pounds of Atrazine weed spray that was valued at \$2 a pound and an electric adding machine valued at \$100 and a fire extinguisher.

Gordon Groninger, manager of the center, discovered the break-in at 9 a.m. Monday and said it occurred after 9 a.m Sunday. A large outside door was pulled open and the glass in the office area door was broken to gain entry.

The sheriff's office and state police are investigating.

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





Three 22 foot rubber rafts will take the students over a series of white rapids in the Usquare Biver between River between umacinta Mexico and Guatamala. The river flows past ancient ruins of the Maya civilization seldom seen by visitors. It gives easy access to that part of the Maya civilization developed in the Usuma-cinta Valley under the cinta Valley under the most promising circum-stances of geography, topography and climate. Some students will stu-dy the ruins for their

history, others for art, some will dig for relhistory, others for all, some will dig for relics, and some will seek to determine the social structure of the Mayan civilization. Side trips will be made to isolated and overgrown wine at Vavehilan and ruins at Yaxchilan and El Cayo Island to see the last remnants of the Mayan civilization. After the river trip, the students will engage in two and one-half weeks of study at Villa Her-mosa deep in the Yucatan Pennisula. Two days will be spent in Mexico

City before returning to the United States. The trip is under the direction of Jane Adams of the Manchester Col-lege Department of Art



Owe Taxes? Don't Buy License Plate

Even though property tax receipts no longer are needed to obtain license plates, a person may not obtain a plate if he is delinquent in payment of taxes, Mrs. payment of taxes, Mrs. Margaret Burkett, Fulton county license manager, remin branch reminded this manager, reminded this week, saying that among the papers a person signs to obtain a plate is an oath that he is not delinquent in tax payments. A copy of the papers goes to the Fulton county auditor's office where it is checked against tax recked against tax re-cords.



So you've been cozily sleeping under your Christmas electric blanket for a few weeks. And the thought creeps across your mind, 'What happens when it looks dingy?

Never fear, electric blankets are ma**chine washable.** In fact, one of the first rules for their care is Do Not Dry Clean—the chemicals may injure the insulation on the heat-

For the method, your first authority is your use-care tag (you know, the one you filed under Electric Blanket or, hopefully, tossed in a box marked Use-Care). In case the directions are briefer than you'd like, here are some words of

Use light-duty detergent. The chemicals in those that tackle heavy soil might attack the heating wires. Besides, blankets don't get that dirty. If there are some spots, pre-treat with suds of light-duty detergent. An exposed plug should be covered with a terry cloth tied over

Wash just one blanket at a time. But use full load water level-and lukewarm water. Add the detergent (watch the amount so it doesn't over suds) and agitate until dissolved. Stop action, add blanket and submerge it. Let soak for 15 minutes, turning it a couple of times. Agitate for one minute. Advance setting to spin. Fill tub with rinse water. Soak five minutes. Advance to spin and then repeat the rinsing.

During the final soak, get the dryer ready. Clean the lint trap. Preheat for five minutes on high with three or four bath towels in the dryer. Place blanket in heated dryer with towels as buffers and tumble 15 or 20 minutes. There'll be enough moisture left to block the blanket easily. When thoroughly air-dried, put back on the bed, plug in the controls and be ready for another comfortable night's sleep.

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

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

On October 1, 1768, a large British Fleet sailed into Boston and thus the agitation began. With each succeeding in-cident the atmosphere was becoming more tense, tempers were flaring, and the state was being set for war. Previously, the various colonies had very little in common, the value of the common, but the British Crown, by its harshness, had united the colonists in Common cause. The united the colonists in a common cause. The Revolution, that moderate name had hoped would never come, was being born in the hearts and minds of the people.

In the immediate years that followed never years

that followed many a hard fought battle with almost incredible hardships followed. Howev-ever, the colonists, with their liberty and rel-igious freedomat stake, had an undying cause ever before them for which they were willing to sacrifice their lives and fortunes to protect. and fortunes to protect. However, they did not fight alone in their own strength. The fact that an all pervading, overshadowing Presence was with them in whom many trusted and turned for help, is evidenced in a portion of our beclaration of Independence: "and for the support of this Declaration with a firm reliance on Divine Providence we mutually Providence we mutually pledge our lives, our fortunes and our Sacred Honor."

The Revolution, fought so desperately on land, was won in the end on the sea. Across the ocean lanes, the colon-ists were supplied with arms and reinforcements from France. Finally, control of the sea made victory possible at Yorktown, and Cornwallis Yorktown, and Cornwallis surrendered on Oct. 19, 1781. After two years of wearisome waiting, in April of 1873, the final treaty recogniz-ing American Independ-ence was received and ratified by Congress

ence was received and ratified by Congress. At last the American Colonies were a nation. Although many trials lay ahead, they staunchlay anead, they staunch-ly guarded their dearly won liberty, and now 200 years later, it is up to their descendents, us, to do the same, she said.

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

Roudebush Bill Would Bar Reds From Defense Jobs

A bill introduced last July by Congressman Richard L. Roudebush (R-Ind) to bar communists from working in U.S. defense plants has been approved by the House Rules Committee and will be brought before the full House soon for a vote.

House soon for a vote.
Roudebush drafted the
legislation last July
14 to blunt the harmful
effects of a U.S. Supreme Court edict permitting Reds to retain
sensitive jobs in key
American industrial installations engaged in

defense work.

The Roudebush bill, if approved, will amend the Internal Security Act of 1950 by adding a new section on defense facilities and industrial securities.

ial securities.

"There is now no adequate program in effect to forestall penetration of this vital area by saboteurs and espionage agents. This bill, in my opinion, will restore and improve the effectiveness of the former program," Roudebush stated.

The Roudebush proposal will (1) authorize the President to institute a personnel security screening program to determine the eligibility of individuals in defense plants with regard to preventing sabotage, espionage or acts of subversion; (2) restore personnel screening programs for the safeguards of vessels,

harbors, ports and waterfront facilities which were struck down January 16 by the Supreme Court.

The bill would also authorize a security clearance program for the protection of classified information released to U.S. industry. It would also estab-

It would also establish a cooperative voluntary security program with industry and labor for the protection of defense production.

Roudebush appeared before the House Rules Committee in recent days to testify in behalf of the bill. Two hours of debate are allotted for the legislation when it is presented for consideration in the House.
