TV sex discrimination charged

"Is physical education for boys more important than for girls?" Jean Roberts asked at Monday night's Tippecanoe Val-ley school board meet-

Stating her confidence in the school board was at low ebb because of the lack of physical education programs for girls and elementary girls and elementary students, she charged that \$11,000 is spent annually for coaches and teachers for boys' programs and only \$300 for girls. "Right now there is one girls' P.E. teacher at the high school and one who must divide her time between the Akner time between the Ak-ron and Mentone junior highs," she said. After reading a federal law regarding sex discrimin-ation, she charged, "No ation, she charged, "No one is doing anything to initiate a girls' program." program.

Mrs. Roberts' remarks came during the audience session, but the feeling they generated among spectators caused an ongoing discussion of the second going discussion after the gavel for adjourn-ment sounded two and one-half hours later. chief reason given for the lack was that the boys' programs had been in progress for a time but the girls' pro-grams could not be funded because of the tax



Fur Buying, a Paxton tradition

Hobart Paxton had enjoyed trapping and hunt-ing all his life. Fur buying was a family bus-iness that fitted his lifestyle perfectly.
"I guess there's been

lifestyle perfectly.
"I guess there's been
a fur buyer on this farm
for more than 70 years,"
he said in a January 25
interview at his home
northeast of Mentone.
"I took over the business in 1950, and my father had bought furs for 40 to 50 years before that," he reminisced. "One of my uncles used to buy furs in Mentone. It's just been a busi-ness we've always enjoy-

Although he was in failing health, he had continued to operate his business as usual with his wife and son Eddie

providing help. The last of the season's furs were yet in the fur shed, and he thought it had been a good year. "Last year wasn't bad, either," he said, reading from a notehook the ing from a notebook the number of skins he had number of skins he had bought: more than 6,000 muskrats, almost 1,000 racoons, more than 100 mink, 90 fox, 135 possums, 21 beavers, six weasels, a skunk, eleven deer hides.

Multiply that year times the twenty-five he had been buying furs the answer would

and the answer would make a lot of coats.

At one time there had been many fur buyers in the area, but now he was one of the last. "The business has changed," he said, remembering that when he started all the animals had to be that when he started all the animals had to be skinned and the furs stretched over wire frames. In later years his buyers had been willing to take whole willing to take whole animals, and he stretched only a few pelts, such as mink or skunk. The skinning racks outside the fur shed remained, the Eddie had become proficient at skinning and stretching.

skinning and stretching.
Prices, too, had changed, he said. "I used to pay \$30 or \$35 for a mink," he said, "but now six or seven dollars is about tops. There just isn't as much demand as there was." He said red isn't as much demand as there was," He said red fox brought the highest price-\$20-and seven dollars was top for racoon although they had been higher earlier in the season. The demand for the particular fur and its own quality control the price, the Paxtrol the price, the Pax-tons said, and Mrs. Pax-ton later showed the difference in the fur on some racoons. Some mangy, thin and tle; other animals was mangy, thin and birttle; other animals had thick, luxuriant coats. These commanded better prices.
"It's a good business." Hobart Paxton

"It's a good busi-ness." Hobart Paxton said. "I like buying furs."

furs."
But he was only to enjoy the business another three weeks. On February 9, a little over a week after trapping season ended and before the interview could be published, he was dead at 78.

It's too soon for Mrs. Paxton and Eddie to decide the future status of the fur buying business, but whatever their decision, trappers and hunters from all over northern Indiana will long remember Hobart Paxton and his penuine Paxton and his genuine interest in hunting, trapping and, most of all, furs.



Rochester Zebras Advanced To Finals In 1937

The 1936-37 Rochester Zebras won 18 of 20 games in the regular schedule, going to Butler Fieldhouse, Indianapolis, where they were defeated in the semi-final round of the state cham-pionship battle. They won the Winamac sectional, the Rochester regional, and the semifinal at Logansport but met defeat at the hands of a larger and more experienced Anderson in the first rounds of the finals at the Fieldhouse. Anderson then the Fieldnouse. Anderson then beat Huntingsburg in the final rounds to win the state cham-pionship. The championship game was the first that saw action by a Rochester team since 1928, according to the 1937 Manitou Ripples from which this information was obtained.



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



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

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

She got the lo-cations from 1876, 1883 and 1907 atlases, but numbers and not names of the schools were giv-en. We have not been able to find the names of a few schools. Can anyone help us identify them?

Henry Township: Three are unidentified. One was on northeast corner was on northeast corner of IN 14 and 700E about half mile east of Athens, built 1876-83. Another was on north side of 250S a quarter mile west of 800E near Sugar Grove, built before 1876, closed by 1883. The third was on northwest corner of 250S and 1275E about a mile south of IN 14 southeast of Akron, built before 1876.

ron, built before 1876, closed by 1883. Newcastle: Two are still unidentified. One was on south side of 550N half mile west of Fulton-Kosciusko county line, built before 1876, closed between 1883-1907. The other was on southeast corner of 400N and 800E a mile west of Fulton - Kosciusko line, before 1876, closed 1883 and 1907.
