Sparky started working for the town of Akron on June 20, 1961. In January of 1971 he became the Water Superintendent for the town. Dur-



Can you return Christmas gifts?

The shirt you received for Christmas doesn't fit and you really didn't need a third pair of slippers.

Can you return those Christman gifts and get a refund or exchange?

Refunds and exchanges of merchandise are really changes in the contract, or agreement, between the buyer and seller, says Attorney General Linley Pearson. And returning the merchandise for exchange, credit or refund is generally a privilege rather than a right.

An exception is when you have purchased an item that is defective or was misrepresented. In either case you are entitled to a suitable substitute or a refund, the attorney general noted.

While return policies vary from store to store, they come in three basic forms. Pearson said. Those are:

1. Exchange. Merchandise may be returned and another item of the same kind may be taken in its place.

This privilege is offered when the buyer, for example, has made a mistake in the choice of size or color of the

2. Return for credit. When merchandise is returned, the customer is given a credit slip or his account is credited with the amount paid

The customer may then apply that amount to the purchase of any item in the

Refund. Under this policy, the customer gets his money back. Retailers who use and advertise this policy effectively guarantee satisfaction with whatever mer chandise they sell.

If the returned item had been charged to a credit card initially, the refund may take the form of a credit charged to the same credit card

In every case these policies are voluntarily adopted by retailers who wish to provide high standard of service to their customers. They are not required to do so by law. Pearson said.

Pearson said consumers could avoid problems when it comes to returning items by making it a rule to check the store's return policy before you buy. Some stores have "no return" or "final sale" policies.

If you are in doubt about the policy, have your sales slip marked "on approval. Pearson suggested.

Honest mistakes over items that don't fit, don't serve the purpose for which they were bought or turn out to be inappropriate gifts from a well-meaning spouse or friend entitle you to use a

store's refund policy, provid-ing they have one, Pearson said.

Return privileges are usually extended with the requirement that merchandise be returned within a specified time period and be in new condition, Pearson said.

Stores often require a sales slip or other evidence that the item was actually bought there and not at some other store, the attorney general

For some items, such as sales merchandise, the policy may be that all sales are final, he noted. While retailers have the right to adopt such a policy, "final-sale" items should be clearly identified or so advertised, he said.

Consumers should be care ful not to abuse return privileges. Pearson Some shoppers buy casually and return merchandise purchased on impulse, causing an unnecessary amount of sales time and paperwork.

That costs the store money. and ultimately increases the cost of all merchandise in the store to all customers, Pearson said.

It also causes some retail to adopt less liberal return policies than they might otherwise use. Pearson said

Kosciusko Extension Notes

Additionally, Kosciusko County 4-Hers have visited Switzerland, China, Japan and the Dominican Republic in just the past 3 years.

4-H members throughout Indiana will again have the opportunity to visit Japan on a four week home stay this summer as part of the Indiana 4-H Labo International Exchange Program. 4-H youth ages 12-19 are eligible for this once in a lifetime opportunity. This international exchange program offers 4-H members an opportunity to learn how other people live by accally living in their homes, learn to appreciate another country's culture and traditions, gain a better understanding of themselves and our own culture and have an exciting summer in Japan.

The total cost is \$2,100.00. This includes round trip airfare from Indianapolis International to Tokyo's Narita International Airport. 

Along with the transfer of


funds, the board also gave a \$125 donation to the Heritage Park Advisory Board. This was done because of the extra work and thorough cleaning the board had done to the premises.

Mentone marshal and Superintendent get pay raises from town board

Salary increases were given to two of the town's employees, along with appointments to the cemetery, park and zoning boards and the planning commission during the Mentone Town Board meeting Monday night, Jan.







Indiana State Police report for December

The Indiana State Police at he Peru District have announced the following end of the month report for the month of December, 1985 on their activities in Fulton County, and for the district #61 personnel

County troopers reported 69? patrol and criminal hoars, 11,282 miles parolled, nine accidents investion ed. and 82 arrests effected. 151 warnings were issued, four driving while in oxicated reports, six interrogation reports, and 73 motorists assisted.

In district #61, 7,374 patrol and criminal hours were reported, 112,110 miles patrolled. 114 accidents were investigated, 560 arrests effeeted, and 1,305 warnings were issued. 36 driving while intoxicated reports, 25 interrogation reports, and 692 motorists were assisted.

Lieutenant John D. Gaylor, District 61 commander, reports that four troopers assigned to the county were

responsible for the above work, along with 47 total personnel who work district #61. District #61 comprises of Cass, Fulton, Howard, Tipton, and Wabash Counties. The district officers conducted 51 criminal investigations, which resulted in 26

Five persons have been tatally injured in rural accidents in Fulton County during the 12 months of 1985, as compared to four persons during this same period of 1984. Urban accidents have accounted for two fatalities. compared to zero persons for, the same period of 1984. For the six county district, 43 persons have lost their lives in traffic accidents as compared to 44 persons this same period last year. This is a decrease of two lives.

Of the 27 fatal accidents investigated by the Peru district troopers, 10 lives would have been saved by the use of seat belts.

Indiana Historical Society chooses logo and seal

In today's rapidly-changing world, organizations tend to abandon their histories for slick and futuristic images. However, when the staff of the Indiana Historical Society decided to adopt a new logo and revise their seal they took a dramatically different approach. They shunned the current trend toward using images representative of the future, and drew and inspiration for their "new" logo and seal from own rich history.

The origins of the Society's new logo begin 155 years ago at the Society's first meeting. At that founding meeting in December, 1830, Henry P. Thornton served as secretary. As the meeting began, Thornton wrote "Indiana Historical Society" across the top of a clean page. It is an exact replica of this seriot that has been adopted as the logo for the Society.

The history of the Society was also the inspiration for the organization's new seal. All a Society meeting in 1887 a resolution was passed that the seal of the Society should be an impression of an open book within a circle. Although the seal was adopted. a drawing of it has never been found and was probably never used until this time.

Peter T. Harstad, executive director of the Indiana Historical Society feels that the seal of the book accurately symbolizes the Society's three central programs-library, publications and out-

The Indiana Historical So. ciety is a private, non-profit organization founded in 1830 for the purpose of collecting, preserving and promoting Indiana's history. For more information about the Society call (317 232-1882

Comment On Sports BASEBALL * * * *

WASHINGTON, D.C. --The recent signings of Kirk Gibson and Carlton Fisk by the Detroit Tigers and Chicago White Sox are strong indications sanity is returning to Major League baseball.

Both were free agents, who in earlier years would probably have received fabulous offers from clubs spending more than they should. But Detroit's offer of a 3-year pact worth about \$3.9 million to Gibson was not bettered by any other club.

Because Gibson is a young superstar, this is significant. In the case of Fisk, who is 38, one can surmise that his age might have discouraged offers. But Gibson has years to play. He and his agent sought a 5-year pact, at over a million a year.

In the past, however, clubs which went in for such unrealistic salaries have often been burned. Maybe they have learned their lesson. While pro football average salaries are between \$150,000 and \$200,000, the average among Major Leaguers today is nearing \$400,000. That's just an absurd figure--in view of the sloppy play seen on Major League diamonds these days.

Possibly discouraging offers to Gibson is a history of injuries. Clubs tied to huge contracts think about this. Gibson has missed much of several seasons with the Tigers.

There's no doubt he hustled hard in 1985, knowing he was going the free-agent route. Detroit will be paying him over a million a year starting this year; management hopes he hustles just as hard.
