Have you been tempted to try your hand at sew-ing simulated leather now available by the now available by the yard in many fabric departments? If you are a reasonably skilled seamstress you'll probably enjoy working with this popular high style material.

A few special sewing

techniques to make sew-ing fabric backed vinyl easier are suggested by Gotwals, Purdue sity extension Lois of University extension plothing and textiles clothing and textiles specialist.

Since the material is

heavy and bulky, you'll find a simple pattern with few seams easiest to work with. Some pat-terns are especially designed for leather and heavy fabrics.

heavy fabrics.
Keep the pattern in place while you are cutting with cellophane tape since pin marks will be permanent. Ripped seams leave needle holes also, so use the pattern to check fit. holes also, so use the pattern to check fit pattern to check fit carefully before you

A fairly long machine stitch setting is best setting is best ou are working stitch setting is best when you are working with simulated leather. You may also need to de-crease the pressure of the presser foot a bit. If you are top-stitching and the material doesn't feed through the machine smoothly, strips of tis-

smoothly, strips of tissue paper under the presser foot will make stitching easier.

Pressing simulated leather is difficult. You will probably find it simpler to glue seam allowances, hem and dart folds with a fabric glue or rubber cement. Deafness was his handicap. And though he composed some of the world's greatest masterpieces, he could not hear his own music. His name was Ludwig van Bee-

Blindness and deafness Bilindness and dearness was her handicaps. From, the time she was two years old she could neither see nor hear. Her name was Helen Keller.

A crippled body was the handicap of this man. He was the victin of polio who had a body racked with pain. But he became president of the United States. His name was Franklin Roosevelt.

Ill health was handicap. He was an invalid most of his life and seldom knew a moment without pain. His name was Robert Lou's Stevenson.

Ignorance was the handicap of this man. He knew nothing about electricity, but inventions in the field of electricity brought him fame and fortune. His name was Alexander Graham Bell.

Ugliness was the handicap of this lady. She was abused and mistreated as a child. Yet she became one of the world's greatest actresses. Her

name was Sarah Bernhardt. The list could go on and on. Unfortunately, most of the talk about economy in government is nothing much more than that, just talk. When the bureaucrats proudly announce dollar savings brought about by operational changes, the result is usually about as effective as trying to change a hurricane's nath with a Jananese fan. trying to change a number path with a Japanese fan.

While pennies are saved one place, millions are squandered elsewhere. The Poet Office, for example, has a plan to save some money, it involves painting all the corner boxes blue, instead of the present red-and-blue combination. Postal officials say each all-blue box will be \$1.07 cheaper to maintain each year, compared with the two-tone receptacles.

The Post Office has operated The Post Office has operated so deeply in the red for so many years, despite rate increases, that red on the mail boxes seems quite appropriate. The resulting savings in the changeover will hardly make a dent in the Post Office's billion dollar a year deficit.

Remember when all the mail boxes were green? Plain, innoc-uous green. Then somebody in Washington decided they should be more colorful, so the mail drops were all painted over in red and blue. Now that "extravagance" has made pos-sible teday," "gronnomy" extravagance" has made today's "economy."

Those who want economy in government will also appreciate a change at the U.S. Treasury. Its Bureau of Engraving has decided to reduce its printing costs by not making any more \$5 U. S. Notes. These bills, not to be confused with Federal @ National Federation of Independent Burling.

Reserve Notes which account for most of our currency, were Reserve Notes which account for most of our currency, were first issued during the Civil War, and for many years, the only new ones printed have been issued to replace wornout U.S. Notes.

Now the economy plan is to stop printing \$5 U. S. Notes. entirely. Instead, the Treasury will print one \$100 note to replace every 20 five-dollar bills will be provided in the press run, the government figures that the one hundreds will circulate longer and be retired at a slower noce than the fives thus reduces.

hundreds will circumae and be retired at a slower pace than the fives, thus reducing the costs of handling bills.

A good idea But since most of the vintage \$5 U. S. Notes are in collector's hands and likely to stay there, the savings cannot be very impressive.

Some really worthwhile savings might be gained by extending this idea to all U. S. currency. Instead of printing so many one-dollar Federal Reserve Notes, one-tenth as many ten-dollar bills could be printed. And instead of fives and twenties, a lesser number of hundreds could be printed.





EGG SHELL TESTER—The Atomic Energy Commission and the U.S. Department of Agriculture have developed a nuclear device to measure the strength of eggshells. The gauge shown in use at the USDA's Engineering Research Division at Beltsville, Md., uses a radioisotope to hurl harmless beta particles at the egg, then measures how many particles bounce back. The thicker the shell, the more beta "backscatter" is back. The thicker the shell, the more beta recorded. Commercial processors lose about \$25 million a year through egg breakage. Researchers are using the device to measure the effects of egg temperature, hen house humidity. and the hen's diet, age and rate of production on shell strength. Automatic Sow Is New

automatic sow mechanical device which substitutes for the mama pig and permits weaning new-born pigs at six to eight hours of age-could revolutionize the pork industry.

Gerald Beattie, Sumner. Nah.

Gerald Beattie, Sum-ner, Neb., hog raiser, expressed this view reexpressed this view re-cently in a talk pre-pared for delivery at a pork producers meeting held in connection with Farm Science Days at Purdue.

Beattie told the hog en that he and his brmen that he and his brother are using the mechanical device "to save pigs from large litters and from sows with milking problems."

"As we learn better

"As we learn better how to use the machine, we may be taking all pigs from the sow at six to eight hours afsix to eight hours at ter birth. With improv-ed diets and know how, we may be able to pro-duce a 50-pound pig in fifty days with no

fifty days with no runts.

"The machine may soon drastically change the design, cost and use of farrowing facilities. Certainly we won't be spending so much for farrowing equipment if the sow is only going to use it a few days each farrowing."

Beattie said he had experienced some mechanical problems with

experienced some mech-anical problems with the device and that diarrhea developed in some of the baby pigs. Los-

ses from diarrhea have ranged from three to 50 per cent, with the greatses est among the youngest pigs, he added.

The Nebraska producer said he plan-ned to try limit feed-ing in an effort to cor-rect the diarrhea prob-He said that ching the pigs to drink their formula which is dribbled into a small trough has not been dif-ficult.

"Generally speaking, the longer the pigs are left on the sow the slower they are to start to drink," he observed.

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

Farmers Become Sole Owners of Farm Credit System

This week, with payments to the U. S. Treasury by the farmer operated Farm Credit System to retire \$148 million of government owned capital farmers became the ital, farmers became the sole owners of this \$12 billion credit system. This ends a significant phase of the partnership between farmers and the government in building government in building this 51-year old system, according to R. B. ell, Governor of Farm Credit Administra-tion. The payments re-presented the retire-ment of \$126 million of government owned capital remaining in the 12 Federal Intermediate Credit Banks and \$22 million in capital of 5 of 13 banks for Cooperatives.
When the 12 Intermed-

iate Credit Banks, which provide loan funds to PCAs and other organizations supplying oper-ating credit to farmers were established in 19-23, Congress made no provision for retirement of the government owned capital. The farmer owned PCAs began acquiring capital stock in these banks in 1957.

"The cooperative Farm Credit System is one of most important assets American farmers have today," Governor Tootell pointed out. "It assures farmers and their cooperatives adeamounts of credit on terms suited to their needs because the System channels in vestment funds from the Nation's funancial markets out to the rural areas where it is needed in ever increasing amounts. Last year alone those invest-ors bought \$10 billion of securities issued by the Farm Credit Sys-tem--more than one-fifth all the credit used by farmers. The amount will probably double by





By Professor A. H. Easton Director, Motor Vehicle Research Laboratory University of Wisconsin

1 . (jet the "feel" of the road by accelerating carefully to see if wheels spin, or brake gently to see if they skid. Reduce speed accordingly

2 · Increase your following distance. It takes three to nine times as far to stop on snow and ice as on dry

3 "Pump" your brakes to slow or stop them on. An intermittent pumping action three to five times per second keeps the wheels rolling and helps maintain steering control.

4 . Have good tires with good treads. Better yet, use snow tires which provide half again as much pulling power in snow as regular tires. Studded snow tires offer still more help on icy surfaces.

5 + Always carry reinforced tire chains in the trunk of your car for use during severe snow and ice conditions. They provide four to seven times as much traction on snow or ice as regular tires.

6 * Keep your windshield and windows clear at all times. Replace streaking wiper blades gone dead from ex-posure to sun, wind and only road film. Be sure that your windshield washer solution contains adequate anti-freeze.





Meredith, Lyle Eden-burn and Ernest Holcslaw, high school principals Akron and Mentone, the corporation's guidance personel , Forst Dunnuck and George Welch. Letters from school teachers, who, according to the report were interviewed by Well's fieldmen, were read, and they too mainread, and they too main-tained that much of the information was false. In criticizing the re-port, the men did not speak against the report's recommendation that one high school be built, but said it was based on the inaccurate information.

--The corporation lacks programs for average below-average pup-

their subject and have to split their time be-tween the present high school buildings. ---The percentage of graduates who complete

a four-year college program is low.

1 out of 6 Hoosiers makes his living from trucks.

Here in Indiana the trucking industry provides direct employment for over 319 thousand (319,000) employees. For each of the last nine years the total annual trucking wages in the state have passed the billion and one-half mark. The payroll flowing into Indiana's economy will soon exceed 2 billion dollars. One out of every six Hoosiers build, service, sell and work with trucks.





---There is no coordination of curriculum development between the present two high schools.

---There is not adequate opportunity for occupational and vocational instruction.

In refuting the statement concerning the number of people who complete a four-year college term, it was pointed out that the state average is 16-2/3% while Mentone's average is 22% and Akron's is 20%.

A survey taken recently showed that the corporation has industries employing in excess of 1063 people as compared to 675 when the corporation formed.

In addition, the principals and guidance directors agreed that coordinating sessions had been held between teachers in the two schools, contrary to what the report alleged, and that co-ordinating sessions would continue to be held.

The state report also said that there were no plans for revising or expanding the English curriculum. This was disputed by principals of both high schools, saving they do have plans for revising and expanding the English curriculum perhaps not to the extent that the English department at the state would so desire inasmuch as they do not plan to offer a course in poetry or non-academic senior English. No English teachers are employed at both schools, contrary to the report.

Routine business occupied the board for the remainder of the evening. Claims and payroll were approved. A financial report by the superintendent showed \$909, 210.33 in all funds and reported that \$250,000 was recently invested in treasury bills at a yield of 6.33%. He noted that all money that is invested by the corporation is invested in government insured treasury bills or bonds through Forrest Miner, president of the Farmers State Bank and investment counselor.

Delford Nelson, a resident of Seward township, presented the board with a manual for establishing an area vocational school and suggested that the board might be interested in investigating the matter. An area vocational school had already been placed on the agenda, and the board discussed its possibilities at length, but tabled the matter until

a later time.

Howard Utter complimented the board and the town marshal but complained that the water is gummy, red and almost unfit to use. He asked what the town was doing about this, saying the condition was more noticeable in the past

The board noted that phosphate used to be added to control lime content but that the that had been advised town that phosphate was caus ing some redness in the system and that now nothing was added to the water. The solution. they said, would be to hook up the new well, but that when this is but that when this is done an additional well will be needed and that a new well house will need to be built as well need to be built as well as a new water main. In addition, the water will have to be chlorinated and filtered. Engineers have been contacted about this, the board said, and will give a design for getting this into the system at a cost of \$75.000 to \$125. into the system at a cost of \$75,000 to \$125, 000. The board said it did not feel that finances are available for the switch now.

Instead of pell-mell to rushing join the factions that rage against each other, we'd like to suggest a third alternative, one that is interested only in good education, whether comes in one or packages and whether it is tied with green and white or black and gold or a combination of five colors, that doesn't care if the school is called Akromen or Men-akron or Tippy High and that couldn't care less the team became the if the team became the Flying Bulls, the Bull Flies, or the Tippy Tipplers—and that would like to see the honor roll students receive the acclaim given the top basketball players. This "group" doesn't care where the school is located, but does care located, but does care that it is a good one. By this we mean it should have good teachers, good equipment and be attractive and sound enough the children don't de-velop a phobia attending it. Along with this we would like to have a tag that we could all afford without having our tax rate soar too high and without having friends and nei-ghbors become enemies.

It seems there surely can be a compromise tween the two groups that would be satisfactory to all and would get on with education. One on with education. One suggestion is included in Lee Norris' letter

editor. Another suggestion Another suggestion would locate the high school in one or the other of the towns and the junior high in the other town. That way town would have its school, but there would be a consolidated high school to enrich the children's curricula. 

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

farmers.
Don C. Peters made the observation at the conference, held in connecwith Farm Science Days at Purdue.

Purdue entomologists reported last fall that a single adult of the destructive western corn rootworm was found in Newton county last Aug-

ust.
"Cheap nitrogen the 'hard pesticides'-aldrin and heptachlor-made it profitable to
grow continuous corn rather that follow the traditional rotations,

Peters asserted. chlorinated hydrocarbon resistance problem began in Neb-raska and the western species of rootworms, but by now there are spots of resistance in both northern and western corn rootworms in most of the Corn Belt most of the Corn Belt states. In regard to the western corn root-worm in Indiana, my worm in Indiana, my guess would be that it will take two to four years for serious ec-onomic losses to occur."


