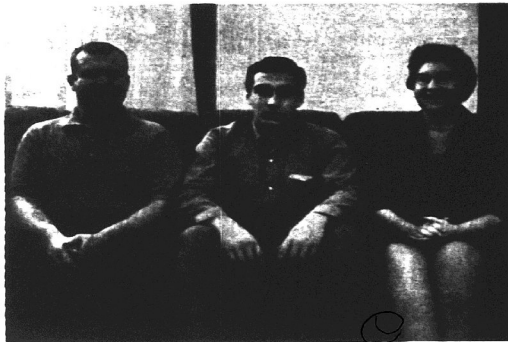

C. and Cedar Lake, Ind. during his ten-week visit to the United States.

The average monthly wage

is \$250 in Peru, but Peruvians pay no income tax. The only tax levied is on imports thus making a new Chevrolet cost \$8,000 or a Polaroid camera cost \$400.

An on-the-scene report cannot reach you from the Middle East in time for this printing, so will give you an outline today of this trip. It is my second in approximately two years and for the purpose of study of society (as well as antiquity) from all angles. What are the conditions there, and does politics "play up" possible new flare-ups? First hand information. Then too, we are going to visit the new diggings in Golan Heights. - this area was taken from the Arabs last June and extensive archeological work is underway there. The great Christian religious heritage from the Tomb of Abraham to that of St. Paul will be visited and studied. The roots of our very existence are there in that area and that is why we are on our way.

About two months ago a great find was made two miles South of Bethlehem. Skeletons over 500,000 years old were unearthed. What bearing will this have on the Christian theology of today? Last week a 2,000 year old temple was unearthed just outside the present wall of Old Jerusalem and I want to see that. We will travel from St. Catherine's Monastery to Golan Heights in Israel; from Antioch to Istanbul in Turkey; Philippi to Corinth in Greece and visit Rome. Will have something from on-the-spot next week.

## The GI in Vietnam is quite a guy

THE GI IN VIETNAM IS  
QUITE A MAN

FEELING in Vietnam is that most back-homers, including lawmakers, do not understand or accept the truth that the conflict in Vietnam is war. That the bulk of America considers Southeast Asia with confusion and mild contempt.

A soldier returning home from Vietnam will find that people can't yet point the country out on a map, can't guess the number of weekly casualties there, can't figure out who the enemy is, and can't understand what it's all about except they guess freedom is involved.

"You think Vietnam is bad?" a statesider will grin. "Brother, you should have been in New York during the blackout."

"Too bad you're home," another adds grimly. "Traffic's terrible."

"La Drang?" a third will say. "Nothing. You should've seen the Battle of the Bulge. Now that was real war."

Vietnam is still a pop art entity 12,000 miles away.

The public worries more about living with a possible tax increase. Officials worry about living with world opinion. The GI worries only about living.

His world there is nightly blackout and mortar traffic. It's alive with booby traps that can blow his legs or his life to shreds. It's occupied with an enemy and an ally that look exactly alike.

He would give a month's pay for a sound sleep.

And 10 years of his life for a night at home.

He is not a bit player in a comic opera conflict, not the trump in an international card game and not 12,000 miles away but as near as the muddy and bloody pictures in the newspapers.

Moreover, he is usually a very young American citizen in a hell of a fix. The average age of a combat GI in Vietnam is 18½.

But what a man he is!

A pink-cheeked, tousled-haired, tight-muscled fellow who, under normal circumstances, would be considered by society as half-man, half-boy, not yet dry behind the ear, a pain in the employment chart.

But right now, he is the beardless hope of free men.

He is for the most part unmarried and without material possessions except for possibly an old car at home and a transistor radio here.

He listens to rock 'n' roll and the 105 mm howitzers.

He has just got out of high school within the past year, received so-so grades, played a little football, and had a girl who broke up with him when he went overseas or who swears that she is still faithful although he is half the world away.

He has learned to like beer by now because it is cold and because it is "the thing to do."

He smokes because he gets free cigarettes in his C-ration package and it is also the thing to do.

He never cared much for work, preferred waxing his own car to washing his father's but he is now 10 or 20 pounds lighter than before because he is working or fighting from dawn to dark, often longer.

He still has his trouble spelling, and writing letters home is a painful process. But he can break down a rifle in 30 seconds and put it back together again in 29. He can describe the nomenclature of a fragmen-

tation grenade, explain how a machinegun operates and, of course, utilize either if the need arises.

He obeys now, without hesitation. But he is not broken.

He has seen more suffering than he should have in his short life. He has stood among hills of bodies and he has helped to construct those hills.

He has wept in public and in private, and he is not ashamed in either place, because his pals have fallen in battle and he has come close to joining them.

And he has become self-sufficient; he has two pairs of fatigues, washes one and wears the other. He sometimes forgets to brush his teeth, but not his rifle.

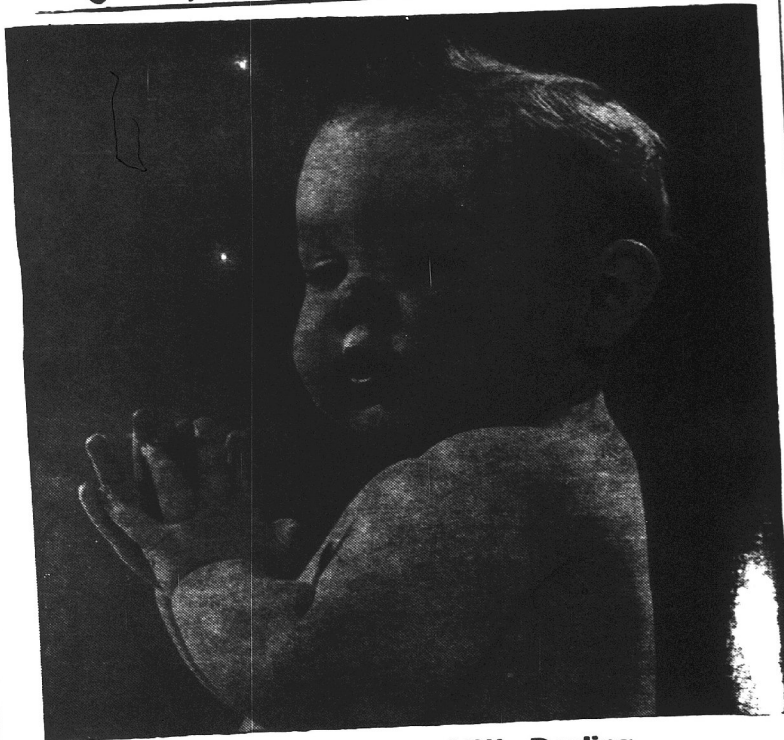

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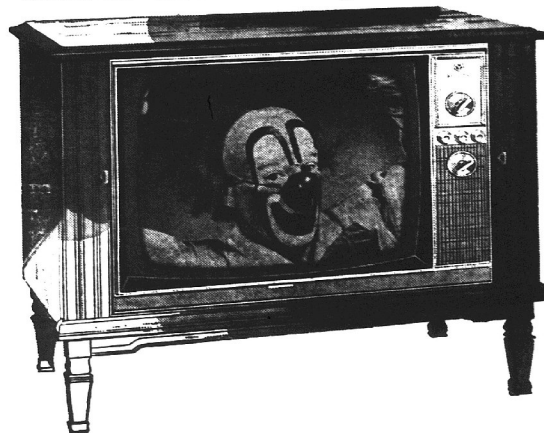

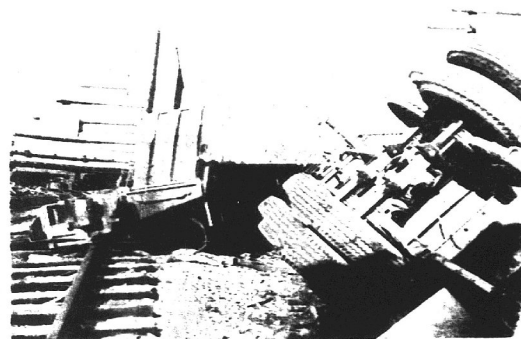
## Train Derails Near Here

exists for Burket, Akron, and Mentone, but that all additions and remodeling undertaken since the corporation had formed had been paid for as work was completed. He was also told that the cumulative building fund balance as of December 31, 1967 had been \$349,494.68 and that this would grow to approximately half a million dollars by the end of this year. Parker asked if the present 82¢ cumulative building fund would need to be increased in the event a building program was begun and was told payments could not be made on the present rate. He was also told that the fund would grow to approximately \$900,000 by the time a building could be built, approximately two and one half years from preliminary plans to completed building.

Forbes showed him figures based on a hypothetical \$2,700,000 building that would pay off in twenty five years if financed at 5% interest through a holding company. The payments on this building would be \$191,592 per year based on an assessed valuation of \$20,774,860.00 and would boost the rate to 92.2¢. He was advised, however, that this was merely a hypothetical building since no estimates could be given on the actual cost.

Parker further questioned the advisability of letting registered voters make the decision concerning the school without their having to be taxpayers. He was told that everyone paid taxes, whether they be sales taxes or property taxes and that it would be impossible to limit it strictly to tax payers since so

many of the corporation's residents were buying property on land contracts and were paying taxes but were not legally recognized as landowners.

Parker also wondered how the "facts" about a school building program and the needs of the corporation were to be distributed and was told that representatives of the press were present at each meeting and that past attempts by the board to disseminate information had failed.

Richard Dickerhoff, a resident of Mentone who described himself as one of the corporation's largest taxpayers, questioned the advisability of an open meeting at which time the five board members and the superintendent could present the "facts" of the issue. He said that people are taking it for granted that two new gyms would be built if the two-school policy is followed. He also questioned whether the board knew what they had approved as the second part of the referendum, two new high schools or additions to the present facilities. He was told additions had not been discussed but that it had been mentioned that a campus-type arrangement could be utilized at the present schools if two buildings were built.

Dickerhoff and Parker both expressed a desire to live in better communities and said they thought a centralized high school would enrich the area and would entice people to locate here who might go elsewhere for lack of better educational facilities here. Dickerhoff felt a centralized high school would increase the value of farm ground, and Parker

estimated that 98% of the people in Seward township favored a centralized high school.

Board member Ralph Davis reported that the Lewis-Cass school district had been denied state approval to build outside the city limits of a town, and to this Forbes replied that he had absolutely no guarantee from the state that they would approve a centralized high school for the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation that was located outside the city limits of one of the incorporations or that they would approve two high schools within the corporation.

Dickerhoff asked the advisability of planning a multi-story building and was told that the cost of stairways, etc. usually offset the savings in roof, etc.

Terry Walgamuth, R. R. 1, Akron, asked how costs could be cut on transporting children to four schools instead of three. He was told that it would cost more to transport children to a centralized school because the grade children would first need to be taken to the high school and then shuttled to grade schools in Akron, Burket, and Mentone. The state requires a certain amount of time for high school operation. Board members estimated children would need to be on the bus approximately one half hour longer in the event a centralized school were built. Mrs. Terry Walgamuth objected to this, saying that it was senseless to have children boarding busses in the dark and coming home in the dark.

Robert Runkle, R. 1, Akron, asked Forbes to make an estimate of the cost of a central high school. Forbes replied that a guess would be \$3½ million and that this did not include interest. He also reported that if everything went well from plans to finish, that the building could be ready for occupancy in two and one half years.

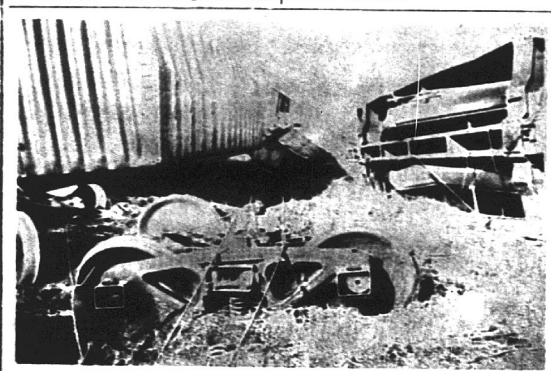
Runkle asked Forbes to estimate the cost of two buildings, one at Mentone and one at Akron, without a new gym or swimming pool, and Forbes replied that he thought he meant eleven additional classrooms at each school at an average cost of \$35,000 each. Runkle then asked if this approximate \$800,000 expenditure for buildings at Akron and Mentone could be financed without bonding and with the present surplus and incoming cumulative funds and was told that it probably could. He complimented the board on their past action and said he hoped they would again use a "pay as we go" system.

Further question and answer time was spent determining that more planning would be involved with two high schools than one and that the board understood more about building one school than two. Parker said he thought the time was right to build, that other corporations had paved the way for this one to bring up the rear, and Dickerhoff concluded by saying most of the intelligent people in the community favored one school.

Following the end of the audience period, the board handled routine business and approved contracts for Chuck Wagner, June Weber, and Marion Hunter as bus drivers in the event a route should become open.

Eldon Cumberland was elected president of the finance committee and Gale Creighton was

named treasurer. The group then went into executive session.

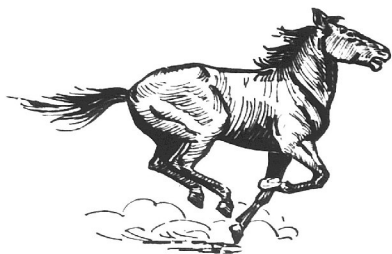

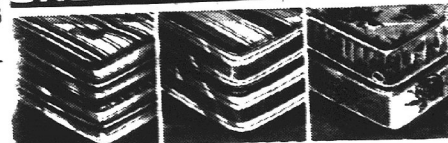

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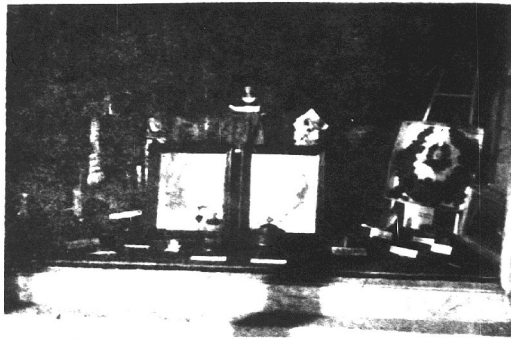
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## Antique Display Marks American History Month

5th — Fulton, Wabash, Cass, Miami, Carroll, Howard, Grant, Blackford, Clinton, Tipton, Boone and Hamilton counties.

6th — Pike, Washington, Wayne, Decatur, Perry and Franklin townships of Marion County and Hancock, Rush, Morgan, Johnson and Shelby counties.

7th — Warren, Fountain, Montgomery, Vermillion, Parke, Putnam, Hendricks, Vigo, Clay, Owen, Sullivan, Greene, Martin, Monroe and Brown counties.

8th — Knox, Daviess, Gibson, Pike, Dubois, Orange, Crawford, Harrison, Posey, Vanderburgh, Warrick, Spencer and Perry counties.

9th — Fayette, Bartholomew, Decatur, Jennings, Ripley, Dearborn, Ohio, Washington, Scott, Jefferson, Switzerland,

Clark and Floyd counties.

10th — Jay, Madison, Delaware, Randolph, Henry, Wayne and Union counties.

11th — Center, Lawrence and Warren townships of Marion county.

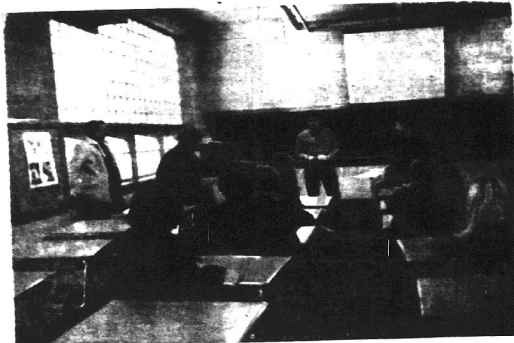
## Spring-A-Ding-Ding launches businessmen

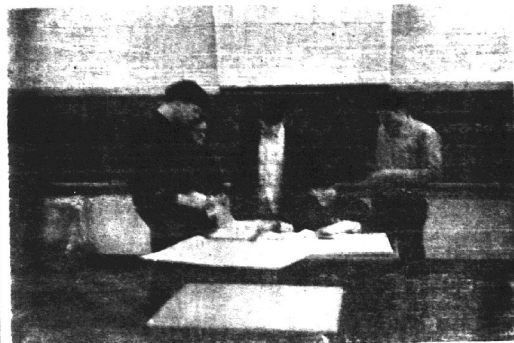

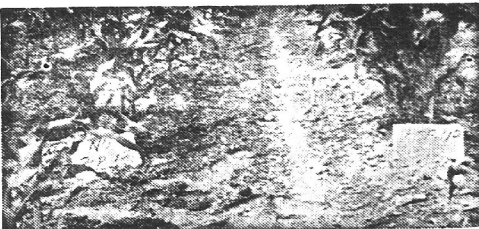
### Earl Sarber, 78, Rites Are Held

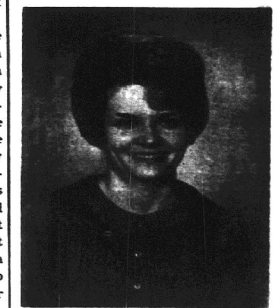

LAFAYETTE, Ind.--The child who misbehaves frequently in the third grade is likely to be in trouble with the police a few years later. This is one of the findings of a research project reviewed by a Purdue University psychologist.

Working with elementary school pupils in Wisconsin, the researchers found that children who are constant distractions to school routine in their early years may be expected to score lower in later school work and also rate lower than their school mates in later social adjustment.

The aggressive-disruptive children also were found to have much more frequent contact with the law than the original socially acceptable group.

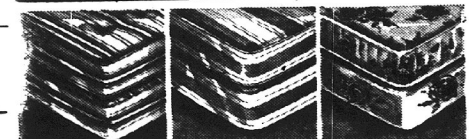

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## General Telephone Seeks Reclassification Approval

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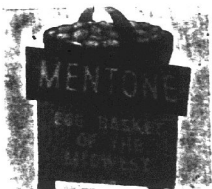
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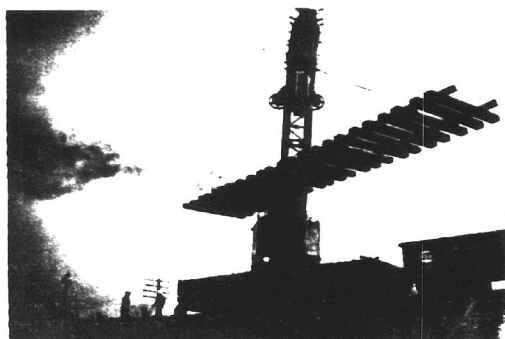

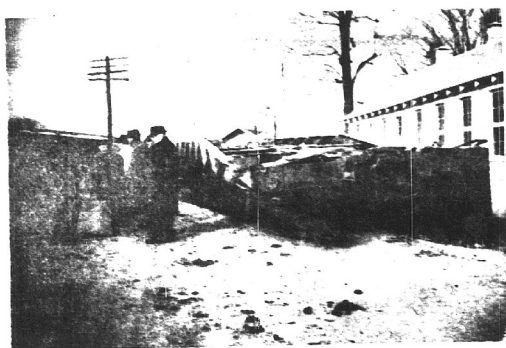

## Train derails - again

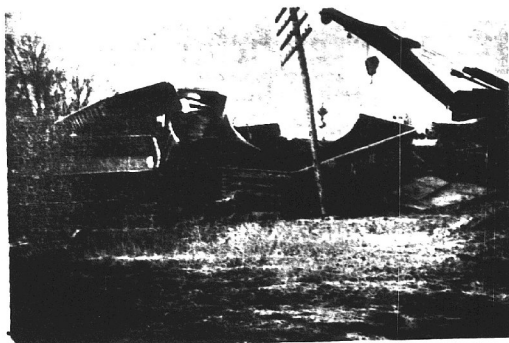

## ODDS and ENDS

We studied penmanship in grade school, spending hours making tight little circles with our ink pens to get the "feel of writing" and to limber our wrists. It was part of our initiation into the world of books and papers, new friends and new words.

Some of the first new words I heard were "consolidation" and "condemnation." The Athens students had begun coming to Akron the year before we started and the older people, remembering the once proud Athens school, shook their heads and wondered "where all this consolidation would end." The word "condemnation" came later and when I heard it applied to the old building I loved, it meant little. We enjoyed its cavernous rooms, the forbidding basement, the lofty ceilings.

Never having known a school that wasn't drafty, we didn't worry when the war years cancelled thoughts of building. Instead, we pitched in and collected milk weed pods, scrap paper, and iron for the war effort, spent the summers prowling a deserted one room school, wondering at its smallness, and searched the cook books for sugarless cakes. Finding nothing but griddle cake recipes, we prayed for a speedy end to the war.

School life continued, and, though dimly aware that teachers were being called into action, we continued playing fox and goose in the winter, red rover, dodge ball, and crack the whip in the spring and fall. We thought it would be nice to have swings but lacking them we played king of the mountain on the ash pile. Somehow, we did learn quite a bit. At least our grade cards show that we had a wide variety of subjects.

By war's end we had been convinced our old building was hopeless and when we left it a year or two later to transfer to the high school building, a few of us hid in the hall and spat on the floor to show our contempt.

As seventh graders, we were past the spitting stage but a love for exploration soon led to our being banned from the third floor of the high school building. This was a special area for high school students, we were told, and for years I had a recurring dream about that third floor. Such wonders that my dream had--an aquarium, a room where Geo. Washington slept, a switchboard, an executive suite. What a disappointment to finally be allowed up there and find nothing but classrooms.

It was from a vantage point on the third floor that we watched construction of a new grade building, one so modern it didn't even have an ash pile.

Talk of consolidation began again, and the Burket school, the one I would have graduated from had not my family moved the spring before I started to school, closed. The old Akron grade building was demolished, and our sons think we are joking when we tell them about it.

By graduation time we were in a subdued lot. The boys were faced with the prospect of Korea, the girls with the prospect of waiting for their guy. Some of us went to college where making the jump from a class of 27 to one of 2200 was quite a jump, but one that was mastered with some mishap. Given a choice of writing about something other than dairy judging or taking an F, I wrote a tongue-in-cheek article about climbing out of dormitory windows after hours and received an A.

Marriage beckoned and it wasn't until we found ourselves living in Germany that we thought much more about schools. Living with a teacher's family, we could observe daily the students who came for tutoring. I was impressed with their German until reminded it was their native tongue. It's funny how long it takes to realize a simple thing like that. Accepting their German was easier than accepting their English, which was better than ours. This from ten-year olds? "Where is our school system lacking?" we asked ourselves. Sputnik soon pointed out some of the facets it lacked, and, by the time we returned to the States, chemistry, foreign language, etc. were receiving more emphasis. The grade building we had watched grow from nothing was being enlarged; the high school building was crowded.

The Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation formed the same year we bought the Akron News, and because consolidation had become the issue of the day, I was more conscious of it as I searched for items for the "This Was News" column. Consolida-

tions were formed fifty years ago that no one remembers today. Black Oak, White Oak, etc.

In the meantime, high schools at Talma, Beaver Dam, Atwood, Claypool, Silver Lake, Macy, Gilead--the list of endless--have closed. The Akron and Mentone schools have enlarged. Changes have affected college campuses too, and no longer would it be necessary to climb out dormitory windows. Hours no longer exist.

Locally, consolidation remains the chief topic of discussion and having lived in three of the corporation's townships and having worked in the other two, I wonder at its outcome. Some of us, reading of schools that are deconsolidating, would like to do the same. Others of us want to go big in a big way.

Whichever way we go, there is no doubt about it, the tight little circle that was forming 28 years ago hasn't changed much from the tight little circles that were forming in 1900. Penmanship may be outdated but the tight little circles it represented still exist.

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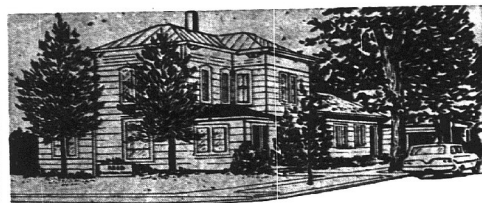

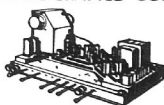

Rev. James Gabhart, pastor of the Tippecanoe Community Church, officiated. Burial was at the Walnut Church of the Brethren Cemetery.

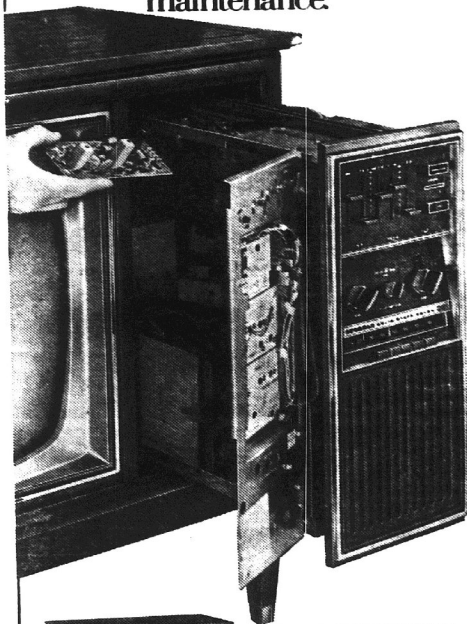

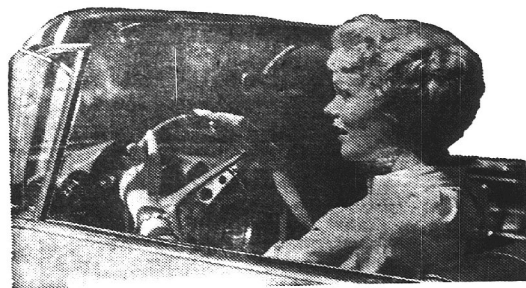
