Organization offers several varieties of trees

The National Arbor Day Foundation is giving ten free trees to people who become Foundation members during January, 1987.

The free trees are part of the Foundation's effort to promote tree planting throughout America.

A Sugar Maple, White Flowering Dogwood, Pin Oak, White Pine, Red Maple, Birch, American Redbud, Silver Maple, Red Oak, and Colorado Blue Spruce tree will be given to members joining during January.

These trees were selected to provide benefits every season of the year: lovely spring flowers, cool summer shade, spectacular autumn

colors, and winter berries and nesting sites for songbirds, according to the Foundation. The six to twelve inch trees will be shipped postage paid with enclosed planting instructions at the right time for planting this spring. The Foundation makes its spring shipments between February 1 and May 31, depending on the local climate and this year's weather.

The National Arbor Day Foundation, a nonprofit organization, is working to improve the quality of life throughout the country by encouraging tree planting. The Foundation will give the ten free trees to members contributing \$10 during January.

The Fourth Grade class at Akron Elementary has implemented a mini-economy form of instruction. It provides needed instruction in basic economics, decision-making and living skills. The mini-economy motivates teachers and students and it can be very effective in promoting classroom discipline and responsible study habits.

The children earn a play-money salary every week for

a classroom job they perform. First they had to fill out a job application and go through the process of getting hired. Some children hold more than one job such as desk monitor and black-board monitor. If they don't perform their duties they are in danger of being fired.

They receive bonus money for exceptionally good work and they are fined for any violations such as incomplete

assignments or too much noise.

An auction is held in each room every Friday. And the children use their play money to buy different items and privileges. Hopefully this system will allow the students to take an active role in a learning situation and to take part in actual decision-making and bearing the consequences of those decisions.

Resignation accepted by Mentone Town Board

During a year-end meeting of the Mentone Town Board, the resignation of Board President, Jim Miller, was accepted. Miller had announced his resignation during a meeting earlier in December because of conflict of interest concerning the wastewater proposals.

The board president of five years and member for seven years did not attend the meeting. However, Mrs. Jim Miller reiterated that her husband believed he could not act fairly in making a decision which would affect the Mentone residents.

According to the two active board members, Miriam Boardman and Wayne Tombaugh, an ad hoc sewer advisor committee is trying to locate viable alternatives through researching plans and financial resources activated by other communities which have been faced with the same problems.

A meeting will be held Jan. 7 (today) with the Department of Commerce representative concerning an application of a \$500,000 economic development grant. These grants are

awarded to attract new business to an area or to stimulate the enlargement of existing businesses.

The state board is willing to work with Mentone in finding a cost effective method and to allot more time for the completion of a sewage project, according to town attorney, Lee Bazini.

The board accepted the \$9,180 bid from Millwood Sanitation, Bourbon, for trash pickup in 1987.

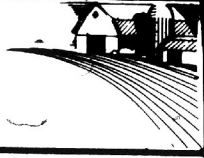

are opened.

Nearly 200 miles of snowmobile trail in northern Indiana are managed by the DNR. The trails, which can be used by snowmobilers who have valid snowmobile registrations vary from 22 to 62 miles in length.

Returning policies

Your Christmas shopping was completed in November and everything you purchased turned out to be the perfect gift.

But you received some white elephants and want to return or exchange them for a different item. What are your rights and how should you go about it?

Realistically, however, gifts are not given with receipts or price tags remaining. If you are able to get the receipt, it will make the return-refund process much more simple.

The policies used by stores vary greatly. But there are some policies that are consistent in most places.

An easy way to avoid disaster once the wrappings have come off the gifts is to keep all receipts and price tags. The type of item and for whom it was purchased should be logged with the receipts. If you have received a gift you like, but is

the wrong color or size, take it back to the store and ask to exchange it. This often can be accomplished with little trouble.

If you wish to return or exchange an item that was purchased with a credit card, you will not receive cash back even with a receipt. The gift giver's account will be credited in the case of a returned item, or you will be allowed to exchange that gift, applying its price to any item in the store. But, there is nothing in the law compelling the merchant to extend that particular privilege.

If you received a gift that was not purchased with a credit card, be prepared to have a receipt unless the store's policy is that one is not needed for returns or exchanges. In this transaction, your gift is returned and you receive cash.

In Indiana, refund and exchange policies are at the discretion of the store.

Views On[®] Dental Health

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THUMBSUCKING OR PACIFIER?

If your infant has the thumbsucking habit, should you try to replace this habit with a pacifier?

All babies have a natural instinct to suck. But if the habit lingers beyond infancy, when the primary teeth are beginning to appear, you may want to give baby a pacifier. If you start the pacifier soon enough, just after your child has been weaned and is getting solid foods, your child may never develop the thumbsucking habit.

Pacifiers have proved a lot less harmful to a child's teeth and mouth than sucking thumb or fingers. Thumbsucking may force your child's teeth out of position and narrow the dental arches. This may cause the upper teeth to protrude outward because of a deformation of the supporting bone.

One advantage of the pacifier is that it is made of soft rubber, while thumb or fingers have an unyielding bone inside. They exert much more pressure than a pacifier and are much more likely to cause dental problems.

Season for ear infections

Winter is not only the cold and flu season for children, it is also the season for ear infections. Ear infections can be serious and result in additional medical costs, says the Indiana State Medical Association (ISMA). In fact, according to the Ear Institute in Indianapolis, one out of three pediatric visits to the doctor are for ear infections. Nationally, this results in up to \$2 billion spent annually for the treatment of ear infections.

According to the ISMA, ear infections are communicable just like colds, the flu and other viruses. An acute ear infection often develops when an infection of the nose and throat travels along the eustachian tube, which connects the throat with the middle ear. It may also be associated with allergies. It occurs often in children because the eustachian tube is smaller, shorter and straighter than an adult's, and does not work well.

The Ear Institute explains that an ear infection usually starts with a feeling of fullness in the ear followed by a severe stabbing pain, often enough to wake a child from sleep. Other symptoms are fever and possible hearing loss. If the infection is not treated, the pressure of the pus within the middle ear may eventually burst the eardrum. This produces a discharge which is accompanied by sudden relief from pain.

If the infection remains untreated or delayed too long, there is a danger that the problem may become chronic and may cause permanent damage to the ear. A child should be seen by a

doctor as soon as possible for treatment. This treatment will involve drugs to help unblock the eustachian tube and antibiotics to kill the bacteria. If a child has repeated middle ear infections, the adenoids may be serving as a reservoir of infection and/or blocking and eustachian tube and will have to be removed.

Middle ear infections can

often lead to fluid remaining behind the eardrum. Called "otitis media with effusion," the fluid can prevent sound from entering the inner ear and result in decreased hearing. Left untreated, this painless hearing loss can lead to problems with speech and language development, and learning and behavior problems. It can also lead to repeated ear infections.

An "A+" legislative package for education reform in Indiana was announced jointly by Governor Robert Orr and H. Dean Evans, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, last Wednesday. Calling the program, "A new approach to meet changing educational needs" Evans said it stands for heightened Aspirations, increased Achievement, and more Accountability.

The 1987 Orr/ Evans package of 31 new and expanded initiatives carries a \$372.5 million price tag for the upcoming biennium, and proposes a change in the sales tax system to fund it. But, the governor said the new money must be tied to increased performance and better results from Indiana's educational system. He added, "I will not support new taxes unless we can absolutely guarantee better results. The great questions today are: Will there be strings attached to the

public's money? Will schools be accountable to the taxpayers? The answer to both questions must be yes! Nearly half of all state taxes go to local schools, therefore, state government has a duty to insist on accountability."

Orr praised Evans' leadership in molding a program designed to get better results and called him "one of the most respected education leaders in America." He added, "We must be able to guarantee that better finding will produce better results. If this package passes, we will have better schools."

Commenting on the package, Evans said, "Parents pay for good schools; students pay for poor schools. I believe that we must address, in a far different fashion, the educational needs of our youngsters. And, if we do not, I fear that we will lose a whole generation of children who will not receive the high-level educational experience they need to prepare for the 21st Century."

The new revenue which

the governor seeks would be raised by broadening the sales tax base to include services (excluding medical and dental). Groceries and prescription drugs would remain tax-free. Broadening the sales tax base would allow a reduction in the overall sales tax rate from 5 percent to 4.5 percent.

"This change would make the sales tax less regressive. It reduces taxes for people on fixed incomes and benefits middle-class families," Orr said.

Calling it the most comprehensive education reform package in the history of Indiana, the governor said it fulfills a commitment made during his State of the State Address last January.

"What makes this so significant, is that for the first time, our educational sights are focused on performance. Everybody involved in the delivery of education will have his or her performance evaluated under this program," said Orr.

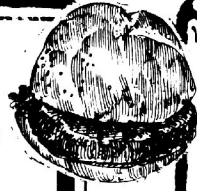

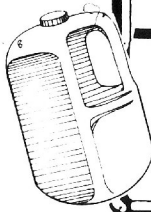

Vikes defeat Southwood

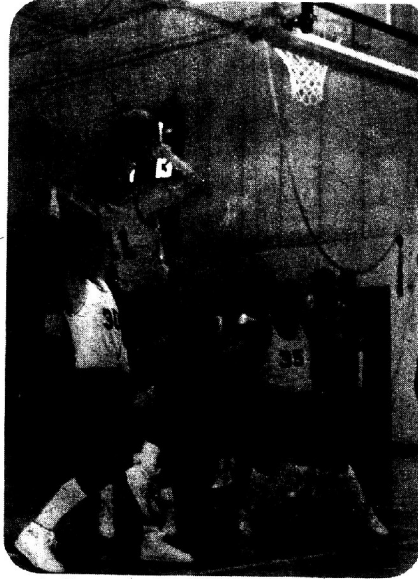

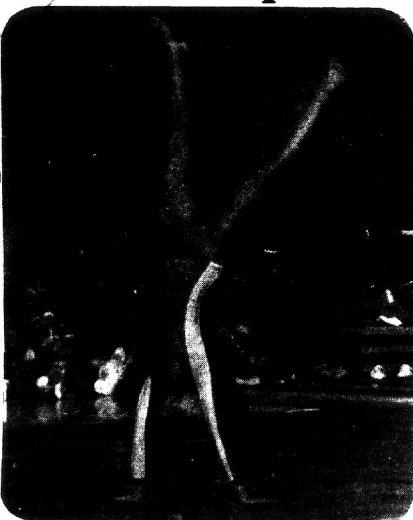

Educational sights on performance

Under the Orr/Evans proposal, students will be tested and all school personnel — including teachers, principals, and other administrators, will be subject to regular evaluations. All Indiana students in grades 1, 2, 3, 6, 8, 9, and 11 will be tested to ensure that key skills are mastered. Remediation the following summer will be required for those in grades 1-8 who need it. Also, each school's level of performance on these tests will be made public.

"These test scores, along with a host of other factors, will be the cornerstone of performance-based funding," Orr said.

To discourage the practice of "social promotion" (i.e., passing on students to the next grade despite unacceptable academic performance) the state would no longer allow school corporations to count such students in their enrollment figures for the purpose of receiving state money. This new policy will be known as "Social Pass: No Pay."

The entire 1987 legislative proposal for educational reform is detailed in a booklet entitled, "The Future is Now," which is attached.

"This program is an attempt to recognize the critical need for a better educated workforce at a time when the number of students 'at risk' is on the increase," Evans added. "Yet, this program is not a call for a blank check to be thrown at the public schools without measurable results. In short, we are asking for additional resources, yet we are also

asking to be held accountable for the new appropriations we seek for education. We must make sure that the dollars we spend on educating our children are adequate to the task at hand and that resources we devote to educating our children will actually produce well-educated citizens."

Orr said, "Remember,

kids now in first grade will be taking their first jobs in the next century."

He added that he would not be asking Hoosiers to make this investment in the future if he did not believe it was absolutely critical to the long-term prosperity of the state.

"Nor, would I make such a promise, if I did not believe

these reforms would make a real difference in the quality of our schools. But, this is the kind of long-term investment that Indiana must make to remain competitive in a rapidly developing worldwide marketplace," he said.

Orr emphasized, "It is precisely the kind of long-range investment this administration has encouraged the General Assembly to

make over the past five years. Time and again we have asked for the faith of Indiana's citizens and consistently delivered on our commitments. It shows in the success of programs like PRIME TIME and the Indiana Corporation for Science and Technology. It shows in an economic growth climate that has added 350,000 jobs since 1981 and

given Indiana the lowest unemployment rate in our region.

"This may be the hardest thing we have ever done, but it may be the greatest. Great things are hard to do. Today, we ask all Hoosiers and the General Assembly to do something great for Indiana, to muster the courage and the foresight to ensure the future of our state."

"Hoosiers" determined big success in Indiana

The Hickory High School State Basketball Champs of the recent film release "Hoosiers" are experiencing great success in the Indiana box offices by grossing \$1.6 million, according to *The Hollywood Reporter* (Jan. 6, 1987).

In addition to Indiana, "Hoosiers" has also opened at a theater in Los Angeles in order to fulfill the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Science's qualifications for award consideration for 1986.

"The success of 'Hoosiers' has been significant both economically by creating 300 short term jobs, and socially by generating a feeling of pride and enthusiasm throughout the entire state," said Lieutenant Governor John M. Mutz.

Since its November 14 release, this Indiana produced film has remained in *The Hollywood Reporter's* weekly list of top-25 grossing

films. Twenty-fifth ranked "Hoosiers" is listed as having a \$3,309 per screen average at the 26 theaters showing the film. "Golden Child," this week's number one film, has a \$3,877 per screen average at 1,714 screens.

Karen Galvin, director of the Indiana Film Commission said, "The Film Commission is very pleased with this return. We are certain that this movie is going to be a big money maker."

A spokesman for Orion Pictures Corporation says that current distribution plans call for the film to be released to 65-75 west coast theaters on January 16. National release should follow on February 27.

The Indiana Film Commission has played a major role in the production of the movie, beginning in January of '85 with the selection of location sites and local talent

Without proper releases, either by local officials or state personnel, the school would have been liable for any accidents that might happen in the gymnasium caused by failure to comply with state standards.

During the board meeting Krassick also reported that the building projects were well within the schedule and the \$4.01 million budget. All three sites are expected to be completed by August.

The board also received a report on the Vocational Agriculture program at the high school under the supervision of second year teacher Lisa Weitzel.

Enrollment figures for the Vocational Agriculture program are as follows: Agriculture I, 14 students; Ag. II, 9 students; Forestry, 41 students; Ag. Welding I, 32 students, and Ag. Welding II, 26 students.

He told the board that after the booster club gets started he hopes other sports will be able to have their own clubs. He added he would like to see a strong support for all athletics at the high school, not just the major sports.

* Bill Screeten was appointed as head girl's track coach and Lewis Goodwin as assistant girl's coach. Gary Lafferty was appointed as boys assistant track coach.

* Christina Lynn Haywood's GED certificate was signed by the board.

26th birthday milestone with Selective Service

The Selective Service System has announced that men who will reach their 26th birthday in 1987 are reaching an important milestone.

Beginning on Jan. 1, 1987, men who were required to register with Selective Service in 1981 will be turning 26. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept registrations after age 26. By failing to register before turning 26, a young man will have permanently forfeited his right to certain benefits including federal student aid, job training and federal employment. In addition to these federal benefits, some states require registration for state student aid, entrance to a state supported college or university, state employment and permission to practice law.

Many of the 25-year-olds who have still not registered may be unaware of the requirement, or do not understand the importance of the obligation to register. Some may even have served in the military but failed to register either before entering the Armed Forces or after leaving active duty. Others may have been institutionalized or incarcerated at the time of their 18th birthday and not realized that they were required to register if released prior to age 26.

For those men born in 1961 who have registered, 1987 also marks the year that ends their eligibility for selection for induction under present law should there be a return to the draft. Over 17 million men, age 18 through 25 have registered with Selective Service since registration

was reinstituted in 1980. These men comprise over 97 percent of those required to register.

Men age 18 to 25 who have not yet registered still have a chance to avoid risk of prosecution and loss of benefits by registering promptly at any local post office. Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000, up to 5 years in jail, or both.

CAUSES OF TMJ SYNDROME



Many jaw problems are the result of a condition known as TMJ SYNDROME (temporomandibular joint syndrome). Symptoms include aches and pains in or near the joint (just in front of the ears), muscle spasms, headaches, stiff neck, and popping or clicking when opening and closing the mouth.

What causes this problem? In most cases it is a combination of two factors: a bad bite and stress. The bad bite may be caused by a high filling, a twisted or tilted tooth, a missing tooth, an undererupted or overerupted tooth, or a poor arrangement of several or all teeth when you close them together.

As the jaw deviates from a symmetrical arrangement, the muscles and ligaments on one side of the joint may be overly stretched, and they tend to compensate by contracting. A struggle is set up between the teeth and their desired closure position, and the ball-socket arrangement of the lower to upper jaw. This struggle may induce muscle spasm, leading to pain.

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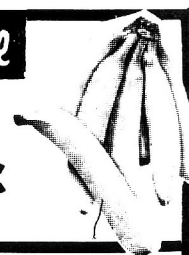

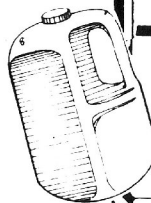

RECIPE

Pork is usually eaten more in the cold months and it is quite nutritious. Trim away excess fat. Pork must be thoroughly cooked.

Stuffed Pork Shoulder

- 4 c. soft bread crumbs
- 2 t. salt
- 4 T. chopped green pepper
- 1 c. whole grain corn
- 2 T. chopped onions
- 4 T. melted butter
- 2 eggs, beaten.
- 1 6 to 8 lb. pork shoulder (weight after boning)

Combine all ingredients but the pork and use to stuff the shoulder. Boning has left a pocket. Tie up firmly with a strong cord and roast in an oven 250 degrees, allowing 40 minutes per pound (unstuffed weight).

If desired place raw, peeled sweet potatoes around pork roast in the roasting pan, during last hour of cooking. Baste them once in awhile with the meat drippings.

"To verify that someone is

an employee of ours, ask to see an identification card or call our office and check," Wilber said. "The phone number in Rochester is 219-223-2186."

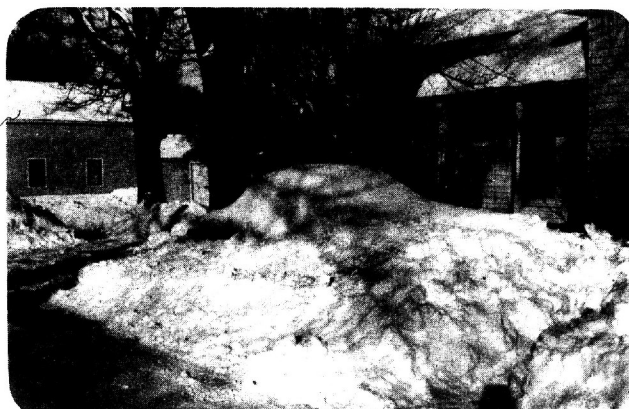

In 1980, his friends organized the Si Deeb Agricultural Scholarship Fund which awards stipends to Fulton County students for post-high school education in agriculture.

Mr. Deeb received the Rochester/Lake Manitou Chamber of Commerce Community Service Award in 1984.

Mr. Deeb served his community in other ways. He was a former member of the Fulton County Council, a 24-year member of the committee that conducts the annual auction of 4-H livestock during the 4-H Fair, a longtime member of the 4-H Fair Board, a former member of the Rochester Water Works board, and had been active in Democratic Party work.

He was a member of Grace

United Methodist Church, the John Purdue Club, the Rochester Classroom Teachers Association, the Indiana State Teachers Association and the National Education Association. He was a past president of the Indiana Agriculture Teachers Association.

Miami soils cover about one-third of Indiana. Medium colored and effective for water holding, crop production and building development, Miami is a typical but useful soil in the state of Indiana. Miami terrain has gently rolling hills, characteristic of the central part of the state.

"By claiming an official state soil type, more people may realize that dirt is not just dirt," said Musselman.

KNOW THE WEATHER

Can you tell by the nature of winter rainfall whether a cold or warm front is passing in above you?

Yes, there are clues which will enable you to know most of the time, whether winter rain is being caused by a cold or warm front. If the rain is hard and comes on suddenly and wind indicates a fast-moving front, chances are excellent that a cold front is moving over you.

These fronts move faster, the leading (precipitation) edge passes above in less time and cold, clear weather usually follows. If the rain is steady and dull and lasts a day or more, with winds moderate or almost non-existent, a warm front is probably passing in above you.

This means several hundred miles of stratus cloud, and a lengthy spell of moisture, quite probably.

FIXED BRIDGE TO THE RESCUE

If you have one or more missing teeth creating gaps that should be filled, you may want to consider the fixed bridge.

Missing teeth can do more than affect the shape of your face. They can also throw your other teeth out of alignment and cause other serious dental problems. If you choose a fixed bridge to solve the problem, you'll have "new" teeth that will be permanently fixed in your mouth. You won't have to take them out to clean them. They can be brushed the same way your natural teeth are and flossed (with a little dexterity from the underside) to remove bacteria and food particles.

Before your dentist makes a fixed bridge, he'll check the health of the adjacent or supporting teeth. They have to be strong and healthy with enough underlying bone structure to support the denture. Then he'll make crowns for the supporting teeth to make them even stronger. As a final step, the dentist will solder the crowns to the replacement teeth (called pontics) and cement the entire bridge into place.

Mumps reported in North Central Indiana

Dozens of mumps cases continue to be reported in North Central Indiana. Since the beginning of the year, St. Joseph County has reported 47 new cases and Elkhart County has reported 7 new cases.

Mumps disease is characterized by swelling of the parotid glands, and occasionally fever, headaches, or earaches. Although complications from mumps are rare, secondary infections such as encephalitis or orchitis can occur. There is no specific treatment for mumps. The best prevention is the mumps vaccine, usually given at 15 months of age as part of the MMR (Measles, Mumps, Rubella) shot. Mumps vaccine is also available by itself for persons who are susceptible and wish to prevent the disease. The mumps vaccine is highly effective, as shown by the dramatic nationwide decline in cases once the vaccine was introduced. However, some cases do occur in previously immunized persons.

Since December 1, 1986, St. Joseph County has reported nearly 300 cases of mumps. Elkhart County has reported eleven. Mumps cases are also being reported from Indianapolis (Marion County) and other counties throughout Indiana.

Club tours new school

Dr. Daniel Kramer, principal of Akron's school, took members of Akron Women's Club and guests through the new building and the remodeled gym, Jan. 8. Scheduled for completion next fall, the new rooms sported the first coat of paint and much of the ceiling tile.
