

Sheila is currently in the process of recruiting volunteers to call on their neighbors to help educate the public about leukemia and to seek support for the programs of the Indiana Leukemia Society. These programs include research. direct patient-aid, and education.

Leukemia is a disease of the the blood-forming tissues, including the bone marrow.

lymph nodes and the spleen. Leukemia and its allied illnesses - the lymphomas. multiple myeloma and Hodgkin's Disease - will strike approximately 64,000 Americans this year. An estimated 40,000 persons will die from these diseases. That includes and estimated 425 Hoosiers. Leukemia kills more

children than any other disease. And, it kills more adults than children. The Leukemia Society of

America is a voluntary health agency dedicated to seeking

the cause and eventual cure of leukemia and related diseases.

The cause of leukemia remains unknown. However. the effectiveness of recently developed treatment methods and steady advances in research have created a sense of hope for victims of the disease.





missioner Michael M. Packard called the new plate "very attractive design which will instill pride among Hoosiers. We are pleased at the response from many citizens of the state and proud of the fact that this plate was for the most part designed by the public."

The new white plate uses the golden torch and stars from Indiana's state flag as for the deep blue registration




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

To the Editor:

If the income tax is on the up and up, why all the secrecy?

For over 3 years I have assisted Rachel Templeton and others in searching the law books and questioning the Inter-nal Revenue Service, and still have not been able to come up with the section of the Internal Revenue Code that makes any sovereign individual a "person liable" for an income tax. Oh, we got a lot of verbage, and a lot of garbage, but when the rubber meets the road, the IRS either stutters or

refuses to respond. The facts are these

As an alleged government agency, the IRS is required to inform each individual who they ask to fill out a form, whether it is voluntary or mandatory, before they fill out that form. [See The Privacy Act, 1974].

The IRS claims to comply with this requirement by their issuance of their Privacy Act Notice #609.

That Notice says: "Our legal right to ask for information is the IR Code, Sections 6001 and 6011 and their regulations. They say you must file a return or statement with us for any tax you are liable for '

tax you are liable for." Section 6001 says: "Every person liable for any tax im-posed by this title...shall keep such records, render such statements, make such returns..."etc. Section 6011 says: "...any person made liable for any tax imposed by this title shall make a return or statement..." So before you can be required, you must be "liable" and the liability must be stated clearly before anyone can be sub-ject to the IR Code or to the IRS.

The Supreme Court said this quite eloquently in the case of Gould vs. Gould (245 US 153).

"In the interpretation of statutes levving taxes it is the established rule not to extend their provisions, by implica-tion, beyond the clear import of the language used, or to enlarge their operations so as to embrace matters not specifically pointed out in case of doubt they are construed most strongly against the Government, and in favor of the citizen." citizen

Now, so there is no confusion as to terms, being "a per son liable" means that the person has an obligation or duty that person is answerable, or compellable to make satisfaction...he is bound or obliged in law. (See Blacks Law

Dictionary). There is a clear distinction between "having a tax liabili ty" and being "a person liable". It is possible to be a "person liable" for a tax imposed by the IR Code but have no tax liability. However, it is impossible to have an income tax liability if one is not a person liable for any internal revenue

So Rachel followed the lead of IRS Notice #609 and look ed for a section of the Code that made her liable for a tax and that made her answerable to the IRS, and made her obliged to submit forms to the IRS under oath. She couldn't find any section that imposed a liability

upon her

upon her. So she sent literally hundreds of requests, over 200 of them by certified mail, to the IRS, to Congressmen, to the President, the Supreme Court Justices, to attorneys, accoun-tants and CPA's and tax preparers requesting this most here advantation information

Most din't even respond, but of those who did, none ould document the Code to show how a person becomes liable for an income tax. Four attorneys, 1 CPA and 1 tax preparer informed her there was no such section in the IR

Code

When she received no response from the IRS by mail, she set up a meeting with two special agents from the Criminal Investigation Division of the IRS, informing them in advance the question she would ask them, and then asked them personally at that meeting. "What section of the IR Code makes me a person liable for an income tax?" They didn't respond. They just stuttered and stammered and then terminated the meeting without giving her an answer. She then sent a certified letter with certified copies go-

ing to each of the agents and their superiors including diana District Director Paul Williams and IRS Commissioner Roscoe Egger.

She asked them again for the documentation that made her a person liable, or in the alternative to set up an ad-ministrative hearing as per Title 5, Sections 553-559, to ad judicate the facts of the matter. In over 3 months, no viable response has been received, and atter 2 wears her constrained to the section of the section.

and after 2 years, her search has been fulle. She has been unable to find any section of the IR Code that makes her a person liable to pay or collect a tax or required to submit a form to 100. When the table to be the section of the tax of the submit a form to the IRS. Yet the IRS continues to harass her, threatening to steal her property and indict her for some unknown crime

Such tactics are not only unathical but outright illegal, but the IRS moves forward with impugnity, as the people's federal prosecutor, the Justice Department just happens to be the IRS's defense counsel and the Federal Judges are "taxpayers" and subject to the IRS.

Rachel has stated that she won't submit to these 'gestapo'' factics. She knows that submission, even out of fear, makes people the servants and the IRS their master. She has stated publicly that she would rather sit in jail a free person than walk in public as a slave, I agree with her convic-tion and I too will not submit to IRS tyranny. I believe that if there was some requirement, then the

section of the IR Code that makes me a "person liable" wouldn't be a secre

I believe that any claimed mandatory requirement for an individual freeman to submit to an income tax is a fraud. The reason is quite simple. If there was a liability clause mandating compliance, it would not pass constitutional muster and would be struck down by the Supreme Court, as they have already ruled:

"It is clear, however, that the legislature and the people may not choose to deny a fundamental constitutional right as a means of collecting revenue." Lucas vs. Forty Fourth General Assembly (1964) 377 US 713.

I personally will not voluntarily waive my fundamental right to privacy by submitting a form to the IRS. Nor will I waive my right to trial by jury. I'll not be forced to take an oath against my will and over my objection. I'll not volunteer to become a "subject". President Reagan set the record straight last May, when

he stated:

Our Federal tax system is in short, utterly impossible, utterly unjust and completely counter-productive. It's earned a rebellion, and it's time we rebelled." So how about you? Will you continue to submit to the

IRS the next time you're told to blindly waive your rights, simply because it's less controversial? Or will you demand to know what section of the IR Code makes you a person liable for an internal revenue tax, and makes you a "subject" to the IRS?

My feelings, and the feelings of many others I know can best be expressed in the words Patrick Henry, in his inspirational speech before the House of Burgess over 200 years

ago. Is life so dear or peace so sweet as to be purchased at the price of chains and slavery? Forbid it almighty God. I know not what course others may take, but as for me, give me liberty or give me death.

He also served on the state's General Pulaski Commission, Indiana Delegation of the Council of State Governments, Indiana Economic Council and several other committees.

He was the Democrat nominee for the U.S. House of Representatives for the state's old Second District in 1936, but lost to Republican Charles A. Halleck.

He was elected president and chairman of the Rochester Telephone Company in He served in both capacities until 1976. He was named an honorary director on the company in 1981. He was president of the United States Independent Telephone Association.

Despite his involvement in state and national offices. Mr. Barnhart's lifelong interest and involvement in the progress of his own community never diminished. And in 1972 this culminated when he and his wife donated \$100,000 to Rochester Community Schools for the construction of the new high school athletic field that now bears their name.

Student Grant Information

College-bound high school seniors and their parents were reminded recently that March 1 is the deadline for filing applications for state higher education grants administered by the State Student Assistance Commission of Indiana (SSACI). College students who wish to be considered for renewa grants also must apply by the same date.

About 45 days after the deadline, or about May 15. the state agency will offer a record high total of more than \$31 million in grants to graduates of Indiana high schools planning to attend or already attending private or public colleges and univer-

sities in the state. Application for the state higher education grants is made by filing a Finanacial Aid Form (FAF). Copies of the form and additional information are available from high school counselors. lege financial aid offices. some libraries and the SSACI office at 964 N. Pennsylvania Indianapolis (telephone 317 232-2350).

For the 1985-86 academic year, SSACI's grants to students with the greatest financail need ranged from \$779 at Indiana Vocational Technical College to \$2,840 at many private colleges. The 1986-87 grants are expected to be substantially higher.

To be eligible, applicants must have been Indiana residents as of last Dec. 1, be planning to attend or now attending an approved Indiana institution of academic higher learning, be planting to work or be working toward a first undergraduate degree and demonstrate financial need


