## Mentone board reorganizes; Miller new president

After concluding the business portion of a special meeting on Tuesday, Dec. 27 to wrap up 1983 finances, Mentone town attorney, Lee Bazini, read the oath of office to incoming 1984 members. Inaugurated were returning trustees Wayne Tombaugh and Jim Miller, clerk-treasurer Kate Whetstone, and new trustee Miriam Boardman.

Although Boardman does not officially assume her duties until noon, January 1, 1984, the board

members reorganized by electing Jim Miller president for the next year. Whetstone reminded trustees that several appointments will need to be made at their first January meeting. Miller suggested they hold an executive meeting prior to their next regular meeting, to give Boardman an opportunity to be briefed about personnel and appointments. The executive meeting will be held Tuesday, Jan. 3 at 7 p.m.

Board members Tombaugh,

Miller and Frank Hardesty discussed a letter received from Steve Lease, Kralis Brothers, concerning a proposed move of that company. Lease sent a copy of a resolution addressed to the Kosciusko County Zoning Board stating the Mentone trustees supported Kralis's expansion. In his letter, Lease asked trustees to sign the resolution and forward it to the zoning board.

Hardesty questioned if a resolution was necessary or even

appropriate, and Bazini agreed a resolution seemed too strong. The trustees unanimously agreed to support Kralis Brothers expansion, however, by sending a letter to the Area Plan Commission before the January 4 deadline. Bazini was authorized to write the letter.

Trustees unanimously approved Whetstone's request to transfer monies to balance the 1983 budget. Funds were transferred

within the general fund and the motor vehicle highway fund. Also included in the transfers was a check for \$2,143.43 received for Cumulative Capital Improvement.

In other business: Whetstone reported the auditor's bill for the November election was \$960.12. The trustees had approved up to \$1000 for election expenses.

Tombaugh informed other members that Valley Sanitation had submitted a bill for 1983 for \$300. The bill was for emptying trash barrels downtown and at the park and cemetery. Whetstone reported the board had budgeted only \$250 for the year. Trustees requested Kate check the minutes of the meeting when the agreement with Valley Sanitation was made.

Whetstone read a letter from the Kosciusko Area Plan Commission inviting all town officials to attend a meeting on Wednesday, Jan. 25 to discuss the county's Comprehensive Master Plan. Mentone does not participate in the county plan commission, as there is a local commission.

The town received a letter from the Environmental Protection Agency notifying trustees that drinking water in Mentone is within acceptable health limits. Mentone was scheduled for an unannounced random testing between Oct. 1, 1982 and Sept. 30, 1985. The water sample was taken at Mentone Quick Mart.

Marshal John Hart volunteered to remain in his position as coordinator for the Civil Defense, and trustees accepted his offer.

Deputy Russ Hart reported an accident behind Frank and Jerry's Market that involved the police vehicle. There was no damage to the town's car, but a second vehicle received approximately \$150 damage.

An accident report has been filed with the town's insurance company.

The next public meeting of the board will be Monday, Jan. 9, at 7 p.m. in the town office.

## Gene Black loses shop in blaze

A shop-barn was completely destroyed by fire at the home of Gene Black, Rt. 1, Akron, Wednesday afternoon, Dec. 28.

Contents of the shop-barn included a 1983 automobile, a combine and 1500 bales of hay. The fire apparently was started by a propane gas space heater being used in the shop area.

Mentone firemen were on the scene for approximately one hour. Estimated cost of damages were \$15,000 to the building and \$25,000 to its contents.

A Claypool man died in a mobile home fire at 1:15 a.m. Friday, Dec. 30, 1983. Myrl Alexander, 91, was found in his bed by Claypool fireman after being called to the scene by a granddaughter, Lynn Brown.

Kosciusko County coroner Gary Eastland listed the cause of death to smoke inhalation.

## Down Memory Lane

### TAKEN FROM THE AKRON NEWS JANUARY 4, 1934 50 YEARS AGO

The Akron Exchange State Bank has received word from the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation that they have been accepted to membership in the temporary federal deposit insurance fund.

This means that all deposits up to a \$2500 limit are 100 percent guaranteed and that after July 1, 1934, the limit will be raised to \$10,000.

In complying with the conditions of the law, it was necessary that the bank pay a fee of \$1,853.06 for the first year premium on this insurance.

Officers of the bank have a right to feel jubilant over this order, and their many patrons should feel happy that their deposits are now guaranteed by the government.

Sylvia Showalter has assumed her duties as town treasurer, the post to which she was elected at the recent town election. N. Clair Moore, retiring officer, will turn in his annual report in the next few days, and then his duties as an officer will be ended.

Other officers who were re-elected are Dr. W.E. Hosman, Ted Jontz, and Dr. Whallon. George Baum is the third member of the board.

Dr. R.E. Miller, a physician and surgeon from Burlington, Wisconsin has located here and is moving into W.W. Stokes' property on Mishawaka street. He will start his practice Monday.

Dr. Miller is a former Rochester man, having spent his youth there. For the past three years he has been engaged in surgery and a general physician practice at Burlington.

He is married, and his office will be established at his home.

The HMC Cafe was visited by a pair of hold-up men shortly after midnight Tuesday. The bandits only loot was a penny vending machine.

Arvid Putnam, night clerk at the cafe, was on duty at the time the two young men entered. The two youths both placed a short order, and after completing their lunch, paid their bill. As the clerk

was depositing the small sum in the cash register, one of the strangers covered him with a revolver and ordered him to go into the kitchen and stay there until he heard their auto start up.

Putnam complied with their request, and upon entering the main room of the cafe and making a complete check-up for missing articles or money, found the only thing taken by the bandits was the penny machine. The cash register, which was not locked, had not been disturbed.

### TAKEN FROM THE AKRON NEWS JANUARY 2, 1964 20 YEARS AGO

The new Akron town board took office January 1 with Merrill Kendall assuming the position of clerk-treasurer. Board members are Harold Gearhart, Jack Stucker and Ernest Smith.

The board has issued an invitation to citizens to attend the board meetings. The meetings are held the third Tuesday of each month.

Kendall urges anyone with problems to call him at either 893-2985 or 893-5341 to make an appointment to meet him at the town hall.

Fire of an unknown origin destroyed a large barn on the Dail Barber farm north west of Akron Sunday night. The Barbers were not at home at the time, and the fire was discovered by David Sheetz, Paul Schipper, and Danny Hoffman, who reported it. Eight fire fighting units from Burket, Akron, and Mentone were unable to save the barn and its contents.

Lost in the fire were nine sows and pigs, a pick-up truck, a tractor, corn and hay. The barn had recently been remodeled, and Mr. Barber estimated the loss to be close to \$20,000, most of which was covered by insurance.

This was the second barn fire for the Barbers this year. Another barn burned in January and was replaced. It was not damaged by Sunday night's fire. The Barbers have not yet decided whether to replace the barn which was destroyed Sunday night.

Some damage was done to the roof of the Barber home by flying debris from the barn, but firemen

were able to prevent the dwelling from being destroyed.

The Fulton County Welfare started issuing food stamps on January 2 and will continue to do so Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. until noon and from 1 to 3 p.m.

People applying for the stamps are asked to take cash for their purchase of the stamps as no checks will be accepted or cashed.

E. Lee Bazini was appointed town attorney by members of the Mentone town board Thursday. Bazini replaces Robert Burner. Also named were Lyman Mil-lenhour, fire chief, and Joe Good, assistant.

Reappointed were Marshal Gene Norton and Deputy Marshal Richard Peterson, who becomes a full-time town employee half of the time as deputy marshal and half as assistant superintendent of public works.

The board decided to seek additional applications for the post of cemetery and park caretaker. Applications can be made to board members prior to the next meeting, Feb. 4.

Board members present were Kenneth Bush and James Whetstone. Bill Boardman was absent. Also present was clerk-treasurer Marie Coleman.

Dr. Virgil Miler was re-named to a four year term of the Fulton Co. Board of Health in action by the Fulton County Board of Commissioners last week.

## Farm Home Admin. has emergency economic loans

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will resume making economic emergency loans by the first of the year, according to FmHA County Supervisor R. Greg Smith.

"Economic Emergency loans are designed for farmers who are in a cost-price squeeze or face other financial difficulty beyond their control," Smith said. "In other words, the loans are for a financial emergency rather than a natural disaster such as a drought or flood."

The economic emergency or "EE" program was in operation from 1978 to 1981. The program expired in 1981, but was later reauthorized by Congress. It is being reopened under an order by the U.S. district Court in Washington, D.C.

"Under the program, loans will be available to farmers who are suffering an economic emergency

through no fault of their own. They must show that they have tried unsuccessfully to get a loan from another source before coming to FmHA, and that they can repay the loan over a period of time, depending on the use of the funds. The funds can be used to finance debts and related uses," Smith said.

The interest rate for direct loans fluctuates with the cost to the government of borrowing money. The interest rates for guaranteed loans, which are made by commercial lenders and backed by the government, are negotiated between the borrower and the lender.

## 1984 Wheat Pik program has payment limitations

The number of acres a wheat farmer can enroll in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's 1984 payment-in-kind program will be limited so that no farmer will receive more than \$50,000 in benefits, a USDA official said today.

Everett Rank, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said payment limitation is a ceiling imposed by law on the total amount of payments a farmer can receive for participation in USDA's production stabilization programs.

Generally, a farmer can receive no more than \$50,000 a year. However, price support loans, special disaster assistance and/or cost-sharing for approved, enduring conservation practices are not subject to this limitation, Rank said.

"Because the 1984 wheat loan rate was reduced from the statutory \$3.55 per bushel to \$3.30 per bushel to maintain our domestic and export markets, a portion of the deficiency payment rate may not be subject to the \$50,000 payment limitation," Rank said.

"The amount of deficiency payment not subject to the \$50,000 limit will be the amount that the deficiency payment rate exceeds the difference between the old \$3.55

loan rate and the \$4.45 target price. This will ensure that the total returns to participating farmers will be the same as if the adjustment in the loan level had not been made," he said.

"We do not believe the payment limitation statute applies to PIK commodities and we did not apply the limitation to last year's PIK program," said Rank. "This view has now been challenged by the General Account Office and some members of Congress."

"We continue to believe we are correct, but the issue must be put to rest so that we can get on with implementation of the 1984 PIK program for wheat. Therefore, we have decided, as a matter of administrative policy, that a farmer will not be allowed to receive a combination of PIK compensation and cash payments for participating in production stabilization programs that exceed \$50,000, using the 1984 county wheat loan rate to determine the value of the PIK."

Rank said a proposal to make the necessary changes in the PIK program regulations will be published soon in the Federal Register and that final action on the changes would be completed before the sign-up period for the 1984 program ends Feb. 24.

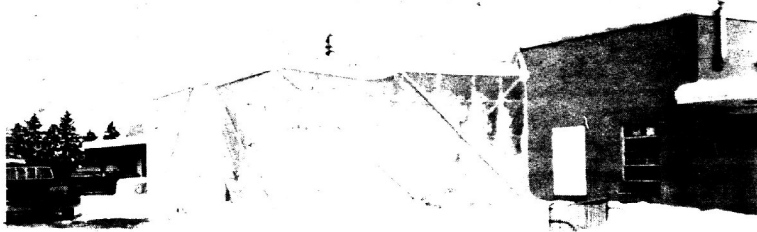

## Potawatomi historian to speak

Dr. David Edmunds, historian and author of "Potawatomi - Keepers of the Fire," will speak at the Century Center Recital Hall, South Bend, Jan. 5 at 7 p.m. The public is invited without charge. Representatives of the bands of the Potawatomi Nation will be present.

Several historical societies will have displays and sell books about Indians in the corridor by the Recital Hall. Included will be the Fulton County Historical Society, Elkhart Historical Society, Northern Indiana Historical Society, and the Fort Wayne Historical Society. The occasion is sponsored by the St. Joseph Park Foundation.

Also from Fulton County will be a display by the Independent Indian Relief Fund and the newly-

founded Indian Awareness Center. Mr. Ervin Stuntz, author of a new book on the Indians of northern Indiana, "The Incredible Wheel of Time," will be with the Fulton County group to sell and autograph his book.

Dr. Edmunds has specialized in Indian history since his Master's thesis in 1961 at the University of Illinois. His books include: "The Ojibwa-Missouri People," "American Indian Leaders: Studies in Diversity," "The Shawnee Prophet," and "Tecumseh and the Image of Indian Leadership."

Edmunds' book, "Potawatomi - Keepers of the Fire," was awarded the 1978 Francis Parkman Prize in American History. "The Shawnee Prophet" was nominated for a Pulitzer Prize in 1983.

Grand and petit juries for the January term of court were drawn Monday by County Clerk Orvel E. Phillips under supervision of Rolla A. Anglin and Charles S. Ramsey, jury commissioners. Members of the grand jury chosen were: Fenton B. Davison, Mentone; John Norris, route 3, Warsaw; Ralph Liggett, Jackson township; Bert A. Smiley, Etna Green; Scott Swanson, Warsaw; and O. A. Hightway, Franklin township. Petit jurors chosen were: Anna B. Bishop, Leesburg; Harvey D. Boggs, Prairie township; Bertha Hamman, North Webster; Asa Dirck, Claypool; William Nyce, Syracuse; Robert D. Kuhn, Warsaw; Ralph Neff, Milford; Earl Good, Piercetown; Russell Bradway, Harrison township; Gordon H. Johnson, Syracuse; Ralph Parker, Tippecanoe township; and Lester Culbertson, Piercetown.

Loss of approximately \$25,000 was entailed in the destruction by fire of the Dunkard Church, southwest of Mentone, according to an estimate made today by the pastor Rev. C.C. Cripe. The loss is covered by insurance and the edifice will be replaced, the Rev. Cripe said.

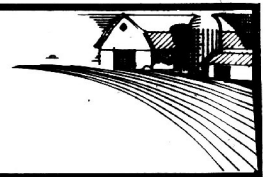
Many Mentone students participated in a district music contest held at Plymouth on Saturday, February 1, 1964. Mentone participants were under the super-

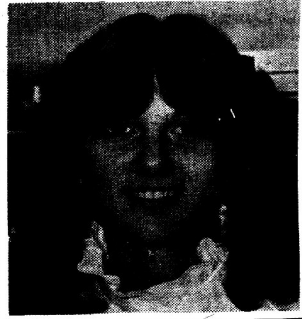

## Fulco Historical Society publishes new quarterly

Fulton County Historical Society's new Quarterly no. 53 features the historic visit of the Potawatomi Indians to the Trail of Courage Rendezvous and a story about Lost Lake.

The 96 page booklet is available at the Rochester News Stand, Hardesty Printing, Fulton County banks, Rochester and Akron libraries, and the Civic Center Museum, which is open Monday-Friday from 9 to 5.

Illustrated with many photos, the booklet tells about the recent visit of the Citizen Band Potawatomi of Oklahoma to the Trail of Courage Rendezvous, a living-history festival on the Tippecanoe River north of Rochester. This was the first time in 145 years that the tribal council returned to Fulton County, from which they were forcibly removed in 1838 on the infamous Trail of Death.

Lost Lake is a secluded marshy lake near Akron, Indiana, believed to be the place where Chief Little Turtle hid the Indian women and children from the battle with Gen. Anthony Wayne. This story was written by Dean Kreamer in 1927. Mrs. Saloma Myers, oldest woman in the state of Indiana,

lived at Lost Lake and died in 1934 at age 105. She recalled the Indian village at Lost Lake when she was girl there in 1837. Photos of her and her cabin and Lost Lake accompany the story.

A 20-year history of Fulton County Historical Society outlines the growth and accomplishments of this historical society. Founded in 1963, the group has grown to 650 members with four museums and was recently called "one of the top five historical societies in the state of Indiana."

Another story is that of "A White Indian Princess" by Lydia Reed Rans Easterday as told to Bertha Waltz. This tells of a little blonde girl who was taken by the Indians for a day and returned an Indian Princess; Nancy Callaway in the 1830's.

The Indian Creation Story is also reprinted in the booklet, as is the story of Abram Burnett, an Indian who was interpreter on the Trail of Death. Burnett was the biggest and strongest man in Kansas, weighing 500 pounds. His descendants attended the Trail of Courage Rendezvous.

## Pre-Christmas temps aid record natural gas usage

Record cold weather, combined with increased residential, commercial and industrial usage, helped Northern Indiana Public Service Company (NIPSCO), reach a natural gas sendout of 1,507 billion cubic feet in the 24-hour period ending at noon on Friday, Dec. 23.

The company said the average temperature across its service area was -6 degrees Fahrenheit, and its customers' usage matched the existing record of 1,507 billion cubic feet set on Thursday, Feb. 12, 1981.

Even though frigid temperatures, intensified by penetrating wind chills, have hit the Midwest early in the heating season, the company said its supplies of natural gas have been adequate to meet customer demand and will continue to be so, barring any unforeseen problems.

The company said the increased use of natural gas will be reflected in service bills, and these bills would most likely be higher even though its rates are lower than those charged at this time last winter.

The utility said any customer having a problem with a NIPSCO ser-

vice bill should contact the company before the bill is due.

Methods customers can use to hold heating costs down include lowering the thermostat to the lowest comfortable setting and even a little more at night; cleaning or replacing furnace filters if necessary; sealing air leaks around doors and windows and keeping opening of outside doors to a minimum.

Internal Revenue Service Publication 17

Those who pay another person \$600.00 or more in a year for service are now required to in January file an Information Form with the Internal Revenue Service listing the one paid with their Social Security Number, name, address and amount paid. There is a \$50.00 penalty for failure to file this Form 1099. If the number is not furnished another penalty can be avoided by filing an affidavit stating the facts of the case, name, address and amount paid as well as for what. This applies to mechanics, painters, "baby sitters", etc. If you have questions, better see your tax preparer.

**Editor's Note...**This article was taken from the Woodlawn Hospital Newsletter.

Dr. Charles Herrick of Akron was honored by his fellow physicians and co-workers at the annual Woodlawn Hospital Christmas party, held Friday, Dec. 17.

Dr. Kenneth Hoff, chief of staff at Woodlawn Hospital, presented an inscribed plaque which read: "Charles L. Herrick, MD, for 50 years of dedication and unlimited sacrifice to the citizens of Fulton County that has served as an inspiration and glowing example to all of us. We thank you, Woodlawn Hospital Medical Staff."

The record 315 in attendance

saw Dr. Herrick receive a gold pen and pencil set with a caduceus emblem the medical staff and a utility garden cart presented by head nurse Beulah Rynearson on behalf of the nursing staff.

I wanted to meet this "inspiration and glowing example"—this medical man whose recognition was in part responsible for the overflow crowd.

Most anyone in the hospital could direct me—"He arrives about 11, reads his Wall Street Journal in the physician's lounge, checks on a few patients upstairs, has his lunch in the cafeteria, feeds the squirrels outside, and is back in his office in Akron by 2 p.m."

Dr. Herrick looked up from his Wall Street Journal when I knocked and laughed as I rattled off the rest of his prescribed routine. "I've turned the feeding of the squirrels over to Greg (Gearhart)," he admitted. "He has longer legs than I and he can wade through the snow."

What about the new garden cart, I wondered aloud. Is it full of snow? "No," he flashed his gold-etched smile, "but the nurses

want to know when I'm going to bring it back filled with cookies."

Fifty years is a long time to do anything, and few people practice medicine that long. "Oh, I really don't practice medicine any longer," he says modestly. "I just see a few patients four days a week. I thought I'd retire at age 65. Dr. Miller was still in Akron then, but he developed health problems, so I forgot about retiring."

Had he always planned a medical career? "Oh, no, I didn't have money to go to college and didn't think I would until the last weeks of high school. The principal thought I should get a scholarship at DePauw, but that fell through."

Nevertheless, Dr. Herrick did go to DePauw University. "I had one suit and \$200 and thought I was ready—but by Thanksgiving I was broke and alone and I was a failure."

He came back home to the family farm in Winamac and then went off to work at Studebaker. When he arrived at college the next time (Indiana University), he was prepared to stay. "I had 3 new suits, a dozen shirts, 3 pairs of shoes and \$1200 in the bank."

Waiting tables, working as a janitor in an apartment house, and working summers as a metal finisher in the auto factories allowed him to stay in college and enter medical school in 1929.

In 1934 Dr. Charles Herrick opened his medical practice in Akron, where he became that town's fourth doctor. "Besides that, there was a doctor in Athens, one in Macy, one in Gilead, one in Burket, and one in Tippecanoe. Fifty years ago you just went somewhere and tried to build a niche for yourself." Ex-

cept for four years spent in the Army, Akron has been Dr. Herrick's niche.

Certainly he's seen major changes in those 50 years. "We had no penicillin or sulfa drugs—good nursing care was the best we had to offer patients. Hospitals were owned by surgeons and filled with their surgery patients. Occasionally other patients would be admitted."

"I prided myself on knowing who lived in every house within 5 miles of Akron and more. Usually someone sent a neighbor boy to town to get the doctor, but you never knew what was needed. When I left on a home call, I took my OB bag, my emergency bag, and my medical bag."

And changes in medical costs: "We used to deliver babies for \$20. Now I hear doctors talking about \$635 for OB costs. It seems to me it has gone too far, but maybe it's just the old story of an old man thinking the young folks are going to the devil."

The snow continued to fall outside and our discussion turned to Christmas which he's spending with his sister and her family in Three Rivers, Michigan. He recalled his worst Christmas; it was spent on an aircraft carrier which left Naples, Italy, on Christmas Eve 1945 bringing American soldiers home from WWII. He was the doctor on call and severe storms at sea had left 85% of those on board seasick.

It was now nearly time for the office to open in Akron. Dr. Herrick has never worked by appointment, so he wasn't sure if it would be a busy afternoon. But he would be there—ready to practice his special brand of country-gentleman medicine.

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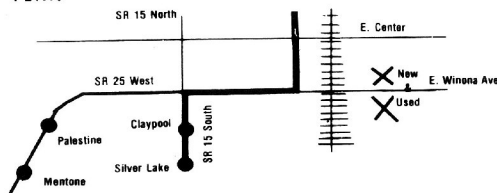

## Fulton County Circuit Court

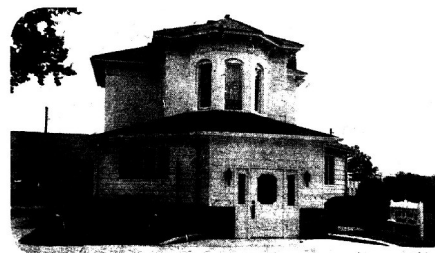

# Bureau of Motor Vehicles announces '84 license info

The Bureau of Motor Vehicles is offering the alternative of purchasing license plates by mail again this year. Approximately 4.3 million renewal registration forms are currently being mailed to Indiana citizens. By using the renewal form, residents may purchase their 1984 plates by mail.

The processing and handling fee will be \$1.50 for all plates, due to each registrant receiving a plate and renewal stickers as the majority have for the past two years. The appropriate fees will be included in the total amount to be paid as indicated by "mail this amount" which appears on the renewal registration form.

Due to 1984 being the first year of a multi-year plate program, plates will be mailed with the

appropriate expiration stickers affixed prior to mailing.

The 1983 Indiana General Assembly passed legislation which requires all owners, other than corporations, to register passenger vehicles, recreational vehicles, motorcycles and trucks (declared gross weight of 7,000, 9,000, 11,000 pounds) according to the following schedule:

Owners' last names beginning with the letters:

A - C - February; D - H, March; I - N, April; O - S, May; and T - Z, June.

A corporation will now be required to register passenger vehicles, recreational vehicles, motorcycles and trucks (declared gross weight of 7,000, 9,000, and 11,000 pounds) before February

1st of each calendar year. The new expiration dates are reflected on the renewal forms currently being mailed.

Another change in the law eliminates the sale of 1983 license plates after January 1, 1984. Any motorist wishing to purchase a new license plate after January 1, 1984, will be required to purchase a full year 1984 license plate. However, motorists wishing to transfer a valid 1983 license plate to a newly-purchased vehicle after January 1, 1984, will be permitted to do so.

Any registrant who properly established an Excise Tax Credit in 1983 should include a legible reproduction of the front and back of that 1983 registration form with the renewal form in order to

utilize the established credit. Motorists should contact their local license branch for further details regarding this procedure.

Proof of financial responsibility is again required prior to purchasing 1984 license plates. The public may satisfy this requirement precisely in the same manner as in 1983. Once again the 1984 registration form will be considered an affidavit of proof of insurance. No registration forms may be accepted which do not display the signature of the registrant.

According to the Bureau of Motor Vehicles, individuals wishing to purchase license plates by mail must follow these steps upon receiving their renewal registration form:

1. The motorist should verify the information on the registration form. If the address is incorrect, the necessary corrections should be entered on the registration form in the space provided.
2. Individuals who have traded cars during the past year should make certain the registration describes the vehicle currently owned. In some instances, the individual may receive more than one renewal form. The obsolete form should be discarded and the normal procedure followed.
3. The registrant must complete the bottom section of the registra-

tion form by completing the necessary information and signing in the space provided. Only the person whose name appears on the registration form may sign the document. If these requirements are not met, the paperwork will be returned to the registrant for correction.

4. To insure faster processing of the application, the motorist should purchase either a cashier's check or a money order payable to the "Bureau of Motor Vehicles" for the exact amount indicated on the renewal form. Personal checks are also acceptable through the mail-in program.

5. Before placing all copies of the form and the check, cashier's check or money order in the envelope, be sure the license branch address is visible through the envelope window. All license plate purchases must be made in the motorist's county of legal residence.

6. Registrants are requested to mail the renewal forms on or before the fifth day of the expiration month to assure delivery before the 1983 license plate expires.

Any citizen not receiving the renewal form by January 18, 1984, is requested to contact the Registration Department, Bureau of Motor Vehicles, at 317/232-2795.

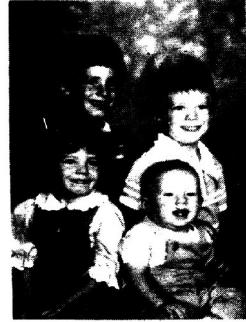

### Care of Partial Dentures

The commonest of all tooth replacements is the removable partial bridge or denture, most often called simply the partial. When some teeth are present and some missing, the partial may be used to replace the missing teeth.

Good oral hygiene habits are particularly important for wearers of partial dentures. If food residue and film are allowed to accumulate on clasps (which are food traps) the very important abutment teeth may decay. Be especially careful in cleaning these clasp teeth and the inside of

the clasps. Use the special denture brush to clean within the clasps so that the clasps, as well as the tooth itself, is preventive clean. This must be done at least once a day. Have water in the bottom of the sink whenever you clean your partial. If it should happen to drop, the water will break the fall.

If a partial denture becomes damaged in any way, it should be taken at once to the dentist for repair. Amateur attempts to repair a denture are fraught with danger. Do-it-yourself dentistry is high folly.

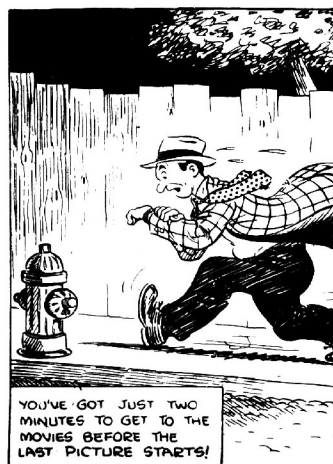

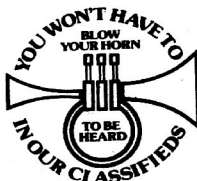

## Mentone Water Superintendent Shand resigns

At last Monday's meeting of the Mentone town board, Street and Water Superintendent Steve Shand surprised board members by submitting a written resignation during the opening moments. Citing "the board's dissatisfaction with my services and the un-called-for-pressure from Jim Miller" as his reasons for leaving, Shand's resignation was effective immediately.

When asked, Shand revealed he plans to devote his time to Shand Electric, Inc., the business he began in 1982.

Trustees Miller, Wayne Tombaugh and Miriam Boardman spoke with town employee Rodney Holloway about assuming duties as town superintendent. Holloway, a part-time employee hired in August, 1983, would need to receive a State water certification license in order to take weekly water samples for the State Board of Health. Board members set an executive meeting for next Monday, Jan. 16 at 7 p.m. to discuss duties and salary with Holloway.

President Miller declined to comment on Shand's resignation, saying only "It would just be a rehashing of problems we've had, and I don't want to do that."

In other personnel-related matters, board re-hired Marshal John Hart and deputy Russell

Hart at the same salary they received in 1983. Marshal Hart questioned the board about the possibility of an increase in salary, stating he felt they should at least receive a cost-of-living raise. Deputy Hart concurred, and both officers pointed out they were the lowest paid officers in Kosciusko county.

Boardman stated that she felt their salaries should be frozen as both men had received \$500 increases in each of the past four years.

Marshal Hart's present salary is \$12,500, and Deputy Hart's salary is \$11,500. The matter was not resolved by any definite action from the board.

Trustees did, however, reappoint Russ Hart as town building commissioner at a fee of \$240, and they rehired Becky Hart as police dispatcher for an annual salary of \$3267. They also awarded a \$2000 summer contract to Joe Miller to serve as cemetery caretaker and retained Darrell King to continue as cemetery sexton for \$300.

Board members will receive an annual fee of \$300, while Clerk-treasurer Kate Whetstone will receive \$3,900. Boardman moved to offer attorney Lee Bazini a retainer to continue as the town's attorney and members unanimously agreed. No fee was set.

Non-remunerative appointments made were: Aviation board, Dr. Wymond Wilson, Bill Ettinger, Don Smythe and Lois Miller; and Cemetery and Park Board, Marian Smith (replacing Tom Fugate), Bob Whetstone, Rosalind Mentzer, Annabelle Mentzer, Rosemary Bazini, Wayne Tom-

baugh and Darrell King. Trustees appointed themselves as the newly-created Public Service Commission of Mentone.

Appointments to the Area Plan Commission and the Zoning Board will be made at the next meeting.

In other business: Roger

Moriarty requested the trustees submit an insurance claim to partially cover expenses accrued by him over the past two years. Moriarty's home has flooded several times as a result of faulty drainage, and he stated, "Even if

## Child restraint law goes into effect January 1



Within the past few months Indiana has had its share of new laws, the first being the Drunk Driving law, which went into effect September 1, 1983. The most recent law has the welfare of children in mind.

Indiana's new child restraint law became effective on the first day of January 1984. According to the new law, children less than three years of age must be placed in a federally-approved child safety seat when riding in a motor vehicle. Also children ages three and four must use a federally-approved child safety seat or seat belt.

An average of 700 children under five die each year while riding in passenger vehicles, and another 40,000 are injured. Children are 50 times more likely to die in a car accident than by all preventable diseases.

There are 41 other states that already have safety seat laws designed to reduce the number of deaths and injuries.

The law states the restraint system as "a device that is manufactured for the purpose of protecting children from injury during a motor vehicle accident."

The law further states, "A person who operates a motor vehicle in which there is a child less than three years of age who is not properly fastened and restrained by a child passenger restraint system commits a Class C infraction."

This law does not apply to school buses, taxis, rental vehicles leased for not more than 30 days, ambulances, vehicles registered out-of-state unless operated in-state for more than 60 days in any calendar year, or a public passenger bus.

A first-offense driver who owns one of the seats will not be fined or have to pay court costs. First-offense drivers who do not own one of the seats will be ordered by the court to obtain one within 30 days but will not be assessed fines or court costs.

If drivers fail to comply with the

law or are second offenders, a fine of not more than \$500 and court costs can be imposed.

According to Sergeant Jim Ewen of the Rochester Police Department, "We cannot stop a car specifically for this (children not being restrained), but our current accident form has a question on it about the use of

passenger restraints. Most likely a citation would be given in conjunction with an accident or

another traffic violation.

"We would like to see it enforced," continued Sgt. Ewen. "Hopefully the parents have enough sense to provide for child safety because that child is at their mercy. This is a good law, but there is a question about the enforcement. People have to enforce it themselves first."

Maurine Smith, president of the Hospital Auxiliary at Woodlawn, reminds Fulton County residents

of the loan program available through the hospital. "We have 60 Century Infant Love Seats available through the auxiliary for lease to anyone needing them." For a deposit of \$10, parents can obtain an infant seat which meets federal safety standards for a child weighing up to 20 pounds. The seat may be used for nine months. When the seat is returned to the hospital in good condition, \$5 of the deposit is refunded.

## Douglas Morton to run for re-election

Douglas B. Morton has announced he will run for re-election as Judge of the Fulton Circuit Court in the 1984 general elections. Morton, a Republican, has served as Judge since his election in 1978.

Prior to election as Judge, Morton served as law clerk for Judge James E. Noland in the Federal District Court in Indianapolis. He became a partner with Rochester attorney Robert E. Peterson after moving to Fulton County in 1972, and he has also been associated with local attor-

neys Richard L. Kehoe, Jr. and Ted A. Waggoner. He served as deputy prosecutor under both Steven A. Stinson and James O. Wells, Jr. A graduate of Logan Sport High School, Morton holds a 1968 Bachelor of Arts degree from Wabash College and a 1971 Doctor of Jurisprudence degree from Duke Law School.

Since election to the bench, Morton has served as representative for a six-county area on the Indiana Judges Association Board of Managers; he was recently re-

lected to that post. He has also served on the Legislative Committee of that organization during the last three sessions of the General Assembly. He is currently a participant in the drafting of the Indiana Judicial Center's new Civil Benchbook.

Morton, 37, resides at Rt. 1, (Fortna Addition), Rochester with his wife, Lois and their three children: Chris, 12; Rob, 10; and Katie, 4. He is active in Rotary, and is an elder in the First Christian Church.

He practiced law in Rochester for nearly three years, one year of which he was County Attorney for the Welfare Department. In 1943 and 1944 he was Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation with assignments in Washington D.C., North Carolina and Florida. During 1944 and 1945 he was in the U.S. Navy studying and teaching radar operation.

Mr. Tombaugh has long been interested in Republican politics, having served as county chairman of Young Republicans in Fulton County as well as Second District Chairman of Young Republican Clubs in Indiana. In 1960 he came within 235 votes of defeating the incumbent Frederick Rakestraw after having been named to fill a vacancy on his party's ticket for the office of Fulton Circuit Court Judge.

Mr. and Mrs. Tombaugh attend the Presbyterian Church in Rochester where he has served a term as deacon. They have a son, John, 22, who is employed by a contractor in Logansport. Mrs. Tombaugh is a member of the Manitou Chapter D.A.R., and with her husband as a member of the Dance-A-Rounds Club. Mr. Tombaugh is a director of the Fulton County Association for Mental Health, a charter member of the Fulton County Bar Association, a member of the NACCA Bar Association and a member of the Society of Former Special Agents of the FBI.

## Firemen called to Prater home

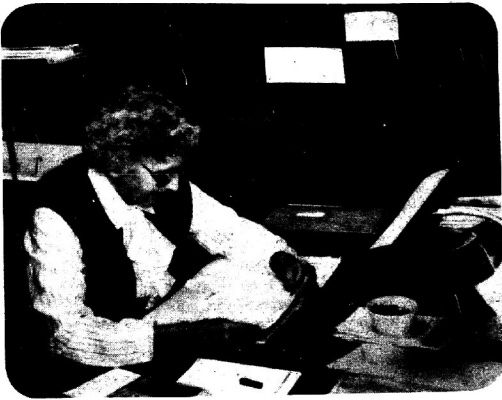

## TAKEN FROM THE NORTHERN INDIANA CO-OP NEWS JANUARY 12, 1944 40 YEARS AGO

Plans have been completed for the Soil Management and Farm Machinery School to be held January 21 at the Warsaw High School auditorium for farmers of Kosciusko County, according to county agent Joe Clark.

George Enfield and Russell Shipman of the Agronomy and Agricultural Engineering Departments of Purdue University will be present with information on fertilization practices and machinery operations under war time conditions. Problems to be discussed will include, making the best use of the available fertilizers, operation of tillage equipment to handle soybean straw and corn stalks, methods of fertilizer application and operation of fertilizer distributing and planting equipment.

Since fertilizer and machinery are two very important items in the production of food, county agent Joe Clark urges every farmer of Kosciusko County to plan to attend this meeting.

Many are the unusual events that show up at various times. I've heard of fish jumping in a fisherman's boat, and the like, but I've never heard of a cock pheasant coming to town, flopping on the grocer's door and then dashing to the meat counter - until last Friday.

## Sowing Seeds

During the winter months it is exciting to grow a citrus or avocado plant from seed. Depending in which region you live the avocado could become an indoor plant and the citrus tree could be transplanted outdoors.

Most citrus can be grown from seeds, but for more predictable results obtain a seedling from a nursery. Water frequently and keep in a warm well lit room. In the cold season keep the citrus indoors near a sunny window. During the summer keep the plants well watered and give them a monthly feeding of complete house plant fertilizer.

An avocado plant can be started by inserting toothpicks in the sides and suspending the seed halfway in water. When the root becomes apparent, transplant to a pot with rich loose soil. Make sure the root's pit is half exposed in the pot. Keep moist and in a well lit area.

HINT: In the cold season keep citrus indoors near sunny window.

In the warm season keep them outdoors in a lightly shaded area, and avoid full sun.

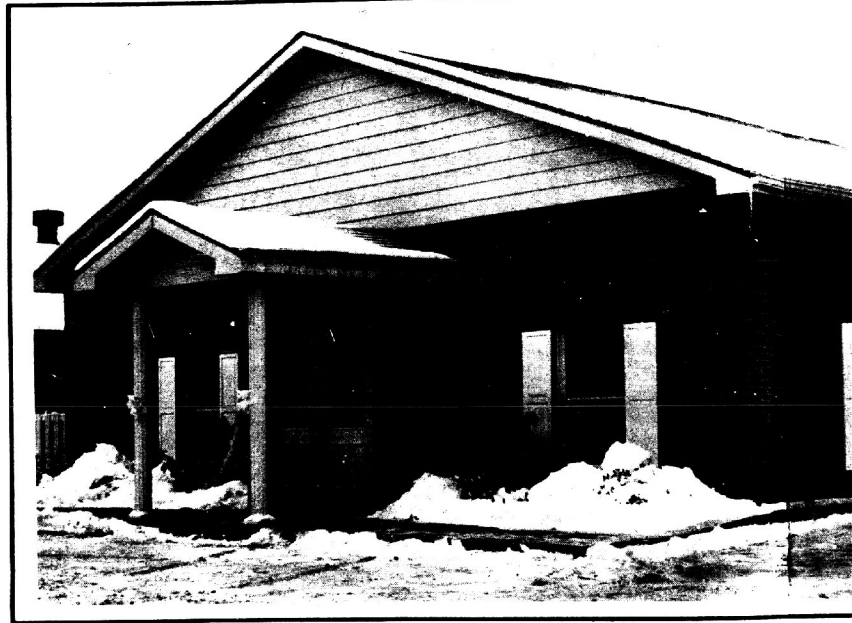

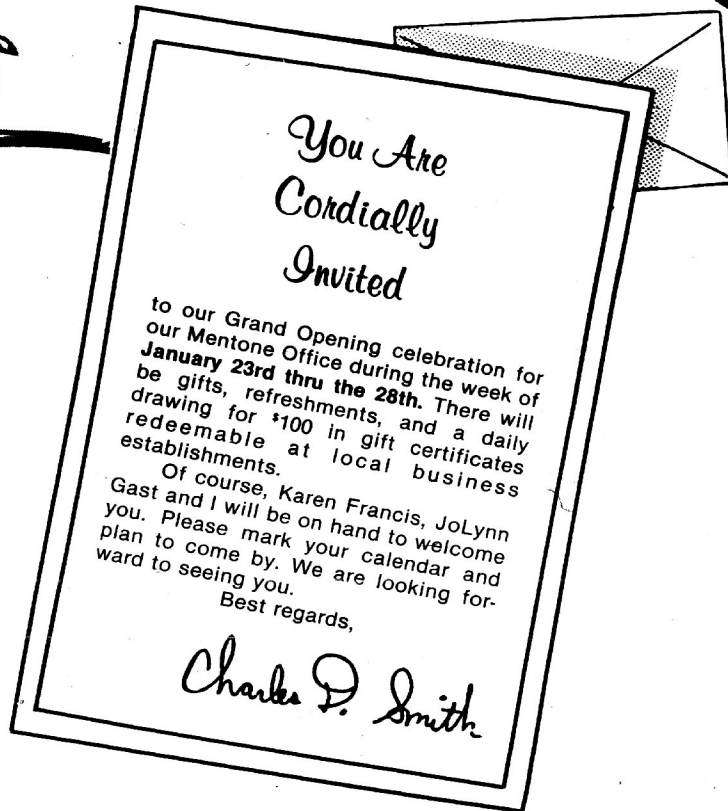

## Fulton County Circuit Court

### Civil

**Farmers and Merchants Bank, Rochester,** filed a complaint to foreclose a mortgage against **Diana L. Honkomp Moore** and **Jack W. Moore.**

Brandenburg.** The suit was filed after the younger **Eatmon** was injured in a car-pedestrian accident May 25, 1982. **Brandenburg** was the driver of the car.

## NIPSCO reports record gas use

your insurance won't stand it, I feel the board should. Some of the expenses I'll handle myself, but it's the board's responsibility to take some of this since we've been fooling with it for two years."

Ski rental, which costs \$2 per hour for skis, boots, bindings and poles, is available at the following state parks: Chain O'Lakes, Albion; Dunes, Chesterton; Mounds, Anderson; Ouabache, Bluffton; Pokagan, Angola; Potato Creek, North Liberty; and Tippecanoe River, Winamac.

Skiing trails open when there is at least a 4 to 6 inch base of snow at the area. Ski rental is available from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. at all parks. Chain O'Lakes, Dunes, Ouabache and Tippecanoe River will operate rentals only on week-

ends and holidays. Groups of five or more people wanting to reserve skis for weekday use at these four properties should contact the appropriate park office.

A \$20 deposit or driver's license is required to rent skis. Skiers are also liable for equipment damage.

Ridenour encourages individuals owning their own skis to

take advantage of the state's excellent cross-country ski trails.

The Pokagan toboggan run is open from 5 to 10 p.m. on Friday, 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. on Saturday and 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Sunday and holidays.

## Woodlawn closes cancer detection clinic

After 27 years of operation the Woodlawn Hospital Cancer Detection Clinic is closing down according to a joint announcement by Robert E. Kelsey, hospital chief executive, and clinic representatives Eileen Halterman, Mary Pike, and Geneva Metzger.

"It has been a benefit to the community and has a commendable record," says Kelsey, "but it has simply outlived its time."

"The Pap test and breast exams which have been offered at the monthly clinics are not considered sufficient by most doc-

tors today in light of improved cancer detection techniques. Physicians prefer to see patients in their offices for a more complete examination."

Additionally, fewer women are taking advantage of the clinic's services.

The Woodlawn Hospital Cancer Detection Clinic opened in August of 1956 following a donation from O.M. Miller in memory of his wife Ethel who was a cancer victim. Local physicians donated their services as did the volunteers who assisted: Mary Pike, Eileen Halterman, Geneva Metzger,

Velma Thompson, and Edna Bailey.

Mrs. Lea Goss and Howard Wertzberger served as chairman and treasurer through most of the clinic's years of operation. Records indicate that 5,720 exams were given.

The last clinic was held December 13, 1983, according to Mrs. Halterman.

Equipment which has been donated in the past will continue to be used for patient purposes. The remaining funds will be applied towards cancer patients' needs until expended.

## Bell Memorial library offers Citizens Guide

Anyone who wishes to have an impact on the drunk driving problem in our area can now get help at Bell Library in Mentone.

Madeleine Fisher, Librarian, announced that A Citizen Activist Guide to Fight Drunk Driving has been made available to the library by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). NHSTA, an agency of the U.S. Department of Transportation, disseminated the Activist Guide in cooperation with Allstate Insurance Company and the American Library Association. The Guide has been mailed to more than 17,000 public, junior college, college and university libraries across the country.

The Guide provides "how to" information that will help individuals organize a task force to study the drunk driving problem and then get the study results translated into effective programs for their own localities. During the

past few years, several citizens' groups have used the "grass roots" approach that has successfully focused attention on the problem and on the potential solutions. The Citizen Activist Guide sets out a step-by-step method of investigating a community's existing system for dealing with drunk drivers. It also includes helpful suggestions about strategy, how to finance a program for controlling drunk drivers, how to draw public attention to the subject, and how to lobby for change.

Mrs. Fisher noted that at least 55% of all fatal traffic collisions are alcohol-related, and 650,000 people will be seriously injured by drunk drivers in the United States during this year alone.

The Citizen Activist Guide to Fight Drunk Driving is available during regular library hours, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. every day except Sundays.

## Claypool board members set new RR speed limits

At the Wednesday, Jan. 4 meeting of the Claypool Town Board, trustees approved drafting an ordinance limiting the speed of trains going through Claypool to 45 mph. Board members unanimously approved this move, also agreeing a sign designating the lower speed limit should be placed at the east edge of town.

Although an earlier meeting

with three representatives of the Norfolk & Western Railroad resulted in a refusal to lower their speed limit, trustees decided to sign the lower limit into town law. Town Attorney Duane Huffer reported statutes are not clear regarding this matter.

The ordinance will be completed before the February 1 meeting.

## English visitor learns old American art forms

In a back corner, tucked upon a hill, a small cottage stands on Lukens Lake. You begin to wonder what is so special about a cottage on a lake. Well, in this case it's not so much the cottage that interests me, but the people who live inside.

Larry Houchin, his wife Lynda Capocci, their two children and Michael Hendry.

Michael is a tall, thin, blond from Ipswich, England. Michael is similar to any other 17-year-old you would see, but he is different. Michael came to the states to study woodworking and silversmithing under the direction and guidance of Houchin.

Houchin has been in the business for a little over 10 years. He

makes everything from pipes to tie tacks. One of the most interesting pieces was a tie tack made from the rattles of a rattlesnake. Houchin also deals in furs; for example, if you wanted a full-mounted buffalo, Houchin could put you in contact with someone that could get you one.

Houchin and Michael recently returned from a knife show in New York. Several of Houchin's knives had ivory handles and were done in scrimshaw by Houchin's wife, Lynda. "It was good experiences for Michael to go to the show in New York," Lynda said. Houchin also goes to several other shows during the year, displaying his fine jewelry and artwork. The next show on his agenda is the "Hodston Livestock & Rodeo Show," in the Astrodome.

"Show's like this only let registered people in; for example, my husband belongs to the Knife-makers Guild," Lynda said.

Scrimshaw is an old form of art, done by the whalers to pass time between whale hunts. Most scrimshaw is done on pieces of ivory. But the whalers used whales teeth. They would scratch a design on the tooth with a nail, and later fill the indentations up with ink. "It was considered very rough work, the whalers weren't artists," Lynda said.

Lynda showed a fossilized walrus tusk that she is soon going to start scrimshawing. The tusk is between 30,000 and 35,000 years old. The ivory in the tusks sometimes turns different shades of

## TVSC School board approves administrative salaries

Members of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation board approved salaries retroactive to July 1, 1983 for both non-certified personnel and certified administrative personnel.

Trustees Richard Long, Fred McSherry, Cecil Miller, William Rogers and Jim Royer accepted the recommendation of Superintendent Baxter Paige to grant raises to non-certified personnel on a merit system. Paige submitted a list of wage recommen-

dations compiled by the principals of each school for their respective employees, and trustees unanimously approved the list.

Administrators Dan Kramer, Oliver England, Paige and Bob DuBois were each granted \$1500 increases, also retroactive to July 1, 1983. Kramer also received an additional \$2000 increase for the Chapter I duties he's assumed this year. The new salaries are: Kramer, \$29,490; Paige, \$42,885; England, \$26,420; and DuBois,

\$30,295.

Paige read a report of accreditation from the State Department of Public Instruction. TVHS and Mentone both received first class commissions. Burket received a continuous commission, and Akron dropped from a continuous commission to a certified commission. Reason for Akron receiving a lower rating was "due to poor physical plant," although they stated the staff and curri-

culum were good. The report strongly recommended a new junior high facility at Akron was needed. They also recommended the libraries at all four schools needed upgraded materials, equipment and books.

Paige and Valley principal John Hill explained some changes in the high school program will need to be implemented for the 1984-'85 school year, due to new requirements of the Indiana General Commission. Although the final report has not been received, Paige explained preliminary guidelines call for a minimum of six hours of instruction time daily, or 250 minutes of instruction per week, at the high school level. Non-instructional time (lunch periods and activity periods) does not count towards the mandatory six hours. Valley currently does not meet those standards.

In response to questioning by trustee McSherry, Hill replied, "There's no question that next year we'll have to lengthen the (high school) school day by at least 30 minutes." Elementary schools are currently meeting the guidelines set by the Commission.

Paige also informed trustees a bill before the Indiana legislature may postpone the start of schools until after Labor Day, setting spring dismissal back to the first or second week in June.

In other business: Trustees granted permission to advertise for additional appropriations of \$11,500 from the cumulative building fund to cover costs of the new roof at the Mentone elementary and junior high building.

Work on the roof was completed January 11.

Commission was granted for members of the high school Ski Club and sponsors to go to Michigan on an overnight ski trip. Approximately 33 students and eight chaperons will take the trip on Feb. 25-26.

Board members granted a maternity leave to Miriam Ruppel beginning Feb. 24 through the end of the school year. Trustees also granted a second semester temporary contract to Deanna Hicks and contracts to bus drivers Larry Flor and Susan Worley.

Trustees approved claims of \$110,505.40 and payrolls of \$74,894.41, \$76,979.90 and \$73,730.69.

Principals reported that last Friday marked the end of the semester and report cards will be sent home Wednesday. England informed trustees that Burket third graders will attend the Shrine Circus in Fort Wayne on Feb. 3. Ron Leachy, Mentone principal, invited trustees to attend Mentone's athletic banquet on March 13 and their science fair on March 20.

Hill reported that gymnastics, swimming and basketball teams are in the thick of their seasons, with the girls basketball sectional starting Feb. 2. Band director Kim Metcalf has organized a jazz band, and the winter concert is scheduled for Feb. 15. Auditions for the spring musical, to be held April 13-14, are being held this week.

The next meeting of the board will be Monday, Feb. 20 at 7:30 p.m.

## John J. Delworth seeks Circuit Court judgeship

John J. Delworth, Jr., Judge of the Fulton-Pulaski County Court, has announced his candidacy for election as Judge of the Fulton Circuit Court.

Judge Delworth, a Rochester Attorney, a Democrat, and a former Fulton Circuit Court Judge, was appointed by then Governor Otis Bowen to the bench of the newly created joint County Court, effective July 1, 1977. He was elected in 1978 and again in 1982 to that position.

A graduate of Valparaiso University (1950, Bachelor of Arts degree) and Law School (1955, Doctor of Jurisprudence degree), Judge Delworth began his practice of law in Rochester in 1957. He was Rochester City Attorney from January, 1958 to January, 1966 and from July, 1967 to January, 1976.

In 1966 he was appointed Judge of the Fulton Circuit Court by

then Governor Roger Branigan to replace Judge Frederick Rakestraw who was named to the Indiana Supreme Court.

In addition to his duties as Judge of the Joint County Court,

he has served as special judge in surrounding County, Superior and Circuit Courts, as well as hearing officer for the Indiana Supreme Court in disciplinary matters and special judge in the Pulaski and Starke Circuit Courts by appointment of the Indiana Supreme Court. He also caused to be created and directs, the Fulton and Pulaski Court's alcohol and drug abuse program for the counseling, education and referral of alcohol and drug abusers.

Judge Delworth, age 57, resides with his wife Nora at 1806 Oakwood Drive in Rochester. 50 YEARS AGO

The Akron high school basketball team won the Fulton county basketball tournament last Saturday at Rochester by defeating Talma, Fulton, and Grass Creek. This is the Flyers' second consecutive victory and they retain their title of county champs.

The first game of the tournament was between Akron and Talma, and was a rather listless affair. Coach Deardoff played his second string players most of this game, injecting the regular five for a long enough period to give the Flyers a safe lead. The final score was 37 to 19.

The second game which the Flyers had to play with Fulton, the team many dopsters had chosen to win the tournament. The Flyers took the floor and were complete masters of the game from the very beginning until the final whistle had sounded.

The Bull Dogs were nosed out by a score of 37 to 27 and the victory was even more decisive than the score would indicate.

Grass Creek had sneaked into the final game by defeating Kewanee in the forenoon and Richland Center in the afternoon. In both of these games the boys from the other side of the county had played good ball, but they cracked up under the stellar work of the champs and folded up under a barrage of baskets that sent the final score to 39-10.

The Flyers were easily the cream of the county teams during the tournament and those who saw the boys defeat Fulton sighed and wished they had been shooting like that in either the Beaver Dam or Rochester encounter.

pink. Lynda explains that while the tusk lays on the edge of the water until gathered the ivory picks up minerals and they will change the color of the tusks.

"Scrimshaw is actually an American art." It was classified as the original American art. "Each scrimshander has his own basic style, but when scrimshaw was began in the state of Washington the Bellingham style was developed and that is what most people use," Lynda said.

Some scrimshaw work is only used in the collector category, but there are also some pieces that were made to be functional, such as plaques, mounted tusks on stands and mostly used for decorative purposes. J.F. Kennedy was an avid scrimshaw collector.

Michael is not really interested in learning the scrimshaw, he is presently studying books on silver and woodworkings. "I am slowly building into woodworking right now," Michael said.

One of Michael's first projects was making a wooden Indian war club. The handle is long and wrapped in animal skins and beautiful feathers are added later. Michael has done some intricate etching on the base of the club.

Michael has been with the

Houchins since November. He decided to come work under Houchin, after he had graduated from school in England at the age of 16.

Michael describes the unemployment in England much worse than in the states. He had a job selling vegetables in the open market, but nothing to "make a family life," said Michael.

Michael is from a small town in England called Ipswich. According to Michael the size of Ipswich is comparable to North Manchester. Ipswich is located 65 miles from London. He lives with his family in a brick home built by the council (England's government). The council owns most of the housing in England and you pay rent to them. You pay only what you can afford to pay, similar to the government subsidized housing in the states.

Michael said he has done more traveling in the past two weeks, going to shows, than he has in his whole lifetime. He is looking forward to the Houston Livestock & Rodeo Show at the end of February. Michael hopes to take back to England with him the trade of silversmithing and woodworking. "In England I would like to open my own business, probably in the London area," said Michael.

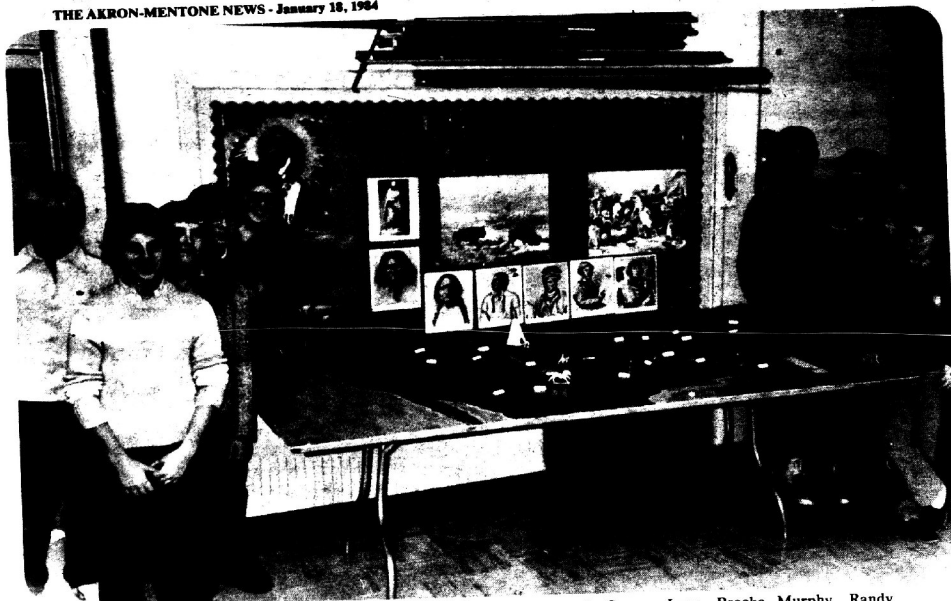

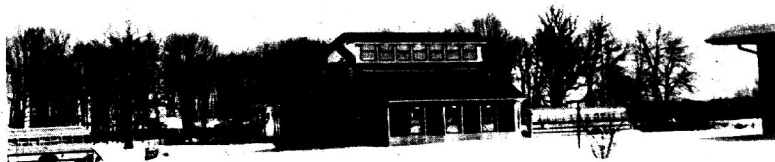

## Valley building trades class tackles ambitious project

Although last year's Tippecanoe Valley building trades class successfully completed their first passive solar home, instructor Ken Murphy admitted this year's project is the most ambitious he's ever attempted with students.

For starters, the three-bedroom home is a good deal larger than last year's home. The building, located in Saner's Addition, Akron, has a total of 1600 square feet of living space and a two-car garage, while last year's ranch-style home had only 1300 square feet. This is also the first time Murphy's students have tackled constructing a two-story home, and the passive solar features in this house are different than those used previously. Add to these things Mother Nature's cold refusal to cooperate, and Murphy

and his students have had a very interesting time.

"This morning (Thursday, Jan. 19) when we arrived, the inside temperature was 17 degrees," Murphy explained. "It's a great motivating factor; the kids get here and work to keep warm. We couldn't have made it without our daily stops at the Akron Supermarket to get Twinkies and drinks!"

"Seriously, though, the cold temperatures have slowed us down. We had to stop on the block work, because cement won't set up in the cold. The furnace was delivered this week," he added, "and once we get that set up and working, we'll be able to begin some of the finishing work."

Murphy saw the plans for the house in a magazine and decided

it was time to try something different. "Last year we adapted the house plans to include the passive solar features, but these plans included the solar design," he said. "When I saw them, I knew this lot was the only place this house could sit. It had to be this house on this lot to bring out the richness of the woods and still fit in with the other homes around it."

Even so, Murphy found a place in the house plans for improvement. He and his students added a small room on the second floor from attic space that would otherwise have been wasted. The room, which is located behind one of the bedrooms, would be perfect for an office, a sewing room, or a playroom.

The outside of the house is covered by rough-sawn reverse

board and batten and features large windows and glass-paned walls with a southern exposure. The cement blocks used on the southern wall of the home are painted black between the windows and covered with glass sheeting to absorb and hold heat from the sun.

In addition to the outside, front block wall, there's an inside center block wall, rising the full two stories of the house, that will also hold heat. After laying the blocks, the student carpenters filled the wall with concrete for

mass.

The inside room, which Murphy called the "great room," has a cathedral ceiling and an open balcony from the second floor. This openness further contributes to solar heat distribution, as there is a solid row of windows in the second-story outside wall. A small solarium in the southeast corner of the great room, backed by a solid wall of brick, further adds to both the attractiveness and design of the home.

## Akron town board selects Jack Miller president

Board members Jerry Hudson and Dick Drudge elected Jack Miller to serve as president of the new Akron town board. Trustees met in public meeting on Tuesday, Jan. 17 to formally organize. Members also decided to hire Robert Peterson, Rochester, as the town attorney for 1984 for a \$500 retainer. He replaces Jess Brown.

Trustees revealed the 1979 Ford LTD used by the police depart-

ment had been sold at a car auction in Fort Wayne. Miller announced the town received \$475 from the sale after fees had been paid.

Henry Township trustee Jean Connors spoke with board members about the "workfare" program she's established. The workfare program is a public works service designed to give the town compensation for financial aid received from the Trustee's office.

Trustees assured Connors they'd support the program and accept workers from her office once they have proof of insurance coverage. Connors agreed to get a copy of the insurance policy.

Connors and the town trustees also discussed the 1974 agreement between the town and the township concerning fire protection. She showed them a chart of her costs, which have increased 758 percent in ten years. The 1984

township budget for firefighting is \$9100.

Trustees discussed a proposal from Strummel and Hill, LaFountaine, whereby the company would make regular maintenance checks for the town's sewage treatment plants. Cost per visit would be \$290 for four visits annually, plus cost of materials for needed repair. Miller suggested the company be queried regarding labor costs and the cost

of a semi-annual maintenance program. This motion carried.

In other business: Marshal Dave Kruger reported 38 parked cars have been legally abandoned on public streets or private property. According to State statutes, these cars can be towed at the owner's expense. After discussion, trustees agreed to notify owners through the media (see

which Dr. John McKee questioned the need for the building corporation (holding company) to have an \$250,000 account. "They (building corporation members) are costing us money," he said, estimating the money invested at six percent would net TVSC taxpayers \$15,000 in interest per year.

Forbes said his own figures would place the amount to be earned higher than that since he thought a higher interest rate could be obtained. He said the high balance resulted because the payment schedule previously established was not effective in light of the slow progress at the school.

Without voting, board members agreed the building corporation should invest part of the funds, retaining a "reasonable" working balance.

## TVSC to provide free immunizations

A free immunization clinic will be conducted in the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation to provide immunizations for students who are not in compliance with the state law. The law requires that students enrolled at grade one or below have received:

Four doses of diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, or tetanus diphtheria vaccine.

Three doses of trivalent oral polio vaccine.

One dose of measles (rubeola) vaccine.

One dose of rubella (German or three day measles) vaccine.

Students enrolled at grade two or above must have a minimum of three doses of Diphtheria, Whoop-

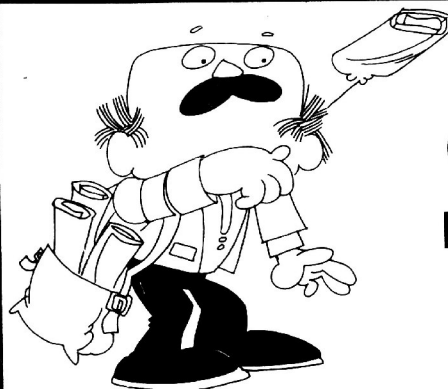
ing cough, tetanus or tetanus diphtheria vaccine. Mumps vaccine is strongly recommended, but not required by law. However, legislation pending may make it required in the near future. If Measles vaccine was given prior to 12 months of age, or before 1969, it cannot be assumed to be effective, and should be repeated. If measles, mumps, or rubella vaccine is missing in the students immunization history, it is recommended that one dose of MMR vaccine be given to provide the missing vaccine, and to serve as a booster for those already received. Immunizations are required for all students except those whose parents have filed a statement of

objection with the school.

Immunizations will be given at the high school on Feb. 1, at Akron and Mentone schools on Feb. 2, and at Burket on Feb. 16. Permission forms will be sent home with high school students, and mailed to parents of students in Mentone, Akron, and Burket schools. The forms should be returned to school as soon as possible.

## Abandoned Vehicles

The problem of abandoned vehicles throughout the town has been brought to the attention of the Akron Town Board, and the Board requests the assistance of the owners in removing these vehicles - particularly those which are parked on public property. As of Tuesday, Jan. 17 there were 38 cars and trucks which fall under the category of "Abandoned" as defined by Indiana State Statutes, I.C. 9-3-1, 1-2.

These include:

- (1) A vehicle located on public property illegally;
- (2) A vehicle left on public property continuously without being moved for three (3) days;
- (3) A vehicle located on public property in such a manner as to constitute a hazard or obstruction to the movement of pedestrian or vehicle traffic on a public right-of-way;
- (4) A vehicle which has remained on private property without the consent of the owner of the property for more than forty-eight (48) hours;
- (5) A vehicle from which there has been removed the engine, transmission, or differential or that is otherwise partially dismantled or inoperable and left on public property;
- (6) A vehicle which has been removed...upon request of an officer...if the vehicle has not been claimed within 15 days;
- (7) A vehicle that is six (6) or more model years old and mechanically inoperable, and is left on private property continuously in a location visible from public property for more than thirty (3) days.

"Public Property" means a public right-of-way, street, highway, alley, park, or other state, county, or municipal property. "Private Property" means all property other than Public Property.

The Board has decided on a 30 day grace period to permit the owners of these abandoned vehicles to remove them to proper places. After that time the pertinent procedures of the Statutes will be followed and the vehicles will be towed and impounded at the owner's expense.

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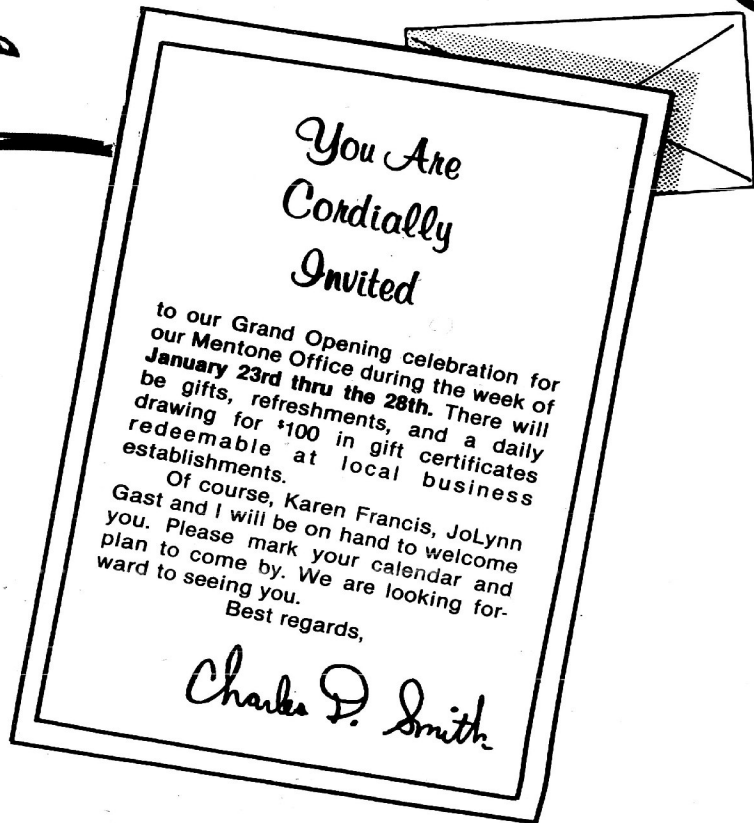
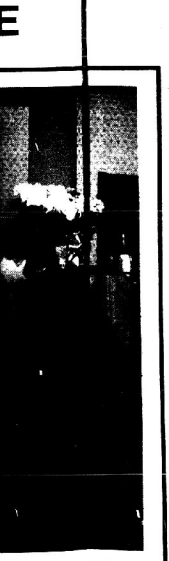

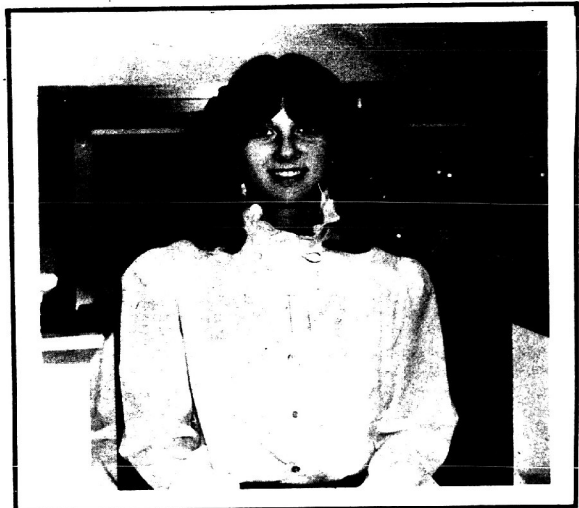
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## Notice

The Akron Police Department has received many complaints from the citizenry concerning loose dogs running the streets of town, particularly during the late night and early morning hours. As the weather has been getting colder, more stray/wild dogs have been coming into town and, with pets whose owners allow to run free, are forming packs.

These loose dogs pose a threat to the health and safety of the town by tearing open trash sacks, chasing and killing smaller household pets, and a possible threat to homeowners attempting to rescue their pets, while they are walking the streets or jogging in the evenings or mornings, or otherwise conducting their daily business.

The Akron Police Department has caused to be published in **The Akron-Mentone News** the town ordinance which requires all pet dogs to be confined—either tied in the yard or penned. Pet owners are responsible for any and all damages caused by their pets running loose and may be held civilly liable for their dog's actions.

In order to preserve the order of the town and reduce the stray dog problem, the Akron Police Department will attempt to capture and impound loose dogs. Dogs which can not be captured and are deemed by the police to be vicious or dangerous will be destroyed then and there.

## State advisor issues woodburning stove warning

Members of the public and private sector are combining efforts to inform Indiana residents of the dangers of improper installation of woodburning devices.

According to Chuck Coffee, energy conservation advisor to Gov. Robert D. Orr, improper installation of woodburning devices is responsible for 25 percent of all fires that occur during the heating season. Of those fires, 75 percent are a result of improper installation by the homeowner.

These statistics are derived from a three-year study of five states, including Indiana. The State Administrative Building Council has organized talks to address those statistics involving representatives from the Federal Consumer Product Safety Commission, the Office of the Governor, the Office of the State Fire Marshal, the State Energy Office, Meridian Insurance Companies and the National Association of Mutual Insurance Companies.

With the increase of woodburning devices in private homes, new risks are developing such as: (1)

The tendency of homeowners to install too large of appliances and therefore burn too cool of a fire which causes creosote build-up in chimneys, (2) Poorly designed chimneys that fail to properly vent hot gases, and (3) Inadequate maintenance of stovepipes and chimneys.

All these factors combine to create a potentially dangerous situation in Indiana homes. The talks will focus on developing a campaign to reach users of woodburning appliances. Stress will be placed on clearances of combustibles, stovepipe materials and proper maintenance of woodburning devices.

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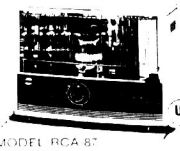
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## Valley girls fall 55-54

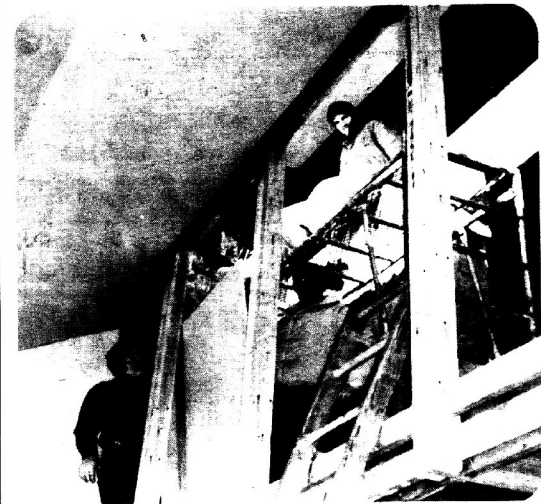

Marshal Kruger requested 12 stop signs be purchased to replace worn signs on side streets. Trustees instructed him to price the signs.

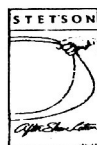

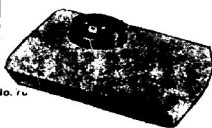

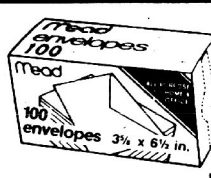
