#### **fundraisers** Band Boosters plan **TVHS**

newly-organized canoe Band Boosters aren't wasting any time in planning events to raise funds to benefit the high school band. According to band director Kim Metcalf, the Band Boesters have two major projects scheduled to take place within the next five weeks.

The first of these is a dinner concert scheduled for Wednesday, Feb. 15 in the high school commons. This is a first for Tippe Valley, and Metcalf reported the dinner concert will see the pre-miere performance of the high school Jazz Band. Also featured during the dinner will be selecfrom the high school Auxiliary Corps., the Concert Band and assorted soloists.

A catered roast beef dinner will be served at the concert at a cost of \$7.50 per person. Attendance is by reservation only, and tickets may be obtained beginning Monday, Feb. 6 by calling either 893-4241 or 893-4713.

On March 10, high school band, auxiliary corps and eighth grade hand members will hold a pledge car wash, also sponsored by Band Boosters. Students will pledges for one cent a car for every car washed during that day, with a \$5 maximum from any one sponsor. (If 100 cars are washed during the day, a sponsor would pay \$1.) The car wash itself will be free of charge, and there will be four car wash sites. The location will be announced later.

Proceeds for the two fundraisers will pay for the remaining balance of the trip to the Shenandoah Apple Blossom Festival this spring. Band and Auxiliary Corps members and sponsors will travel to Winchester, Virginia to participate in concert, parade and field show competition between May 2

Other monies raised from the concert dinner and car wash will go toward the purchase of new band uniforms. Metcalf reported the order must be placed by mid-March if the uniforms will be received in time for next fall's marching competition. Total purchase price of the uniforms is \$20,000, and half that amount must accompany the order.

'This is the first major project undertaken by the Band Boosters," Metcalf explained. "I believe it will make a vast difference mentally for the kids as much as anything else.'

The uniforms, which will be in the school colors of green and gold, feature striped trousers and short, fitted jackets.

#### Without Partners" formed "Parents **Fulton county**

Plans are being made to form a Parents Without Partners (PWP) organization in Fulton County. At a recent meeting at Pat Prater's home in Akron, Lee Garringer, Parker City, District Manager for PWP, and Pat Heezen, Indianapolis, Regional Manager for PWP, presented a program for several area people.

PWP. Inc. is an international, non-profit and educational organization devoted to the welfare and interests of single parents and their children. It was started in New York State in March of 1957 and has chapters in every state, in Canada, and in Australia. PWP activities and programs are done through the volunteer work of its members.

Members stress that PWP is not a counseling or advisory body for legal, emotional, or financial matters. They have lectures and discussions in the general area of personal growth and transition to the single-parent status.

The club is unique in that it is made up strictly of single parents.

"Many people are leery of this because they have the group wrong idea about the values of the membership, but they may find that they probably run higher than those of most people," said Donna Hart, president of Logan-

"Most of the members are divorced, and because of that divorce, their scars run very deep.

These people feel as though their world has been swept away. They have lost their belief in all that they thought was important," Hart said.

The single parent in our society is isolated to some degree. The difficulties of providing both for ourselves and our children a reasonable equivalent of normal family life are increased by the isolation. The established pattern of communication and institutions to enable us to resolve our special problems, and find normal fulfillment.

Therefore, in the conviction that we can achieve this end through working together, through the exchange of ideas, and through the mutual understanding, help and companionship which we find with one another, we have established "Parents Without Partners, Inc." to further our common welfare and the well-being of our children.

Each single parent faces unique puzzle when bringing up their children alone or having to live apart from them. How to be mother and father...How to manage money... How to balance a career with family and social life...How to do all that alone.

Members of PWP have suffered through similar experiences, and through group discussions they

can receive understanding and support from fellow members. The group seems to be close knit. and the parents have equal opportunity to attend many PWP func-tions with their children. Their children have an opportunity to develop new friendships and ex-

Last week, Jan. 23-27 was proclaimed "Excellence In Education Week" by Governor Robert Orr. "Indiana has many thousands of dedicated and efficient teachers and administrators who are committed to helping children become the best they can

Harold H. Negley, State Superintendent of Public Instruction said "Excellence in Education Week" is an ideal time to highlight the importance of education to all Indiana citizens and salute those who give so much of themselves to their students, school and communities.

Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation should take heed to go previous statements. A negative light is beginning to shine his corporation. Every year it's the same thing: year-round states.

The teachers in the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation are beginning to lose their Valley pride and patience. They have worked since August 15, 1983 without a contract.

The teachers are asking for a wage increase in order to make their salaries comparable to teachers wages in surrounding areas. According to Indiana State Teachers Association (ISTA) research, the following salary comparisons were found:

The average percent of increase required to cause Tippe Valley to be comparable with the other 11 locals is 14.06 percent. The average dollar raise would be \$2,967, and the top masters salary would need to be \$24,075.

The Tippecanoe Valley Classroom Teachers Association is asking for a 12 percent increase on the current base with a 17 year maximum for Masters on a school year basis (August-May). The TV school board is offering the association a four percent in crease on the base

crease on the base.

According to Baxter Paige, Superintendent of the TVSC, by going with the proposal of the association a teacher at the top of the schedule could receive an increase of 18-20 percent.

The association is asking for 14 percent on the current base and the board is offering four percent on the base for extracurricular architistics alon.

ricular activities also.

and the board is oftering four percent on the base for extracurricular activities also.

The TVCTA is asking for the corporation to pay all but \$1 on the single and family insurance plans. Presently the TVSC pays all but \$1 on the single (\$557.60) and \$925 (just about half) toward the annual premium for the family plan. The family plan takes in the employee, spouse and any children under the age of 18.

The elementary teachers want school hours to be consistent corporation-wide. The elementary teachers are at school 20 minutes longer than their high school peers. But due to new state regulations, John Hill, principal at TVHS, stated at last week's school board meeting that the high school would have to add andditional 30 minutes to their day to meet the requirements.

The association has stated that they feel that there is a need for a grievance procedure in their contract. Out of the 304 school corporations in Indiana, only 34 do not have a grievance procedure the network of the school spells out the rules and regulations. "If we put a grievance procedure in the teacher's contract," he stated, "it would become a negotiable item. That would put the control of the school in the hands of the association." Presently the "control" of the school is in the hands of the school board. "The school board runs the school," said Paige.

Another item of concern was dealing with due process. The

Another item of concern was dealing with due process. The association feels that they should have language in their contract to set guidelines for the board to prove just cause in firing teachers. Paige said he feels this isn't necessary because they are covered in this area by the law.

The last item discussed was Reduction in Force (RIF). This deals with the laying-off of personnel. The association wants language in their contracts based on certification and seniority. When asked about this issue, Paige said he doesn't have to discuss it due to the fact it is not mandated in Public Law 217.

Included and/or in addition to the above figures, this department also conducted 52 Criminal and 41 non-criminal case investigations.

During the eyar, the Police Department applied for and received a Federal Grant through the Indiana Dept. of Highways for the purchase of a camera and highway safety equipment. Deputy Marshal Spangle attended the first week of a three week photography course at the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy on the use this equipment. Marshal Kruger then attended the first two weeks of the three week Accident Investigation course at the Academy. It is anticipated that the two officers will complete their courses in 1984, since class quotas were not available in 1983.


In addition to the above mentioned formal training at the Law Enforcement Academy, one or both officers have attended several seminars conducted by the Indiana State Police and Federal Bureau of Investigation on topics ranging from revised accident reporting procedures to crime scene photography, fingerprint lifting and classification, and investiga

tion/interrogation techniques. We both attended a symposium conducted by the Indiana Prosecutors Association changes in the State Criminal and Motor Vehicle Codes. I feel it is worthy of the Board's note that at most of these seminars/symposia, this Department was the only one representing Fulton County. This is indicative of the importance we place on training to improve the professionalism of the Police Department to better serve people of Akron.

Furthermore, Deputy Marshal Spangle has just completed the Basic EMT course and is awaiting the results of the State examination. His successful completion will place a certified EMT at the scene of all accidents, fires or other emergencies occurring within the Town prior to the arrival of the Ambulance. With both Officers being EMTs, we can provide one more needed service to the town, especially since the Police Department is quite often the first emergency unit notified.

# Mentone trustees hear cable-TV pitch

Town board members Jim Miller, Wayne Tombaugh and Miriam Boardman received a cable television pitch from Mayer Singerman, Park Forest, IL, at their Monday, Feb. 6 meeting. Singerman, a representative of Dowden Communications of Illinois, Inc., outlined a basic proposal his company offers to small communities.

In addition to offering all South Bend stations already received on television (as per federal requirements), Dowden Communications would offer at least six channels received by satellite. Among the channels Singerman suggested would be of most interest to local viewers were a 24-hour sports network, MTV, Cable News (a 24-hour news network), and "super stations" WTGN-TV and WTBS.

Singerman was not able to make a definite proposal, as no local survey has been taken to ascertain interest in a cable system. Cost of the system would cover the basic package, and possibly HBO would be offered for an additional fee.

Board members voted to hire Rodney Holloway to fill the position of water superintendent, retroactive to January 1 this year. Holloway will receive an annual salary of \$11,500. He replaces Steve Shand, who resigned in January.

Trustees unanimously agreed on the appointees to the 1984 Zoning Board of Appeals and the 1984 Plan Commission. Appointed

to the Zoning Board were: Forrest Kantner, four years; Joe Good, four years; Kenneth Romine, three years; Charlie Smith, two years; and Jerry Smith, one year. Appointed to the Plan Commission were: the three town board members, four years each; Eldon Horn, three years; Willard Wagner, two years; and Wayne Bowser, one year.

President Miller suggested a number of changes to be gradu-

ally implemented by the board, and Boardman and Tombaugh were usually in agreement. Among those changes:

-The telephone at the water plant will be removed. According to clerk-treasurer Kate Whetstone, cost of the phone runs approximately \$588 annually. Although Holloway and Marshal John Hart felt it would be an inconvenience, trustees were unanimous in their decision.

--Board members voted to replace a section of water line behind J & J Sales and The Pizza Place. The 105 foot section has been repaired five times in three years and still has leaks. Trustees decided to use galvanized pipe in the replacement.

--Trustees decided to add two street lights along SR 19 S. There are no lights at the south end of

# TVHS band students discuss spring festival

The students sat together, seriously considering their answers before they spoke. When the answers came, they were unanimous in opinion.

'I think we can do it," Tana Tinkey, senior, confidently as-

Freshman Tony Crill agreed.

"I'm ready to go. President of the band executive council, senior Laura Cochran, stated firmly, "It's a good idea. The seniors are going to have a chance this way to see what will be happening next year. I'm excited about it."

Jennifer Sriver, senior, secre-

council, summed up the students' feelings by saying, "It was unanimous.

The students were discussing their recent decision to participate in three out of four competition events during the Shenandoah Apple Blossom Festival to be held at Winchester, Virginia this spring. According to TVHS band director Kim Metcalf, most of the competing bands will participate in one or two events at most, because to compete in three could be grueling work.

"There are four kinds competition," he explained, "and the bands can compete in any or all of them. In each event, if you place in the top three, you re-ceive points. The band with the most points at the end of the festival wins the "Sweepstakes"

The Valley band will compete in concert, parade and field show competition. The fourth competition of the festival is jazz, and Valley is only now organizing its first jazz band. Metcalf stressed, however, that it will be difficult enough getting three types of

'One of the biggest problems in field show competition," Metcalf continued, "is that we cannot use the field show we used to place tenth in the State finals last fall. We have to use next year's show. By the time we receive our arrangements, we'll only have about one month to prepare the

"In the middle of this, we also must prepare for the State concert band contest, which will take place April 14."

The band members were given the opportunity to use the democratic process in making this decision. In fact, Metcalf was so democratic he had the students vote three days in a row as to whether they wanted to make the extra effort needed to participate in the field show competition. He confirmed the students unanimously agreed to try it.

"In the past, we've concen-trated on the marching band in the summer and fall, and the concert band the rest of the year. Realistically, your strong competitive field bands spend a lot more time on field band. With this decision (on the part of the students), we've decided to compete with the big guys, I guess."

Students and sponsors travel to Virginia on May 2 and return May 6. Itinerary for the trip will be: leave Wednesday, May 2 at 6 p.m. and drive straight through to Washington. On Thursday morning, May 3, the band will compete in concert band. On Thursday afternoon, they'll travel to Washington, D.C. for sightseeing, and on Thursday evening they'll take the Illumination Tour of the city.

On Friday, May 4, students will visit the White House, the Capital Building, the FBI and Ford's Theatre. After an afternoon rehearsal, they'll attend a dinner theatre that evening.

Saturday morning, May they'll compete in preliminary field show competition, and in the afternoon they'll appear in competition in the 'Grand Feature Parade." If they make the finals in field show, they'll compete again on Saturday evening before boarding the bus and returning

Metcalf recently spent some time in Washington on a scouting trip to plan the itinerary. Group will stay at Falls Church Inn in a suburb outside Washington, D.C.

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

## Acreage reduction signup ends on February 24

Now that the acreage reduction sign-up period is underway, Steve Rodenberg, Director of th Fulton County ASCS Office, advises farmers to seriously consider program benefits. The signup ends February 24.

Rodenberg said, "The acreage reduction program enables all farmers to work together to help control stocks and improve crop prices by reducing production. At the same time, it protects them from economic disasters.'

Farm program participants who wheat acres by 30 percent will be eligible for target price protection at \$4.45 bushel, price support loans at \$3.30 per bushel and the option to reduce their acreage an additional 10 to 20 percent for payment-inkind at 75 percent of their yield.

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The 10 percent feed grain acreage reduction program offers farmers target prices of \$3.03 per bushel for corn, \$2.88 for grain sorghum, \$2.60 for barley and \$1.60 for oats. Program participants also will be eligible for loan rates of \$2.55 a bushel for corn, \$2.42 for sorghum, \$2.08 for barley and \$1.31 per bushel for oats.

# Lois Baldwin publishes "Grandmas Berry Patch"

Lois Baldwin, Rochester, has accomplished a dream: she has published a cookbook entitled, "Grandma's Berry Patch." The book is different from other cookbooks in that it focuses on wild foods found in Indiana along creek banks and roadsides.

The 186-page book is for sale by the Fulton County Historical Society, of which Lois and her husband Bill have been members for seven years. Each year the Baldwins make lye soap at the Trail of Courage Rendezvous, a living-history festival put on by FCHS the third weekend of September.

Recipes include acorn bread, persimmon pudding, baked Indian pudding, sumac tea, turtle stew, wild rice with wood chuck, violet jelly, may apple jam, milk weed casserole, dandelion wine, and much more, even homemade soap.

Many of the recipes were handed down in Lois' family from her mother, Della Heeter, Delong. These include favorite recipes such as waffles, upside-down cake, and oatmeal cookies. Other recipes were lent by friends and relatives, developed by Lois, or were gathered by her while camping at State and National Parks. Whenever there was a Nature Program, the Baldwins attended.

The book was a family project with art work by her children: Wilma Melchiorre, San Ramon, Calif., Bill Baldwin Jr., and Roxie Smith, South Bend. Photos were taken by the author's husband. Instead of type, the book is hand-printed by the author, which gives it an antique appearance.

Besides 162 pages of recipes and photos, the book contains Indian legends such as the Locust Tree Legend and the Willow Legend. # Public Service cuts work hours

Public Service Indiana said it will cut working hours beginning Monday for nearly 600 workers because of its critical financial condition.

In most cases, the cuts will result in a four-day work week. The reduced work hours will be in effect for at least six months, while at some company locations, the reduction will last indefinitely.

We are taking this action because our construction spending has been reduced dramatically," noted PSI's Senior Vice President, Customer Operations Willard Twyman. But since we're already at minimum manning levels in our customer service organization, we felt we couldn't reduce our work force any further and still provide reliable service to our customers.

He said resorting to the alternative of reduced working hours would help ensure that the company had enough employees ready to respond to emergency situations and to provide for increasing requests for new services brought on by the economic recovery.

The reduced working hours will affect 573 of the company's union and other hourly workers at various locations in its 69-county service area whose jobs had some connection with the construction of electrical facilities.

## William Rogers resigns from TVSC board

times-tense meeting of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation board last Monday evening, Feb. 20. Superintendent Baxter Paige surprised the audience by reading a letter of resignation from absent board member William Rogers

In the letter, Rogers stated he was resigning due to "problems

The resignaimmediately. tion was effective Paige recommended the trustees accept Rogers' resignation, stating, "because that's what Mr. Rogers wants." Trustees Richard Long, Fred McSherry, Cecil Miller and Jim Royer voted to accept the resignation

Earlier in the evening, the trustees were greeted by the sight

of approximately 40 pickets stationed outside the administration building as they arrived for the meeting. Members of the Tippecanoe Valley Classroom Teachers Association (TVCTA) staged the protest after rejecting the latest contract offer of the board last Thursday, Feb. 16. During the audience portion of the meeting, president Bernadean Howard stated the CTA was disappointed they didn't receive a contract and they hoped the board would get back to the negotiating table as soon as possible. Teacher Betty Martens, CTA secretary, also voiced displeasure over the fact the board membes wouldn't move the meeting to a larger room, forcing many of those present to stand or sit on the floor.

Paige presented two proposed calendars for the 1984 - 85 school year to the board. The two cal endars, one submitted by the CTA and the other prepared by Paige, had only minor differences. The administration's calendar calls for school to begin on Friday, Aug. 24 for all students, while the teachers recommended school for students begin Tuesday, Aug. 28. Paige suggested an abbreviated Christmas holiday, beginning December 21 with school resuming. on January 2, while the teachers preferred a holiday break from December 21 through January 7. The recommended end of school would be May 24 and May 31, respectively.

Paige stated his recommendations were based on a recent poll conducted among approximately 370 parents, 43 teachers, and 382 high school students.

Martens raised some questions

end of both first and second semesters from the calendar proposed by administration. She stressed teachers need that time to make Paige repermanent records. sponded by stating the half days. under new guidelines of the State. created scheduling problems and extra transportation costs.

Trustee Rover moved to table the issue until next month.

TVHS principal John Hill pre sented a proposal to the board of changes which would meet new State requirements for high school class time and graduation credits. Under the new requirements. TVHS needs to extend its school day by at least 30 minutes, and Hill requested permission switch to a seven-period day instead of the current six periods.

His proposal included having two periods daily of 56 minutes in length, while the other periods would be 51 minutes. At the end of the week, the students would have 35 "extra" minutes above State requirements. Hill explained, and this time could be used for club activities or pep rallies.

A major benefit of adding an extra period, according to, Hill, is that students could easily meet the stiffer State graduation requirements. Students in the graduating class of 1988 will be required to have four years of English and two years each of math and science. This year's seniors need have only two majors and two minors, with a total of 32 credits needed for graudation.

Hill recommended that by 1988. Valley students be required to have 42 credits to receive a TVHS

After some discussion, trustees voted to give Hill a "vote of confidence" on the sevenperiod school day, so he could proceed with scheduling for the 1984 - 85 school year.

In other business: Trustees voted to transfer \$11,500 from Cumulative Building Fund 25,000 to Support Services Fund.

Board members approved a request by Hill to attend the North Central Association annual meeting in Chicago March 25 - 28.

'Swans mate for life.'' said Mr. Coffing. "Once they have found a mate they will no longer have an



## Indiana author explores "golden age of ragtime"

The Indiana Historical Society has awarded a grant to John Edward Hasse to research and compile a book containing the best works from Indiana's golden age of ragtime.

The society has taken a lead in documenting state musical history. "We believe this book will be an important contribution to the preservation of Indiana's rich musical heritage," says Raymond L. Shoemaker, assistant executive secretary of the Indiana History Society.

Indiana was an important center for ragtime music, but most of the music is long out of print and diffifult to locate. This book will restore to print approximately sixty pieces in their original sheetmusic editions, complete with full-page covers. The book also will include historical and biographical notes, photographs, a bibliography and a discography.

Project director Hasse is solici-

ting cooperation from sheet music collectors throughout the United States. "The success of this project," he says, "will depend on the goodwill and help of collectors throughout the Indiana and across the country. We are seeking to borrow, buy, copy, or acquire as donations several dozen 'lost' ragtime works from Indiana. We are also seeking photographs and biographical information, especially of Mark Janza and Sophus Jergensen."

Individuals who offer assistance will be acknowledged in the book.

Hasse holds a Ph.D. in American music from Indiana University. He is editor of Ragtime: It's History, Composers, and Music, to be published by Macmillan Publishing Company, and co-producer of Indiana Ragtime: A Documentary Album, published by the Indiana Historical Society in 1981. The fire started in the kitchen area and rapidly spread throughout the house, Assistant Chief Sells commented.

Fire officials have not determined the cause of the blaze yet. However, they will most likely return to the scene and look through the debris in an effort to determine the cause, Sells commented.

While firemen were at the scene, Shepherd returned home only to find that his residence had been gutted by fire. He told fire officials he had left shortly before 6 p.m.

Silver Lake firemen remained at the scene four hours, returning to to the station at 11:30 p.m. Friday.

## **Letters To The Editor**

The budget recently presented to Congress by the President proposes the continuation of near record levels of deficit spending by the federal government. If one listens carefully to the noise of reaction to these proposals, it sounds like little kids arguing on the school playground: "Do huge deficits by the federal government really matter? Yes, they do! No, they don't!"

Why should we worry about the inability of the government to balance its spending and receipts? After all, in the 34 years since 1950 we have had a budget surplus in only five years. Federal deficits have become a way of life. However, there is a new ingredient. The huge size of the recent past and expected future deficits are in uncharted waters for peacetime. Frankly, no one has ironclad answers for how such deficits will affect economic well-being.

There are two possible results of such huge deficit spending that most economists agree on -- and neither is good. First, there is an alternative that the authority responsible for controlling Federal money supply, the Reserve Board, will simply create enough new money to finance the deficit. This is called "monetizing the debt." This was the practice largely followed during the 1970s. Most agree this was a major cause of the record peacetime level of inflation during those years, which led to this decade's rising interest rates, slowdown in economic growth and rising unemployment.

In the second alternative, the Federal Reserve authorities do not create the extra money to bring inflation under control. This means federal debt securities would have to be sold to private investors which can then bring on what is called the "crowding out" process. The amount of available domestic loanable funds limited. In fact, many view the low level of savings in our economy as a very serious problem. The Federal government, in order to obtain these savings to finance its debt, will bid up the interest rates. These higher money costs will cause private businesses to reduced investments needed to create jobs and increase efficiency.

Currently there is an escape valve from this problem. Foreigners, finding returns from our high interest rates attractive, are buying large amounts of our federal debt. However, they must buy the dollars needed to buy these bonds. This activity helps drive the foreign value of the dollar up which has two consequences. One, it makes imports into this country unrealistically cheap to domestic buyers and, two, it makes exports from this country unrealistically expensive to foreign buyers. This hurts businesses which must compete with cheap products and it also hurts businesses which depend heavily on foreign sales. feared the result will again be high interest rates, a slowdown in economic growth and high unern-

ployment

But, you might ask, aren't these two dismal possibilities just another example of economists crying "wolf?" After all, we are

having a business recovery and the deficits have been huge. This is true. But it is also tre we in true. But it is also true we're in uncharted economic territory. All we know about the history and functioning of our economy indicates huge peacetime deficits will have unsatisfactory consequences. Just because the wolf has not yet attacked doesn't mean it's not lurking in the economic forest and eventually will attack the economic Red Riding Hood.

We must assume that the path of fiscal irresponsibility we're treading will damage our economic health. Huge deficits do matter! It is time to lay that debate to rest. Attention should be focused sharply on what to do to bring the deficit down -- not just a few billion, but sharply and soon.

Many are suggesting that no such actions can be taken in an election year. Like Scarlet O'Hara, we'll think about the problem later! Recent events in the stock market indicate that people who save and invest are worried. Delay in handling the deficit problem could turn our current recovery into another recession. Playing "politics as usual" with the deficit time bomb is a dangerous game.

# Akron board plans clean-up



### PSI in financial crisis

Public Service Indiana Chairman Hugh A. Barker testified before the State Public Service Commission that the company is in the midst of a financial crisis.
"Without emergency rate relief," Barker said, "the company will be out of cash in a matter of weeks. Our cash shortage will amount to \$89 million by April. By June, our bill swill exceed available cash by \$120 million. Unless we receive this rate increase, there's no way we can raise the money to pay these bills."

Barker pointed out that the company's suppliers of coal, wire, poles and all the other material used to generate and distribute electricity expect to be paid. "So the people and institutions who've lent us money over gthe

years." Barker said. people are not aware cost-cutting we've done in the last eighteen months. Cutting our staffing in areas not associated with the Nuclear division by 14 percent below peak levels is just the most visible step." Further cost cuts, Barker pointed out, would have a negative impact on service without raising enough cash to pay the company's bills. "So without price increases," he said, "we'll have no choice but to seek legal protection from our credithog

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"The consequences of such a step are just as serious for customers as they are for the company," Barker said. "Our ability to provide adequate electric service would quickly deteriorate.

With the cost of inflation, financing, government regula-tions, cost of fuel, and with neighboring utilities foreseeing financing. growth in their service areas, they no longer wish to sell power. NIPSCO therefore must build their own generating stations for additional power and in the future will have to replace some that have been in service many years. The most recent generating station built cost \$611 million and of that pollution control devices the total cost.

The cost of money, the cost of regulation, and the cost of fuel are the primary factors affecting electric and gas rates. 40% of the electric bill is due to the cost of coal, while 80% of the gas bill is has been imported from Western states with the cost of transportation amounting to 40% of the cost. With the addition of scrubbers in the new generating station, high sulfur coal from Indiana mines can be used.



### U.S. Dept. of Agriculture

U.S. Department of Agriculture animal health officials are encouraged by developments in the nationwide program to control and wipe out cattle brucellosis.

The current total of 6,434 quarantined herds, reported at the end of December, is the lowest ever recorded, and down by more than 800 from a year earlier. Last year's 0.37 percent infection rate in market cattle tested was down from 0.41 percent in 1982.

The market cattle infection rate for the three-month period ending Jan. 1 was 0.28 percent, although usually a period of low incidence, down by a full tenth of one percent from the same period a year earlier.

"Hard work is beginning to pay off," said Bert Hawkins, administrator of USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service. "But I urge state-federal animal health officials and their livestock industry cooperators not to relax.

"Brucellosis is an insidious disease. It has taken us 10 to 12 years to recover from a resurgence of infection that occurred in the early 1970's. We don't want to be in that position again," Hawkins said.

Fifteen states and the U.S. Virgin Islands are classified brucellosis free, meaning no known infected herds for a year or longer. Five states have been added since a new, tougher rating system began in May 1982.

The free states are: Alaska Connecticut, Delaware, Hawaii, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, New Hampshire, New York, North Dakota, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Utah and Vermont.

Two staes, Montana Wyoming, have both free and class A areas.

Twenty states, rated class A, have low herd infection rates at 0.25 percent or less. Three of these states have no known infection and could qualify as free within a few months.

### Mortgage deduction guidelines

Persons eligible for the following deductions will need to apply this year between March 1 to May 10, 1984: Mortgage deduction; Over age 65 deduction; Blind deduction and total disability; Disable veteran deduction; Surviving spouse of W.W.l. veteran deduction; and W.W. I Veteran deduc-

Mortgage Exemption: 1. Must be resident of this state.

2. Mortgage must be recorded. 3. Contract buyers must have the contract or memorandum of contract recorded.

Maximum deduction allowed is the lesser of \$1,000 or the amount of the Mortgage as of March 1, 1984. No deduction shall allowed greater than one-half (1/2) of such assessed valuation of real estate. Filing fees is \$1.

Affadavit of Person 65 Years of Age or More: 1. Must be a resident of the County and reside in the premises for which the deduction is claimed. (Absence from such premises while in a nursing home or hospital will not prevent such person from being entitled to such deduction.)

2. 65 years of age on or before December 31, 1983. Surviving

spouse must be at least 60 years of age on or before December 31, 1983 and the deceased was at least 65 years of age at the time of his/her death and the surviving spouse has not remarried.

3. Combined adjusted gross income is \$10,000 or less. This means that Social Security is not included.

4. The Individual has owned the real property or mobile home for at least one (1) year before claiming the deduction.

If you filed in 1982 or 1983 and have not moved or changed your mortgage the deduction will carry forward without refiling. If you have any questions, please contact the Auditor's Office, 223-2912.



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

### Burger's Warning

Chief Justice Warren Burger has sounded a timely, prophetic warning to the legal profession-at the right place.

Speaking before the American Bar Association in Las Vegas, Burger bluntly warned the na-tion's lawyers they had become overly fascinated with the adversarial aspect of their profession.

The Chief Justice went further. He said this overemphasis on the adversarial relationship, and on courtroom battles, must give way to overdue reform. Trials by adversarial contest must in time, "go the way of the ancient trial by battle and

Burger criticized today's law-yers for bringing too many frivolous lawsuits, thereby losing the public's confidence. (Polls show the legal profession ranks among the lowest of all the professions in public esteem.)
