Fithian will open TVHS adult ag classes

Rep. Floyd Fithian, a member of the House Agriculture Committee, will discuss foreign and domestic agriculture policy Monday night in the lecture room of Tippecanoe Valley High School to open this year's adult agriculture classes.

All interested persons are welcome to attend any of the classes, which are set to begin at 7:30 p.m. in the school lecture room and conclude at approximately 9:15 with refreshments.

On January 12, Russell Arvin, a field representative of the South Bend Internal Revenue Service, will discuss

what to do or expect in case of an audit, preparing for an audit, what the auditor looks for and mistakes commonly made by farmers.

Weldon May of Production Credit Association, Albion, will discuss obtaining and using lines of credit, money management and cash flow statements on January 19.

The January 26 session will focus on swine nutrition and will be led by Dr. Tip Kline, a Purdue University research scientist.

The final session, on February 2, will center on rural estate planning and transfer. Rich Helm, a member of the Koscius-

ko Co. Bar Association, will lead the discussion.

No charge will be made for any of the classes. Wives are urged to attend with or without their husbands as some of the classes will be of concern to everyone involved in farming operations.

Forrest Kantner, vocational agriculture teacher, will be in charge of the classes, which are sponsored by the TVHS agricultural advisory committee.

Vikings win Culver tourney

Coach Floyd Henson's Tippecanoe Valley Vikings walked away with their second straight Culver Holiday Tournament trophy this weekend, but the squad that took this year's honors was nothing like last year's. The 1974 edition of Vikings scored a phenomenal 206 points in two games. This time around, the Valley scrapped the fireworks and merely played two of the best all-around team games in the school's history.

In the Friday night opener against highly touted John Glenn, the Vikings threw a tough defense at the Falcons, and got a leg up on what surprisingly proved to be a defensive battle. Forcing turnover after turnover but unable to hit consistently, the Vikings held only a 6-3 lead midway through the first quarter. Late in

the quarter things started to open up, and Valley battled to a 15-7 first-stop lead. With Ryan Williams and Eric Alspaugh doing damage

to Glenn underneath, Valley held on to its lead at halftime, 27-20. John Glenn was far from beaten, though, cont. on back page

Akron project nearing completion

A spokesman for General Telephone Company of Indiana said this week the company is nearing completion of a \$45,000 project that added 8,000 feet of new telephone cable to the eastern area of the Akron exchange.

Cable was installed primarily along Walnut Street from just east of SR 19 to SR 14, south

to Main St. and then east to CR 1275E. Small sections of cable were placed along Slaybaugh, Cherry and Johnson streets.

Work is scheduled for completion this month and is part of the company's eight million dollar statewide program.

I can walk right out of this barn any time I want to and I can eat what you eat, but you'd better never ever try to get my food or I'll chase you out. And if one of you ever ends up in steaks, we'll see who gets the last laugh--or the last bone."

And so it goes--sibling rivalry in the barn!

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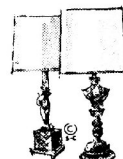
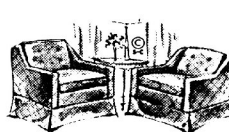
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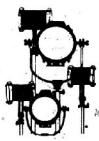
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Spotlight on 4-H

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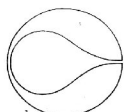
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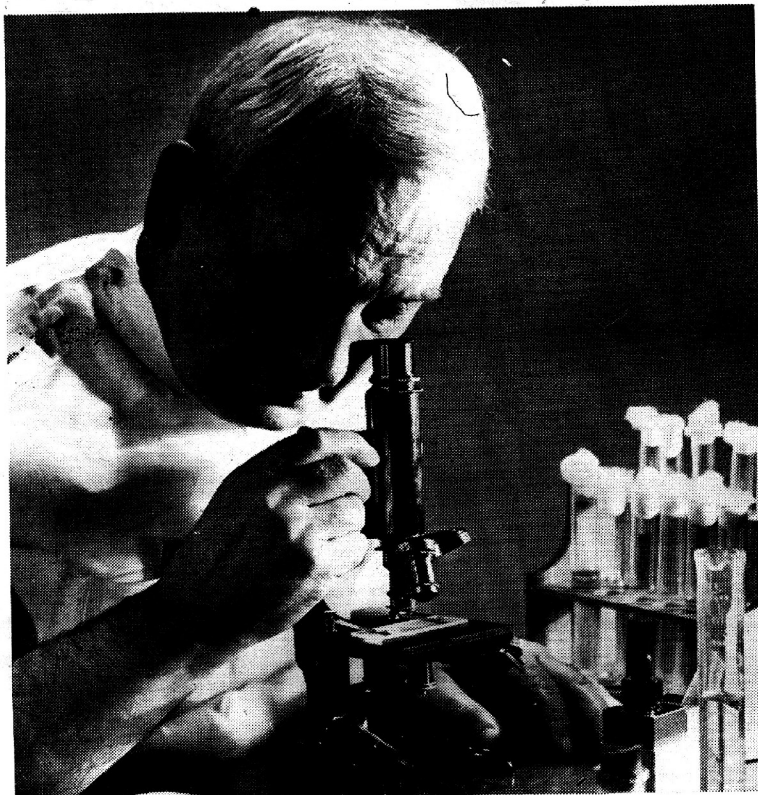

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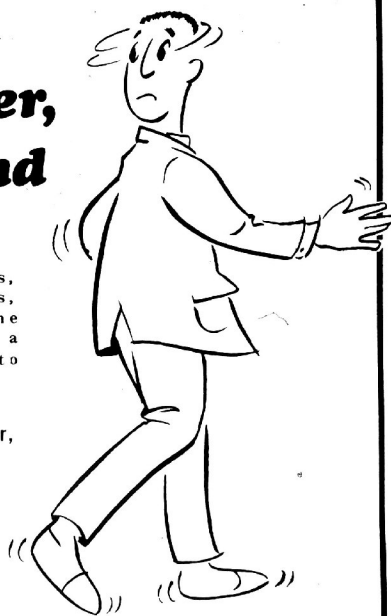

Akron Bicentennial committee seeks 100-year-old homes and buildings

Is your house 100 years old? Do you own a building, an old school or business that is more than 100 years old. If so, the Akron Bicentennial commission will honor the present owner with a plaque at the February 22 Bicentennial program at Tippecanoe Valley High School, a joint effort of the Mentone and Akron groups.

Pam Madeford, chairman of the Akron group, says the home or building does not need to have been in the same family for 100 years. Present owners will be asked to provide a short history of their home. Anyone thinking his home is eligible should contact Mrs. Madeford at 893-4726 after checking his abstract.

Questions about the project, separate from a similar farm survey, can be directed to her. Details of the Feb. 22 joint program will be announced later.

Akron ambulance group explores phone service

Akron, lying as it does in the corner of Fulton, Miami, Kosciusko and Wabash counties, is unique as far as General Telephone Company and the Comprehensive Health Planning Council are concerned. Not only does it lie in two CHPC regions (3 and 5) but the people the newly organized Akron Community Ambulance Service will serve are on a number of telephone exchanges, some of which require toll calls.

Attending a special meeting Wednesday to discuss telephone service were members of Akron's town board and ambulance service, Phil Halasz of CHPC, Joseph F. Sipe, government communications manager of General Telephone, and General's communications consultant, Virginia Oberley.

By meeting's end, it was determined the best approach for the present time would be a seven-digit number that residents of any exchange

served by the ambulance service could dial. Tentative plans call for utilization of the police frequency. Board members noted they have plans to move the police radio, now located in Town Marshal Ed Hauser's home, to a downtown location.

A 911 emergency number had been sought, but Sipe said it is a company policy that police must be involved in this type of installation. He said 911 is a common point of answering, one that handles not only ambulance and police but fire calls as well. In addition, it would be limited to the Akron exchange.

Asked about a bar-type installation such as the fire department has, Sipe said it is not now possible for the town to get a second bar installation without rule changes and applying to the Public Service Commission for permission

"Speaking of lists," said the oldest, "Dad sent this home to you."

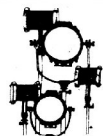
He handed me a list of supplies to be ordered. Across the bottom, the boys had scrawled, "Bake cookies."

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Malawi persecutes Jehovah's Witnesses

"Thousands of Christians are now under brutal persecution in Malawi," declared Richard Kolar, presiding overseer of the Rochester congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses. He said more than 34,000 Jehovah's Witnesses from Malawi who fled as refugees to Mozambique in 1972 because of severe persecution were forced to return to Malawi and now experience brutal persecution again—all because they refuse to join a political party.

He said in some instances the Witnesses were allowed to enter their villages and take up occupancy of houses they abandoned in 1972. However, in most cases, Youth Leaguers soon called to ask if they were prepared to buy political party cards. Referring to Jesus' example of political neutrality, the Witnesses refused, and immediately beatings, rapings and other atrocities began again and many were driven from their homes.

In September, youths under the direction of the Kasonjola branch of the Malawi Congress Party visited homes of Jehovah's Witnesses in six villages, demanding they buy party cards. When they refused, the youth stole all their belongings, subjected them to terrible beatings and urinated on the

supply of flour the refugees had brought with them. In other locations, Witnesses were stripped, their hair burned off their bodies with torches and beaten.

Because no one will accept them, many Witnesses have been forced to wander in the cities by day, sleeping in nearby forests at night. Upward of 4,800 fled to neighboring Zambia, but reports just received say they were repatriated to Malawi by force.

Dr. H. Kamuzu Banda, Life President of Malawi, recently instructed police to round up adult Jehovah's Witnesses and

put them in detention camps. The children are being left behind, either to stay with relatives or fend for themselves. The government order applies this even to nursing infants. The police have ruthlessly executed this order. Whole congregations of Witnesses, men and women, have been rounded up and put in detention to further pressure them into buying political party membership cards and to prevent flight from Malawi, according to latest reports.

to vary. Mrs. Oberley said she would attempt to determine how difficult this procedure might be and contact local officials at a later date.

On the matter of financing an ambulance, Halasz reported the Emergency Medical Council has asked the Indiana Legislature for one million dollars to help purchase ambulances. "If you want help, you'd better get after your senators and representatives," he said, "because without it, your chances of state aid are absolutely zero."

David Kruger, financial chairman of Akron Community Ambulance Service, said donations may be made payable to the service and given to him or Dr. Charles Miller, ACAS president, or deposited at the Akron Exchange State Bank.

4-H enrollment deadline Jan. 15

January 15 is the Fulton Co. ownership and enrollment final deadline for 1976 beef and dairy projects. This enrollment includes beef steers and heifers and dairy born before June 30, 1975.

Enrollment forms, project information and requirements are available at the Fulton Co. extension office or from local 4-H club leaders.

Other 4-H projects that will begin before spring enrollment are veterinary science and tractor maintenance. Those interested in enrollment in these projects should give their name to 4-H leaders or the extension office by Feb. 1.

The enrollment deadlines for projects not listed above is May 1.

Any youth who will be between the ages of nine and 19 during 1976 is eligible to be a 4-H member in Fulton Co.

4-H members can choose from some 70 different project areas for their club work, including six new Bicentennial projects. This wide range of projects is designed to be of interest to both rural and urban youth.

The district includes all or portions of Cass, Miami, Fulton and Carroll counties and is eligible for 83 precinct committeemen, but three vacancies exist. Of the 80 committeemen, 68 attended and voted.

As required by law, State Republican Chairman Thomas Milligan presided at the balloting. He pointed out it was the first use of the 1973 legislative vacancy law for the Senate. It has been used three previous times to fill House vacancies. The law provides that precinct committeemen of the party and district of the vacant legislative seat select the replacement.

Mrs. Sullivan, who often accompanied her husband to the Senate floor since he is in a wheelchair because of poliomyelitis, was sworn in Monday afternoon.

Indian artifacts to be displayed Saturday

A collection of American Indian jewelry and artifacts valued at over \$15,000 will be exhibited in the Branch Museum of the Fulton Co. Historical Society in the Neighborhood Center (old middle school building) from noon until 6 p.m. Saturday, January 17, as a kick-off to the Society's Bicentennial Trail of Death Rendezvous slated for Labor Day weekend.

Mr. and Mrs. Sidney L. Davis, Springfield, Ill., have traveled in western and midwestern United States collecting and displaying the tur-

quoise, silver and coral jewelry, Indian beadwork, pipes, rifles, knives, tomahawks, furs and other items that will be on display.

The exhibit will give local residents an opportunity to see what will be available on a larger scale when the Rendezvous, commemorating the forced emigration of the Potawatomi Indians from this area in 1838, takes place. The couple, along with local black-powder gunsmith Francis M. Freese, have offered their services as consultants for the Rendezvous and

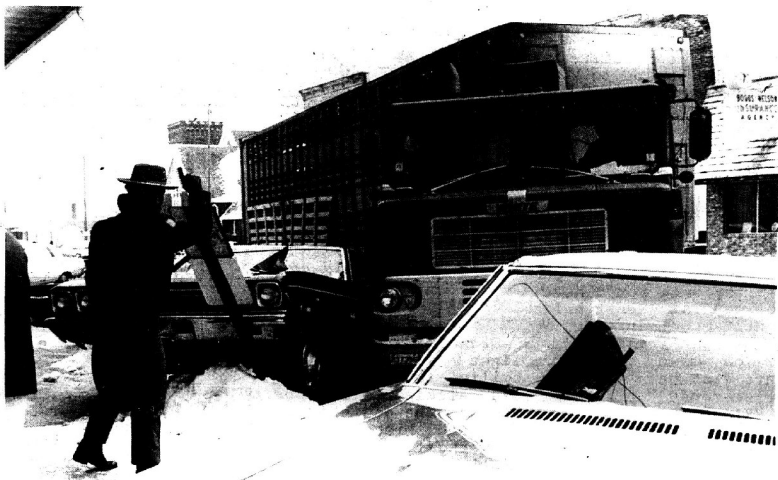
will invite some 50 other collectors of Indian crafts as well as mountmen and pioneer craftsmen to participate in the Labor Day weekend event.

Admission for Saturday's exhibit is free. In the event bad weather prevents the Davises from making the trip, another date will be set.

Visitors should use the parking lot on Seventh St. across from the Methodist Church and enter the museum through the east double doors just off the alley between Sixth and Seventh streets.

Trail of Death to be commemorated

The Trail of Death Rendezvous will be commemorated in a Labor Day weekend Bicentennial observance on the Clyde Neff property located on Indiana 25 south of Rochester.

Shirley Willard, president of the Fulton Co. Historical Society, the sponsoring organization, says the event will consist of three related projects: erection of a marker noting the first death on the trail, a

re-enactment of the march through Rochester and an authentic Buckskinners' Rendezvous.

Boy Scout Troop 285 is currently raising funds to purchase and erect an historical marker commemorating the first death on the Trail of Death, the forced emigration of the Potawatomi Indians from this area in September 1838. The marker will be erected along Mud Creek on SR 25, just north of Fulton. Historical doc-

uments indicate it was at this encampment that the first death, that of an Indian child, occurred. Top state government officials and other dignitaries will be invited to participate in the dedication.

The Scouts and FCHS members will ask the entire county to take part in a September 4 of re-enactment of the march through Rochester. It will begin at the river

bridge on old US 31 and continue through Rochester to SR 25 and to Mud Creek, a total of nine miles. This was the actual distance made and route followed by the 1,000 Indians and some 100 men who volunteered as soldiers in charge of them on the day the death occurred.

Extensive research into the history of the Trail of Death has been conducted by Mrs. Willard and Elizabeth Williams, Society researcher, and every effort will be made to make the re-enactment as authentic as possible.

Through the weekend, an authentic Buckskinner's Rendezvous in the best tradition of the old-time Indian and mountaineer get-togethers will be staged on the Neff property.

It will feature a village of Indian tipis--pronounced teepees--and mountaineer lean-tos set up by members of the National Association of Primitive Riflemen and the National Muzzleloading Rifle Association who have been invited to participate. The buckskinners will come from all over the west and midwest, bringing with them authentic Indian and mountaineer crafts and trade goods. Turquoise and silver jewelry, fur, black powder rifles, leather goods, beadwork, knives,

tomahawks-----virtually every type of art and craft item intrinsic to the early American Indian and pioneer craftsman--will be on display and offered for sale and trade during the Rendezvous.

In addition to the Buckskinner village, civic organizations throughout the county will be invited to set up booths to sell and demonstrate craft and food items authentic to the 1830-40 period. Booth workers will be asked to wear period costumes and observe certain old-fashioned traditions during the weekend to maintain a high standard of quality and realism.

Organizations interested in participating may contact Mrs. Willard or the Branch Museum office in the Neighborhood Center in Rochester, phone 223-4436.

"We have many ideas and lots of materials for reference to assist groups in planning for their part in the Rendezvous," Mrs. Willard said.

A steering committee will be appointed to coordinate the three events, and groups deciding to participate should count on continued assistance in planning activities.

"We hope the Rendezvous will not be just a Bicentennial observance," Mrs. Willard said, "but an annual event to draw people into the county. It is patterned after the Feast of the Hunter Moon near Lafayette, which is sponsored by the Tippecanoe Co. Historical Society."

Groups setting up booths will be permitted to keep proceeds from their sales for their own projects, but will be asked for a small percentage by the Historical Society to defray costs of building booths and other expenses.

A gate admission will be charged with the funds to aid the Historical Society in maintaining its two museum sites at Lakeview Park and in the Neighborhood Center in Rochester.

"This is a great opportunity for the county as a whole to plan and conduct a meaningful event for the Bicentennial--an event that will be unique in the history of Fulton Co.--and we sincerely hope everyone will get involved," Mrs. Willard said.

"You think I should quit talking about it, huh, Mom?"

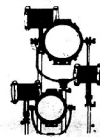
"That wouldn't be a bad idea. You don't have the money. You don't know that you'll ever have it. Do something else. Don't spend

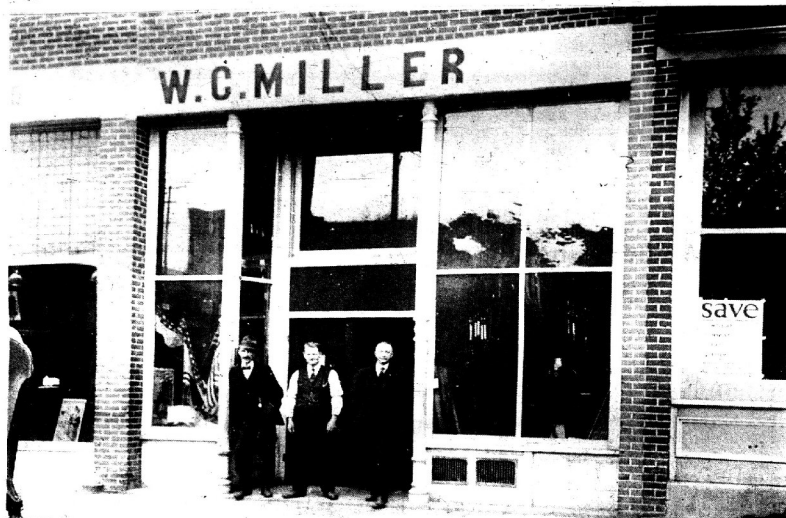

How long can I keep baking powder on hand before it becomes inactive?

Most commercial baking powders are now dated to give the last date it will be effective. If you question the effectiveness, test it by mixing one teaspoon baking powder with 1/3 cup hot water. Use the baking powder if it bubbles enthusiastically.

What is the difference between mayonnaise and salad dressing? How many calories do they each contain?

Mayonnaise is made from vegetable oil, vinegar or lemon juice, eggs or egg yolks and sugar and spices. Salad dressing has about the same ingredients except part of the oil is replaced by a cooked starch paste. Mayonnaise is 65 per cent vegetable oil and salad

Hoosiers get good news and bad news

The outlook for 1976 includes some good news for Hoosier taxpayers: the relative tax burden is growing lighter. At least, that's what the Indiana State Chamber of Commerce says.

According to the 1976 tax calendar compiled by the state C of C, the typical Indiana taxpayer will work for the first 113 days of the year to pay his federal, state and local tax bills. From the 114th day (April 22) onward, he will be working for himself.

The good news, they say, is that the tax burden will average out to 31 percent of personal income, compared to 32.4 percent in 1975 and 33.7 percent in 1974.

"Two years ago, the average taxpayer had to work until May 4 to earn enough to pay his tax bills," said Edward J. Bowman, director of the State Chamber's Taxation Department. "Last year he only had to work until April 28, and this year until April 22. On a comparative basis, he is doing better each year."

Why is the burden growing lighter?

Basically, Bowman said, it's because the growth in taxes owed is not keeping pace with the growth in personal income. (This was nothing to do with the cost of living, which determines how much is left after non-tax bills are paid.)

Vikings drop pair on road

After winning five straight games, the high-flying Tippecanoe Valley Vikings journeyed south for a pair of games and, at least on this occasion, the south did rise again, as the Vikings came up on the short end of both scores.

Friday night Tippecanoe visited Caston, champions of the Three Rivers Conference which TVHS will be joining next year, and lost a 67-62 decision. The Vikings played fairly well and could have won but for the fact that Caston shot a phenomenal 57% and ran off two scoring streaks which Tippecanoe could not equal.

In the first quarter Derek Anglin controlled the game, driving at will for 13 points and a 19-18 lead at the break. The Vikings were still in good shape with three minutes remaining in the half, holding a 29-26 lead. Then lightning struck in the form of a 10-0 Caston bulge, and the Comets had a 36-29 lead at halftime.

The third quarter held more of the same in store for the Vikings, as Caston built their lead to 42 on three occasions, including once at 53-41 to end the third frame. Finally, with six minutes remaining and trailing, 55-44, Tippecanoe regrouped and put on its most valiant rally of the year. In three minutes time they outscored their hosts 14-2 to grab a 58-57 lead, as John Lash scored eight points and Ryan Williams began to take chunks of the backboard along with his rebounds. Caston went up again by three, but again Valley battled back to take a 62-61 lead. Then, in the final minute and a half, Caston ran off six unanswered points and won the game, 67-62.

Derek Anglin was the Vikings' top point-getter with 17. John Lash added 14 and Ryan Williams 12. But Caston posted five scorers in double figures.

Saturday night, the Vikings invaded Walton to meet 9-1 Lewis Cass. The Vikings jumped to an early lead, with everyone getting in on the act. Midway through the first quarter Tippecanoe was ahead 12-4, but when Cass got started, the bad news began. At the end of the quarter the margin was only one, 14-13. After the score see-sawed through much of the second stanza, Tippecanoe took its final lead at 21-20. Then, for the second straight night, a late-half surge did the Vikings in. This time the score was 12-3, and it left the Kings with a 32-24 halftime advantage.

School board will circulate petitions for bus bond issue

Tippecanoe Valley school board members Monday night heard attorney Fred Rakestraw outline procedures for issuing general obligation bonds and agreed to follow that course to finance nine school buses.

School superintendent Dr. Lloyd Harrell said nine or ten of the corporation's 27 buses are ten years old or more, the age at which they ordinarily are removed from regular service. He said business manager Robert Forbes had proposed having the corporation upgrade the fleet by purchasing nine buses every three years.

Forbes estimated the nine buses will cost \$150,000. He said this is more than can be included in the budget and therefore necessitates a bond issue.

Following the procedures outlined by Rakestraw, board members or designated property owners in their communities will carry petitions

seeking signatures of at least 50 property owners favoring the issue. The petitions will be certified by auditors of both Fulton and Kosciusko counties before returning to the board for determination. A notice will be published and there will be a 30-day

remonstrance period during which those opposed to the issue can kill it if they obtain more signatures than were obtained on the school board's petitions. If

There's still an ambulance if you need it

Ambulance service will continue in Akron and Mentone until the Emergency Medical Service units now being readied can be put into operation.

Sheetz and Hauptert funeral homes of Akron and King Memorial Home of Mentone will continue to operate their present ambulances until the new units are put into operation, according to word received this week.

No state or federal funds, Akron EMS group told

"There are no state or federal funds available to assist local ambulance groups," members of Akron's emergency medical service were told in a public meeting Tuesday evening.

Attending in addition to EMS volunteers and Chamber of Commerce officials were Fulton Co. commissioners LeRoy Crippen, Fred Brown and George Craig and George Stephen, a member of the county council.

David Kruger, chairman of the local fund committee, chaired the meeting, explaining its purpose was to see if any assistance could be expected and to learn the county's long-range plans. "We don't want to buy an ambulance now and find out two years later the county is going to take over," he said.

Brown asked what other communities are doing, and Crippen replied that Kewanna plans to care for the west side of the county. He said the county has been allocated two ambulances, supported by federal funds for 70 percent of each. He said application can be made, but there are no funds available. It was noted that since Rochester does have ambulance service, the two ambulances would probably be put in Kewanna and Akron.

County officials said applications for funds have been submitted to the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). If this money is received, it would have to be used to build a community building, one that would house firefighting and ambulance equipment.

Points noted included: * The tax rate is frozen. The Legislature has made no provisions to obtain additional funds. Rochester undertakes may possible re-

tain their ambulances after 1978, using volunteer EMTs. This, however, was only speculative.

the issue is still viable at the end of the remonstrance period, a date will be set for sale of the bonds and another notice published.

Rakestraw said he could not estimate how long the sale might take but it possibly could be done in six months. He said attorney fees probably would amount to \$2,000, regardless of whether he worked on a percentage basis or on an hourly pay scale.

* Cass Co. is using revenue sharing funds, but there is no assurance there will be money after June 1.

* If a federal grant is used, there are restrictions, such as the ambulance can be used only for emergency runs as opposed to convalescent trips.

* The hospital and sheriff's department have been asked if they plan to operate an ambulance. The sheriff estimated it would require 18 men to serve as EMTs and deputies.

* The county has no firm plan at present concerning ambulance service.

* If a county option tax were to be imposed by July, it would be 1978 before funds were received, and the most the county could get would be \$4,000, less than the cost of the personnel it would require to handle the tax. It is not known what effect reassessment will have on tax revenue, and it too will not be noted until 1978.

* There is a bill before the legislature to allow counties with bankrupt railroads to raise their tax rate sufficiently for one year only to get the funds they lost in tax revenue from the railroad.

* It would be possible to establish a bond issue, because while the tax rate is frozen, a bond rate can be established to handle the initial cost of a purchase but cannot be used for operating expense.

* The commissioners have considered asking the council for \$1,000

It's not every day you get a chance to get a million dollars in the mail, so much money, in fact, that it takes duffle bags to haul it in. And all for a two dollar investment.

That's the gist of a letter we received last week--the one that got turned into the post

office for examination.

The deal, obviously as phony as an Atlantis three-dollar bill, was divided into three separate stages: invitation, millionaire's club and super stage. Its promoters promised to control all participants, providing the way to guard the business program from being changed by disloyal participants. "We guarantee you your first million," they said.

Their plan? To introduce "a unique business opportunity, unknown to 99 per cent of the general public and strongly supported by many money motivated people." Details of that would come after you had sent two dollars in cash to the address that was practically concealed in the mimeographed letter, enclosing with it a copy of the letter on which you were to write "Yes, I am going to participate" and sign. You were then to receive important information not available anywhere else--details of the millionaire's club.

"Please note," the letter said, "you will be working and getting all your participants

through an invitation like this, so that everyone working in this program is a willing participant. Besides, you will offer these people valuable information in exchange for dollars. As a result, this procedure is legal and nobody loses... You can easily see that this is not a nickel and dime opportunity and it is well worth the small investment and little time. Some people enjoy wallowing in poverty and just getting by. By taking part in this program, you have proved you are not one of those who expect things to drop from the sky. Remember, it takes some time, so don't be discouraged."

And it concluded, "Always use first-class postage and a return address. This invitation is valid for ten days only so rush your order now."

The letter was mailed bulk rate, had no return address and was dated Dec. 4.

A deal that great, you'd think they'd heed their own advice.

Competition was brisk between two barber shops. One posted a sign advertising haircuts for \$1. The other followed quickly with a sign that read: "We repair \$1 haircuts."

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Bicentennial year ag forecasts clouded

While the Bicentennial year is clouded by "uncertain prospects for grain exports, livestock expansion and the general economy," efficient Hoosier agricultural producers of major grain crops and livestock can expect reasonable returns.

This assessment was made recently by John F. Marten, Purdue University extension agricultural economist, in remarks prepared for the final session of the Indiana Farm Management Association meeting at Farm Science Days.

With lower grain prices and stronger livestock prices generally characterizing 1975, the economist said the following is the most likely to happen to farm prices in 1976:

Corn--A strong market in the months ahead. If feed usage increases and export bookings materialize as expected, cash corn prices should strengthen. An average \$2.65 a bushel range for the entire 1975-76 marketing season, based on current information

and a normal 1976 growing season.

Soybeans--A continued decline in prices from late December levels is not expected. (Any major recovery, however, will depend on crop trouble either in the U.S. or Brazil, or a 1976 planted acreage of fewer than the 50 million acres now expected. With the current situation and expectation of higher usage, coupled with a smaller 1976 crop, prices may average \$4.50-\$5 a bushel at the farm for the entire 1975-76 marketing year.

Wheat--Odds favor stronger prices this spring although the price pattern could be very erratic during the next six months. The U.S. farm price for all classes is expected to average \$3.50-\$3.80 a bushel for the 1975-76 marketing year. However, soft red winter wheat will likely average \$3.20-\$3.50.

Hogs--Prices are expected to move irregularly lower through 1976, averaging six to 10 percent under the record \$49 per 100 pounds (all barrows and gilts at the seven major markets) last year. First quarter prices are expected to average in the lower \$50s, dropping to the upper \$40 range in the second quarter. A continued downward movement is expected in the last half of the year.

Cattle--Choice steers at Omaha should average in the \$43-\$47 range during the first half of the year and could vary from the high \$30s to the mid-\$50s depending on the particular supply and demand situation. For the last half of the year they will average in the low \$40s with the potential of a drop to the high \$30s in November and December.

At the free throw line, Akron hit 4-10 and No. Miami 0-20. Akron was led in scoring by Jeff Claxton with six and Rich Flynn with five. North Miami was led by Hurst with four.

In the "A" game, Akron won by a 34-25 margin, but this does not reflect the true picture of the game. At the end of the third period, it was 31-12. Akron shot 16-41 for 39 percent from the field and 2-8 from the free throw line. North Miami shot 9-37 for 24 percent from the field and 7-24 from the line. No. Miami also held the edge in re-

bounds with 35 compared to 29 for Akron. Akron was led by Kevin Howard with nine points and Ryan Murphy with eight. Kevin Howard was also the leading rebounder with seven, followed by Donald Studebaker with six.

Coach Ed LaMar said, "I was very pleased with most of our game. We played good defense and hustled a lot except for the fourth quarter."

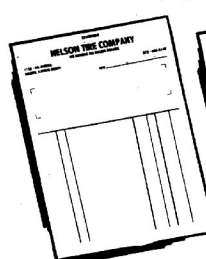

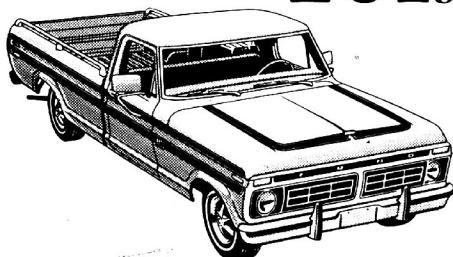

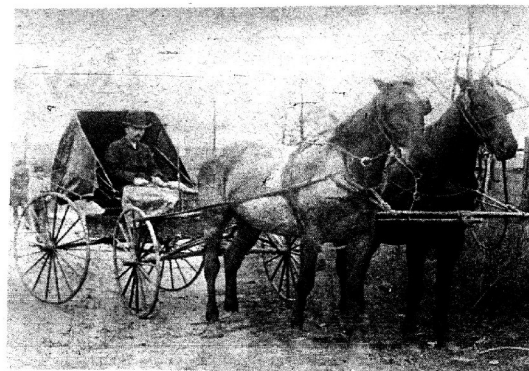

Anthony Nigo DAR hears national spending topic

Delegates to the April 18-23 DAR Continental Congress in Washington, D.C. were named at the January meeting of Anthony Nigo Chapter.

Mrs. Frank Smith will be delegate and Mrs. Max Smith is alternate.

"The New Mood In Congress," a national defense report by Mrs. Wayne Smalley, noted an emerging undercurrent in Congress about the day of financial reckoning for the federal government, as in the case of New York City--the day that could be closer than any responsible federal official has been willing to admit publicly. This "peril point" thinking came to surface in a recent debate over a normally routine request by the administration to increase the overall public debt ceiling from \$577 billion to \$597 billion. The proposal was defeated by a House vote of 217-179. A majority of those voting against hiking the national debt to \$97 billion cited as their reason the skyrocketing national debt during the past five years as outlined in a House Ways and Means committee report. In 1947 the total statutory debt was \$275 billion. It took 23 years, until 1970, for the public debt to increase \$100 billion to a \$375 billion total but it took only four years to add the next \$100 billion, bringing the total to \$475 billion in 1974. Then it took only one year to add the next \$100 billion. Another major increase is asked to make \$597 billion the debt ceiling. The committee report shows the cost of the national debt is now running at \$100 million a day. This cost could be twice that amount by the end of the 1970s, the report indicates, unless Congress takes action to cut government spending or increase taxes. How far this new undercurrent will cause Congress to cut back on government spending is still highly debatable. Most members of Congress believe the answer will come in the mail they receive from home. DAR members were reminded to take used clothing, which will be shipped during March to Kate Duncan Smith DAR School in Alabama, to the home of Mrs. Max Smith, chairman of DAR schools. 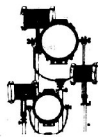

Akron farmer scores high in national corn program

Eldon Cumberland, Akron, with a yield of 154.2 bushels of corn per acre, has placed high in the 1975 Project 200 corn growing program.

The nationwide corn growing program is sponsored by the producers of Funk's G-Hybrids and is considered the largest program of its kind in the country.

To qualify, Cumberland, who used Funk's G-4321, had to harvest shelled corn from not less than four adjacent rows running the full length of the field. His crop was planted May 6 in 36-inch rows at 23,000 plants per acre. It was harvested Oct. 28 at 17.7 percent moisture and harvest population of 21,500 per acre.

Cumberland applied 53 pounds nitrogen, 80

pounds phosphorous and 136 pounds potash as his fertilizer program. The yield was verified by a disinterested witness.

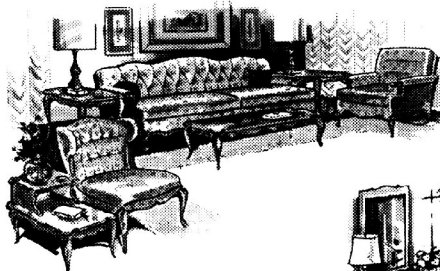

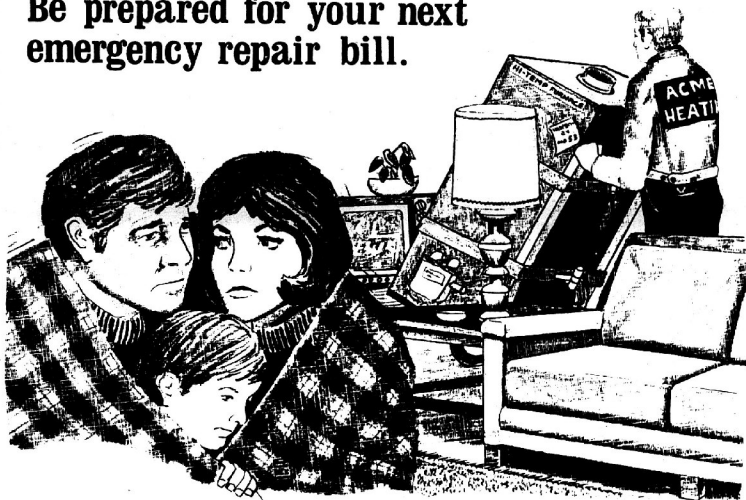

THE BOSTON MASSACRE

Overt acts of resistance were everyday occurrences after British Troops arrived in Boston. One cold wintry night, March 5, 1770, a British soldier stood sentry on King's Street, Boston. A group of youngsters pelted him with snowballs. Adults joined the assault. The Old South Meeting House bell gave the alarm. Realizing the situation was serious, Captain Preston of the Twenty-ninth Worcesters, ran from his headquarters shouting, "Don't fire." It was too late. Shots rang out and there on the snow lay the bodies of five men mortally wounded. This was the Boston Massacre.
