Juggling a heavy schedule and playing many roles can be difficult at times but for rural Akron man, Frank R. Miller II, 29, a senior at Manchester College, North Man chester, IN, it should be especially difficult.

With a 16.5 credit hour load, on campus he is called a student. In his private life he is a husband and the father of three children. In his spare time he is a blacksmith and a horse trainer and assists a local basketball coach several hours

a week.
This friendly broad-shouldered man who has a ready smile handles the demands made of him quite well. With such a demanding schedule, Miller, who is majoring in secondary education in social studies, plans carefully to accomodate all of his roles. "I study two hours in the evening Monday through Thursday," he said. "Much of my studying is done on campus during blocks of time that I don't have classes. I set aside the weekend for family activities. I hardly do any studying on the weekend," Miller said. "I don't put 100 percent into being a student, " he pointed out.

Yet, he manages to maintain a 3.0 grade average.

Mitter graduated from high school in 1969 and for several years was a jack-of-all-trades. He tried asphalt construction, welding, grain eleva-tor operator and trucking. "But," he said, "I didn't want to work in a factory or be a laborer all my life. I wanted to direct and control my own life."

Consequently, in 1974 Miller decided to attend Grace College in Warsaw. The first year at Grace he worked full-time in addition to being a student. The second year at Grace he was a full-time student. Miller majored in business administration when he started at Grace. 'However," he said, "I gave that up for my first love--teaching. Since about the seventh grade it is some-

thing I wanted to do." An illness in the family prevented Miller from returning to Grace in 1977. In 1977, Miller returned to

college. This time he attended Manchester College as a full-time student.

As society has traditionally viewed the man as provider, it must be difficult for a man to discard this role and become a student. "It is harder for a man to return to school " Miller theorized "because of peer pressure and family pressure that says you can't quit work and go back."

He added that, "My self-image isn't related to what society feels or thinks a man should be. It is related to my relationships with my wife and family and the image I draw from within myself."

With his thought on self-image he expanded on the idea when he said, "Women should do what they have the capacity to attain. They don't need to be tied down to certain aspects of life and to what society and other people think."

A special burden is placed on the family when one spouse returns to school if the family has had two incomes. "Be prepared to live on less money and be willing to sacrifice and given up luxuries," he advised seriously.

As an older student Miller didn't think he was at a disadvantage. It the contrary, he stated, "I feel I have the advantage because of things I've done, work responsibility and knowing where I want to

go."
"For older students to get the most out of school they should develop a sense of what they need and get it," he philosophized. "I take what I want from class and gear it to my needs and where I will need it later." Being a commuter, though, does have its disadvantages for him Most of the time you don't know what is happening on campus," he lamented. "You are also limited in the activities you can be in because

Miller is, however, on the Com muter Steering Committee and the Athletic Committee on campus. Miller plans to coach in conjunction with teaching. In preparation for coaching he assists Tippecanoe Valley High School basketball

coach, Roland Fletcher, several hours a week.

In addition to his other responsibilities, Miller is a practicing black-smith and a horse trainer. "I decided I wanted to do horseshoeing," he explained, "when I had a horse that needed corrective shoeing and the man who usually did my shoe-ing couldn't do it." He attended farrier school in Texas.

He has trained horses profession-ally since he was 19. Miller keeps Appaloosa horses. "I enjoy their disposition, manner and style, he explained. He belongs to the National Appaloosa Horse Club and the Indiana Appaloosa Association. This past summer Miller served as show chairman for IAA. Miller and his wife, Linda, have three daughters, Stephanie, 10; Sara, 9; and Staci, 3.

The family travels to several horse shows during the summer. Miller and his daughters ride in competition and have won numerous ribbons and trophies.

Indiana House Bill 1214, which would require all individuals and museums in the state to turn over all Native American artifacts to the Secretary of State for dispursal to the individual tribes, by January 1st, 1982, should be defeated!

The bill would require that all persons in possession of remains of sacred objects of an American Indian must surrender them to the Sheriff for delivery to the Secretary of State for redelivery to the appropriate American Indian nation or organization. "Sacred object" means an item sacred to an American Indian and includes shells, pipes, medicine bags, necklaces, clothing, arrowheads, cutting tools, and other items buried with an American Indian.

He is a crewmember aboard the frigate USS Francis Hammond, operating from Yokosuka, Japan.

The ship completed its second cruise to the Arabian Sea this year, spending four months operating with the USS Midway carrier battle group, and earning the Battle Efficiency "E" Award for the second consecutive time. The carrier battle group conducted training operations to maintain a ready force in support of national objectives.

Enroute to Yokosuka, the Hammond rescued 85 South Vietnamese refugees, who had spent four days in the South China Sea and were nearly out of food and water. They were taken to Hong Kong where the Hammond's crew enjoyed a scheduled port call. Additional port visits were made in the Phillippines and Thailand.

The Francis Hammond is a 438foot long, "Knou" class frigate with a crew of 283. Equipped with guns, missiles and rockets, if can operate independently or as part of a naval task force.

A 1978 graduate of Warsaw Community High School, Harman joined the Navy in August 1978.





How to enter **Artist Show**

A change in the eligibility of many materials and media as well as a change in the jurying procedures are important to artists interested in entering the 68th Indiana Artists Show at the Indianapolis Museum of Art. This year's biennial competitive exhibition opens to the public Wednesday, Aug. 19, 1981, and continues through Sunday, Sept. 27.

Current work produced since 1979 by artists presently or formerly residents of Indiana may be entered. The change this year has been the expansion of eligible media to include mixed media. textiles, ceramics, metalwork, glass, wood, film, photography and video, as well as painting, sculpture and works on paper.

An additional important change in procedure streamlines the jurying process. Artists are asked to submit 2 x 2 photographic slides for a preliminary review, rather

than supplying the work itself. Each artist may submit up to five slides of five different works or various views of fewer works, up to a total of five slides. Deadline for the slide entries is Friday, May 15, 1981. Following the slide review, invitations will be sent to artists to enter the actual works of art the week of June 22-27 for final jurying.



The content of gold is determined by dividing the number of carats into 24. For example, 6 carats is one-quarter or 25% gold, and 12 carats is one-half or 50% gold. Other metals such as brass, copper and silver are added for strength and durability because gold, by itself, is not strong and long-wearing.

"The higher the gold content, naturally, the more expensive the item, but the less long-lasting it will be. A lower gold content will cost less and give better wear. All good quality gold jewelry will be marked with a number and the letter "K" denoting the amount of gold it contains. The most common are 10 carats, usually in men's gold jewelry, and 14 carats, general ly in women's gold jewelry

"Some jewelry will be marked with the letters "G-F." This means that it is gold-filled. In this jewelry the item has a core of some other metal with a layer of gold fused into it or melted onto it. Another designation is R-G-P, which stands for rolled gold plate. This means that gold plate is rolled on, applied to the other metal while liquid, or electroplated. If the item has 18 RGP on it, that means the gold applied to the base metal was 18 carats, not pure gold,'



SCHOOL BOARD MEETING

The Tippecanoe Valley High School chapter of Future Farmers of America has a long-term project to plant trees around the high school as funds become available. The plan was outlined for the Tippecanoe Valley School Board trustees at their meeting Monday evening at TVHS.

Craig Kantner, the son of Tippecanoe Valley FFA advisor Forrest Kantner, said the project will take five years or longer to plant all the trees. Also explaining the FFA plan were Keith Mc-Sherry, Randy Grass, Sam Hed-ington, Steve Foltz, Chuck Feldman and Keith Haney, president of the Valley FFA chapter. They will dig up seedlings in

the woods, and obtain other trees from Pike Lumber Company in Akron, and from the Indiana Department of Natural Resources. The students estimated the cost of the project will be \$2000 or \$400 per year. Since the school received \$712 for the corn crop planted and harvested by the FFA members on school property last year, the students asked the board members to allocate three-fourths of that money for the tree-planting

project. FFA members will pay one-fourth of the cost, and provide the energy needed to plant the trees.

Board members Con Shewman, Lee Norris, Don Snipes and Vernon Meredith gave their approval to the plan. Trustee Richard Long was not present at the meeting.

Superintendent Baxter Paige called the project a great opportunity for both the school and the students.

The Board approved the monthly payroll, claims and financial report. They also approved a request allowing TVHS principal Robert Myers to attend the North Central Association of Secondary Elementary Schools and Colleges Conference in Chicago, Ill. on Marc h 29, 30, 31 and April 1.

The principals at Akron, Mentone, Burket and Tippecanoe Valley High School gave their monthly reports to the board.

The trustees decided to begin charging a fee, for the first time in Tippecanoe Valley's history, for the driver education course. Students who enroll for driver education next summer will be charged a \$20 fee.

The Board members also approved a long-term disability insurance policy with Sunlife Assurances Company of Canada. The premium will cost the school corporation about \$575 a month, and it will cost each participating teacher \$1.00 per year.

The trustees designated the school's public depositories as the Akron Exchange State Bank and Farmer's State Bank in Mentone. A request from First Federal Savings and Loan Association, Rochester, was rejected because the firm is located outside the school district.

Children being enrolled in kindergarten classes in the Tippecanoe Valley school district must be five years old on or be-fore August 1. It was decided that no children will be tested prior to entering classes.

The trustees approved contracts for Marjorie Sanders, who will serve as a Mentone fifth grade teacher for the remainder of the year.; David Krieger, who will be the assistant varsity track coach; and James Yunker, who will serve as the track coach for Mentone Junior High School pupils.

The Board members also signed GED diploma for Donna Sue Peters McClelland, of Elwood.



Thirteen year old paperboy, Rodney Hudson, may well be the youngest businessman in

Rodney, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Hudson, Box 62 Akron, delivers the Rochester Sentinel to 48 locations in Akron. The route usually takes a half hour per day, six days a week. He started three years ago in August. "I was looking for a job to do and a paper route would bring me extra money. My mom talked to me about it, so I decided to be on."

"Jerry Kindig, Jr. showed me how to do it and taught me everything about it. Jerry was a paperboy and I took over his route. He wanted to give it up.

Other paper carriers in town include Mrs. Mounty who works at the school; and Billy Kline and Chuck Clawson. "All the rest of them are in the cars, you know, delivering out in the country." Rodney said.

Rod said his territory includes "the ones around town and up by the park and down by the 'Fluff' A lady brings the Sentinels to Akron from Rochester about 2:30 p.m. or sometimes as early as 1 p.m. The route usually takes one half hour, starting at 3:30 p.m. "I can do it faster when it's nicer out; I've done it in 15 minutes before."

When asked what he plans to do older, Rodney

replied "Well, Mom was asking me when I was gonna give it up and I don't really know. Because of sports in the summer, it's kind of buggy, because I had football practice after school. I wouldn't get home until 6:30 p.m. and stuff, Mom just wondered if I should give it up.

"My only complaint when I moved here was that very few houses were for sale, and the few that were - the prices were unreal!"


Wortinger lives in Mentone. "If you've ever been down to French Lick, you'll find Akron and Mentone are very

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

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



I look ahead until 2,000 A.D., preaching from 500 to 600 times a year. Writing all hours, day and night. Putting in from 15 to 18 hours a day. I have thousands of friends. I have loved everybody and have never been given a church that anyone else wanted. I never turn down a chance to preach and have let people know I am open to preach. I have loved people and God with my whole heart, never wanted anything but to preach and love the Lord.



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

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

MAURICE THOMPSON: A Talented Hoosier

Maurice Thompson was a successful soldier, civil engineer, naturalist, geologist, lawyer, legislator, poet, novelist, editor, and literary critic.

Born in Fairfield in 1844, he was the son of a prosperous Baptist minister. In 1853 the family migrated to northern Georgia, where they became plantation owners. Thompson was a scout in the Conferate army in the Civil War.

Returning to Crawfordsville in 1868, he became a civil engineer for the railroads. He later opened a law office and still later became a poet and a novelist.

He was appointed State Geologist of Indiana in 1885 and served until he resigned in December 1888.

"Alice of Old Vincennes," written about a year before he died in 1901, was his most successful literary effort.



New guidelines set for School Lunch Program effective March 2

Tippecanoe Valley schools have announced that due to the recent passage by the U.S. Congress of Public Law 96-499, a change has been ma'le in the current income poverty guidelines used to determine eligibility for free and reduced price meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals and milk served under the National School Lunch Program and Special Milk Program. The new guidelines and any adjusted benefits will be effective on March 2.

The new family size income criteria for determining eligibility is listed in the order of family or household size; free meals and free milk for annual, monthly and weekly incomes; and reduced price meals for annual, monthly and weekly incomes.

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals and free In addition, special hardship deductions have been disallowed for the remainder of this school year. For example, high medical bills, disaster or casualty losses, strikes, shelter cost, or special education expenses for children. In place of the special hardships provision, a standard deduction has been applied to the guidelines printed in the chart.

All applications currently on file in the Principals' offices will be re-examined against the new guidelines. Any family whose benefits under the program will be reduced or terminated due to the new guidelines will be notified in writing 10 days before the change goes into effect. Families which have not previously applied but may now be eligible to receive benefits under the new guidelines may apply to receive free or reduced price (20 cents) meals and free milk. Applications are available at the principal's office in each school.
