Recipients are required to show identification, such as a welfare or food stamp card or driver's license, and to bring a container to carry the food home.

Baker seeks County Sheriff nomination

Wayne township resident, Bruce Baker, 44, Rt. 2, Kewanna has announced he will file for the Republican nomination for Fulton County sheriff in the May primary.

Baker having been a Fulton County deputy for 18 years, having been hired under Homer Carr administration. He served as a detective for the department until that position was eliminated due to budget cuts. He graduated from the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy in 1972.

Baker has successfully completed courses of instruction in: chemical test for intoxication (1973) with recertification every two years; investigation of homicide; basic scuba diving school; terrorism; arson investigation; death investigation; police firearms instructor; psychic phenomena; bomb threat/search procedures; advanced open water diving and emergency response for hazardous materials.

A 1963 graduate of Kewanna High School Baker served in the US Army from 1966-68 spending a tour of duty in the Mekong Delta Vietnam with the 9th Infantry Division.

Baker joined the Kewanna Masonic Lodge in 1966 which has since merged with the Rochester Masonic Lodge. He is an active member of the Kewanna United

Methodist Church where he presently serves on the pastor-parish committee and has taught the high school Sunday school

class. he is a member of the board of directors of Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Fulton County, the Fulton County Fraternal Order of Police #143, the Indiana Sheriff's Association and a life member of the National Rifle Association.

Much of the blood given by American Red Cross volunteer donors is used to save or enhance the lives of people undergoing surgery, accident victims, hemophiliacs, and chemotherapy patients.

American Red Cross donors must be in good health, at least 17 years of age and weigh more than 110 pounds. People age 65 and over may give blood without a physician's permission.

The Indiana Adoption Coalition is a non-incorporated non-profit organization formed in 1983 to present a unified bloc for legislative purpose. While the IAC's roots are deep in the soil of the open records movement, it has grown to include all areas of adoptive reform.

The Indiana Adoption Coalition seeks to act as liaison for support groups and the professionals in the field of adoption. The IAC attempts to bridge the gap between adoptive and birthparents. It shows adoptive families they should not fear birthparents and vice versa. The IAC hopes to bring mutual respect and trust between both sets of "parents."

The Indiana Adoptive Coalition's goals are as follows: (1) to diffuse the fear and mistrust generated in the adoptive triad by sealed records. (2) to support anyone in the triad experiencing stress related to the adoptive process. (3) to share information with the general public on matters of importance to triad members and (4) to work with others to establish change in the legislative aspect of the adoptive experience.



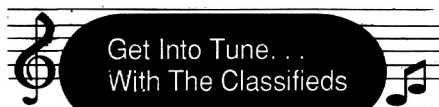

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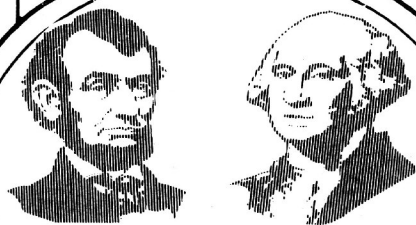

WHEN GUM POCKETS FORM

Does toothbrushing or eating hard foods make your gums bleed? If so, you can be sure that some inflammation is going on. Pockets of bacteria may have developed around some of your teeth.

Gum tissues have two parts. The lining or surface tissue is called the epithelium. The dense supportive tissue that lies under it is called connective tissue. In the early destruction phase, called gingivitis, bacteria attack the gum lining and connective tissue. Your body sends cells to fight the bacteria, but some of them are destroyed in the process. When these cells die, enzymes and other substances are released that contribute to the destruction of gum tissue and bone. As the disease progresses you may notice that your gum tissue looks red and shiny. It may also look slightly puffy or swollen and bleed more easily.

Fortunately, gum disease, is treatable if you get the treatment you need from your dentist. The longer you delay treatment, however, the greater your chances of losing teeth.

Gibson Lake to open for weekend use

The Gibson Lake Recreational Area near Princeton will open Saturday, February 3, for weekend use.

The 3,000-acre lake will be open 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Gibson County time on Saturdays and Sundays only. Beginning April 1, the recreational area will open for its regular season from 5 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily.

There is no charge for use of Gibson Lake or for parking. Visitors, however, are asked to sign in at the recreational area's guard building before using the lake.

The man-made lake is maintained by Public Service Indiana and is ideal for early spring fishing and boating because it seldom freezes. Gibson Lake is also stocked with hybrid striped bass, called wipers, which help control the lake's gizzard shad population. Since stocking the lake with 30,000 fingerlings last summer, PSI has virtually eliminated the nuisance problem of shad in the water-intake screens at its Gibson Generating Station. Wipers, a cross between white bass and striped bass, are fast-growing and a popular game fish.

Gibson Lake was built in 1975 and has been open for public use since 1978.

Hoosier Hysteria's mementos revive dreams, legends

editors note: This story was taken from the January 5 issue of the Indianapolis Star and was written by John Shaughnessy.

Nearly everywhere Ron Newlin turns, nearly everything he picks up, a story seems to follow.

First, there's the mangled basketball rim on the table before him, a rim that represents another incredible legend from the can-you-top-this world of Hoosier Hysteria.

Holding the rim, Newlin leans back in his chair like a storyteller and shares the tale of the infamous rim from Unionville High School.

"Unionville had their greatest scoring record one night in 1961," Newlin recalls. "They scored 110 points in a game. The story goes that it was the last home game in that gym because a few nights later, the gym burned down. The legend that quickly took root in the community was that the fire started because the nets were still smoldering from the hot shooting a few nights before. Supposedly, a few of the players went through the burned gym and found this rim. At least, that's how the legend goes."

Newlin smiles at the story, one of many to be shared when the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame opens June 30 in this eastern Indiana city. As the hall's executive director, Newlin promises that the museum will showcase the great stories of Indiana high school basketball: the miracle of Milan, the smoothness of Crispus Attucks, the dominance of Muncie Central and the long pants of Freelandville.

Ah yes, the long pants of Freelandville. What a story. Holding a pair of long quilted pants, the 31-year-old Newlin shares their legacy.

"These are pants from the 1904 season at Freelandville, down near Vincennes. At first I thought they were football pants that the basketball team just used. But the school was too small for football. They wore these long pants because they didn't have a gym and they played outside on a parking lot. Not only were they worn to keep the players warm, but to keep them protected when they dove for loose balls. If the opposing team showed up with short pants, it definitely gave Freelandville the homecourt advantage."

If long pants and playing home games in a parking lot seem strange, then Newlin has another story share. In 1910, in northern Indiana, the Beaver Dam High School team played its home games in the attic of a restaurant.

Newlin offers a more sentimental story when he walks outside the museum to an area where thousands of commemorative bricks form the shape of Indiana. Newlin points to a brick honoring Monroe City High School, a school that was open from 1911 through 1967.

"The Monroe City alumni raised \$500 to put this brick in. One of the people who contributed to it was a 65-year-old bricklayer who was one of five brothers to play for Monroe City. When we were putting their brick in, he drove four hours to come and lay the brick."

For Newlin's best story, though, you have to return to 1974 and a place called Akron High School in northeastern Indiana. There, 300 students attended a red-brick school, knowing it was the last year in their school's history. Consolidation would move them to a larger school the next year.

"I went out for the basketball team and after two weeks, I was informed by the coach that I didn't have a future in the sport," recalls Newlin, who was a sophomore at Akron High in 1974. "So I asked to be the manager."

"We were a textbook small-school team. We played zone defense because we couldn't afford to get into foultrouble. And our strong point was the out-side jump shot because everybody had grown up playing by themselves. We just thought we could outscore people."

"We had a record of 10 and 10 when we went into the sectionals. And everyone knew it was our last sectional tournament. In the first game, we drew Warsaw, the biggest school around, and we managed to beat them. I remember going to bed that night and thinking 'Why can't we end it here?'"

"But we had to come back the next night and play Rochester. And they were 21 and 0 and ranked in the Top 10. But we ended up winning that game by throwing up a 25-footer every time down the floor. We won 91-89, in overtime."

"As one of 64 sectional champions for the past 80 years or so, that game is lost in the annals of history. But I still remember that game so clearly. It's still one of my most cherished memories. The point is, everyone has a game they look back on, the way I look back on that one. It means as much to them as that one means to me. It's what Hoosier Hysteria and the museum is all about."

Owners Jess Adkins and Zach Terrell have announced they will build up a new circus. Origin of the fires is unknown. It is termed significant by some that all fires except one or two, which been of mysterious origin, were discovered about six o'clock in the evening. Bright lumber yards, the Jack Morris and Tim Baker barns, and the Dillon building.

State lottery revenue could be used in other areas

State lottery revenue should be used for public works capital improvements and other nonrecurring government expenses rather than for automobile excise tax relief, according to the Build Indiana Council (BIC).

"We strongly supported creation of the lottery-financed Build Indiana Fund last year," BIC Executive Director Jim Purucker said. BIC is a not-for-profit organization representing the state's highway and heavy construction industry.

"The logic," he explained, "was that these one-time capital outlays could be scheduled and controlled to accommodate fluctuations in lottery revenues."

Noting that other states have seen their lottery receipts take big swings, Purucker said, "Indiana's lottery has been in existence since last October, hardly enough time to make meaningful revenue predictions."

"We don't even have an on-line game yet, but members of the General Assembly and the Administration are ready to commit \$70 million of anticipated revenue to offset lowering the excise tax."

Purucker said most people would agree that Indiana's automobile excise tax should be reduced. "But there are sound reasons why we shouldn't attempt to replace this lost revenue with unpredictable lottery receipts," he added.

Since this excise levy was intended to be a way to tax those individuals who do not own real property, Purucker said a more fair way to replace it would be an income tax that everyone pays.

The excise tax is collected at the same time motorists purchase their license plates and pay the \$12.75 vehicle registration fee. The revenue is an important local government funding source for education and other non-road programs.

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Carpal Tunnel Syndrome

You wake up in the middle of the night feeling your hand is numb. At work there is tingling and burning in your fingers. It becomes increasingly difficult to grip the objects and tools needed to perform your job. The pain is unbearable.

These are some of the symptoms of carpal tunnel syndrome (CTS), a work-related disorder that the 1.3 million-member United Food and Commercial Workers Union (UFCW) is actively working to prevent.

Caused by repetitive, stressful hand and wrist motions, this potentially crippling disease is occurring at alarming rates. Some of the workers most affected are poultry workers; meatpackers, cashiers, and shoe workers.

An estimated 60 percent of supermarket cashiers who use laser scanners and 67 percent of workers on the boning lines of the meat packing industry suffer from some form of CTS.

Available evidence indicates that minor changes in work practices may help reduce the threat of CTS. Indeed, the UFCW's health and safety experts have discovered that simple corrective measures—such as new knife-blade handles, sharper scissors, adjustable stools, padding on floors, and more frequent work breaks—can be important in preventing the disease.

UFCW is in the forefront in fighting this disorder. Working with several companies in developing new solutions to the problem, the union is helping reduce the incidence of CTS. In this case, an ounce of prevention truly could be worth a ton of cure.

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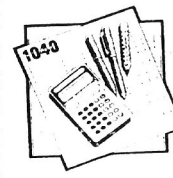
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Local bandsman selected for 1990 All-State Band

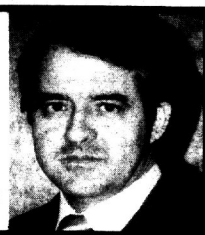
Coach Kindig had the team well prepared as all the Lady Flyers played and seemed eager to earn their wings. Keep on Flying!!

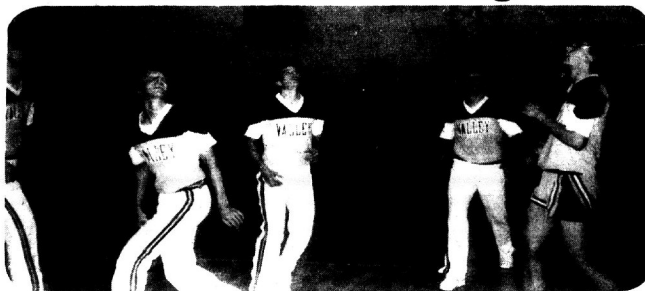

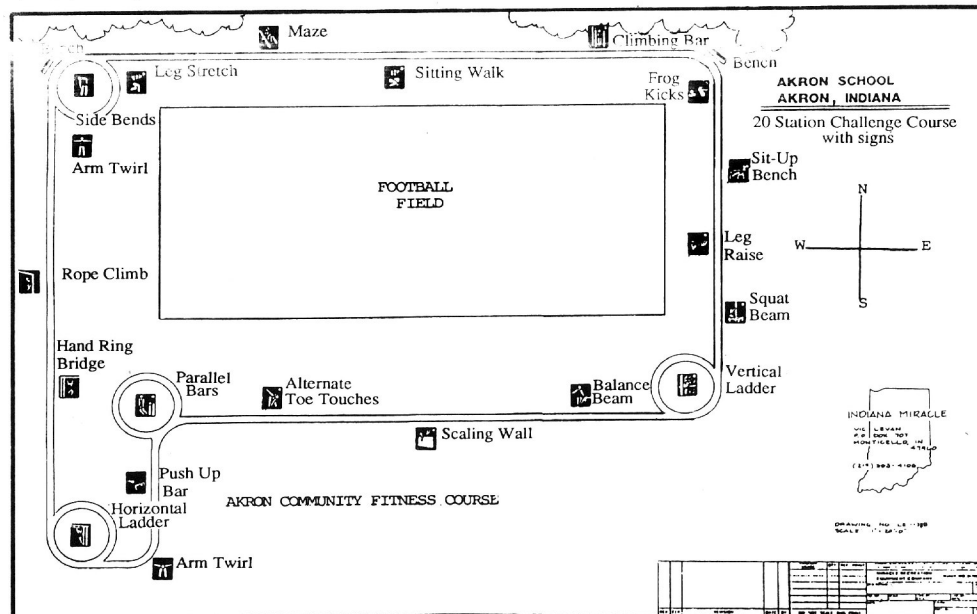
1. Removal and transportation of dirt from the fitness path and stations along with leveling of fill dirt located in the northeast corner of school property.

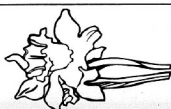

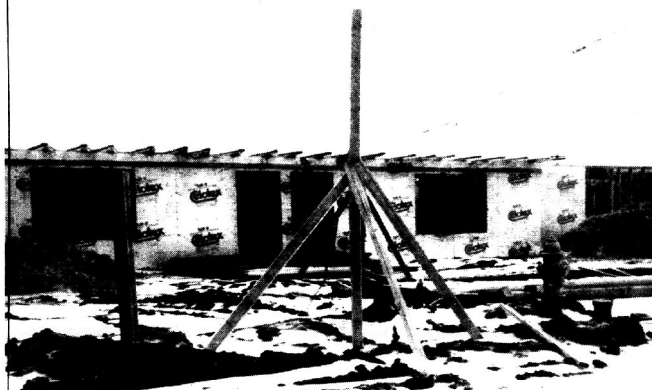

Right now Steve and his employees will be finishing some odds and ends around the store and hopes everyone will stop in and see all he has to offer.

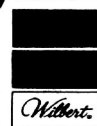

Local students compete in National Academic Contest



A group of eight sixth grade students from Akron and Mentone elementary schools competed in the Elementary Knowledge Master Open (KMO) academic contest on February 7. The team scored 612 points; the maximum possible would be 1,000 points, if all questions were answered correctly within the first 7 seconds. The first-place team scored 789 points.

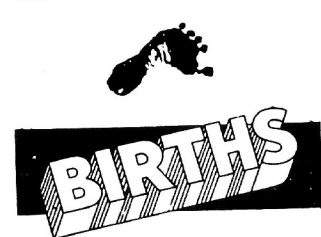

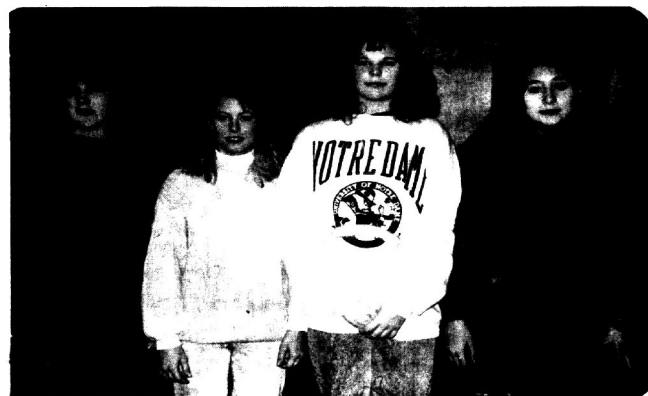

THE FREEWAY SPACE

When you think of "freeway," you probably think of the high speed motorways leading in and out of big cities. But you also have a freeway space -- in your mouth. When your jaws are in a normal and relaxed position, there's a space between your upper and lower jaws that dentists call "the freeway space." It has nothing to do with traffic, but it has a lot to do with mouth comfort.

Whenever full or partial dentures are placed in a patient's mouth, the dentist makes sure the freeway space is not eliminated. This may cause temporomandibular joint (TMJ) problems. Your temporomandibular joints are located on each side of your head, just internal and in front of your ear openings, and are connected to the lower jawbone.

If your chewing muscles or the ligaments that control them are over-stretched, too slack, inflamed, or in spasm, this can cause the severe pain in the jaw joint area. If you are feeling any discomfort or pain in your jaw area when you open or close your mouth, have this condition treated by your dentist.
