The News first issued in 1889

Although Akron was founded in 1836, residents learned of the end of the Civil War by the tolling of the Methodist Church bell because it wasn't until 1866 that the town's first newspaper was published. During the 23 years that followed, the community saw the development and demise of five newspapers-Globe, Signal, Echo, Eagle and Fulton County News.

The latter was virtually on its last sheet of newsprint when S.N. Shesler, a spunky school teacher with a penchant for a business of his own traded some Missouri timberland, sight unseen, to Samuel Flora for printing press. Shesler's daughter later recalled the land wasn't much good but probably had a future and the press wasn't much good, so it was considered an even trade.

The first issue of the Akron News was published on November 20, 1889. Now the oldest continuous business in Akron, its longevity was not predicted by its usually optimistic founder. "I was nervous, ignorant in the business with no experience as a writer for publication. When the paper was addressed and in an old clothes basket, 240 copies in all, I flatly refused to take them to the post office," he later recalled. "Mr. Flora did it for me. Nobody else would do it for me."

Later, while hurrying home, fearful of seeing anyone, he met Dr. C.F. Harter. "He was opening his Akron paper right on the street," Shesler reminisced in an anniversary edition "So glad," he said, "to read an Akron paper again, and by golly, this is the best paper Akron ever had." "I liked that and rushed home to tell my family of my success."

His success seemed short-lived the following year when the office was destroyed by fire. He was ready to look for a job when someone passing a hat, raised \$97.50 in cash. Encouraged, Shesler went to Chicago and returned with a new printing plant costing \$573, \$200 in cash and the balance in payments.

Business continued to grow, and Shesler later built a brick building that to this day boasts the name "Akron News" although the News office has not occupied the space for many years.

In 1919, Shesler sold the News to Bernard Clayton who later traded it for a Tipton company paper to DeWitt Hosman. Hosman, in turn, sold the paper to Garland Kline.

Kline sold the News to Claude and Esther Billings in 1932 and they operated the weekly for 30 years, the longest tenure of any of the publishers.

In 1962, the Billingses sold the News to Loren and Ann Sheetz, who in 1964 purchased the Mentone News and in 1968 combined the two publications into one called the Akron/Mentone News. They also converted it to offset at the same time.

Robert and Renee Norlander of Niles, Michigan purchased the News on Oct. 8, 1977. Richard Lynn of Lagro bought the News on May 14, 1980 and less than a year later, on March 27, 1981, sold it to Richard and Mary E. McKee of Rochester. The McKees moved the News office to the first building north of the old town offices, then to its present location in the old Akron Hotel.

In 1983 Don Towle and Dave Ruff of Plymouth purchased the News and also the Shopping Guide News in Rochester. The News office remains in Akron.

Other newspapers have been published in Akron over the years but the one Sam Shesler founded has outlived them all, despite other editors who had never seen a printing press before buying one, despite other fires and disasters of every variety.

Part of this can be attributed to the fact that the ten owners have been dedicated to the premise that local news comes first. The rest of the credit has to go to the subscribers and advertiser who have supported it through wars, depressions and school consolidation and have come to call the paper "theirs."



Editor's note: The following information and picture were taken from the 75th year Anniversary issue of the Akron News.

The move to this building was the fourth made by the Akron News during its first 75 years. The business was founded by S.N. Shesler who operated a printing plant above the Gast Furniture Store until it was destroyed by fire in 1890. The

paper was then printed in a two room building which was also home for the Shesler family until a new brick block building was built. The News then moved into this new building, using the rooms from Doering Radio and T.V. to the end of the business block.

The Billings moved the business to the location of the Akron Insurance Agency in 1932 and were located there until August of 1957 when they moved to the present building which they had constructed to their specification.

S.N. Shesler Describes The Early Years

This Newspaper, like many other publications in small towns, fell down in a financial way late in 1888, and its equipment was stored, type presses, all its meagre appurtenances. It was picked up, resuscitated and took on new life, by Roswell Kroft and Samuel Flora. Under these young men's endeavors the paper was called The Fulton County News instead of using it previous cognomen, Akron Echo.

On the bridge this side of Mentone Mr. Flora traded his printing plant to me for 80 acres of pine timberland in the Mts. Ozark mountains, sight unseen. This occurred a dark and rainy night, ten o'clock November 10, 1889. We arranged that he write and publish his valedictory the following week and my first issue came November 20, 1889. I was teaching public school at Staten, 2 miles west of town, and of course I would be busy if I taught school during the day and edited a newspaper at night.

I got Eddie Sausaman, 18 year old school boy who had been in the office since May 1st of that year, which was all the experienced help there was in the office. I had never been in any printing office, only as a visitor. With Eddie, brother of Bill Sausaman, the old type, a jobber press too old to have a name, a Washington hand press that was dated on the lever 1816, Pa., that stood for Pennsylvania. There was another tool, a card cutter that cut one card at a time. With some leads, a few slugs, I commenced the publication of the Akron Newspaper.

I was nervous, ignorant in the business, with no experience as a writer for publication. I wrote my introduction at my school gathered as much news as I could at school, gave it to Eddie to put in type the next day, and we published on time Friday evening, November 20.

When the paper was addressed and in an old clothes basket, 240 copies in all, I flatly refused to take them to the post office. Mr. Flora did it for me. Nobody else would do it for me, not even Eddie. All this took place in the 2nd story of an old frame building where Karl Gas's theatre now stands. The stairway was at the same place it is now. I was nervous about seeing anyone, but after an hour or two I ventured down on the street. The first person I met was Dr. C. F. Harter, who was opening up his new Akron paper right on the street, "So glad," he said, "to read an Akron paper again, and by golly, this is the best paper Akron ever had." I liked that and rushed home to tell my family of my success.

We did but little job work all winter. In fact, we lacked type, leads or slugs and brains enough to do job printing. We didn't know how much to charge J. J. King for printing some sale bills on small cardboard.

Charley Davis was our first new subscriber, Abe Grindle was the next one. Money was very scarce that winter, until my school was out and by that time Eddie and I were going fine. New subscribers every day and soon we needed a mailing machine, which we found at

Warren, in Huntington county, and 200 pounds of type to set up the names. We were busy putting our subscribers' names in the new mailing machine August 16 when we laid it away for the night.

At 1:30 a.m. August 17, Mrs. Maggie Valentine saw a light in her bedroom window. She went to the veranda and saw the stairway to our office, as well as to Dr. Harter's office, on fire. She screamed "Fire" and almost instantly little boys ran up and down the streets, past our house and awoke us, crying "the town is burning up." I heard the call and soon saw my previous Newspaper plant sink down into the cellar. By daylight I was out of business and no insurance. The only article left of my enterprise that I know about is my Washington press bed. It now covers the coal shed in front of Joe Bidwell's grocery. That's the bed on which I printed the Akron News for thirteen years.

As the sun was coming up in the east, I sat on an upturned iron kettle on the steps of the Patterson hardware store, where the Bidwell Grocery is now, wondering what I might find to do. Along came Bill Kriehbaum and Geo. K. Brundige, asking what I was planning to do now. I said, "Get a job somewhere." They both said, "No, no." Kriehbaum reached into his vest pocket and handed me a ten dollar bill. Brundige, a rheumatic cripple, pulled out \$5. That started the sympathy for the Akron News until an hour later. I went home with \$97.50 in cash, all donations with the declaration that I must rebuild the Akron News. I did, Eddie and

I went to Barnhart Bros. and Spindler in Chicago and returned with another plant that cost me \$537. \$200 was paid in cash, the balance in two payments, 6 and 9 months.

In the new plant, I had another Washington hand press, because any other press would cost more than the office could make in 10 years, as I thought then. But two years later, I made another trade, swapped this press at Claypool for a wooden press, all wood except the cylinder, which was iron.

Business grew, people were good to the family paper and I bought the Potter drum in 1906, then as fine a press as was in the country. This effort urged me to build a home for the dear old Akron News. This was done and in October of 1909 we moved in to the new brick block and called it the Akron News Home. Here we worked until we sold to Bernie Clayton in 1919. Mr. Clayton traded for a Tipton county Republican paper to De Witt Hosman, and Hosman traded to Garland Kline, and Kline sold to the present editor, Claude Billings.

For 18 months after we started again after fire, we printed the NEWS in a two-room house in which my family was housed for 2 years prior to the fire, on the corner of the Mrs. Kistler lot next to the present home of the E. L. Scotts. This building sat right next to the sidewalk, with a block of wood for a doorstep. There wasn't a door latch to lock the door all that time. Anyone could have gone in and upset the type cases or forms on the imposing stones, but none entered or did us any harm.

We cannot close this story until we say frankly that for what even success we had during those 30 years of editorial life, we owe some measure to Mrs. C. H. Haldeman, Josephine Shaffer, and Mary Beik, along with the children of our own family.

Second Picture

Early in the summer of 1932, Mr. and Mrs. Billings dropped in to Akron to visit with their friend, Prof. Roy Jones, whom they had met somewhere this side of the river Styx. Their meeting proved out to be a strong and fervent friendship.

Soon after their arrival in Akron, visions appeared on the horizon of their mind. "Old men dream dreams and young men see visions" is an old but trite truth. These young people liked Akron, sensed its potential possibilities for an active and useful life, and realized that this valued newspaper plant would furnish the revenue for just that very life.

Negotiations with Garland Kline soon developed into a deal whereby Kline turned over to the Billings couple his good will, his plant and all his appurtenances thereto. But only at a big price, the "good will" being the large factor in the plant's valuation. Price nor anything else daunted this brave young couple and the deal was consummated. The new owners and publishers were installed. They set to work to make friends and to keep their feet on the ground while their thoughts were lofty.

They soon found friends and the door of opportunity wide open. For months business went on in the brick home, built for the dear old Akron-peper. But one day the word broke out about town that the NEWS would change its home and move to its present location. This move was a heart breaker for me, but they owned the plant and could do as they pleased — set it out doors or in a meadow, as I argued, and in a few days I recovered my senses and was won as a real friend to the new owners. Soon I located the Bidwell Grocery, and now I have all I need to eat.

In the new location business began to grow, friends were new and prosperous, and success came. Although they paid a dear price for the good will and plant, yet its equipment was out com-

plete to meet the needs of the community. New presses and new jobbing type were needed. Hundreds of dollars were spent for further modern equipment until now its valuation will easily reach \$15,000 or \$18,000. Speed on the newspaper press which I installed in the shop will run 1200 an hour, and the new jobber, whose speed is 4000 per hour, draws printing jobs from afar, thus making the Akron News printing plant second to none in the country for good work and speed.

Both Mr. and Mrs. B. are sound, but unobtrusive Republicans, and allow everybody his right to his own opinions yet Mr. Billings has made almost a state wide acquaintance among Republicans. The other party politicians concede his cleverness.

Mrs. B. is an ardent friend, and helper in the society events of the city and clubs. She is an untiring worker in the church, which is deeply appreciated because of her ability so cleverly and wisely offered. Mrs. Hahn, her mother, is none the less appreciated, not only in the printing office, but also in Sunday School and Church services.

All three members of this family are most valuable personages for the upbuilding of our city and community.

Wishing the Akron News a continued, prosperous happy life, we will quit writing, hoping that all will live to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Akron News.

The Akron News is still my child; it has had an eventful career. It was once burned out, losing its subscription list, advertising contracts, every scrap, files and all. And last, but not least, it was coaxed from its new brick home to a room around the corner to its present location, where I am hoping it will live to celebrate its 100th anniversary as a stalwart disseminator of usefulness and stand abreast along with the other business enterprises of good old Akron.

Early Record of Akron's Papers

AKRON'S FIRST NEWS-PAPER WAS "GLOBE"

The first newspaper published in Akron was the "Akron Globe", and a number of copies of this paper are still to be found through-out the community. A copy bearing the date of November 1866 is framed and in the files of the Public Library, but there is no official record of its beginning. W. T. Cutshall was the publisher, probably Akron's first editor.

The handpress was operated in a building used for drugs, medicines and groceries by Cutshall and Bitters. In 1867 Mr. Bitters

Withdrew from the firm, going to Rochester. A. J. Jackson became the owner of the drug stock in June 1868. In December 1869 he sold it to Milo Bright, who operated it in the name of Bright's Drug store. The Globe retained its home in this building until the early seventies. Mr. Cutshall, the editor, moved his family to Huntington about 1870. With Mr. Cutshall's removal, the publication ceased. Mr. Cutshall, a Civil war veteran, was the first editor in the village, and substantiates the fact that a paper was not published prior to the Civil War. About 1882 J. L. Snook came to town from Wab-

ash with a handpress and published the Akron Signal. It was short-lived and it was moved to Denver by the owner.

With the completion of the Chicago and Atlantic railroad, Frank Brown of Rochester put in a plant, and his paper, The Akron Echo, flourished for a brief time. L. M. Noyer took it over in 1887 and changed the name to the Akron Eagle. In the year 1890 S. N. Shesler became publisher and rechristened the The Akron News.



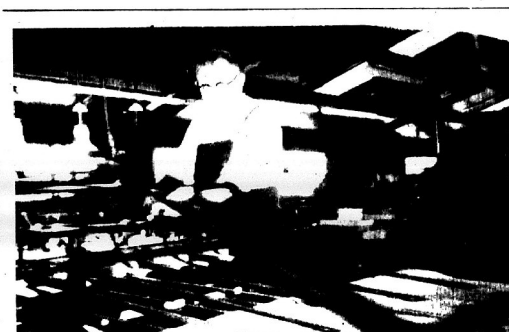

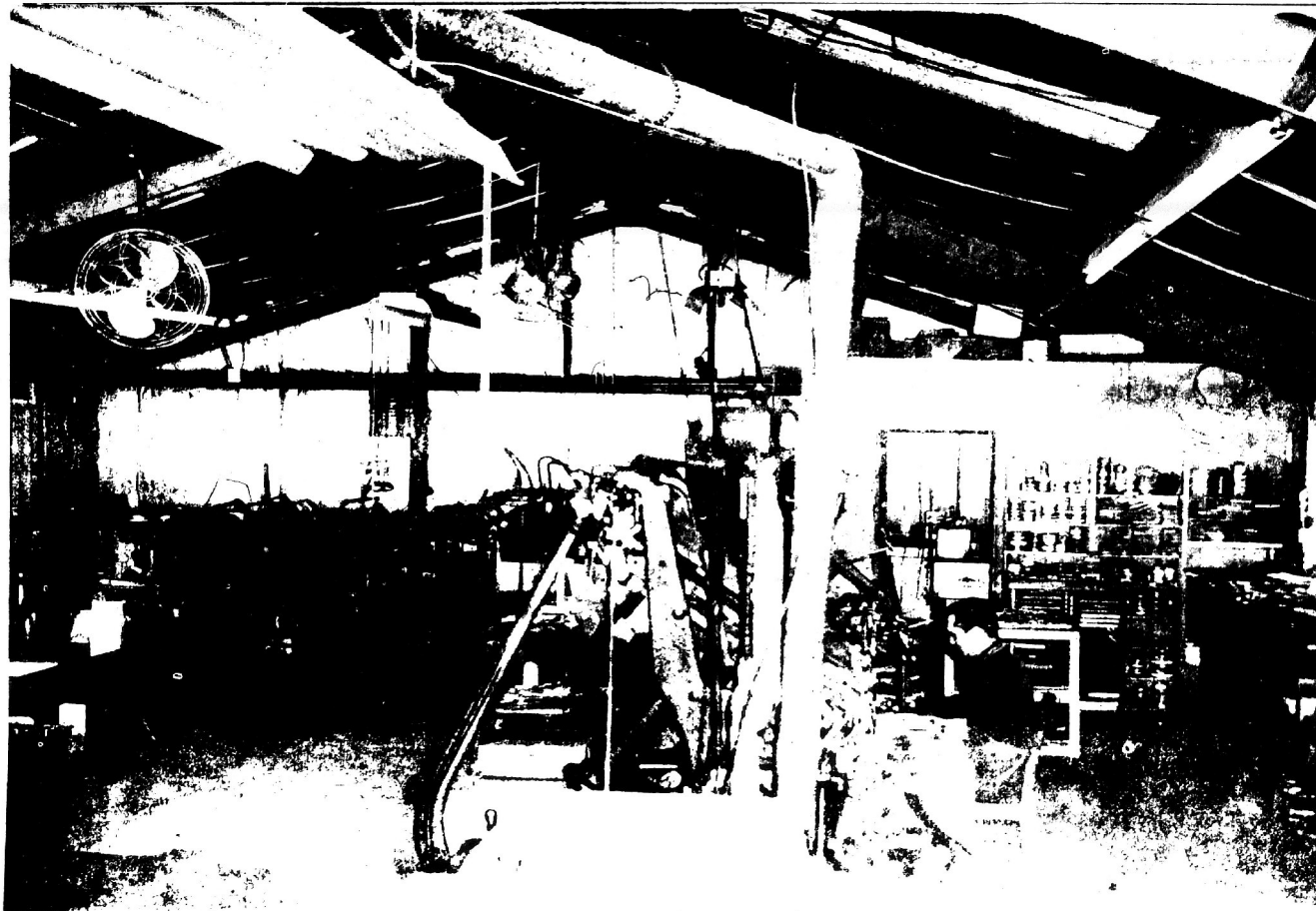

Mandatory Social Security numbers on 1990 registrations

The Bureau of Motor Vehicles announced effective January 1, 1990, social security numbers will become mandatory on all registrations. This means that all registrations processed after January 1, 1990 will require a social security number, including pre-sales processed prior to the January 1 date.

Deputy Commissioner of Branch Operations Michael Terry stated, "The preprint envelopes will carry notice, both on the delivery envelope and the return envelope, informing customers that the social security number is now mandatory. The notice requests that the customer write in their social security number on the preprint form if it does not appear on the form already."

The Indiana code cite, 4-1-8-1, which made this information mandatory will be indicated on the forms. The customer will not be able to register without it.

The only exemptions to the mandatory social security requirement are persons who do not carry a United States citizenship, and therefore are not eligible for a social security number.

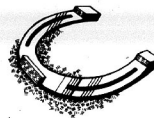

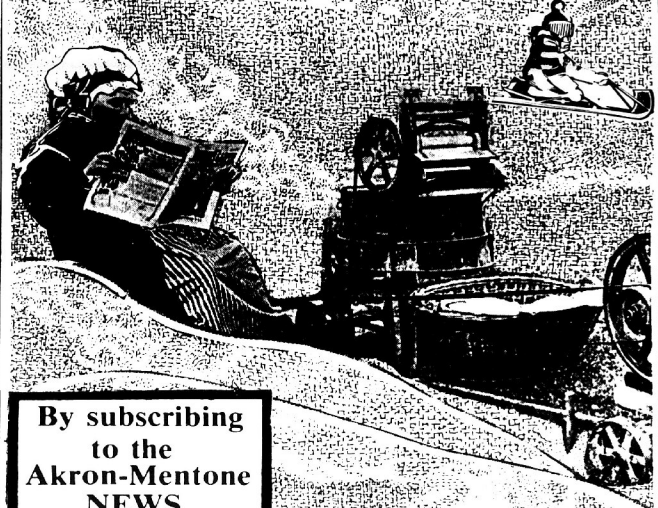

Scientists have found 15-year old vegetables and newspapers in sanitary landfills that have barely started to degrade because there is insufficient oxygen and water. Biodegradable plastics are not the answer to landfill problems. In fact, biodegradable plastic could contaminate other plastics and render them unrecyclable, because the second generation plastic would fall apart!

Mentone man in Panama invasion

As Noriega surrendered to American troops, the stories of the real heroes, the American soldiers came to the surface.

As families wait to hear from their sons and husbands, one family in Mentone knows that their son will return home and tell his story over and over again.

On December 20, 1989 Sergeant David Hudson of the 82nd Air Borne American Guard parachuted into the airport with 20 planes with 110 men on each plane. This was the first combat mission jump executed since D-day. David, a jump master and jungle expert, was in charge of 55 of those men.

David remembered meeting Noriega but at the time did not realize what a powerful man he was. In Panama, after David had completed a number of successful jumps he was presented his gold wings and Noriega attended the ceremonies.

On Christmas Eve a Panamanian business man named Paul Cane called some of the wives to let them know their husbands were all right. Lynn Brikel Hudson received a phone call that David was doing fine. Later, David phoned his mother, Lea Hudson, and informed her that everything was fine and the people of Panama were very happy the soldiers were there, bringing water and food, and doing anything to help them in their quest

to capture Noriega.

David is a 1984 graduate of Tippecanoe Valley High School and is the son of Jerry and Lea Hudson of Mentone. He is married to Lynn Brikel Hudson and they have two children, David, 5, and Jessica, 2.

If you were a winner in the Indiana Lottery during 1989, do you know what you need to do about your income taxes? Now is the time to learn and to make preparations for the upcoming tax filing season. Over 2.4 million Indiana filers received tax packages the week after Christmas, and will receive Form W-2, Wage and Tax Statement, by January 31.

Hoosiers can get answers to their tax questions by calling the IRS at 1-800-424-1040 (in Indianapolis 226-5477). Beginning January 21, the toll-free center will be opened extended hours. The hours will be Monday thru Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Saturday 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and Sunday 1:00 to 5:00 p.m.

Some changes for 1989 returns include: Social Security numbers for children age 2 and over, increased earned income credit, increased personal exemption and standard deduction amounts, and the repeal of the Medicare Catastrophic Care premium payment.

Last year over 82,000 Hoosiers received their refunds faster by filing electronically. Electronic filing is featured on the cover of the tax package and in IRS Commissioner Fred T. Goldberg's message to taxpayers. Many Indiana professional tax preparers offer electronic filing in addition to their return preparation services.

Through the efforts of countless community volunteers, Christmas Baskets were delivered Saturday, December 23, 1989.

The project, sponsored annually by the United Ministries of Rochester was started 16 years ago as a community project to provide a Christmas Basket of food and toys for needy families in Fulton County. The hope was to combine efforts of community and church groups who were individually giving food baskets. Throughout the years, this project has grown to be a total community effort. This year, 980 people benefited from the Christmas Baskets or 296 families, which

included 274 children and 13 infants.

United Ministries received donations totaling \$9,484.42 and spent \$8,941.82 for the basic food order, which was supplemented by donated foods, paper and soap products. Leftover monies will be used to stock the Food Pantry, located in the Civic Center. The Pantry is available on a limited basis to any Fulton County family needing food in an emergency situation. This is a year round ministry that offers a three day supply of food up to three times in six months.

Numerous volunteers, including youth groups, sorted and packed the foods at the Civic Center. Other volunteers, collected, sorted, repaired and wrapped toys, which had been delivered to the Fire Station and the Civic Center.

Many, many people are to be thanked for their time, money and efforts in pulling together to get the Christmas Basket Project completed successfully again this year.



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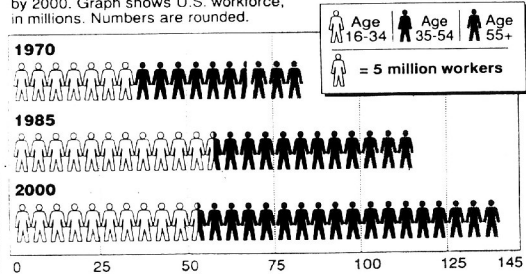



Health-Wise

Fever and Fear

Raymond O. West, M.D.

Most mothers recognize fever as an ill omen and respect it.

Three-year-old Brenda was feverish. She was peevish and had no appetite.

"After I finish the dishes, I'll take her temperature," her mother promised herself.

Too late. Little Brenda had a seizure--the special kind of convulsion that happens to toddlers when fever reaches a level that the brain can no longer tolerate. Fever-induced convulsions are a hazard of fever in toddlers who often run higher fevers than their older siblings.

Body temperature (fever) is Mother Nature's way of reminding us when illness is threatening. Fever is also nature's way of stimulating our antibodies, the body's fighting warriors, newly marshalled to destroy the microbial invaders.

But "knee jerk" reaction that calls for immediate measures to reduce a fever sometimes thwarts Mother Nature in her role as a healer. Many physicians believe that fevers below 102 degrees Fahrenheit (as an acceptable generality) should not be tampered with, and convulsions seldom occur at this reading. Nonetheless, fever is a cardinal symptom, and the underlying illness causing the fever must not be neglected.

Let us suppose that a patient's temperature is soaring. Up goes a red flag as we wonder, why the fever? This calls for diagnosis, and a call to your family physician for a telephone consultation is usually the best way to begin. A fever lasting more than a day or two calls for "hands-on" attention, for even a common "cold" can become acute bronchitis, a commonplace cause of flu, or a critical case of pneumonia.

Here are some guidelines. Every family should own a thermometer. In a baby under six months, a temperature over 100 degrees (37.7 C) warrants a call to your doctor.

In a child over six months, a temperature of 102 (38.9 C) can often be cared for by telephone. In an adult, a temperature over 101 that lasts for several days, even if there are no other symptoms,

may be a signal from Mother Nature that health is threatened.

In child or adult, if a fever rages 105 or over (40.5 C), urgent measures are demanded. Fever of this nature can produce confusion (delirium), even brain-cell damage through destruction.

Grandmother's alcohol sponges are still good methods to control fever. Some cautions in infants and toddlers, dilute the alcohol about half and half with water, and apply the alcohol to the skin in a fashion that avoids the child's inhaling the fumes. Alcohol sponges can be given repeatedly as necessary to reduce the fever below 102.

While aspirin and acetaminophen are both safe for adults, only the latter is fine for use in toddlers and other children. Read the label.

More cautions: A thermometer placed under the tongue is the traditional standard. Hot or cold food or drink, even brushing the teeth, along with breathing through the mouth, can alter the mouth-taken temperature for several minutes. Wait at least 15 minutes before attempting to take an accurate reading.

Remember, temperature taken by rectum must be reduced by one degree, and temperature taken by axilla, must have a whole degree added.

A good thermometer, knowledge of its use, and consequences of fever should be part of every household.

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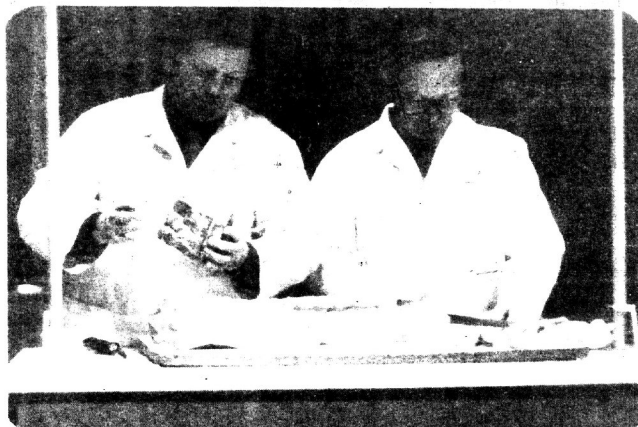

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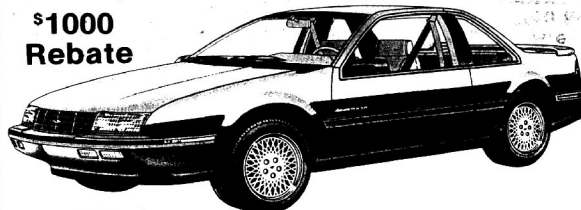

Counties to distribute surplus food for needy

Surplus butter, honey, pork, and flour or cornmeal will be distributed Thursday, February 8, 1990, beginning at 10:00 a.m., at various sites in ELKHART, FULTON, KOSCIUSKO, and MARSHALL COUNTIES.

Recipients are expected to utilize the distribution site nearest their home.

Recipients are required to show identification, such as a welfare or food stamp card, or a driver's license, and bring a container in which to carry the food home. Elderly or handicapped homebound individuals can have someone pick up the products for them by sending a signed authorization and proper identification with the person picking up the food.

Income eligibility guidelines for those under 60 are: household of one, \$8,970; two, \$12,030; three, \$15,090; four or more, add \$3,060 for each additional person in the household. If the head of the household is age 60 or over, the annual income guidelines are: household of one, \$10,764; two, \$14,436; three, \$18,108; four or more, add \$3,672 for each additional household member.

Young Men turning 26 in 1990

Young men who will turn 26 in 1990 will be reaching an important milestone, according to the Selective Service System.

Beginning on January 1, 1990, men who were required to register with Selective Service in 1982 will be turning 26 and will no longer be eligible for induction should a draft be reinstituted. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept late registrations after a man reaches his 26th birthday.

Selective Service Indiana State Director, Mr. Clark S. Ketterman, warned that with few exceptions, a man who fails to register before turning 26 will permanently forfeit his eligibility for certain benefits, such as federal student aid, job training and most federal employment in addition to facing possible prosecution as a felon.

Some states also require registration for state student aid, entrance to state supported colleges and universities, state employment and permission to practice law.

Mr. Ketterman points out that men age 18 through 25 who have not yet registered can avoid the risk of prosecution and loss of benefits by registering promptly at any local post office. Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000 up to five years in prison, or both.

Over 14 million men, age 18 through 25 are currently registered with Selective Service. Of those, 341,011 are from Indiana.

He can apply a thin veneer of porcelain and bond it directly over the surfaces of the stained teeth in a color that will match your natural teeth. The next time you see your dentist for a checkup ask him about the bonding technique to cover badly stained teeth.

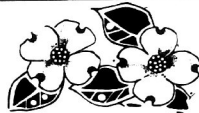

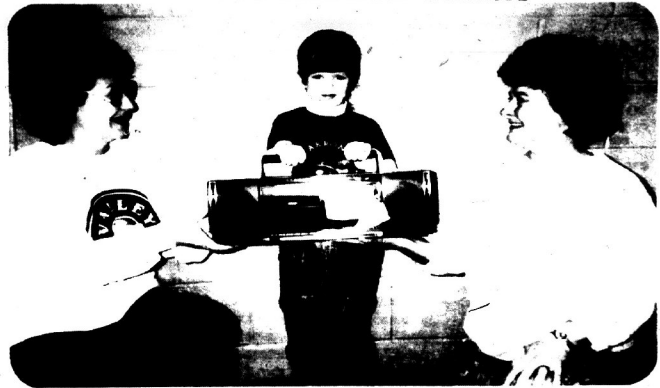
"Mother's Day Out"

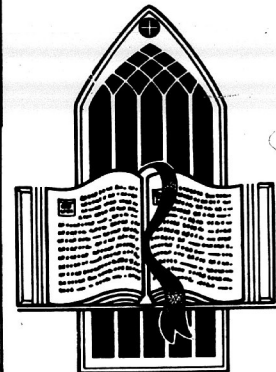

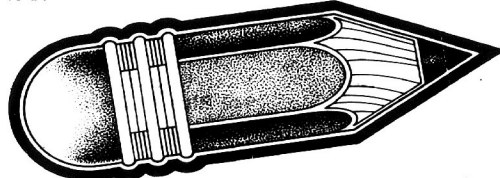

Fulton County Court report

The two courts in Fulton County generated \$222,332.17 in the county portion of court costs which were turned over to the Fulton County Auditor for deposit to the County General Fund. The Clerk of the Fulton Circuit and County Courts took in \$1,849,404.96. The State of Indiana was paid \$179,052.97 for its portion of court costs.

The Clerk received and distributed \$1,080,469.09 in child support payments during the year 1989, \$191,030.75 in garnishment/judgment payments, \$159,784.98 in trust fund receipts and \$16,735.00 in restitution payments.

In the Fulton Circuit Court, there were 8 adoptions filed, 385 civil filings, 90 criminal filings, 163 juvenile filings and 134 probate matters which includes estates and guardianships.

In the Fulton County Court, there were 41 felony cases filed, 529 misdemeanors filed, 3,188 infractions (traffic) filed and 776 small claims filed.

There were 190 marriage licenses issued from the Clerk's office.

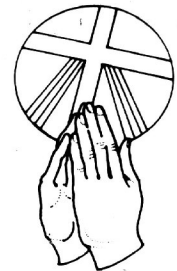

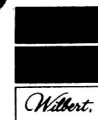

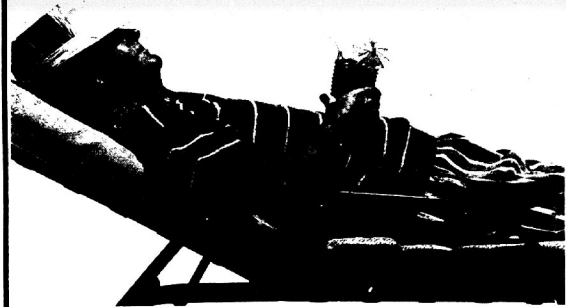

ASCS reminds farmers to file for wool payments

Farmers who have sold or plan to sell any shorn wool or unshorn lambs or mohair this year should turn in their sales receipts to be eligible for price support payments under the "National Wool Act," Steve Rodenberg of the Fulton County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said.

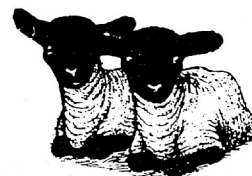
Farmers who have a record of their wool and mohair sales are eligible for payments only if the sales are reported to the ASCS Office.

Rodenberg said the quantity sold does not affect the eligibility, however, sales slips should contain the date of shearing (if possible), the month and date of sales, number of head shorn, pounds of wool (grease basis) or mohair sold, and net

proceeds. Sales slips for lambs also must show the liveweight and state that the lambs were unshorn.

He also reminds wool producers that marketing charges must be itemized on the sales documents, other than for sales at a farm, ranch, or local shipping point. "If transportation charges are not shown on the sales receipt, producers will be required to furnish this information when they turn in sales receipts, and file for a payment.

The ASCS official said transportation charges will be deducted from the sales document even if the producer sells through a wool pool, with or without a manager, or through any other agent. The location for which the net proceeds are computed also must be shown on the sales document.

Indiana High School Color Guard

The Indiana High School Color Guard Association (IHSCGA) opens its 1990 competition season at Tippecanoe Valley High school Saturday, February 3, at 5:00 p.m. Admission is \$3.00. There will be 18 guards performing. They are divided into 3 classes according to membership. Eight guards will compete in Class B (8-14 members); five, including Warsaw H.S., in Class A (15-22); and the Open Class (23-30) will consist of four guards. The Tippecanoe Valley Winter Guard as contest host, will perform in exhibition at 8:30.

IHSCGA was founded in 1983 in order to continue the development of students performance skills after the fall marching season has ended. Through competition, it promotes excellence in the visual and musical arts. With education as a primary philosophy, the association has sponsored many scholarships for senior guard members. This year, the association will award two \$1000 scholarships to two senior members at State Finals on March 17. Money for these awards is raised by the sale of color guard souvenirs.

In IHSCGA's first season, 28 high schools enrolled in membership. This season, 63 schools belong to the association. Ten will participate in the Open Class, 16 in Class A., and 37 in Class B. Only seven guards in each class will make it into Finals, and only one in each class will be able to call itself State Champion.

Throughout the country, there are many independent circuits feeding into WGI (Winter Guard International). However, IHSCGA is the only circuit strictly for high school members. All others offer membership to age 21. WGI culminates in Finals competition in Buffalo, NY in April. Many Indiana color guards partici-

pate in WGI. Center Grove High School of Indianapolis has been National Champion twice.

The IHSCGA competition season consists of weekly contests held throughout the state until March 17. The TVHS Winter Guard's competition schedule includes 8 contests. Besides the exhibition performance at the February 3 contest, the Guard will be at Lafayette Jefferson H.S. on February 10, Hamilton Southeastern H.S. on February 24, Warsaw H.S. March 3, and Pike H.S. in the morning and Avon H.S. on the night of March 10. On March 17, State Finals are held at Greencastle H.S. That morning, the Guard will compete in preliminary competition at either Mooresville or Greencastle. The top seven guards in each class that morning will compete that night in Finals competition. The winner of each class that evening will be the State Champion of 1990.

Anniversary of Social Security checks

It was January 1940. It was a time when a chip was a piece of wood, when hardware was something found in a hardware store, and software wasn't even a word.

If you have yet to retire and want a better understanding of what Social Security offers, you can request a free Personalized Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement (PEBES). The PEBES lists your Social Security earnings history including a yearly breakdown from 1951 on and an estimated amount of Social Security taxes paid on those earnings. It also gives you an estimate of future Social Security retirement benefits, plus disability and survivor benefits should you die or become disabled this year.

TAKEN FROM THE AKRON NEWS
JANUARY 25, 1940
50 YEARS AGO

Several hundred German sailors, from the scuttled German steamer, *Columbia*, passed through Akron over the Erie railroad late Monday afternoon, January 15th on their way to the Pacific coast, while little information was given out along the line, yet it was understood the sailors would go to San Francisco and then across the Pacific to Asia. Presumably they will cross Siberia and Russia, and thus evade capture by the British or French. There were two trains, about an hour apart. A thirty minute stop was made in Huntington while the train crews were changing. Capt. Wilhelm Daehme was in the first section, but did not get off the train. The sailors were guarded by government agents, as they were under internment regulations and were not allowed out of the coaches. However, they opened the windows and conversed with some of the bystanders. Some of the sailors couldn't speak English, while some of the bystanders understood German. All the sailors but one said they like the United States, "that is was a land of plenty." One expressed his anxiety to get home.

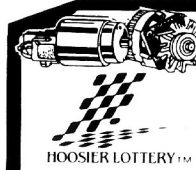

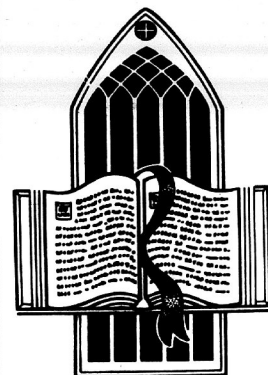

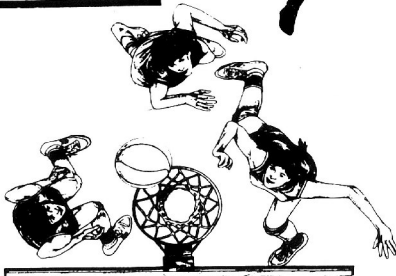
The Vikes will enter the sectional with the second best record. They will be playing number one ranked Warsaw Thursday night at 6 p.m. in the Warsaw gymnasium.

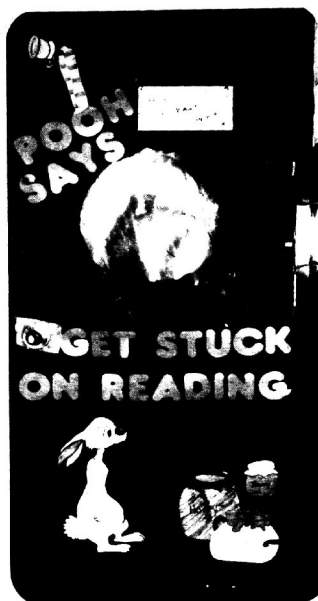
