a tractor accident. The remaining four all graduated from Beaver Dam School and three remain in the neighborhood today. Maurice is a dairy farmer, Fred, Jr. is a retired driver for Sonoco, and Marilyn Adams is a nurse at Woodlawn Hospital. The fourth, son Leslie, is a doctor in Goshen.

In fact, Doris's career in medicine must have had quite an influence on her family, which includes two M.D.'s (Leslie and his daughter) and four R.N.'s. A great-granddaughter is also

studying to be a doctor.

When asked how many grandchildren and great-grandchildren she had, Doris replied, "Scads and scads. So many I can hardly count them. Seven great-grandchildren were born last year

Since Fred's death in 1984, Doris has continued to live in their home by herself. "Fred was a fine father and a fine man. My daddy was always so good to mama and it was always a goal of mine to find a husband as good as my father was. And, by golly I did. I achieved that!" exclaims Doris.

Her family members check on Doris a couple times everyday. "My children are all very good to me, for which I am very

Doris still attends the Beaver Dam Church, where she started the first Bible class for children, during the 60's.

Besides the dolls that Doris gives to Helping Hands, she also

has a collection of her own. A glass case in her spacious living room contains the large, pretty doll she had since she was five years old. She has several Amish dolls that are special because they remind her of the time she and Fred spent among the Amish when they were first married. She also has a doll dressed in a nurses training uniform like she wore in the late 20's, with a white pinafore over a striped dress and a string of safety pins at the waist. The doll also has black stockings for winter and white for summer, just like Doris did.

This week the Haney house will be filled with people again. Doris will have her whole family for Christmas and is expecting around 50 relatives. She has been busy sewing gifts for her grand and great-grandchildren. "The house looks like a warehouse when Christmas time comes," she says.

Christmas is also a time when Doris hears from many of her past patients. Some have been sending her cards for years. Besides lots of other correspondence, Doris has kept in touch with her roommate from nurses training. And each spring, 14 or 15 women from their class get together to visit.

Nursing and medical care have changed a great deal since the depression days. One of the most radical changes is in obstetrics. "During the depression, only the most affluent women went to the hospital for the delivery of their babies. Home delivery was the accepted thing. Only in an emergency did the doctor advise hospitalization," Doris explains. "Now we do not know of home

Another big change is the early ambulation of all patients. "Even surgical patients are gotten out of bed in as short a length of time as can be tolerated," says Doris. This was not so then.

One thing that hasn't changed, though, is the need for caring, this are the control of the control

giving nurses like Doris. "I've always found it very satisfying to help other," she says. "My life has been blessed in so many

And the people of the community have also been blessed, to have had Doris caring for them for so many years

Dubois Distributors, described by Manager Emma Lou Hiers an "animal drugstore," has served the Mentone community

The company was started in 1956 by Carlton Gerdon in Huntingburg, Indiana, in Dubois County, from which it takes its name. When the company originated, it primarily serviced

Hoosier farmers with medicines and supplies for poultry.

Bob Hibschman, who at that time lived near Mentone, became a Dubois salesman and opened a branch store in the garage of his home on 900W, where John and Carol Hurst now live.

The business prospered and Dubois soon moved to its present location on the site that once housed a stockyard and coal yard. iocation on the site that once housed a stockyard and coal yard. The building Dubois occupies was built by the Wentzel family and was the original location of Maple Leaf Duck Farms. Between the times of Maple Leaf and Dubois, the building served as the Red Comb Mill Office (now Cargill, Inc.).

As the business continued to expand, another branch was opened at Milroy, Indiana, in Rush County, but soon moved to St Paul in Decapter County.

St. Paul in Decatur County.

These three branches still comprise the company. Huntingburg's primary business still caters more to the poultry industry. The St. Paul branch's biggest business is with the veal industry, and the Mentone store's business is centered around hogs and cattle. Carlton Gerdon's sons, General Manager Doug Gerdon and veterinarian, Dr. David Gerdon, have assumed active roles in running the family enterprise.

Dubois provides the farmer with antibiotics and disinfectants designed for prevention of disease as well as treatments for sick

The preventive approach to dealing with livestock, Emma Lou notes, is quite a departure from methods of a few years ago. "Farmers never used to use medicine without sickness. Now the emphasis is on keeping the animal well. It's just good management, although there are still those who think medications shouldn't be used unless the animal is ill."

Emma Lou cites the close confinement of today's animals,

where unchecked disease can spread faster and infect more animals at a time as reasons for the wisdom of preventive

When Emma Lou began working at Dubois, she says, "If a farmer had 50 sows with pigs, he was considered to have a big herd. Now herds of 300-400 are more common, with some of the larger businesses raising as many as 1000.

Émma Lou notes there are people concerned with cruelty to simals who object to today's methods of raising livestock. "But, if the animals are fed a balanced diet with low-strength

medication and are kept in clean quarters, they have to do well. It's good. As a matter of fact," she adds, "a lot of these animals get better care than many of today's children! And in the long run, it's cheaper

run, it's cheaper."

As for the safety of eating the meat from lightly medicated animals, Emma Lou says they sell "blend downs," approved by FDA as safe to use. There are, she says, a lot of rules and regulations to prevent the use of dangerous substances in animals destined for human consumption. The medicines must be tested over a period of years to determine their safety before they are approved for administration to animals.

Another new law, "positive identification," provides for the ability to trace an animal's origination and history. This law demands that each animal be marked for identification by tattoos or car tags, so their feed and drug intake can be checked.

or ear tags, so their feed and drug intake can be checked.

Tattoo hammers and ear tags are available, along with medications, at Dubois, as well as many other products. Just a few of the items Dubois handles are: hot shot prods, heat bulbs, heat bulbs,

heat shields, tank heaters and medication applicators. In addition to today's preventive methods in raising livestock, Emma Lou has seen other changes through the years. When she started at Dubois, they employed two part-time people plus a salesman. They now require two more full-time people to run the business

Emma Lou is doubtful, however, about another change—to computers. "When I first started, we did all the invoicing by hand. We were always done no later than the 3rd of the month." With the computer, it takes at least until the 6th of the month-so, is automation better? And we lose the personal touch."

Emma Lou still sells a lot of product to family farms. In some

emma Lou still sells a lot of product of tailly failing. In some cases, she is selling to the third generation customers. "One of my policies," she says, "is to pay attention to the childrenthey're my future customers. I give them little things like scratch pads and let them handle things in the store." Many of her present customers can remember coming into Dubois as children with their parents.

Emma Lou also values senior citizen customers, whose purchases are small. "I go the extra mile for my customers," she says. "When they need something I don't have, I try to get it for them. I listen to their troubles and help if I can."

"Working here is an education every day," she says, with new products coming out for animals all the time. When I started here I didn't knew coughing should not be supported by the says of the says

Emma Lou and husband, Luke, came to Mentone when he Emma Lou and nusband, Luke, came to Mentone when he was hired to work for Manwaring Leghorn Fams. Emma Lou was already driving each day from their Peru home to Warsaw, where she kept books at Senger's Department Store. She left Senger's to be bookkeeper at Cooper's Store on Main Street in Mentone, a job she held for seven years. She has worked at Dubois since January 1968. Luke retired August 1 from Midwest Spring Midwest Spring.

The Hiers have three children, Debi (Mrs. Ron Batten), Mentone, Sue (Mrs. Bill Sincroft), Stanton Lake, Leesburg, and Anita, Mentone. They have three grandchildren, Erica, a Tippecance Valley High School student, and Jeff and Dacy, both

Mentone Elementary students.

Emma Lou says, "I enjoy Mentone. I think it's an ideal town for retirement--with friendly people. When we moved here, we expected to go back to Peru to retire. But within a year, we had changed our minds. We intend to stay here.'

Meantime, Emma Lou and the staff at Dubois Distributors will continue to serve their customers faithfully

Low-Cost production loans in Indiana

Hoosier farmers with a net worth less than \$250,000 will get a shot at trimming as much 4.5% off the interest rate on their production loans next

The Indiana Treasurer's office expects to provide about \$65 million in low-interest loans to farmers in 1991 through the Treasurer's Farm Program, a linked-deposit loan

ine program officially will announced January, says Jim Snyder, deputy treasurer, but it won't be implemented until March.

Besides the net worth requirement, the farmer must also derive 75% of his or her income from the farm. Loan applications are taken and processed by the farmer's local bank and then passed on to the Tresurer's office for funding. The maximum loan is \$75,000. Last year the entire \$65 million was gone within a month.

"We have more demand for his program than we can handle," says Karl Friedrich, assistant vice president of The Farmers Bank in Frankfurt, Indiana. "Last year, I submitted 30 loans, but they ran out of money and only about 20 were funded."

The interest rate on the loans varies depending on the rates on U.S. Treasury bills and certificate of deposit rates at Indiana banks. The Treasurer's office determines

a rate that participating banks will pay on certificates of

deposit.
In 1990, banks paid a rate of about 5.5% to the Treasurer's office. They are then free to mark up the rate to the farmer by as much as 3%.

They recently acquired a patent for their new ACP Anchor and Akron Concrete is now a franchise manufacturer of Parm Furty becoment entrances.

PermEntry basement entrances.

After his trailer, at Barr Lake, suffered wind damage, company President Terry Walgamuth decided there must be a better way to anchor mobile home skirting. With the assistance of area welder John Craig, he designed and built the first ACP (Akron Concrete Products) Anchor.

Basically a concrete channel, the anchor comes in two foot to five foot interlocking sections, which are buried underground around the base of a modular or manufactured (mobile) home. Skirting sections are fitted into the anchor to form a solid wrap for the base of the home. The anchor withstood 70 mph winds earlier this year at a mobile home park in Ohio. Because the anchor is buried in the ground, it also alleviates the problem of mice, squirrels and other rodents entering under the home. Since the anchor comes in sections, it adapts well to uneven ground surfaces and is easily moved if the home is relocated. Akron Concrete sells the ACP Anchor on both a wholesale and retail level.

The PermEntry is a one piece concrete basement stairway unit with an attached heavy gauge steel door. It provides a convenient and economical outdoor entrance to a basement. The PermEntry is sold through contractors or directly to homeowners.

Akron Concrete Products is truly a family business, employing six members, from three generations of the Walgamuth family. Akron's oldest active businessman, Fred Walgamuth, purchased the business, on the corner of North and Maple Streets, from Charles Tatman in April of 1928 and it has grown steadily ever since. In the summer of 1955, a larger building was built, south of the original structure. In 1959, Fred's son, Terry, joined the business. In 1970 they became a franchise for Wilbert, Inc., the largest burial vault company in the U.S. Their franchise area covers eight counties: Fulton, Marshall, Cass, Pulaski, St. Joe, Elkhart, Whitley and Wabash. In the 12 year old boys'





23 Oct.

Hello, I hope this letter finds you all well and enjoying the beautiful fall weather. I'm sorry that I wasn't able to return your letters sooner, but I have been very busy. Enclosed in this envelop are letters to each of the kids that wrote me. I hope that through this letter everyone there will understand what it is like

The weather here is very uncomfortable, with temperatures during the day reaching the 110 to 120 range and then dropping to the upper 80's at night. During the fall they have sand storms here, with the wind speed around 70 miles per hour. It is just like a blizzard with sand instead of snow. There are no It is just like a olizzard with sand instead of show. There are no trees or bushes and almost no vegetation at all except for timbleweed and a few dry weeds. The people from Saudi Arabia are very different from our people back home. Most of them wear long white robes with a white sheet wrapped around their head.

Women in this country aren't allowed to do almost everything, they aren't allowed to drive, vote, or own property. The crime rate here is very low because of the severity of the The crime rate here is very low because of the seventy of the laws. They still have the "eye for an eye" and "tooth for tooth" rules, if you get caught stealing they cut off your finger and if they catch you and find you guilty of murder, they cut off your head. I hope that this is all over soon and we're able to return home before the holiday. I would like you to thank your class for me and tell them how much I enjoyed their letters and that it is good to know that the people back home haven't forgotten about

Profile of Joann

A busy homemaker, secretary and faithful church worker, Joann Utter's cheerful smile and kind, helpful ways have been an asset to our community for many years.

Joann grew up in Bourbon, "right behind the funeral home," where she enjoyed a typical, small town, happy childhood. She liked sports and was a cheerleader five years. "Things surely have changed since then," Joann remarks. "The only time we were allowed to wear slacks to school was for pep sessions.

One of Joann's first interests, as it is now, was music. She took piano lessons, three years from Mrs. Ethel Price (Rita Simpson's grandmother), and two years from Mary Ferguson, a retired school teacher who also taught Mentone Elementary's fourth grade teacher, Cindy Law. A highlight for the whole Utter family, since 1965, has been their annual family fishing vacations in Minnesota. Joann laughs as she describes the "spectacle" they must have made when the children were small. "We'd go out, all six of us in the boat, with fishing lines draped on all sides. Sometimes we would get our lines tangled. We must have looked funny!" Especially precious are the memories of the years they took Grandpa and Grandma, Hap and Mary Utter, along. "It gave the children a chance to be with their grandparents."

Since the children are grown, they can no longer all get away at the same time, but Joann says they all get excited just thinking

about it. And as many go as can arrange it.


