Dittman scores 50 as Vikings win trophy

Coach Floyd Henson's Tippecanoe Valley Vikings brought home the first trophy in their short history Saturday night as they outclassed Oregon-Davis 94-80 to win the Culver holiday tourney.

The big story in the game was the scoring antics of Ron Dittman, who shattered the school scoring record, the Culver gym record, and his own personal record by ripping the nets for 50 points.

The game opened with all the fury the championship game was entitled to, as both teams came out firing, and after six minutes the score was knotted at 16-16. But the Vikings reeled off nine straight points to end the quarter with a 25-16 lead. At this point, a shooting match between Dittman and the Bobcat's Grover Morris had developed as the two had scored 12 and 10 points, respectively. But in the second quarter Dittman closed that contest

and opened the game itself, scoring 20 at the team's 23 points as TVHS went to the locker room with a 48-35 lead.

In the second half very little changed as the Vikings worked at shutting off any offense Oregon-Davis could muster and scored almost at will itself. The lead ballooned to over 20 midway through the fourth quarter and the bench finished it off at 94-80 to win the tourney.

NOTE: I had just taken a series of pictures of butchering homestyle at the George Sheetz residence when Mrs. Kessler submitted a reminiscence of butchering day, so I chose to use her text because the basic day is still the same. And cracklings are ever bit as good now with a bit of salt as they were then. It's a lot of work, but nothing is quite like butchering day. AS

Our neighbors had boys in college so they al-

ways liked to butcher when the boys were home to help or hinder during the holidays. We were up at crack of dawn although I was never sure about that. I still get up early from habit but I have yet to hear the crack of dawn.

The water in two big iron kettles must be hot enough to scald by the time there is daylight to see the pigs' eyes. Each man of the house must shoot and stick his own pigs. In case you

don't know, pigs are stuck in the neck with a sharp butcher knife so the heart still beating will pump the blood all out and leave clean meat. My father taught me early in life how to sharpen a knife on a steel. Time is never lost keeping a knife sharp. I hate dull knives in the kitchen. The pigs were then soused up and down in a barrel of scalding water and the business of scraping all the hair off began. Farmers are so clean about their work, especially about butchering with plenty of hot and cold water to keep the carcasses and tables washed. The weather is usually cold at butchering time and I well remember a day when a strong east wind blew. The thermometer reached -12° before mid-afternoon and the meat froze before it got cold.

After the hogs are scraped, the heads are cut off. A row of hog heads on a butcher board is a sight to behold. Then they are pulled up on racks and the insides

can be removed. That is a man's work. The women had padded the old work table in the summer kitchen with papers and were ready to begin taking out the lard. The whole insides of a big, fat hog were dumped on the table and the smell of butchering filled the air, especially if even one tiny cut was in the wrong place and the gas leaked out.

But it was all fun and the helpers all stayed for dinner. The men were busy, and you would be surprised how soon a fat got bathing in a mud puddle turned into ham, bacon, pork chops and sausage. The boys loved to stuff sausage and one had to be quick-handed to keep everything from going haywire. They would turn the crank before the casings were in place. We had to hurry with the stuffing because a sausage stuffer and lard press are all the same and the lard must not be scorched.

We grew lots of popcorn and when the lard and cracklings were all out of the big iron kettle we dumped in a dipper full of popcorn and it filled the kettle and air with goodness.

Pig tails baked brown, tenderloin browned in a big kettle of hot lard even cracklings with a sprinkle of salt are all delicious eaten outdoors when the weather is snappy and one is good and hungry.

We walked home through the snow tired and happy just as the old round moon was peeping up over the straw stack.

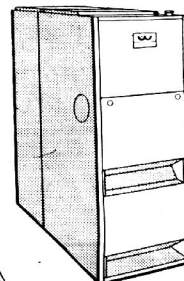

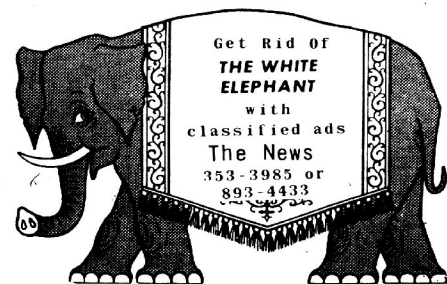

Jan. 20 is TVHS moving day

January 20 will be the first day of classes in Tippecanoe Valley's new high school if no unforeseen difficulties arise. "But the building won't be completed," Superintendent Robert Forbes said Monday.

Forbes said almost 300 elementary students from the north campus now attend makeshift classrooms in the Youth League building and town

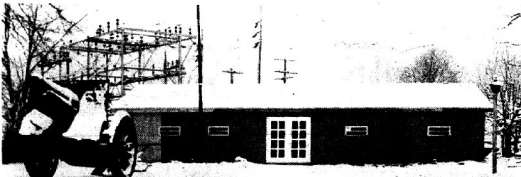
hall in Mentone, a Burket church and rooms at the Akron campus that formerly were lounges and preparation areas. "The parents of these

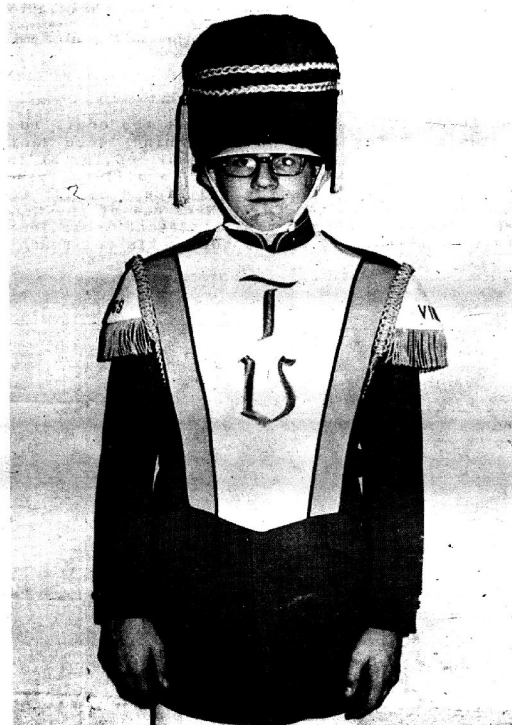
NEW AKRON CLERK Gerald Mangus, right, was sworn in Thursday night by Justice of the Peace Abraham Caldwell.

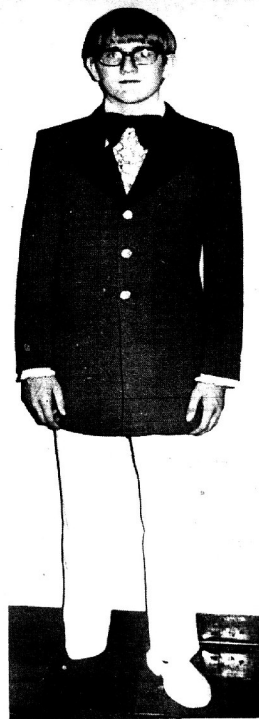

If your New Year's resolution is to loose those extra pounds you picked up during the holidays, perhaps you need to give some thought to your diet. The most common reason for going off diets is boredom. Especially for the homemaker who has to prepare a well rounded meal for her family and then serves herself a grapefruit half.

There are four important steps to effective dieting if you are serious about losing weight. You should see your doctor for a check up and get his approval for your diet. He can give you help in planning your calorie intake. Secondly, set a goal for yourself. These people who are continually on diets don't seem to diet seriously. Choose a holiday, birthday, or just a certain date that you want to achieve losing ten or twenty pounds. It's an

incentive if you have a goal to work towards.

The most difficult step in weight reduction is to restrain your eating habits. It was your eating habits that put these extra pounds on so don't diet and then go back to your old eating habits and gain them back. Examine your eating pattern. Do you include many of the low calorie fruits and vegetables in your daily food pattern? Do you snack? Do you clean up what the children leave on their plates? Do you take two helpings? There is really no need to exclude everything good from your diet if you restrain your eating habits.

It is an interesting age that we live in. We buy a membership to the Y then drive over to work out for exercise. In years gone by exercise was a way of life, but now we have to make an effort to exercise.

Exercise alone will not take off those excess pounds but it will help. Plan to include more physical activity in your daily schedule whether you are on a diet or not.

If you are counting calories don't forget to count nutritive value also. A sixteen ounce soft drink and thirty potato chips contain as many calories as an eight ounce glass of chocolate milk and a peanut butter sandwich but there is no comparison in nutritive value. The milk and sandwich provide needed nutrients for utilization by the body. All foods contain calories so choose your calories by the company they keep.



April 3 tornado destroyed the Talma school," he said, "but we think it would be better if we got these children into permanent classrooms as soon as possible."

The school's gymnasium, also put into use before it was completely finished, has drawn large crowds for the Valley's home games, but spectators have not been allowed to enter the main portion of the school. "We'll probably let down the barriers for the January 17 and 18 home games and let the public roam through the new building," Forbes said.

Dropping of the barriers and the January 20 move are very tentative, he cautioned, adding, "We never know what will come up to change our plans."

John Hand Assists Education Planning

Dr. John S. Hand, Director of the Indiana Facilitator Center, Logansport, has been selected by the U. S. Office of Education (USOE) to assist in planning the current year's evaluation for the National Diffusion Network.

Son of the Rev. and Mrs. Lamoin Hand, Akron, Dr. Hand was one of four state facilitator center directors who met with USOE personnel in Yorktown Heights, New York, on January 6 and 7 to determine the data that Facilitator Centers and Developer/Demonstration (D/D) projects will collect this year for evaluation purposes.

The National Diffusion Network, sponsored by USOE, consists of 54 state facilitator centers and 81 D/D projects. The facilitator centers serve as "brokers or linking agencies" between local schools and the innovative education programs that were developed and are being demonstrated by the D/D projects.

The Indiana Facilitator Center, sponsored and supervised by the Logansport Community School Corporation, works in cooperation with the Indiana Department of Public Instruction. Funded by USOE under Title III of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, the Center at Logansport serves the entire state of Indiana. The Center is located in the administration building of the Logansport Community Schools.

A variety of services is offered to Indiana schools. Informational files about the D/D projects are maintained at the Center. Available services include assistance in investigating

D/D programs, help in matching local needs with D/D program capabilities, and aid in developing plans for the adoption of selected D/D programs. The Center is authorized also to defray some of the cost of such investigation and adoption. Indiana schools, both public and private, are encouraged to use the Center.

IEERB Board hears TVSC dispute

A two-day hearing in the Kosciusko Co. courthouse last week moved one of three disputes between the Tippecanoe Valley Classroom Teachers Association (TVCTA) and the Tippecanoe Valley school board within one month of resolution.

Michael Swigart, Valparaiso, a hearing officer for the Indiana Education Employment Relations Board (IEERB), heard testimony from teachers, school administrators and teachers on Tuesday and Wednesday in an unfair labor practices complaint filed by Phyllis Gearhart, an Akron element-

ary teacher and TVCTA president.

Her complaint charged the school board discriminated against TVCTA by refusing the use of school facilities for teacher association meetings, eliminating the standard teacher preparation period each day during the 1974-75 school year, transferring

TVCTA members within the school corporation, denying raises to five TVCTA members and by referring to TVCTA members and officers as "union agitators."

Dismissed during the two-day hearing were two parts of the complaint, one that charged the

No. Miami senior killed in beating



Doug Zintsmaster

Only five days from graduation, Doug Zintsmaster, a North Miami senior whose immediate plans for the future included farming and marriage, was beaten to death early Saturday morning at Blair's restaurant, a truck stop located on US 31 north of Peru.

Reportedly kicked in the groin and rendered unconscious, he was kicked repeatedly in the head and beaten with a belt found at the scene. He died enroute to Dukes

hospital, Peru. An autopsy Saturday determined he died of a pulmonary edema (police said he choked on his vomit), massive head injuries and severe chest injuries. The report said the kicks to the head resulted in a crushed skull.

No motive has been determined for the beating, and it is uncertain if Zintsmaster knew his assailants. Arrested an hour later and charged in connection with the death were Steven Alberts, 19, Peru, held in Miami Co. jail on a \$15,000 bond, and Michael Wilson, 19, also of Peru, charged with aggravated assault and freed early Saturday after he posted a \$3,000 bond.

It is believed at least four other people were outside the restaurant at the time of the assault, but only the two charged were suspected of taking part. A number of witnesses saw the beating take place after the two entered the restaurant and told Zintsmaster someone outside wanted to see him. When he went outside, the two attacked him,

according to witnesses who provided police with a description of the car Alberts and Wilson were driving. The accused assailants were apprehended a short time later.

Zintsmaster's car was damaged recently by one of the five juveniles riding with Alberts and Wilson. Police were not

school board with promising raises to some teachers and then not raising all teacher salaries and another that charged the board with dismissing four teachers, Freda Baker, Barbara Titus, Marsha Groff Roderick and Sara Strain, without cause.

Mrs. Gearhart charges the school board actions against TVCTA are in violation of a section of a 1973 state collective bargaining law for teachers and constitute an unfair labor practice against TVCTA, and she asked in her complaint that an IEERB finding direct the school board to cease the practices. Her original complaint, amended prior to the hearing, was filed in August, 1974.

Testifying Tuesday were TVHS principal Forst Dunnuck, school board member Dr. Wymond Wilson, Mrs. Gearhart Duane Smith, vice-president of TVCTA, and Norman Metzger, one of five tenure teachers who did not receive a \$500 raise granted other teachers.

Another of the five teachers, David Creighton, testified on Wednesday as did TVSC superintendent Robert Forbes and board member Richard Goshert.

Swigart requested summaries of labor law from attorneys for each side

by January 21 before he forwards his summary of the hearing and recommendation for action to IEERB for a decision.

Other members of the present school board are Dr. John McKee, Donald Snipes and Fred Kindig, McKee, Maurice Coplen and Philip Lash, along with Goshert and Wilson, were members of the board at the time the teachers mentioned were dismissed.

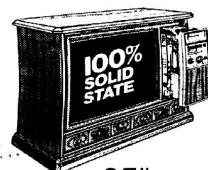

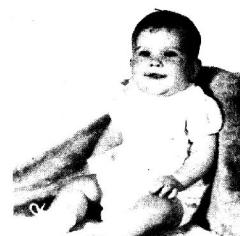

Vikings Top Caston

The Tippecanoe Valley Vikings proved to any skeptics that they could win the close ones against good teams Friday night when they held off a talented Caston Comet five for a 72-67 win.

Tippecanoe seemingly took control in the third quarter as Dittman found the range, and Williams, Dittman and John Lash started to dominate the boards. The lead ballooned to 13 twice, and Valley led 56-46 at the third quarter break.

Caston waited to make its move until the four minute mark of the last quarter, trailing 60-49. They then instituted a tough press, the same strategy that had allowed them to upset Rochester under similar conditions in their opener. The adjusted defense eventually took its toll as the Comets battled back to within one point at 66-65 with just over a minute left. But in the final minute Phil Adams coolly dropped six clutch free throws and the Viking defense forced three turnovers as the Vikings held on for a 72-67 final count. As usual, Ron Dittman

was the leading Viking scorer with 22, but he had a strong supporting cast led by Ryan Williams and Phil Adams with 19 apiece. Dittman and Williams grabbed 13 rebounds apiece, but the big difference was at the charity stripe, where Tippecanoe connected on 24 of 34 shots to just five of eight for Caston. John Zartman led Caston with 22.

The Tippecanoe B-team rolled on to win number nine, stomping Caston 52-32. Eric Alspaugh scored 12 to pace the win.

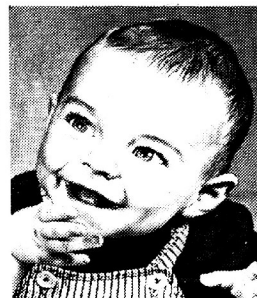

Broom Polo offers fun for

"Gentlemen, mount your beasts," Dick Fretz calls. Ten men leap onto their horses, nudging them into starting position.

It's time for the Marshall Co. broom polo team to go into action.

Broom polo differs quite a bit from regulation polo, although, like its game's ancestor, the playing area is divided into two courts. But, instead, of wooden mallets, each player carries a well-taped broom that has had all the bristles cut off to just below the stitching line. And instead of a ball, Fretz will place a volley ball on the center chalk line as he blows the whistle for play to begin.

Running for cover as he blows the whistle, Fretz grins broadly. A retired Bourbon barber, the lively septuagenarian was one of the founders of the team five years ago. Unable to play because of an injury sustained in a horse race this summer, he is the team's referee during practice sessions.

At the sound of the whistle, one of each team's two forwards rides towards the ball, striking it with his broom. If one succeeds in hitting the ball in

to the opposing court, his fellow forward joins him as they attempt to score a goal. Only the forwards are allowed across the center line, and only five players can be in a court at one time so the opposing team's forwards go to the other court, leaving their guards and goalie to prevent a goal by the invading forwards.

If the forwards are successful, they will drive the ball between twin barrels at either end of Dale Dodson's barn, site of all practice sessions. But each team has a goalie astride a horse guarding the goals, and it is difficult to get past him. Sometimes the horses become so involved in the game, as happened during this particular practice session, that one will actually nudge the ball through and score a goal.

The local team usually boasts 11 or 12 players, easily dividing into two five-men teams for practice. Come tournament time, they will alternate as they face their opponents---the Starke Co. Sheriff's Posse, a team from DeMott and one from Valparaiso at the Bass Lake Horse Palace. As far as Fretz knows, there are no other broom polo teams in the state.

Four five-minute quarters are played. At the end of each period, Fretz blows the whistle and calls, "Time! By now, the horses have become drenched with perspiration. Steam rises in clouds as they are walked for five minutes.

fun for area horsemen

Broom polo is as simple as that, but its simplicity says nothing of the fun, the exhilaration, the competitiveness of the game. Or of the humor. Imagine a volley ball struck full force with a broom. It goes places higher, faster and with more bounce than a wooden ball. And the horse that carried its rider to make the attack isn't frightened by the "kerwhump" as the ball ricochets off beams. The horses are always ready for more action, almost anticipating the riders' desires. Even to nudging in occasional goals.

And don't let the fact that players are restricted to two courts mislead you. There's always plenty of action.

And there are always broken brooms. The team goes through brooms like a 10-year old at a movie goes through popcorn.

"We'll give a quarter for every good broom we get," Fretz says. "And we can use a lot of them." While the handles need to be strong, elevator brooms are too heavy. "Mom's worn-out kitchen broom is best," he says. "And don't worry if the bristles are worn, we'll cut them off. All we need is the stitching line."

Admission's free at the Dodson barn. Visitors are welcome. And if you come bearing a broom, they'll pay you.

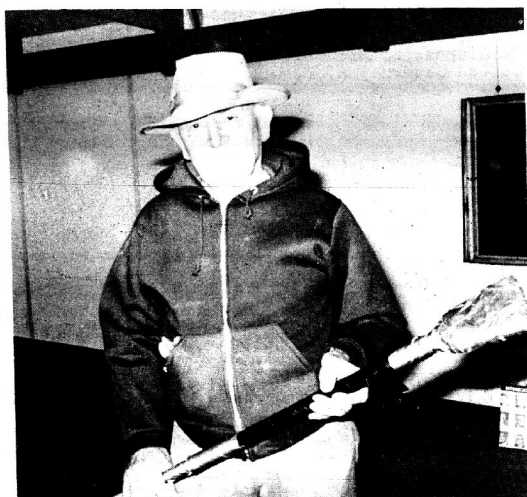

News Of Interest To Homemakers

Rugs and carpets represent a large investment. When you invest in room size or wall to wall carpets, some special cleaning equipment is needed. There will also be some maintenance expenses if you are to receive value from your carpet through the years.

The type of vacuum you use will largely determine how well your carpet will look. Tests have shown that carpets are kept cleaner and last longer when an upright type vacuum is used. The tank type is best only when the pile of the rug might be disarranged by an upright model.

Vacuum carpets daily in areas of heavy traffic and weekly or twice weekly in all carpeted

areas. Empty the dirt receptacle often to insure best possible cleaning from your vacuum.

If a soiled carpet seems to require shampooing, vacuum the rug twice as well as you ordinarily would. Home shampooing needs to be done with care to make sure the backing does not become wet. For this reason home shampooing is not recommended. Carpeting is a large investment so it

is worthwhile to get it professionally cleaned. Many families use this service once a year and it is said to double the life of many carpets.

Usually after the holidays carpet and rugs go on sale. If you are considering purchasing floor coverings plan ahead and buy at the lowest price. Since replacing a floor covering can be done anytime of year, it can be planned at sale time.

There's Poison Under The Sink

If you look under the kitchen sink in most homes, you'll find enough acids and poisons to kill yourself. Although there are hundreds of brands of cleaning products on the market, they are all basically the same. They are either alkaline, acids, detergents, abrasives, bleaches, sanitizers or spirit solvents.

Most of these products are dangerous only when misused. The Federal Hazardous Substances Act requires that dangerous products must have a statement on the label describing the hazards by using the product. If a child should happen to get into cleaning products, most labels tell what antidote to use and how to handle the situation. Read the labels so that you know how to use the product safely.

One of the most common accidents involving home cleaning products is the mixture of toilet bowl cleaner and bleach. Used independent of each other they are fine, but when mixed they give off deadly chlorine gas. Never add bleach when using a bowl cleaner. Flush the toilet and then add the bleach.

Children are usually the victims in accidents involving cleaning compounds. Storing cleaners under the kitchen

sink is a poor practice. They should be stored in a cabinet that is high enough off the floor that small children cannot reach it or lock the cabinet. Don't transfer cleaners into other bottles such as soft drink bottles. Handle all cleaning products carefully for your own safety and the safety of your family.

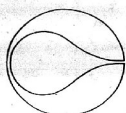

Some Teachers Covered By New Act

Indiana school teachers will be eligible for unemployment benefits to be administered on a case by basis during the summer vacation, according to a recently passed Emergency Jobs and Unemployment Assistance Act (EJUA). Also covered by EJUA will be local government employees previously ineligible for unemployment benefits. Approximately 12 million persons will be covered under the new act.

Indiana teachers are not covered by state unemployment benefits. The \$2.5 billion allocation for benefits has been appropriated from general revenues of the federal government. Local governmental units or school boards will pay nothing toward the program as it is currently outlined.

Claims may not be filed until a teacher is

unemployed, a provision that prevents a teacher from applying at this point for unemployment compensation benefits beginning in June of 1975. The benefits received will be based upon compensation received for the period of 52 weeks prior to the date of claim. The amount of benefit then is computed based upon a percentage of salary plus dependents. Teachers receiving paychecks on a 12-month basis are eligible because the money represents services previously performed.

The law will cover teachers only as long as they are available for work and can prove they are actively seeking employment and are unable to obtain jobs. This will rule out those with summer teaching loads, graduate students and those with summer employment or those who do not wish to work over the recess period.

area still recovering from the horrors of last April's tornado but wreaked minor damage in comparison.

In one of the more unique incidents created by the gale, 57 customers of the Fulton Co. REMC were left without electricity for almost two hours when a chicken was blown onto a "hot wire" near the junction of Ind. 25 and 331 in northern Newcastle township at 12:10 p.m. The shock killed the chicken and shorted out the line. It took until 1:55 p.m. for workers to locate the trouble spot and make necessary repairs.

Most serious of the damage was a fire at the Paul Schmidt home on the north shore of Lake Manitou that threatened to spread to neighboring homes. Akron and Mentone firemen joined Fulton, Kewanna, Macy and Leiters Ford in helping the Rochester department and were successful in keeping the fire contained.

Forbes given "blank check" for supplies

Whether or not supplies and equipment requested by Tippecanoe Valley High School teachers are needed will be determined by school superintendent Robert Forbes, according to action taken at Monday night's school board meeting that, as he said, gave him a "blank check" to purchase any or all of the materials. Estimating the purchase orders would total between fifty and sixty thousand dollars, Forbes had asked that specifications be drawn up and a notice to bidders be published. Fred Kindig and Don Snipes voted no to the motion to allow Forbes to pick and choose, but Dr. John McKee, Dr. Wymond Wilson and Richard Goshert voted in favor. McKee said further delay in acquiring the materials would hamper the efforts of the teachers. At his request, Forbes said he would notify the teachers which of their requests had been ordered and which had been denied.

Specifications for gas and oil and for an 84-passenger Ford school bus were approved. Notices to bidders for each are published in this week's NEWS. Bids will be opened Feb. 13. In defending his request for the 84-passenger bus, Forbes said it was exceptionally well-built and would easily have a 15-year lifespan as opposed to the other buses' 10-year life expectancy.

The large bus will be used in an area that has its buses loaded to capacity, almost to the point of adding another bus, he said, agreeing with Goshert that the savings made on the extra bus driver's salary alone would easily pay the difference between a smaller bus and the big one. In addition to a larger gas tank and

FM radio, the bus's specifications call for an outside public address system, which Forbes described as "the coming thing." A Diesel engine was added to the specifications as an alternate at the request of Snipes.

No financial report was given. Forbes said this would be mailed to board members as the books were late in being closed because the money from Fulton and Kosciusko counties had been late arriving.

Akron park moves to goal

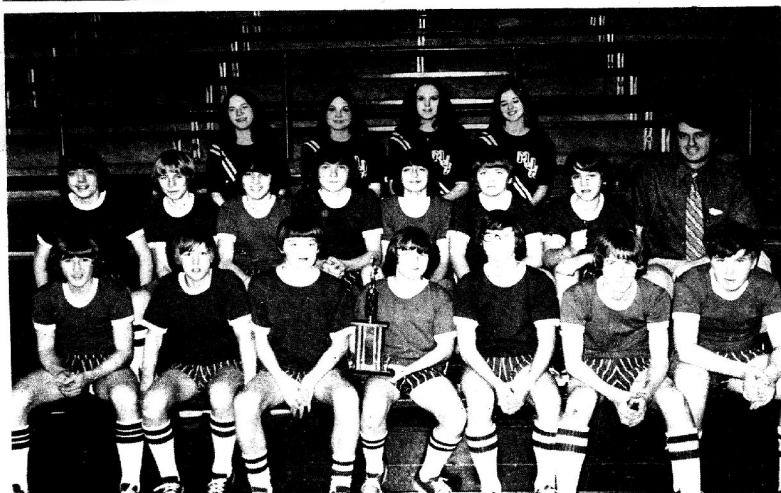

Disaster assistance available for victims

Families or individuals experiencing loss of all or part of their homes or personal belongings during the April 3, 1974 tornado may be eligible for federal grants.

Applications must be filed between January 13 and March 15, 1975.

The American National Red Cross has been named by Gov. Otis Bowen to assist the state Ci-

vil Defense Agency in processing applications for grants.

The grants may be made only to eligible disaster victims who have necessary expenses or serious needs that were not met by federal-state disaster assistance, according to Indiana Civil Defense Director Milton M. Mitnick.

Kosciusko Co. Red Cross case workers recently attended a workshop in Ft. Wayne to enable them to assist with disaster grant applications.

Taking the training and qualifying as caseworkers in addition to Inez Devenney, executive director, were Red Cross disaster chairmen, the Rev. Herbert Edwards, Atwood; Edith Baumgartner, Milford; Mrs. Howard Horn, Mentone; Lucille Koontz, Sidney; Sue Weyer, Warsaw, and Ruth Fellows, also of Warsaw.

The grants, which have a maximum limit of \$5,000, are available only to cover losses of homes, furniture or other household goods and belongings. They do not apply to businesses that were victims of the tornado.

Mrs. Devenney said the caseworkers were instructed not to take into consideration any cash, credit, power, real estate or personal property or income from the sale of real estate that the applicant may have at the present time.

The amount of insurance that could be applied to the loss and

We attended the Viking basketball game Saturday evening in the new TVHS and then took a tour of the new school building.

When I first started to school it was at Akron. I was in kindergarten there. Tural Haldeman was my teacher. That year we moved to Mentone. My dad moved by horse and wagon. He came early one morning with a load of our household goods. While he was gone our barn burned to the ground. We had our first car then and everyone was afraid to go in and push it out. Was afraid of an explosion. There was some stock in the barn, too.

My brother, Earl, was in the second grade. The teacher let him go home and he got tin cans and filled them with water and threw on the fire. Being's there was no way to get word to my dad he did not know what happened until he returned home that night late.

A Mr. and Mrs. Slater had traded their farm where Leonard Smith now lives for our town property in Akron.

My dad drove a horse-drawn school hack (we called it then). We attended school at Palestine, a little one-room frame building with a pot-bellied stove to warm it. There were eight grades in that one room and Dale Morrison was our teacher. We didn't have flush toilets then, just an outside building with a board seat with two holes in it. We often had to wait our turn to get in. We used old catalogues for wiping paper (not soft like today). I went there a

year, then came to Mentone. Clara Warren was my teacher then. The school building set where Dr. Wilson's office now is and a Mr. Baker and Sam Sanders were the janitors when I went there. Our class was the next to the last class to graduate from that building.

Jessie Brunner was one of our principals, also Dale Kelley. There were four girls and seven boys who graduated when I did. Letha Jefferies Menzie, Josephine Schrader Sanders, Amelia Bowman, Pearl Davis Horn, Charles Cole, Phillip Blue, Elery Nellans, Wilson White, Raymond (Bunk) Hudson, Wm. (Shiney) Blackburn and Virgil Shirey.

We had a good basketball team too then. The boys had cold and hot showers but had to go to the gym (now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Russell Eber) to play ball and take physical ed. We were to run through the cold shower last so we wouldn't take cold so easily because we had to run back to the school house for our next class or dismissal.

Members of our class are probably grandparents of children now attending TVSC.

We had an outside pump to get drinking water and we each had our own drinking cup and carried our lunches everyday. I still have my tin cup and dinner bucket, antiques now.

Howard went to Tippecanoe one-room school. He got a scholarship to Greencastle when he graduated. Went one year.

Kids, appreciate your new school and all the facilities. We never had it so good, but we have lots of happy and sad school day memories.

other forms of assistance from governmental or private agencies, such as the Red Cross, will, however, be taken into consideration when the state civil defense agency determines the applicant's eligibility.

Mrs. Devenney said the applications are simple to complete. They request the applicant's name, address, dependents, employment, history in applying for disaster assistance from other agencies and the amount of their grant request, up to \$5,000.

In addition, the applicant must compose a statement detailing the serious need for the grant or expenses incurred from the disaster. Penalties for making false statements on the application are also listed.

The grant program is part of the 1974 federal disaster relief act passed on May 20, 1974, to cope with the needs of the nation's tornado victims.

Applications may be made at the Kosciusko Co. Red Cross office from 9 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday and from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. on Wednesday. Applicants are requested to call the Red Cross at 267-5244 for an appointment so that a caseworker can be on hand to conduct an interview.

Fulton Co. disaster victims can apply at the Red Cross office in the Knapp Building, 100 West Ninth St., Rochester, from 1 to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

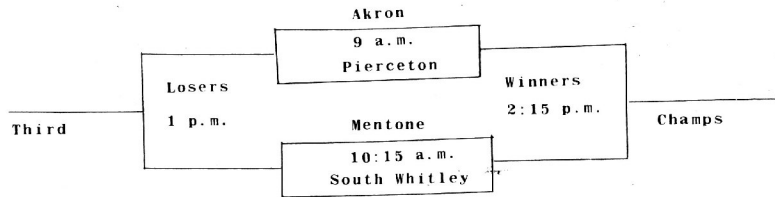

Yazel for a similar position at Mentone. McKee and Snipes were appointed to the board of finance. Sole function of this board is to designate two banks as

depository for school funds.

During the audience period, Doug Mappin asked why tenure teachers had been bypassed by less experienced personnel when the staff of the new school was chosen. Forbes said tenure was not a factor, that licensed areas and extra-curricular activities were the deciding points.

Saying too much confusion existed by having the school name so nearly like that of the corporation, Goshert moved the board adopt the name most favored by TVSC students--Valley High. Wilson voted for the motion, but McKee, Kindig and Snipes opposed it. "You're two years too late," McKee said. Killed for lack of majority was Goshert's motion to allow expenses for board members to attend the national school board convention in Miami in April. Wilson voted yes while Kindig and Snipes voted no. McKee abstained. Goshert said a member who attended the meetings and applied himself, could easily bring back information more valuable than the cost of the trip.

Mention of the insurance package for teachers and other school personnel prompted an hour-long executive session from which board members returned to give their approval to establishing a committee to investigate various plans. McKee said, "If two-thirds of the present policy holders agree they don't like the present plan and can come up with a different one, it will be presented to other policy holders for consideration." He said that in the future the superintendent would write specifications on health and accident policies for board members to take to policy holders for suggestions. Board members would then decide which policy was best and put it up to a policy holder vote.

The insurance question was one that had been tabled for several months and stemmed from complaints by personnel that they had been given no alternative but to

accept a new policy this fall.

Grand Jury Hears Beating Case

After two days of work and 19 witnesses, the grand jury at Peru late last Tuesday indicted two 19-year-old Peru residents in the beating death Jan. 10 of Douglas Zintmaster, R. 1, Roann.

The six-member panel also recommended accessory to voluntary manslaughter and perjury charges be brought against a 16-year-old Peru boy who will be dealt with in juvenile court.

The indictments charged Steven Alberts with voluntary manslaughter and Michael Wilson with being an accessory to voluntary manslaughter, charges similar to what they were charged with following Zintmaster's death.

Alberts, who had been in jail because he was unable to make bond of \$15,000, was rearrested on a new warrant and his bond affirmed. However, his bond was later lowered to \$8,000, and he was released. Wilson was to turn himself in at the jail, have the new arrest warrant read

to him and then be released on bond he had already posted.

The 16-year-old was to be arrested and possibly jailed. Deputy prosecutor James Grund said the charge against the latter came because the jury thought he had a hand in setting up the beating.

Arraignment of Alberts is set for Feb. 6.

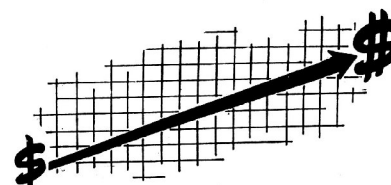

One Thousand Fewer Indiana Farms

Indiana farms totaled 106,000 in 1974--about 1,000 fewer than in 1973, report state-federal agricultural statisticians at Purdue University.

However, preliminary estimates for 1975 indicate that Hoosier farm numbers will remain the same as last year.

Total land in farms at 17.5 million acres has remained constant since 1969 and is expected to continue at this level during 1975, the statisticians say.

Average size of Indiana farms last year was 165 acres, one more than in 1973. The statisticians expect the size to remain the same this year.

There were 2.8 million farms in the United States last year; this was less than one percent fewer than in 1973. Average size of U.S. farms was 384 acres, one more than in 1973.

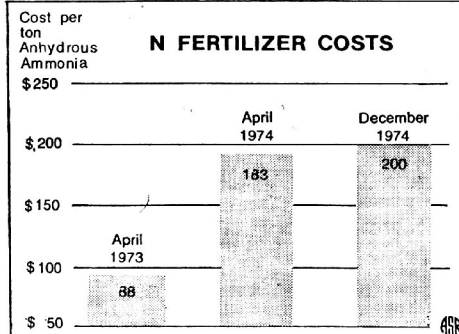
Grain Crop Production Workshop

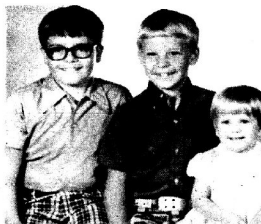

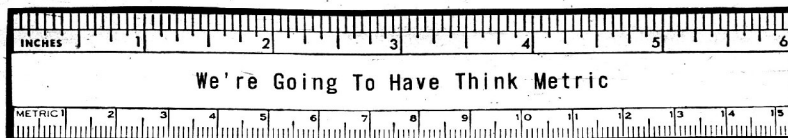

When the nation eventually goes on the metric system, a lot of old nursery rhymes, catch phrases and proverbs may have to be revised.

Instead of saying "A miss is as good as a mile," it will be "A miss is as good as 1.6 kilometers."

"He's all wool and .9 meters wide" will have to substitute for "He's all wool and a yard wide."

It will sound strange for a teacher to tell a youngster, "Don't hide your light under a 35-liter basket," rather than "Don't hide your light under a bushel."

The nursery rhyme that tells us "There was a crooked man and he walked a crooked mile" is going to sound funny when it comes out "There was a crooked man and he went a crooked 1.6 kilometers."

Gone, too, will be the "ten gallon hat". In its place will be a 38 liter hat, and 28.4 grams of prevention will be worth 453.6 grams of cure instead of "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure."

Strange as it may sound, our language as well as our measurements will be altered considerably when the change is made.

Why change? Because all the other major countries of the world are on the metric system. If we want to continue to be a leader in world trade, we are going to have to make the change, a change actually recommended by George Washington and Thomas Jefferson more than 200 years ago. The metric system was legalized in this country in 1966 and is now used by scientists, pharmacists and nutritionists.

And while our familiar measurements work, those who have tried metric like it better, because its real beauty lies in its simplicity. It is based on decimals, like our monetary system, in which ten of any unit of measure are equal to one of the next largest unit. For example: ten cents equal one dime; ten dimes equal one dollar.

The basic unit of length is the meter. If we want to work with smaller units of length, the meter is subdivided into ten equal parts called decimeters. If we want still smaller units, the meter is subdivided into 100 equal parts (centimeters) or into 1,000 equal parts (millimeters.) For longer distances, decimal multiples of the meter are used, of which the most common prefix is the kilo. Kilo means 1,000; hence one kilometer equals 1,000 meters.

The basic unit of volume is the liter, which is the volume of one cubic decimeter. Subdivisions and multiples of the liter are derived by adding the same prefixes to "liter" as to "meter."

The basic unit of weight is the gram, which is the weight of one cubic centimeter of water. Prefixes for subdivisions and multiples of the gram are the same as for meter and liter.

In the metric system, heat is measured in degrees centigrade with water freezing at 0 and boiling at 100. Normal body temperature is 37 degrees.

The change will not

be inexpensive. In fact, it is estimated it will cost eleven billion dollars, but in the long run, changing our thinking may prove the hardest.

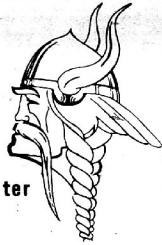

onds left won it for Mentone. Fields led the Bulldogs with 16 and Jeff Pritchard added 14 points.

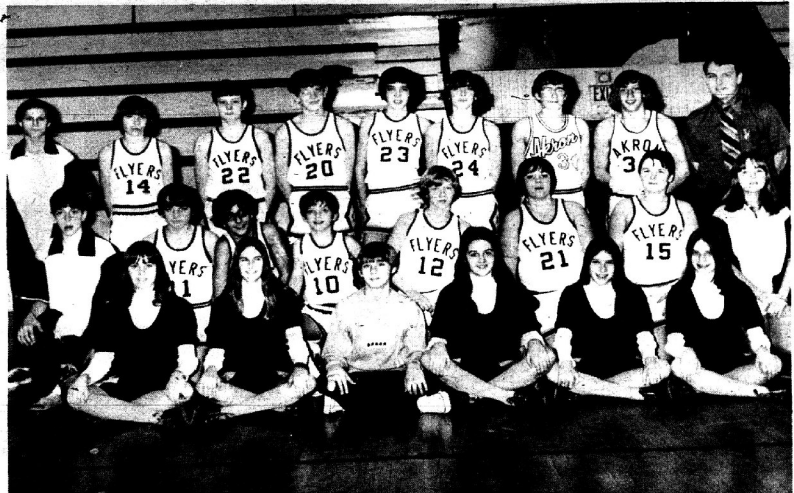

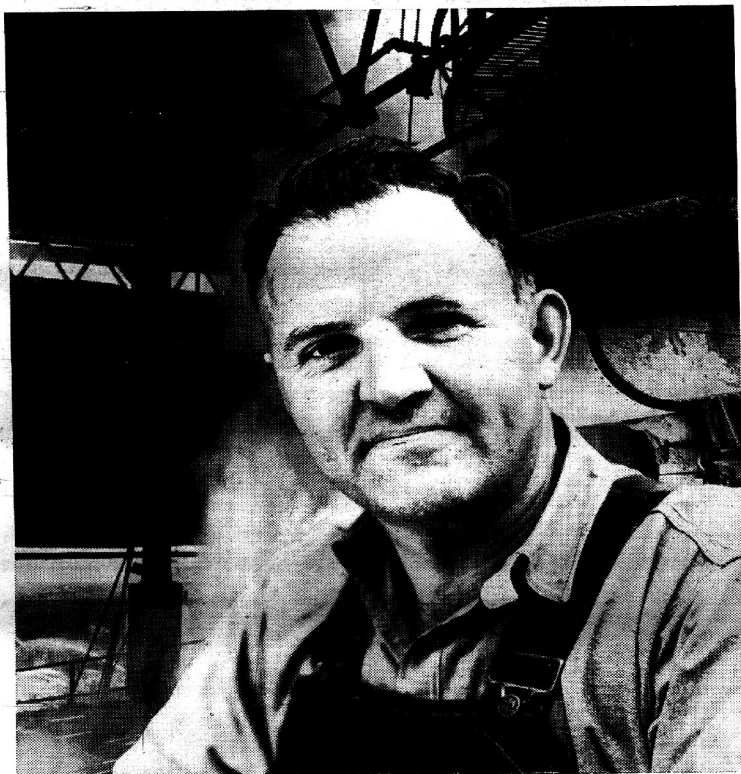

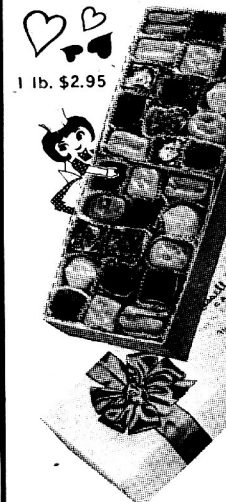
