Resolution passed to refund bonds

Akron, Indiana

A resolution was passed by the Board of Directors of Tippecanoe Valley Elementary School Building Corporation to allow the superintendent to take any and all necessary steps to proceed with the refunding of first mortgage bonds dated March 1, 1986, provided that the action results in a net present value savings to the School Corporation of at least

Value Savings to the Scarce Valley Corporation of at least \$420,000.

The Tippecanoe Valley Elementary School Building Corporation has determined to issue refunding bonds of the corporation in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$2,600,000 in order to effect

such savings.

The bonds are designated "qualified tax exempt obligations" of the Building Corporation pursuant to Section 265 (b) (3) of the Code. The president and secretary of the corporation are to approve the form of Trust Indenture and Mortgage to secure the refunding bonds, the bond purchase agreement between the corporation and Traub and Company, Inc. relative to the purchase of the bonds and the official statement in connection with the bond.

They are also to execute the bonds and any certificates or documents necessary to complete the issuance of the

D.C. Patton Associates was employed as financial advisor and Bose McKinney & Evans as counsel. Traub and Company, Inc. was employed as underwriters to take all steps necessary to prepare for

an advance refunding.

The Board of Directors of the Tippecanoe Valley Elementary School Building Corporation went on record to the Board of School Trustees saying that they are opposed to the use of any money saved by this refunding through reduced lease rental payments for the Akron Elementary Junior High School, being used in the construction or lease rental payments for a new middle school at the present high school site.

Kosciusko County rescue units prepare for unexpected

Kosciusko County rescue units got a rare chance Wednesday to prepare for the unexpected.

Every county fire, police and emergency medical service unit was invited to participate in a disaster drill coordinated by Multi-Township EMS and Kosciusko Community Hospital.

A mock plane crash at the Warsaw Municipal Airport set the stage for dramatic performances by Warsaw Community High School's 22 Select Theatre students.

A variety of injuries was simulated including fatalities and an emergency delivery. Emergency response teams followed protocols for a real disaster by assessing the site for safety before proceeding. Injured were then triaged or sorted and dispatched to KCH by ambulance.

Once at the hospital the "victims" were properly tagged and sent to the appropriate areas for treatment. Hospital ancillary departments such as X-ray, Lab, Switchboard and Medical Records participated in the drill by putting emergency plans into action. This included not using elevators, bringing nonemergency patients in the front door, restricting telephone calls, and notifying doctors and off-duty staff.

Members of the KCH Safety Committee observed and critiqued the one-hour drill. An evaluation session will follow.

Besides police, fire, and EMS, the Civil Defense, Red Cross and coroner were invited to participate. The airport and Biomet, which supplied the plane, also cooperated. Coordinators were Kim Finch, R.N., KCH Emergency Department Director, Ed Ksiezopolski, MTEMS and the WCHS theater department.

Live media coverage added to the authenticity of the event and allowed communication policies to be tested also.

Finch said although there have been two actual disasters this year (Explorer Van and Burket Elevator fires), this is the first drill where the entire county has been involved. Drills are conducted approximately every two years.

Girls' swim team earns recognition from coach


"This is the best girls' swim team we've had since I've been at Tippecanoe Valley High School," said Coach Steve Doerscher.

Hot foods and cold drinks may be enjoyable together, but there is evidence that this combination can result in dental damage. Studies have found that intensive cycles of heat and cold can cause tiny cracks in tooth enamel, inviting tooth decay and possible tooth

Heat alone seems to do no harm. Cold is the villain, and when warm teeth are suddenly exposed to cold, the temperature drop can be shocking. Thus, if your after-dinner coffee at 140 degrees is followed by ice cream at 35 degrees, the enamel contracts severely. The resulting pressure on the shrinking enamel may make it crack. Repeated exposure to such temperature changes increases the possibility of tooth fracture.

One sure way to injure teeth is to chew cracked ice. The physical pressure from chewing hard ice, combined with the sudden

Marilyn Kruger's paintings reflect love of nature

by Tonia Weller The tranquil view of woodlands visible from the windows of Marilyn Krûger's studio, in her rustic log cabin home south of Akron, provides inspiration to the artist.

Nature serves as the theme for most of Marilyn's large intri-cately detailed paintings. Working in both acrylics and oils, she captures the beauty of rocky cliffs, the textures of the forrest floor and the delicate shadings of wild flowers and plants.

An accomplished artist, Marilyn has had one-woman shows in both California and Indiana. This year her paintings were exhibited at the Fernwood Nature Center in Niles, MI, and in onewoman shows at the Fulton County Library and the Hoosier Salon. An exhibit at the Honeywell Center in Wabash is planned for next year. Her works are offered for sale at the Art Mart, Century Center in South Bend; Fort Wayne Museum of Art Sales and Rental Gallery; and the Art Barn Gallery in New Buffelo MI.

Bom and raised in Akron, Marilyn displayed her talent at a very early age. "I can't remember a time when I wasn't interested in drawing and art. I never wanted to do anything else," she says. "I remember my mother telling how, when I was just a very little girl, I'd ask her to draw pictures for me. I'd say, 'Draw me a chicken', then I'd laugh and draw a better one!"

After graduating from Akron High School, Marilyn attended

After graduating from Akron High School, Marniyn autended the Cincinnati Art Academy and pursued a career in commercial art. She did illustrations for the L.M. Berry Co., producing ads for telephone book yellow pages. "I found out that advertising was very boring! It's the same type of thing over and over again. It's very restrictive and I hated it!" she says.

When Marilyn's husband, David, a Navy officer, was transferred to the west coast, she returned to school, studying fine arts the University of Southern California at LaHova. She then be-

at the University of Southern California at LaHoya. She then be-

at the University of Southern California at LaHoya. She then began painting on her own, reproducing the seascapes and rocky cliffs she saw along the California coast.

In 1969, while living in the San Francisco Bay area, the Parks and Recreation Department approached her about teaching classes. Marilyn has been teaching ever since. She currently has 30 students through the Adult Education program at TVHS and also teaches at the Hoosier Hodgepodge in Plymouth.

In 1972, the Krugers returned to Akron to live and Marilyn's paintings reflected the change in location. "A lot of coming home was getting back in touch with the earth, with Indiana

home was getting back in touch with the earth, with Indiana landscape," she says. "I became very interested in the particular flora and fauna of the Midwest. The woods have always been a very big part of my creative feelings. I'm inspired by the woods and everything on the forrest floor. I was getting back in touch with my Indiana roots."

Marilyn usually does her paintings in a series, completing

several works on the same theme. A recent series featured close-ups of wild flowers. The large, richly colored, sensual blossoms show the influence of Marilyn's "hero", Georgia O'Keefe, the famous south western artist.

"I've always admired her work and admired her as a person. Georgia O'Keefe has always been a great hero of mine," Marilyn says. "Her lifestyle, her ability to step out and be her own person, far ahead of the sexual revolution and any women's movement. She was a woman way ahead of her time. She was one of the few recognized women talents of her time. In the earbly modernist movement, she was on equal footing with any of the men. She was just marvelous!"

Marilyn says her work is taking a new turn. She is leaving the

flower series, and moving on to a new series featuring tree and

plant roots. "I have a whole new series of messages I want to put across. More social, more political and more environmental in content." She explains, "I have chosen roots as my means of expressing that and using the roots to get across my commentary. Roots reach down and become part of the earth. Roots have a special significance for bringing us life and bringing us life experiences. It's according to what our roots reach into, that

determines the kind of people we become. I plan to deal with the roots of envy, the roots of greed, the roots of passion."

In keeping with the trends of her past series, Marilyn plans to use word plays to give humorous titles to her paintings. One will be titled "Root Beer" and will show roots entwined around rusty beer cans. "Root Beer Float", another environmental com-mentary, will have beer cans floating in water among roots. She also has plans for paintings entitled "Get Your Kicks on Root 66" and "Root Canal".

Marilyn says she spends about an hour each morning on creative visualization. This is when she gets the ideas for both her paintings and titles. "I give free reign to my imagination. I push my mind and visual powers as far as they want to go. That is probably the most creative time that I have.

When Marilyn works, she may paint as long as 14 hours a day. She seldom accepts commission work because, "When I'm interested in a project, I don't want to be bothered or distracted

Besides her paintings, Marilyn also works with her father, Ronald Fenimore, producing lovely authentically detailed wooden bird pins. The joint venture, known as "Hoosier Wings" turns out several hundred miniature birds each year. Ronald hand carves the tiny pieces and Marilyn realistically paints their feather colors. Hoosier Wings recently added a selection of fruit pins to their line. They wholesale the pins throughout the Midwest. Locally the pins can be purchased at Collins Country Charm in Rochester.

Vikings win opening games


The Tippecanoe Valley Vikings had a successful weekend, winning both their Friday and Saturday night

A Plastic Christmas

In today's world of plastic money, Christmas can be anything you want it to be. Just remember, the time will come when you have to settle up.

Creditors are lurking around every corner, waiting for the chance to get you into their trap. And you are eager to be

I remember well some of my famous last word: "I will just charge this one thing and pay it off before I charge anything else." "The payments are only \$10 a month; I can afford that." (Never mind the fact the total price was one I would never have been willing to pay if cold, hard cash had been changing hands!)
"As soon as I get this paid off, that's it; no more charging."

One reason it is so easy to convince yourself to just say "charge it" is that everyone uses credit. Stores used to have a special register for ringing up charge purchases. Now they have a special register for "cash only" purchases.
I remember when credit wasn't so casual. Not so very long





Eric Secrist joins Marines

"A lot of my friends in school told me I was crazy," said Eric.

"This one guy in another platoon didn't get his cut one week

The Secrists combined Thanksgiving and Christmas for Eric since he won't be home for Christmas. Donita said it was great having Eric and his sister Alisa together again.

Harvest time- use crop residue to control soil erosion

"Crop residue management for 1993 starts NOW- with the harvest of the 1992 crop", said Robert L. Eddleman, State Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service. The amount of residue cover after managed until after planting
vear's crop will harvest and the way it is next year's crop will determine its ability to control soil erosion. Farmers should act NOW- to meet their residue requirements by evenly spreading this year's crop residue and keeping as much as possible on the soil residue Crop management is the most economical way to reduce soil erosion from wind and water. Reducing soil erosion will improve soil and water improve soil and water quality, and help meet the requirements of the Food Security Act

Eddleman unprotected crop field that is highly erodible due to water, (morely clay loam, for example) growing com and soybean in rotation, can lose 20-25 tons of soil per acre, per year. By leaving a minimum of 30 percent crop residue cover after planting next spring will reduce the soil loss to about 13 tons per acre per year; and with 60 percent residue cover after planting next spring erosion is reduced

to 6 tons per acre, per year." Eddleman, also states that

crop residue on the surface also protects top soil from wind erosion. Unlike water erosion, wind erosion is more serious on fields of nearly level fine sandy soils. A level filed in northwest Indiana is damaged more from erosion by wind than by water. These fields, left unprotected, are subject not only to erosion by wind but crops often are damaged by the abrasive effect of blowing sands and other soil particles.

Many factors affect soil in Indiana. Comanagement is erosion residue major factor for reducing erosion. Soil losses my be reduced 75 percent or more by using this management practice. It is the most economical way to reduce soil loss and is the preferred method chosen by producers to reduce soil erosion on their farm. Eddleman emphasized that each landuser or producer should refer to their individual conservation resource plan to find residue requirements for each filed. Farmers should start managing crop residues NOW. On each highly erodible field farmers should maximize the amount of crop residue left after harvest, spread the crop residue evenly throughout the field, and avoid or minimize field operations that will disturb and bury the

21st Century Scholars applicants are encouraged to prepare for postsecondary education by taking college preparatory courses during high school. "Engaging eighth graders in preparing for the future makes the 21st Century Program extraordinarily important endeavor," according to Scott Gille, executive director of the Indiana College Placement and Assessment Center.





Town Board to hire deputy

Marshall, Ebersole, told the council at Monday night's meeting that it would be to their advantage to hire a deputy before January 1, 1993. Casper will contact Oak Cable Co. and ask for a representative to attend the January town council meeting in hopes of resolving the problems.

* Lois Miller asked the council to take over costs of the security lights in Miller's Mobile Home Park. When the town annexed the park, the council had agreed to accept the responsibility for the streets and lights but have never done so. The council agreed to check with the electric company and see what

has to be done to shift the responsibility to the town.

* Kathy Irwin appeared before the council with a question about her water bill The Irwins moved to Mentone on November 7 and after living there nine days, their meter showed a usage of 555 gallons per day, resulting in a bill of \$37.50 for that time period.

"There are only three of us and we didn't even have a washer and dryer hooked up then," said Irwin. "If this bill is right, we will pay it, but I can't believe we are using that much water."

Brian Reed said he was stumped by the situation. He said he had checked for leaks and found none and that the meter seemed to be working correctly. The council agreed to install a new meter and recheck the billing after the next billing period. If the usage changes a lot, they will

make an adjustment.

The Tinkey Insurance Agency, 600 E. Walnut Street, has been offering complete insurance coverage to Akron and the surrounding area for nearly 27 years.
The business offers a full range of insurance coverage, including auto, homeowners, business, health and Medicare supplement, from six major insurance groups. One company, Preferred Risk, insures only non-drinking customers, enabling them to offer lower rates them to offer lower rates

In addition to holding insurance licenses in property and casualty, and accident and health, owner Norman Tinkey is also a licensed real estate broker. He says, "Real estate has not been a part of our business that we worked that hard in the past, but we are looking to work back into that area in the future and we are now looking for properties to list."

After being located in downtown Akron for several years, the Tinkey Insurance office has operated, for the past few years, from an apartment building they built in 1974. The four unit building contains three rental apartments in addition to the office. The business is open Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and from 9 a.m. to noon on Thursday and Saturday.

Norman's wife, Rozella, is the bookkeeper for the agency. Their daughter, Lana Bowser, who holds a property and casualty insurance license and is a real estate salesperson, has also worked in the office for the last 17 years. "Sometimes, I don't know if I'm working for Lana, or her for me," Norman jokes then adds, "She's my right arm."

The Tinkeys have recently made a new addition to their business. They are now sales reps for GCI in Fort Wayne, which is an authorized representative for All American modular homes. There are seven different houses, with variable floor plans available from All American. Included are single, one-and-a-half, two story, and bi-level homes; duplexes and triplexes. "These houses have 2x6 exterior walls and are very well made," Norman says. "Twenty years ago, I thought of modulars as doctored up mobile homes. Today they're not like

If you have some wind or fire damage, the cost of repairing is much greater. I feel most companies are pretty justified in their rate increases." Then he adds with a smile, "Of course it depends on whether I'm the one paying the premium or not."

Lana says, "Some people seem to think we control the rates. But that's not true at all. The rates are all set by the company. We have no control over them."

Norman advises people to look carefully at their personal property coverage. "As a rule, about 50% of the amount you have on your house goes for unscheduled personal property," he says. "That's true in case of fire or wind damage. But what says. That is tue in case of the of white dailage. But what people don't realize is there is limited coverage in case of theft. Firearms, jewelry, antiques, art, and fine china and silver should all be listed on a scheduled floater. It provides much broader coverage based on appraised value. Therefore, if you do have a loss, it takes all the problems out of it."

Teacher Feature

June Yazel says teaching the Learning Accelerated Motivational Program (L.A.M.P.) is her idea of what teaching should be about.

"We don't have to follow a set program, there are no books to follow. I like that. We learn by doing and if a student's interest takes us down a different path, we are free to go with it," said Yazel. "Like right now, we are going west with the pioneers. We learn pioneer skills like making apple head dolls, sewing clothes, and making quilt blocks. In science, we do things in reverse of the usual way. We experiment first, then read why things happened like they did. In this class, students learn to think for themselves. Gifted children become bored in a regular class. They lose interest and don't go as far as they can. Here they learn to do things for themselves. This canses over into their regular class work because it teaches them how to get more out of

it."
Yazel said students are evaluated during the second grade. The top 25% are tested with SAGES (screening for gifted) and ability tests. Parents and teachers fill out a check list to evaluate the students. The top 5 to 7% of second grade students can go into L.A.M.P. classes. These students attend regular third grade classes and go one day a week to L.A.M.P. classes. Third through sixth graders learn science, social studies, math, critical thinking, creative thinking, research, problem solving, leadership, and computer skills to enrich their regular curriculum.

Yazel graduated from Muncie Central High School in 1984 after spending a year in Hamburg, Germany. She graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree from Purdue University in 1987. She is currently working towards her masters degree at IU in Fort Wayne.



Conley. He and Detective
Dennis Reichard and Office Robert Daugherty of Rochester City I Department are coordinators of the program

Each week the three officers will choose one crime committed in Fulton County to be featured in newspaper and radio spots. A reward of up to \$1000 will be paid to area citizens who provide information leading to charges or an indictment being filed against the person or persons responsible for the crimes. Bond issue and building program on TVSC agenda

The Akron bond refunding issue and the building program were once again on the agenda at the Monday, December 14, meeting of the Tippecanoe Valley School Board.

Dr. Don Patton and Steve Meno gave a report on the bond of t

refunding issue for Traub and Co. Inc. Meno reported that paying the bond off early will result in a savings of \$613,185.78, which is a 13.6% savings of the prior net debt service. Paying the bond off 4 years early will bring the average percentage rate to 4-1/2% versus the 7-7/8% it was before.

Akron resident Richard Day questioned how the savings would benefit the taxpayer. "Will it lower the tax rate?" he

Board president Joe Crill told him it would not lower the tax rate but would allow it to remain the same and would pay the

debt off four years early, resulting in a lower total cost.

Doyle Baum of DMB Corporation and Ed Soots from Clinton & Associates Architects presented information to the board concerning the building project. Soots questioned whether the board wanted to use a carpet base or a vinyl base for the locker nom and corridor. The carpet base would add an additional \$2430 in costs. The board decided to stay with the vinyl base as originally planned. Soots asked the board's permission to prebid the steel for the project as it takes four to five months to get it delivered. it delivered.

Baum advised that if the steel was not pre-bid and the shop drawings done, the steel could be set by November 1993 but no masonry work could be done until the spring of 1994. Prebidding the steel could save three or four months and allow the building to possibly be closed up before the weather gets too bad. This would save costs in interest and project overhead as well as part of the costs of heating during construction. Baum said a completion date of December 1994 is feasible but the deadline for that date will be tight.

Baum explained the amount of risk the board will incur by allowing this is not the cost of the steel but only the cost of the shop drawings which is expected to be in the area of \$25,000.

The risk would come into play if there is a remonstrance that succeeds in stopping the building program from continuing. Shop drawings are expected to be completed by February 15 and bids will be received by the first part of March.

The board voted 4-1 to allow the steel to be pre-bid. Crill, McSherry, Kantner, and McFarland agreed; Tilden was opposed. Mark Wise questioned Baum about the total projected costs of

the project. Baum said the projected figures are \$7,370,000 for construction costs. Another \$300,000 is in the original plan for furnishings and fixtures. In addition to that will be the architect's fees, which Soots didn't have available at the time. He said they are usually 5%.

Day asked that the board advise reporters when the remonstrance period will begin. Boling replied it begins as soon

as bids are accepted.

Day asked the board if the executive session which was to follow the meeting was to discuss the purchase of land to the west of the school. Crill said it was. Purchase of the land would solve the problem of the location of the sewer. Wise said he had understood at the November meeting that it had been approved to build without a set-back for the sewer. Forrest Kantner admitted that at first, the board believed that to be the case also, but on closer examination found the approval was for the capacity of the sewer only, not location.

When Wise and Day expressed concern that the purchase of the land hadn't been brought up at the meeting before, Crill assured them the matter had just come up and hadn't even been

discussed by the board.

During the Spotlight on Valley segment of the meeting, high school Principal Charles Mills explained the program of "Inclusion" and introduced Kathy Ritter, Valley's resource teacher and Kathy Ummel from NCI to explain the concept in more detail.

Ritter said the purpose of Inclusion is to bring the Special Education students into regular classrooms as much as possible

instead of segregating them.

"Valley's first year of full inclusion has brought about the many important changes," she said. "The focus of the special education department has changed from an academic service delivery within the resource setting to a service delivery within the regular class setting. Students are currently placed in the resource room for study halls only. This provides them an opportunity to receive assistance in homework and/or study

Ritter said resource teachers co-teach with regular teachers in a regular classroom setting. This helps them form a partnership with each doing the part he/she specializes in. The resource teacher is the specialist in Special Education while the regular classroom teacher is the specialist in his/her subject. Working together allows them to provide the best possible assistance for

the student.

With material made available by the Indiana University Institute for the Study of Developmental Disabilities, Ritter pointed out that among other things, inclusion provides an opportunity for each student to receive an education that meets their individual needs, parents are involved in designing and supporting the education programs of their child, administrators, teachers, and students learn to understand, and value individual differences. accept,

It does not include "dumping" students with disabilities in general education classrooms without careful planning and adequate support. It does not mean reducing services or funding for special education services or exposing any student to unnecessary hazards or risks. It does not require all teachers to become experts in special education or relegate special education teachers to the role of assistants in a general education

classmom. Regular education teachers are provided with student ability profiles on each student and modifications are made in assignments and testing. Students are provided with assistance with homework, projects and tests and are monitored closely and their progress reported regularly to their homes.

The 1993-94 school year will see in Inclusion emphasized with co-teaching. Training will begin this year with the core academic areas and the special education staff receiving training

at Bloomington North High School.

Board member Kantner questioned the use of what he termed "double standards" in what is expected from each student

"Is this really fair to the other students?" he asked. "It looks to me like we're back to where we were twenty years ago."

Mills said there has always been a double standard as far as what can be expected from students. "That is the reality," he said. "Whether we're using a double standard in a separate classroom or within one room is the issue. So far, it hasn't caused any major problems."

In other business: * Mark Wise asked the board to consider setting aside a night during the week without extra-curricular school activities to enable the local churches to hold their mid-week Bible studies without having to compete with the schools. He pointed out that

Triton School has implemented such a program.

Boling said the board was asked to do this last year but it wasn't possible to entirely eliminate activities for one night each

week. She offered to check and see if activities could be reduced. Kantner commented that the churches need to get together and decide on a specific night because it would be impossible to accommodate individual schedules.

* The board voted to accept bids for the purchase of three 66-passenger school buses with minor changes in specifications recommended by Dr. Dan Kramer. The changes include Bridgestone tires instead of Michelin and changing the strobe lights to make them compatible with what is already used on alley buses. Bids will be accepted until 1:30 p.m. January 22,

* The board gave approval for the Spanish Club, under the supervision of Don Craw, to take a field trip to an art museum in Chicago.

* The board approved the re-appointment of Ed LaMar to the Bell Memorial Library Board.

Danyelle has relatives that live in the Tippecanoe Valley School district. Danyelle will have to have chemotherapy treatments for at least the next two years. Right now, she has to go to Fort Wayne three times a week.

Money collected through December 22 will be delivered to the Dittons by Jon Parker, principal at Mentone School.

"There are many families that are going through very tough times right now," said Parker. "But when we hear of little children fighting battles for their lives, we all hurt a little more inside. I believe that there is much more power in the giving if 600 students gave a dime to this family, rather than 60 students giving a dollar apiece. The total money is the same, but the support base is different. Maybe this is what Christmas is all about.'

said Robert Hackworth.


