AKRON MILL BURNS: An early morning blaze completely destroyed the main building of the Akron Feed and Grain Company in a blaze Monday morning. Fireman from Akron, Mentone, Rochester, Burket and Silver Lake controlled the blaze, containing it in the three-story structure which has been a land mark in Akron for over 100 years. The blaze was reported at approximately 5:30 a.m. by an employee of the Akron Foundry, who spotted it on the way to work. The mill, located on So. West Street, was a complete loss. Firemen saved the adjoining buildings, an auto parts store to the north of the structure, and a lumber building to the east. The building was owned by Shannon Buck of Rt. 1, Akron. Tony Feldman dies of injuries sustained in car-truck crash

James A. "Tony" Feldman, 19, of Rt. 2, Akron, died Wednesday, January 30, 1985 of injuries sustained in a two-vehicle accident on Friday, Jan. 18, on St. Rd. 114, East of Akron.

Feldman apparently lost control of his auto on the ice and snow covered road and struck a pickup truck driven by Mark A. Milam, 20, Rt. 1, Silver Lake. Feldman died of internal injuries at South Bend's St. Joseph Medical Center at 11:30 a.m. Wednesday.

Milam who suffered from facial lacerations and injuries had been transferred from Woodlawn Hospital to Fort Wayne's St. Joseph's Hospital. He was released from that hospital on Jan. 20.

Heisler contacted the county police so Norfolk and Western could be contacted but the call was too late as the engineer could not stop the train in time to avoid a collision.


loaded semi-tractor trailer, completely destroying it, and sustaining extensive damage to two engines of the train. Two sections of railroad tracks were badly damaged also.





Claypool man dies in van explosion

A possible leak in a propane gas line inside a van is believed to be the reason for an explosion which killed David C. Boston, 33, R. 1. Claypool early Tuesday morning. January 29.

Boston, a delivery man for Snap-On-Tools was pre paring to leave early Tuesday morning on his route to businesses in the Fulton County area.

The explosion, located at Co. Rd. 800 South, onefourth mile east of County Rd. 1000 West, about one mile south of Sevastopol, occurred at 5:48 a.m., scattered debris over 100 yards from the truck and shattered the windows, causing extensive damage to the family's trailer home which was located 70 feet from the explosion. Damage was estimated at over \$100,000.

Boston's wife and two daughters, sleeping at the time, were not injured.



"The purpose of the program is to adjust the monthly due date for retired customers on fixed incomes, and alleviate any hardship caused by the bill's due date preceding the receipt of the monthly Social Security check," said Jack W. Stine, NIPSCO vice president of Division Operations.

He said "This plan should help these customers in their household budgeting and avoid deferred payment charges on their utility bills.

Stine said the program will be offered to retired customers 60 years of age and older, who receive Social Security benefits and who have a NIPSCO account in their name, and whose utility bill payment falls due between (and including) the 21st of the month and 4th of the following month.

Customers can apply at any NIPSCO customer service office, he said. Proof of age is necessary as well as a service address and NIPSCO account number (found on the bill). A customer can apply by mail by sending copies of the

information listed above as well as a telephone number.







State panel works on return of abandoned rail lands

Editors Note: Interest is high at the local level in the following article, taken from the Indianapolis Star recently, about the work being done to return the abondoned railroad rights of way ownership to adjoining landowners. Several local people have filed a suit in the Knox court system for clear title to the lands adjoining their properties. No trial date has een set at the present time. A state legislative committee Wednesday unani-mously recommended passage of a bill that would streamline the process of returning ownership of abandoned railroad rights of way to adjoining landowners.

It also would make government agencies that acquire abandoned railroad property liable for damages caused to adjoining property by persons using the public land.

A vote on the bill was delayed last week to remove objections of railroads and the Indiana Department of Highways. An amended version exempts the highway department from liability.

The amended version also eliminated a section that spelled out the process by which railroads could sell abondoned land that they had purchased.

Supported by farm organizations, the bill would make governmental agencies responsible for weed control. maintenance of fences and drainage of the abandoned property they had acquired. Also, owners of adjoining land would not be liable for damages or injuries suffered by any person who trespassed directly or indirectly from former rights of way onto their land.

This section was included in the bill to protect landowners from trespassers who legally many be using rail property acquired by such agencies as the Indiana Department of Natural Resources for hiking, bicyling and snowmobiling.

Thursday saw snow emergencies declared again to keep people off the roads for emergency vehicles, but little snow fell.

County police were called to investigate several vehicles in ditches and reported several fender-benders, but no serious accidents were reported. Many people who made it to work tast week, spent several nights sleeping in different quarters, but most people were safe and warm. Blowing snows continued Thursday morning cutting visibility to zero for travelers who were brave enough to try, although early in the morning, the one lane roads were snowed under again and people were asted to stay off the roads to road crews could continue their work. 
Snowmobilers were busy making deliveries of groceries







With this in mind, we proclaim 1985 as Fulton County's sesquicentennial year, and invite all inhabitants to help with the celebration and planning for the future.


We officially adopt the design drawn by Martha Powell Carparell, a descendent of Chief Aubbeenaubbee, as Fulton County's sesquicentennial emblem.

On the left, representing 1835, it shows the Potawatomi Indian and his wigwam and the campfire with three logs (official emblem of the Citizen Bank Potawatomi of Oklahoma, whose ancestors were removed from here on the Trail of Death in 1838).

On the right side it shows the present Fulton County Courthouse, the symbol of the white man's system of government and a beautiful example of architecture. The tree in the middle represents growth firmly rooted in the past. As a tree needs big strong roots to withstand the winds of misfortune, so we need family roots and community ties to keep us from being knocked over by hard times and temporary problems

The tree symbolizes also the raising of crops and reminds us how important farming is to our county, a predominantly rural community.One of our major crops is corn, which the Indians showed the early settlers how to plant.

May God continue to bless Fulton County and help us to be kind to our fellow man, to strive to be the best that we can be, and make good decisions that will cause our county to be a better place in the future.

If a scuba diver is being treated for root canal therapy which is temporized partially with cotton and he goes diving, complications can result - and most probably will. In diving, the atmospheric pressure changes. In fact, the pressure increases tremendously with each foot you descend. When air is trapped within when the diver surfaces resulting in a whopper of a toothache.

Even a filling which may have an air pocket can cause the diver problems on descent. The pressure is decreased (relative to the outside pressure of the water) and the air pocket is compressed. This could cause pain - and even result in an imploded tooth. In either case, the diver is going to need a dentist in a hurry. In the midst of the flu season, important new information has become available about the development -- in illnesses are self-limiting and teens and children with flu-of Reye syndrome, a rare but serious condition that kills 20 to 30 percent of its young victims and leaves many survivors brain-damaged.

The new information comes from a U.S. Public Health Service pilot study of a possible link seen in four earlier state studies between the use of aspirin in treating flu or chicken pox and an increased risk of Reye syndrome.

The Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences has reviewed the pilot study and found 'strong support' for the link.

Although personnel from the Food and Drug Administration, the National Institutes of Health and the Centers for Disease Control will continue the study through next winter, the Institute of Medicine advised that the federal government not wait to inform and protect the public.

As a result, Health and Human Services Secretary Margaret M. Heckler has asked manufacturers to remove any recommended use in flu and chicken pox from aspirin-containing products aimed at children -- and to add a warning to all aspirincontaining products against use for flu and chicken pox in children and teens.

The pilot study looked at the histories of drug treatments and other factors of 29 young people who got Reye syndrome last year. Use of aspirin for flu or chicken pox thread was the common shown in 28 of the 29 (whereas ordinarily less than half the young people with flu or chicken pox would be expected to take aspirin.)

U.S. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop, M.D., has said that most childhood usually don't require any medication at all. Doctors often suggest that a child with fever simply be made comfortable with cool compresses.

Of course, physicians continue to find aspirin useful and safe for adult, teen and childhood arthritis and other conditions.

Reye syndrome is a rare condition -- a few hundred cases a year. It was named in 1963 for an Australian pathologist who described it as a swelling of the brain, combined with liver malfunction and blood chemistry disorders leading in most cases to death.

Improved recognition and early treatment of the discase has helped reduce the death rate, but still about one out of four reported cases are fatal.

It is crucial to take action quickly if Reye's symptoms occur -- whether or not aspirin or an aspirin-containing product has been used. The first sign is generally persistent vomiting. The young person may be sleepy and lethargic, but still responsive. Within half a day, he or she can become disoriented, combative and delirious.

Untreated, the teenager or child can go into a coma and die.

Thus, Reye is a medical emergency. A child with Reye syndrome symptoms must be taken immediately to a hospital, where blood and body fluids can be monitored and a respirator used if breathing fails. Surgery may be needed, in some cases, to relieve pressure on the swollen brain. Therefore, act promptly if you suspect Reve syndrome.





Kruger resigns Police

Akron's Town Board met in regular session Tuesday, February 19 at the town hall with all members of the board and Clerk Sarah Jane Sutton present.

Reads letter of resignation

The audience participation portion of the meeting started off with a letter of resignation being read by police officer David Kruger. The letter in its entirey follows: Addresssed to: Board of Trustees, Akron, Indiana Dated 19, February 1985

Gentlemen:

I have been employed as a member of the Police Department in the Town of Akron since 1 July 1981. During this time, both as Deputy Marshal and as Marshal. I have endeavored to perform in a dedicated manner in order to provide the Town with a Police Department which I felt it deserved, one of which the Town could be proud, and to reflect the professionalism in my job with which I had been imbued at the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy. To this end I have uncomplainingly been available to the public an average of 84 hours a week and have spent several hundred dollars of my own money to provide equipment. reference texts, and other material necessary to my job and for which no Town funds were made available.

However recent events have indicated to me that the desires of the Town as reflected by the comments and actions of the Town's elected Board of Trustees are that a professional Police Department is neither required nor desired.

The Board has made promises which it has not kept. An important one being to meet with the Officers of the Department to discuss comments, problems, and complaints concerning the Department in order that any conflicts or misunderstandings might be resolved. A case in point being the meeting I had with the Board in October 1984 when I was informed that I was being replaced as Marshal by then-Deputy James Spangle. When I asked for a reason the only answer I was given -- and that after considerable delay -- was "...your attitude. And the people of the Town want both of you fired, which we can't do, so we are going to try this reorganization, if Spangle wants to hire you....' When I pressed for specific comments or complaints the Board would not, or could not give me any.

On one occasion a member of the Board told Spangle a deliberate lie concerning my performance of duty -- which would have occured on my day off -- and that same member, who in his pre-election campaigning stated that he would "...get rid of the Police Department starting with Kruger...", has made other insulting or insinuating remarks in public concerning me personally or my performance of duty. Yet he will not show me the common courtesy nor the courage of his convictions to face me directly with his accusations, be they true of fabricated.

During the last three or four months of my tenure as Marshal members of the Board directed comments or orders concerning the Department directly to the Deputy rather than following the normal protocol of passing them through the Marshal. This was done too frequently to have been coincidental but rather appears to have been an attempt to subvert and undermine the authority of the Marshal.

The members of the Board of Trustees of the Town of Akron have exhibited no real concern or interest in the functioning or operation of the Police Department and leave me with the impression that any knowledge of the Policeman's duties and responsibilities might alter their preconceived ideas of how the job should be done.

This lack of interest in the Police Department and aura of distrust evinced by members of the Board make additional stress to the working conditions which have become personally intolerable. Nothing in these comments should be construed to reflect upon Marshal James Spangle, an officer with whom I have closely worked for almost three years. He is a sincerely dedicated professional Law Enforcement Officer worth far more civil and monetary consideration than he may ever receive from this Administration.

The constraints under which I feel we have to work cause a prostitution of police professionalism and therefore it is with deep personal regret and my sincere apologies to the residents of the Town who have supported my efforts, that to maintain my own self esteem 1 hereby tender my resignation as Deputy Marshal of the Town of Akron to be effective at 9 r m. this date, 19 February 1985.







noting that they presently provide service to several Akron patrons at a charge of \$1.15 per week, they said large items would be picked up at an extra charge to the patron.

Board President Jack Miller told them the board members would make a decision at a later date and notify them as to that decision.

Snowmobile problems

Marshall Jim Spangle told the board members he had a lot of problems with snowmobile operators during the recent bad weather, following one person through Pike Lumber yard and through a field and yards on foot when he couldn't catch the person with the police car.

Spangle said the speed limits were not being obeyed, nor were the stop signs being ved, creating a hazard for other vehicles traveling the streets in town.

Board member Richard Drudge said he thought the town board had designated Walnut Street as a "pass-thru" for people to be able to get through town on snowmobiles. Spangle noted that even the town board can not do this without a snow emergency being declared.

President Miller noted that the board should pass some ordinances concerning snowmobiles within the corporate limits.

Spangle said that during bad weather, the law enforcement officer in charge may give permission to operate a snowmobile within town limits only if a snow emergency has been declared. He noted that a town board may make other requirements but cannot supercede state laws.

Trustee Drudge said that people in town who operate snowmobiles need a way out of town, and Marshall Spangle said the town board should get legal advice on the way to handle the matter. Miller reminded him that several times the snowmobile owners in town have been good to deliver medicines and groceries to people stranded in the country, but Spangle again note that you cannot tell them (snowmobilers) to do something against the law

No Registration

Marshall Spangle told the board that many of the riders had no registration and no numbers on the machines, and some no licenses to drive a snowmobile.

The suggestion was that the town board need ordinances to meet minimum standards of state to cover these requirements, since the town streets are usually cleared enough to get through in vehicles, it is unclear as to how the town can declare a snow emergency. Spangle said that snowmobile owners, if it were checked on a case by case basis might be allowed into town for emergencies.

The board members decided to check with their legal council and determine what can be done with respect to ordinances governing all instances.

In other business the board: *decided to repair the dented door on the police car, damaged in a "snow incident" for an estimated \$100 for removing dent-and painting.

*okayed a \$25 fee to get license renewal for the police 2-way radio.

Funds total approximately nine million dollars this year for the state of Indiana and recently was the process which the town of Etna Green used to build a new fire station. *President Miller noted that 52% of the overdue water bills had been paid.

*Board member Richard Drudge said he wanted to personally thank David Kruger and Jim Spangle for installing the heater in the police office and the door windows in the police office and water department office. Hudson and Miller also added their thanks.

Lester had three steals and ten assists, Miller and Johnson had seven rebounds each.


The Viking jayvee game ended 47-46 Valley with Steve Clampitt scoring 14 points and Chris Zolman adding another 11 points.
