

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# Hear program on "Freedom's Symbol"

Anthony Nigo Chapter, DAR met recently at the festively decorated home of Mrs. Charles (Cara Lyn) Tucker of Mentone.

The program, "Freedom's Symbol-The Lady with the Lamp-Keeper of Dreams" was given by Tucker. She stated the Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island Centennial Commission was formed by President Ronald Reagan in May, 1982. Comprised entirely of private citizens, the commission charged with restoring the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island. The commission aims to accomplish three goals: 1) to completely restore the Statue of Liberty in time for the centennial of its dedication in 1986; 2) to prevent further decay of the historic buildings on Ellis Island, and to plan for its development as a national, living experience, in tribute to the ethnic and national origins of all Ameri-cans; and 3) to plan memorable centennial celebrations between 1984 and 1986 for the Statue of Liberty and in 1992 for the centennial of Ellis Island. To accomplish these goals \$230 million will be required. There will be no government funding, so support must come from the private sectorcorporations, private sources and importantly, the grass roots.

Mrs. Tucker explained the Statue, a gift to America from the French people--a pledge of friend-ship and a commemoration of the centennial of their independence had been proposed by Edouard de Laboylaye at a dinher party in 1865. In 1971 Frederic Auguste Bartholdi, a French sculptor, after studying New York harbor, returned to Paris with a clear image of the Statue he would create. Four years later, a campaign to raise funds for construction of this monumental project was launched. After fifteen years of dedicated of Bartholdi, Alexandre Gustave Eiffel, structural engineer, French fund raisers, construction workers, and gifts from the grass roots, the Lady was completed. On October 28, 1886, the American people were ready to receive "Liberty" in New York harbor.



# Claypool Board re-organizes

#### People to get new statement

A new Form SSA-1099, Social Security Benefit Statement, will be sent to each of the roughly 550 people around Akron who got any Social Security benefits during 1984. Nationally, about 40 million forms will be mailed out by zip codes. Akron residents can expect their forms shortly after January 7th.

The forms are being sent out, with a copy to IRS, because people who have substantial other income may have to include up to half of their Social Security benefits on their Federal income tax returns. All of the money collected by this new tax will be deposited into the Social Security trust funds and used to pay benefits. The 1983 Amendments, which took away the tax-exempt status of benefits, were designed to guarantee the continued financial soundness of Social Security. The Amendments were strongly endorsed by the President and Congress.

The 1099 will show the amount of Social Security a person got during 1984. The new form should be used when completing Federal income tax returns for 1984, just like any other Form 1099 sent by a financial institution. A simple worksheet called IRS Notice 703 will be included for people to see if any of their Social Security benefits may be subject to Federal income tax. It is estimated that 90% of the people getting benefits will not have to pay any tax on them and this have no need to contact their local Social Security office.

People who still have questions about the information shown on Form SSA-1099 should call the toll-free 900 number printed on the form rather than their local office. Questions about tax liability or figuring income tax should go to the Internal Revenue Service at their toll-free phone number of 1-800-424-1040.

Publication 915 contains a detailed explanation of the entries on Form SSA-1099 and explains taxability of benefits. Free copies are available at any Social Security or IRS office. Request one by writing to: Social Spourity Administration, P.20, Box 19, South Bend, IN 46624.

Only two units were filled with eggs, but the entire loss, including the 3,200 eggs, was announced by Mr. Cook as being between \$2,500 and \$3,000. Two relatively new brooder houses, located about five feet from each side of the hatchery, were kept from burning by the department and friends who braved the cold morning air.

Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Tucker and John Vangundy narrowly escaped serious injury the other evening at Etna Green. The Tucker car, proceeding east on Highway 30, turned off the pavement into Etna Green on their way home, and just after they left the pavement a large truck went past them on the right side, crumpling the right fenders and bumper. The truck finally stopped before crashing into the filling station and oil storage tanks. No one was injured other than a few bumps.

The members of the Mentone volunteer fire department gathered at the home of their chief, Arlo Friesner, where they enjoyed a very delicious steak dinner, served by Mrs. Friesner, Mrs. Ciik and Mrs. Fawley.

Arlo had a great part in making the plans for the evening and was really enjoying the fact that he was having a chance to entertain the boys but he was somewhat befuddled when the gang started singing "Happy Birthday" to him. He figured no one knew that he had a birthday then and he had made every effort to conceal the fact after he realized that the birthday and the night of the meeting were identical.

Mr. Friesner received a number of gifts from the department and friends. The greater part of the evening was spent reminiscing on things of the past in and around Mentone while the cigar-smokers puffed on cigars presented to the department the fore part of the week by Paul Cook.

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



# **Akron Library offers** IRS forms to public

The Akron Carnegie Public Library has resources available to assist the public in filling out federal income tax forms, according to Velma Bright, Librarian.

The material is prepared and provided by the IRS in cooperation with the nationa's libraries. Useful aids include audio cassettes containing simple line-by-line instructions for filling out federal forms 1040EZ; 1040A and Schedule 1; and 1040 and Schedules A, B, and W.

These and other commonly used federal tax forms and schedules can often be obtained or photocopied at the Library. Individuals should check to see if the forms they need are available in their local library.

Many IRS publications are available for public reference. One that can help taxpayers prepare their individual tax returns is Publication 17, Your Federal Income Tax. Federal tax laws applying to business and farmers are explained in Publication 334, Tax Guide for Small Busines, and Publication 225, Farmers Tax Guide.

Publication 1194, specially designed for libraries, is a set of the IRS's most requested publications and a helpful reference guide

Reproductible tax forms are contained in Publication 1132. This allows a taxpayer to easily photocopy for a fee of (15¢ per page or 2 pages 25¢) more than 90 of the most commonly used federal income tax forms.

Publication 910, also available at the library, is the handy Taxpayer's Guide to IRS Information, Assistance and Publications. This publication contains useful year-round tips on how to obtain tax information.

Taxpayers wishing to receive recorded tax tips via their telephones can pick up a brochure on Tele-Tax Publication 1163. The brochure lists various tax topics which can be accessed by using either a push button or rotary-dial phone

Under Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA), the IRS trains volunteers to offer free tax assistance to elderly, handicapped, lower-income and non-English speaking taxpayers, and this is available at Senior Citizen Sites.

As a service for the blind, several of the most needed forms and publications are available in braille and distributed through the Regional Libraries for Blind and Physically Handicapped.

Librarians are not expected to serve as tax experts, the IRS stressed. They will, however, be able to direct taxpayers to these many helpful tax aids.

After a reception in the Statehouse rotunda, state officials will hold open houses in their respective offices.

Following the formal swearing-in, the celebrations will begin. A private \$500-a-couple reception will start at 5:30 p.m. in the Skyline Club and last until 7 p.m. when the four newly-inaugurated officeholders and their wives will be transported by horse-drawn carriages to the Indiana Convention Center, Others attending the reception will be transported to the Convention Center via the new Metro trolleys

The site for the Inaugural dinner and ball, Hall D of the Convention Center, will be decorated in shades of plum, white, silver and blue. These colors will also be featured in a commemorative poster designed for the

# **Indiana farmers** on campaign

Hundreds of Indiana farmers from most counties of the state have entered a campaign to try to get the federal deficit reduced. They have signed pre-printed cards addressed to Congress which encourages their Congressmen and the Administration to reduce the federal deficit through reduced spending.

The farmers point out that interest rates are still too high. At present levels, they prevent full economic recovery in housing, farming, and many other businesses. Lower interest rates will stimulate production, reduce unemployment, and boost the chance for continued economic recovery, the Hoosiers point out.

"As citizens, we cannot live very long beyond our means and neither can our government. Government spending should be reduced rather than resort to increased taxes. My signature tells you I am deeply concerned and will support you in constructive actions that you must take to lower interest rates," the pre-printed card says.

The "Balanced Budget Brigade" campaign concludes January 29-30 when Donald E. Henderson, Indiana Farm Bureau, Inc., national affairs director, will take the cards to Washington where he will join Farm Bureau representa-

representatives from other states who also bring cards.

A news conference will feature American Farm Burea Vice-President, Elton Smith, who is also president of the Michigan Farm Bureau. Smith has been a visitor in Indiana a number of times and has spoken at a number of meetings here. For the "Balanced Budget" push, the American Farm Bureau is trying to arrange visits with President Reagan and Congressional leaders.

Treasurer of State Julian I.. Ridlen announced that the State of Indiana has received a check from the Chrysler Corporation for the amount of \$1,689,180.33, representing interest on the \$32 million loan at 10.5 percent for the period of July 2, 1984 through January 1, 1985. The cumulative total for the loan repayment now equals \$15,942,330.80.

'We are very pleased with the progress of the Chrysler Corporation and their efforts to rebuild this vital industry by maintaining a prompt repayment schedule and periodic certification compliance with employment levels in Indiana," Ridlen remarked.

In closing on the rene otiated loan for August, 1983, the State of Indiana agreed to lower the interest rate on the \$32 million loan from 15.5 percent to 10.5 percent per annum, as well as extend the life of the loan from July 30, 1985 to July 1, 1986. Chrysler, in turn, agreed to maintain a level of employment within Indiana plants above 9.6 percent of the total number of Chrysler employees nationwide, and to establish a Research and Development facility at the Indianapolis Shadeland Avenue plant to manufacture 1985 model-year wiper blade motors and assemblies. Ridlen stated that the corporation is continuing to uphold its pledge of employment levels in Hoosier plants, and that the Research and Development facility is currently in full operation.

# Local Jaycees to help with Cerebral Palsy benefit

Indianapolis - In 1985, some 7,000 infants throughout the country will be born with Cerebral Palsy and another 1,500 will acquire the condition as a result of injury or infection, such as influenzal meningitis, one of the leading causes of Cerebral Palsy.

Presently, nearly 700,000 people across the United States are affected by the condition with 20-25% of preschool children acquiring Cerebral Palsy as a result of influenzal meningitis infection, ending in a high mortality rate among preschool children, especially those under two years of age. What's more, children surviving the disease are extremely prone to brain damage.

Research commitments for the UCP Research and Educational Foundation for fiscal 1985 is \$1,083,000. Funding will go to research as well as the development of a vaccine to curtail influenzal meningitis be available for limited testing sometime within the next year.

To begin the new year with increased awareness, a Joint Resolution requesting the President to designate January 1985 as "National Cerebral Palsy Month" has again been passed in the United States Senate and House of Representatives.

The Jaycees, headed up this year by J.P. Freeman, will take phone pledges throughout the telethon at 982-4005. Last year the group raised nearly \$400 in support of statewide programs and services for over 20,000 Hoosiers with cerebral palsy.

# Financial Aid **Awareness Week** set for Jan. 13-19

January 13 - 19, 1985, has been proclaimed Financial Aid Awareness Week by Governor Robert D. Orr. If you are interested in a college, university or technical education but cannot pay the entire cost, you may be eligible for federal, state, or local financial aid. Grants, loans and work-study programs are awarded on the basis of demonstrated financial need and/or merit, college cost and availability of funds. They may be used for part-time of full-time study.

Two major grants include: the State Student Assistance Commission of Indiana Higher Education and Freedom of Choice Awards, offering assistance towards tuition and fees for Indiana residents attending eligible Indiana Institutions; the federal Pell Grant offering up to \$1,900 per year towards educational expenses at over 7,000 post high-school institutions throughout the United States. Three federal campus-based programs include the Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant [SEOG], providing up to \$2,000 annually, College Work-Study [CWS], allowing part of the educational expenses to be earned through work, and the National Direct Student Loan [NDSL], paid back at 5% interest starting six months after leaving school. In Indiana, all five programs may be applied for by completed the Financial Aid Form [FAF] and an institutional aid application if required. Applicants should apply prior to March 1, 1985, for the 85-86 school

Two other loan programs are available through direct application to participating banks. The Guaranteed Student Loan Program charges 8% interest which starts accumulating when repayment begins six months after leaving school. The Parent Loan for Undergraduate Students [PLUS], allows parents of undergraduate students, independent and graduate students to borrow at 12% with repayment starting immediately.

During Financial Aid Awareness Week, most communities, high schools and colleges will be sponsoring financial aid presentations. For deadlines and more specific details on federal, state, and local financial aid programs or to pick up applications, contact your local high school or the financial aid office of the institution you plan to attend.

#### Offer energy assistance

Public Service Indiana will offer energy assistance again this winter to low-income customers who are elderly or disabled. Applications for the Helping Hand program, conducted in cooperation with the American Association of Retired Persons and funded by PSI shareholders, now are being accepted at company offices.

Under the plan, applies \$1 against an eligible individual's electric bill for every \$1 supplied by the customer or a sponsoring agency. ## Instead of weight you lose your money

Maybe you got a little carried away with the season to be jolly and in true holiday spirit you gained ten pounds. To ease your conscience, on New Year's Eve you vowed to lose your excess weight.

The holidays are over and as you plan to start dieting, panic may easily set in. Attorney General Linley Pearson advises those who want to lose weight, not to buy the first weight-loss measure that promises fast and easy weight reduction.

"Instead of losing pounds, all you may lose is your money," Pearson said of some products on the market that profess wraps that "melt" away fat, or diet pills that allow you to eat whatever you want and still lose weight, may get your attention, but probably won't get you thin.

Rubber sweatsuits and wraps have no affect on fat deposits and will not dissolve fat, even temporarily. In fact, such treatment may cause a loss of inches and perhaps pounds due to heavy sweating, but reductions are only temporary. The fluid is soon replaced by eating and drinking. Such a rapid and excessive fluid loss can bring on severe dehydration and can upset the balance of essential chemicals in the body.

Diet pills can also cause dehydration, and many have high caffiene levels which can be very dangerous. The FDA has investigated many of these products and found that some users have complained of nausea, vomiting, diarrhea and stomach pains. The pills are especially hazardous to diabetics and people with heart problems.

Pearson advises the serious dieter to invest in a good, balanced, lower calorie diet, and a pair of walking or running shoes, instead of spending money on "get slim quick" products which may not work at all.

If you feel a diet product has taken you in, instead of taken your fat off, call Attorney General Linley Pearson's

Clerk Kate Whetstone read the minutes of the special meeting of December 3rd and the minutes of the regular meeting on December 17, which was the re-organizational

Department heads appointed again this year were Russell Hart, Town Marshall and Rod Holloway, Superintendent for the Water Department. Billy Steele was rehired as the town meter reader.

Non-remunerative positions for the town are: Public Service Board, the board which sets the water rates - Town Board members, Miller, Boardman and Tombaugh; Aviation Board · Dr. Wymond Wilson, William Ettinger, Don Smythe, Lois Miller; Park and Cemetery - Rosemary Bazini, Rosalind Mentzer, Annabelle Mentzer, Bob Whetstone, Darrell King, Wayne Tombaugh and Marian Smith; Zoning Board - Forrest Kantner, three years; Joe Good, three years; Kenny Romine, two years; Charlie Smith, one year. The Planning Commission is composed of Jim Miller, Miriam Boardman, Wayne Tombaugh, all three years; Eldon Horn, two years; Willard Wagner, one year. Darrell King was appointed as Sexton for the cemetery. Lee Bazini was to be asked if he would continue as legal council again this year.

Board President Miller stated that the Park and

Cemetery Boards should have two new members appointed. A new appointment was made to the Zoning Board during the meeting, depending on acceptance of the appointment; Jo Gamble will be asked if she will take a position on the board for a period of four years replacing Jerry Smith who went off the board at the end of 1984. There will also be a new appointment to the Planning Commission in the near future, to take the place of Wayne Bowser whose term on the commissionn ended last year.

Marshall's Salary Raised

During the session on appointments, the Board members inquired of Marshall Hart if he would be satisfied with his salary of \$14,000 again this year. Hart replied that he had understood that if the board did not hire a deputy for the police department, they (the board) would increase his salary by \$2,000. President Miller said he thought Hart should have a raise of at least \$500, but Hart came back with the fact that \$500 would only be around a 3% raise, and he had not had a raise in salary since he was hired as Marshall. Hart noted that he was promised a \$500 raise at the end of his probationary period and had received none.

Clerk Kate Whetstone stated that the budget now includes the provision for Hart's salary of \$14,000 plus \$4,000 for reserves, and the total budget for the police department included \$27,067 for the salaries of Marshall and Deputy Marshall plus dispatcher. Of this amount she said \$23,000 has already been spent including approximately \$3,000 for phone bills for the department.

> Should My Wife Have A Will, Too?

If your wife owns property, solely or jointly, or if she is heir to an estate, she should have a will of her own. This applies in quite a few other cases, too.

Husband and wife may be double victims of a fatal accident. The husband may have designated his wife as major beneficiary in his will. Without the wife's having a will of her own, distribution of her share of the estate will not have been provided for. Her share may be subject to state laws, tying it up for long periods right when it may be needed.

If the wife is a business partner in a family

the wife is a business partner in a ramily business, it is to the firm's advantage to have its business continuity assured by her having a will. After the man has made his will, he should discuss with his lawyer a separate will for the wife. Above all, be sure to consult your attorney. We've seen bad situations arise because no wills were made or because they were drawn up by amateurs. (Copyright 1978)

# Mentone Board

Trustee Boardman asked Miller if they should think about giving Hart \$15,000 and wait longer for the new police car, when Miller noted again about the savings from last year, not having hired a deputy nor a dispatcher.

Trustee Tombaugh then asked Hart if he would agree to an increase of \$1,000 of \$15,000 in salary, with no extra pay for time spent at court. Hart decided that he would do this, but stated that next year, he will expect a larger increase in salary. A motion was made by Tombaugh, seconded by Boardman to increase the Marshall's salary to \$15,000 yearly. Hart was then asked if he would still be the Director of Civil Defense and he replied that it goes along with his position. Hart is also the town's Building Commissioner.

Steele remains

The board asked Billy Steele, who presently is reading the town's water meters if he would continue in his position, and he agreed. President Miller asked Steele to have the readings done by the 21st of each month, so that the Town Clerk could get the water bills made out on time. Miller also told him he needed to check on leaks, etc., stating that if there is a lot of snow on the ground at the time the meters are being read. Steele would not be required to remove the snow to read the meters, but if at all possible, they should be read, so the readings would be actual and not estimated.

Good public opinion

Water Superintendent Rod Holloway, a veteran of one year at the job, was given a \$1,000 raise to increase his salary to \$13,000. Discussion of his salary and raise included the fact that he had saved the town money on backhoe work, and has worked extra time on week-ends checking the pumps, has required less supplies and the town's people having a very good opinion of his work. Holloway is the only employee in the Water Department.

Both Hart's and Holloway's raises are retroactive to the first of the year.

Revenue Sharing

Clerk Kate Whetstone reported to the board that the town of Mentone would receive \$5,233 in revenue sharing in 1985 as opposed to the estimated \$8,000.

Kosciusko Development Inc

Trustees discussed the option Mentone has of going along the route of developing the area under the direction of the KDI, or continuing in the present vein to develop the town's economic development prospects on their own via the Planning Commission. KDI is a county-wide economic development planning commission. Trustee Boardman made the comment she thought it was the job of the town board to spend taxpayers money to benefit the local town's people, and going with KDI would mean using the town's tax monies to help develop all of the county, not just the Mentone area. Kosc. Development Inc. asked for \$1,000 and an advisor from the Mentone area to works on their projects. President Miller stated that the County Commissioners had put in \$30,000 already of the county tax monies and if this is so, part of our/money (Mentone's) already gone to them.

Trustee Tombaugh made the statement that he could see no benefit to local people as there is no place to build at Mentone since the town is without a sewer system. Boardman suggested telling the KDI to contact Mentone's Chamber of Commerce. The issue was tabled at that time.

The board in discussing the new trash pickup contract with Stafford and Sons, Warsaw, decided to publish a notice in the local newspaper for several weeks which states (see notice in this issue) that trash pickup will be on Thursday each

week, beginning at 7 a.m. Mentone residents who do NOT want town trash pickup must contact and state that fact to town trustees. You may call 353-7674, 353-7690 or 353-7530 to do this.

#### Other Business

Several subjects were considered in the discussion between trustees including the alley work which is planned to begin this Spring; the new Ordinance for Street Signs which attorney Bazini is working on; revenue in the Water Department; delinquent water bills.

Marshall Hart requested that he be allowed to lock the front doors to the town hall on Saturday a.m. and keep them locked unless he is on duty through Sunday, to stop the vandalism being done in the public restroom area. He was told he would have to contact the Fire Control Board.

Holloway reported that the newest portable suction pump needs work and he was told to check on the cost of rebuilding it, and on the cost of a new pump.

Old Business

Board President Miller reported that the thad been

contacted by Dowden Communications of Illinois, the company requesting to bring cablevision into Mentone. They stated that they plan to be started on the project this Spring. Miller was asked to contact Mike Stephen of Akron, who had requested to provide the service, and inform him of Dowden's continuing interest.

Discussion of the continuing drainage problems in the area at the North edge of town, brought the news that Charles Lynch of the County Drainage Board had been called and was to be in the vicinity soon to check on the problem.

The next meeting of the Mentone Town Board will be Monday, February 4, at 7 p.m. in the town hall.

The move up from Basic Life Support service to Advanced Life Support requires

the certification of Advanced Emergency Medical Technicians - IV Technicians. trained to initiate an intravenous line as pre-hospital

treatment in situations where it is deemed advisable as treatment or as a precautionary measure.

Heart attack victims and diabetic patients who need medications started immediately through an IV route, and trauma victims who may have lost critical levels of fluids will benefit from having this care initiated at the scene.

To qualify as an Advanced EMT - IV Tech requires that the EMT complete 60 additional hours of in-class instruction along with clinical training with another Advanced Life Support service. F.C.E.M.S. staffers served their clinical training hours at St. Joseph Hospital in

South Bend where they each spent two days with an IV bulance Service or with the South Bend Fire Depart- a nurse to go along."



# Contract on Water-Sewage discussed

Four town patrons listened to the Akron Town Board members as they sat in regular meeting last Tuesday at town hall. President Jack Miller and Richard Drudge were present for the meeting, Jerry Hudson having been called back to his place of business on an emergency.

### Clerk reports

Clerk Sarah Jane Sutton read the minutes of the December 18 meeting of the board and the January special budget hearing meeting on January 2nd.

Mrs. Sutton stated that the town's year end report had been published in the newspaper this week; and she had filed a claim in Small Claims Court against a town patron delinquent on their water bill.

#### Suggestion taken

Clerk Sutton said it had been suggested to her that if windows were installed in the doors opening into the offices of the town hall, the doors could be kept closed and the hall would not have to be heated, thus saving on the heating costs. Marshall Spangle had checked into the cost of the windows and reported they would cost \$14 each. Installation was discussed, but no costs given. A motion was made to install a window in the police office, motion was carried. Trustees decided if the window works alright in that office, they might install one in the water department door.

## Water and Sewage Billing

Clerk Sutton reported to the trustees that she had published a notice to Akron Residents about the policy on payment of water and sewage bills and asked to have the newspaper publish it for a number of weeks, plus again every month about the time bills are due. President Miller reported

that the new policy had been to extend the payment date from the 10th to the 20th of the month, but there are still some people dragging their feet on the payments. (see notice this issue) He said they had checked with the Public Service Commission and the town has the right to shut off the water to anyone delinquent on the 21st of the month. Clerk Sutton also reported that she and Mrs. Katz would get some articles ready for publication explaining to town patrons the way the water billing is done; explaining about the months in which the bills are estimated, and the end of the quarter, when the meters are actually read; catching up the actual amount of water used over a period of three months.

Miller announced that town employee Marty Gearhart is now in charge of reading the water meters.

#### Contract discussed

Patron Charles Miller appeared before the board to ask what they intended to do about the contract they now have with Val Duggins to do the testing for the Indiana State Board of Health on waste water and the contract for taking care of the sewer system.

President Miller stated that Duggins had been hired to work five hours a day, five days a week and his work includes cleaning the pits at the lift station, checking equipment, painting the buildings inside, as he can, setting up the lab at the lagoon for the testing, and doing the testing. President Miller noted that Duggins also does some other work for the town, which was not in his contract to do, and said that they would continue with Duggins until the contract runs out in March 1985.



TIME IS OF THE ESSENCE

There is a legal phrase: "Time is of the essence" which means there is no fooling around with dates in a contract. If your youngster accidentally gets a tooth knocked out and you'd like to give the dentist half a chance to successfully replant it - "time is also of the

Take the typical case where a child gets his front tooth knocked out at a hockey game. He skates over and hands it to his parents and finishes the game. Later on - probably the next day - they'll go see a dentist. Too late, my friends. No chance for saving that

The proper reaction would be to take Johnnie skates and all - immediately to the dentist. This is an

emergency. A tooth replaced within 30 minutes has a 90% chance of being saved, but in two hours the success rate drops considerably.

To improve the chances of a successful replantation of a knocked-out tooth, rinse it in tap water (don't scrub it), replace it in its socket and have the patient hold it in presentation. hold it in place with the tongue on the way to the den

Trustee Dick Drudge noted that the town had had several large repair bills totaling close to \$6,000 on equipment at the lift station and had checked with the Rochester Sewage Department on the cost of having the pits cleaned regularly. The cost of having the pits cleaned would be between \$50-75 per hour to have the work done he was told. He said he then talked with Duggins and was told that a preventative maintenance measure of cleaning the pits each morning would take care of the problems causing the repair bills, and Drudge noted that this measure was taken and is working.

President Miller then told Charles that the board would do some work on the contract before it comes up next month, and see if they would want to change the testing. Charles stated that his original bid on the contract, on all the work Duggins does, was for less money, and that it had gone on for months costing the taxpayers extra to pay for having a man come from South Whitley to do the work. Drudge asked Miller if his bid had been only for testing, and was told the contract he submitted had stated inspection of all units of operation, subject to call at any time, so if he had been on the job, he would have done whatever was necessary to do, just as his bid stated. Drudge pointed out that Duggins puts in more time than his contract calls for, and Charles again stated that his offer read that he would be subject to call at any time, for any operational problems, at the same rate quoted in his bid.

#### 44WIN under bid 15

President Miller asked if he (Charles) would keep the buildings up, this being on a different contract, Charles stated that if it was part of his contract, he would. He said he had never had a chance to approach the board when problems arose to find out if he would do the same work as Duggins. Charles told the board members "in any event, I intend to be low bidder," and said he thought that was as plain as he could get. He was told to re-submit his bid on the work that Duggins is now doing; testing at Sonoco, Leiningers, and the town testing and also maintenance of equipment. Charles said he would do that in March 1985 and asked that it be made a part of the public record that "I have and will continue to underbid the work that you are now paying.

#### Hydrants

Patron Bob Allen asked the board members if they had ever resolved the water hydrant problems and was told that one new hydrant had already been installed and two more are ready to be installed when weather permits.

#### Different meter

Trustees said that Sparky had suggested that the town install a tru-flo water meter at the Greenlawn Apartments, where the flow is too low to trip the present meter, so does not give a true reading. The cost of the new meter would be \$2,250. The suggestion was tabled until such a time when all three board members are present to vote on the matter.

#### Bids given

President Miller noted that Dave Kruger had given the town a bid for the 10 channel scanner in the police car of 125.00 and for the Bear Cat scanner in the police office of 75.00, which he had furnished. Miller said that new ones could be purchased: a 10-channel Bear Cat programmable, for 116.95 and an 10-channel scanner for the office for 89.95, programmable. Miller made the motion to order new ones, the motion carried. Drudge noted that for a few dollars, the town could have the guarantee on new equipment. The board also decided to let Marshall Spangle trade the rifle used by the police officers for a new shotgun for the department.

#### **Extension ordered**

The board decided to have an extension of the phone in the police office, installed in the home of Marshall Spangle who has an unlisted number, so he can be contacted when the office is not manned, and officers are off duty. The cost for installation was quoted as \$60.40 plus \$\$1.75 monthly charge for the service. Patron Ron Fenimore questioned the costs to the town since the job of the police he said is subject to call 24 hours a day. President Miller noted that no one should be subjected to harrassment, just because of his job, but Fenimore noted that it is just part of police work. Fenimore withdrew his objection because people will be able to contact the officers easier. A request for an answering machine for the police office was tabled.

To clear up a misunderstanding by a statement made in the January 2nd report of the Akron Town Board meeting about burning trash in the town limits; there is a town ordinance against burning trash on the ground in the open. You may burn trash within town limits if it is burned in a container, or is contained in a barrel, or another type of incir rator.

#### **Next meeting**

The next regular meeting of the board will be Tuesday, February 19 at 7 p.m. in the town hall.

# Indiana Farmers list Legislative priorities

Several legislative issues before the Indiana General Assembly are being given priority attention by the state's largest farm organization, the Indiana Farm Bureau, Inc., according to William A. Hadley, the organization's coordinator of local government affairs.

Farmers support the allocation of \$7.5 million in state funds to continue moving the Purdue Livestock Research facilities. Purdue University with the full support of the Indiana livestock industry, sought four years ago to obtain \$15 million to relocate the livestock research farms from their present location to a new one near the agronomy farm. This was necessary due to pressure from the city of West Lafavette. Received initially from the state were \$7.5 million and a plan was initiated to make the move. To date, they have contracted most of the swine facilities, part of the beef cattle, and some of the poultry facitilies.

An emergency fund for animal disease control is also requested by farmers. A study committee, comprised of nembers of all the related agencies, shows a contingency fund is needed. Farm Bureau is requesting a \$500,000 emergency fund earmarked for livestock testing and regulations to prevent delays and loss of time.

A 20 percent property tax relief restoral to cumulative funds and debt service funds is supported by farmers. Farm Bureau says they believe the economy has recovered enough since the 1982 tax increase to justify this action.

An attempt will be made to exempt grain drying bins from state sales tax. Additional funds for highway and bridge maintenance will be requested. Farmers support a move to oppose free textbooks for all students in the public school system and are for giving a portion of income tax to the local

The Akron Police Department reported for the month of December they had patroled 1,016 miles in the police car. The department investigated four accidents, handled one complaint, two dog complaints. # Highway Users Conference advises motorists beware

A proposed eight cent increase in motor fuel taxes should be flashing a warning signal to the Hoosier motorist. That's the word of caution voiced by the Indiana Highway Users Conference, a coalition of over 50 associations and individuals representing business, agricultural, industrial and motorist

. This warning stems from a recently announced proposal by the Indiana Transportation Coordinating Board (ITCB) concerning taxes which the legislature will be asked to consider beginning in 1985 on gasoline, motor vehicles and other higway related items.

The ITCB proposal encompasses too much and would seriously endanger sound principals of highway finance, says Highway Users Conference Chairman Marion Stackhouse, president of the Indiana Farm Bureau. The Highway Users Conference stresses six recommendations for Indiana legislators to consider before enacting any portion of the ITCB proposal. The recommendations are:

1. There is a need for additional highway funding at both the state and local levels;

2. Highway funding should primarily come from a

two-structured system consisting of license registration fees and motor fuel taxes without imposition of any additional forms or types of taxes applicable to highway users;

3. Highway user tax revenues should continue to be dedicated only for highway construction, maintenance, and ther highway-related purposes;

4. While highway funding should primarily come from highway-user fees and taxes, the benefits of a good highway system enjoyed by non-highway users should be recognized by assigning some highway cost responsibility to the general

5. Special efforts should be made to ensure that a high quality of highway construction and maintenance is attained by state and local highway departments and that maximum benefit is received from the tax dollars expended;

6. The variable motor fuel tax should be replaced with a fixed cents per gallon tax rate.



# TVSC one step closer to \$4.2 mil building |

Nasty weather and bad roads didn't keep people from attending the Tippecanoe Valley School Board meeting last Monday evening. On the agenda for the evening was the public hearing on school construction, the selection of architects for the project and the sale of the building trades house.

The public hearing, held according to a new state law, was another step toward the building project estimated to cost \$4.2 million for the Tippecanoe Valley School system. Dr. Ted Kowalsky of Ball State University who has been hired as financial advisor for the project, reported to the board, the increase on the tax rate in the debt service fund would be approximately \$1.03 per \$100 assessed valuation in 1987 and \$1.52 in 1988, if there is a 24-year lease agreement at 10.5 percent interest.

The present debt service rate is approximately 74.4 cents, that being the amount for the holding corporation for the payment of the high school building and some buses purchased two years ago thru bonding. The buses, Superintendent Paige noted are to be paid off prior to the first payment being made of any structure, reducing the debt service rate about 20 cents, (making it about 54 cents), before the new building program; making the increase in debt rate approximately 75 to 80 cents.

#### **Program includes**

New construction would include replacing the rooms for the sixth thru eighth grade at Akron School, following demolition of the old building, and the remodeling of the gymnasium plus adding additional classrooms necessary for prime time study; adding eight classrooms at Mentone to take care of the prime time requirement and adding one multi-purpose room at Burket, to include lunchroom, library and indoor play area.

The estimated completion date for the project was given as June 1987.

#### et named

Board members, in discussion of their choice of architects for the project, noted that all members of the board with exception of John Mellott had been able to visit schools in northern Indiana, on which their selection was based. Trustee Royer noted that he was glad to see that ice was with an architectural firm which did not design flat roofs. The boards choice for the project was the Fanning-Howey Associates firm of Michigan City, which prepared the Director. bility study.

Three bidders were present at the meeting to bid on the 1983-84 building trades house which has been up for sale since June 1984. The house, located in the Saner Addition, Akron was appraised at \$55,507.50, of which amount the school corporation must receive 90% of that total appraisal price. Bids started at \$50,000 with President of the Board Fred McSherry presiding as auctioneer. Interest at first seemed to be just between two bidders, Dave French of Akron and Andy Wyckoff of Beaver Dam Lake, who between them ran the bidding to \$51,400, Wyckoff having the last bid. Jerry Kindig, Akron then gave a bid of \$52,500 which made him the successful bidder.

Fred McSherry, president and Jim Royer, secretary, were named by the board as the Board of Finance upon Superintendent Paige's recommendation.

Five professional agriculturalists were honored by the Purdue Agricultural Alumni Association Friday, January 18 at the organization's annual Fish Fry.

The certificate of distinction is the highest award given by the association, and is based on outstanding service to agriculture.

Some 35 Hoosiers--most of them Purdue University School of Agriculture graduates--were nominated for the 1985 awards. The recipients include brothers who operate a seed business, a professional farmer, a retired County Extension Agent, and a vocational agriculture teacher.

The brothers, John A. and Gilman C. Stewart, Rt. 8, Greensburg agribusinessmen, were nominated separately. Others honored were Will W. Erwin, rural Etna Green; O.K. Anderson, 420 Buntin St., Vincennes; and Simon M. (Si) Deeb, Rt. 1, Rochester.

Erwin, a graduate of the University of Illinois College of Agriculture, is a life-long farmer who is president and general manager of his family's Triple "E" Farm, Inc., near Etna Green. He is known for his public service, avid interest in wildlife conservation and rural development, and assistance to young people interested in farming.

Erwin served two terms as an Indiana state senator, and in the federal government under four Presidents -- Eisenhower, Johnson, Nixon and Ford. As assistant secretary of agriculture during the Ford administration, he coordinated all federal rural development assistance programs. He currently serves as agricultural consultant to the U.S. Environmental Protection

Erwin received the national Jaycees Outstanding Young Farmer Award and the National Vocational Agricultural Teachers' Assn. Outstanding Service Award. He also received the University of Illinois Agricultural Alumni Award of Merit, and the Outstanding Conservation Award of Marshall County. He is a member of the board of directors for the Indiana Institute of Agriculture, Food and Nutrition, Inc., a member and past chairman of the Purdue Farm Policy Study Group. He is also chairman of the Dana and Edith Bennett Agricultural Round Table, a member of the White River Park Development Commission, director of the Foundation of American Agriculture, a trustee of the Farm Foundation, and past president of the Purdue Farm Policy Study Group.

Deeb, a 1949 graduate of Purdue's School of Agriculture, has taught vocational agriculture at Rochester High School since 1953. He is well known for his positive influence on the lives of hundreds of students, for his impact on vocational agriculture in Fulton County and the state, and his successful soil judging teams which have frequently placed high in state and national contests, winning the national contest in 1983.

Deeb has served as president of the Indiana Vocational Agriculture Teachers' Assn., and founded the Rochester Chapter of Future Farmers of America. He was a catalyst in founding the county's 4-H livestock auction and served some 24 years on the committee, 10 years as chairman. He also initiated the 4-H Fair Livestock Judging Contest and served as chairman of the 4-H Fair Livestock Judging Contest some 30 years.

Deeb has served as Fulton County councilman, a member of the Rochester Waterworks Board, and on the board of directors of the Farmers and Merchants Bank. He was named the Rochester Chamber of Commerce's "Outstanding Citizen of Fulton County in 1984," and also was named a Friend of Extension for his contributions to the 4-H Club programs.

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
