After almost nine monthe State Superintendent the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Richard D. Wells, this week officially denied the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation's proposal for building additional facilities at Akron and Mentone to at Akron and Mentone to provide a campus-type arrangement that would permit high schools to be operated in each topm town.

In addition to denying the request, the state further recommended that plans be initiated im-mediately for the con-struction of a central-ized facility to accomodate all students in grades 9-12 within the corporation. corporation. It was a recommendation of Richrecommendation of Rich-ard W. Morrison, direct-or of the division of school house planning, that it would be advis-able to incorporate the necessary provisions for the ultimate housing of orades 7 and 8 on the grades 7 and 8 on the central site. He said all existing facilities could be used except for the Talma building, which could "honorably be retired."

Refering to a land option that was made before the May referendum in order that people voting could know where a centralized high sch-ool could be located, the director further the director further noted, "We have on file Project No. 3356, dated April 1, 1968, which is a request for the pur-chase of a centralized site and the construct-ions of a 9-12 facility thereon. If you desire to activate this application, please notif us of your intentions. notify

The site is about two and one half miles south of Mentone on State Road 19 and is about 6¹/₂ miles north of Akron. It is situated on land owned by Max Nellans in Frank lin township.

the present time, are two bills, there there are two bills, House Bill 1469 and Sen-Bill 113, pending ate in the Indiana State Legislature, which pro-vides for a direct primary election for the selection of candidates for United States Sentor Governor and Lieutenant Governor and the other top state offices. At the present time, these public officials nominated by their Democrat respective Republican State and conventions. Indiana and Connecticut are the Indiana two states in the only union which do not pro-vide for nominations in the state conventions by direct primary for state offices. In Indiana, we hold a primary election to determine our preferance for President of the United States and select our candidates congressional, leg islative, county and municipal offices by direct primary. Howev-er, in the state officwe make an exception. es we make an exception. This exception allows for political power to be controlled by a few hands rather than by the people. The loyalty of the delegates are difthe delegates are dif-ficult to ascertain and when the people vote for them, they actually have knowledge for whom no thev are voting. Appro-tely twenty per cent ximately of the votes cast in the convention state

cast by proxies. Thus as the law now stands, the people have no real choice in the selection of their top no selection of their top state candidates.

Every day these words echo through the halls of justice across our land. Do you, as a cit-izen of the U.S.A., re-alize what freedoms are alize what freedoms are taken away if you are convicted of a felony? An Iowa judge points these out as he is talk-ing to a 16-year-old ing to felon:

you have no "Because previous conviction, I am permitted to give you parole...But if you never see the inside of a penitentiary, you will not have escaped the penalties of your crime." "The record of your conviction will be here as long as the court-house stands. No amount of good conduct in the future can erase it.... If you are ever called to witness in any court some lawyer will point some lawyer will point his finger at you and ask: 'Have you ever be-en convicted of a fel-ony?'...And the question will be asked for the purpose of casting doubt on your testimony. Convicted felons are not believed as readily as other persons."

"It may be that someday...you will apply for a passport. You will not get it...No country get will allow you to be come a resident."

Your world is. oh so much smaller than it was.

"Some day you may se-ek a position in the civil service...You will find the question: Have you ever been convicted of a felony? Your an-swer will bar you from examination."

"You may want to take position of trust where a surety bond is required. On the appli-cation will appear this question: Have you ever been constant question: Have you ever been convicted of a felony?"

ony?" "In a few years you will be 21 and others your age will have the right to vote, but you will not...You will be a citizen of your state and county, but you will have no voice in public affairs."

Your country is calling ling men to the colors. ..But the Army will never accept you, nor will the Navy...You may serve your country in a labor battalion perhaps, but never behind guns. Yours be the drudgery of but never the honwar. or that comes to a sol-dier."

"I am granting you a parole. A parole is in no sense a pardon. You will report to the men who have accepted your parole as often as they may ask. Your convermay ask. Your conven-ience is not a matter of importance. You wil answer fully and truth wi11 fully any question they may ask. Should they suggest that you refrain from going to certain places or with certain companions, you will from follow their suggestions and without grumbling. "You will also obe "You will also obey your parents...You will perform such tasks as are assigned to you. Your parole is a fragile



The last 16 have been a fascin-atingly varied lot as atingly varied lot as you will find when you read the book.

"Land of the Indians" Is Woman's Club Topic

"Land of the Indians" the was the topic of the talk delivered by author L. W. Shultz to mem-bers of the Akron Wo-man's Club last Thurs-

day. "Indiana ^Tndi is the land of the Indians with the Indian name carried to the capitol at Indiana-polis," he said.

polis," he said. He had a display of pictures, Indian arti-facts, maps and copies of books including re-prints of books by the late Otho Winger. These reprints included "The Frances Slocum Trail", "The Last of the Miamis" "Little Turtle," "Poto-vatomi Indians" and "the Lost Sister Among The Miamis." He commented that Lit-

He commented that Litne commented that Lit-tle Turtle, famous Ind-ian chief who was born in Whitley county, was the greatest Indian the greatest chief of ~ all Indians in try. Littlethe country.

Turtle belonged to the Miami tribe and won many battles for his people. When President George Washington sent General Anthony Wayne west he defeated the Indians across Ohio and more land of Greenville. Little Turtle advised against lurtle advised against attacking the forces of Wayne but would not leave his own people. Little Turtle was the last to sign the treaty and said he would be the last to break it.

Mr. Shultz gave each person a book, "More Indian Lore," by Lamb and Shultz and the con-tents were used as in a classroom. He showed pictures of Little Tur-tle, Tecumseh, Simon Potawatomi and Sacajawea an Indian woman who bean Indian woman who be-came known for her ser-vices as a guide for the Lewis-Clark expedition, described by Shultz as

one of the most important and dramatic explor-ation feats in American maps, ifacts, songs, maps, words, signs and mean

words, signs and meanings. Mr. Shultz presented many names that come from the Indians, such as the counties of Del-aware, Miami, Ohio, Wa-bash, Tippecanoe and the lakes of Michigan. Wi-nona, Manitou, Wawasee. Also, the rivers of Cal-umet, Kanapocomoco (Eel), Maumee, Mississinewa, Wabash. Ohio, etc. He Maumee, Mississinewa, Wabash, Ohio, etc. He also pointed out that, all Indian names have a meaning, such as Ship-shewanna, great beast; Mishawaka, trees and a reat beast; trees and a swamp, Coesse, old man, and Chicago, place of foul smell.





Farm Bureau Plans Feed Mill At Rochester

The Indiana Farm Bureau Co-Op this week announced a new feed installation to be constructed in Fulton county near Rochester.

The Co-Op holds an option on some 85 acres a mile and a half west of Rochester. The mill will be built on this site south of the Erie-Lackawanna Railroad line. The projected route of the U.S. 31 bypass is a quarter mile from the site.

Production capacity will be 50,000 tons a year, according to Joe Wise, manager of the Co-op's feed and poultry department. Using highly automated equipment and processes, only nine production e mp loyees will be able to produce

200 tons of feed in an eight-hour shift. The mill at Rochester is the latest in a series to be built by the Co-op. The installation will include a manufacturing building more than 160 feet tall, a warehouse 70 feet wide and 300 feet long, a service building, an office, and a laboratory for quality control.

Construction is expected to start this spring.



One week ago, a bill to "amend an act concerning school sites and build-ings by providing that when school corporations of enrollment of 2,000 or more pupils and area of 175 square miles and of 175 square miles and referendum of the people and board vote to have and boar two high schools that two high scnools unac-such project is auto-matically approved and the state tax commiss-ion shall approve ap-propriations for such propriations for such project without approval of any other board, agency or commission" was passed by the Indi-ana House. Marijuana Possession Is Costly

Indiana State Police what may prove to be an effective deterrant against unlawful use and possession of marijuana. Superintendent Robert

K. Konkle reported this week that Department researchers recently dis-covered a seldom-enforced section of the Inter

ed section of the Inter-nal Revenue Code of 1954 that was enacted by the U.S. Congress, entitled "Marijuana: Imposition of Tar on Transfers." Briefly, the portion of the code referred to rules that whenever mar-ijuana is transferred there is a tax due the Federal government of one dollar per ounce for Federal government of one dollar per ounce for persons who possess a valid Federal narcotics valid Federal narcotics tax stamp. The code states further that in a similar transaction by persons who do not have a narcotics tax stamp, an assessment of \$100 per ounce shall be levied by internal rev-enue authorities. Only druggists and doctors are permitted to pur-chase the narcotice chase the narcotics stamp.

Police crime State laboratory experts said that an average marijuathat an average mail jua-na cigarette has a to-bacco weight of about 1/20th of an ounce. Any measurable part of an ounce shall be consid-ered an ounce for taxing purposes, according to ered an ounce for taxing purposes, according to the wording of the code. Therefore, Konkle em-phasized, a person in possession of just one would, in addition to criminal penalties, be subject of payment of the \$100 tax.

State Police confer-ed at length with inred ternal revenue author-

ities to establish val-idity of the code and to set up procedures for reporting the identity of those persons appre-hended and charged with illegal possession of mari juana.

Mari juana. State and Federal Of-ficials added that of-fenders would, as usual, retain the right of ap-peal in the appropriate court.

Superintendent Konkle pointed out that the tax assessments will be lev-ied even in the case of juvenile offenders.

State Police plan soon to contact all oth-er Hoosier police agen-cies to explain the legal steps necessary in notifying the Internal Revenue Service when apprehensions are made.

TVSC Group Meets With Senators

Residents of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation attended a hearing held by members Indiana Senate of the education committee last education committee last Friday regarding HB 15-58. The bill, which re-cently passed the House, would permit the TVSC to add classrooms at the Akron high school and srooms at the sh school and Mentone high The board's at the Mentone high school. The board's request for approval of this plan was recently refused by Richard D. Wells, state superintenwells, state superinten-dent of public instruc-tion. The project was submitted after a refer-endum in May indicated a majority of the residents of the corporation favored maintaining two schools.

However, another group has been opposed to the referendum and its results.

Representatives of both sides met with the Senate committee Friday. Speaking for passage of the bill were Dr. D. J. VanGilder, Dr. O. L. McFadden and David Burmembers of the kett, membe TVSC board.

Speaking against the bill were Joe Boggs, Mentone, Larry Klein of Akron, Lawrence Castal-Akron, Lawrence Castal-di, Gale Creighton, a former school board mem-ber, and Richard Gosh-ert, a present school a ert. a present school board member.

The latter group used as a basis for their arguement item number 3 of the educational program envisioned and recommended in a compre-hensive plan for the re-organization of the organization of the school corporations of Kosciusko county that says one of the purposes of the reorganization of the reorganization is: That each corporat-ion provide a new high school located with due consideration of densi-ty of population, geo-graphical center, and natural barriers.

They say that since this was a part of the reorganization program voted for by 85% of the voters of Franklin, Har-rison, Seward and Henry rison, Seward and menuy townships (Newcastle en-tered the corporation later) there should be no question but that a consolidated high schocorporation ol should be built.

The group speaking for passage of the bill re-minded the committee of the referendum vote.

The senate committee took no action and it

is not known if members will meet again or when the bill will come up for vote in the Senate.
