State Says NO To TVSC Building Project

After almost nine months of deliberating and to no one's surprise, the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Richard D. Wells, this week officially denied the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation's proposal for building additional facilities at Akron and Mentone to provide a campus-type arrangement that would permit high schools to be operated in each town.

In addition to denying the request, the state further recommended that plans be initiated immediately for the construction of a centralized facility to accommodate all students in grades 9-12 within the corporation. It was a recommendation of Richard W. Morrison, director of the division of school house planning, that it would be advisable to incorporate the necessary provisions for the ultimate housing of grades 7 and 8 on the central site. He said all existing facilities could be used except for the Talma building, which could "honorably be retired."

Referring to a land option that was made before the May referendum in order that people voting could know where a centralized high school could be located, the director further noted, "We have on file Project No. 3356, dated April 1, 1968, which is a request for the purchase of a centralized site and the construction of a 9-12 facility thereon. If you desire to activate this application, please notify us of your intentions."

The site is about two and one half miles south of Mentone on State Road 19 and is about 6½ miles north of Akron. It is situated on land owned by Max Nellans in Franklin township.

The question had been put up at a referendum last May with a majority of the residents indicating they preferred keeping high schools

in each town. The board by a 5-0 vote agreed to follow the mandate of the referendum and plans for a 10-12 high school in each town that would form part of a campus-type arrangement were discussed and a building project for the same was submitted for state approval.

Implications of the report and the next course of action will be discussed at the Feb. 17 meeting of the local school board.

Mentone Youth League To Buy Pitching Machine

The Mentone Youth League will purchase a pitching machine to be used at the Youth League park this summer after receiving permission to buy the machine at Monday night's town board meeting.

Youth League president Jerry Secrist outlined the activities of the league to board members, noting that enrollment had grown from 76 three years ago to over 200 at the present time. He said the Youth League plans to add tennis courts and possibly an outdoor pavilion for winter activities. The program includes activities for boys and girls and playground equipment for the younger children has been added, Secrist noted.

Dr. O. L. McFadden of the Mentzer park board gave the town board a detailed accounting of income and receipts at that park since its beginning and asked that an additional pavilion be built there. The board took the matter under advisement. It was noted that Pauline Riner had volunteered to plant and maintain flowers in both parks and permission for this was given.

To The Editor

Dear Editor,

At the present time, there are two bills, House Bill 1469 and Senate Bill 113, pending in the Indiana State Legislature, which provides for a direct primary election for the selection of candidates for United States Senator, Governor and Lieutenant Governor and the other top state offices. At the present time, these public officials are nominated by their respective Democratic and Republican State conventions. Indiana and Connecticut are the only two states in the union which do not provide for nominations in the state conventions by direct primary for state offices. In Indiana, we hold a primary election to determine our preference for President of the United States and select our candidates for congressional, legislative, county and municipal offices by direct primary. However, in the state offices we make an exception. This exception allows for political power to be controlled by a few hands rather than by the people. The loyalty of the delegates are difficult to ascertain and when the people vote for them, they actually have no knowledge for whom they are voting. Approximately twenty percent of the votes cast in the state convention are cast by proxies.

Thus as the law now stands, the people have no real choice in the selection of their top state candidates.

After the funeral on Tuesday, I rode into Indianapolis with my brother-in-law, only to miss the bus for Rochester by 15 minutes. I waited three hours for the 1:00 a.m., arriving in Rochester after 3:00 in the morning. Cold... slick streets.....raw wind. No place open. They brought me a pillow and a blanket. I lay on the sofa and slept for a couple of hours, then called my son. I thanked the good ladies who operate the night shift and left...with a warm place in my heart for the hospital in Rochester.

As the minister of Talma and Mentone United Methodist Churches, I have for two years made many calls. I just want to say I pray Rochester realizes how very fortunate they are to have such a fine hospital. Where they are able to get such wonderful help in these times, I don't know. I have made over 10,000 calls in hospitals all over the United States, and I would rate the Rochester hospital with the best of them. Thank you and God bless you.

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"I Hereby Sentence You"

Every day these words echo through the halls of justice across our land. Do you, as a citizen of the U.S.A., realize what freedoms are taken away if you are convicted of a felony?

An Iowa judge points these out as he is talking to a 16-year-old felon:

"Because you have no previous conviction, I am permitted to give you parole...But if you never see the inside of a penitentiary, you will not have escaped the penalties of your crime."

"The record of your conviction will be here as long as the courthouse stands. No amount of good conduct in the future can erase it.... If you are ever called to witness in any court some lawyer will point his finger at you and ask: 'Have you ever been convicted of a felony?'...And the question will be asked for the purpose of casting doubt on your testimony. Convicted felons are not believed as readily as other persons."

"It may be that someday...you will apply for a passport. You will not get it...No country will allow you to become a resident."

"Your world is, oh, so much smaller than it was."

"Some day you may seek a position in the civil service...You will find the question: Have you ever been convicted of a felony? Your answer will bar you from examination."

"You may want to take a position of trust where a surety bond is required. On the application will appear this question: Have you ever been convicted of a felony?"

"In a few years you will be 21 and others your age will have the right to vote, but you will not...You will be a citizen of your state and county, but you will have no voice in public affairs."

"Your country is calling men to the colors. But the Army will never accept you, nor will the Navy...You may serve your country in a labor battalion perhaps, but never behind guns. Yours may be the drudgery of war, but never the honor that comes to a soldier."

"I am granting you a parole. A parole is in no sense a pardon. You will report to the men who have accepted your parole as often as they may ask. Your convenience is not a matter of importance. You will answer fully and truthfully any question they may ask. Should they suggest that you refrain from going to certain places or with certain companions, you will follow their suggestions and without grumbling."

"You will also obey your parents...You will perform such tasks as are assigned to you. Your parole is a fragile

thing."

"Should the slightest complaint of your conduct reach this court, your parole will be revoked immediately.... You will not be brought back here for questioning or explanations. You will not be picked up and taken to prison without notice to you and without delay."

....Those were the judge's words. Perhaps if that young boy had heard or read words like this before he committed his crime, he might have stopped to reconsider.

Runkle's fertilizer program included 110 pounds of nitrogen, 45 pounds of phosphate and 120 pounds of potassium. Weeds were controlled with 2,4-D and two cultivations.

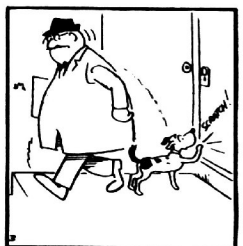

Franco, the Man and His Nation by George Mills. No other living head of state has been so controversial a figure as Franco. No other person has been a head of state as long as he in this century. To date, however, no one has attempted to establish the facts on which judgement may be made as to whether he is the evil figure portrayed by his enemies or "the great Christian gentleman" painted by his friends. The author leaves the reader to make the final judgement.

Food for Fifty compiled by Sina Faye Fowler. Procedures are given for planning, buying and organizing meals for special occasions with a selection of foreign food recipes. There are about 350 basic recipes included with about 300 variations.

This first full-length English language biography of Indira Gandhi presents an intimate portrait of an intriguing personality who until now has been shrouded in mystery, in spite of public scrutiny and constant exposure in the political arena. As Prime Minister of the world's second most populous nation, she has faced and struggled with such diverse and difficult problems as population control, entrenched religious animosity, the specter of mass starvation, and the confusion of dealing with many different language dialects within one homeland.

The Bell Memorial Public Library has recently received three gift books presented by the Mentone Reading Club. All three of the books are reference books and should be a valuable asset to the library.

The first book - **American Authors and Books** by W. J. Burke and Will D. Howe, is an encyclopedia of American books, authors, personalities, periodicals, organizations, and other pertinent information covering all aspects of the literary world.

The other two books are **The American Heritage Pictorial History of the Presidents of the United States, Volume I and 2.**

Volume 1 tells the stories of the first 19 men who held America's highest office. Beyond that trust, these Presidents had surprisingly little in common. Some were great political figures before they were elected to America's highest office. Some were catapulted to the Presidency by accident, or assassination, or the vagaries of politics. They were a "mixed grill." But to each man the country looked for leadership. And by and large the leadership was there. Each president, as this book clearly shows, had a style of his own.

Volume 2 contains the stories of the 16 men who guided the destiny of the United States during the years from 1881 to 1968.

Their administration spanned the years in which the United States matured as a nation and came of age as a world power. As historian Bruce Catton points out, "The country does not always elect its most famous and talented men to the Presidency...but surprisingly often we get a big man just when we need one." The last 16 have been a fascinatingly varied lot as you will find when you read the book.

Since February is National History Month, the Anthony Nigo Chapter of DAR has arranged a display at the library with the emphasis on Abraham Lincoln and George Washington, using books, newspapers and pictures.

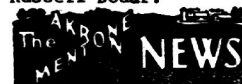

junior-senior high school, and minimum repair to one elementary school currently in use are considerations of the No. Miami Board of School Trustees at the present time.

At a recent meeting of the school board with representatives of the Kingscott Architectural firm, concerns for educational needs of the community, the tax dollar dilemma, and the wishes of patrons as expressed over the past several months were important influences in arriving at a tentative plan for moving head in solving the facility problems of the community.

The proposed addition to the high school would include provisions for expansion of industrial arts, a science laboratory, additional space for music classes and provision for teacher planning and conference.

The proposed new elementary facility would be a building capable of housing approximately 660 elementary and kindergarten students. This facility would comprise approximately 24 teaching stations and would accommodate the students now housed at the Chili school, the Gilead school and the Macy school as well as the fifth and sixth grades from the Mexico school.

Minimum remodeling of the Mexico school to upgrade the necessary toilet, food service, and other facilities would allow use of this building for several years.

It is estimated that the total cost for carrying out the above program would be \$1,494,000. Of this amount, \$260,000.00 would be required for the high school addition, \$1,184,000.00 for the new elementary school and \$50,000.00 for minimum renovation of the Mexico school. These figures are estimates and are subject to bids, litigation and unforeseen developments.

The proposed program would be financed with the monies available from the cumulative building fund (approximately \$400,000.00), a previously approved Veteran's Memorial Loan of \$250,000 and a possible building corporation bond issue for \$966,000. The annual repayment on this indebtedness would total approximately \$91,000. The cumulative building fund annually provides in excess of \$108,000. This amount now being collected would handle the proposed debt retirement and would provide some accumulation in the building fund to handle problems in the years ahead.

The school officials met Monday night to discuss necessary appropriations for the purpose of site purchase and payment of architect fees.

Patrons were given an opportunity to ask questions and discuss the latest developments of the board's efforts to solve the school housing problems of that community.

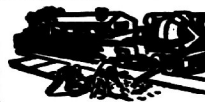

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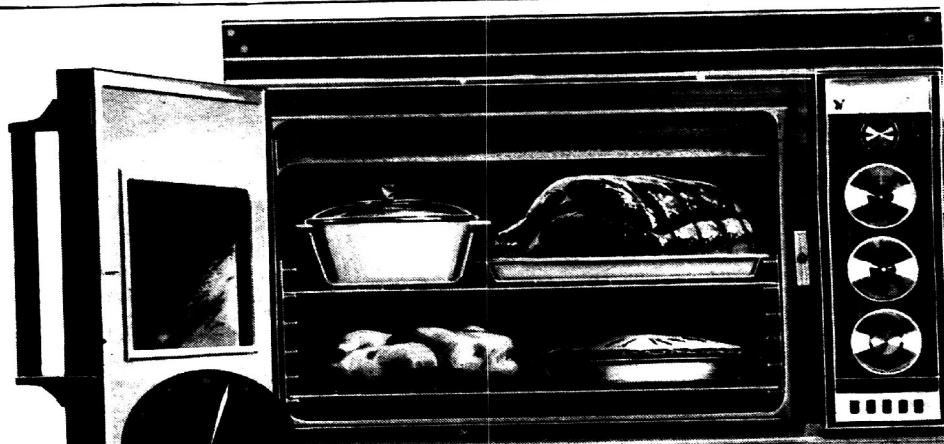

"Land of the Indians" Is Woman's Club Topic

"Land of the Indians" was the topic of the talk delivered by author L. W. Shultz to members of the Akron Woman's Club last Thursday.

"Indiana is the land of the Indians with the Indian name carried to the capitol at Indianapolis," he said.

He had a display of pictures, Indian artifacts, maps and copies of books including reprints of books by the late Otho Winger. These reprints included "The Frances Slocum Trail", "The Last of the Miamis", "Little Turtle", "Potawatomi Indians" and "The Lost Sister Among The Miamis."

He commented that Little Turtle, famous Indian chief who was born in Whitley county, was the greatest Indian chief of all Indians in the country. Little-

Turtle belonged to the Miami tribe and won many battles for his people. When President George Washington sent General Anthony Wayne west he defeated the Indians across Ohio and more land was given at the treaty of Greenville. Little Turtle advised against attacking the forces of Wayne but would not leave his own people. Little Turtle was the last to sign the treaty and said he would be the last to break it.

Mr. Shultz gave each person a book, "More Indian Lore," by Lamb and Shultz and the contents were used as in a classroom. He showed pictures of Little Turtle, Tecumseh, Simon Potawatomi and Sacajawea an Indian woman who became known for her services as a guide for the Lewis-Clark expedition, described by Shultz as

one of the most important and dramatic exploration feats in American history. The book was full of other pictures of the Indian stone artifacts, songs, maps, words, signs and meanings.

Mr. Shultz presented many names that come from the Indians, such as the counties of Delaware, Miami, Ohio, Wabash, Tippecanoe and the lakes of Michigan, Winona, Manitou, Wawasee. Also, the rivers of Calumet, Kanapocomoco (Eel), Maumee, Mississinewa, Wabash, Ohio, etc. He also pointed out that, all Indian names have a meaning, such as Shipshewanna, great beast; Mishawaka, trees and a swamp, Coessee, old man, and Chicago, place of foul smell.

In the Indian calendar he mentioned that December was the month of the long night.

Don't Let Your Emotions Make You A Statistic

Distressed? Depressed? Anxious or even overjoyed? Be careful! Don't become one of the 4,000,000 yearly traffic crash statistics.

An estimated 80 per cent of all traffic crashes involve drivers emotions. Thus, emotional conditions indirectly cause most of the 1,000 traffic deaths per week.

Strong emotions can act as drugs that affect the brain and inhibit the decision making processes, explains Don Costa, Safety Director of the Allstate Insurance Companies. Consequently, an excessively elated driver takes more chances than he ordinarily would. A depressed driver "loses himself" in his problems and fails to notice the changed traffic signal.

The problem is for the driver to drive carefully despite the temporary handicap of anger or other emotion.

"The key to controlling emotional driving is simple," says Costa. "Settle down, and make deliberate choices instead of emotion-blinded ones. After all, an elated driver only spoils his happiness in a crash caused by his recklessness."

Farm Bureau Plans Feed Mill At Rochester

The Indiana Farm Bureau Co-Op this week announced a new feed installation to be constructed in Fulton county near Rochester.

The Co-Op holds an option on some 85 acres a mile and a half west of Rochester. The mill will be built on this site south of the Erie-Lackawanna Railroad line. The projected route of the U.S. 31 bypass is a quarter mile from the site.

Production capacity will be 50,000 tons a year, according to Joe Wise, manager of the Co-Op's feed and poultry department. Using highly automated equipment and processes, only nine production employees will be able to produce

200 tons of feed in an eight-hour shift.

The mill at Rochester is the latest in a series to be built by the Co-Op. The installation will include a manufacturing building more than 160 feet tall, a warehouse 70 feet wide and 300 feet long, a service building, an office, and a laboratory for quality control.

Construction is expected to start this spring.

TVSC Feud Off And Running Again

The complexion of the school situation in the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation continues to change. In May, voters of the district indicated a preference to maintain two high schools, one at Akron and one at Mentone. Three weeks ago, State Superintendent of Public Instruction Richard Wells denied the request to construct additions at the two schools and at the recommendation of Richard Morrison, head of the Division of School House Planning, recommended the immediate construction of a centralized high school. One week ago, a bill to "amend an act concerning school sites and buildings by providing that when school corporations of enrollment of 2,000 or more pupils and area of 175 square miles and referendum of the people and board vote to have two high schools that such project is automatically approved and the state tax commission shall approve appropriations for such project without approval of any other board, agency or commission" was passed by the Indiana House.

If the bill passes the Senate, where it is now in committee, the school corporation would have unlimited power to proceed with plans for the two school additions without the permission of any state agency.

The board had estimated the building additions would cost a total of \$1.2 million at the time the project was submitted for state approval in May.

Monday night's school board meeting was attended by approximately 50 people, many of whom favor the construction of a centralized high school facility for the corporation.

Speaking for the one-school people were Larry Klein, Akron, and Bill Ettinger, Mentone. Ettinger said, "The basic goal of educating our children is being lost in technicalities."

Lloyd Bowerman of Mentone asked the board to consider the feasibility study for a vocational high school.

The board indicated

some consideration had been given the vocational school and that it would discuss it at a later time. It also declined to say what action would be taken regarding Wells' decision and the bill passed by the House. Board president Ralph Davis said "Wells delayed nine

months so the board can delay a little longer."

In other board action, teaching contracts with June Erwin and Julia Gerberin were signed and the board authorized the Farmers State Bank at Mentone and the Akron Exchange State Bank as public depositories for the next two years.

They'll Protest

HB 1558 that was sponsored by Coblenz passed in the Indiana House by a 78-1 vote Friday and will come up for vote in the Senate soon. In the meantime, members of the Senate education committee, headed by Gene E. Snowden, Huntington, will be hearing a lot of noise from the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation. Those who favor HB 1558 are asking local residents to write the committee with their support. Those who do not favor the bill want everyone to write against it.

In addition, there is some indication that representatives of both sides will go to Indianapolis for a public hearing before the Senate considers the bill.

The first will make available an award equal to full tuition for one year to all high school valedictorians and an award equal to 75% tuition for one year for salutatorians. The County Scholarship is available to students from counties in Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, Illinois and Kentucky that are not presently represented at Huntington College. This award provides a 50% reduction in tuition for one year. Anyone interested in the scholarships should contact the office of Don Kline, director of admissions.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 5: Sen. Birch Bayh (D-Ind.), chairman of the Subcommittee on Constitutional Amendments and a recognized spokesman for young people, today opened the first session of the Youth Franchise Coalition's meeting with a challenge to the Coalition "to see this campaign to lower the voting age to 18 through to a successful conclusion, whether it takes three years or five years to pass an amendment."

INDIANAPOLIS: The office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction this week announced that public schools operating special education programs for handicapped children during the 1967-68 school year will receive \$800,000

less in state support than they received last year. He said the reduction was necessary due to failure of the 1967 General Assembly to appropriate additional funds for the programs. 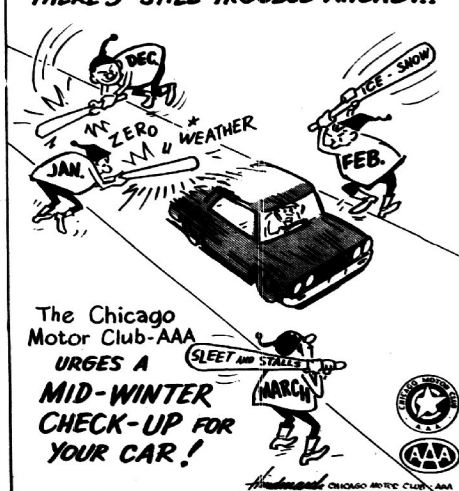
Unquestionably, a debt-free school corporation in this day and age would be a very unique thing, but also a very desirable one for the majority of you over-burdened taxpayers. I think many of you in the minority might be letting your judgement be colored with visions of mighty basketball teams. To this I say to each his own, but let us not lose sight of the fact that we are talking about education for our children. Some of you perhaps think that we too should have a fancy new school because this corporation or that corporation has one. To you, I would say look at the financial crisis facing some of these same corporations. It doesn't always have a rosy glow. Some of you would talk of our curriculum and its deficiencies, etc. I would answer that our percentage of students going on to college is above state averages. Surely this means something. Evidently these students are able to meet college entrance requirements. A fancy new school plant would not insure us a solution to our problems nor would it guarantee the best educated children

in the country. No question that the need for room is a very pressing problem. However, let's not be like sheep and follow along for fear of being different. Sure, everything might not be fancy and new but it would belong to us. We wouldn't be paying thousands of dollars interest each year nor have to worry where the next tax dollar was coming from. How old would some of the buildings be on the campus of Yale or perhaps Harvard? To you people who believe along these lines I would urge you to get busy and write our state senators and let them know your feelings. They believe in majority rule. That's how they got there. As you know, HB 1558-Coblentz passed in the House of Representatives 78-1. It can do as well in the Senate with your help. To you people on the other side of the issue, let's face facts. You are the minority, let the majority rule. Don't change it now. It's brought us a long way in 200 years.

Marijuana Possession Is Costly

Indiana State Police officials have found what may prove to be an effective deterrent against unlawful use and possession of marijuana.

Superintendent Robert K. Konkle reported this week that Department researchers recently discovered a seldom-enforced section of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 that was enacted by the U.S. Congress, entitled "Marijuana: Imposition of Tax on Transfers."

Briefly, the portion of the code referred to rules that whenever marijuana is transferred there is a tax due the Federal government of one dollar per ounce for persons who possess a valid Federal narcotics tax stamp. The code states further that in a similar transaction by persons who do not have a narcotics tax stamp, an assessment of \$100 per ounce shall be levied by internal revenue authorities. Only druggists and doctors are permitted to purchase the narcotics stamp.

State Police crime laboratory experts said that an average marijuana cigarette has a tobacco weight of about 1/20th of an ounce. Any measurable part of an ounce shall be considered an ounce for taxing purposes, according to the wording of the code. Therefore, Konkle emphasized, a person in possession of just one marijuana cigarette would, in addition to criminal penalties, be subject of payment of the \$100 tax.

State Police conferred at length with internal revenue author-

ities to establish validity of the code and to set up procedures for reporting the identity of those persons apprehended and charged with illegal possession of marijuana.

State and Federal Officials added that offenders would, as usual, retain the right of appeal in the appropriate tax court.

Superintendent Konkle pointed out that the tax assessments will be levied even in the case of

juvenile offenders.

State Police plan soon to contact all other Hoosier police agencies to explain the legal steps necessary in notifying the Internal Revenue Service when apprehensions are made.

When his unit came under an intense enemy attack, Pvt. Yarian, with complete disregard for his own safety, exposed himself to intense enemy fire as he moved about his position placing effective fire on the advancing insurgents. His valorous actions contributed immeasurably to the defeat of the enemy force. Pvt. Yarian's personal bravery and devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, the 25th

Infantry Division, and the United States Army.

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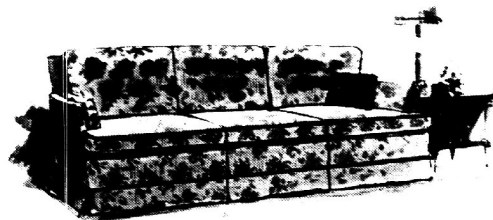
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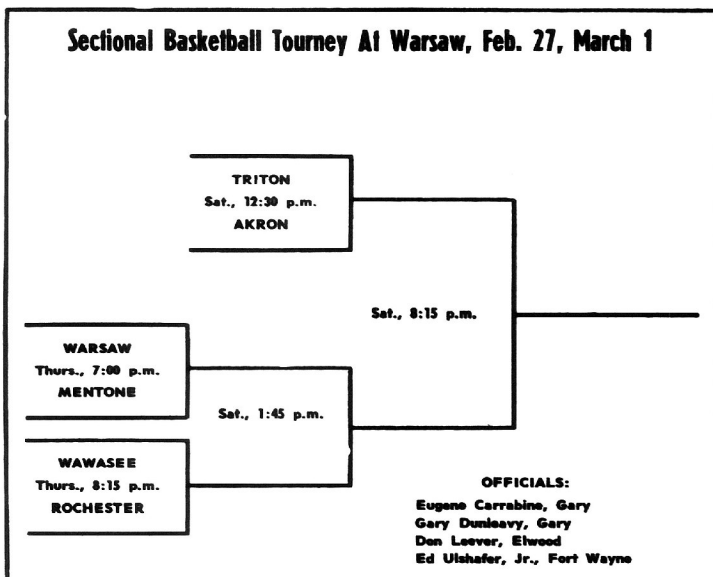

National defense chairman, Mrs. Smalley, read portions from the National Defender—a publication edited by the National Defense Committee of the NSDAR as follows: "The Non-proliferation Treaty was signed for the United States by the President and by representatives of 56 nations on July 1, 1968. It will not go into force until it is ratified by 40 signatory nations and by the three sponsoring nuclear nations, Great Britain, United States and the Soviet Union. Despite opposition of the Military, great pressure is being exerted on the Senate which must ratify the Treaty before it becomes binding on the United States. The Treaty has alternately been described as a "treatment to reason" and as a possible nuclear Yalta. It is difficult to see how it can contribute to the security of the United States for these reasons: (1) The Treaty does not stop the arms race, (2) It has no inspection safeguards, (3) The treaty denies and excludes the opinion of the U. S. to

selectively proliferate purely defensive nuclear weapons to hard pressed U. S. allies, and (4) It does not include Red China which is already in possession of nuclear weapons."

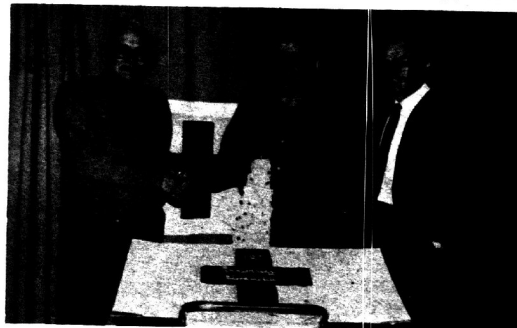

TVSC Group Meets With Senators

Residents of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation attended a hearing held by members of the Indiana Senate education committee last Friday regarding HB 15-58. The bill, which recently passed the House, would permit the TVSC to continue with plans to add classrooms at the Akron high school and at the Mentone high school. The board's request for approval of this plan was recently refused by Richard D. Wells, state superintendent of public instruction. The project was submitted after a referendum in May indicated a majority of the residents of the corporation favored maintaining two schools.

However, another group has been opposed to the referendum and its results.

Representatives of both sides met with the Senate committee Friday. Speaking for passage of the bill were Dr. D. J. VanGilder, Dr. O. L. McFadden and David Burkett, members of the TVSC board.

Speaking against the bill were Joe Boggs, Mentone, Larry Klein of Akron, Lawrence Castaldi, Gale Creighton, a former school board member, and Richard Goshert, a present school board member.

The latter group used as a basis for their argument item number 3 of the educational program envisioned and recommended in a comprehensive plan for the reorganization of the school corporations of Kosciusko county that says one of the purposes of the reorganization is: That each corporation provide a new high school located with due consideration of density of population, geographical center, and natural barriers.

They say that since this was a part of the reorganization program voted for by 85% of the voters of Franklin, Harrison, Seward and Henry townships (Newcastle entered the corporation later) there should be no question but that a consolidated high school should be built.

The group speaking for passage of the bill reminded the committee of the referendum vote.

The senate committee took no action and it

is not known if members will meet again or when the bill will come up for vote in the Senate.

John Augsburg was chairman of the Kosciusko County School Reorganization Committee and

is now a member of the Senate education committee. Gene Snowden of Huntington is chairman of the education committee.

He estimated there are 137 retarded persons in Kosciusko County, 144 of these under 5 years of age. He said only three of the five school corporations have special education facilities that serve 117 individuals. He said a new law will require,

school corporations to provide educational facilities for these children.

He said 61 children and adults are helped by the center with the ages broken down into several categories until the students reach age 16, at which time they are eligible to participate in the industrial workshop. Included in the work done in the workshop are jobs for Endicott Church Furniture, Da-Lite Screens and other local industries. He said that often the children are capable of accepting the community after having had the preliminary training at the workshop.

Macy Nelson reminded members that the scholarship basketball game between fourth and fifth grade students at Mentone and Burket will be held March 21 and that the annual sportsmanship trophy will be presented at that time.

Why School Board Supports HB1558

Ralph Davis, president of the Tippecanoe Valley School District board of trustees, today released the following statement in support of a bill in the Indiana Senate that would allow the district to build two new high schools without permission of the state superintendent of public instruction:

"This is in reference to House Bill 1558, that passed the Indiana House of Representatives by a vote of 78 to 1 on last Feb. 14. It was sent to the Senate the next morning and is now in the Senate Public Policy committee. It concerns the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation.

"1. The TVSC lost a junior high building by fire a year ago and is pressed for new construction.

"2. The TVSC school board gave the people of the district a referendum last May 7 to tell what they wanted.

"3. 61 percent preferred to maintain high schools as they are now — one in each of their real good towns of Akron and Mentone. This plan has the approval of a Purdue survey made of the district.

"4. These towns already have lands, sewers, gyms, cafeterias, band rooms, libraries, athletic fields, fire and police protection, and much more.

"5. The TVSC has the money to build these buildings as of completion date, Sept. 1, 1970, to pay cash, not go in debt, and not increase tax rate.

"6. Plans for this construction were sent to the superintendent of public instruction on May 11, but no decision was given until Jan. 31, 1969 — nearly nine months delay.

"7. The state superintendent now says 'No' to the people of the TVSC. He says they should build a 4% to 5 million dollar building out in the country, plus interest of 2 1/4 to 3 million dollars — wait another three years for completion, and go far in debt.

"8. TVSC has excellent schools, good curricula, good teachers and the number of high school grades going to college and graduation is well above the state average.

"9. The state superintendent, in speeches and in newspapers, tells of many school districts in the state in financial chaos, and is now insisting that the TVSC be added to that very unfortunate list. People of the district are screaming for Democracy."

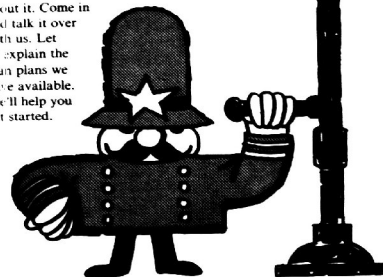

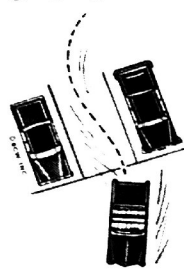
