State ready to approve TVSC projects

office of State Superintendent of Public Instruction is ready to approve the Public Instruction ready to approve high school built at Akron high school building projects at Akron and Mentone as submitted by the Tippecanoe Valley school board on Dec. 3, it was learned this week a letter from that office.

Approval will be givthe letter stated, if certain additions to locker and shower rooms are made at Mentone and Akron, if agricultural rooms and gymnasiums for physical education pur-poses are added to each and if two science rooms --one for physics and chemistry--are included in both schools. The also stipulated that a also stipulated that a general shop be includ-ed in the Mentone fac-ility similar to that provided in the Akron facility and that both sites must meet minimum standards.


The letter. Roger Birdsell, Astant Superintendent Public Instruction, sistant concluded by saying that the department was of the opinion that it was not the most desirable program for the provision of good, sound high school programs in TVSC.

The projects submitt-ed by the board on a 3-2 vote called for new academic and shop facacademic and shop fac-ilities for Akron grades 10, 11 and 12 and re-modeling of gymmasium and shower facilities and extension of the present gymmasium. The facilities were also to include principal's office, guidance health room, to health room, teacher's room, storage and work education materarea, center (library), English and speech room. social studies room, math room, two general classrooms, science room, commercial-typing combination, homemaking room with one teacher department, language room, art room, general shop, agriculture room, music room and any facilities that the state desired to have added or deleted.

Seek new Fulton Co. hospital

Members of the Woodlawn Hospital Board of Trustees met with the Fulton Co. Board of Com-missioners Monday to discuss a new hospital. They were told to take their plans to the Ful-ton Co. Council.

Hospital trustees, in presenting the idea to the commissioners, said a decision should be the idea to made and stressed that delays could hamper the community's chances for financial aid and keep the hospital from ac-creditation.

Woodlawn Hospital administrator Don Logue said an up-to-date hospical would be an in-centive for doctors to come to a community and said the board is not trying to replace the hospital because it is would be an intrying to replace the hospital because it is overloaded or filled to capacity all the time, but that they are trying to replace an old, wormout, obsolete unit.

The hospital board reportedly made the de-cision to build a new

hospital in October afnospital in October af-ter reviewing a survey of the present and fut-ure needs of Fulton Co. as compiled by Hewitt and Royer hospital construction consultants of Kansas City, Mo. Estimated cost of the

new hospital on a new site was listed \$2,850,000.

The construction conpany offered two alter-natives:

1. Construction of an addition to the north wing of the present hospital at a cost \$2,850,000.

2. Establishing "minimal program making maximum use of existing facilities" by remodeling and renovation plus building a smaller addition. Estimated costs was \$1,970,000, plus cost of additional land and demolition of the 1935 portion of the hospital.



Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Add yolk and all other ingredients, except cherries. Knead well with hands or spoon. Shape in small balls with hands dusted with confectioners sugar. Put on cookie sheet 3 inches apart. Press half a candied cherry in center of each cookie. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) until golden brown about 15 minutes. Cool on racks. Makes about 40 cookies.



"take what you want—use efficiently what you take" is rephrasing dinner table advice popular with parents and applying it to conserving electricity. While there's no shortage of electricity here, no one wants you to waste it. Consider these saving ideas:

household engineering Organize the refrigerator so all family members can find what they want without groping while warm air replaces cold . . . Plan your laundry to cut down on partial loads . . . Some engineering jobs are major, such as relocating the electric water heater so water doesn't cool off enroute to the places it is used most. Since they don't need a

flue, electric water heaters can go anywhere. **keep equipment in good working order** Not only repaired but clean. Even light bulbs. Use a soft cloth to dust. If they must be washed, remove from socket and wipe with a slightly damp cloth. Be scrupulous about chang-ing furnace filters (every 30 to 60 days) and emptying the lint filter on the clothes dryer (after every load).

be alert for energy losses A dripping hot water faucet empties a 60 gallon heater five times a month even if it drips only 90 drops a minute . . . Fireplace dampers left open and unsealed attic doors are escape hatches for heated

rethink some practices There are those who leave lights on with the argument that it is more costly to turn them on than leave them on for short periods. Not quite true: Turning lights on and off may shorten bulb life but it conserves electricity . . . Even the time honored practice of turning the thermostat way down at night doesn't always save: It takes additional heat to warm up areas that cool down by morning. A maximum turndown of 5 degrees is recommended.

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

Dear Editor: The first week of the Ceneral Assembly was one many committee hearings and the passage of six tax bills out of the House of Representa-tives. This tax package which included two control bills (one on a local level and one of state level) and a and a 4% sales tax, with all food relieved of the sales tax and 25% of the sales tax collections to be deposited in the property tax replacement fund. Another bill reduced the present corporate gross income tax by 5% and another bill would raise the adjusted gross income on a graduated basis from 2% to 5%, depending on individual income. An additional bill would distribute raised under the money previous bills mentionamounting to a reduction of your property taxes by 2%.

A further area os interest is the matter of reassessment. I sponsored a bill which will take the reassessment schedule back to every eight years and also measures whereby more time will be allow-

ed for preparation of the training of assess-ors, make-up of the assessing book and more time to review the assessments after they have been completed. We feel that the public can exert more pressure on public officials if the reassessing is under-taken in the same year throughout the state. I also agree that many counties using professional firms were dissatisfied with the results. Record Gas Sent Out During Cold

A record distribution of gas was noted this week-end throughout the upper third of the state, according to Dean H. Mitchell, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer, Northern Indiana Public Service Company (NIPSCO)

During a 24-hour period of Arctic weather ending at noon Sunday, Mitchell said the utility's 430,000 gas customers used 1.27 billion cubic feet of gas-to break the last mark by nearly 50 million cubic feet-as temperatures dropped to an average reading of -10 degrees in the 30 counties served my NIPSCO. An average reading of -13 was recorded during the 24 hours at the utility's plant in East Chicago.

It is a good idea to know what you are buy-ing. Some firewood sellers may offer such "measurements" as face cord, rick, rack, rank, stack, truckload or "pile" and buyers often believe they are getting

a cord.
A "cord" is defined A "cord" is defined as "the amount of wood which is contained in a space of 128 cubic feet This is a neatly piled rank of wood four feet four feet wide, high, four feet wide, and eight feet long. A face cord is a neat-

ly piled rank of wood four feet high and eight long and as wide ne lengths of the feet the sticks of wood. If the sticks are 16 inches long, you have one-third cord of wood, says Hoyle.

New Budget Will Cost You \$1,116.14

The new federal budget beginning next July 1 will cost Indiana tax-payers nearly \$5.9 billion as their share of the U.S. government, according to the Indiana according to the indiana State Chamber of Comm-erce which notes that amount is five times as much as the state's own budget for the same per-

President Nixon pro-posed a budget of \$246.3 billion in his message to Congress Monday.

to Congress Monday.
This figure was analyzed by Edward J. Bowman, director of the Indiana State Chamber's Taxation Department, using a formula worked out by the Council of State Chambers of Commerce.
Bowman's analysis disclosed that Indiana's share of the U.S. budget wil be \$5,886, 570,000 or 2.39 percent of

share of the cool and get wil be \$5,886, 570, 000 or 2.39 percent of the total. This share is .06 less than Indianal Appropriate than 2.45 percent share is .06 less than Indi-ana's 2.45 percent share

of the current (1972) budget. However, Hoos-ier taxpayers will have more to pay because the budget total is larger.

Analysis reveals the Analysis reveals the new budget will cost Hoosiers \$1,116.14 for each man, woman and child in Indiama.

This per-person figure compares to \$1,081. 20 for fiscal 1972 and \$955.26 for fiscal 1971. The constant rise illustrates the constant intrates the constant increase in federal spending, according to the State Chamber's executive vice president, John V. Barnett. Barnett.

"President Nixon's 1973 spending estimate of \$246.3 billion may be considered by some be considered by some to represent a relatively modest increase of \$9.7 billion over the current budget," Barnett said. "But remember, the 1972 total exceeded the 1971 outlay by \$25.2 billion.

He was in Russia as a member of the Select Sub-Committee on Educa-tion that is headed by Congressman John Brade-

mas, D-Ind., So. Bend. Landgrebe said he had checked with the U.S. State Department first and had been told there nothing wrong with taking Bibles to Russia. The suitcase containing 200 booklets of the Gos of St. Matthew, booklets containing the four Gospels and 30 plete Bibles, all printed in Russian, was never opened by customs off-icials. He left a carton of Bibles in Helsintaking the rest to Russia where he gave them to people in his hotel, in restaurants and on the street. He reported one woman wept on receiving her copy.

At the time he was detained, fellow committee member Congressman John Scheuer, D-N.Y., was held by secret police and charged with encouraging Russian Jews to emigrate to Israel and Alphonso Bell, R-Calif., another comm-ittee member, was accused by aiding Zionists. He noted Russians are doing just the opposite of the American educators concernschool size. Ining building ever stead of bigger schools, they are going to smaller scho-ols. "In fact," he ols. They feel that experience has smaller schshown that ools, closer to the homes of the students are more conducive to are more conducive to good education. Their goal is to get all sch-ools down to a maximum of 1.200 students and preferably down to 1,000 as a maximum.

He noted that Russia is planning to adopt the U.S. system of ten year compulsary schooling and that the Russians introduce foreign language in the students' early years.

Taxes and low pay are big problems in Russia, he noted, but he also noted that because of a police-state-type system, there is no crime on the streets and noted that nothing was ever taken from his room. 

News Of Interest To Homemakers

Poly unsaturated has become a household term the last few years. With the concern over cholesteral and its re-lationship with coronlationship with coron-ary heart disease, homemakers are becoming con-cerned with fats and their function in the diet.

Fats are needed in the diet diet to furnish energy to the body. It is recommended that the diet consist of twenty to thirty per cent fat. At the present time our diets consists of a larger percentage then the recommendation suggests.
A saturated fat con-

tains as many hydrogen atoms as it can hold. A poly unsaturated fat lacks hydrogen atoms. A saturated fat is a solid at room temperature while poly unsatur-ated fats are naturally liquid at room temperature but many of them have hydrogen forced in-

to them so that they become solids. Saturated fats from animal sources are as-sociated with cholesteral. Butter, lard, and egg yolks are high in cholesteral. Plant cholesteral. Plant sources such as corn oil, soybean oil, and cottonseed oil are unsaturated and low in cholesteral.

Cholesteral does serve many useful purposes in the body. Vitamin D is formed from sunlight with the help of cholesteral. It is also used in the formation of bile acid and the sex hormones.

The problem with cho-lesteral is that the body also produces it and it seems to produce varying amounts. Chol-esteral production in-creases during rapid creases during rapid weight gain, with diab-etes, during low thyroid activity and during other stress periods. Cholesteral has been

associated with hardening of the artery walls. This hardening walls. This hardening has also been found to contain protein, cal-cium and iron. More research needs to be done to find the exact cause coronary heart disease. Unless your doctor has put you on a specific diet, modera-





More electric power can help turn back the tide

A tide of millions of tons of pollutants is being dumped into the air we breathe, the water we drink and the communities we live in. Is your electric company a part of this pollution? Yes, but only a small part. We're working at elimination of smoke and soot at our plants, but some invisible gases such as sulphur dioxide can't be trapped with existing equipment. New equipment, now being developed, will be installed when it's perfected. Meantime, for every pound of pollution electric generation causes, electricity powers the equipment to remove tons of pollutants from the air and water. Huge electric motors pump waste through treatment plants, to clean the water before it returns to our rivers and lakes. Purification of water for drinking takes millions more kilowatts. Electric air filtering equipment in thousands of factory, school and hospital stacks trap smoke before it fouls the air. In recycling waste products, electrically powered machines shred and compress trash, cans and junk into reusable raw material. More electricity, not less, is needed to help solve our pollution problems.
