You've heard it said many times, but it's true. Their future is up to us, and we haven't a moment to lose. We must act now to improve our education and insure the hopes of a bright future for our children.

As chairman of the Indiana House of Representatives: Committee on Education, I have taken a hard look at the Hoosier educational system. Changes must be made to better prepare our children for the future and restore public con-

fidence in the system today.

In his State of the State Address, Governor Robert Orr presented recommendations for upgrading the state's education system which include adding 10 days to the school year, evaluating teacher performance and changing the school funding formula to reward schools that excel.

While the legislature must review these proposals thoroughly, I commend the Governor for his stand.

The cornerstone of Governor Orr's education package is

accountability. Since nearly half of all state taxes go to local schools, state government has a duty to insist on accoun-

The insistence that our children get the best education possible can restore public confidence in the system and make Indiana a beacon for the rest of the nation.

For more than a year now. Superintendent of Public Institution H. Dean Evans and hundreds of others have been working to put this education package together. Now Republicans and Democrats alike will need to work together. Indiana cannot afford to make education a partisan issue.

A united effort can make our schools and our society stronger, more vital. In our commitment to address this pro-

blem of national magnitude, Indiana will shine as the state that has the vision and courage to meet the future.

and public transportation.


What's more, Japan has become a role model for Taiwan and South Korea. Also making economic headway are: Hong



You're On Your Way

Having taken the first step toward attaining your desired

Having taken the first step toward attaining your desired weight (as we discussed last week) you have gone one week down the road. Many times the first and second weeks are the hardest when initiating a weight reduction program. We have all heard that habits are hard to break. It also applies to our eating patterns. Have you ever been so caught up in something you were doing, that time flew by and before you knew it the afternoon was gone and you realized you hadn't snacked? Yes...it has happened to me and I didn't starve to death like I thought! As others, I figured doing without snacks I was sure to die of starvation. Rest assured, you'll live through it and feel better in the end!

By now, one week down the road, my cupboards have been searched high and low for a perfect low calorie snack to hold me over until breakfast. With calculator in hand and hold me over until breakfast. With calculator in hand and calorie counter by my side, careful considerations have been made so I won't go over my calories allotted. Every now and then an evening goes by, as it will for you, without a thought of snacking. One suggestion for a low calorie snack is a rice cake (35 calories each). Another is diet gelatin (8 cal. per serving) as well as raw vegetables. Be sure and keep to one helping, anything is fattening if enough is eaten. The idea is to reduce; cutting down - not necessarily cutting out.

Be proud of yourself. Dieting or a reduction of calories is a difficult thing to do. However the weight never seems to disappear quickly enough. You have to remember the best way isn't always the fastest. Stay on a balanced diet and check with your doctor.

Here is a list of foods and servings recommended daily.

Here is a list of toods and servings recommended daily for a balanced diet: Meat and cheese, 2-3; breads and cereals, 2-3; vegetables, 3-5; fruits, 2-4; milk products, 2-3. Next week: Meal planning and calorie counting. Until then...don't give up! Take it one day at a time and soon your hard work will pay off. (Excuse me while I nail my cabinet doors!)



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

MISSING REAR TEETH

f all of the rear teeth in one side of your law are missing you may opt for a partial denture instead of a span of empty gum. Your dentist will have to rely on your front teeth for support in making such a partial denture. He'll also have to make maximum use of your gums and supporting bone to give the denture stability.

Even though this kind of partial denture is not as stable as the kind that hooks onto or is permanently affixed to supporting teeth on both sides of a tooth void, it is certainly preferrable to the alternative of full dentures. The remaining natural teeth can continue to provide strength in chewing food and help maintain the shape of the

Without the help of supporting teeth in the rear to hold this type of partial denture in place, there is more pressure on gums and ridges. A certain amount of shrinkage is a natural occurrence. This neans the partial denture will have to be adjusted from time to time. This will probably include relining to compensate for changes in your gams to make it fit securely. But, it is certainly better for your nealth, your appearance, and eating to have teeth rather than uncovered gums



Miller rejoins **Mentone Board**

Jim Miller has rejoined the Mentone Town Board. As the precinct committeeman, Miller was responsible for appointing a replacement for himself after resigning from the town board position.

In the two month period, however, Miller had no success in finding a replacement.

As a result of Miller's efforts, he decided the only possibility of filling the vacancy was to go back to the board as his own replacement.

Miller commented it would be difficult for just two members of the board to make the decision to solve the wastewater problem.

Miller's decision earlier to resign had come about because to solve the problem of polluting Yellow Creek would involve putting the town into financial hardship. He said he could have chosen one plan which would have meant no expense for himself, and thus that caused a conflict for him.

year to submit a Municipal Compliance Plan to the state. The deadline to eliminate illegal connections to the existing storm sewer system is July 1, 1988.

An ad hoc advisory committee is trying to locate viable alternatives by researching plans and financial resources adopted by other communities. They may be discussing options at the special meeting Feb. 16.

Mrs. Boardman was elected president of this year's town board.

The board voted Monday to keep the present salaries for the town marshal and water superintendent. They requested raises for 1987. The board did okay extra pay for the men for their work in snow removal.



Meal Planning and Calorie Counting

I've often wondered how many people make a menu each week. I first started using a menu after making two different trips in town for ingredients to make cookies. After the second time I decided there had to be a better way. Later when trying to fix different foods while on a weight reduction plan it came in handy, I was always sure of something with fewer calories and not being caught with only fattening

If you shop once a week for groceries, perhaps a 7-day menu will work. Keep a pad and pencil handy and your food groups nearby. As you plan your meals be sure to jot down any items you don't have in the house. Be sure to include plenty of carrots, celery, raw cauliflower, etc. for emergency

Besides each food you will eat write the number of calories, add the calories at the end of each meal to help you keep track. Sometimes adjustments can be made in your lunch so you can have more for your evening meal. This also helps you learn how much food adds up to 1,000 or 1,200 calories. It's surprising how a few items such as donuts and lasagna, pie or ice cream add up. When you have only 1,000

to 1,200 calories to eat, you learn to choose them wisely. (You'll be surprised how full you feel after measuring out your food and preparing it and having it look attractive.)

Other important factors, although they may not seem so, are color, texture and variety. Anyone who has tried reducing their weight knows how boring the same foods can be. However, with the aid of a menu you will be able to rearrange your foods and add crispy items with soft ones, tart foods with bland, and brighter foods with some of lesser color. When served on a plate, arrange the foods in an attractive manner, use a place mat, always eat at a table or food bar and eat slowly. Concentrate on the food you have in your mouth and really taste it. (Don't be distracted by reading material or a television, etc.) Enjoy not only the appealing plate of nutritious food, but also the beginning of a successful weight loss program. And just think...YOU did it!





Of the 2,220 in jail last year, 250 under the age of 21 were booked on alcohol related charges and 11 under 18 for drugs. He stated no one 'starts' with cocaine or heroin, they start with alcohol or marijuana and parents must be aware of these problems.

The major problem with youth today is lack of discipline and lack of respect. Discipline is simply 'system of rules' and respect means 'to show consideration'. He reminded his audience that parents, church, and school had all lost the youth before they became a police matter. Fifteen years ago authorities were dealing with 15 and 17 year old youths, now the age is as low as 7 to 9.

All drugs are a depressant, he stated, though they may have a fake high it is followed by even lower depression. 97% are good kids, but peer pressure will often get them involved with drugs alcohol. Some symptoms for parents to watch for are if the child changes friends, wants to be alone, has up and down moods, grades fall, and never wants to be at home. Too much permissiveness and affluence are contributing factors, and suggested asking your child Would you rather be dead than square?"



Older adults need accurate assessments

Grandma may like a few glasses of wine now and then, or may misuse her tranquilizer but this does not necessarily mean she is an alcoholic or drug abuser.

But, if a pattern develops. grandma needs an asssessment, an evaluation of her alcohol/drug habits.

This is becoming more and more important in our society as the total of senior citizens rises. Social scientists tell us percentage of older adults in the U.S. increase in the next decade and even into the next century. Our nation has developed many "miracle drugs" for its citizenry who wholeheartedly back a 'feel-good'' philosophy through liquids, pills, etc. Got a headache? Take an Stomach ache? Swallow this. Nervous? Take

Substance abuse centers such as Koala are working more closely with nursing homes, retirement centers, social agencies, and families to help older adults. Most of these patients are still abusers when they come to us for treatment but many are only misusers on an infrequent basis

A perfect example of this involves a woman we'll call Clara. Her family noted some erratic behavior by her. A son, looking for reasons, found she was taking a tranquilizer and her supply was almost used up. Clara's behavior changed soon after a death in the family. She also had a slight tremor from Bender Funeral Home, a medical condition which family and friends. The tranquilizer helped on this.

Getting a consent to talk with her pharmacist and doctor, our treatment people found the prescription level and learned that Clara did not exceed it by much. Interviewing the family and Clara's concluded the research on her chemical substance use. The Koala "Social detectives" then concluded that Clara was not a drug abuser, nor an alcoholic. She was misusing her prescription drug

Clara did, indeed, need ome education on her selfesteem issues and some guidance on the use of tranquilizers and her tremoring but she did not need inpatient drug abuse treatment.

All this evidence presented to her family physician and her family so they can monitor her needs and solitary lifestyle with knowledge and caring instead of guesswork and

Older adults who ARE admitted to treatment are researched by reputable substance abuse centers to the extent of asking family members to bring in all drugs the patient has been taking. This means an accurate assessment of the patient can be conducted.

People with diabetes, for example, who neglect regular taking of insulin are often diagnosed by family members as "drunk or drugged up." Koala Center, Lebanon,

has developed a unique and specialized older adults program, A person over 60 responds differently to alcohol and other drugs than younger persons. Combination of chemicals, including prescriptions, can cause devastating results to these folks.

Just because grandma or grandpa is forgetful and "acting" senile, does not mean senility has set in. An accurate assessment is the answer.

Special Olympics to be held in South Bend

The world's largest athletic event for mentally retarded citizens will be held July 31 - August 8, 1987 on the campuses of the University of Notre Dame and Saint Mary's College and throughout the South Bend area. The VIII International Summer Special Olympics Games will feature 4,700 athletes from more than 60 countries and

the 50 states.

The 1987 International Games will include 14 sports with the following classifications:

* Eight Official Sports -Athletics (track and field), aquatics (swimming and diving), basketball, bowling, gymnastics, soccer, softball and volleyball.

* Six Demonstration Sports - Cycling, equestrian, roller skating, table tennis, tennis and weightlifting.

Medals will be awarded for official sports, and the '87 games will mark the first time medals will be presented in demonstration sports

Competition between evenly matched teams and individuals will be determined by divisioning efforts for all events. Athletes are given a skills test by their coaches, then ranked by the venue committees to ensure that they are placed in evenly matched divisions. Special Olympics competition is exciting to watch, as athletes of equal skills exercise the talents they have developed.

Special Olympics provides year-round training and athletic competition for mentally retarded individuals. They develop their physical fitness and prepare to participate in school and community sports programs. These Special Olympians express courage, experience joy and participate in the sharing of gifts, skills and friendship with the families of other athletes and their communities.

In addition, there will be five Exhibition/Clinics conducted during the 1987 International Games. They include canoeing, rowing, sailing, synchronized swimming, and team handball. The Exhibitions/Clinics are considered educational in nature, while also providing athletes and coaches with excellent instruction in these infant Special Olympics sports.

The VIII International Summer Special Olympics Games, July 31 - August 8, will include 5,700 athletes and coaches participating in 14 sporting events (eight official, six demonstration) at the University of Notre Dame and Saint Mary's College. The 1987 International Games will involve more than 60 countries, the 50 states, and U.S. territories in the most vigorous athletic competition yet for mentally retarded individuals.

The VIII ISSOG will be the largest worldwide amateur sporting event of 1987. The ambitious \$4.8 million budget is being raised outside the South Bend area but will be spent locally. This is being accomplished by selling sponsorships to corporations and civic groups. Major sponsors include Civitan International (55,000 member service organization

pledging \$1.6 million and more than 1,000 volunteers), Hardee's, AT& T, Coca-Cola USA, Communications Workers of America (CWA), Gates Chevrolet, IBM, Independent Grocers Alliance (IGA). Kellogg Company, Knights of Columbus, Lilly Endowment. Red Lobster. St. Joseph Bank & Trust, State of Indiana, and United Commercial Travelers

(UCT).

Special Olympics is the largest worldwide program for mentally retarded citizens. More than one million athletes compete annually, guided by the Special Olympics oath: "Let me win, but if I cannot win, let me be brave in the attempt"; and the words - skill, courage, sharing, and joy.

GTE gets \$1 increase

Access charges are the

To the Editor:
Surely there is agreement about the need for attention to our nation's deteriorating highways, and surely there is agreement that gasoline taxes which Hoosier taxpayers have already paid should be returned to our state as soon as

possible for addressing these needs.

Yet we are faced with a situation where Congress is acting at a snail's pace on authorization of funds for our country's highways. Because Congress cannot get a highway bill passed 10,000 jobs in our state are threatened, and motorists are subjected to untold numbers of unnecessary jars and

To the credit of our new House Speaker, Jim Wright, the Surface Transportation Act (H.R.2) was introduced in the House on the first day of business this year. H.R. 2 would authorize over \$91 billion for highway construction and repair

authorize over set filling in right way construction and repair over the next five years. Some \$292 million would be allocated for Indiana in fiscal year 1987 alone.

This bill passed the House without amendment on January 21st and was sent to the Senate. Unfortunately, the bill has faced rougher sledding there as it has been embroiled in the controversy over a higher speed limit. In essence, our highway tax dollars are being held captive by Senators who want to use the highway bill to resolve an issue which, although important, shouldn't be tied up with this essential

I agreed with Governor Orr this past October when he protested the Congress adjourning without passing this needed highway legislation. It can take three months or more for funds, once authorized by Congress, to show up in Indiana as construction project starts on our highways. Clearly, action to pass H.R. 2 is long overdue.





Dear Friends and Family:Greetings from tropical Haiti! While all of you have snow to shovel once again, we're only now becoming comfortable with the heat. The highs are in the lower 80's now (Fahrenheit, of course), Although we do miss the familiar cold at times (like at Christmas), it is also nice to have unending summer for a change. Spending Christmas playing volleyball outdoors and going to the beach will remain a special memory for us.

We've been in Haiti now since mid-August of 1986, soon after graduating from Goshen College in June. We spent the first six weeks in the capital city of Port-au-Prince studying the language Haitian Creole which we now use daily. It cam fairly easily to us as it is similar to French which we had both studied before. Then we moved to Les Cayes, a city on the southern peninsula, where we plan to live for the remainder of our 3-year term with MCC. We rent a nice little tin-roofed house with a livingroom, kitchen, bedroom, and bathroom; an extra little building out back serves as a storage area. Suprisingly, it even has the familiar shape of a house trailler. It's no more or less than we need so we're very satisfied with it. Being in a city, we were able to install water and electrical systems, so that we now have the luxuries of indoor running water, electricity, and indoor plumbing which have made our adjustment here considerably easier.

We have very friendly neighbours who have been extremely helpful in learning Crecke and becoming expetitive to

tremely helpful in learning Creole and becoming sensitive to the Haitian culture and way of life. One of our neighbours and good friends is Marie Victoire Simon, a middle-aged woman who helps us by making our dinner at noon (usually Haitian food which we enjoy very much), doing our laundry (all by hand), ironing, and cleaning, etc. Having a "servant" was a difficult cultural idea to accept for us as it seemed to necessitate one-way rather than mutual servanthood, but we have found ways to honour Marie by respecting her wisdom and advise, trusting her fully, and treating her as the close friend she is to us. We have also made many friendships with our music students and fellow choir members which has

helped make life here very enriching.

Our work here in Haiti is to train Haitian Christians to

Our work here in Haiti is to train Haitian Christians to lead music in their churches. Originally, the 4-semester course in music literacy (how to read and write music) that we teach in Creole (a 90-minute class weekly, 14 weeks per semester) was part of the general requirements of a Bible school program to train Haltian pastors.

It has been difficult at times being so far from all of you. At times we question whether God really wants us to serve here in Haiti instead of at home. But again and again we have received confirmation that this is our calling for the present time. We look forward to seeing all of you again, but also wish to serve as best we can while we're here. Life for us here has not been a constant struggle by any means. MCC prohas not been a constant struggle by any means. MCC pro-vides well for our needs, and we receive great satisfaction from the eager interest and progress of our students. If some of you are interested in visiting Haitit while we're here, we would welcome you to come. Our immediate

here, we would welcome you to come. Our immediate families can help with questions regarding details. We look forward to a visit from Kathleen's mother and brother Sam in

It wasn't funty then, and I still fail to see the hump Can I bell it if the ny then, and I still fail to see the humor. Can I help it if the seat is so small?)

Throughout the book, junk food was mentioned continually as the main thing the kids ate. It was also stressed that there was a great deal of snacking along with second and third helpings of the right foods. in total costs include plans to extend service outside city

Three months Commonwealth suggested the sewage project for only the town could costs close to \$3 million.

The Airvac firm is an air vacuum system which is designed for small communities and uses two - four - and six inch pipelines and has a seven mile pumping capa-city. The system utilizes small collection tamks that are connected to as many as eight customers and eventually feed into one pumping station

Board members were also optimistic about working with a company located less than 15 miles away.

Mentone and other communities were given an ultimatum by state and federal officials to construct sanitary sewage collection and treatment facilities or eliminate the illegal connections to the existing storm sewer system before July 1, 1988.

Upgrading the sewage treatment facilities have been discussed for nearly 14 years, but have been bogged down at federal, state and local levels. The board president has high hopes in receiving a \$400,000 grant for the town from the Department of Commerce. town may also be eligible for a 40-year low interest loan through FHA.

Remaining costs of the project would be included in monthly sewage bills and would not be figured into property taxes, Boardman

In other business, Boardman said the board has decided to restrict garbage collection to one company, Millwood Sanitation, Bour-bon, who was the lowest bidder and began service several weeks ago.
