The players are shipped free of charge to each talking book reader on extended loan for as long as each taiking book reader on extended loan for as long as the reader needs it. Any repairs that should be needed are handled by the talking book service, free of charge.

Talking book patrons may novels. mysteries. poetry, essays, the Bible, and a host of non-fiction titles. Most popular magazines, reflecting a broad range of interest, are also available. Children's books and magazine are, of course, available also.

Patrons applying for talking books indicate the type of player/players they would like to receive, and their general areas of reading interests: Mysteries, classics, bestselling fiction, etc. as well as any specific titles they want to read.

If you're thinking about signing up for Social Security sometime in 1992, you should get in touch with Social get in touch with Social Security now about your plans. You and your family my be due benefits for months you are still working. But to et those benefits, you must file your application early.

It may be to your advantage to have your Social Security benefits start in January, even if you don't plan to retire unitle later in the year. Under current rules that effect how much a beneficiary can earn, called the Social Security "retirement test", many people can receive more benefits with an more benefits with an application that is effective in

January.
A 1990 legislative change that eliminated retroactivity in most retirement claims, increased the importance of contacting Social Security before retiring. The rules are complicated, so the Social Security Administrations complicated, so the Social Security Administration urges prospective retirees to find out in advance if choosing to star their benefits in January would be advantageous.

Retirement claims that go

into effect in January can be filed any time now through January 31. To set up an appointment to file an application for retirement application for retirement benefits, call Social Security at 1-800-772-1213 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. weekdays. The best times to call are early or late in the day.

ASCS announces disaster payment program

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will administer a crop disaster assistance program to compensate eligible producers crop losses caused by drought, natural disasters in either 1990 or 1991.

"To be eligible, producers with crop insurance must have had losses greater than 35 percent," said county ASCS official Steve Rodenberg, "Producers without crop insurance must have had must greater percent." than

Program applications may be filed from February 3 through March 13.

The 1990-91 crop disaster provides for pr program production payments losses on participating program crops of wheat, feed grains, upland cotton, extra long staple cotton, and rice; nonparticipating program peanuts, soybeans, sunflowers, sugar beets, sugar cane and tobacco; and all commercial non-program

crops.
Rodenberg said producers who intend to file should begin to assemble their records now, so they will be ready when the program opens. He said that farmers will receive a special mailing with specific information on the program this month. "If a

producer does not receive the disaster program information in the mail by February 3, he or she should call the county ASCS office."

Rodenberg explained that a producer may not file on one crop on a farm for one year

and a different crop on the same farm for the other. "However, the producer may request benefits for 1990 on one farm and for 1991 on another farm."

The ASCS official said disaster payments would be computed according to the 1990 Farm Bill, and expects to begin issuing payments to farmers by April 16. Further details of the disaster payment program will be forthcoming.

Athens couple takes toys seriously

Talking to Tim Robbins will make you wish you'd kept all Talking to 1m Robbins will make you wish you'd kept all those boxes your kids' Christmas toys came in instead of pitching them out with the wrapping paper. Robbins, a dealer in collectible toys, 'explains that in a few years those Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles may be valuable and in many cases "the box is worth as much as the toy". As an example, Tim cites the 12" GI Joe dolls that were popular in the mid 60's. "A German GI Joe from the '67 'Soldiers of the World' series in mint condition would be worth 630." would be worth \$250, with the box it might bring \$800.

Tim and his business partner, Lou Ann Hahnert, who live in a farmhouse southeast of Athens, have been dealing in comic books and collectible toys for five years. It all started when Tim, who had always been interested in collecting, began scouting yard sales for antiques. He purchased a few toys and found they sold well. "A lot more people were looking for antiques and the antiques were more expensive and harder to find," he says, so

his interest switched to toys and comic books.

Four years ago, Tim and Lou Ann opened a shop called The Third Planet in Rochester. On weekends, they also have a booth at Speedway Mall, near Glenbrook, in Fort Wayne. Frequently, they attend toy shows or Star Trek conventions throughout the Midwest. The biggest share of their business, though, comes from mailorders to other dealers and collectors. In addition to toys and comics, they also deal in sport and non-sport cards, autographs of movie and rock stars, vintage paperbacks and

her collectible items.

Although neither Tim nor Lou Ann is originally from this

area, both have strong family ties here.

Tim was raised in New York state, graduating from Palmyra Masadon Central High School and St. John Fisher College. But during high school, he spent his summers working on his grand-father Norman Burkett's farm, south of Athens, Both of Tim's parents, Marcia Burkett and Jim Robbins, grew up in the Akron area. In 1984, after a stint as an assistant branch manager for First Federal Savings and Loan of Rochester, New York, Tim decided to move to the Akron area.

Lou Ann grew up in Cass County, south of Logansport. She attended Indiana University and had a number of different jobs, including planting trees and teaching English to foreign adults in Washington, D.C. Lou's older sister and her mother, Kathryn Hahnert, had moved to Athens and in 1983, Lou joined them. In addition to helping with the business, Lou is employed as a su-pervisor at Robertson Transformer in Rochester.

"The economy hasn't hurt the collectibles business," Tim ys. "True collectors will skip a car payment before they will pass up a toy they want. They seem to be pretty fanatical.'

"The key to success in this field is getting involved in an area before it becomes collectible," Lou says. "You have to predictthe trends

This isn't a big money-making occupation until you've been in it for 20 years, because you're trying to anticipate what will be the hot collectible ten years from now," Tim says. He is seeing a trend now towards 60's items, such as Peter Max, pop art and rock concert posters; protest items, records and Woodstock items. "It's real hot along the west coast and on the east coast right now," he says. "There are shops springing up dealing in all the 'counter-culture' stuff."

Tim listed some of the most collectible items from recent decades. "From the 40's-the radio premiums, decoder rings, and

anything featuring the cowboy heroes, Hop-a-long Cassidy, Roy Rogers or the Lone Ranger. From the 50's, battery operated Japanese-made toys are big. They were cheap then. A battery operated robot that cost \$3 new might be worth \$2000 now. From the 60's, the 12" GI Joes and Barbie dolls are hot. From the 70's-Star Wars toys are getting hot, but it'll take ten years for them to reach their potential. From the 80's, the three inch GI Joe dolls are doing well. It looks like Ninja Turtle items will probably be the big toy from the 90's.

probably be the big toy from the 90's.

Lou Ann and Tim have original art drawings by Kevin Eastman, one of the originators of the Ninja Turtles. "They may be priceless in the future," Tim says hopefully.

In comic books, it is mostly those featuring super heroes that are the most valueble. A feat redising the

are the most valuable. A first edition of the Superman comic book, in mint condition, can be worth \$20,000.

Last year, Marvel Comic Books artist, Denys Cowan made an in-store appearance at The Third Planet. Tim and Lou now have

several of his original drawings.

When it comes to collecting autographs, you must use caution. Many sports and movie starts use "ghost-writers" to sign their autographs and political figures frequently use an "autopen", a devise that duplicates their signature. Tim buys only from dealers who are members of the UACC regulating oronly non dealers who are members of the OACC regulating or-ganization. UACC dealers must guarantee the authenticity of any autograph they sell. Tim is proudest of his autographs of Lon Chaney Jr. and Boris Karloff. He has personalized inscriptions from Howard Hessman, Leonard Nimoy, Stephen King,

Collecting also requires caution in other areas. The new laser printers have been used to reproduce old toy boxes and baseball cards. Tim is afraid these fakes will ruin sport card collecting. "The first time someone goes out and buys a Michael Jordan rookie card for \$200 and someone else comes along and tells them it's a fake, that'll be it. It'll just ruin it for them."

Joan Jett and many others.

"The first thing you learn as a dealer," Tim says, "is don't collect for yourself, or you'll end up spending all you make." Tim has broken this rule, though, with an extensive personal collection of lobby cards from horror movies of the 40's and 50's. Displayed in theater lobbies to promote the film being shown, the cards usually come in sets of seven, but only one of the cards showed the monster. "The prize card out of every set is the one with the monster, and that's what I try to get," Tim explains.

Recently magazines, such as Toy Value Monthly, have raised

public awareness of the value of old toys. "It used to be I could walk into a flea market and find a rare Pez candy dispenser that was worth \$150 and buy it for 50 cents. Now everyone reads these magazines and thinks 'Wow! that little plastic container is worth \$150!" A Pez dispenser with the Green Homet on top might go for \$250 but ones with Mickey Mouse are quite com-

mon.

The average person would be very surprised at some of the items that are considered collectible. Plastic trinkets from cereal boxes, and even the boxes themselves, can be quite valuable. "Quake and Quisp cereal boxes from the 60's can be worth hundreds of dollars," Tim says. And he once sold a mold from a Creepy Crawler maker (remember those?) to a dealer in Japan.

There's a collector out there, somewhere, it seems, for almost any toy from the 40's, 50's, or 60's that has survived in good shape, especially if it's still with its box.

So, you might want to take another look at some of your childrens' Christmas toys or make a search of your parents' attic for some of your childhood toys. They just might be valuable, now or some day in the future.

"Did you like Scarlett?" Elaine asked me. "Is it worth buying for Mom Fugate?

"Well, it isn't Gone With The Wind, but then how could nyone write a book to equal that?" Honey had ordered a first edition for my birthday and we had

to wait for delivery. When it finally came, even though I don't have much reading time these days, it didn't take me long to devour it. Just like *Gone With The Wind*, once I got into it, it was hard to put down.

The new book takes up just where the first one stops. We first see Scarlett and the familiar people of her Atlanta world acting very much in character at Melaine's funeral.

Descried by Rhett and totally shunned by Atlanta society, Scarlett goes through a period of alcoholism before her eternal spirit revives, helping her to bounce back and pushing her out into the world.

From that point on Scarlett's natural verve takes her to Charleston, Savannah and on to Ireland, conquering, then sometimes losing everyone in her path.

The book is definitely Scarlett's story, although Rhett waltzes in and out of her life periodically, we meet his family and learn something of what "makes him tick."

Enraptured by the warm family life she discovers of her poor O'Hara relatives, Scarlett prefers them to the dignified but cold

We see Scarlett, both by turn, as hard working as during her post-war days at Tara and as captivating as we've ever seen her. She has opportunities for new romances, but the one character, an O'Hara cousin, who might have lured her away from her now obsessive love for Rhett is conveniently a Catholic priest.

Resourceful and charming in Ireland, Scarlett soon becomes the owner of the love O'Hara land and in a continuent learning.

For a time she functions as "The O'Hara," a position of tacit popular appointment, great responsibility and respect. But, true to form, Scarlett soon finds problems with these Scarlett soon finds problems with that.

By the end of the book, we see a matured Scarlett and follow some interesting developments in the lives of characters we know from her past.

Alexandra Ripley was a brilliant choice to write Scarlett. A Southerner herself, Ripley clearly knows the history of Charleston society and that of neighboring cities, as Margaret Mitchell did. Library last summer. They were absorbing books, and to my delight, I met some of the same characters and all-important social events in Scarlett that I had first met in her earlier books. Paine's Common Sense

"These are the times that try men's souls," observed political journalist and patriot Thomas Paine at the start of the American Revolution.

Deemed the greatest political pamphleteer in American history, Paine was born in England on Jan. 29, 1737, and began work as a corset maker at age 13. Paine unsuccessfully

tried various other occupations until 1774, when he met Benjamin Franklin who gave him letters of introduction to travel to America.

Paine's first job in the American colonies was editing Pennsylvania Magazine, and he soon began publishing his own articles. His most famous work is the pamphlet "Common Sense," which was published on Jan. 10, 1776. A persuasive argument for independence, "Common Sense" sold 500,000 copies within a few months and helped pave the way for the Declaration of Independence

Histórians, however, claim that Paine's greatest contribution to the patriotic cause was his 16 "Crisis" papers. The stirring prose of these papers helped inspire the dispirited Continental Army, which, in December of 1776, was on the verge of disintegration.

Tobacco Exports' Continued Rise

At a time of economic uncertainty nationwide, there is one source of good news for the American economy - U.S. tobacco exports.

· American leaf tobacco and cigarette exports have had a significant impact on the U.S. economy, according to a recent Price Waterhouse study released by the Coalition for Open Markets and Expanded Trade (COMET).

The study shows that, in 1990, tobacco exports generated 268,785 jobs, \$6.34 billion in earnings for U.S. workers and \$2.23 billion in tax revenues for local, state and federal governments. Also in 1990, net U.S. exports of leaf tobacco, cigarettes and other tobacco products equaled \$5.77 billion - an increase of more than \$2 billion since 1981.

'This study makes two points indisputably clear: U.S. cigarettes and other tobacco products can compete in the international marketplace, and this compétition translates into substantial benefits' for the U.S. economy," said Wayne Valis, executive director of COMET.

During the 1980s, the U.S. tobacco products export industry was one of the few Ameri-

can industries to increase its foreign trade surplus, while the U.S. merchandise trade deficit nearly quadrupled from \$27.3 billion in 1981 to \$101.7 billion in 1990, the study reported. Analysts attribute this dramatic increase in part to a growing demand for high-quality American products and increasing international competitiveness of

Working with a diamond grinder and leaded stained glass, he creates beautiful lamp shades, shades for hanging lights, night lights, sun catchers, shadow boxes, Christmas ornaments, window panes, hand mirrors and university logos.

In Bob's workshop, a small attached to his house, narrow storage sections under the workbench hold varied colors and types of glass that Bob fashions into the colorful pieces which so delight family, friends and lucky recipients of pieces as gifts. Carton boxes hold the overflow of stained glass stock, as well as his extensive collection of patterns and pattern books. Although he uses boughten patterns for most pieces, he has begun to create his own original designs.

Right now, a custom pool table light shade is almost finished on his workbench. Having adapted a smaller pattern for his use, Bob has lengthened the shade and added the word "pool" to the

Colorful flower arrangements and birds of all kinds are favorite subjects for Bob's art. One large suncatcher depicts a farm scene featuring a traditional big red barn. Poinsettias, lighted in a shadow box, and angels help to light up Christmas time. Bob has made several crosses, complete with overhead clouds and sky. One of these graces The Resting Place chapel of Bonnie Newton east of Burket. Another hangs in the Gosherts' Florida church. Bob and Betty presented a special cross, lighted in a shadow box, to the nursery of Burket's United Methodist Church, in memory of their son, Lee, who died in 1944, at the age of almost three.

Bob says the piece he's proudest of is a door window about 22"x58" he made for a granddaughter. Irises in the center bloom under the sun and sun rays. Two small ducks bobbing on the water near a seacoast compete the picture. Bob says as he was planning the window, Betty commented that the lake needed ducks. So, working with very small pieces of glass, he added

He keeps it well-stocked so the shopper has plenty to choose from. Bob says his art pieces have gone as gifts all over the United States and beyond. One lady, his Florida doctor, bought many pieces to

beyond. One tady, first prioring doctor, bought many pieces to take home with her to the Philippines.

All of Bob and Betty's nieces and nephews have benefitted from Bob's art. Starting out to give each of them a large piece of their own choice for their twenty-fifth wedding-anniversary, he decided the younger ones needn't wait that long. So, he has almost completed the task of propositive each exists. almost completed the task of presenting each one with a gift of

art.

Bob says his interest in working with stained glass has proved to be a "godsend." During recuperation from cancer surgery a few years ago, he remembers times when he felt sorry for himself, wondering, "Why me?" At those times he would jump up and get busy in the shop. "I'd work awhile," he says, "then go in, lay down, go to sleep and rest. I'd recommend a hobby like this to everyone," he adds. "It was a wonderful thing for me."

Bob graw up in the house near Burket where Rich and Marna

His name, he laughs "is without a doubt" one of those carved on the wall behind the stage in the Burket gym. Bob played basketball at Burket and played saxophone in the band "--and chased Mom

chased Mom."
"Mom" is the former Betty Hammer, who loved taking part in high school chorus and all the plays before graduating from Atwood High School. She remembers she helped her dad on the farm after graduation, raising chicks for fifty cents a week.
They both laugh as they tell the story of how they met. It was at Church Camp at Epworth Forest. She sat several rows above

him one evening and was thrilled to receive a note from him requesting to walk her back to her cottage. But, the walk turned out to be hurried and he left her almost without saying goodnight. She was puzzled because she never saw him again that week. It was only later she learned that Bob and friend Louie Meredith had bet each other a quarter on which one could

"I was the winner, anyway," Betty chuckles. "I got Bob!" It was three years later they were married.

State Taxes Hit Record High

Despite the fact that tax increases are not popular with the American public, state legislatures handed out plenty of them recently, making fiscal year 1991 the biggest year in history for revenue raising by the states, according to a recent study by the Tax Foundation. "And with no robust recovery in sight," the study stated, "it is a trend which will cause an increasing amount of pain to state taxpayers."

Thirty states have enacted tax increases designed to raise a total of \$17 billion in new revenue during fiscal year 1992, reported the Washington, D.C.based research organization. Gasoline and tobacco were the most popular targets, with 23 states raising the amount paid at gas pumps, and 14 states increasing cigarette excise taxes. The bulk of the new revenue. however, will be raised from higher sales taxes in six states

and higher income taxes in

According to the Tax Foundation study, these tax increases are the latest in a frend of higher taxes and higher spending at the state level that began during the 1980s. State taxes grew an average of 8.6 percent throughout the last decade, outpacing inflation by three percentage points.



Date set for McEyoy trial

A two-day jury trial has been set for May 12 and 13 in Fulton Circuit Court for former Akron Town Marshall

James McEvoy.
McEvoy, 30, was arrested
December 13 on charges of contributing to the delinquency of a minor and obstruction of justice. He is accused of ordering Deputy Marshal Daniel Butt to not file a report on a theft from Gagnon Chevrolet and threatening to pull Gagnon's impound license if they filed a report. The incident, which took place late in November, involved an Akron juvenile against whom delinquency charges were also filed.

I remember how proud I felt each time I was able to go to the office to purchase a stamp or two. Before my youngest brother enlisted in the Navy, on his seventeenth birthday, he faithfully supplied my sister and I with extra coins for stamps.

Then the momentous day came when our books were full and my sister and I each actually owned a war bond! They were so

my sister and I each actually owned a war bond! They were so important, our parents solemnly placed them for safekeeping in their bank safety deposit box. That was serious business to a

I remember, in those days, there were "unpatriotic people" around who questioned the future value of bonds. I can still hear Dad saying, "The day U.S. Savings Bonds aren't safe, our whole country is in trouble." country is in trouble.

I don't remember how my sister used her precious bond money, but I certainly remember the day I redeemed and spent mine. In those days, high school graduates (in my school, at least) wore a new "graduation suit" under our gowns for Baccalaureate and Commencement. My bond money bought my very sober and really quite elegant dark green graduation suit from John Snell's in Warsaw.





An Akron man is dead and a Warsaw women is still in critical condition after a shooting that took place last Tuesday in Warsaw.

Rose Cotton, 22, 4224 N. unkle Drive, Warsaw, Runkle suffered two shots to the neck and one shot to the head allegedly fired by Phillip Joe Ellis, 29, 402 N. Center Street, Akron.

Police beleive Ellis went to Cotton's residence about 3:45 tried to enter the p.m. and trailer. Cotton refused to let him in. When the police approached the Ellis vehicle they found Ellis had a selfinflicted gunshot wound to the

Basketball great Bob Igney honored at Valley

A new plaque has been placed on display at Tippecanoe Valley High School honoring Indiana Basketball Hall of Famer Bob Igney, who taught and coached first at Mentone High and then at TVHS from 1970 until his death in 1983.

The plaque was purchased with donations from teachers, students and athletes who had worked with Igney during his

students and address who have years at Valley.

On Mary 22, 1991 Igney was inducted into the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame at an awards dinner at the Indiana Convention and Exposition Center in Indianapolis. On April 14 his widow, Ruth, took part in the ribbon cutting ceremony for the permanent Hall of Fame display in Newcastle.

Igney first gained fame on the hardwoods of Rossville High School, where he lettered all four years, after transferring in the ninth grade from Frankfort. He was instrumental in Rossville's surprise upset of Frankfort in the 1937 sectional, Frankfort had won the state tourney in 1936 and was favored to do so again in '37. The next weekend Bob scored 31 points in the games of the Lafayette Regional. He was co-captain of the team and named its MVP. He was named to the 1937 All-State team and was frequently referred to by rival coaches as a "natural".

Bob went on to play basketball for Purdue, where he lettered three years, under Hall of Famer "Piggy" Lambert. His first year on the varsity squad he was Purdue's leading scorer and was a starter for the Sugar Bowl Classic in 1938. Bob was the leading scorer with 16 points, in the game in which the Boilermakers

defeated Southwest Conference Champions Arkansas 57-51.

In the 1939-40 season Bob helped Purdue win the Big Ten championship, a feat the Boilermakers did not accomplish again

Together, Ken and Jeff have formed A & B Fabricating at 516 N. Morgan Street in Mentone, a fabricating shop for industrial, commercial and residential needs that offers a "wide range of commercial and residential needs that offers a "wide range of services, from belt conveyors, bucket elevators, screw conveyors, material handling equipment, storage bins and silos, walkways and platforms." They also weld a "wide range of materials, including mild steel, stainless steel and a variety of

What makes Ken and Jeff's business unique is their portability. Instead of the customer bringing his problem to the A & B shop, Ken and Jeff go to the customer. They "offer portable welding service on a twenty-four hour emergency basis, including weekend and holidays. "We are on the road 65 to 70 percent of the time," Jeff says. Most of their work is for feedmills and farmers. Recently they erected a 220 foot grain leg elevator--about twice as high as the tallest in Mentone.

Referring to themselves as millwrights, the two men design, build, install, maintain and repair just about any kind of

Fate seemed to keep bringing Ken and Jeff together, until they finally formed their partnership. "We started school together at Akron," they grin. "We're both in the same first-grade picture."

The same fate that brought them together also separated them

several times. While still in grade school, Ken moved to Talma, then to Mentone. But, both young men graduated from Tippecanoe Valley High School, Ken in 1976 and Jeff in 1977, where they both got started working with machinery in high school Industrial Arts classes.

Ken graduated at mid-term, January 17, 1976 and January 19, 1976, he was in U.S. Navy Boot-Camp at Great Lakes Naval Training Station, Chicago, Illinois. Ken credits the Navy for much of his currant success. He attended Engineman A School, where he learned "what a control pitch propeller is. I learned more in thirteen weeks of Boot Camp than I learned in four the death of the propeller is the school. You have to learn it. When the drill. Set years of high school. You have to learn it. When the drill Sgt. walks in early in the morning, you realize it's a whole new ballgame here. You grow up quick. I'd recommend it to every young man.'

Following training, Ken was stationed aboard the LST 1182 U.S.S. Fresno. There, besides gaining experience and honing his skills, Ken took schooling in hydraulics, pneumatics and electricity. "When you eat and sleep something for four years, you have to learn something," he laughs.

Jeff also gained a lot from the military. He enlisted in December, 1976, in the delayed entry program, in the U.S. Army

and entered the service in September, 1977. After Basic Training at Fort Knox, Kentucky, where he took Advanced Individual Training, he went to Fort Polk, Louisiana for eighteen months. Training, he worked as Battalion Dispatcher and as a mechanic. "I fixed everything from Jeeps to tanks," he says. His next move was to Mintz, West Germany, where he served sixteen months before being discharge. "In Germany," he laughs, "I was still 'turning wrenches,' from Jeeps to trucks." Jeff says he thinks some service for each young man in the country should be mandatory.

Both young men had taken advantage of every possible opportunity to learn before they rejoined civilian life in 1980. Both then spent the next few years working and becoming more proficient in the millwright and welding trades.

"It was hard work," they agree, "but we were willing to work."

work."

The two young men met again for the first time after high
The two young men met again for the first time after high school in a metals shop doing industrial maintenance, where Jeff for at time was Ken's supervisor. Jeff went on to an apprenticeship program, from which he earned a certificate. He worked as a supervisor for eight years.

Ken, meanwhile, joined another shop, starting as maintenance man, advancing to maintenance supervisor, with eight men under him; then was promoted to Project Manager, a very responsible position. He often traveled on the job, flying to New York, New Jersey, N. Carolina, Texas and Chicago. One interesting machine he worked with was a "bag line' that makes the hubble material and for packing." the bubble material used for packing.

the bubble material used for packing.

As well as designing, building and installing machinery, Ken became experienced in hiring and supervising contractors, excavators, electricians and millwrights.

Finally, Ken and Jeff realized they had the necessary knowledge and initiative to run a business of their own. They did their first job early in October, 1990, working out of Jeff's garage. All they had to work with then was a portable welder, a two wheeled trailer and their curve exerced tests. two-wheeled trailer and their own personal tools. Their business opened officially November 1, 1990. "Ken was working firsts and I was working thirds," Jeff says. "We'd work together all night long. We didn't get much sleep."

Successful from the start, they soon expanded to a building on Main Street with more equipment and both were able to leave

their other jobs.

It was a happy day when, within their first year of business, they bought the old Kralis building on N. Morgan Street. They are very comfortable there with plenty of work and office space. 'We have more space now than we need," they add. "Three large office areas are for rent.'

Jeff and former Robin Wideman first got together during one of his Army leaves. "We couldn't stand each other in school," he laughs. But they started dating during that leave and now are married, with two children, Autumn, 6, and Austin, 3. They live

in Mentone.

Ken met Charlene, the visiting niece of California friends, while in the Navy and, upon his discharge, followed her home to Virginia, where they soon married. They live west of Mentone in Walnut, and have three children, Patricia, 11, Amelia, 5 and Lauren, 3.

Ken is an avid golfer, shooting in the 70's. Jeff likes golf also

"plays baseball cards

Ken and Jeff have high hopes for the future of their company. Their business is growing. "We go in, do the job, and we leave," they say. "We do good work. We're both perfectionists. We don't want to do anything over!"

One thing Ken and Jeff would change if they could is Mentone's lack of a police officer. But, they are well satisfied with their location here. "We both came from this area," they say. They appear to be planning to stay!

until 1969. Bob was named

team captain of the Riveters for the 1940-41 season.

During his years with Purdue, Igney was known as one of the most accurate long shooters in the Big Ten. Bob was also a star baseball player lettering both in high school and for the Boilermakers.

After graduation from Purdue, Bob served as head cage coach at Kendallville High School, leading the Comets to four sectional championships in five successful seasons. His teams won 95 of the 125 games they played.

In 1953, Bob, Ruth and their two sons, Mike and Bob, moved to Lebanon, where Bob signed on as basketball coach

Bob was among the players named Silver All-Star to the 6 Anniversary

Basketball Team in 1962.

Bob, Ruth and family moved to a farmhouse between Claypool and Burket in 1970 when Bob began coaching at Mentone. When the new high school opened in 1974, Bob made the move to Valley. There he coached or with basketball, cross country, B-team basketball, wrestling and Affectionately his students as baseball. known to "Uncle Bob", he also taught government, economics and

driver's education.

While living in this area the Igneys were active members of the Burket United Methodist Church and Ruth belonged to the Seward Home Extension Club. Even after he had stopped coaching, Bob continued to attend all of Valley's home games. Ruth remained at the Claypool farmhouse for a year after a heart attack claimed Bob's life in 1983. Tax news: The new earned income credit

Designed to help working Americans, major changes have been made to the earned income credit for 1991. In addition to increasing the dollar amount of the refundable credit and adjusting it for family size, two new credits have been added-a heath insurance credit and a young child credit. The requirements for claiming the credit have changed too, explains Paula Garcia from H & R Block.

Paula goes on to say, to qualify for the credit taxpayers must have earned income and adjusted gross income of less than \$21,250 and they must have at least one qualifying

A qualifying child is one who meets three tests relating to relationship, residence, and age. Qualifying relationships include a taxpayer's son or daughter or descendent of either, stepson or stepdaughter, foster child, or adopted child. The qualifying child must have lived with the taxpayer for more than half the year (the entire year in the case of a foster child). Finally, the qualifying child must be under age 19 (or a full time student under age 24) or be permanently and totally

A taxpayer entitled to the basic credit who also has out-of-pocket expenses for medical insurance covering at least one qualifying child may credit. A taxpayer who has a qualifying child born in 1991 may claim the young child credit as well.

The IRS has designed a new Schedule EIC for claiming the revised and expanded credit. In addition to providing separate space for calculating each part of the total earned income credit, the new twopage form requires that the taxpayer provide certain identifying information about his or her qualifying child or


